### World Bank offers SGR, central line credit cover

THE World Bank has expressed interest in issuing loans for the construction of the ongoing standard gauge railway project and renovation of the traditional central line or metre-gauge railway (SGR), due to the sector's importance to the country's de-

Nathan Belete, the World Bank country director, made the pledge in a liaison meeting with Finance minister Dr Mwigulu Nchemba, Works minister Innocent Bashungwa and Mohamed Mchengerwa, the Regional Administration and Local Governments state minister in the President's Office (PO-RALG) in Dar es Salaam yesterday.

Affirming that the bank is a major stakeholder in the country's development, underlining that the bank sees it as vital to participate in the two railway projects, as the country's biggest priority at the moment is SGR construction.

A World Bank team of experts and top project officials are meeting to process the needs of the projects so that the bank can provide funds to that effect,

This will enable the country to fulfil its goals of completing the vital railways infrastructure, he said, affirming that SGR completion and improvement of the traditional line will stimulate the economy by calibrated transportation of passengers and goods.

Govt team leader Dr Nchemba thanked the World Bank for its willingness to support SGR construction and rehabilitation of the central railway line.

The meeting also discussed ways of obtaining emergency funds for improving road networks extensively damaged by the rains, along with pushing forward the Dar Rapid Transit (DART) project.

Treasury permanent secretary Dr Natu El-Maamry Mwamba, deputy permanent secretary Amina Khamis Shaaban, PO-RALG deputy permanent secretary for infrastructure Rogatus Mativila, top officials of the Tanzania Railways Corporation (TRC), the Tanzania National Roads Agency (Tanroads), the Tanzania Rural and Urban Roads Agency (TARURA) and DART were also in attendance.

tors, including tourism, are well protected and also offers various tax incentives," he stated.


He affirmed that the government is determined to enhance infrastructure such as roads, electricity, water and airports to create an environment that fosters the growth of the tourism industry.

# Traffic police gets set for digitalised vehicle inspections

DIGITAL vehicle inspection is soon taking off, traffic police commander DCP Ramadhan Ng'anzi has de-

Addressing police officers at a road safety training here yesterday, he said that modern cars have digital equipment and the police must keep pace with the

That is vital to actually ensure that vehicles, especially passenger carriers, are regularly examined to be allowed on the roads, he said, to an audience of vehicle inspectors and heads of traffic units from various regions.

They were being exposed to tailor-made auxiliary road safety training organized by the Arusha Technical College (ATC), the only vocational training institution to operate a computerised vehicle diagnosis laboratory.

ATC specialises in mechanical training, with a vehicle repairing workshops and a driving school. It is seen to far ahead in this field, focusing on the future of motoring, which has inspired the traffic police department to emulate this innovation, the commander maintained.

He was persuaded that the days of relying on the naked eye to determine vehicle roadworthiness are over, thus digital scanning and quick analysis of data on computers, the current advanced technology in automobile inspection must be taken up.

Prof. Musa Chacha, the ATC principal, said their studies assert that more than 70 percent of road accidents countrywide are caused by drivers, asserting that the reason is that most drivers are ignorant of vehicle mechanisms.

"Some drivers do not take warning lights seriously nor recognise abnormal cautioning lights or seek periodic inspections and maintenance of their vehicles," he

David Mtunguja, the vehicle department head, said the training covered topics like automobile maintenance, modern driving skills and the provision of first aid and rescue services for passenger vehicles.

The college provides specialised traffic training courses including VIP chauffeuring, tour vehicles driving, handling dignitary vehicles, he said, hinting that the college will soon launch an international driving skills

DCP Fresser Kashai, the traffic police supervisor, in his remarks, said the digital adaptation programme boils down to reinforcing safety on national roads, reducing incidents of motor vehicle accidents countrywide.

SOUTH Africa's unemployment rate, already the highest in the world, rose to 32.1% in the fourth quarter of 2023, according to official government figures released on Tuesday.

The date of this year's election has not yet been announced. It's expected to take place between May and August.

### KenGen set for drilling of geothermal wells in **Tanzania**

KENYAN-LISTED electricity generating company KenGen will soon sign a contract to drill three exploratory wells in Tanzania, as the country seeks to plug into geothermal energy. KenGen Managing Director and Chief Executive Peter Njenga said within the next

one month, the company should have kicked off operations in Tanzania, a move aimed at cementing its revenue diversification through venturing into markets outside Kenya. KenGen started drilling its first well in

Djibouti in November 2021 following the securing of a (\$4.9 million) contract in February that year. In the same year, the Kenyan firm bagged contracts for the drilling of wells and consultancy in Ethiopia.

One of the things we are doing is aggressive diversification in looking at outward markets. We are in Ethiopia; we are in Djibouti.

Malawi has visited us and they are interested n us helping them explore their geothermal. We also have Tanzania, Zambia and Rwanda.

Tanzania is now exploring its geothermal capacity and it is a small project which we intend to be done within three months," Njenga told the media.

Njenga said the regional foray is expected to bolster the company's performance with the target of closing the full year ending June 2024 (\$55.2 million) in net earnings, a 59.5 percent increase from the Ksh5 billion (\$34.5 million) reported at the close of June 2023.

"What we are looking at is to make sure that we increase our profits. Looking at our asset base which is at around (\$3.5 billion), we expect actually to be making well above Ksh10 billion (\$69 million) as profit every year," Njenga said.

# Conference tourism experts asked to bring more meetings

THE government has asked the African Society of Association Executives (AFSAE) -Tanzania chapter to help boost conference tourism by attracting more regional and international meetings.

Amb. Mindi Kasiga, director of government communication unit in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and East African Cooperation made the request in Dar es Salaam yesterday while opening a two-day second Tanzania Association Training

She said the workshop organized in collaboration between Arusha International Conference Centre (AICC) and the Julius Nyerere International Convention Centre (JNICC) aimed at building capacity to participants on conference tourism.

She said the workshop also aimed

at giving participants skills on how to network at local, regional and internationally levels and how to manage the associations.

Kasiga said that conference tourism is part of diplomacy tourism that the government has already embarked on promoting as a source of revenue.

She said that conference tourism has countless benefits, adding that unlike traditional holiday tourism, it is not seasonal.

She said people travel for work both in summer and winter alike which creates a market that revolves around trade fairs and conferences.

"We as custodian of economic diplomacy, we call on AFSAE to ensure whatever success comes, including preparing for the international conferences, has to come in Tanzania first," she said.

Jeffers Miruka, AFSAE founder and president said the aim of the workshop was to build capacity of members to ensure that more international conferences take place in the country.

Miruka said without knowledge, it will not be easy for them to accomplish the task of attracting conferences because it is all about compe-

He said members must know how to bid and lobby against the giants and well-experienced chapters.

He said similar workshops had been conducted in Rwanda, Uganda, Kenya and South Africa, adding that it was a new emerging business in Africa.

"We must ensure our executives are well prepared on what they do and ensure that the agenda is well known and they get prepared for

it," he said.

### **Initiative worth 11bn/- targeting** coffee farmers, artisanal miners

LEAST 101,500 smallholder coffee farmers and 18,000 artisan and small-scale gold miners in the country are set to benefit from a capacity building programme worth 11bn/- launched here yesterday.

The Pathways to Prosperity Coffee Programme is a seven-year (2023-2029) project that intends to reach 101,500 small holder coffee farmers, 30 percent women and 10 percent youth in Mbeya, Songwe and Ruvuma Re-

It is implemented by Solidaridad, an international network organization working in Tanzania.

The programme aims at building capacity of smallholder coffee farmers to have an opportunity to participate in economically viable value chains by increasing their productivity through the adoption of good agricultural practices for increased income.

It aims to help farmers produce high quality coffee, strengthen the leadership and governance of 50 cooperatives as well as 200 others indirectly and provide a platform for cooperatives to link and interact with 500 service providers to establish long term relations.

Speaking during the launch of the programme, managing director of Solidaridad East and Central Africa Rachel Wanyoike said that some of the expected outcomes in 2029 include viable and resilient production systems through diversification and capacity enhancement.

"The programme will be focused on ensuring smallholder farmers have a strengthened capacity to increase their coffee productivity, quality and increase their resilience to climate change" she said.

She added that the programme will also ensure inclusive service delivery with sustainable access to relevant technology, inputs, production and services tailored to the needs of farmers, miners, processors and agrientrepreneurs.

Survey: Journalists still face challenges despite reforms

These were the Union of Tanzania Press Clubs, Tanzania Media Women's Association, Media Institute of Southern Africa-Tanzania and Jamii Forums. According to the study, jour-

nalists' experiences of risk are widespread and when interviewed half of them confirmed to researchers that they had been threatened, harassed or assaulted and sometimes detailed by the law enforcers on orders of high authorities.

Similar number of women journalists who were interviewed said that "they are not always treated fairly compared to their male counterparts and had experienced sexual harassment or abuse and had working equipment or materials seized from them."


Other findings are related to personal gains for journalists in Tanzania which is seen to be alarming as most have less permanent forms of employment, hence do not receive employment benefits such as insurance and paid leave.

Two out of 10 who were interviewed described their employment status as permanent compared to six out of 10 who said it's temporary while others said it was occasional, an aspect that is hard to make a decent living from journalism profession.

According to the researchers, some members of the press have gone as far as persuading their children not to join the profession, knowing well that it has a dark future.

In recent years, Tanzanian media landscape has witnessed some challenges, including mysterious disappearance of Azory Gwanda, a journalist who worked for Mwananchi Communications Limited who went missing from his work station in Rufiji District, Coast Region in mid-2016 and his whereabouts is still unknown.

Russia shipped 50,000 tonnes each to Somalia and the Central African Republic and 25,000 tonnes each to Mali, Burkina Faso, Zimbabwe and Eritrea, Agriculture Minister Dmitry Patrushev told Putin during a meeting, according to tran-

Putin had promised to deliver free grain to the six countries at a summit with African leaders in July, soon after Moscow withdrew from a deal that had allowed Ukraine to ship grain from its Black Sea ports despite the war Russia has been wag-

The deal, known as the Black Sea grain initiative, had helped lower prices on the global market. But Putin argued it was failing to get supplies to the countries in most urgent

we have been maintaining relations (with African countries and building cooperation," Patrushev told Putin. "As a result, we were able to deliver this volume of wheat to these countries quite quickly."

