TAHA unveils macadamia drive as export value chain

After six years of rigorous scientific experiments, hard work and significant investor funding, the macadamia crop is now ready for commercial-scale farming

THE horticultural industry in Tanzania is experiencing rapid changes as it turns its attention to the macadamia nut-a perishable but nutritionally rich and commercially valu-

Dr. Jacqueline Mkindi, the Tanzania Horticultural Association (TAHA) chief executive officer, declared over the weekend that macadamia presents a new value chain in the horticultural sub-sector, thanks to more than six years of dedicated research and considerable investment.

For years, TAHA has quietly collaborated with strategic investors to establish a macadamia value chain in northern Tanzania and is now confident that the nut can be grown on a commercial scale, she stated.

"After six years of rigorous scientific experiments, hard work and significant investor funding, the macadamia crop is now ready for commercial-scale farming," she affirmed at a press conference here.

Macadamia trees thrive in agricultural zones with altitudes between 1,000 and 1,500 meters above sea level, complemented by average rainfall and temperate climates-conditions found in regions in three northern regions, the southern highlands and partially the Lake Zone, she stated.

Climatic and soil conditions are suited for macadamia cultivation in many regions, capable of producing remarkable yields of 42 nuts per tree bunch compared to the average 22 nuts with the right inputs, she said.

Cultivating macadamias is not a soft option as establishing orchards requires substantial investment and solid commitment, as trees take about five years to yield a worthwhile harvest, she said, pointing at optimal costs for one acre at \$2,400 and potentially capable of earn \$12,000 in the season if the harvest and marketing are right.

"Investing \$24,000 to plant ten acres of macadamia can yield returns of \$120,000 per year once the nuts are ripe," she further noted, describing macadamia as "truly the crop of the future."

TAHA will provide tailored practical guidance to help those taking up the crop to navigate the complexities of commercial cultivation in the burgeoning industry, she stated.

Hussein Gonga, a pioneering farmer in the new field, said that despite their premium pricing, macadamias' high cost is justified by their exceptional nutritional value and limited supply.

Growing on trees like most nuts, the crop require a considerable lead-time from planting to harvest, taking five to six years to reach maturity and begin yielding nuts.

The high-value nut is most sought in China, the United States and Europe, he added.

THE Tanzania Ports Authority (TPA) yesterday pledged to waive storage fees on goods imported by tenants of a building that collapsed in Kariakoo here a week ago, killing 20 people and damaging goods worth millions of shillings.





Mzumbe hands out first honoris causa, to Samia

PRESIDENT Samia Suluhu Hassan has been conferred an honorary doctorate degree in leadership by Mzumbe University, marking the sixth honorary degree awarded to the president since assuming office.

Vice Chancellor Prof. William Mwegoha made this affirmation at the university's graduation ceremony in Morogoro on Friday, where President Samia was the chief guest.

He said the decision to honour the president stemmed from carefully

evaluating the solid contributions during the three years she has been at the helm of the state.

"This doctorate serves as recognition of the president's efforts toward sustainable development in Tanzania and beyond," he said, noting that the president made history as Tanzania's first woman taking up as top national leader, as vice president and then as president

During the three years of her leadership significant achievements have been realized, making the president a deserving recipient of the honorary doctorate.

He commended President Samia for being a role model in leadership at the domestic and even at an international level, pointing out that before this recognition, the Head of State had already received five honorary doctorates.

These awards relate to various disciplines, awarded by local and foreign universities, where the Mzumbe VC said that this was the first time the president is offered an honorary doctorate exclusively for exemplary leadership. Earlier citations for the doctorate honoris causa were conferred by

the University of Dar es Salaam (UDSM), the State University of Zanzibar (SUZA), the Jawaharlal Nehru University in India, Ankara University in Turkey, and the Korea National University of Aviation.

In the latest citation, the decision also marks the first honorary doctorate to be awarded by Mzumbe University, where Prof. Cyriacus Binamungu, rector for the Mzumbe University Dar es Salaam campus, elaborated on the rationale for awarding the citation.

Mpox is still clear health emergency, states WHO

THE Mpox outbreak continues to represent a public health emergency, the World Health Organization has said.

The WHO first declared the emergency in August, when an outbreak of a new form of mpox spread from the badly-hit Democratic Republic of Congo to neighbouring countries.

The WHO had convened a meeting of its Emergency Committee and, agreeing with its advice, the WHO Director-General has determined that the upsurge of mpox continues to constitute a public health emergency of international concern.

The decision is based on the rising number and continuing geographic spread of cases, operational challenges in the field and the need to mount and sustain a cohesive response across countries and partners, the WHO said.

Mpox is a viral infection that spreads through close contact, and typically causes flu-like symptoms and pusfilled lesions. It is usually mild, but it can be lethal.

This year, there have been more than 46,000 suspected cases across Africa, mainly in Congo, and more than 1,000 suspected deaths.

The label of "public health emergency of international concern" is the WHO's highest form of alert, and was also applied to a global outbreak of a different form of mpox in 2022-2023.

