THE government is in the 2024/25 financial year, plans to issue a total of 49.5bn/- in subsidies for the implementation of various alternative energy projects.

Dr Doto Biteko, the deputy prime minister and Energy minister, made this observation yesterday when presenting the ministry's budget estimates for fiscal 2024/25,

totalling 1.883trn/-.

This includes the second phase promotion of cleaner or sustainable cooking energy shifts, like the construction of natural gas supply infrastructure in public and private institutions serving more than 300 people per day, he said.

## Broadcasting licenses see new high since Dec, 2023

#### **By Guardian Reporter**

LICENCED broadcasting service providers increased by five to 350 per cent in various categories between December 2023 and March 2024, a recent report has indicated.

Dr Jabir Bakari, the Tanzania Communications Regulatory Authority (TCRA) director general, says in the January-March 2024 communications sector status report that intra-city courier licences, mainly for passenger buses, increased by 30 per cent.

Unveiling the report in Dar es Salaam yes-


terday, he said that subscription television content licences increased by 60 per cent from 10 to 16 agencies, with district licences in this category rising by 350 percent from two operators to nine licensed during the period.

TCRA issued 17 community radio licences during the period, a jump from 11 licenses during October to December 2023, a 55 per cent increase. "This category authorizes content services for specific communities," he stated.

require community broadcasters to provide content based on community issues not usually covered by other content service providers covering the same area, he said.

"They are required to use only standard Kiswahili or English language and may use another language for specific periods with prior TCRA approval," he said, noting that more institutions now use the country's domain name online.

The domain name (dot tz) on websites and email addresses is widely applicable, with registered domain names increasing from 29,006 late December 2023 to 29,968 by end of last month.

A domain name system translates the numerical addresses of computers connected to the internet into names that are easier to remember. Domains identify particular web pages and are also used in email addresses, the report indicated.

It shows a rise in domain names for companies and businesses (dot. co), tertiary academic or technical institutions with relevant accreditation (dot.ac) and non-profit organizations (dot.or), he said.

"Country-level domain names are more advantageous than generic domains such as dot.com as they identify the owner with the countries where they operate and inspire loyalty and trust in a website," he added.

CHAIRPERSON of the African Union (AU) Commission Moussa Faki Mahamat has expressed serious concern about the escalating challenges of terrorism and violent extremism affecting the African continent.

"Terrorism and violent extremism are the biggest evils of our time -- spreading to all the five regions of Africa," the AU Commission chief told a high-level meeting on counter-terrorism in the Nigerian capital of Abuja on Monday, according to an AU statement.

Faki referred to the scourge of terrorism in Africa as "a form of metastasis," as he highlighted the concerning situations in the Horn of Africa, the Great Lakes Region, the Sahel, and parts of northern Africa.

## Floods cause widespread devastation in Nairobi

cent weeks. Nearly 100,000 people have been displaced in Burundi, while at least 58 people have died in Tanzania.

One of the biggest drivers of heavy rain in East Africa is the Indian

Ocean Dipole (IOD).

The IOD - often called the "Indian Niño" because of its similarity to its Pacific equivalent - refers to the difference in sea-surface temperatures in opposite parts of the Indian Ocean.

During a positive phase the waters in the western Indian Ocean are much warmer than normal and this can bring heavier rain regardless of

However, when both a positive IOD and an El Niño occur at the same time, as was the case last year, then the rains in East Africa can become extreme. One of the strongest positive IOD patterns on record coincided with one of the strongest El Niño patterns in 1997 and 1998, with severe flooding reported. These caused more than 6,000 deaths in five countries in the region.

A TOTAL of 169 public institutions that feed more than 100 people at a time have complied with the government's directive of not using firewood and charcoal as main energy

Dr Selemani Jafo, Minister of State in the Vice President's Office (Union and Environment) said this yesterday in the National Assembly while tabling the 2023/24 financial year

He said that during the financial year 2023/24, the government issued a ban on public institutions that feed more than 100 people to stop using firewood and charcoal and use clean energy for cooking by January, 2024.

He said government institutions that stopped using firewood and charcoal and started using clean energy for cooking include 30 teachers' training colleges, 51 community development colleges, eight vocational education training colleges, 76 prisons out of 129 and four colleges run by prisons.

According to him, other institutions that are in various stages

of investment in clean energy for cooking include hospitals, health centers, primary and secondary schools, Fire and Rescue Force and institutions managed by the Ministry of Defence.

"I encourage all institutions that still use firewood and charcoal to continue investing in the use of clean energy for cooking. In addition, I ask private institutions that feed more than 100 people to start using clean cooking energy to save our environment and protect the health of the communities," he said.

In another development, Dr Jafo said assessment of the floods and mudslides that occurred in Katesh, Manyara Region revealed that the landslides were caused by geological phenomenon on Mount Hanang which is formed by weak rock.

He said the landslides that occurred in Hanang District were due to the rock being overwhelmed by heavy rains that fell in a short period of time and caused slides of mud, trees and stones.

In addition, he said the assessment revealed that unsustainable human activities taking place on the side of the mountain have contributed to the destruction of natural vegetation and thus increases the ease of rocks falling from the moun-

Regarding the priorities of the new budget, Dr Jafo said that in ensuring sustainable conservation of the environment, for the year 2024/25, Vice President's Office has planned to coordinate implementation of the National Environmental Policy 2021 and the Environmental Management Act, Chapter 191.

Also, the office is overseeing implementation of the National Master Plan for Conservation and Environmental Management (2022 - 2032) and taking measures to reduce environmental damage, strengthening the coordination and implementation of environmental conservation issues in sectoral ministries, regional secretariats and local government authorities.

# LHRC wants tougher laws to enforce accountability

THE Legal and Human Rights Centre (LHRC) has called for review of laws with provisions that make public office holders accountable for their actions.

Dr Anna Henga, LHRC executive director, said this in Dar es Salaam yesterday shortly after the launch of Tanzania Human Rights Report 2023 themed 'Constitution: A pillar for accountability and rights protection.

Dr Henga said there is a need to revisit the current constitution in order to strengthen accountability mechanisms and where necessary create new provisions to implement the recommendations made by stakeholders to address human rights violations in the

According to her, accountability is the cornerstone of human rights framework without which rights holders cannot hold duty bearers to account in accordance with their obligations.

"In recent years, stakeholders in Tanzania have repeatedly voiced their concerns over the lack of accountability, including corruption and mismanagement, misuse and embezzlement of public funds as contained in CAG reports," she said.

"A new, people-centred constitution is therefore needed now more than ever to enhance human rights and accountability.

Key issues highlighted in the report include mob violence, witchcraft motivated killings, intimate partner homicide, press freedom issues and economic violence against women and children.

"Others are criminal justice challenges as highlighted in the presidential commission on criminal justice reforms, violence against the elderly, mental health, violence against children; political participation, quality education and health services, economic empowerment of women, youth and persons with disabilities, corruption, embezzlement, accountability and development in relation to human rights," she said.

Dr Henga said the report impacts all Tanzanians, public institutions, civil society organisations, private institutions and various groups, adding that LHRC calls upon policy makers to implement the recommendations given in the report through formulation of policies

"Apart from the policy makers, the public also has to observe and establish why there are human rights violations against children because it is the people's duty to protect children. There are also recommendations for human rights that are related to people from special groups," she said.

Dr Henga said that the Tanzania Human Rights Report 2024 shows that children account for 45 percent

while women account for 30 percent of victims of human rights violations whereas other victims are elderly at 12 percent, men at 10 percent and persons with disabilities at 3 percent.

"Five most violated rights are right to life, freedom from violence, right to equality before the law, right to liberty and personal security and freedom from torture. Some of the regions where most of the human rights violations and issues were reported are Dar es Salaam, Njombe, Geita, Arusha, Kilimanjaro, Mara, Kigoma and Dodoma," she said.

She said that based on the assessment of human rights issues vis-a-vis international human rights standards, LHRC observed that the overall situation of human rights deteriorated in 2023 compared to 2022, adding that there were a few positive changes such as the removal of the ban on political rallies and enactment of the Universal Health Coverage (UHC) law.

Fundikila Wazambi, head of research at LHRC, said the effects of human rights violations have been devastating and can be seen at individual, society and national levels, adding that some victims were heavily affected while others died which is a loss to the country's human

"Money is also lost through embezzlement of funds which could have been used for the purchase of more hospital beds to help pregnant mothers, improve elderly services or add to education budget to finance feefree education. The effects are immense," he said.

Wazambi said the first group to be affected is children, a situation he said calls for accountability from the government and members of parliament through review of policies and laws, adding that everyone has a role to play.

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#### Tanga port attracts more big ships after revamp

THE Port of Tanga is gaining global prominence in international shipping because as evidenced in the increase of big vessels docking there recently.

Between July 2023 and February this year, it served 217 ships out of which 94 were mammoth marine vessels and 123 were medium-sized vessels.

During the same period, the port handled 160 ships, meaning it registered a 35.6 percent performance rise. However, the port is still performing poorly in the export container cargo aspect.

"We have come a long way. Our port modernisation project is bearing fruit. Now that in such a short period we have handled 94 deep sea ships, it means we have gained global shipping reputation," said Tanga Port Manager Masoud Mrisha in a briefing to reporters on the port's performance recently.

He thanked port users, calling them "our valued stakeholders."

The two-phase project which started in October 2019 has cost the Tanzania Ports Authority (TPA) a total of 429.1bn/- and was implemented by China Harbour Engineering

Tanga port was established by the German colonial government in the 1880s as a 'marine jetty'. Despite its strategic position on the

Indian Ocean coast, for decades the port has been skipped by foreign ships for lack of requisite marine infrastructure.

"We know we are in a strategic coastal area to handle cargo to and from any point on this globe," he told a reporter who wanted to know why the port has lagged behind in the global shipping business despite its strategic location."But the investment made by TPA in modernising the port is paying off and there is no going back."

As a result of the modernisation project, the entrance channel is now 73 metres wide and draft has increased from three to 13 metres. The ships' turning basin has also been increased and its entry is now 800 metres.

Mrisha said between 2018/19 and 2022/23 financial years, the port handled cargo at an annual average rate of 12.2 percent. The port handled 667,976 metric tonnes in 2018/19 rising to 987,828 in 2022/23.

There has also been a rise in handling containers. In 2018/19 some 6,259 containers were handled, rising to 7,244 containers in

"You will appreciate that there has been an annual average rise of 4.3 percent," he said. However, he noted that the current headache has been to secure container cargo for export; something he said is a significant aspect in the shipping business and international trade.

"As you are all aware, there are several strategic government projects such as Standard Gauge Railway, East African Crude Oil Pipeline, Julius Nyerere Hydroelectric Power Project and the ongoing expansion of roads carried out by the Tanzania National Road Agency."

She underscored that the conference will also recognize public institutions and investors who posted excellent performance by giving them awards.

Investors come to Tanzania in big numbers after the government created a business-friendly environment that attracts foreign direct investments.

In 2023 alone, the Tanzania Investment Centre (TIC) registered investment projects worth a record \$5.72

## Caucus reacts to RC's tough talk on teenage pregnancy

GIRLS' education national caucus under the Tanzania Education Network (TEN/MET) has urged the government to heighten supervision of child rights protection, especially implementation of the re-entry policy.

This comes a few days after Singida Regional Commissioner Halima Dendego issued a statement threatening legal action against pregnant schoolgirls.

According to a statement issued by the caucus yesterday, while at Kitaraka Secondary School on April 21, this year the RC warned that any schoolgirl found to be pregnant will be dragged to court along with their parents.

"From now on, if I find that a school girl is pregnant, she will be the number one suspect and will be dragged to court and later go to jail without mercy because the action was committed by both male and girl," Tendego was quoted as saying when addressing pupils at the school.

The caucus sees the RC's statement as inhumane as she blamed girls as a source of early pregnancies in the society without even thinking of other major causes of the challenge.

"We are deeply saddened by this leader's statement especially when the government and stakeholders work hard to promote education for all with the implementation of the re-entry policy to facilitate reinstatement of pupils who drop out of school due to various

regions, including pregnancy," reads part of the caucus's statement.

The caucus asked the Ministry of Education, Science and Technology to cooperate with other sectoral ministries to issue explanations and instructions to public leaders on the importance of issuing correct statements on the implementation of the government's reentry policy and child rights.

This will help leaders avoid issuing statements that may raise questions about the protection of child rights.

The statement further stated that the country's laws clearly state that impregnating girls who are under the age of 18 is illegal and the culprit serve 30 year in jail upon conviction because underage girl is regarded as a child who cannot consent to sexual activity.

In November 2021, the government through the Ministry of Education, Science and Technology announced 'Education Circular No. 2 of 2021' that allows re-entry of school dropouts due to various reasons including pregnancy back to a formal system of education.

The announcement changed the whole situation and destiny of school girls who drop out of school due to pregnancy and other reasons.

In February 2022, the government issued guidelines to reinstate pupils who drop out of primary and secondary education for various reasons in line with the Education Circular No. 02 of 2021.