He also told Putin that Russia expects to export up to 70 million metric tonnes of grain in the 2023-2024 agricultural year. In the previous season, Russia shipped 66 million tonnes worth almost \$16.5 billion, he added.

DROUGHTS have the potential to increase the spread of HIV for women living in rural parts of Africa, researchers at the University of Bristol have ber of people living with

In the study, published yesterday in AIDS and Behaviour, findings imply that drought triggers behavioural changes as people struggle to battle poverty and food insecurity through activities such as transactional sex.

Due to climate change, droughts are likely to become increasingly common in the future, which could lead to higher instances of HIV transmission. Sub-Saharan Africa will be one of the regions most affected by climate change, with increasing risks of drought caused by changes in precipitation and limited water storage, as well as limited capacity and resources to support adaptation.

Drought is an ongoing and worsening trend in sub-Saharan Africa, with the percentage of land experiencing severe drought increasing from around 5 percent to 15 percent since 1901.

Lead author Dr Adam Trickey, based at Bristol Medical School explained that: "Women in rural areas of sub-Saharan Africa who had recently been exposed to drought were more likely to acquire HIV than those who had not been exposed to drought.

"That we found this among women in rural areas, but not women in urban areas or men in either rural or urban areas corroborates previous studies indicating that the mechanism through which drought may in-

crease HIV risk is that drought pushes women who rely on farming for their livelihoods into sex work for money or food.

### NIMR to conduct NCDs research via mobile phones

### By Carlos Banda

THE National Institute for Medical Research (NIMR) is set to start collecting data this week by using mobile phones in its study on Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs).

The mobile phone methodology has been settled on so as to reach more people and reduce the cost incurred in traditional studies that involve physical contact with respondents.

Dr Mary Mayige, senior researcher and director of research information at NIMR said this in Dar es Salaam on Monday during a press conference where she noted that with the rapid increase in population, physical collection of data from households has proven to be expensive.

"As we focus on studying the state, trends and symptoms of NCDs in the country, we will conduct this research using mobile phones because it is an effective method for conducting these types of studies from time to time and acquire the information we need," she said.

Dr Mayige said that a team of researchers will establish a population sample of the contact numbers for respondents who had given their consent to participate in future research studies during the Housing and Population Census 2022, stating that security measures against scammers have been taken.

The researcher said that the approach has also considered individuals without smart devices,

saying that such group of respondents will be able to respond via text messages unlike their counterparts with smartphones who can respond using social media platforms.

Prof Said Aboud, director general of NIMR, said the NCDs have been on the rise and posing a major challenge to the country.

"According to the World Health Organization (WHO), the rise in NCDs has doubled from 19 percent in 1990 to 34 percent in 2015 and is estimated to contribute to 33 percent of all deaths," he said.

Statistical data collected from hospitals have shown a large increase in NCD patients between July 2022 and July 2023 whereas the most prevalent diseases are high blood pressure which stands at 49 percent compared to 34 percent recorded in 2021/22, diabetes at 24 percent and respiratory diseases at 13 percent compared to 10 percent recorded in 2021/22 respectively."

This situation is a reminder that we need to place effective strategies to curb this challenge. Having accurate information on the diseases and their symptoms is a crucial aspect that will enable the government to strategize and measure the progress of interventions taken to combat these diseases."

Prof Aboud said NIMR has been conducting strategic researches on behalf of the Ministry of Health, noting that recently they conducted a survey for 2023/24 and that a preliminary report will be released soon.

### Journos drilled on human-wildlife reporting

A TOTAL of 25 journalists are from today undergoing a two-day training to enable them adequately report on the magnitude of Humans-Wildlife Conflicts (HWC) and available mitigation measures.

Participants are expected to increase awareness of local communities on HWC issues in the Ruvuma landscape as well as to increase their access to accurate data and information on biodiversity conservation.

John Chikomo, executive director of Journalists' Environmental Association of Tanzania (JET) told The Guardian this week that the training has been organized by the association with the support from the Mitigation of Human Wildlife Conflicts in Tanzania project implemented by German Development Agency (GIZ) on behalf of the Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ).

"We expect journalists to accurately report on HWC with special focus on reducing HWC impacts on the livelihoods and security of women in the Ruvuma landscape. They are expected to promote community awareness and effective participation in conservation issues," he said, adding, the training is

scheduled for today and tomorrow in Bagamoyo District, Coast Region.

He said the training is conducted as part of a project to ensure continuity, networking and sustained engagement with topical issues in corridors such as human wildlife crimes, community empowerment, climate change, gender aspects in relation to HWC, multimedia storytelling and reporting on biodiversity conservation.

"JET trains journalists on subjects and issues that resulted from previous engagements and trainings. The dynamics of conservation of biodiversity increasingly bring out additional issues related to climate

change impact and adaptation, social behaviour patterns and development activities," he said.

Journalists will also learn the concepts of resilience and ecosystembased adaptation and how they are related to habitat connectivity at wider landscape scales."

Topics to be covered include HWC causes and mitigation strategies, essential considerations for managing HWC and coexistence, role of Tanzania Wildlife Authority (TAWA) in combating HWC, gender aspects in relation to HWC, practical approaches to producing impactful HWC stories as well as the power of storytelling on HWC.

### Stop hiding children with cleft lip at home, parents told

PARENTS have been urged not to hide children with cleft lip and palates but instead take them to hospital as the medical treatment to reverse the condition is safe and free of charge.

A section of surgeons, anaesthesia providers and nurses made the call in Dar es Salaam early this week at a workshop aimed at sharing educational experience in order to enhance operating room safety and improve cleft surgical services in the country.

The workshop was part of the Smile Train and safe surgery Lifebox initiative to improve surgery and anaesthesia safety for paediatric patients undergoing cleft surgerion

Dr Edward Wayi, a plastic surgeon at CCBRT Hospital, said many children with cleft and palate lip deformities are left home with no help as parent fear effects of the surger-

He said that in Tanzania, approximately 2,500 children are born with

cleft deformities annually and fortunately, most cleft deformities can be fixed with a simple surgery.

"We encourage parents to bring children to hospital as the surgeries are safe and completely bring smiles on children," he said.

He said since the surgeries are

He said since the surgeries are ideally performed within the first 18 months of a child's life, early identification and intervention is essential for good outcomes.

According to him, a cleft lip affects usually the upper part of the lip where there is a physical split of the lip, while a cleft palate is when there is a split of opening in the roof of the mouth and can affect both males and females.

The expert emphasised the importance of collaborative efforts in ensuring successful surgeries and post- operation care for patients with cleft conditions.

Dr Peter Saria, an anaesthesiologist and trainer at the workshop, said the aim of bringing together the professionals in the workshop was to provide them with non-technical skills and awareness to ensure they

speak the same language, have unity, and have the ability to connect when performing surgeries.

"Ensuring there is teamwork, and we believe that collaboration of professionals in the operating room helps improve the outcome both during and after the procedure," he

Dr Athanase Masele, dentist and cleft surgeon at Dodoma Regional Referral Hospital, said the problem of cleft lip is currently big because the services are not provided on a large scale.

"This issue involves stigma and that is why parents hide their children, especially in rural areas. But there is also a rise in awareness as many stakeholders continue to fund surgeries, education and awareness campaigns targeting rural areas," he said.

Belinda Karimi, Lifebox nurse fellow, said all patients deserve safe surgeries and that it is important for the team in the theatre room to closely collaborate to deliver cleft surgery and care as well as post-operation recovery.

### **Zimbabwe starts** emergency polio vaccination drive

### **HARARE**

ZIMBABWE has begun an emergency campaign to inoculate more than 4 million children against polio.

This came after health authorities detected three cases caused by the rare mutation of the weakened virus used in oral vaccines, including a 10-year-old girl who was paralyzed last month.

The health ministry said laboratory tests from samples collected from sewage sites in several areas of the capital, Harare, late last year, showed the presence of a mutated polio virus that originated in an oral vaccine used in the global eradication effort.

In rare instances, the live polio virus in vaccines can mutate into a form capable of sparking new outbreaks, especially in places with poor sanitation and low vaccination levels.

The number of polio cases globally has dropped by more than 99 percent since the global effort to wipe out the disease led by the World Health Organization and others began in 1988. But the majority of children being paralyzed by polio these days are being crippled by a virus that was originally linked to a vaccine.

Vaccination teams in Zimbabwe are moving from house to house to deliver more doses to protect children, while others will be stationed at health facilities, authorities said.

Officials said it was the first time Zimbabwe would be using a new oral polio vaccine specifically de-

signed to reduce the risk of the virus within it mutating into a dangerous form.

Zimbabwe aims to roll out more than 10 million new vaccine doses targeting just over 4 million children below the age of 10 in two rounds in February and March. More than 95 percent of that population needs to be immunized against polio to stop new outbreaks.

Last year, the wild poliovirus caused a dozen cases in Afghanistan and Pakistan, the only countries that still have that virus. In comparison, polioviruses linked to the vaccine caused more than 500 cases in nearly two dozen countries globally, mostly in Africa.

Zimbabwe last reported a wild poliovirus case in 1986, according to the United Nations children's Agency.

Zimbabwe Health Minister Douglas Mombeshora called the new detection of polio "a serious concern" but said they were prepared to respond swiftly. The health ministry said it was collaborating with health authorities in at least five other African countries that had recently detected polioviruses through environmental sampling and routine surveillance.

Polio can cause total paralysis, and children under 5 are especially vulnerable. It is transmitted from person to person, mainly through contact with contaminated feces, water or food, as well as through droplets from a sneeze or cough of an infected person.

### Three die of cholera, four hospitalised in Singida

AT least three people were confirmed to have died of cholera and four others hospitalised in Ikungi District, Singida Region.

Ikungi District Commissioner Thomas Apson said this yesterday, explaining that Kikio Ward is the hardest hit area.

He said the disease outbreak was discovered in the region last week and the government has taken steps to control it so that it does not spread to other areas.

The DC said immediately after the outbreak, the government sent health workers to the affected area to work 24 hours to treat patients and quarantine was set up.

Apson said that preliminary investigation conducted by health experts revealed that the source of the disease was consumption of

unsafe water. "The government sent medical equipment and medicines to the

affected areas and I have directed

to call public meetings to educate people on how they can protect themselves against cholera," he

The DC asked residents to take precautions by boiling drinking water, washing hands thoroughly with soap, washing fruits before eating as well as avoiding unnecessary gatherings.