The alert issued this year followed the spread of a new variant of the virus, called clade Ib.

Cases of this variant have been confirmed in the UK, Germany, Sweden and India, among other countries.

In September, after facing criticism on moving too slowly on vaccines, the WHO cleared Bavarian Nordic's

A total of 607 patients were identified as having liver cancer or cirrhosis, requiring liver transplants, he said, explaining that the hospital has been preparing to launch this service over the past two years, in collaboration with Indian specialists.

"In the past two days, we've conducted screenings at the outpatient department and identified over 100 patients with liver complications," he said, referring to the

consultation as part of the institution's capacity-building process.

MNH needs nurses and qualified specialists in this field, he declared, asserting that India's expertise in liver transplantation dates back to 2002, while the collaboration move is projected to have the service operational in the next few months.

Stressing the importance of bringing such services closer to the people, he said that many patients have to travel abroad for

treatment due to a lack of expertise, diagnostic equipment and proper infrastruc-

"We've worked with experts from Fortis Hospital in India, who have spent three days with our doctors, assessing patients with liver diseases and evaluating the availability of medications, laboratory infrastructure and ICU facilities required for this service," he stated.

Jennifer Choudhary, the Vaidam Health

business director, an Indian medical enterprise, expressed excitement at being part of the preparations, asserting that providing

the service requires careful planning. It may go through several stages before liver transplants can begin, she said, explaining that the Indian team was there to lay the groundwork, setting up modalities for patient assessments and identifying re-

sources needed for the next phase. Dr. Gaurav Gupta, top consultant at the Fortis Hospitals system in India, said that liver transplantation is a complex process that requires the right equipment and experts for success.

Dr. Kitembo Salumu, a digestive system and liver surgeon at MNH, asserted that the hospital's records show over 5,000 patients reported having liver ailments, with 2,333 showing liver tumours and 607 diagnosed with liver cancer, mostly requiring liver transplants.

TANZANIAN youth have been urged to take advantage of opportunities existing in energy sector that offers a broad scope for creating jobs and self-employ-

Ambassador John Ulanga, Director of Department of International Trade Coordination and Economic Diplomacy in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and East African Cooperation, made the call here at the weekend when speaking at a conference themed 'The Role of Youth in the Energy Sector and Its Transition in Africa' which was organized by the East African Crude Oil Pipeline (EACOP) project at the University of Dodoma (UDOM).

RPC calls for more chemical safety education

DODOMA Regional Police Commander, George Katabazi has called on both government and private institutions to enhance efforts in educating the public on the safe and proper use of chemicals.

RPC Katabazi made the remarks in Dodoma Region over the weekend as he closed the first phase of a public education campaign on the safe transportation of sodium cyanide.

He emphasized the campaign's importance in equipping stakeholders with the knowledge and skills necessary to handle the safe transportation of the chemical.

"Institutions like the Government Chemist Laboratory Authority (GCLA) are leading by example, offering vital education and training to various groups, including small-scale entrepreneurs, gold miners, chemical supervisors, drivers, and the general public. I urge other organizations, both public and private, to follow GCLA's impactful approach," he said.

Commander Katabazi also highlighted that the campaign was part of a broader national effort to safeguard public health, protect the environment, and raise safety standards within the mining industry.

He emphasized the importance of collaboration among stakeholders to ensure effective management of hazardous chemicals while promoting sustainable development in critical

Daniel Ndiyo, Director of Regulatory Services at GCLA, outlined the core goals of the campaign which focuses on educating the public about the safe transportation of Sodium Cyanide, a chemical essential to gold mining.

He said sodium cyanide was among harmful chemicals that if not taken and protected properly might harm the users.

"This initiative is crucial to ensuring stakeholders are equipped to safely handle Sodium Cyanide," he said, stressing the importance of educating the community about the chemical's risks and its vital role in gold extraction.

Joseph Mbanya, Transportation Supervisor at Barrick Gold Mining Company, expressed gratitude to all participants and organizers of the campaign. He expressed confidence that the knowledge shared would be spread to a wide range of stakeholders, empowering them to further educate their communities.

"This campaign has laid a strong foundation. I believe the insights shared here will help promote chemical safety within their areas of influence," he said.

Last year, GCLA launched a campaign to increase awareness on the safer use of sodium cyanide in eight regions.

The campaign was part of the authority's effort to improve the implementation of the Industrial and Consumer Chemicals (Management and Control) Act, 2003.

World Prematurity Day highlights usefulness of prenatal clinic visits

with Aga Khan Hospital Dar es Salaam. The event highlighted the critical role of awareness to safeguard health of mothers and their newborns.

Dr. Zuheri said that Dar es Salaam City Council has made notable progress in tackling the challenges, particularly through enhanced care for premature babies. Key initiatives include educating mothers on

organized in collaboration the importance of early prenatal clinic visits and providing parents with essential knowledge on newborn care.

Efforts have also focused on improving facilities such as Kangaroo Mother Care units which provide life-saving support for premature infants.