- b) Kuanza kwa uzalishaji wa umeme kupitia Mradi wa Kuzalisha Umeme kwa Kutumia Maji wa Julius Nyerere (JNHPP) wenye uwezo wa kuzalisha MW 2,115 ambapo tayari uzalishaji umeanza kwa MW 235 kupitia mtambo Namba 9. Aidha, matarajio ni mradi huu kukamilika Desemba, 2024 kwa mitambo yote nane (8) yenye uwezo wa kuzalisha MW 235 kila moja kuwa inazalisha umeme;
- c) Kukamilisha ujenzi wa mitambo ya kufua umeme ya Kinyerezi I Extension MW 185 ambapo kwa sasa mitambo yote minne (4) inafua umeme kiasi cha MW 40 kila mmoja na hivyo kuwezesha uzalishaji wa umeme kuinqizwa katika qridi ya Taifa;
- d) Kukamilisha mradi wa kuzalisha umeme kwa kutumia maji wa Rusumo (MW 80) unaliojengwa kwa ushirikiano wa nchi tatu (3) za Tanzania, Burundi na Rwanda kwa mgawanyo sawa wa umeme kwa kila nchi. Kukamilika Mradi kunaiwezesha nchi yetu kupata MW 27 katika Gridi ya Taifa;
- Ujenzi wa mradi wa kuzalisha umeme wa jua Mkoani Shinyanga wa MW 150 unaendelea na matarajio ni umeme huo kuanza kuzalishwa ifikapo Januari, 2025;



*Mheshimiwa Spika,* Serikali pia iliendelea na utekelezaji wa miradi mingine ya kuzalisha umeme ikiwa ni pamoja na Malagarasi – MW 49.5, Ruhudji – MW 358, Rumakali – MW 222, Kakono – MW 87.8 na Kikonge – MW 321 ambapo hatua zilizofikiwa katika utekelezaji wake ni kama inavyofafanuliwa katika Hotuba yangu.

#### Usafirishaji na Usambazaji Umeme

**Mheshimiwa Spika,** umeme ukishazalishwa, hauna budi kusafirishwa na kusambazwa ili uweze kuwafikia watumiaji, hivyo ni muhimu kuchukua hatua madhubuti za kuimarisha miundombinu ya usafirishaji na usambazaji wa umeme. Kutokana na hatua zilizochukuliwa katika mwaka 2023/24 za kuimarisha miundombinu hii, yalipatikana mafanikio yafuatayo:

- a) Miundombinu ya kusafirisha umeme imeongezeka na kufikia jumla ya urefu wa kilomita 7,745.4 ikiwa ni ongezeko la asilimia 21.7 ikilinganishwa na kilomita 6,363.3 za mwaka 2022/23;
- Kuanza kutumika kwa njia ya kusafirisha umeme wa Kilovoti 400 kutoka JNHPP hadi Chalinze pamoja na kituo kipya cha kupoza umeme cha Chalinze cha Kilovoti 400/220/132 kinachotumika kupoza na kusafirisha umeme unaotoka JNHPP na kuingizwa kwenye Gridi ya Taifa;
- c) Kukamilika kwa asilimia 99 kwa Mradi wa Njia ya Kusafirisha Umeme Msongo wa Kilovoti 220 kutoka Morogoro hadi Dodoma kwa ajili va uendeshaji wa treni va umeme (*SGR Lot II*):
- d) Kukamilika kwa asilimia 99.4 kwa Mradi wa Njia ya Kusafirisha Umeme Msongo wa Kilovoti 400 kutoka Singida Arusha Namanga. Aidha, ujenzi wa Njia ya Kusafirisha Umeme Msongo wa Kilovoti 400 kutoka Arusha hadi Namanga yenye urefu wa kilomita 114.3 umefikia asilimia 97.5 na kituo cha

kupoza umeme cha Lemugur kimekamilika kwa asilimia 100 na kuwashwa:

- e) Miundombinu ya kusambaza umeme imeongezeka na kufikia kilomita 176,750.9, ikiwa ni ongezeko la asilimia 4.9 ikilinganishwa na kilomita 168,548.5 za mwezi Mei, 2023;
- f) Jumla ya wateja 4,784,297 wameunganishiwa umeme hadi kufikia Machi, 2024 ikiwa ni ongezeko la asilimia 9.4 ikilinganishwa na wateja 4,319,258 waliokuwa wameunganishiwa umeme Juni, 2023;

**Mheshimiwa Spika,** miradi mingine ya usafirishaji wa umeme iliyoendelea kutekelezwa ni pamoja na mradi wa njia ya kusafirisha umeme msongo wa Kilovoti 220 kutoka Rusumo hadi Nyakanazi; ujenzi wa njia ya kusafirisha umeme msongo wa Kilovoti 400 kutoka Iringa hadi Sumbawanga kupitia Mbeya na Tunduma (TAZA); ujenzi wa njia ya kusafirisha umeme msongo wa Kilovoti 400 kutoka Nyakanazi hadi Kigoma na Mradi wa Kuimarisha Gridi ya Taifa (*National Grid Stabilization Projects*) – Gridi Imara.

Mheshimiwa Spika, Serikali iliendelea kuimarisha utoaji wa huduma ya umeme kwa wananchi kwa kuchukua hatua mbalimbali ikiwa ni pamoja na kupanua kituo cha huduma kwa wateja (Call Center) kwa kuongeza vifaa na wapokea simu kutoka mawakala 63 hadi 100; kuanzisha mfumo unaomuwezesha mteja kuhudumiwa kwa haraka zaidi bila kupiga simu kwa njia ya ujumbe wa simu (CHATBOT) na kuanzisha mfumo utakaowawezesha wateja kupata taarifa maalumu za hali ya upatikanaji wa umeme kwa haraka kwa njia ya ujumbe wa simu ambayo ipo katika hatua mbalimbali za ukamilishwaji.

#### Upelekaji wa Nishati Vijijini

Mheshimiwa Spika, Serikali iliendelea kuchukua hatua za kuimarisha upatikanaji wa nishati vijijini ambapo hadi kufikia mwezi Machi, 2024 jumla ya vijiji 11,837 sawa na asilimia 96.37 ya vijiji vyote 12,318 vya Tanzania Bara vilikuwa vimeunganishwa na umeme. Aidha, ikiwa ni hatua ya kuimarisha utoaji wa huduma kwa wananchi vijijini, jumla ya taasisi 63,509 zinazotoa huduma kwa jamii ikiwemo Elimu, Biashara, Pampu za Maji, Vituo vya Afya na Nyumba za Ibada zilikuwa zimeunganishiwa umeme ikilinganishwa na taasisi 43,925 za Aprili, 2023. Vilevile, Serikali iliendelea kuchukua hatua za kupeleka umeme vitongojini, katika visiwa na maeneo yaliyo mbali na gridi ya Taifa, vituo vya afya na pampu za maji, wachimbaji wadogo wa madini, viwanda na kilimo na katika shule na mahakama za mwanzo Vijijini ambapo mafanikio yaliyopatikana ni kama inavyofafanuliwa katika Hotuba yangu.

#### Nishati Safi ya Kupikia

*Mheshimiwa Spika*, kutokana na athari za matumizi ya nishati isiyo safi ya kupikia ikiwa ni pamoja na athari za kiafya kwa wananchi wetu, uharibifu wa mazingira pamoja na athari nyingine za kiuchumi na kijamii, Serikali iliendelea kutekeleza mikakati mahsusi ya kuimarisha matumizi ya nishati safi ya kupikia nchini.

Mheshimiwa Spika, Serikali iliidhinisha Mkakati wa Taifa wa Matumizi ya Nishati Safi ya Kupikia wa mwaka 2024 – 2034, unaolenga kuhakikisha angalau asilimia 80 ya watanzania kuwa wanatumia nishati safi ya kupikia ifikapo mwaka 2034. Malengo ya Mkakati huu ambao unabainisha majukumu ya wadau mbalimbali ni pamoja na kupunguza gharama za nishati safi, vifaa na majiko sanifu ya kupikia; kuimarisha upatikanaji wa malighafi na miundombinu ya uhakika ya nishati safi ya kupikia; kuhamasisha uwekezaji katika nishati safi ya kupikia; pamoja na kuimarisha uelewa wa jamii kuhusu matumizi ya nishati safi ya kupikia.

Mheshimiwa Spika, kwa kushirikiana na wadau Wizara iliratibu na kushiriki katika mkutano wa 28 wa Umoja wa Mataifa wa Mabadiliko ya Tabianchi (COP 28) uliofanyika Dubai mwezi Novemba-Desemba, 2023. Kupitia Mkutano huo, Rais wa Jamhuri ya Muungano wa Tanzania Mhe. Dkt. Samia Suluhu Hassan alizindua Programu ya Nishati Safi ya kupikia itakayowawezesha Wanawake Barani Afrika (African Women Clean Cooking Support Programme-AWCCSP) kutumia nishati safi ya kupikia. Aidha, mwezi Mei, 2024 kutafanyika mkutano wa Wakuu wa Nchi kuhusu Nishati Safi ya Kupikia Barani Afrika, Paris Ufaransa ambapo Rais wa Jamhuri ya Muungano wa Tanzania Mhe. Dkt. Samia Suluhu Hassan atakuwa Mwenyekiti Mwenza wa mkutano huo kwa kushirikiana na Waziri Mkuu wa Norway, Mkurugenzi Mtendaji wa Shirika la Nishati Duniani (International Energy Agency-IEA) na Rais wa Benki ya Maendeleo ya Afrika (AfDB). Mkutano huo pamoja na mambo mengine, unalenga kujadili na kuweka mikakati ya namna ya kuimarisha Sera, ugharamiaji na ushirikiano katika kuimarisha matumizi ya nishati safi ya kupikia Barani Afrika.

Mheshimiwa Spika, hatua nyingine zilizochukuliwa na Wizara kuimarisha matumizi ya nishati safi ya kupikia nchini ni pamoja na kusambaza kwa wananchi mitungi ya gesi ya LPG, gesi asilia na majiko banifu; kutekeleza program mbalimbali za kuhamisha matumizi ya nishati safi ya kupikia ikiwa ni pamoja na kuendesha kongamano la wanawake la nishati safi ya kupikia lililofanyika Mkoani Dodoma tarehe 9 Machi, 2024; na kushirikiana na Jeshi la Magereza ili kuwezesha Jeshi hilo (Magereza, Kambi za Makazi ya Watumishi, Ofisi, Vyuo, Shule na Hospitali) kutumia nishati safi ya kupikia.

#### SEKTA NDOGO YA MAFUTA NA GESI ASILIA

**Mheshimiwa Spika**, katika mwaka 2023/24 Serikali iliendelea kuchukua hatua mbalimbali za kuendeleza Sekta Ndogo ya Mafuta na Gesi Asilia nchini katika maeneo ya utafutaji, uendelezaji, uzalishaji, uchakataji, usafirishaji na usambazaji wa bidhaa za mafuta na gesi, ambapo utekelezaji ulikuwa kama ifuatavyo:

- a) Majadiliano ya Mikataba ya Utekelezaji wa Mradi wa Kuchakata na Kusindika Gesi Asilia Kuwa Kimiminika (LNG) yaliendelea ili kuboresha rasimu za awali za Mikataba hiyo kwa kuzingatia maoni yaliyotolewa na wadau mbalimbali ikiwemo Ofisi ya Mwanasheria Mkuu wa Serikali na Taasisi nyingine za Serikali;
- b)
  c) Shughuli za utafutaji wa mafuta na gesi asilia katika vitalu vya kimkakati vya Mnazi Bay Kaskazini, Eyasi– Wembere, Songo Songo Magharibi na Vitalu Namba 4/1B na 4/1C ziliendelea kwa kuchukua hatua mbalimbali kama inavyofafanuliwa katika Hotuba yangu. Aidha, Serikali iliridhia kutolewa kwa leseni ya uendelezaji wa gesi asilia iliyogunduliwa katika eneo la Ntorya katika kitalu cha Ruvuma kwa TPDC kwa niaba ya mwekezaji (kampuni ya ARA Petroleum). Uendelezaji wa gesi iliyogunduliwa Ntorya unatarajiwa kuiwezesha nchi kupata gesi ya takribani futi za ujazo milioni 60 kwa siku katika kipindi cha awali cha miaka miwili na kuongezeka hadi kufikia uzalishaji wa Futi za Ujazo Milioni 140 kwa siku baada ya kipindi hicho na hivyo kuimarisha upatikanaji wa gesi asilia nchini;
- e) Kufanikisha ununuzi wa asilimia 20 ya hisa za Kampuni ya Wentworth kwenye Mkataba wa Uendeshaji wa Kitalu cha Uzalishaji gesi asilia cha Mnazi Bay kilichopo Mtwara. TPDC imeongeza uwekezaji katika kitalu hicho kwa asilimia 20;
- Miradi ya usambazaji wa gesi asilia viwandani, katika taasisi na majumbani iliendelea kutekelezwa katika mikoa ya Dar es Salaam, Pwani, Lindi na Mtwara. Kazi zilizotekelezwa ni pamoja na kujenga bomba la gesi asilia lenye urefu wa kilometa 12.4 kutoka Mwenge hadi Mbezi Beach Dar es Salaam lililowezesha kuunganishwa kwa miundombinu ya gesi asilia kwenye viwanda na hoteli mbalimbali na kujenga bomba la kusafirisha gesi asilia kutoka BVS 3 kuelekea Kata za Mnazi Mmoja na Mingoyo mkoani Lindi lenye urefu wa kilomita 10.04 lililowezesha kuunganisha nyumba 209 na gesi asilia. Hatua nyingine zilizochukuliwa ni kukamilisha taratibu za kumpata Mkandarasi wa kujenga miundombinu ya kuunganisha nyumba 451 mkoani Lindi (Kata za Mnazi Mmoja na Mingoyo) na nyumba 529 mkoani Pwani (Mkuranga);
- h) Ujenzi wa vituo vya kujaza gesi asilia (Compressed Natural Gas-CNG) katika magari uliendelea kwa kushirikisha pia Sekta Binafsi. TPDC na GPSA ziliendelea na taratibu za kumpata Mshauri Mwelekezi wa kufanya upembuzi yakinifu, usanifu wa michoro ya kihandisi na Tathmini ya Athari ya Mazingira na Jamii ili kuwezesha GPSA kujenga vituo vya CNG katika bohari za Dar es Salaam na Dodoma, ikiwa ni hatua ya kuwezesha vyombo vya moto vinavyomilikiwa na Serikali kutumia CNG. Aidha, Sekta Binafsi iliendelea kutumia fursa ya matumizi ya CNG katika vyombo vya moto kwa kujenga vituo vya CNG Dar es Salaam na Pwani pamoja na karakana nane (8) za kubadilisha mifumo ya matumizi ya CNG kwenye magari ambayo ni nyenzo muhimu ya kuchochea matumizi ya CNG katika magari. Hatua hizi zimeendelea kuimarisha matumizi ya gesi asilia asilia (CNG) katika magari:
- Hali ya upatikanaji wa bidhaa za mafuta ya petroli nchini iliendelea kuwa nzuri, ikiwemo kutengamaa kwa bei za mafuta ikilinganishwa na mwaka uliopita pamoja na kuwepo kwa changamoto mbalimbali ikiwemo upatikanaji wa Dola za Marekani kwa ajili ya kulipia mafuta yaliyoagizwa nchini;

Mheshimiwa Spika, Serikali iliendelea na utekelezaji wa Mradi wa Bomba la Kusafirisha Mafuta Ghafi kutoka Hoima - Uganda hadi Tanga - Tanzania (East African Crude Oil Pipeline – EACOP) kwa kukamilisha malipo ya fidia ya Shilingi bilioni 34.93 kwa wananchi 9,823 kati ya 9,904 waliopisha utekelezaji wa mradi, sawa na asilimia 99.2; kukamilika kwa ujenzi wa nyumba 340 sawa na asilimia 100 ya makazi mbadala kwa wananchi 294 waliopoteza makazi na kupisha mkuza; kukamilika kwa ujenzi wa karakana ya kuweka mfumo wa upashaji joto kwenye mabomba; na kuendelea na ujenzi wa maeneo 14 ya makambi. Aidha, mabomba yenye urefu wa Kilomita 400 yameshawasili nchini na zoezi la kuwekewa mfumo wa kupasha joto, usalama na mawasiliano wa bomba (thermal insulation and fiber optic cables) linaendelea. Vilevile, hadi kufikia Machi, 2024, Serikali ilikuwa imelipa jumla ya Dola za Marekani milioni 289.78 sawa na asilimia 94 ya kiasi kinachotakiwa kuchangiwa kama mtaji katika Kampuni ya EACOP Ltd. Utekelezaji wa Mradi kwa ujumla umefikia asilimia 27.1.

Mheshimiwa Spika, Serikali kupitia Mamlaka ya Udhibiti Mkondo wa Juu wa Petroli (PURA) na Mamlaka

ya Udhibiti wa Huduma za Nishati na Maji (EWURA) iliendelea kusimamia na kudhibiti Sekta ya Nishati ili kuhakikisha utekelezaji wa shughuli za Sekta hiyo unazingatia sheria na taratibu zilizopo pamoja na utoaji wa huduma bora kwa wananchi. PURA iliendelea na maandalizi ya kunadi vitalu vya utafutaji wa mafuta na gesi asilia kupitia Duru ya Tano (5) kwa kuandaa rasimu ya Mkataba Kifani wa Ugawanaji Mapato (Model Production Sharing Agreement-MPSA) wa mwaka, 2024 (MPSA, 2024) kwa ajili ya kutumika katika zoezi hilo na kukamilisha Mwongozo wa Kupata Kampuni za Kijiofizikia zitakazoshirikiana na PURA katika zoezi la kunadi vitalu ambapo taratibu za kupata kampuni hizo zinaendelea.

Mheshimiwa Spika, ili kufikia azma ya Serikali ya kuhakikisha wananchi wananufaika na uwekezaji katika rasilimali zilizopo katika maeneo yao, Serikali kupitia PURA na TPDC imeandaa rasimu ya Miongozo ya Uwajibikaji wa Kampuni kwa Jamii (Corporate Social Responsibility – CSR) katika Sekta Ndogo ya Mafuta na Gesi asilia inayotarajiwa kukamilika mwishoni mwa Juni, 2024. Aidha, maandalizi ya rasimu yamehusisha wadau kutoka maeneo mbalimbali ikiwemo mikoa ya Lindi, Mtwara na Pwani.

Mheshimiwa Spika, EWURA iliendelea kusimamia na kudhibiti shughuli za mafuta, gesi na umeme ambapo Mamlaka hiyo ilitoa leseni 34 kwa kampuni za mafuta kwa ajili ya kuagiza na kuuza mafuta kwa jumla; vibali vya ujenzi (construction approvals) 237 kwa ajili ya ujenzi wa vituo vya mafuta, miundombinu ya kuhifadhia LPG, matumizi binafsi na ghala ya kuhifadhia mafuta na leseni 1,163 kwa wataalamu wenye sifa za kufunga mifumo ya umeme. Aidha ili kuimarisha usimamizi, udhibiti na utoaji wa huduma, EWURA iliboresha Kanuni (Rules) mbalimbali ikiwemo The Petroleum (Wholesales Storage Retail and Consumer Installation) Rules, 2023; The Petroleum (Retail Operations in Townships and Villages) (Amendment) Rules, 2023 na the Energy and Water Utilities Regulatory Authority (Petroleum Products Price Setting) (Amendment) Rules, 2023.

#### CHANGAMOTO ZILIZOPO NA UTATUZI WAKE

Mheshimiwa Spika, pamoja na mafanikio yaliyopatikana katika mwaka 2023/24, Sekta ya Nishati ilikabiliwa na changamoto mbalimbali ikiwemo uzalishaji wa umeme na gesi asilia kutoendana na mahitaji kutokana na ukuaji wa shughuli za kiuchumi na kijamii na uchakavu wa miundombinu ya kusafirisha na kusambaza umeme. Kutokana na hatua zilizochukuliwa na Serikali, ikiwemo kuharakisha utekelezaji wa miradi ya uzalishaji wa umeme pamoja na kukarabati na kufanya matengenezo ya miundombinu ya umeme, hali ya upatikanaji wa umeme nchini unaokidhi mahitaji imeendelea kuimarika na kuwa nzuri kwa sasa.

Mheshimiwa Spika, changamoto nyingine iliyopo ni vitendo vya hujuma/uhalifu katika miundombinu ya umeme, ambapo Serikali iliendelea kuwachukulia hatua za kisheria waliobanika kutekeleza vitendo hivyo. Aidha, niendelee kutoa wito kuwa, Serikali itaendelea kuchukua hatua kali kwa wote watakaobainika kufanya vitendo vya hujuma/uhalifu katika miundombinu ya umeme, kunakosababisha hasara na usumbufu mkubwa kwa watumiaii wa umeme.

Mheshimiwa Spika, kama nilivyobainisha awali, tulikabiliwa pia na changamoto ya upatikanaji wa Dola za Marekani kwa ajili ya kulipia mafuta yaliyoagizwa nchini, hali ambayo ilisababisha wafanyabiashara kupunguza kiasi cha mafuta kilichokuwa kinaagizwa. Serikali kupitia Wizara ya Nishati kwa kushirikiana na Wizara ya Fedha, Benki Kuu ya Tanzania na wadau wengine ilichukua hatua mbalimbali, ikiwa ni pamoja na kufanya mapitio ya mikataba ya kuagiza mafuta na kuruhusu matumizi ya fedha za kigeni zikiwemo fedha ya Uingereza (British Pound), Umoja wa Ulaya (Euro) na Umoja wa Nchi za Uarabuni (Dirham). Aidha, Wizara ya Nishati kupitia EWURA iliimarisha ukaguzi katika vituo vya mafuta ili kuhakikisha mafuta yanapatikana wakati wote katika maeneo yote nchini.

#### C. MPANGO NA BAJETI KWA MWAKA 2024/25

Mheshimiwa Spika, baada ya kutoa taarifa ya utekelezaji wa shughuli za Wizara kwa mwaka 2023/24, sasa napenda kuwasilisha Mpango na Bajeti kwa Mwaka 2024/25.

Mheshimiwa Spika, katika mwaka 2024/25 utekelezaji wa majukumu ya Wizara utaongozwa na vipaumbele mbalimbali vinavyojikita katika kuendelea kutekeleza miradi ya uzalishaji, usafirishaji na usambazaji wa umeme ikiwa ni pamoja na kufikisha gridi ya Taifa katika mikoa iliyosalia; kupeleka nishati vijijini, ikiwemo katika vitongoji; kutekeleza miradi ya kielelezo na kimkakati ya mafuta na gesi asilia ikiwemo mradi wa Kuchakata na Kusindika Gesi Asilia kuwa Kimiminika (Liquefied Natural Gas – LNG Project) na ujenzi wa bomba la kusafirisha mafuta kutoka Hoima, Uganda hadi Tanga, Tanzania (East African Crude Oil Pipeline – EACOP). Aidha, Wizara itaendelea kutekeleza na kusimamia shughuli za utafutaji na uendelezaji katika vitalu vya kimkakati na wawekezaji; usambazaji wa gesi asilia viwandani, katika taasisi na majumbani na kuimarisha matumizi ya CNG katika magari.

Mheshimiwa Spika, vipaumbele vingine ni kuendelea kuimarisha matumizi ya nishati safi ya kupikia (clean cooking) nchini pamoja na upatikanaji wa nishati ya mafuta vijijini kupitia uanzishwaji wa vituo vya mafuta katika maeneo hayo; kuhakikisha nchi inaendelea kuwa na uhakika wa upatikanaji wa bidhaa za mafuta ya petroli pamoja na ufanisi katika kushughulikia upatikanaji wa bidhaa hizo; kuimarisha uwekezaji na ushiriki wa Sekta Binafsi katika shughuli za utafutaji na uendelezaji wa mafuta na gesi asilia pamoja na uzalishaji na usambazaji wa umeme na kuendelea kuimarisha utoaji wa huduma, tija na ufanisi katika uendeshaji wa Taasisi/Mashirika yaliyo chini ya Wizara ya TANESCO, TPDC, EWURA, PURA na PBPA pamoja na Kampuni Tanzu. Wizara pia itaendelea kuimarisha ushiriki wa wazawa katika shughuli za mafuta na gesi asilia pamoja na rasilimali watu ya Wizara ya Taasisi zake na upatikanaji wa vitendea kazi muhimu.

Mheshimiwa Spika, Mpango na Bajeti ya Wizara kwa mwaka 2024/25 pamoja na mambo mengine, umezingatia Dira ya Taifa ya Maendeleo ya Mwaka 2025, Mpango wa Tatu wa Maendeleo wa Taifa wa Miaka Mitano (FYDP III) 2021/22 – 2025/26, Ilani ya Chama cha Mapinduzi kwa Ajili ya Uchaguzi Mkuu wa Mwaka 2020, Maagizo ya Viongozi wa Kitaifa katika Sekta ya Nishati, Mwongozo wa Maandalizi ya Mpango na Bajeti ya Serikali kwa Mwaka 2024/25 pamoja na Mpango Mkakati wa Wizara wa Miaka Mitano (2021/22 - 2025/26). Miongozo mingine iliyozingatiwa ni Sera, Mikakati na Programu mbalimbali za Kisekta na Kitaifa pamoja na Malengo ya Maendeleo Endelevu ya Umoja wa Mataifa (SDGs) ya mwaka 2030 kuhusu masuala ya nishati.