### BRI driveing strong Africa-China relations, expert says

### Public institutions' cooking energy shift quite pragmatic OME fruit is being reaped even decomposed plants or dung

OME fruit is being reaped from the government's directive to public institutions feeding not fewer than 100 people per day to abandon charcoal or firewood, with those targeted indeed increasingly heeding the call to turn to what is described as clean cooking energy.

The Environment portfolio holder in the Cabinet has lately been giving a briefing on the level of alternative energy uptake and its character, and it is quite clear that clean energy in the sense of natural gas remains far from adequately popularised. Most of those shifting are making an effort to use improved wood-based modes.

A Vice President's Office (VPO) write-up on the remarks the minister made at a recent press briefing shows that institutions under the Education, Science and Technology ministry lead the way, having dropped charcoal use by up to 85 per cent by the end of last month.

Rapidly, 30 out of 35 teacher training colleges had made the shift alongside 51 out of 54 folk development colleges, and eight out of 36 centres run by the Vocational Education and Training Authority (VETA). Other categories of institutions, among them schools, had much fewer numbers in comparison

For one thing, the shift is less to cleaner energy than to affordable alternatives which don't require that forest patches be cleared on a regular basis for charcoal to be plentiful.

This kind of uptake is a sort of wake-up call for the Energy ministry in particular to liaise with the Minerals one on the need to expedite the availability of wood-based briquettes.

These can also be produced from various combustible materials, especially crop waste, saw dust and

It is noteworthy that it is public institutions opting for usable softer version of firewood where the felling of trees for charcoal is eliminated.

Here there is a distinct idea of what 'alternative energy' ought to imply, and where public efforts ought to be directed.

The public wants a massive supply of cheap briquettes, while policy advisers want clean energy - and they are appealing to the public to go for gas.

This is clearly in the view that the

This is clearly in the view that the shift is feasible and straightforward, just a matter of awareness, etc. The cost margin is largely ignored for a strident emphasis on clean energy.

Experience up to late January on how the government directive is being taken up shows the pace as fairly slow, even bordering reluctance.

However, the scenario is much brighter in a number of areas, including in vocational training centres, police training colleges and a good number of boarding schools.

Just a few have picked natural gas as their proper alternative. Others are making frantic efforts to find options that will not cause cost headaches in future. There was a missing link, though, and it was in using biomass directly for usable electricity - this chiefly owing to regulatory constraints.

The other lesson is that chances of a wide-ranging shift to natural gas are limited if public institutions systematically hesitate to move in that direction, and energy policy makers cling to expectations that by 2032 most households will have shifted to natural gas.





## Charting the course for transformation: Will small island 'digital' states cope?

### Brela training on company law provisions of great use

EARING about training on company ownership laws primarily meant to keep the relevant authorities abreast with new changes so that innocent people are not punished is highly inspiring.

One ought to be familiar with matters at hand and even figure out what is being talked about as it covers two or three steps taken up in one breath particularly when involving controversies.

The Business Registrations and Licensing Agency (BRELA) would then presumably take the position that the law was insufficient in that regard because there are stakeholders losing out or otherwise being

Even without some awareness of what is at stake and taking up the issue purely at the level of company or business registration and licensing, various issues crop up.

The second aspect is the method, where BRELA comes up with training sessions first held in Mbeya Region, bringing together legal officers, magistrates, police and immigration officers and significantly, even the anti-corruption bureau.

The idea was make all concerned get familiar with the changes. Of course, that isn't what is commonly known of legal procedure, where a court judgment serves as a precedent as to how far subsidiary ownership rights or entitlements can be recognised, on case by case basis.

When the keeper of the seals used in company registration goes on an educational drive on such issues, the clear implication is that the office is removing what in law is known as benefit of doubt -where

those auxiliary claimants have to prove their entitlement beyond reasonable doubt.

Without undue prejudice as to the substance of the BRELA campaign, it would appear that the issues relate less to business registration but succession -for instance, when a business owner dies, a company fails or the relevant shareholders disagree and split up.

There are issues that belong to the Registration Insolvency and Trusteeship Agency (RITA) and are not embedded with company registration.

The law on companies is one of the most longstanding pieces of legislation we have, as for decades we retained the Companies Ordinance, implying that it was put to the Legislative Council (before independence) when efforts were being made to convert UK law into Tanganyika legislation.

It became the Companies Act in 2002, or slightly earlier, with some amendments on the duties of company directors, etc.

That can still be problematic given the nature of the operations of state-run firms like Air Tanzania Company Limited (ATCL) and the Tanzania Electric Supply Company Limited (Tanesco).

That is why one would be excused to have reservations when top BRELA officials discuss changes in company ownership law which now recognises stakeholders not recognised by previous law.

The agency says that under the previous law, beneficiaries were not recognised in registration documents and thus used to find themselves in trouble whenever the issue came up.

# Techniques to expedite transfer of knowledge to young learners

complex process which demands a lot of efforts before a certain skill is acquired. Teachers find themselves in a pressure to enable learners attain the expected competence. All blames are thrown to teachers when something is not proper with learners.

To ensure effective transfer of knowledge, many aspects are considered including handwriting, organization of work, ability to reason and others.

Younger learners are different from older learners as they are not capable of self-leadership. They need to be directed in all ways of academic life. They are still enjoying comfortability from parents and guardians.

Everything is ready for them. They just consume. They don't think of any future challenges as they are not capable of thinking from a broader perspective. Young learners are less afraid of doing mistakes; they are not frightened so

EARNING is a much when criticized.

Taking into account all the features of a younger learner it becomes necessary for teachers to be creative to be able to impart a certain skills and knowledge at a time. Teachers need to be motivational but also entertaining to capture the attention of learners. Teachers should not force learners to learn but rather convincing them to do so.

Sometimes the pressure from parents who are highly educated or with little understanding may derail the teacher from the path they have created to make learners fulfil the intended objectives. Some parents forget that learning is a gradual

They do not take into account the differences in terms of complexity of lessons when learners move from one class to another. As they are not well exposed to learning parameters and patterns, they use past results to determine the present results.



cessful they need to know how to handle pressure from parents and move on strongly with the business of shaping learners into important individuals in the future. Teachers need to identify basic skills to be mastered by younger learners and design a plan to impart them into minds of those learners through

Teachers may select a certain skill for a certain topic. This enables them at the end of the topic to make evaluation and see how much they have succeeded. When you are evaluating a single skill it becomes easy to come up with reliable For teachers to be suc- findings. If teachers are seri-

ous in imparting a particular skill to a certain topic at the end of the year they will have accomplished the objectives which they wanted the learner to attain.

When teachers do revision it is an opportunity for learners to apply some skills in the topics which they did not apply previously.

The following are the skills which teachers should struggle to impart into the minds of younger learners to make them successful in their academic pursuits.

One of the skills is reading and writing. The very basic skill when it comes to schooling is the ability to read and write. While a teacher is teaching some 

concepts or perspectives at the same time he may find that most of the learners are still struggling in reading and writing.

If the learner cannot read and write the learning is already impeded. Therefore the teacher needs to spare time teaching younger learners on how to read and write while at the same time teaching the syllabus contents to make their business successful.

Another important skill is organization of work. It is hard to tell someone that a person is learning if the organization of their work is poor. Good organization of work motivates someone to accept that a per-

son is learning. Therefore and it can be discouraged by the teacher needs to utilize some of their time directing younger learners how to organize their work. Organization of work reflects intellectual capacity of an individual hence it should be taken with much emphasis enabling individuals organize their work in a manner that is understandable.

Also younger learners should be taught how to find solutions for challenges. Instead of the teacher everyday providing an exercise and come to mark later, they may decide to provide an exercise which will be open and done during the lesson time. Demanding learners to find solutions for questions during the lesson time creates a sense of responsibility and make learners to depend on themselves when finding solutions. According to a comprehensive new analysis released by the Global Nutrition Cluster, the on-going conflict in the Gaza Strip enters its 20th week, food and safe water have become incredibly scarce and diseases are rife, compromising women and children's nutrition and immunity and resulting in a surge of acute malnutrition.

The report 'Nutrition Vulner-Gaza' - finds that the situation is particularly extreme in the Northern Gaza Strip, which has been almost completely cut off

Inadequate safe drinking water, as well as insufficient water for cooking and hygiene purposes, are compounding poor nutrition.

On average, households surveyed had access to less than one litre of safe water per person per day.

According to humanitarian standards, the minimum amount of safe water needed in an emergency is 3 litres per person per day, while the overall standard is 15 litres per person, which includes sufficient quantities for drinking, washing and cooking.

Without more humanitarian assistance, the nutritional situation is likely to continue to deteriorate rapidly and at scale across the Gaza Strip. With the majority of health, water and sanitation services severely degraded, it is essential that those that remain functional are protected and reinforced to stem the spread of diseases and stop malnutrition from worsening.

### Snowless winter and climate crisis: Kashmir's 'unprecedented' weather

BDUL Gani Malik, a 75-year-old goldsmith living in Kashmir's capi-⊾tal, Srinagar, has witnessed eras of tranquillity and turbulence in the Himalayan region.

What he has not seen, however, is a snowless Kashmir during the

Malik still works at his shop, located in one of the jam-packed markets of the old city area of Kashmir's capital, intricately lacing colourful emeralds on dazzling gold necklaces.

While conversing with IPS, he mentions that the winter in Kashmir has never been so terrible and terrifying as it has been this year.

He recalls how, during the 40day harshest winter period from December 21 to January 30, snow would accumulate to about six or seven feet, freezing and making pathways treacherous even for city dwellers.

In the mountainous region, according to Malik, the snow would

### Threat to agriculture

In Kashmir, 60 percent of the state's revenue comes from agriculture and horticulture, and about 80 percent of the population lives in rural areas.

However, over the years, the valley has experienced irregular patterns of precipitation. In the first five months of 2022, Kashmir saw a 38 percent rain shortage, according to data provided by the Meteorological Department (MeT) in Srinagar.