"We extend our heartfelt gratitude to the leadership of Aga Khan Hospital for their unwavering commitment. This event underscores the critical importance of neonatal care," she said.

She noted the tangible impact of the initiatives, citing a dramatic reduction of premature infant mortality rates. During the July-September quarter, mortality rates dropped from 40 percent to 12.98 percent.

"This remarkable progress reflects the power of collective action and prioritization of neonatal care. As we celebrate today's achievements, let us reaffirm our commitment to ensuring every child, regardless of their circumstances at birth, has the chance to live," she said.

"As someone born prematurely, I feel immense pride and hope witnessing the significant strides being made to help today's children achieve milestones we once dreamed of."

Dr. Yaser Abdallah, neonatol-

ogist at Aga Khan Hospital, Dar es Salaam emphasized the urgent need for universal access to high-quality neonatal care to prevent unnecessary deaths of premature newborns.

Dr Shoo condemns abductions, killings of innocent Tanzanians

CHAIRMAN of Christian Council of Tanzania (CCT) and former head of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania (ELCT) Bishop Dr. Fredrick Shoo has condemned abductions and "brutal" killings of innocent Tanzanians, including senior member of the main opposition party Chadema who was recently kidnapped and murdered.

Addressing fellow clerics from Tanga, Kilimanjaro, Singida, Arusha, and Manyara regions during their interfaith meeting here on Friday, Dr Shoo denounced the "brutal acts" and called for investigations into such murders.

"You will all remember that in September this year, Mohamed Ali Kibao, 69, was forcibly removed from a bus by suspected security agents while traveling from Dar es Salaam to his hometown of Tanga. His death has raised concerns among the opposition and human rights groups about the clampdown on political activity. My appeal to my fellow clerics is to denounce such incidents affecting our followers," he said.

The meeting, organized by the Kilimanjaro Regional Interfaith Committee and sponsored by Norwegian Church Aid (NCA-Tanzania), was held under the theme 'The Role of Stronger Democratic Institutions in Promoting Human Rights and Fostering People's Participation'.

"The government should take urgent steps to address the deteriorating human rights situation in the country, especially ahead of the upcoming local government elections scheduled for November 27 and next year's General Election," he said.

He emphasized the importance of unity and cooperation among members of the public, stating that it is essential for national development.

Sheikh Saad Abdallah, Chairman of the Muslim Council of Tanzania (BAK-WATA) in Kilimanjaro Regions, noted that while religious leaders guide their followers to adhere to religious teachings, they should also encourage them to work towards sustainable economic development of the nation.

"As religious leaders we also have a role in supporting the needy in our communities to ensure their survival," he said. Fr. Charles Kitima, Secretary of the Tanzania Episcopal Conference (TEC), explained that the happiness index is a better indicator of people's welfare than socioeconomic index.

"We cannot separate the happiness index from socioeconomic index as they are intertwined. As religious leaders we should emphasize to our people the importance of hard work to achieve their goals rather than resorting to theft and leaving victims in extreme poverty," he said.

Chadema stresses need to vote for capable candidates

THE main opposition Chadema has called on residents of Mbeya Region to vote for competent candidates in the upcoming local government elections.

The party emphasized that local government offices play a critical role in addressing people's day-to-day challenges.

Freeman Mbowe, Chadema National Chairman, made the call here at the weekend when speaking at a campaign launch rally, highlighting that the importance of local government offices, referring to them as the 'State House' at grassroots level.

He urged residents to vote for Chadema candidates, claiming they are better positioned to address people's grievances, noting that Mbeya is among the five regions where the party has fielded the highest number of candidates.

"This is the right time to remove such leaders. Elect candidates who have been thoroughly prepared for the roles," Mbilinyi said. He urged election officials to ensure fair treatment of all candidates to prevent disputes that have historically marred elections.

Local government elections are slated for November 27 when Tanzanians will elect village and hamlet chairpersons in rural areas and mtaa chairpersons in urban areas.

COP29 \$300bn climate change finance sparks hope in some, outrage in others

UNITED Nations climate talks adopted a deal to inject at least \$300 billion annually in humanity's fight against climate change, aimed at helping poor nations cope with the ravages of global warming in tense negotiations in Baku, Azerbaijan.

The \$300 billion will go to developing countries that need the cash to wean themselves off the coal, oil and gas that cause the globe to overheat, adapt to future warming, and pay for the damage caused by climate change's extreme weather. It's not near the full amount of \$1.3 trillion that developing countries were asking for, but it's three times a deal of \$100 billion a year from 2009 that is expiring. Some delegations said this deal is headed in the right direction, with hopes that more money flows in the future.



Utilise ICT tools to remain competitive, CCM advised

DEPUTY Secretary General of CCM (Zanzibar) Dr. Mohamed Said Dimwa has urged party leaders and organization responsible for publicity, ideology and training to adapt to the evolving landscape of science, information and communication technology to remain competitive in the country's political arena.