**Mheshimiwa Spika**, sehemu C ya Hotuba yangu ukurasa wa 119 hadi 173 inatoa maelezo na ufafanuzi wa kina kuhusu programu, miradi, mikakati na kazi zitakazotekelezwa katika mwaka 2024/25. Kwa ufupi Wizara itatekeleza yafuatayo:

#### SEKTA NDOGO YA UMEME NA NISHATI JADIDIFU

#### Miradi ya Kuzalisha Umeme

Mheshimiwa Spika, moja ya kazi kubwa iliyopo mbele yetu ni kuhakikisha nchi yetu inakuwa na umeme unaotosheleza mahitaji ya sasa na siku zijazo, umeme wa uhakika na unaotokana na vyanzo mbalimbali (energy mix). Hii ni kwa kuzingatia umuhimu wa nishati hiyo katika maendeleo ya kiuchumi na kijamii ya nchi yetu na Taifa lolote. Ili kutimiza azma hiyo, Wizara imepanga kukamilisha mradi wa kuzalisha umeme kwa utumia Maji wa Julius Nyerere (MW 2,115) ambapo kazi zilizopangwa kutekelezwa ni pamoja na kukamilisha ujenzi wa jengo la mitambo (power house) na ufungaji wa mitambo saba (7) ya kuzalisha umeme ambayo kwa sasa ipo katika hatua mbalimbali za ukamilishwaji.

*Mheshimiwa Spika,* Wizara pia itaendelea na utekelezaji wa mradi wa kuzalisha umeme kwa kutumia gesi asilia wa Kinyerezi kwa kukamilisha ujenzi wa njia ya kusafirisha umeme wa msongo wa kilovoti 132 yenye urefu wa kilomita 19.2 kutoka kituo cha kuzalisha umeme cha Kinyerezi kwenda Gongolamboto hadi Mbagala Jijini Dar es Salaam na kufunga transfoma maeneo ya Gongolamboto na Mbagala.

Mheshimiwa Spika, miradi mingine ya uzalishaji wa umeme itakayotekelezwa ni mradi wa kuzalisha umeme kwa kutumia maji wa Malagarasi – MW 49.5; mradi wa kuzalisha umeme jua Shinyanga – MW 150; ukarabati wa mitambo ya kuzalisha umeme katika Kituo cha Kuzalisha Umeme cha Hale; mradi wa kuzalisha umeme kwa kutumia maji wa Kakono – MW 87.8; na mradi wa kuzalisha umeme kwa kutumia maji ya mto Kikonge–MW 321. Aidha, Serikali pia itaendelea kuelekeza nguvu katika uzalishaji wa umeme jotoardhi ambapo itakamilisha uchorongaji wa visima vitatu (3) vya uhakiki (exploratory wells) ili kuhakiki hifadhi, kiwango na ubora wa rasilimali ya jotoardhi katika mradi wa Ngozi (Mbeya) wenye uwezo wa kuzalisha MW 30 kwa awamu ya kwanza pamoja na kuanza ujenzi wa mtambo mdogo wa kuzalisha umeme (wellhead generator) wa MW 5. Vilevile, Serikali itaanza utekelezaji wa programu ya uchorongaji wa visima vinne (4) vya uhakiki katika mradi la Kiejo Mbaka (Mbeya) wenye uwezo wa kuzalisha MW 60.

#### Miradi ya Kusafirisha na Kusambaza Umeme

Mheshimiwa Spika, miundombinu imara ya kusafirisha na kusambaza umeme ndiyo msingi thabiti wa kuwa na umeme wa uhakika. Hatua zitakazochukuliwa na Serikali katika mwaka 2024/25 ni pamoja na kukamilisha mradi wa kusafirisha umeme kutoka Julius Nyerere Hydro Power Plant hadi Chalinze – Kilovoti 400 na Kituo cha Kupoza Umeme, Chalinze ambapo kazi zitakazotekelezwa ni pamoja na kumalizia kazi zilizobaki katika kituo cha kupoza umeme ikiwemo majengo, barabara, njia ya kusafirisha umeme na marekebisho mbalimbali.

*Mheshimiwa Spika*, Serikali itaendelea na ujenzi wa njia ya kusafirisha umeme msongo wa Kilovoti 400 kutoka Chalinze hadi Dodoma yenye urefu wa kilomita 345 na upanuzi wa vituo vya kupoza umeme vya Chalinze na Dodoma. Kukamilika kwa mradi huu kutawezesha kusafirisha umeme unaotoka katika Mradi wa Kuzalisha Umeme wa Julius Nyerere kupitia Chalinze, kwenda mkoani Dodoma na kuusambaza katika Mikoa mbalimbali nchini.

Mheshimiwa Spika, Miradi mingine ya usafirishaji wa umeme itakayotekelezwa ni ujenzi wa njia ya kusafirisha umeme msongo wa Kilovoti 400 kutoka Chalinze - Kinyerezi - Mkuranga; ujenzi wa njia ya kusafirisha umeme Msongo wa Kilovoti 400 kutoka Chalinze - Segera na msongo wa Kilovoti 220 Segera - Tanga; ujenzi wa njia ya kusafirisha umeme msongo wa Kilovoti 220 kutoka Chalinze - Bagamoyo hadi Ununio Dar es salaam na ujenzi wa Kituo cha Kupoza Umeme cha Ibadakuli Shinyanga Kilovoti 400/220/33; ujenzi wa njia ya kusafirisha umeme msongo wa Kilovoti 400 kutoka Iringa hadi Sumbawanga kupitia Mbeya na Tunduma ( TAZA) na ujenzi wa njia ya kusafirisha umeme msongo wa Kilovoti 400 kutoka Nyakanazi hadi Kigoma. Aidha, Serikali itaendelea kutekeleza mradi wa kuimarisha Gridi ya

Taifa (*National Grid Stabilization Project*) – Gridi Imara kwa kuendelea na ujenzi wa njia za kusafirisha umeme pamoja na vituo vya kupoza umeme. Serikali pia itaendelea kufanya matengenezo katika mitambo ya kuzalisha umeme, miundombinu ya kusafirisha na kusambaza umeme pamoja na vituo vya kupoza umeme ili kuhakikisha umeme wa uhakika unapatikana wakati wote.

#### Miradi ya Nishati Vijijini

Mheshimiwa Spika, katika Mwaka 2024/25, Serikali kupitia Wakala wa Nishati Vijijini (REA) itaendelea kuchukua hatua za kupeleka nishati vijijini ili kuchochea kasi ya ukuaji wa uchumi na maendeleo ya kijamii katika maeneo hayo. Miradi iliyopangwa kutekelezwa ni pamoja mradi wa kupeleka umeme katika Vitongoji 20,000 ambapo kazi zitakazofanyika ni pamoja na ununuzi wa wakandarasi wa kutekeleza mradi, kufanya usanifu wa kina wa mradi na kuanza ujenzi wa miundombinu ya mradi. Aidha, Serikali itaendelea na utekelezaji wa mradi wa kupeleka umeme katika Vitongoji katika Mkoa wa Songwe na Kigoma kwa kukamilisha ujenzi wa miundombinu ya kusambaza umeme Msongo Mdogo, kufunga transfoma na kuunganisha wateja. Vilevile, Serikali itaendelea kutekeleza mradi wa kupeleka umeme katika Vitongoji 3,060 (vitongoji 15 kila Jimbo) kwa kujenga miundombinu ya mradi, kufunga transfoma na kuunganisha wateja. Mheshimiwa Spika, miradi mingine itakayotekelezwa ni mradi wa ujazilizi Awamu ya Pili B; mradi wa Ujazilizi Awamu ya Pili C; mradi wa kupeleka umeme katika maeneo ya Vijijini-Miji; mradi wa kusambaza umeme katika Migodi Midogo, Maeneo ya Kilimo na Viwanda; mradi wa kupeleka umeme katika minara ya mawasiliano ya simu na mradi wa ufungaji wa mifumo ya umeme jua kwenye makazi yaliyopo Visiwani na valiyopo mbali na Gridi ya Taifa.

#### Nishati Safi ya Kupikia

Mheshimiwa Spika, katika mwaka 2024/25 Serikali itaendelea kutekeleza hatua madhubuti za kuimarisha matumizi ya Nishati Safi ya kupikia nchini. Serikali kwa kushirikiana na wadau itaendelea kutekeleza Mkakati wa Taifa wa Matumizi ya Nishati Safi ya Kupikia wa mwaka 2024 – 2034 kwa kupatia ufumbuzi vikwazo vya matumizi ya nishati hiyo, ikiwemo gharama kubwa, upatikanaji hafifu na uhaba wa miundombinu yake na kukosekana kwa elimu ya kutosha kuhusu madhara ya nishati zisizo safi na salama za kupikia. Aidha, Wizara itaendelea kusimamia na kuratibu utekelezaji wa Programu ya Nishati Safi ya Kupikia inayolenga Kuwawezesha Wanawake Barani Afrika Kutumia Nishati Safi ya Kupikia (African Women Clean Cooking Support Programme – AWCCSP.

Mheshimiwa Spika, Serikali pia itaendelea na utekelezaji wa mradi wa kusambaza majiko banifu kwenye Kaya zilizopo katika maeneo ya Vijijini na Vijiji-Miji; kutoa ruzuku kwa wazalishaji wa mkaa mbadala kwa ajili ya ununuzi wa mashine zitakazotumika katika uzalishaji wa mkaa huo; kuendelea kushirikiana na Jeshi la Magereza katika ujenzi wa miundombinu ya nishati ya kupkia katika maeneo 211 pamoja na kuendelea na usambazaji wa gesi asilia majumbani, hususan katika Mikoa ya Dar es Salaam, Mtwara, Lindi na Pwani.

#### Sekta Ndogo ya Mafuta na Gesi

*Mheshimiwa Spika*, Serikali itaendelea kusimamia na kuendeleza Sekta Ndogo ya Mafuta na Gesi kwa kuchukua hatua mbalimbali, lengo likiwa ni kuhakikisha mchango wa Sekta hii katika maendeleo ya Taifa letu unaimarika. Serikali itaendelea na shughuli za utafutaji wa mafuta na gesi asilia katika vitalu vya kimkakati na kujenga bomba la kusafirisha gesi asilia kutoka kitalu cha Ruvuma (Ntorya) hadi Madimba lenye urefu wa kilomita 34.2 na uwezo wa kubeba futi za ujazo milioni 140 kwa siku. Aidha, Serikali inatarajia kukamilisha majadiliano ya Mikataba ya mradi wa Kuchakata na Kusindika Gesi Asilia Kuwa Kimiminika (*Liquefied Natural Gas – LNG*) ili utekelezaji wake uanze.

Mheshimiwa Spika, Serikali itaendelea na ujenzi wa miundombinu ya usambazaji wa Gesi Asilia katika Mkoa wa Dar es Salaam, Mtwara, Lindi na Pwani ambapo kazi zitakazotekelezwa ni pamoja na kufanya tathmini ya athari kwa mazingira na jamii, usanifu wa kihandisi pamoja na ujenzi wa miundombinu ya kusambaza gesi asilia kwenye viwanda vya Mkuranga pamoja na Kongani ya Viwanda ya Kwala Mkoani Pwani; kukamilisha ujenzi wa vituo vya CNG (Kituo Mama katika eneo la Chuo Kikuu cha Dar es Salaam na Vituo vidogo vya Kairuki na Muhimbili) mkoani Dar es Salaam; na ununuzi wa vituo vitano (5) vya CNG vinavyohamishika (mobile CNG stations) vitakavyotoa huduma katika Jiji la Dar es Salaam. Aidha, Sekta Binafsi itaendelea kushiriki katika ujenzi wa vituo vya CNG pamoja na karakana za kubadilisha mifumo ya matumizi ya nishati ya gesi asilia (CNG) kwenye magari. Vilevile, TPDC itakamilisha awamu ya kwanza ya mradi wa usambazaji wa gesi asilia chini ya ufadhili wa REA ambapo nyumba 980 zitaunganishwa katika mikoa ya Lindi na Pwani; na kuanza awamu ya pili ya mradi huo kwa kuendelea kusambaza gesi asilia maeneo ya Mkuranga, mkoani Pwani.

MheshimiwaSpika, miradi mingine itayakayotekelezwa ni mradi wa Bomba la Kusafirisha Mafuta Ghafi kutoka Hoima - Uganda hadi Tanga - Tanzania (East African Crude Oil Pipeline – EACOP); ujenzi wa miundombinu ya usambazaji wa Gesi Asilia katika Mikoa ya Dar es Salaam, Mtwara, Lindi na Pwani na ujenzi wa miundombinu ya hifadhi ya kimkakati ya mafuta.

Mheshimiwa Spika, Serikali kupitia PURA inatarajia kuendesha Duru ya Tano (5) ya kunadi vitalu vya utafutaji wa mafuta na gesi asilia kwa lengo la kutangaza kwa wawekezaji vitalu vilivyo wazi katika eneo la bahari na nchi kavu. Kazi zitakazotekelezwa ni pamoja na kuandaa nyaraka za zabuni zitakazoongoza mnada wa vitalu, kufanya maonesho ya kitaalamu kuhusu vivutio vya vitalu na kuzindua Duru ya Tano (5) ya kunadi vitalu. Aidha, EWURA itaendelea kusimamia udhibiti wa huduma za nishati nchini kwa kuwasimamia watoa huduma kwa mujibu wa Sheria, Kanuni na taratibu zilizopo ili kuhakikisha wananchi wanapata huduma iliyo bora na uhakika.