The data reveals that the Kashmir Valley has experienced a significant lack of premonsoon precipitation over the years. From March 1 to May "The temperatures during ported a 79 percent precipita- 31, 2022, the region got 99.5 mm of rain, 70 percent lower than av-

Comparatively, between March and May of each of the following years-2017, 2018, 2019, 2020, and 2021-there was a deficit of 16, 28, 35, and 26 percent, respectively. The dry winter this year is already throwing life out of gear for the farmers.

Abdul Karim Ganaie, a farmer hailing from south Kashmir's Pulwama, says the threats are menacingly looming large, and people cannot do anything other than watch helplessly as the crisis un-

When IPS contacted Choudhary Mohammad Iqbal, the director of agriculture in Kashmir, he stated that the department was closely monitoring the situation and would be issuing a warning to the farmers in the coming months.

"We accept that the situation is going to prove worrisome for Kashmir's farming community, but we have to adopt a strategy to ensure minimal losses. We are working on that front," Choudhary said.

### **Tourism under cloud**

The famous tourist destinations in Kashmir are also witnessing a dip in tourist arrivals, putting the people associated with this business in dire straits. In January, the famous tourist resorts recorded the lowest arrival of foreign and domestic tourists, with only 30 percent occupancy in hotels.

It snows at last but too little, too

Finally, in the first week of February, when the harshest 40-daylong spell was already over, it snowed in most of the areas of Kashmir. However, according to experts, the snow would yield the fewest results as it is not possible to accumulate for an extended period.

What is important, says Mehraj Ahmad, a research scholar working on climate change in Kashmir, is that the snow must accumulate in the higher reaches for as long as possible until the arrival of sum-

"The snowfall of February or March carries the least significance when compared with the snowfall of January. Therefore, we really are keeping our fingers crossed and praying for the safeguard of our lives against the dark, dreadful effects of climate change," Ahmad said.

MEDICAL experts and women's rights activists are pinning hopes on the establishment of an anti-rape crisis center for the provision of medical and legal aid to victims of sexual assaults in a timely manner will ensure convictions.

Currently, it takes years to bring the perpetrators of rape to justice due to a lack of evidence and more often than not, the accused get acquitted.

"In most of the cases, the evidence in sexual assault cases is lost because people wash the victims' genital areas from where samples are taken for semen analysis to trace the real culprit. Subsequently, the accused are acquitted by courts," Prof. Hakim Khan Afridi, head of the Forensic Sciences Department at the Khyber Medical College, said.

Afridi added that it was also important to preserve the survivor's clothes to ensure that the perpetrators of rape and sodomy are brought to justice.

Advocate Mehwish Muhib Kakakhel said the accused are often acquitted due to reasons such as faulty first information reports (FIRs), insufficient evidence, credibility issues with witnesses, problems in the investigation process, absence of forensic labs and crisis centers in provinces and cities, legal procedural errors, compromises or settlements outside the legal system, potential pressure or threats, societal and cultural factors influencing perceptions, effective legal defences creating reasonable doubt, among oth-

Kakakhel, who supports rape survivors with legal resources, said that ongoing efforts aim to streamline legal processes, but reforms, improved investigations, and increased awareness are crucial for minimizing delays within Pakistan's legal framework.

However, lawyer Muhammad Ismail is hopeful that things will get better with the setting up of the first-

(ARCC) at the Pakistan Institute of Medical Sciences (PIMS) in Islamabad, which will help the survivors.

Earlier in January, Pakistan, in collaboration with the UK government and UNFPA, set up the ARCC to extend the expeditious and effective redressal mechanism for survivors of sexual violence. It seeks to provide well-rounded medical, legal, and social services to survivors of sexual and gender-

Ismail says it is a big development towards ensuring safety, protection, and bringing to justice those committing sexual assault.

"It will help the victims' medically as well as legally. Samples for semen analysis and the provision of legal assistance will be done on time and enough evidence will lead to convictions," he says.

Addressing the inaugural ceremony, the UK's High Commissioner, Jane Marriott, said that the crisis cell was a significant milestone in addressing gender-based violence in Pakistan.

"This new facility will ensure that gender-based violence survivors are provided with quicker response services under one roof. The UK is proud to partner with Pakistan in advancing such important innovations for tackling violence," Marriott

The United Nations Population Fund Representative,

Dr. Luay Shabaneh, said, "Rape is an ugly crime that causes lifelong pain and psychological trauma to those who face it. By all means, rape is a crisis that needs a collective response. We should start with prevention and awareness raising but also ensure a comprehensive response to help those in need.

Women-rights campaigners appreciate the center,

An eight-year-old girl was allegedly raped by a 45-yearold man in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, one of the four provinces in Pakistan but the culprit is scot-free because of a lack of evidence, Bibi Nusrat, a women's rights activist, told IPS.

"Initially, the accused confessed to police but in court, he denied any wrongdoing because the sample had been collected from the victim in an incorrect way. She has taken a bath soon after being raped," she said.

The ARCC is a blessing for the people who faced issues in assessing justice.

Dr. Muhammad Jawad at PIMS, where the ARCC is located, says they are establishing branches throughout the country.

"The victims would contact the centre in their respective provinces, where their medical examinations and tests would be done free of charge," he says. The rape victims would also get free legal assistance because, in most cases, the hiring of lawyers is a big issue due to a lack of money.

### Veggie centre in new project to counter effects of aflatoxin in vegetable sector

THE Arusha-based world vegetable centre (Worldveg) has embarked on a crucial project meant to overcome aflatoxin cases in the vegetable sub-sector, especially in the vegetable drying, and other value addition sides.

Tanzania stands among countries which continue to battle against aflatoxin in crops produced and foods, the challenge which apart from affecting the agricultural sector, poses a major health risk to human beings.

Aflatoxins are a family of toxins produced by certain fungi that are found on agricultural crops such as maize (corn), peanuts, cottonseed, and tree nuts. The main fungi that produce aflatoxins are Aspergillus flavus and aspergillus parasiticus, which are abundant in warm and humid regions of the world.

In Tanzania, aflatoxin contamination cases have widely been reported to appear in some few common crops, including maize and groundnuts, resulting most of the relevant research being concentrated on the said prone crops.

But recently, the agricultural experts at the Worldveg have seen the need to launch a key initiative to help counter aflatoxin cases towards the vegetable sub-sector, after realizing the possibility of contamination of the disease in vegetables, the common and popular human consumed food.

Dr Simon Boniface, an Entomologist and Laboratory Manager yesterday told The Guardian during an interview that the ongoing research was being executed in cooperation with the International Institute of Tropical Agriculture (IITA).

"In Tanzania, very little research has been conducted to establish the vegetable varieties that are subjected to aflatoxin, but some Aflasafe, which has so far won the reports have suggested there are Best Innovative Research Projsome vegetables and spices that are prone to aflatoxin, and thus we have decided to venture into the relevant research," he unveiled.

He informed that apart from touching the farmers, the ongoing intervention was majoring efforts to empower the vegetable dealers, those engaging into value addition.

"The vision behind the initiative is to impart the vegetable value addition stakeholders with vital knowledge on how to mitigate the possibility of aflatoxin contamination in their products," he observed.

For instance, Dr Simon expressed, processing of vegetables incorporates a range of activities, such as dying, processing, storing and packaging, saying all stages can open the door for aflatoxin contamination.

Together with that, the expert observed that since the aflatoxin fungus are living underground, within the plants as well as in the end produce, there's huge possibility for vegetable varieties to be contaminated, hence a need for specific research and solution.

Records show that more than half of Tanzanians live in rural areas and depend on subsistence agriculture for their livelihoods. However, these crops are highly susceptible to fungal infestation and aflatoxin contamination-the leading cause of liver disease and liver cancer in Tanzania-and reduces the country's export-earning potential.

To fight against fungal infestation and aflatoxin contamination, the Ministry of Agriculture has so far penned down three deals and two Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with different companies for the execution of the Tanzania Initiative for Preventing Aflatoxin Contamination (TA-NIPAC) project, worth US Dollars 35.3 million (about 81bn/-).

Together with that, several other efforts have been stepped up with other stakeholders in the private sector, international originations, to add muscles in the war against the dangerous fungus in

In the similar constructive role, the IITA has managed to develop aflatoxin biocontrol technology, ect at the World BioProtection Awards in 2022.

The dry spore innovation, one of the Institute's technologies for solving the problem of aflatoxin contamination in crops such as maize, soybean, and groundnut, won the award in a category shortlisting 38 finalists from 32 different organizations.

# AfDB: high cost of living in Africa could cause unrest

HE African Development Bank is warning that the rising cost of energy, food and other commodities in several African countries, including Angola, Ethiopia and Kenya, could trigger social unrest. Already, people in Africa's most populous country, Nigeria, have been marching to protest the high cost of living, prompting the government to release grain from the national

The African Development Bank's notice was contained in its biannual Africa Macroeconomic Performance outlook publication released last week.

The bank said in its 2024 forecast that energy and food price increases – along with a currency depreciation in Angola, Ethiopia, Kenya and Nigeria – could spark internal conflict, despite Africa showing overall economic growth.

The bank also said conflicts in eastern Europe and the Mid-

dle East could trigger supply chain disruptions, exacerbate inflation across the world, and make Africa's situation more precarious.

This, as protests over hunger and the cost of living grow in Nigeria.

### **Hundreds protest food** prices

On Monday, hundreds of people demonstrated southwestern Oyo state, asking authorities to take steps to bring down the cost of food or resign from office.

Security analyst Senator Iroegbu agrees with the African Development Bank's projections.

"It's obvious for even the blind to see that there will be social unrest because [of] the three basic needs of life, food, shelter and clothing. The most important is feeding," said Iroegbu. "Nobody can survive without food and that is the level Nigerians are heading to, so people are becoming restless. In fact, if one-tenth of

what happens in Nigeria happens in another place, there will be serious unrest but the elasticity of that is being test-

Bank said Africa has several rapidly growing economies, such as Ivory Coast, Libya, Niger, Rwanda and Senegal.

But the bank said performance varies from country to country depending on economic policies.

Nigerian President Bola Tinubu embarked on bold economic reforms including the scrapping of expensive fuel subsidies and floating of the country's currency, upon taking office last May.

While authorities say the policies are bound to pay off, the immediate shocks are having an impact on the economy.

Last week, Nigeria's inflation hit 29.9% – its highest mark since mid-1996. In response, authorities ordered the release of 102,00 metric tons of grain, including rice and maize, to lower food prices.