Dr. Dimwa made the call here at the weekend when inaugurating a training session for the party's secretaries in charge of politics, publicity, ideology, motivation, youth

He emphasized that modern politics is predominantly conducted on social media, which spreads

"The festival is part of a larger initiative to connect Tanzania's film and tourism industries," she said.

She observed that Kiliman-

jaro, already a globally recognized tourist destination, provides the perfect platform to promote Tanzanian films to international audiences.

"Film industry is growing and needs systems to accelerate its progress. Kilimanjaro is renowned for tourism; so, we decided to establish a film festival here to help films reach international audiences," she said.

Mount Kilimanjaro is the highest mountain in Africa and the highest free-standing mountain in the world at 5,895 m (19,341 ft) above sea level and 4,900 m (16,100 ft) above its pla-

teau base. It is also the highest volcano in the Eastern Hemisphere and the fourth most topographically prominent peak on earth.

Kilimanjaro's southern and eastern slopes served as home of the Chagga kingdoms until their abolition in 1963. Although described in classical sources, German missionary Johannes Rebmann is credited as the first European to report the mountain's existence in 1848. After several attempts by Europeans, German geographer Hans Meyer reached Kilimanjaro's highest summit in 1889.

Bodyright campaign: UNFPA gets into business in Botswana

GABORONE

THE United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) launched the bodyright campaign in Botswana Friday as part of this year's 16 Days of Activism against Gender-based Violence, which advocates the protection of personal photos online as copyright material.

Tlangelani Shilubane-Pietersen, the head of the Office of the UNFPA in Botswana, addressed delegates at the launch in Gaborone, the capital of Botswana, stating that they are aware that gender-based violence (GBV) exists in the virtual world and online abuse violates human rights and bodily autonomy.

She emphasized that bodyright is an evidence-based worldwide campaign with the necessary resources to support its collaborative efforts to achieve meaningful results.

The campaign emphasizes that corporate logos and copyrighted intellectual property are more highly valued and better protected than images of people's bodies online. It also drives the message that women, girls, and others are violated online, calling policymakers, actions to end online violence.

According to the Economist Intelligence Unit, the research and analysis division of the Economist Group, 85 percent of women with internet access have witnessed online violence against other women, with 38 percent directly experiencing it.

Furthermore, 92 percent of women report that online violence hurts their sense of wellbeing, and more than one-third have had mental health concerns as a result of online abuse.

To put a stop to the violation, Shilubane emphasized the need to invest more resources and generate more political will to eliminate such violence in all

"As UNFPA, we are mobilizing partners, resources, and programming with the goal of making all spaces safe for women and girls, everywhere," she added.

Mpox outbreak 'contained' as no new spread reports

BRAZZAVILLE

AS of 17 November 2024, just over 13,000 laboratory-confirmed mpox cases were reported across Africa with three countries-Burundi, the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) and Uganda–accounting for nearly 97 percent of the cases.

The World Health Organisation (WHO) has been instrumental in supporting African nations with outbreak control measures, including health worker training, delivery of medical supplies, and vaccine deployment plans. WHO's efforts have helped contain outbreaks, especially in countries with sporadic cases. In Ghana, for example, after its first mpox case was reported in October 2024, prompt public awareness campaigns, risk communication, and rapid contact tracing helped prevent further spread.

WHO collaborated with the Ghana Health Service to ensure that the public, including immigration and police officials, were trained to recognize symptoms and prevent new cases from being imported.

"Without informed populations, there is a risk that infected individuals may unknowingly spread the virus," said Dr. Frank Lule, Acting WHO Representative in Ghana.

Thanks to early intervention, Ghana has only reported two cases in 2024.

In Gabon, the country successfully contained its first mpox case in August 2024 through rigorous contact tracing and isolation protocols.

A 30-year-old man who travelled from Uganda was quickly identified, isolated, and fully recovered without further transmission. "Surveillance teams stayed in close contact with me, which helped me feel supported," said Axel Mouketou, one of the contacts monitored.

Similarly, in Guinea, after a child tested positive for mpox in September 2024, the national health authorities, with support from WHO, quickly published a response plan and conducted extensive contact tracing, ensuring no further transmission occurred.

Other countries such as Cameroon, Congo, Angola, Mauritius, Morocco, Zambia, and Zimbabwe have also successfully contained isolated cases, thanks to WHO's timely support and training in outbreak response.

However, 14 countries, including DRC, Burundi, Uganda, and Nigeria, still face active transmission and require enhanced surveil-

lance. WHO stresses the need for continued vigilance, especially given high levels of mobility and the emergence of more infectious sub variants. Dr Samuel Boland, Mpox Incident Manager at the WHO Regional Office for Africa, emphasized the importance of rapid detection and response. "The countries demonstrate the value of swift action in preventing larger outbreaks," he said.

Mpox remains a concern in Africa, but ongoing support from WHO and the swift response from affected nations have helped keep the outbreak under control in many

We will never have enough of calls to arms on state of education sector

A former prime minister once spent the better part of his threehour meeting with the editorial heads of Tanzanian media giving the government's stand on a number of recent developments in the country's education sector.