#### D. USHIRIKIANO WA KIKANDA NA KIMATAIFA

Mheshimiwa Spika, katika utekelezaji wa majukumu yake, Wizara ya Nishati inashirikiana na Washirika mbalimbali wa Maendeleo, Jumuiya za Kikanda, nchi wahisani na wadau wengine. Kwa niaba ya Serikali, napenda kuwashukuru Washirika wa Maendeleo, Jumuiya na nchi wahisani ambao wameendelea kushiriki katika kufanikisha utekelezaji wa majukumu ya Wizara na maendeleo ya Sekta ya Nishati kwa ujumla. Napenda kutambua mchango wa Benki ya Maendeleo Afrika (AfDB); Benki ya Dunia (WB); Arab Bank for Economic Development in Africa (BADEA); Mfuko wa Uendelezaji wa Economic Development Cooperation Fund (EDCF - Korea); Jotoardhi (Geothermal Risk Mitigation Facility - GRMF) pamoja na Taasisi na Mashirika ya JICA (Japan), KfW (Germany), AFD (Ufaransa); Shirika la Fedha Duniani (IMF); Sida (Sweden), NORAD (Norway); Umoja wa Ulaya (EU), Shirika la Mitaji ya Maendeleo la Umoja wa Mataifa (UNCDF), Shirika la Maendeleo la Umoja wa Mataifa (UNCDF), Shirika la Maendeleo la Canada (CIDA) na USAID (Marekani); OPEC Fund for International Development; Abu - Dhabi Fund for Development (ADFD); na Saudi Fund for Development (SFD).

Mheshimiwa Spika, nitumie nafasi hii pia kutoa shukrani kwa Serikali za Afrika Kusini, Algeria, Burundi, Canada, China, DRC Congo, Ethiopia, Falme za Kiarabu, Iceland, India, Japan, Kenya, Korea ya Kusini, Malawi, Marekani, Misri, Morocco, Msumbiji, Namibia, Norway, Rwanda, Sweden, Ufaransa, Uganda, Uingereza, Ujerumani, Zambia, na nchi nyingine kwa ushirikiano wao katika kuendeleza Sekta ya Nishati. Nazishukuru pia Jumuiya ya Afrika Mashariki (EAC), Jumuiya ya Maendeleo Kusini mwa Afrika (SADC) na Umoja wa Afrika (AU) kwa ushirikiano katika masuala ya kikanda yanayohusu Sekta ya Nishati.

#### E. HITIMISHO

Mheshimiwa Spika, kwa kutambua umuhimu wa nishati katika kuchochea na kuharakisha maendeleo ya kiuchumi na kijamii kwa Taifa letu, katika mwaka 2024/25 Wizara ya Nishati itaendelea kuchukua hatua madhubuti za kusimamia, kuimarisha na kuendeleza Sekta ya Nishati, kwa lengo la kuhakikisha Sekta hii inachangia ipasavyo katika maendeleo ya Taifa letu na watu wake kama inavyotarajiwa.

Mheshimiwa Spika, Wizara itaendelea kuimarisha upatikanaji wa nishati safi ya kupikia mijini na vijijini ili kulinda afya za wananchi na mazingira. Aidha, Wizara itaendelea kuipatia suluhu ya kudumu changamoto ya upatikanaji wa umeme wa uhakika nchini, kuimarisha usambazaji wa nishati hiyo pamoja na kuimarisha uzalishaji wa gesi asilia unaoendana na mahitaji, kwa kuzingatia kiwango cha ugunduzi wa nishati hiyo hadi sasa nchini na hatua za utafutaji zinazoendelea kuchukuliwa. Wizara pia itaendelea kuelekeza nguvu katika kuimarisha utoaji wa huduma mbalimbali zinazotolewa na Taasisi zake.

Mheshimiwa Spika, naomba kutoa hoja kwamba Bunge lako Tukufu sasa liidhinishe Bajeti ya jumla ya Shilingi Trilioni Moja, Bilioni Mia Nane Themanini na Tatu, Milioni Mia Saba Hamsini na Tisa, Mia Nne Hamsini na Tano Elfu (Shilingi 1,883,759,455,000) kwa ajili ya matumizi ya Wizara ya Nishati na Taasisi zake. Mchanganuo wa fedha hizo ni kama ifuatavyo:

# **EAC** partner states hearing the bell over LVB funding

HANGING winds in global financing are bringing home to members of the East African Community (EAC) over the financing of development projects. Global lenders are under pressure from major donors to be more selective both in the countries they loan to and the projects they fund, and the conditions they set. Treasury authorities are seemingly having a difficult time in projecting what can be expected from global lenders, thus having to accommodate changing perspectives even within a short period of time, depending on current signals.

This situation is in a sense visible during the current spring meetings of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and the World Bank, first showing high expectations on global lender's services and wishing that loans be put on a longer term and made more available. Then the tone shifted to demanding that partner states of the EAC be ready to put up funds for joint environment projects especially with regard to the Lake Victoria Basin (LVB). That was astonishing, or perplexing; it related to a single problem and then a window of wider moods.

The key issue was the mood with the global lender, which also supervises broad environmental programmes in developing countries, wishing to more closely engage with the LVB countries on one of the key drivers of lake deterioration - the discharge of untreated human waste. This is a moot point that observers at a local or wider level need to ponder, as to whether this is an issue that needs to be exclusively handled by the lender, and indeed, if it should even be presented for it to examine how it is funded. The problem is that we usually don't as such questions until we are demanded to do so, and often we let the project lie idle.

That likelihood was in evidence in the way in which the Treasury executive took up the matter, when indeed the global lender sought to obtain precisions on local funding for at least that problem, as it belongs squarely to waste treatment. It is a routine issue which needs to be handled in such a manner that the waste does not reach the lake, instead of letting the lake shores be overrun by weeds feeling on the salty environment of waste water literally pumped into the lake. That this reminder has to be made by the World Bank was salutary as dependency reflex.

The other fairly disappointing aspect is the mood in which the Tanzanian team at the spring meetings received the reminder, namely in issuing an appeal for EAC partner states to strive to become independent. Asking EAC members to strengthen the collection of domestic revenue was not in the mandate of specific delegations as internal revenue isn't EAC matter. Raising it in that context was sort pre-empting the matter, that the countries do not have the money they were seeking from the lender, that it would require extraordinary revenue efforts, this.

Surprisingly, a World Bank published towards the end of last year has the outline of an answer that the Treasury doesn't appear to have worked over, as what it calls isn't more local revenues to replace multilateral lending. There is a Korea Green Growth Trust Fund (KGGTF) using grants in an extensive way, supporting lake-wide inclusive sanitation for improving water quality in the lake. All it requires is to work with the private sector to create low-skill green jobs along the sanitation service chain, in other words allow private firms to use waste as a resource, set up firms that create jobs in biogas units, fish

## Brace up to face the notoriety of the indigenous people lobby for decades

OVERNMENT officials are definitely starting to get used to interference in development plans from a vast lobby of activists in Western Europe and North America, who put up the posture of protecting indigenous people but in reality they are seeking out niches to fight capitalism. Theirs isn't the old fashioned fight against capitalism to bring about a revolution, but to protect nature as it is, so when Kihansi hydropower project was being designed, they vehemently objected to rare toads' environment being dislocated. In the Julius Nyerere hydropower project it was the forest landscape, and elsewhere, at Ngorongoro and now in Udzungwa or Ruaha it is indigenous people. They should not

This lobby has a cardinal principle or not recognizing compensation for any native dwellers or indeed appreciating development, either of the country or of the specific indigenous people they are putting up a face of defending. Those people are vital to them not from a social point of view as having certain needs similar to ours, in which case it would be positive they move to Msomera and start schooling, apart from farming and improved cattle husbandry. They want those people in a manner approaching idols, icons and totems of a past age as the glory of people undisturbed by western civilisation; that is the main

In the case of the Resilient Natural Resource Management for Tourism Growth Project for Southern Tanzania (REGROW), the issue is one of intruding into corridors of animal migration taken up as

habitats. Incidentally most of the herding groups moving into those areas are scarcely indigenous to the places but are indigenous in culture. Activists see them as having a greater right to use the land than the government could possibly be entitled, since the government's first or foremost duty is thus to defend the environment, nature, indigenous people...

Senior government officials will thus have from time to time take to the microphone to explain what doesn't need to be explained, for instance in the East African Crude Oil Pipeline (EACOP) project, activists went to the European Union |legislature to say that people are being moved without compensation. That was fictitious and they are repeating similar accusations on the REGROW project; the World Bank, which faces congressional pressure in the United States when activists surface with wide ranging accusations of human rights abuses, has frozen a third of the \$150m funding slated for the project. It is likely the matter is cleared later, as the bank is more progressive in its outlook.

In that case when a senior official in the national commission for the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) took up the matter to tell a UN forum on indigenous issues that Tanzania was among countries governed by principles of the rule of law he was talking to a skeptical audience. And they would have readily understood if the issue was poaching or such other, but when it comes to replacing people they deem to be part of nature they are unlikely to understand. # With commitment to help struggling learners and a change in education policy is inevitable

EEDUCATION provision in the country is affected by ideas of psychologists, sociologists and activists among others. Some of these ideas become hard to interpret and implement thus challenging teachers who under whatever situation they are expected to produce good results.

It is important to take into account opinions of various social groups which gives educational policy makers a hard time to come up with policies to guide the country's education sector.

Implementation of education policies become a success or failure at the time of policy formulation where practicability is prioritized or not. Education policy is a direction towards which the nation should take in the provision of education in the country and this calls for much awareness during the time of policy formulation making sure that feasibility is given the first priority.

Pupils are of different nature thus educational policy makers need to take into consideration the demands of each group. There should be a possibility of assisting one group without affecting another group. If assisting one group means a loss to another group, the situation is not promising and hence criticism may arise.

Teaching someone an aspect of study which they have already mastered may cause confusion and boredom. It is not all learners who need to repeat several times reading of an aspect of study before they can master it. Struggling ""learners may prefer repetition but not fast learners who always look forward to receive new concepts. How can we then go about this fact?

The current policy in education does not allow separation of struggling learners from fast learners. The reason for the decision is on the ground that separation can create inferiority complex to learners who are termed as struggling ones. Some educational experts convince that when struggling learners mix up with the fast learners they can get motivation to learn. But sometimes struggling learners do not get enough assistance from fast learners who are busy on the quest for increasing knowledge.

Everyone is aiming higher and that is not bad. As teaching is limited to time it becomes difficult for a teacher to suffice the interests and demands of the two groups in the class. The teacher may face a dilemma of which group to prioritize, the fast learners or the struggling learners.

When the teacher tries to help the struggling learners they cause a conflict of interest in the class as some attention to the fast learners is reduced and hence confusion as no one dislikes special attention. When the teacher tries to help struggling learners it is when the fast learners miss something. Should some learners be assisted at the expense of others? It is difficult to avoid social strata in the society and this also manifests itself in the class organization. It is possible to administer justice to everybody according to their situation but making people look similar in all ways is something hard to accomplish. Inferiority complex and loneliness are sometimes driven by social perspectives and hence they can be eliminated by social reconstruction by embracing positive thinking which will allow putting into place practical strategies which can help improve our education for the betterment of all.

With the collective aim to improve our education and achieve advancement in all aspects of human life, separating struggling learners from the fast learners is important due to the following reasons.

One of the reasons that shows importance of separating struggling learners from the fast learners is that it enhances close follow up. As the size of the class is reduced due to separation it becomes easy for teachers to make a close follow up for pupils' conduct and performance of class tasks. It is close follow up that increases chances of learners to improve in class.

Another reason is that it creates a room for research. Improvement in the teaching methodology is the result of research which can effectively be conducted when the class size is small and learners are similar in many ways. If a teacher can have time to study how learners learn, they will be in a position to improve their teaching methodology and hence promising understanding by the learners of the concept they have taught.

Also having a separate class for struggling learners will help a teacher to have a moderate speed in the coverage of contents in class. Education experts propose giving of short class tasks to struggling learners. When the objectives of the teacher is covering few things they can lower the speed of teaching and hence increasing chances of understanding. When the teacher is asked to give short tasks in the class where also fast learners are present it becomes a challenge because those fast learners can do lengthy tasks. Assisting one group should not mean a loss to another group.

Again separating struggling learners from fast learners helps to avoid stress and discomfort. When the teacher plans a class task which corresponds to the ability of learners to accomplish it on time, the lesson becomes enjoyable and free of stress and discomfort. Paying attention to the nature of learners helps the teacher to set realistic goals for their learners and hence assurance of success in the teaching and learning process. When the performance of learners meets the teacher's expectation is when the class is in harmony and hence free from stress and discomfort.