Government 'not sleeping,' says official

On Tuesday, Nigeria's chief of defense staff, Major General Christopher Musa, spoke to journalists in Abuja about the situation.

"The entire world is feeling the heat; it's not only peculiar to Nigeria," said Musa. "We've had a few riots here and there. Why I'm happy is that the government too is not sleeping, it's stepping up to ensuring that they address these challenges. You've seen that grains have been released, measures are being put in place to bring succor all over the country. The issue of dollar and exchange rate, everything is tied to it and that's why we're having these issues.'

The African Development Bank says economic growth in Africa is expected to average 3.8% and 4.2% in 2024 and 2025, respectively - higher than projected global averages in the same period. But protesters say unless they can afford food and life's basics, they will continue to march in the streets.

# In Brazil's soy belt, community seed banks offering hope for the Amazon

OT too long ago, the plot of land that Maria Ivonete de Souza inherited was barren, the soil hardened by years of cattle ranching. When the family had arrived to the Amazon from southern Brazil four decades earlier, her father had swiftly cleared the dense rainforest to make way for pasture.

"He razed it all by hand, with a saw and an ax," Souza said on the porch of her wooden farmhouse on the dusty outskirts of Colíder, some 393 miles (632 kilometers) north of Mato Grosso's state capital. "It's horrible to be talking about this. Because I'm recalling things that bother me deeply today.'

Now, decades later, Souza is fighting to turn back the clock on destruction in this region. In a bid to reforest, she has planted seeds from species that are native to the rainforest but have begun to vanish from here, as sov and corn production expand at a frenzied pace.

"If people knew how difficult it is to plant trees, they would never even dream of cutting them down," said Souza, who leads the community organization Coletivo Agúa Vida. "Here, we want to do things differently. We want to restore the forest to health."

A key part of this dream is building a community seed bank that can help rehabilitate the native vegetation and protect the biodiversity being wiped out by monoculture in Mato Grosso, Brazil's biggest producer of grains. Souza has helped organize events bringing together the region's subsistence farmers, Indigenous people and traditional communities, so they can swap seeds and know-how.

"It's so important for us to have these seeds," she said, waving to a cluster of mismatched canisters holding seeds in shades of brown, yellow and red. "And we have to share, so that this seed doesn't disappear.'

Local seed initiatives like these are gaining momentum across Brazil - and they are emerging as and more trees," she said. "Refora key tool for reforestation, as the estation is our only way out of country looks to make good on this."

Scientists also claim forest restoration through seeds can help recuperate some of the biodiversity that is being lost through deforestation. Unlike government seed banks, which store samples for historic preservation, community banks collect seeds, exchange varieties and ultimately plant a medley of them, in a bid to mimic the forest as closely as possible.

If applied on a large scale, reforestation through native seeds could play a crucial role in offsetting some of the destruction that has swept the Amazon in recent years, while also staving off a climate crisis that is already hitting local communities, according to Luciana Gatti, a senior researcher in climate change for the Brazilian National Institute for Space Research (INPE)

Since the early 1980s, the area occupied by agriculture and cattle in Brazil has jumped by 50%, according to a recent study by MapBiomas, a Brazilian environmental think tank. But scientists say this dizzying growth has come at a steep cost for the climate: repeated heat waves, erratic rain patterns and punishing droughts have become commonplace in the Amazon in recent years.

"The forest is like a rain factory," Gatti said. "It churns out water and it also cools temperatures. So it plays a big role in climate."

The impacts of climate change on the Amazon reached new proportions this year, as historic drought dried up important rivers, decimated subsistence crops, curbed hydropower supplies and shifts. Image by Ana Ionova for

The impact of monoculture is two-fold, she explained. On one hand, fewer trees mean the forest is able to recycle less water back into the atmosphere, resulting in reduced rainfall. The forest then grows drier, which diminishes its ability to regulate temperatures. (Researchers have linked temperature anomalies in the Brazilian Amazon and Cerrado to deforestation events up to 50 km away).

The ideal would be to reforest en masse and move towards an agroforestry model, where native species grow alongside other crops. "That way, you have agricultural production and, at the same time, you preserve trees that will help make rain and reduce temperatures," Gatti said.

The climate impacts of deforestation go far beyond Brazil too. Vapor from the Amazon rainforest canopy accounts for about a fifth of the oxygen released into the atmosphere each day. The rainforest is also both the world's biggest carbon sink and a huge source of potential emissions, holding an estimated 123 billion tons of carbon. When trees are cut down, the destruction deals a major blow to the global climate because more carbon dioxide is released and less is absorbed.

As a result, scientists insist that restoring native forests, in Brazil and elsewhere, represents one of the planet's best hopes for mitigating climate change, both locally and globally. And in the long-term, research suggests these restored forests in the Amazon can help regulate rainfall and prevent important rivers from drying out.

"The species that have the pow-

er to restore balance are the species native to that environment," Gatti said. "And the more they grow, the more water they will throw into the atmosphere."

Although the full scope of the Amazon's biodiversity is unknown, some studies estimate that it may hold between 15,000 and 50,000 species of flora. And research has suggested that climate change and forest destruction could lead to a 58% decline in tree diversity in the Amazon by

Community seed projects are working to combat this diversity loss by using a method called "muvuca," which relies on spreading a large and varied mixture of mostly native seeds across degraded areas, to assure a higher diversity of plants and trees.

"We try to truly imitate the forest as it is, sowing all the seeds at the same time," said Renato Nazário, a forest restoration technician at the Xingu Seed Network, a nonprofit providing support and training to about two dozen community seed initiatives in the Amazon. "And each one has a different role in the reforestation process.'

Typically, about a third of the seeds are rapidly-growing nonnative species, such as squash and jack beans, that act as "green fertilizers." This vegetation provides food and income for local communities, as well as safeguards against invasive plants, so that other native tree species like copaiba (genus Copaifera), cashew (Anacardium occidentale) and pequi (Caryocar brasiliense) can have a chance to mature. Some trees reach maturity in 20 years, while others take as long as 50 to grow to their full size.

"The more species the better," said Nazário, noting this method can yield between 5,000 and 12,000 species per hectare. "This shows it's possible, through ecological restoration, to recuperate the forest's biodiversity."

Over the last few decades, species that were once important medicines or staples in Indigenous diets, like certain types of maize, have vanished in some villages deep in the rainforest. Some trees which yielded seeds and fibers for traditional jewelry, headpieces or artisan wares have also become scarce, dealing a blow to cultural traditions.

### Role of biostimulants in bridging yield gaps and fostering farmers' resilience to climate

IN the wake of dire climate change effects globally and dwindled crop harvest leading to food insecurity, biostimulants application are now being considered as sustainable tool for plant production and a meaningful approach to plants nutrition boost thus reducing the gap between organic and conventional yields.

Cathy Liu, the Marketing Director at Wellyou Tech, a Chinesebased supplier of agricultural chemicals says plant biostimulant substances come from various natural sources such as plant extracts, hormones, seaweed and other organic materials best for crops yields enhancement.

"These substances contain compounds that activate or enhance certain physiological processes in plants, thereby increasing yield, quality and stress resistance thus helping in plant growth and development," said Liu in her LinkedIn published piece on Application of plant biostimulant in agriculture.

Types of plant biostimulants

Plant biostimulants encompass various categories, such as humic and fulvic acids, amino acids, seaweed extracts, and plant growth regulators like auxins, cytokinins, and gibberellins. Each category offers distinct advantages tailored to different crops and growth phases.

In addition, the increase of plant nutrient uptake has been often attributed to one or more of the following factors: an increase in soil enzymatic and microbial activities, modification of root architecture as well as an enhancement in mi-cronutrient mobility and solubility, according to the European Journal of Horticultural Science publication.

# Behavioural change vital for attaining cashless economy

ANY people do not believe that carrying cash for the purpose of making payments for goods and services is costly and risky.

Sometimes, many feel proud when carrying cash in hand, as they believe that it is a symbol of "wealth".

Data show that, despite ongoing campaigns to promote cashless economy over the period of time, each 100/spent by Tanzanians in paying goods and services, more than 88/- conducted through hard currency, while 12/- is paid digitally.

This behavior is continuing to disappoint the central bank, due to spending a lot of money that could either be spent in other uses; to print hard currencies time to time to replace the old notes and coins, because the changing hands do not consider proper handling.

Apart from the disappointment to the central bank, hard currencies handlers also sometimes face a lot of security risks including robbery incidents. It is believed that a cashless society could make the economy more efficient by reducing the need for cash handling and storage.

This could save businesses and individuals time and money.

Fabian Kasole, assistant manager, policy and licensing, department of oversight and policy, directorate of National Payment System, Bank of Tanzania (BoT), says despite of having plenty of digital payment channels, including mobile payment solutions, the majority of people still prefer paying in hard cash.

This is due to the fact that changing a behavior is no easy, as many still do not trust digital channels for their own

reasons. While the mobile payment

channel remains the most used in terms of volume of transactions in making payment, there has been a growing trend towards other channels such as point-of-sale (POS) machines and mobile banking.

The advantages of a cashless economy including less crime, less hassle for managing currency and easy finds transfer,

disadvantages of a cashless economy are less privacy, greater exposure to hacking, technological dependency, and more.

According to Kasole, the central bank introduced two payment systems for large (above 20mn/-) and small value (below 20mn/-), which facilitate digital real time payments transactions for institutions and individual respec-

tively.

The central bank is managing the Tanzania Instant Payment System (TIPS) a payment system that allows users to send and receive money in real time using their mobile phones or bank accounts.

### PMB tool for qualifying track records in IMF programmes reviewed

THE IMF Executive Board completed its review of the policy for Staff-Monitored Programs with Board Involvement (PMB), a vital tool helping member countries establish qualifying track records for IMF support programs.

This is according to IMF's press statement which was made to this paper yesterday, saying the board has also endorsed the proposal to keep the said tool in the Fund's toolkit with a subsequent review expected in three years.

In September 2022, the Executive Board amended the policy on Staff Monitored Programs (SMPs) to create PMBs, as with all SMPs, the objective of the PMB is to build or rebuild a track record of policy implementation towards an Upper Credit Tranche (UCT)quality Fund-supported program.