The most salient of the developments he addressed included the plight of teachers, state loans for students in universities and other institutions of higher learning and intermittent crises in schools, colleges and universities.

Part of the thrust of his remarks was on the visibly unpleasant developments at the National Examinations Council (Necta), notably stubborn cases of exam leakages and faulty marking and grading.

Considering the invaluable role education is expected - and supposed-a to play in human civilisation and development, it was not by accident that the PM spoke as elaborately and passionately on those issues as he did.

It was not for nothing that former US president JFK once said he saw education as the means of developing people's greatest abilities, "because in each of us there is a private hope and dream which, fulfilled, can be translated into benefit for everyone and greater strength for our na-

It was as understandable when distinguished Tanzanian diplomat Dr Salim Ahmed Salim once wondered aloud whether there were many enough people in our country aware that "teachers are more powerful than politicians because of the power they have of shaping minds".

Dr Salim wondered whether communities - parents, leaders, politicians, etc. - accorded teachers the status they deserve, including ensuring that they were paid on time and were operating from decent workplaces, residential environments, etc. It was obviously a rhetorical question - as he knew full well that things were

To his credit, the former PM referred to above did not set out to defend the government or particular institutions like his own office, district and urban councils, the Treasury or the Education ministry in connection with the challenges that have been the lot of many teachers in the country for long.

Rather, he admitted that the situation was far from tolerable and went on to declare that his office would do the most it could to clean up the mess so that teachers and other public servants could lead lives as decent and peaceful as the country's resources could truly make possible.

He also chose to stare in the face the other cruel factors making things rough and tough in institutions of learning, all the way from primary school to university.

It was obvious from the tenor and content of his remarks that the government had decided to use a combination of diplomacy and stringent disciplinary and other measures to reach an amicable a solution to each of the challenges experienced.

A keen reading of his observations showed that the government was seriously intent on making in-depth analyses of all issues in question, and then resolutely move following a carefully studied path.

Going by what was being witnessed, the government had learned crucial vital lessons from the many wars and battles where patience and strategic planning had led to victory - and was this was a battle cry meant

The war is far from over and, accordingly, the struggle must continue - on all fronts, not only as relates to education.

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
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Insights from negotiator into how COPs move needle toward healthier, more liveable planet

EVERY year, the Conference of the Parties creates a global milestone for the climate movement, setting new standards and advancing action towards a net-zero planet to sustain all life on earth. COPs provide a platform for the global community to agree on what it would take to restore planet Earth and the contributions that all signatories to the Paris Agreement should make.

The negotiations are often tense, long, and winding and, more often than not, laden with divergent views on how to build back better. As climate change takes away lives and livelihoods, leaving behind substantial loss and damage, IPS spoke to Malang Sambou Manneh, who is representing The Gambia as lead negotiator for the mitigation work program as well as the nationally determined contributions at COP29 Baku.

Sambou has seen it all, having participated at the COPs since the landmark Paris Conference and a negotiator in COP27 Sharm El-Sheikh that set the rolling for the Loss and Damage Fund, COP28 UAE, where the Just Transition from Fossil Fuel deal was struck and COP29 Baku now dubbed the Climate Finance COP.

He says ongoing negotiations started with the sixtieth sessions of the Subsidiary Body for Scientific and Technological Advice and the Subsidiary Body for Implementation (SB60) of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) in June 2024 and that the outcome shaped the agenda for COP29. But even then, the signs were there that the road ahead would not be easy.

"During SB60 in Bonn, we tried to ensure that the mitigation work program is adapted, but unfortunately, we did not reach any agreement, which means we ended up with Rule 16-no consensus. But COP29 was to be a lifeline for the mitigation agenda. Still, negotiations on mitigation have not been progressive or desir-

fice to make compared to other fossil fuelrich countries in Africa. Saying, "I can talk in the Gambia's national capacity and say we will move away from fossil fuels, and our energy transition can directly move

Stressing that while it costs resources and time to participate at any COP, it is disappointing to see some parties quickly move to Rule 16 or no consensus on critical issues such as mitigation and fossil fuels and that they were not prepared to talk. The African Group of negotiators has nonetheless remained firm and unified around the main agenda, as most of the cities and countries are in danger from climate change. But there are certainly contentious issues around, say, fossil fuels.

On fossil fuels, The Gambia has no sacrito renewables. For others, it is a tough

Knowledge gained working with communities has enriched his capacities as a negotiator in climate talks, giving him insights into how communities are interacting with the challenges and barriers caused by climate change towards sustainable climate solutions. But he says arriving at consensus at the COPs is not always easy, despite the magnitude of climateprovoked problems facing the global communities. Already, there have been many issues of contention.

within my thematic discussions, we had instances where discussions stalled. Remember, these are negotiations of Parties and some have strong positions about many different issues. Very early on, some strong Parties have already stated that they are not interested in making any political

high-level messages or statements, and there are issues they do not want to see within the mitigation work program. It is a tight rope to walk," he observes.