Being realistic in education is very important. The target of the teacher and other educational stakeholders should be to make learners understand what they are taught. We should avoid impractical ideas in education. With separating for the aim of assisting and not for discriminating, nothing is wrong. Let us divide and make sure that everybody reaches a promising destiny. Teaching is separating.

# Renewable Energy is challenging to energy stability

Sept. 28, 2016, the entire state of tralia suffered a blackout at the height of an unusually strong storm that caused some damage to transmission towers and lines. Even though the damage was not insignificant, other regional grids in Australia similarly affected by the same storm were able to ride it out with only a few short power interruptions affecting smaller areas and were back up to full service within a couple of hours of the weather clearing. In South Australia, however, it took between two and seven days to get everyone back online.

So, why was South Australia so badly affected? Extensive investigations determined that the power outage was prob-

ably the first widespread blackout that could be attributed primarily to complications with the interconnection of renewable energy generators – in this case, mostly wind – with the transmission

One might expect that wind generators had either been damaged or stopped due to the storm's prolonged high winds, but that was not really the case. A few wind generators were shut down due to winds exceeding their limits, but the loss to the grid because of this was only about 20 megawatts (MW). Rather, the remaining wind generators were simply unable to handle the other fluctuations on the grid caused by the storm, mainly downed power lines.

In the extensive investigations that followed, which, among other

wind generation companies being fined for technical deficiencies that violated regulations, several lessons emerged that are applicable anywhere that a significant amount of RE in the generation mix is either a reality or an aspiration. In its final report on the 2016 blackout, the Australian Energy Market Operator (AEMO) concluded that to avoid such events in the future, operators need to increase system inertia and the frequency of control services and strengthen the overall

transmission system.



the increased operational complexity of the power system, and, the real technical hard nut to crack, which is necessary to make the latter two objectives even possible, integrating inverter-connected (as opposed to inertial) generation sources.

#### The trouble with inverters

As explained previously, the electrical supply in the grid at any given moment has to be at the proper frequency – in this country and many others, 60 Hertz mand. The frequency is related to voltage; a complete explanation of how that works is complicated, but it is enough to know that when voltage drops, the frequency drops, and when it increases, the frequency increases. The frequency needs to be maintained within a narrow range, typically plus or minus 0.05 Hz, to prevent damage to generation and transmission equipment and electrical devices using the supply.

In a grid based on inertial generation in terms of supply, devel- (Hz) – to properly supply the alternating sources, i.e., those with spinning genthings, resulted in four oping systems to manage current (AC) required by electricity deerators – which include fuel-fired plants

(coal, gas, oil or biomass), nuclear plants, geothermal plants and hydropower plants - maintaining the frequency is relatively easy to do. The supply and voltage of the connected plants are known quantities, so in order to keep the grid stable, the operator just needs to draw the appropriate amount of supply to match demand and ensure that the generators are kept spinning at an average rate of 3,600 RPM (1 Hz equals 1 cycle, or in this case, 1 revolution per second). This is done by having power reserves on hand, regulating reserves to smooth out fluctuations in voltage and frequency, contingent reserves to respond to unexpected increases in demand, and dispatchable reserves to respond to losses in capacity, such as from a plant suffering a breakdown 

Connecting solar and wind power and batteries to the grid presents a challenge because these rely on inverters to maintain frequency rather than spinning generators. An inverter changes direct current (DC) electricity to AC by opening and closing switches between the power sources and the grid connection. The frequency of an inertial grid is a sine wave, and so what the inverter does is open and close its switches many times so that the on-off cycle of the electricity flowing through it approximates that sine wave; the more switches in an inverter, or the faster they are able to operate, the "smoother" the resulting curve is.

So, there are two problems with inverters. The first is being resolved as the technology improves; inverters are being built with better sensors and internal components so they can produce a "smoother" curve, provided the voltage being fed into them to the solar panels, wind turbines or batteries stays within a workable range. Too low a voltage and the switches won't have enough energy to operate; too high, the inverter might be burned out, so it will usually switch off entirely to prevent damage.

The second problem is that inverters, at least as of now, are what is known as "grid-following" inverters. They require feedback from the grid in order to operate at the proper frequency; in other words, the inverter needs to be "told" what frequency it should operate at. There are such things as "grid-forming" inverters, but these are not yet commonplace except in small applications (such as for a single house system); for one thing, they are several multiples more expensive than regular

Thus, in the case of a power outage, most solar, wind and battery sources cannot supply the grid unless there is a connected generator still turning that provides the feedback frequency.

This quirk of inverter-connected power is why some people with grid-tied home solar systems make the unwelcome discovery that their rooftop solar panels are not able to power their homes when there is a blackout unless they are able to disconnect from the outside supply. Most better home systems are able to do this, but if you buy a cheap system, good luck.

#### Variable supply

And, of course, there is the unsolvable problem of variable supply from wind and solar sources, particularly the latter. Even if the inverter connection is working properly, the supply coming from the source fluctuates rapidly. Batteries are more stable, which is why serious proposals have been raised here to require new solar and wind installations to be indirect; that is, instead of being directly connected to the grid, connected to a battery storage system instead, with that being connected to the grid.

In the absence of that kind of setup, which is largely the situation in the Philippines now, the only solution is to greatly increase the amount of regulating and contingent reserves available, which is easier said than done. For one thing, the state of generation resources in the Philippines now is not good enough to comfortably provide those extra reserves; for another, it's expensive. Reserves are not free, and the cost of them is eventually reflected on everyone's electric bill. Granted, transmission charges make up the smallest line item among generation, transmission, and distribution, but people don't like paying higher rates under any circumstances, and regulators don't like to approve them unless there

is a compelling reason to do so. It should be emphasized that the challenges of transitioning to RE are not at all unique to the Philippines and that the complaints that the National Grid Corp. of the Philippines (NGCP) isn't working fast enough to connect new RE sources are not justified by any actual shortcomings on its part. As just one example of how common the challenges are, according to a report from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) last week, there are currently 2.6 terawatts (TW) of RE capacity - roughly 92 times the Philippines' entire existing installed capacity – in the queue for grid interconnection in the US. This is just the way of things; technology is improving, and it seems likely that integrating RE will gradually become easier, but it is not now, and it won't be for some time to come.

## Tabora hosts national World Malaria Day

EALTH Minister Ummv Mwalimu is ⊾today scheduled to grace the World Malaria Day at national level in Tabora Region.

Leodgar Tenga, chairman of Eliminate Malaria Council Tanzania (EMCT) said this in Dar es Salaam yesterday when speaking at a meeting hosted by NBC Bank ahead of the

The move comes as the government statistics indicate that a total of 3.5 million people suffered from malaria in the country in 2023, resulting in the deaths of 1,900 people. A report by the World Health Organization also shows that 95 out of 100 malaria deaths worldwide occurred in sub-Saharan African countries.

According to Tenga, the council's goal is to completely eradicate malaria by 2030.

Tenga said that despite the national commitment to reduce the average malaria infection rate from 7.5 percent in 2017 to below 3.5 percent by 2025 and ultimately eliminate the disease by 2030, there is still a challenge of accessing sufficient resources to implement essential malaria interventions.

"The efforts of the government and various stakeholders in achieving this goal are commendable as the government has continued to invest in healthcare services and



education to combat the challenge of malaria. However, we see the need for more stakeholders, including journalists, private sector leaders and civil society organisations at all levels to support these efforts wholeheartedly to achieve this commitment. Malaria is completely unacceptable. Let's all reject it and take action," he said.

Tenga spoke of the need to intensify efforts in eliminating mosquito breeding grounds, using insecticidetreated nets and allowing experts and various leaders to educate the public about the disease through various media outlets, especially those that reach people in remote

Theobald Sabi, NBC man-

aging director who is also a member of the council, said that the bank's participation in the initiative largely aims to address the consequences of the disease, including the deaths of young people, mothers and children which affect the workforce needed to boost the country's econo-

"Malaria makes children miss school and prevent workers and businesspeople from going to work, thereby affecting productivity and ultimately hindering economic growth. As a bank, we are deeply concerned about this and we are ready to cooperate with EMCT in this important battle at any cost," he said.

# China-Africa cooperation in agriculture continues to deepen

WHEN visiting an egg production factory in Pinggu District, Beijing's northeastern suburb, African diplomats were amazed by the automated breeding process and quality products produced.

During an organized trip last week, 28 diplomats from over 20 African countries visited the egg factory, a food technology company, and scenic spot known as "peach blossom

Modernization of agriculture and mechanization of agriculture at various levels of the value chain is quite relevant to Africa, said Willy Bett, Kenyan ambassador to China.

Beijing boasts about half of Chinese academicians in agriculture, over 1,000 professional breeders, and almost 20,000 agricultural scientific and technical personnel. As a traditional agricultural district of Beijing, Pinggu has made full use of its regional advantages to attract technicians by

establishing laboratories for academicians and researchers, offering funds for scientific and technological innovation.

Chickens nurtured in Pinggu are a great example of local products going abroad. At a chicken farm in Tanzania, workers there nurture chickens and white-feather broilers from Pinggu. Last summer witnessed 15,500 chickens and 1,000 white-feather broilers of Yukou Poultry being exported to Tanzania.

To ensure the chickens could adapt to the environment of Tanzania, technicians of Yukou Poultry made field trips to Tanzania to examine the local production factors, including feeding environment, feed and vaccines before export and sent technicians to work in Tanzania to offer professional guidance.

"The chickens from China can adapt to the local environment, better-resisting diseases than local chickens," said an administrator of the farm.

During the trip, the African

diplomats discussed how to promote agricultural cooperation between Chinese and African enterprises to ensure food security.

A new meeting of the Forum on China-Africa Cooperation (FOCAC) will be held in Beijing this autumn. "When you talk about the FOCAC mechanism, the cooperation between China and Africa, one of the most important topics is agricultural cooperation between China and Africa," said Ibrahima Sory Sylla, Senegalese ambassador to China.

"We have the Chinese embassy in my country that facilitated the project to grow rice. We are talking to China in terms of setting up agricultural demonstration centers in Botswana," said Daphne Nomsa Mlotshwa, charge d'affaires of the Botswana Embassy in

# First quarter 'so far so good' for banks

**By Guardian Reporter** 

S banks continue to publish their quarterly financial performances for the first quarter of this year, in accordance with regulatory requirements, wish indication showing continued growth of profitability, due to positive increase of both funded and non-funded incomes.

According to published financial statements for three banks including Azania Bank, Habib Bank and Access Microfinance Bank, the funded incomes, which hold the largest share of incomes, recorded strong growth, while nonfunded incomes are also growing considerably, driven by fees and commissions, other income as well as forex dealing and transactions gains.

Other banks are also expected to publish their quarterly financial statements during the remaining days of this week and early next week, before the end of this

The Azania bank's unaudited quarterly financial statements paint that net profit amounted to 7.3b/- during the first three months of this year, compared to 6.9bn/- attained during the first quarter of last year.

The increase of the profit resulted from expansion of both funded income, which went up to 22.8bn/- compared to 18.3bn/- as well as nearly doubled non-funded income to 10.1bn/- during Q1, 2024, compared to 5.3bn/- during

The strong growth of nonfunded income resulted from more than doubled foreign exchange profit, which amounted to 3bn/- during the first three months of this year, compared to 1.6bn/- during similar quarter of last year, as well as fees and commission which amounted to 5bn/- compared to 3bn/- respec-

Azania, which is categorized as the largest bank with total assets of 2.2trn/-, also saw its other operating income growing by more

Habib African Bank Ltd For most personalized services

than three times to 2bn/- in the first quarter of this year, from 554m/- in the first quarter of last year.

The bank also managed to maintain its lending level at 1.68bn/- at the end of the first quarter, while customer deposits amounted to 1.59trn/-.

It retained earnings amounted to 95bn/- in Q1, 2024, which enabled it to maintain its shareholders' fund at 185.7bn/- despite slowed profit and loss account to 7.3bn/- from 29.2bn/in the fourth quarter of last year.

Habib bank's statements show that net profit increased by nearly 70 percent to 1.68bn/- during the first quarter of last year, compared to 977m/-

recorded during similar period of last vear.

According to the statements of the small bank, with a total asset of 361bn/- with four branches, the growth of profitability resulted from strong increase of both funded income and non-funded income.

Net interest income increased by nearly 50 percent to 3.8bn/- at the end of March, 2024, compared to 2.6bn/- at the end of March 2023, as lending amounted to 209bn/- during the first quarter of this year.

The statements show the bank has also managed to maintain the low level of Non-Performing Loans

(NPLs) of 2.06 percent, far below the Bank of Tanzania's (BoT) regulatory benchmark of 5 percent.

The non-funded incomes grew by at least 30 percent to 1.37bn/- compared to 1.07bn/- respectively, driven by sharp increase of foreign exchange dealing and transaction gains to 477m/- from 191m/- amid decline of fees and commission to 366m/from 381m/- respectively.