"The PMB is carefully circumscribed for member countries under either, an ongoing concerted international effort by creditors or donors to provide substantial new financing or debt relief in sup-

port of the member's policy program or significant outstanding credit under emergency financing (EF) instruments at the time of a new EF request," the statement reads in partly.

Adding: "It allows the Executive Board to opine, at the time of the PMB approval, on the robustness of the member's policies to meet the program's objectives and, in the context of reviews, on whether it agrees with staff that the member is on track to meet those objectives.

It was noted that the purpose of the review, as envisaged at the time of the inception of the instrument, was to determine whether the PMB remains a valuable addition to the Fund's toolkit.

"The PMB plays an important niche role in the toolkit supporting members in circumscribed circumstances," the statement affirms.

Since its inception, three members namely Malawi, Ukraine and South Sudan, have implemented PMBs.

Given the limited number of cases, further experience would be needed to draw

more definitive conclusions in terms of the usefulness of the PMB vis-à-vis alternative instruments and a more parsimonious Fund toolkit.

In this context, the Executive Board decided to keep the PMB in the Fund's toolkit. The instrument will be expected to be reviewed in three years.

IMF is of the view that the PMB can complement the Fund's toolkit in well-circum-

scribed circumstances, while noting that the limited number of cases thus far prevented drawing firm conclusions.

"They agreed that the Staff-Monitored Program (SMP) should continue to be the Fund's primary instrument to build or rebuild a track record of policy implementation toward a Fund arrangement that supports an Upper program," its reads.

According to the statement, directors acknowledged the potential benefits of limited Executive Board involvement through the PMB, including enhancing donor coordination, catalyzing additional financial support including in low-income, fragile, and conflict-affected countries, creating an additional safeguard in Credit Tranche (UCT)-quality cases of elevated emergency

financing exposure, reflecting the Board's views on policies at an earlier stage, and thereby facilitating the transition to UCT-quality programs. They positively noted the experiences of Ukraine and Malawi in this regard.

However, given the limited set of countries that have used the PMB, directors emphasized that it is too soon to accurately gauge the pros and cons of PMBs, and that further experience would be needed to draw more definitive conclusions on the usefulness of the PMB vis-à-vis alternative instruments. A few directors were skeptical about the merits of the PMB relative to the regular SMP.

Furthermore, the stamen has that directors stressed that access to the PMB should continue to be limited to the two use criteria to prevent encroachment on the use of SMPs. Where the PMB-use criteria are met, the PMB should continue to be encouraged, but the ultimate choice between a PMB or a regular SMP should remain voluntary and continue to rest with the requesting member.

Directors reiterated the importance of mitigating potential challenges associated with the implementation of PMB policy, particularly, potentially blurring the lines between Board endorsed programs and SMPs.

They also underscored the importance of mitigating these risks by maintaining effective communication regarding the nature and purpose of the PMB, and encouraged the next review to include an assessment of risks and challenges that may emerge with more experience with the PMB.

In order to avoid diluting the strength of the signaling effect of the Board endorsement of UCT-quality programs, it would be critical to communicate clearly that responsibility for PMBs rests with staff and management, and the Board has limited involvement and does not endorse a PMB.

The board agreed to have the review in three years once more experience is gained, while a number of Directors were open to an earlier review if warranted.



At Bulyanhulu, he said, there are near-surface opportunities with the potential for increasing production and mining flexibil-

### Bahraini lenders post high profits even as costs rise

BAHRAINI lenders have enjoyed steady growth over the past year, thanks to diversified business models and supportive domestic economic conditions.

The country's higher-interest-rate climate, coupled with a healthy pipe line of local and regional infrastructure projects, lifted the profitability of the biggest banks throughout 2023.

Bank ABC, the only one of Bahrain's top five lenders to post fullyear results before The Banker went to press, saw net profit attributable to shareholders grow by 53 percent to \$235mn, with total operating income growing 16 per cent for the year.

Bahrain's largest lender, Ahli United Bank acquired by Kuwait Finance House in 2022 posted attributable net profits of \$552mn in the nine months to September 2023, a 62 percent year-on-year increase.

National Bank of Bahrain's attributable net profits increased 16 percent over the first nine months of the year compared with 2022, with Gulf International Bank's profits growing by 141 percent over the same period.

Al Baraka Group's attributable net income over the first three quarters of 2023 remained steady compared with 2022, although its total net income increased by 19 percent.

Net interest margins at all banks benefited from rising interest rates, with monetary policy-makers at the Central Bank of Bahrain acting in line with the US Federal Reserve, given the peg between the dollar and the Bahraini dinar.

The CBB lifted its key policy rate from 5.25 percent at the start of 2023 to 6.25 percent in July, where it remains at time of writing.

"Many Bahraini banks have reaped the benefits of higher interest rates. Their NIMs have been high despite their cost of funding going up at the same time," said Sumaya Al Jazeeri, assistant vice-president at SICO, one of the country's largest wholesale

Aggregate NIMs for six of the country's largest banks (excluding AUB) hit 2.9 per cent by the end of the third quarter of 2023, up from 2.69 per cent during the same period in 2022, according to regional investment bank Kamco Invest.

Despite the increase, Bahraini NIMs are among the lowest in the Gulf Cooperation Council, given the competitive dynamics of the country's over-banked financial system which includes 30 retail and 54 wholesale lenders exerting downward pressure on margins.

### British university's alternative finance wing makes digital asset education tool

**CAMBRIDGE** 

THE Cambridge Centre for Alternative Finance at the University of Cambridge has launched its Cambridge Digital Money Dashboard, which aims to provide interactive visual representations of up-to-date data on stablecoins, central bank digital currencies, tokenised bank deposits and cryp-

The first phase of the dashboard focuses on the 10 major US dollar-pegged stablecoins, and targets regulators, supervisors and policy-makers.

The CDMD is offered as a platform that brings together relevant digital asset adoption and risk indicators, allowing for multi-stakeholder uses and comparison. It aims to offer policy-makers, financial authorities, academics, industry and the general public access to reliable information and analytical tools for thorough and insightful decision making.

Founding collaborators on the dashboard include the Bank for International Settlements, Dubai International Finance Centre, Fidelity Investments, Mastercard and NatWest.

Keith Bear, a fellow at the CCAF who also sits on the Bank of England CBDC technology forum and the investor trends and research committee at the European Securities and Markets Authority, said: "This dashboard is an open-access web tool, the main goal of which is to track the evolution of the emerging digital money instrument."

The key group of beneficiaries of the new dashboard are regulators, supervisors and policymakers. "We believe it is important to provide all the stakeholders in the ecosystem with trusted information which can be a basis for informed decisions on policy-making," said Roman Proskalovich, lead, emergent money systems at the CCAF.

He says the dashboard also targets those members of the public who want to better understand the development of stablecoins and other digital money instruments, so the platform features detailed educational content.

While Proskalovich does not believe the tool will lead to further acceleration in the growth in the stablecoin market, he said he believes "it could well be that there will be some major changes with stablecoins and how they're used".

In due course, the plan is for the open-access web tool to cover all emerging digital money instrument types, according to Proskalovich. "We plan to add CBDC tokenised bank deposits and crypto assets," he said. "The main goal is to track the evolution of emerging digital money."

CCAF is co-operating with a variety of data providers to achieve near-real-time data feeds. The dashboard has three sections, including digital money 101, which provides educational content on the nature of the monetary system, evolving and presentation mechanisms and digital money instruments.

"The second section, adoption, is where data exploration starts," said Proskalovich. This includes an option to zoom smaller stablecoins and to see an overview of the global cryptography ecosystem, he said. "For the first iteration we have the most important fundamental metrics that we start with that later on will be extended," he added.

This section will be extended in future releases, for example with the addition of detailed information on stablecoin usage, including a wallets breakdown of the sectors where stablecoins are

The third section in this first release, called risks and protections, aims to cover the risk of price deviation. The dashboard's price feed is based on 14 major exchanges and enables users to interactively check how often the price was falling, for example in a particular price range, said Proskalovich.

"As stablecoins are not always stable, we believe it is very important to show different stabilisation mechanisms that are essentially helping them to achieve stability, as most major stablecoins are trying to do that with reserves that are backing stablecoins," he said. "We provide extended information on this, for example, giving users an overview of the assets stablecoin issues have to back their stablecoins, with details about different asset categories and their share in a stablecoin reserve portfolio.'

Bear said that despite his role on the BoE's technology forum the aim of the dashboard is not deliberately supportive of the goal of CBDCs. "As an independent university research centre, we tend to focus on empirical evidence rather than conjecture in that respect," he said. "We see the value of CBDCs, but we also see some of the concerns, privacy among them."

# AfDB's hybrid capital deal opens class of fangled assets for MDBs

HE term 'ground-breaking' is often overused in capital markets. But the African Development Bank's hybrid capital deal in January 2024 was just that - or at least that is the hope. In the works for three years, it is the first such transaction in the public sector bond market, opening the door for other multilateral development banks to lend more to emerging markets for sustainable development.

Talk of hybrid capital has been gathering pace over the last few years. It came into sharp focus in 2022 after an independent review of MDBs' capital adequacy frameworks by the G20. The review recommended that, as hybrid securities are treated as equity by credit rating agencies, MDBs should use this product to lend more without impacting their credit ratings. But while the objective was simple, structuring the deal was far from it.

Finding the right price Pricing the deal proved challenging. While corporates and financial institutions issue hybrid capital, MDBs or public sector borrowers had not done so before. There was no benchmark for what the spread would be for a public sector borrower's senior to subordinated curve.

'With regards to pricing, we had intense discussions internally with the banks about the best way to work this out,' said Hassatou N'Sele, vice president and chief financial officer at the AfDB. 'While this is not a 10year bond - it is equity - a fair starting point to build the price was a 10-year senior unsecured bond. The pricing had to make sense for us and for investors, but it was difficult to bench-



mark as there were no real comparable deals.

During an extensive roadshow conducted over three weeks across the UK, US and Europe in September 2023 where the AfDB met with over 150 investors - discussions around pricing were at the forefront.

'The price discovery process was at the centre of our discussions with investors,' said Benjamin de Forton, head of debt capital markets at BNP Paribas, one of the joint structuring banks and leads on the transaction. 'We explained the structure to investors, got feedback on what was working for them and not working for them. It was very much an open exchange between us.'