In such cases, it means negotiators proceed in making policy messages, which are not as effective as political high-level statements. Further saying that Africa needs to be in a strategic position to interpret COP29 text contextually as it is the only way that COP decisions can translate into changing

"I am very disappointed to see that coming here from a poor country is a big sacrifice, only to reach here, and the technical people are not interested in talking to each other over these issues. There has to be total consensus, so if one Party backs out of any of these issues, there is no consensus,'

Sambou does not like what he has seen thus far at COP29. He feels the talks lacked the push and momentum needed to deliver an ambitious outcome and especially around mitigation. He faults developing countries for their lukewarm approach and even hostile take on mitigation.

While he understands that developing countries in Africa see embracing the mitigation agenda as translating to a total change of their lifestyles and systems, "we are 58 years behind in terms of development, and it would be best to move forward with practices, lifestyles, and systems that align with the climate agenda."

"Mitigation is not a burden for us; it is an action that we must all partake in. For instance, it is about methods of consumption and production that are responsible, sustainable, and in line with the SDGs. We have to be wise enough and say, 'Let us save the planet' because we are not yet contaminated, but we can also control how the things are moving," he ob-

On what a deal of a lifetime would look like, Sambou speaks of the need for "high-level messages of commitment on mitigation from every responsible country represented at COP29. That pledges that are in place are fulfilled. Developed nations are paying the cost of climate change. More renewables and tripling of renewable energy. Climate accountability and transparency and a substantial reduction of emissions, as this will save us all from the little islands and small countries, poor and underdeveloped nations are looking at COPs for a much-needed lifeline."

Digital business taxation format embedded in registration, levies

THE Institute of Tax Administration has been detailed to conduct targeted research to help the government effectively address challenges the taxing of online and international businesses entail.

This may initially look complicated, but then soon later one discovers it isn't that complicated - as what it all means may be that the government isn't satisfied with what currently ob-

The pain is lack of a proper shop where the business volume is visible, or electronic receipts to which the revenue authorities would presumably be connected, meaning a much happier 'system'.

A Treasury deputy permanent secretary laid out this task for ITA at the graduation ceremony the institute held at its premises in Dar es Salaam recently.

The official underlined the government's wish to close revenue gaps and combat tax evasion in the evolving digital economy.

Also clarified is what is ordinarily meant by 'digital economy', as it implies that the digital window or aspect of routine economic activity becomes a sphere for massive taxation schemes - or differently, massive evasion. Any commercial activity where one doesn't need to open formal shop premises which can be registered as a company and presumably show returns to the tax authorities, or permit them to assess such businesses, is located in the informal sector.

Whenever informal sector activity comes up, there is a preliminary acceptance that these people are merely eking out a living, doing much of the work at home the way many small traders in the form of vendors do their work by pacing up and down the streets.

One lesson in our recent experience before ITA academics get going on the research journey to taxing online sales relates to what happened when a Treasury brainwave settled on mobile phone cash transactions as an untaxed area.

There were people being taxed for receiving money but not for being paid a salary or selling any goods. As it is ministerial authorities that did all the thinking, there was no debate on whether such practices were justi-

There are significant parallels with efforts by a big number of Western countries to demand large amounts of revenues from big telecommunications firms that are also internet service providers.

For example, some countries have ruled that the search engine Google pay their newspapers for using their contents online, whereas those reading that content don't pay for content but for airtime.

In that case, the countries risked seeing the internet search engine shut business in such atmosphere, clearly a lose-lose situation.

In essence, the problems the government faces in that enhanced taxation mode on internet-driven business isn't much different from tagging vendors with tax bills even in the absence of shop frames for which they could still assess the busi-

Internet activity is tied up with purchasing bundles, and the communications regulator must be knowing full well how much has been sold.

GROECOLOGY helps rural farmers to enhance their livelihoods while promoting ecological balance and community well-being as it focuses on using natural processes, reducing reliance on industrial produced agricultural inputs like fertilizers and pesticides.

Agroecology preserves biodiversity, which supports long-term soil health and crop productivity. It is a cost effective way of farming as it minimises dependency on costly chemical inputs, thus allowing farmers to reduce expenses and increase profit. It supports smallscale farmers and champions' biodiversity, soil health, and climate resilience.

In Liwale District, Lindi Region where the German Development Agency (GIZ) in collaboration with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Tourism is implementing the Mitigation of Human-Wildlife Conflict project, farmers in 11 villages that are involved in the project have been trained on how to practice sustainable farming-the activity which is implemented by SWISSAID Tanzania.

The villages are Turuki, Kitogoro, Mtawatawa, Mtawango, Nanjegeja, Chimbuko, Mkutano, Ngumbu, Nahoro, Naluleo and Kimbemba.