The bank's basic earnings per share more than doubled to 650/- at the end of March this year, compared to 274/- recorded during the end of March 2023.

Access Microfinance Bank also

managed to maintain positive financial performances, after recording a net profit of 314m/- during the first quarter of this year, slightly lower than 404m/- recorded during the first quarter of last, pushing down an earnings per share to 31/- from 40/-.

The statements show funded incomes increased to a net interest asset of 5.5bn/compared to 4.6bn/- respectively, with lending to various sectors of the economy amounted to 59.2bn/- compared to 55.2bn/- recorded during the fourth quarter of last year.

The non-interest income amounted to 1.1bn/- compared to 1.2bn/- due to forex dealing and transactions losses of 46m/- compared to the gain of 25m/- as well as decline of other operating income, which amounted to 850m/- compared to 891m/respectively.

This will involves offering a diverse set of innovative financial instruments to shareholders, development partners and capital markets, including hybrid-capital and risk-transfer instruments, and promoting the channeling of the IMF's Special Drawing Rights (SDRs) through MDBs.

The lending headroom will also providing more clarity on

# 'There's a wealth of opportunities in African banking'

THILE the African banking market has seen a withdrawal of global banks over the last five years, the opportunity for localised banking has seen the opposite, driven by the expansion of African banking groups into the continent and led mostly by South African, West African, and Northern African banks.

In fact, 100 percent of respondents to KPMG's inaugural Southern African Banking Survey: Vision 2030 indicated that the size of the market is a key driver for seeking out and implementing effective strategies for growth into Af-

This growth will be driven primarily by opportunity in the corporate banking, Investment Banking, and transaction banking sectors followed by retail and wealth management - underpinned by innovation which has enabled more customers to access banking services through mo-

Based on the survey, there are significant opportunities for the unbanked that can further enable socio-economic development through alternative finance, which includes the rapid growth that is expected from innovations such as blockchain technologies.

However, this doesn't come without its challenges, where the survey highlighted that key challenges for expansion across the continent are the existence of a reliable regulatory framework supported by solid governance and transparency across the industry, as well as considerations around AML and Compliance, with currency and political risk closing the list.

A high level of customer uptake in lending - and transactions - remains a concern, especially as banks race towards innovation that enables ease of use for customer onboarding and retention.

This survey isn't a roadmap, but a call to action. We seek to empower and guide our leaders in banking to become proactive shapers of Africa's financial future. These thought-provoking insights, practical strategies, and realworld case studies will equip the banking industry to thrive in this dynamic landscape.

The survey draws on the perspectives from the various parts of KPMG's Advisory business units across Africa which includes payments, AI and Digital, Investment, and Commercial banking as well as tax and ESG.

The African banking landscape is undergoing a metamorphosis, driven by technology, a vibrant fintech scene, and an insatiable demand for convenient and personalised financial services.

This report shines a spotlight on the seven key areas that will define this transformation over the next 10 years.

Growth across Africa

As Africa is currently poised to be the second fastest growing regional economy, with more than 10 African countries experiencing substantial Gross Domestic Product (GDP) growth, the local environment and available expertise coupled with global knowledge play an important role in the growth across Africa.

This growth on the continent is where the banking sector is looking more for insights to succeed.

The expansion across the continent over the coming years will be driven primarily by opportunities in Corporate Banking, Investment Banking, and Transaction Banking followed by retail and wealth management - with Southern, Eastern, and West Africa presenting the biggest

Artificial intelligence (AI) and digital innovation Artificial intelligence models have the potential to transform businesses and everyday life profoundly. In line with our analysts' assessments, financial institutions are looking towards combining a "build and buy" strategy to enhance their AI and digital innovation skills and portfolios.

The information technology spend on AI and digital innovation is a testament to the 38 percent of participants who confirmed that between 21 percent and 30 percent of their IT budget is devoted toward these priorities.

straints. **ESG** 

The growing sectoral focus on ESG is linked to higher returns and benefits now coming to the fore as banks and financial service providers begin to see tangible results from their efforts.

As regulatory obligations grow and evolve, and consumer sentiment leans towards supporting ESG principles more and more, this operational pillar will secure a stronger foothold in all banking operations across Africa.

The expected trends in tax and the management and support within Southern Africa highlighted the necessity of the tax environment for businesses, particularly in the Banking sector. Interestingly, all participants believe that in tax advisory services of the future, AI is expected to play a bigger role.

In addition, 75 percent expect that the adoption and evolution of technologies to manage and administer tax functions will evolve and grow in the future. Specifically,

in South Africa, 58 percent indicated that they expected an increase in value-added tax (VAT) to meet national treasury budget deficits in the future.

Fifty percent indicated that they were satisfied with the tax management and support provided by internal and external advisors within the Southern African region.

Investment banking

While foreign investment into Africa moves slowly, the continent is currently regarded as the most profitable region in the world. The corporate and investment banking market on the continent has shifted a key focus towards sustainability, flexible risk management policies, and the quick adoption of appropriate technologies.

Our research shows that Investment banking in Africa offers significant growth potential driven by economic development, capital market expansion, and investment opportunities across various sectors. Particular focus is given to the opportunity for infrastructure development programmes, particularly in energy, renewables, water, and transportation.

In addition, public-private partnerships will be key as they enable the sharing of skills but also risks.

We are going to see three key areas of growth here including innovative financing solutions, new sectors for growth, and rising domestic capital.

**Payments** 

Africa is comparatively ahead of the developed world when it comes to payment technology adoption and is uniquely positioned to capitalise on these advancements.

For example, as payment transactions make up the majority of financial transactions, the time is ripe for institutions to begin using those large datasets to gain valuable insights into their customers on an individual level.

With full consideration given to data privacy regulations, of course, the adoption of data analytics tools and technologies can enable institutions to obtain a clear picture of their customers, their preferences, and their needs.

By using payment data to outline customer segments, more targeted customer offerings, customer service, and product optimisation can be added to banks' services.

Sixty seven percent of respondents see the payment landscape as a business opportunity.

However, this is largely threatened by fintech companies which are seen as a threat by 100 percent of respondents.

# Gaza hospital bodies indicate 'possible war crimes'

**HONG KONG** 

REPRESENTATIVES of the United Nations are alarmed by what is called as "possible war crimes" and demand an independent investigation after hundreds of bodies were found in the premises of a hospital in Khan Younis amid continued Israeli bombardment. The Organization of Islamic Cooperation just condemned such crime against humanity and "state terrorism".

According to the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights on April 23, a total of 283 bodies were recovered at Nasser Hospital in Khan Younis in central Gaza and at Al-Shifa Hospital in Gaza City in the north. At least 42 of these have been identified.

Among the dead were older people, women, and some wounded while others were found tied with their hands tied and stripped of their clothes.

"The intentional killing of civilians, detainees and others who are hors de combat is a war crime," said United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights Volker Turk, as he called for independent investigations into the deaths.

"Every 10 minutes a child is killed or wounded. They are protected under the laws of war, and yet they are ones who are disproportionately paying the ultimate price in this war," said the High Commis-

Ravina Shamdasani, spokesperson for the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights told journalists in Geneva that reports suggested there were 30 Palestinian bodies buried in two graves in the courtyard of Al-Shifa Hospital in Gaza City; one in front of the emergency building and the others in front of the dialysis building.

Further, the bodies of 12 Palestinians have now been identified from these locations at Al-Shifa, but identification has not cupation" accountable for the repercusyet been possible for the remaining indi-

viduals. Shamdasani said there could be "many more" victims, "despite the claim by the Israeli Defense Forces to have killed 200 Palestinians during the Al-Shifa medical complex operation.

Turk also lamented the "unabated" grave human rights violations that continued in the West Bank despite international condemnation of "massive settler attacks" between April 12 and April 14 that had been facilitated by the Israeli army.

There were also reports that several Palestinians had been unlawfully killed in the Nur Shams operation "and that the ISF used unarmed Palestinians to shield their forces from attack and killed others in apparent extrajudicial executions", according to the OHCHR.

Turk had also strongly condemned recent Israeli strikes in Rafah that resulted in the deaths of many women and children.

In a statement on Tuesday, Turk also warned against a full-scale ground incursion into an area with over 1.2 million civilians, saying it would violate international humanitarian and human rights law, likely leading to more atrocities, according to a report by Xinhua News Agency.

The Organization of Islamic Cooperation, or OIC, in a statement, condemned "the continued tragic massacre by the Israeli occupation in the Occupied Palestinian Territory" and reports of mass graves recently discovered in the Nasser Medical Complex compound in Khan Younis.

"The OIC considered this as war crime, a crime against humanity, and an organized state terrorism that requires investigation, accountability, and sanction under international criminal law, stressing that the International Criminal Court must assume its responsibility in this regard," the OIC state-

The OIC also said it held the "Israeli ocsions of its crimes and "continued terrorist

practices against the Palestinian people", which negate all human values and constitute a flagrant violation of international humanitarian law.

"The OIC renewed its call on the international community, in particular the Security Council, on the need to stop the war crimes committed by the Israeli occupation in the Gaza Strip and to provide international protection for the Palestinian people," it added.

Mohammad Abualrob, director of the Palestinian Government Communications Center in the West Bank, told China Daily that the discovery of mass graves and the "brutal killing" of civilians in Gaza was a further indication of Israel's "genocidal policies" against the Palestinian people.

"The Palestinian people yearn for international justice and an end to the occupation. Israel has rejected hundreds of UN resolutions, and in the face of so much evidence of ongoing genocide in Gaza, the time is now urgent to force Israel to halt its actions," said Abualrob, who is also former assistant professor and chairperson of the Department of Media at Birzeit University in the West Bank.

Jawaid Iqbal, chairman of the Department of West Asian and North African Studies at Aligarh Muslim University in India blamed the long history of "imperialism" for the mass graves found in Gaza.

"Whether it's the burial sites found at indigenous boarding schools in Canada or the US, or the graves of Nazi war victims, white supremacist and colonialist states have always used racist extermination to maintain their power," Iqbal told China Daily.

"This is happening again in Gaza, as Israel, supported by the West, violently suppresses anti-colonial resistance. The imperialist power of the Global North perpetuates a world where white lives are valued more than those of people from the Third World, who are consigned to mass graves," he added.

More than 34,000 Palestinians have been killed in Gaza, including 14,685 children and 9,670 women, the UN High Commissioner's office said on April 22 since fighting escalated between Israelis and Palestinians after Oct 7 last year.



Moreover, Jaishankar stressed that "They (West) actually think they are part of our electorate", adding, "I think it's time today that we disabuse them and the best way that we do that, is by confidence."

EAM emphasised the need to stand up to these kinds of attacks and criticisms and rankings and reports because they will question everything.

"They will question your election system, your EVM, your election commission, even the weather," he said.

"And one complaint is...BJP is so unfair, BJP thinks it's going to win very big," he said, adding that, in a kind of way, today, we are at a very important inflexion point. Iaishankar said that the decisions, the government will be making, are not just for the next five years, and

will give our nation, our society, and our coming generations a very big vote of confidence. "It is the guarantee, the guarantee is an expression

## **US stops hiding true purpose of sanctions** on Moscow, Russian envoy says

#### **WASHINGTON**

THE US has stopped hiding the true purpose of sanctions on Moscow, Russian Ambassador to Washington Anatoly Antonov said.

"Washington has stopped hiding the true intent of its restrictive pressure on our country. It's not about any mythical aspirations to resolve the conflict in Ukraine, but about banal opportunistic and predatory ambitions.

A trivial scenario is in order: if the Americans cannot win in a fair economic competition, sanctions are used," he pointed out, commenting on US officials' statements about plans to increase pressure on Russia's energy sector.

Antonov stressed that US officials "use every opportunity" to threaten Russia with restrictions.

Earlier, US Assistant Secretary of State for Energy Resources Geoffrey Pyatt said that Washington expected to further restrict Russia's access to European energy markets.

As Antonov marked, US officials believe that energy security is about dominating markets and eliminating compe-

"Energy security, according to Washington, is the desire to dominate markets, complete subordination of satellites and stopping any competition. We doubt that such approaches are viable



in a multipolar world," he noted in a post on the Russian Embassy's Telegram channel.

The US is increasing hydrocarbon production, while pushing other countries to abandon the use of fossil fuels, Antonov added.

"While broadcasting slogans about the existential threat from a warming planet and pushing other countries to abandon the use of fossil fuels, the United States is rapidly increasing its domestic production of hydrocarbons. They are hooking the allies on their own gas for decades to come. Of course, such a situation is not called "unacceptable dependence." This, they insist, is a different story," he noted.

He said, "They've started this amazing trend where every citizen is recognized by hand, eyeball, or finger. They've opened bank accounts for 700 million people, and payments are being processed smoothly.

Their education system and infrastructure are remarkable, lifting the entire country because of one just and tough man. But to break down bureaucracy, you have to be tough, and he's doing just that."