Creating an investor base from scratch

The challenge was accentuated by the fact that the leads were explaining a novel product by an MDB to an undefined investor base. 'We had to educate both the traditional sovereign, supranational and agency investor base that don't buy perpetual products and credit investors that don't buy MDB bonds,' said de Forton.

For the AfDB and its leads, this meant building an investor base from scratch, with the banks using their SSA, financial and corporate DCM desks to reach out to as broad an inves-

tor base as possible.

As hybrid capital is subordinated in the capital structure, the worry was that the AfDB would pay a significant amount for the deal over its senior curve. During the roadshow, investors were asking for a spread of around 150-200 basis points over the issuer's senior or conventional curve. While this spread aligns with what corporates and banks would typically pay for hybrid capital, it raises concerns for public sector borrowers as cost efficiency is crucial to funding and issuance.

'For the price discovery process, one aspect was to look at the best in class in this market,' said de Forton. 'That was the starting point. But it was difficult as this deal is rated AA, which no other hybrid security has. Another difficulty was that there was no outstanding 10-year point on AfDB's curve, but assuming a new 10-year might come at [US] Treasuries plus 23-25bp, that gave a spread to the issuer's senior curve of around 130bp.

Strong result on price and demand

Achieving a spread of 130bp over the AfDB's senior curve was a great result, although some DCM bankers away from the deal saw the spread as closer to 150bp. Either way, it came in tighter than anticipated. 'We

were able to structure this in a way that worked out for all of us,' said N'Sele.

Some market participants away from the deal said the delay of the transaction from the September 2023 roadshow to execution in January 2024 was due to frictions between investors and the issuer on the price. But, according to N'Sele, the delay was more about finding the right window. 'The delay to the transaction was not due to issues around the pricing, but volatility in the market towards the end of last year,' she said. 'We worked for three years on this transaction, and this maiden sustainable hybrid capital transaction deserved to be launched in a conducive market.

As well as achieving a great result on pricing, the demand for the deal was impressive. The order book peaked at over \$6bn, allowing the issuer to comfortably issue \$750m for the perpetual non-call 10.5year sustainable hybrid capital deal. There were over 275 investors in-book, with over 190 allocated to the trade. Hedge funds and specialised funds took the bulk of the allocation (54.8%), followed by asset managers (27.8%), central banks and official institutions (6.7%) and insurance and pension funds (6.6%)

Will other MDBs follow?

For this transaction to really make an impact, other MDBs will have to follow. Whether they will is the crucial question that market participants seem split on.

'It looked like a good outcome in all regards,' said a head of an SSA syndicate away from the AfDB's deal. 'But the question is: does it make economic sense versus borrowing direct from shareholders? My feeling is that the premium that the World Bank will pay versus their senior curve with their private placement to Germany will be less than what AfDB paid with this transaction.'

In September 2023, Germany became the first country to subscribe hybrid capital through a €305m private placement for the World Bank. A private placement allows MDBs to bypass the capital markets and issue directly to their shareholders. By issuing in this way, funding costs are contained as there is only one investor and shareholders receive a coupon for the investment, which they do not get with a regular capital

According to N'Sele, the AfDB is looking at this method too. 'Our sustainable hybrid capital project has two flavours: one designed to be placed with shareholders and another one through capital markets,' she said. 'We are pursuing our discussions with shareholders and foundations for a hybrid capital placement.'

There are other innovative ways for MDBs to unlock more lending. These include shifting part of their portfolios and transferring the risk to the private sector through synthetic securitisations, which is also an area where the AfDB has taken a leading role. But hybrid capital seems poised to gain traction - especially after such fundamental groundwork has been laid.

### Palestine: Israel PM's remarks on Gaza bring no security to region

RAMALLAH/GAZA/GENEVA/DOHA/ **AMMAN** 

PALESTINE on Tuesday rejected Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's remarks about Israel's security control over the West Bank and the Gaza Strip, considering it a challenge to international legitimacy and the Arab Peace Initiative.

Nabil Abu Rudeineh, the spokesperson of the Palestinian presidency, said in a press statement that these Israeli policies "do not bring security and stability to anyone here or in the region," warning against the continuation of this "destructive approach that will lead matters to a complete explosion".

"Palestine rejects this Israeli policy that challenges the world," he added.

Abu Rudeineh called on the US government to "force" Israel to stop the conflict first "because the right to self-determination for the Palestinian people is a red

Netanyahu said Monday that Israel will maintain its security control over the West Bank and Gaza Strip.

"In recent days, we have witnessed pressure on us unilaterally to impose the establishment of a Palestinian state that would endanger the existence of the State of Israel," he added in a video statement.

"The recognizing a Palestinian state at this stage would be a 'reward for terrorism' and would undermine the chances of a lasting peace deal," he said.

Meanwhile, at least 12 Palestinians were killed on Tuesday during an Israeli attack on a residential square in the Nuseirat refugee camp in the central Gaza Strip, according to Palestinian medical sources.

The medical sources told Xinhua that "the Palestinian civil defense crews transported 12 bodies of Palestinians and dozens of wounded after targeting several homes in the Nuseirat camp, which was crowded with displaced people".

"The bodies of the victims arrived

in pieces at a local hospital, while the wounded were transferred to the hospital to receive treatment amid great suffering due to the running out of medicines and the limited number of medical staff present in the hospital," the sources said.

The sources said they are facing "extreme difficulty" in dealing with the large number of victims arriving at hospitals.

Earlier in the day, the Gaza-based health ministry announced that the number of Palestinian deaths as a result of Israeli attacks on the Strip had risen to 29,195 since the outbreak of the Hamas-Israel conflict.

### **Critical patients evacuated**

The World Health Organization (WHO) said Tuesday that it has transferred 32 critical patients, including two children, from the Nasser Hospital in southern Gaza in two life-saving missions in the past two

An estimated 130 sick and injured patients and at least 15 health workers remained inside the hospital, WHO spokesperson Tarik Jasarevic told a press briefing in Geneva.

The WHO voiced concerns over their safety and well-being and warned that further disruption to lifesaving care for the sick and injured would lead to more

The Nasser Hospital in Khan Younis has ceased to function following Israel's military raid on Feb 14, after a week-long siege, said the UN health agency.

The Nasser Hospital had no electricity or running water, and medical waste and garbage were creating a breeding ground for disease, said the WHO. Describing the situation there as "heartbreaking", WHO staff Chris Black said that the hospital was surrounded by burnt and destroyed buildings, and heavy layers of debris, with no stretch of intact road.

the Nasser Hospital was a massive blow to Gaza's health system, said the agency. the ministry's official spokesperson

Other facilities in the south have been already operating well beyond maximum capacity and were barely able to receive more patients, it added.

Jasarevic said the WHO hoped to see the Nasser Hospital and other health facilities in Gaza protected, rebuilt, and properly supplied. This could only be achieved if there was a ceasefire and unimpeded access to health workers, patients, and humanitarians, he added.

The WHO repeated its calls for the protection of patients, health workers, health infrastructure and civilians.

### Hamas receives aid to hos-

Also on Tuesday, the Qatari government said Hamas has confirmed the receipt of a shipment of medicines and the commencement of their delivery to beneficiaries among the Israeli hostages in the Gaza Strip.

Hamas has informed the Qatari side that it received the medicines and started to deliver them to the hostages in Gaza under an agreement mediated by Qatar, in cooperation with France between Hamas and Israel last month, the Qatari Foreign Ministry said in a state-

The agreement includes "the entry of medicines and a shipment of humanitarian aid to civilians in the Gaza Strip, especially in the most affected and damaged areas, in ex-The dismantling and degradation of change for delivering the medicines needed by hostages in the sector,"

Majed Al-Ansari was quoted by the statement as saying.

As part of its commitment to ending the conflict in Gaza, Qatar has affirmed its ongoing mediation efforts, in collaboration with regional and international partners, according to Al-Ansari.

In Amman, King Abdullah II of Jordan on Tuesday warned against the cessation of international funding for the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees (UNRWA), saying it is a vital lifeline for nearly 2 million people facing the risk of famine in

The king made the remarks at a meeting with a delegation from the US Senate, during which he emphasized the gravity of the situation in Gaza as the holy month of Ramadan approaches, noting that the UN agency provides essential services to Palestinian refugees in the region, according to a statement by the Royal Hashemite Court.

During the talks, the king also called for more efforts to achieve a lasting ceasefire that would end hostilities in Gaza. He cautioned about the dire consequences of the ongoing conflict, saying it would be catastrophic for the entire region.

Several of UNRWA's staff were accused by Israel of involvement in the Oct 7 Hamas attack against Israel. Following the allegations, a number of donor countries, including the United States, Britain, and Canada, have announced their decision to suspend their funding for the agency.

### Wang Yi: China, France should enhance strategic coordination

CHINESE Foreign Minister Wang Yi said here Tuesday that China and France should strengthen strategic coordination and deepen cooperation to contribute to global peace and stability.

Wang also expressed the hope that the French side would create a fair and just business environment and provide positive and stable long-term expectations for Chinese enterprises in France.

As independent major countries, permanent members of the UN Security Council and important forces in a multipolar world, China and France should strengthen strategic coordination and deepen strategic cooperation to contribute to global peace and stability, he said.

China appreciates France's adherence to independence and autonomy, and hopes that France will continue to boost the sound and steady development of China-Europe relations, enhance mutual trust, promote convergence of interests, and jointly act as a stabilizing force in today's world.

Sama Lukonde Kyenge was appointed prime minister on Feb. 15, 2021.

On Feb. 8, the Constitutional Court of the DRC rendered the incompatibility of government and legislative functions, asking ministers, provincial governors, and members of political cabinets, who are also elected in legislative elections, to resign from their political functions unless they renounce their electoral mandate."Consequently, (the Constitutional Court) demands that the members of the government, the ministerial cabinets, and the general

Russian forces repulsed four Ukrainian army attacks in the Kupyansk area, destroying roughly 45 enemy troops, a German howitzer and a USmade artillery gun over the past day, the ministry reported.

### Tanzania to begin Afcon 2025 qualifications straight in group stages

TANZANIA senior national football team will begin their 2025 AFCON tournament qualifications in the group stages after CAF released a list of nations that will vie their chances in the preliminary rounds.

Following the conclusion of the 34th edition of TotalEnergies CAF AFCON, the focus has shifted to the next edition.