Anthony Kawishe, focal person for GIZ and SWIS-SAID Tanzania projects in the district said the organization has been supporting smallholder farmers in Liwale District to establish vegetable gardens as a way of minimising impacts caused by Human-Wildlife

According to Kawishe, extension officers were trained in various agroecological methods, including the use of natural pesticides to control pests and diseases, and producing organic fertilizers such as compost from plant residues and livestock manure. These practices aim to reduce chemical use, safeguard human and environmental health as well as promoting sustainable farming technologies.

Following the training, extension officers returned to the villages and were tasked with a number of activities including formation of farmer's groups. He said a total of 24 farmer groups were established, each consisting of 10 to 15 members.

These groups were trained on agroecological practices and were provided with relevant materials, such as watering cans, pesticide application tools, bio-fertilizer production equipment, and seeds for crops like tomatoes, cabbage, spinach, and green peppers.

Success stories

Demonstration farms were established to teach agroecological methods to villagers. In Mkutano vil-

lage, a group of farmers has already harvested some crops, being able to save over 100,000/-. Other groups are at different stages of implementation.

Kawishe emphasized that farmers must strictly follow agroecological principles by avoiding the use of industrial fertilizers.

He added that plans are to make sure villagers apply similar farming tech- added.

nologies for other crops such as sesame and maize, noting SWISSAID Tanzania has shown willingness to support farmers practice agroecology for such crops in the coming framing season.

"The world is increasingly focusing on environmental conservation and protection of human health, thus making agroecology a timely solution," he

Mwanahamis Abeid from Mtawango village said that despite its benefits, farmers face challenges such as limited access to raw materials for organic fertilizers.

"Livestock manure is not freely available; it has to be purchased. Some farmers lack relevant equipment to produce pesticides," said Abeid whose group has 10 dedicated

members involving in the cultivation of vegetables.

Faraji Ngunde from the same village highlighted the need for further education on bio-fertilizer production and pest control. He however acknowledged that the use of smelly repellent fence has been effective in deterring elephants, which previously caused significant damage to their vegetable gardens.

Future plans

Yunufu Luwango, an extension officer in Turuki village commended GIZ for coming up with project. He said training on preparation of smelly repellents as well as how to make fences has greatly helped farmers keep elephants away from their farms.

Deborah Missana, GIZ Technical Advisor, acknowledged the high cost of some raw materials for organic farming, encouraging farmers to focus on yields rather than costs.

Missana said they have been insisting on villagers to embark on community collaborative farming-a formal arrangement where farmers work together to cultivate crops in a community farm. This helps them to improve security as they work together to protect their crops from wild animals.

Community collaborative farming also increases productivity as farmers share resources and knowledge.

"When farmers cultivate their crops in one area it makes it easier to manage resources and enhance farm security,' said Missana, adding that through agroecology they are equipping farmers with sustainable farming skills, economic resilience, and long-term environmental conservation, thus leaving a lasting impact on the community.

Climate crisis escalates as Africa and island nations demand action, walk out in protest

TIATORS from some of the world's most pow-erful economies held a heated and divisive meeting in the early hours of Saturday 23rd November 2024 as they worked to push through a climate financing deal that could see \$300 billion per year directed toward developing nations.

This funding, aimed at helping these countries mitigate the impacts of climate change and transition to cleaner energy, had been touted as a breakthrough in global climate negotiations. However, despite hours of contentious talks, the proposal failed to break the deadlock at COP29 in Baku, Azerbaijan.

At the heart of the impasse were developing countries, particularly island nations, and least-developed countries, which argued that the proposed \$300 billion was far too little to address the scale of the challenges they faced.

These nations, already experiencing the devastating effects of climate change, pushed hard for a more ambitious figure-\$500 billion per year. They demanded this financial commitment to secure their survival and to ensure that the world's wealthiest nations lived up to their responsibility in combating the climate crisis.

"We feel as though we are left with nothing from this COP," said Cedric Schuster, the environment minister for Samoa, representing a bloc of 39 island nations. "Is this how we treat the countries with the moral high ground in the process, who stand to lose the most and have already lost so much?"

On Aljazeera, frustrated and disillusioned, island nations and leastdeveloped countries walked out of the meeting, signaling their deep dissatisfaction with the lack of progress. The walkout left the summit on the verge of collapse, and the chances of reaching a meaningful agreement appeared slim.

As tensions reached a boiling point, European Union Climate Commissioner Wopke Hoekstra acknowledged the gravity of the situation. "It is unclear whether we will succeed," Hoekstra said, underscoring the possibility that the summit could fail to produce a



consensus.

The last COP to end without an agreement was in 2000, and a failure now could push the critical climate financing negotiations into 2025, when the geopolitical landscape may shift dramatically with the potential return of former President Donald Trump to the White House.

For African nations, the stakes were especially high. Vice President Philip Mpango, representing President Samia Suluhu Hassan of Tanzania, voiced his country's deep concerns about the lack of progress on clean energy financing.

"We cannot afford to continue to suffer in the name of development," Mpango said during a live debate on Al Jazeera. His remarks resonated deeply across the continent, as many African nations are already bearing the brunt of climate change's impact, from extreme droughts to devastating

"We need financial support not just for survival but for sustainable development," Mpango continued. "Africa cannot wait any longer for climate finance that addresses its energy needs. This is a matter of survival."