"They have I think its 29 states or something like that, but they all had completelyits almost like Europe that have completely different tax systems, which leads to enormous corruption. He's breaking all that stuff down. And so, there are examples of people who have just turned these things around. And we need a little bit more of that here," Dimon added.

Recently on April 16, the International Monetary fund had projected India to remain the fastest growing among major economies in 2024. IMF, in its latest outlook, raised India's growth projections for 2024 from 6.5 per cent to 6.8 per cent. ANI

#### Israel destroys loaded rocket launchers in Gaza humanitarian zone

ISRAELI aircraft struck Hamas rocket launchers located in a southern Gaza humanitarian zone overnight, the Israel Defence Forces confirmed on Wednesday morning.

No civilians were harmed in either strike after being warned ahead of

Meanwhile, Israeli aircraft struck over 50 Hamas targets throughout the Strip, including an operational tunnel shaft during the past day.

In central Gaza, several Hamas terrorists spotted near Israel forces were eliminated by tank fire.

At least 1,200 people were killed and 240 Israelis and foreigners were taken hostage in Hamas's attacks on Israeli communities near the Gaza border on October 7. Around 30 of the remaining 133 hostages are believed dead. **ANI**

## Palestinians mourn history as Israel destroys archaeological sites in Gaza

IN a state of astonishment. Samiha al-Aqqad, 86-year-old mother of eight, gazed in disbelief at the mound-like piles of rubble, barely recognizing the remnants of Barquq Castle, a historical site in Khan Younis, reduced by the Israeli army to a mere heap of

"A few months ago, we had Barquq Castle, which was an essential and ancient landmark of the city of Khan Younis. It indicated the presence of civilization, heritage, and culture in our city throughout history," the elderly Palestinian woman told Xinhua.

"Unfortunately," she complained, "Israel destroyed it and everything that was Palestinian in our city. Overnight, this castle and all the neighborhoods of our city turned into nothing more than massive destruction."

Barquq Castle was established in 1387 by Prince Younis Duadar at the request of Sultan Barquq, one of the Mamluk sultans of the Arab-Islamic era and the founder of the Burj Mamluk state.

During the lengthy journey between Damascus and Cairo, the two prominent cities of the Mamluk state of Burj, it was built to serve as a resting place and meeting spot for merchants and travelers.

"For many decades, we have been coming here with our parents and our grandchildren to tell them our history ... Unfortunately, it is all over now," said she. "Why Israel insists on destroying all our presence and existence on our land," al-Aqqad asked, bursting into

Standing beside the Al-Omari Grand Mosque in the city, which was also largely destroyed by Israeli airstrikes in December last year, Jamal Abu Kamil, a Gaza-based Palestinian, raised the same question.

The 42-year-old father of four witnessed several conflicts between Israelis and Palestinians in Gaza since 2008.

"We have not witnessed such an Israeli war that destroyed everything in Gaza ... It is not against Hamas only, but it is against our history and existence," he said. The 1400-square-meter Al-Omari Grand Mosque was originally a Roman temple. It was made into a Roman church during the Byzantine

era and later converted into a mosque following the Islamic conquest.

Here, I used to conjure up history and Islamic civilization among the crowds of worshipers. This place has a distinct historical fragrance that makes us feel proud that we live on this land," Abu Kmail recalled. Haitham Saba, a Gaza-based Christian, shared the same sadness.

To escape the intense Israeli bombardment in Gaza City, the 39-year-old father, along with his family and several Christians, sought refuge in the Church of Saint Porphyrius, a Greek Orthodox church that was considered the oldest one in the city.

However, the Israeli army attacked one of the church's outer buildings, killing 18 peo-

ple and wounding dozens, including Saba's

"Back then, Israel claimed that it targeted a place adjacent to the church, but its army deliberately hit the church and destroyed a large part of it," Saba told Xinhua. "Israel has deliberately attacked Palestinian history, whether Christian or Muslim." Barquq Castle, the Omari Mosque, and the Church of Saint Porphyrius are among the 200 archaeological and historical sites that were destroyed in the Gaza Strip, according to the Hamas-run government media office.

"The Israeli army attacked our historical sites and stole thousands of artifacts that were in the archaeological sites and stores,' grumbled Fadel Al-Otl, a Gaza-based Palestinian antiquities expert.

However, he complained, "We do not have anything to protect ourselves from the Israeli aggression against our existence and our lives."



Pamba Jiji will need at least a draw in the club's last Championship League match to garner automatic promotion to the NBC

Premier League next season and end the side's 20-year hiatus in the premier league.

With 64 points, the Mwanza team will need to avoid a loss, because Mbeya Kwanza FC also has a chance to attain automatic promotion- with the outfit now boasting 62 points and a match in hand.

Former NBC Premier League side Ruvu Shooting has been relegated to next season's First League after finishing last in the Championship League- having notched 13 points- while Pan Africans also face relegation.

### **Mauricio Pochettino** accuses 'soft' Chelsea of giving up in **Arsenal humiliation**

MAURICIO Pochettino admitted his Chelsea players "gave up" and accused his team of being "so soft" as their shambolic season hit a new low with a 5-0 thrashing by Arsenal.

Chelsea's defeat was their heaviest ever loss to Arsenal and meant that there are now 30 points between the two sides, with Pochettino saying: "When we have bad days, we are so bad."

Mikel Arteta, the Arsenal manager, said he had "all the sympathy in the world" for Pochettino, his close friend, and praised Arsenal's courage as they moved three points clear of Liverpool at the top of the Premier League table.

Arsenal are now four points ahead of Manchester City, widely regarded as the favourites to win the league again, but have played two more games than Pep Guardiola's team.

Chelsea, meanwhile, remain stuck in ninth place after another night which provoked serious questions about Pochettino's future and the overarching project at the club.

'We didn't compete from the beginning of the

The night was made worse for Chelsea by the fact that Kai Havertz, their former player, scored twice for Arsenal.

"Everyone saw we didn't compete from the beginning of the game," said Pochettino, "After we conceded I think the team was so soft. I'm so disappointed with the start because we're supposed to have full energy and compete better.

"We were not aggressive and we did not concentrate in situations where it is easy to find the solution. That is why we're so disappointed.

"We were talking at half-time to start in a different way [in the second half]. But we started really bad. When we conceded the third goal we gave up. "Arsenal is a very good team. But we allowed

them to play. We gave all the possibility to play and create chances [to them]. In some parts of the game it was an even game. But we're too inconsistent."

During the second half, a young Chelsea fan held up a banner reading: "I don't want your shirt! I want you to want to fight for ours.'

Asked about the banner by TNT Sports, Chelsea captain Conor Gallagher said: "We definitely are putting the effort in. I know how much it means to all the boys. It is a very young squad with not much experience as a team in the Premier League.

"We have had a lot of ups and downs and we are still improving as a team to get to the next level and today was one of those days we were nowhere near

Arteta expressed his support for Pochettino, saying: "[I have] all the sympathy in the world. With everything that he's been through and everything that he's been doing. He knows that.

"I've been on the other side as well. He's doing a great job, I think when you look at this team and analyse every second of them, they deserve to win many matches, they deserve to win against big teams. He's doing a really good job so hopefully things will turn around and be as he deserves."

### Al Ain knock out Al Hilal to reach **Asian Champions** League final

AL Ain reached the Asian Champions League final for the first time since 2016 with a 5-4 aggregate victory over four-time winners Al Hilal, despite a 2-1 second-leg defeat in Riyadh on Tuesday.

Trailing 4-2 after their record 34-match winning run was ended in last week's first leg, Al Hilal quickly cut the deficit through Ruben Neves' fourth-minute penalty.

Brazilian Erik drew Al Ain level on the night, though, to leave runaway Saudi Pro League leaders Al Hilal with a mountain to climb in the second

But Salem Al Dawsari scored a rebound less than six minutes after the restart to give the hosts

Brazilian Michael and former Lazio star Sergei Milinkovic-Savic both went close as Al Hilal piled on the pressure, the latter seeing his effort cleared off the line.

Al Ain goalkeeper Khalid Eisa enjoyed a fine evening, making six saves, including from Michael and Mohamed Kanno late on.

# Five-star Arsenal thrash Chelsea to open up Premier League lead

LONDON

AI Havertz and Ben White scored twice as Arsenal thrashed Chelsea 5-0 on Tuesday to surge ahead in the Premier League title race and ramp up the pressure on Liverpool and Manchester City.

Leandro Trossard was also on target in a record win over Chelsea for the Gunners, who move three points clear of Liverpool and four of Manchester City.

The destiny of the title remains in City's hands as the defending champions have two games in hand.

Liverpool have also played one fewer game than Arsenal and are in action at Everton in the Merseyside derby Wednesday. However, Mikel Arteta's men's goal difference advantage now looks unassailable should it become decisive in the title race.

"We have made our people very proud, it is a big derby for us and I know what it means," said Arteta. "We started the game really well but didn't convert all our chances - we were a bit sloppy in certain areas of the pitch.

"In the second half we were much more disciplined and created chances and were

ruthless in front of goal."

Chelsea and Arsenal's title rivals were dealt a huge blow before kick-off as the Blues' danger man Cole Palmer was ruled out due to illness.

Palmer has scored or assisted nearly 50 percent of Chelsea's Premier League goals this season and his presence was badly missed by the visi-

Despite enduring a disappointing first season under Mauricio Pochettino, Chelsea had been unbeaten in eight consecutive league games prior to their FA Cup semi-final defeat to Manchester City on Saturday.

But they were blown away by an Arsenal side keen to reaffirm their title credentials after losing their last home game to Aston Villa.

"So difficult (a) result and performance (to accept) because it is not nice to see your team playing like this from the beginning of the game," said Pochettino. "Today we didn't compete against a team fighting for the Premier League. We need to be aware we need to compete in a different way."

The hosts flew out of the blocks and were in front inside five minutes.

Trossard only ended up at

were gazumped by Chelsea in the battle to sign Mykhailo Mudryk in January 2023.

The Belgian has proved to be a far more productive signing and smashed in his 15th goal of the season at Djordje Petrovic's near post.

The Serbian briefly held Arsenal at bay early in the second period with saves from Declan Rice and Havertz.

However, the floodgates

opened once White curled in Arsenal's second after Chelsea failed to clear a corner on 52 minutes. Havertz scored the winning goal in a Champions League final for Chelsea during his three years in west London, but he never performed consistently to the level he has found in recent months under Arteta.

Martin Odegaard's stunning through ball was met with the finish it deserved as Havertz smashed high past Petrovic.

His next finish was more subtle as the German international fired in off the post from Bukayo Saka's pass for his seventh goal in his last 14 club games.

A night for forget for Chelsea was summed up when White's attempted cross flew into the top corner from another sensational Odegaard pass.

Defeat leaves Chelsea still in ninth, three points adrift of the European places.

## Who is Arne Slot? The Guardiola disciple who coaches like Mikel Arteta

ARNE Slot is the disciple of Pep Guardiola who has strong similarities to Mikel Arteta and Roberto De Zerbi in the way he coaches and the intense playing style he

Slot's Feyenoord side play some of the most exciting, entertaining, high-energy, attacking football on the Continent. It should come as little surprise then that Liverpool are interested in hiring him as Jürgen Klopp's successor - with Slot a friend of Klopp's assistant Pep Lijnders, who is also leaving Anfield.

The 45-year-old former midfielder is renowned for his precise coaching methods and his attention to detail. So precise is he that that the 'rondo' - the training drill whereby players attempt to keep the ball while a smaller group aim to intercept - is made extremely specific at Feyenoord.

drill does not allow players to 'scan' (to check the options on the pitch) which is one of the fundamentals of passing first Premier League and so he insists that they can take only one touch, that they cannot return possession to the player who passed to them and, crucially, that the ball always stays below the knee. # Chama calls for fans' support as Simba SC seeks redemption

SIMBA SC has navigated a tumultuous 30 days, facing setbacks across multiple fronts, including exit from the CAF Champions League last eight and the CRDB Federation Cup, alongside a lackluster performance in the NBC Premier League.

Their third-place standing in the top flight, trailing Young Africans SC by a significant 12-point margin, underscores the challenges the former has encountered.

Amidst these trials, Clatous Chama, the attacking midfielder for Simba SC, has issued a rallying cry to the club's supporters, emphasizing the importance of continued encouragement during this challeng-

Simba SC has moved to Zanzibar to compete in the revived Muungano Cup.

After the Muungano Cup, Simba SC will have to turn its focus to securing a strong finish in the remaining eight NBC Premier League matches.

Simba SC currently sits third in the NBC Premier League with 46 points from 21 games played (14 wins, four draws, and three losses).

Their quest for second place finish, and the coveted CAF Champions League spot that comes with it, begins with a crucial five-game stretch against Mtibwa Sugar, Namungo FC, Tabora United, Azam FC, and Kagera Sugar.

With Azam FC currently holding onto the second place with 54 points, Simba SC needs a winning streak to close the gap.

A strong finish would maintain Simba SC's impressive five-year run of participating in the CAF Champions League.



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