The preliminary round of the CAF Africa Cup of Nations Morocco 2025 will include the eight lowest-ranked teams according to the FIFA ranking.

The teams are Somalia, Djibouti, Sao Tome, Chad, Mauritius, South Sudan, Liberia and Eswatini. The matches will be played on a home and away basis during the FIFA window of March 18-26, 2024, and the four preliminary round winners will join the 44 exempted teams for the group stage.

Talking about the national team to avoid the preliminary stage, the former player of Taifa Stars, Adolph Rishard, said that the decision has a big advantage because the playoff matches are very unpredictable.

"For us coaches, there are no matches that have been giving us a headache like the playoffs, where you only play two matches to find one winner who will advance to the next stage.

"The playoff matches are always played in a short period of time. So they do not give enough time for the players to rest and do programs to adjust, unlike group matches," he said.

Meanwhile, Taifa Stars will play with Bulgaria in a special competition organized by the world's football governing body, known as 'FIFA Series', on March 22, in Azerbaijan.

The mini-tournament, which replaces FIFA's international friendlies, will feature four teams from Africa, Europe and

Africa will be represented by Tanzania, Europe will be represented by Bulgaria while Asia will be represented by Mongolia and the hosts Azerbaijan. This will be the first time for the Tanzanian national team to play against Bulgaria and Mongolia in friendly games organized by FIFA.

The Information Officer of the Tanzania Football Federation (TFF), Clifford Ndimbo, has confirmed the existence of the tournament and said Tanzania will participate and they are currently in preliminary preparations for the event.

### British billionaire Ratcliffe completes purchase of minority stake in **Manchester United**

LONDON

BRITISH billionaire Jim Ratcliffe said becoming a co-owner of Manchester United is a "great honour" and "responsibility" after his purchase of a minority stake was finalised on Tuesday.

The 71-year-old's investment, which will give him control of football operations at the 20time English champions, was approved by the Premier League and English Football Association last week.

It was announced on December 24 last year that Ratcliffe had agreed to buy a 25 per cent stake in United from unpopular owners the Glazer family in a deal worth around £1.02 billion (\$1.3 billion).

Following the completion of that deal, the founder of petrochemicals giant INEOS has invested a further \$200 million to take his total stake to 27.7 percent and will inject \$100 million more by the end of this year to enable investment in infrastructure at Old Trafford.

"This marks the completion of the transaction, but just the beginning of our journey to take Manchester United back to the top of English, European and world football, with worldclass facilities for our fans," Ratcliffe said in a club statement.

"Work to achieve those objectives will accelerate from today."

United have not won the Premier League since former manager Alex Ferguson retired in 2013 and last won the Champions League in 2008 as their fortunes on the field have deteriorated during the Glazers' reign.

The Americans have been deeply unpopular with supporters ever since a leveraged takeover of the club in 2005 saddled the club with hundreds of millions of dollars of debt.

Joel Glazer, United's executive co-chairman, said: "I would like to welcome Sir Jim as coowner and look forward to working closely with him and INEOS Sport to deliver a bright future for Manchester United."

A boyhood United fan, Ratcliffe has already met with leading supporters' groups and local politicians as he charts a course to lead United back to the top on and off the field.

Omar Berrada has been poached from local rivals and Premier League champions Man-

chester City to be the club's new CEO. A pursuit of Newcastle's Dan Ashworth to be United's sporting director is also nearing completion as Ratcliffe aims to revolutionise

What is VAR, how does it work and what are the biggest problems?

Gary O'Neil proclaimed: "What is the point in VAR?" His side felt aggrieved after yet more decisions proved vital in defeat at Fulham. Newcastle boss Eddie Howe labelled a penalty against his own club in stoppage time against Paris Saint-Germain "a poor decision" which "looks completely different" in a slowed-down replay to officials watching on monitors.

The current situations come after an increase in the use of technology in football over the past few years but none seems to create as much heated debate and questioning as that of the Video Assistant Referee (VAR).

By and large, it is felt that minor and visible calls are improved across the course of the season with on-pitch referees getting extra help. However, there have been several highprofile incidents of late was awarded for handthat have led to clubs, or personnel within them, complaining about the eventual decision or decision-making process, with another recent one PSG. coming in the Champions League.

United Manchester boss Erik ten Hag felt aggrieved that a number of calls went against them in their 4-3 defeat to FC Copenhagen, including a decision to send off Marcus Rashford for serious foul play.

the debate is that - without their being absolute, specific lines on what is Arsenal manager Mikel

and isn't a foul, where a decision should or shouldn't be made and so on - the bar for where VAR intervenes and decides on disallowing inicidents (or not) appears far higher in the Premier League than in European competition.

It is widely felt on these shores that the penalty against Newcastle for PSG would not have been given in England, nor would Jarrell Quansah's late goal for Liverpool against Toulouse have been chalked off for a handball against Alexis Mac Allister much earlier in build-up play. But neither of these instances occurred in the Premier League, and referees in Europe - under the Uefa banner - have different takes and different levels of interven-

Here's everything on VAR vou need to know. including the latest causes for complaint against it.

### \*What has gone wrong?

A lot, Newcastle felt aggrieved that a penalty ball after a VAR review having not been given during open play, in the final minute of injury time in their 1-1 draw at

Earlier in the competition, Man United complained about Rashford's red card, given out for stepping across and onto the foot and shin of an opponent. In domestic football,

Arteta complained over "unacceptable" errors from on-pitch and VAR officials as his team lost to Newcastle, while Wolves boss O'Neil continues to feel unfairly treated by the use of the technology.

Earlier in the season he labelled a penalty decision given against his team and upheld by VAR as "scandalous" - also against Newcastle. VAR sent referee Michael Salisbury to the screen to award a penalty after Joao Gomes brought Harry Wilson down in the box, and Willian scored his second spot kick of the game to seal all three points for Fulham.

O'Neil highlighted the decisions involving the late penalty, Carlos Vinicius' alleged headbutt on Max Kilman and why Tim Ream did not receive a second yellow for a foul on Hwang Hee-Chan, while the Whites' first penalty, awarded for a foul by Nelson Semedo on Tom Cairney, was also contentious. To note, VAR would never have intervened on Ream, as they only get involved for direct red card offences, not sec-

ond yellows. Postecoglou Ange suggested recently that clubs have to shoulder part of the blame for long stoppages for VAR, saying: "Some of it is self inflicted because if we come out every week complaining about decisions that is what will happen, every decision gets forensically checked and we will be sitting around for a long time in every game trying to figure out what is going on."

However, it must be noted that the vast majority of these are subjective opinions and where Arteta sees fault, another manager, supporter or, indeed, official may see justification in decision.

One incident which was not subjective, but instead a quite clear mistake, came with Luis Diaz's goal for Liverpool against Tottenham being ruled out for offside and then allowed to stay disallowed, despite the VAR officials running their processes and showing the forward was onside. The "significant human error" came as a result of the official, Darren England, appearing to forget that offside rather than a goal had been awarded

in the first place. To another extreme, Millie Bright cised the fact there was no VAR in the first edition of the Women's Nations League, after a clearly offside goal was allowed to stand against England which would have been simple to rule

Further clear VAR errors which PGMOL have had to apologise for include no penalty being awarded to Wolves against Man United after Andre Onana clattered Sasa Kalajdzic, a Brentford goal against Arsenal not being checked properly with no offside lines drawn and a West Ham late equaliser being ruled out for a foul. where none was appar-

### \*What has gone right?

In truth, a lot. It's overlooked when three or four calls are spot-on, when one plaint or at least is a subjective call which a majority seem to disagree

As an example, in the incident-packed tenham vs Chelsea fixture, several goals were correctly ruled out for offside through use - or checking - of VAR and the penalty awarded which saw Cristian Romero sent off was also a result of VAR interven-

Generally speaking, these calls that are widely accepted as correct do not get highlighted, partially because the technology exists for that very reason: it's expected to help officials make the right calls with a second look.

That doesn't mean they don't occur, though. The Premier League reported that 82 per cent of decisions were correct in the season before VAR was introduced, rising to 94 per cent being correct in 2019/20.

### \*What is the process for VAR checks?

From the Premier League website: VAR will be used only for "clear and obvious errors" or "serious missed in incidents" match-changing situations: goals; penalty decisions; direct red-card incidents; and mistaken identity.

When any of those match situations occur or potentially occur, VAR is constantly rewatching and monitoring match footage from the hub at Stockley Park.

If there is a decision to be made, the VAR or Assistant VAR (AVAR) will relay to the referee that play should be halted while checks are made, before recommending either an overturn, a pitchside check of the monitor for the ref or a continuation of play with the on-pitch original decision.

The video officials have until the ball goes dead to inform the referee that a check is underway if play is already ongoing.

The referee can then either check the monitor or accept the VAR recommendation. Upon reviewing the pitchside monitor, they may then stick with their own initial assessment or 

overturn the original, before communicating their new decision to the crowd.

### \*What have PGMOL said?

The refereeing chief of Professional Game Match Officials Limited, Howard Webb, took over the role last year to improve the standard of officiating in the English game and to help oversee a smoother use of technology.

PGMOL confirmed to the League Managers' Association "they are actively looking at how best to incorporate VARs into match-day refereeing teams, to ensure the dynamic between onfield referee and VAR is conducive to producing positive outcomes.'

After the Diaz incident, the organisation "acknowledge[d] a significant human error occurred" and brought in additional processes to ensure no repeat happened. They also released the audio of that incident, an "unusual according to step" Webb, "to show everybody what was very quickly pretty apparent to us, a human error and loss of concentration."

Webb has suggested the pool of VAR-specific officials will be increased but Lee Mason presents a cautionary tale. The former referee was appointed a fulltime VAR for 2022/23, but departed the role last season after the aforementioned error over Brentford's goal against Arsenal.

Mason, who had already been stood down from the officiating list that campaign previously for wrongly disallowing a Newcastle goal, was labelled a "serial offender" by ex-PGMOL boss Keith Hackett however, at the start of the current campaign, Mason was re-hired as a referees' coach for the lower leagues. That has not stopped questioning over why his credentials are suited to guiding less-experienced officials despite having been removed from his own post already.

Update: PGMOL confirmed to The Independent that Lee Mason does not work on VAR any longer.