The pressure on wealthier nations to increase their financial commitments has been mounting for years, with developing countries calling for urgent action to help them transition to cleaner energy and adapt to climate impacts.

Nevertheless, the negotiators from wealthier nations-especially the United States, Australia, and key European powers-have been resistant to committing more than \$300 billion annually, a figure that many developing nations see as insufficient.

The new offer of \$300 billion per year by 2035 was a significant concession, increasing from an earlier proposal of \$250 billion. Yet it still fell far short of the \$500 billion target pushed by developing countries.

This updated offer emerged after an overnight meeting that began at 1 a.m. on Saturday and stretched into the early morning hours. The negotiations were described as tense and fraught with disagreements, with "lots of shouting" according to several diplomats familiar with the discussions.

Saudi Arabia's role in the discussions was particularly controversial. The oil-rich kingdom became the focal point of anger, with critics accusing it of obstructing meaningful progress on key issues, particularly the transition away from fossil fuels. Saudi Arabia had agreed in the previous COP in Dubai to a text committing the world to reduce reliance on fossil fuels, but at COP29, it resisted any substantive action toward emissions reductions.

Saudi Arabia's representatives refused to comment on the talks during the summit, but their influence on the negotiations was clear. Their refusal to discuss emissions reductions blocked progress on transitioning to cleaner energy, frustrating many delegates from developing countries who argued that fossil fuel-dependent nations should bear a heavier burden in financing the transition to green energy.

U.S. climate envoy John Podesta defended the size of the proposed offer, despite its limited scope. "The need is great," Podesta told reporters, defending the position of wealthy nations. "The offer on the table from donor countries is high, and it reflects the urgency we face."

However, developing nations did not share Podesta's optimism. For many, the offer on the table was far from enough. According to a report from the United Nations, the financing needs of developing countries run into the trillions of dollars annually.

While some of this gap could be filled by private capital, public funding from wealthy countries will be crucial in ensuring that developing nations can mitigate the impacts of climate change and build resilience against future disasters.

"The gap between what's needed and what's being offered is still enormous," said Dr. Rhoda Kifumbi, a climate expert from Uganda, in an interview during the summit. "Countries like Uganda are already facing the consequences of climate change, from droughts to food insecurity, and the financing that has been offered so far does not

match the scale of the crisis."

African leaders have long argued that the key to Africa's development lies in the ability to transition to clean energy. Rwanda, which has made significant strides in adopting renewable energy technologies, also voiced concerns about the lack of adequate financing to scale up these efforts.

"We are not asking for charity," said Emmanuel Mukeshimana, a climate expert from Rwanda. "We are asking for what is rightfully ours-equitable contributions to the global effort to address climate change."

For many African nations, COP29 was seen as a crucial opportunity to secure the financing necessary to support their energy transitions. The continent, which has historically been sidelined in global climate negotiations, faces a unique set of challenges. Not only must African nations transition to renewable energy, but they also must adapt to the climate impacts that are already causing widespread hardship.

The lack of a clear financial commitment from wealthy nations at COP29 could have serious consequences for Africa. Without sufficient support, the continent's ability to develop clean energy infrastructure, create green jobs, and build resilience to climate impacts will be severely hindered.

"If we fail to secure a financing agreement now, it will be a major setback for Africa's energy future," warned climate expert Rhoda Kifumbi from Uganda. "The global community has a responsibility to help us, not just because it's the right thing to do, but because our future is intertwined with the future of the planet."

The walkout by small island nations and least-developed countries emphasized their frustration with empty promises. As negotiations neared their end, African delegates expressed that they would prefer no deal over one that didn't address their needs. "This isn't just about moneyit's about survival," said Carlos Fuller, Belize's UN representative.

The urgency was clear: island nations and vulnerable countries made it known that they would not accept a deal that left them alone in facing the climate crisis. With the summit's final moments approaching, the world awaited whether negotiators could bridge the gap or let COP29 collapse, risking the future of millions affected by climate change.

JCABACA Valley Municipal Wildlife Reserve comprises more than 2,640 square kilometers (1,020 square miles) of semi-arid forest and tropical savannah in the heart of southern Bolivia's Chiquitania region. However, this protected area and surrounding habitat is being lost to industrial agriculture and associated fires and infrastructure development.

The Tucabaca (also referred to as "Tucavaca") reserve was the first of its kind in Bolivia when it was created 24 years ago and is situated in the municipality of Roboré in the department of Santa Cruz, near the border with Brazil. It acts as a refuge for wildlife of the Chiquitano dry forest ecosystem, which connects South America's two largest biomes: the Gran Chaco and the Amazon rainforest

Tucabaca is also inhabited by several Indigenous communities, who for millennia have protected and relied on its wetlands and rivers, forests and grass-

But today, Tucabaca's natural wealth is in danger. Roads and a bridge in the midst of a protected area

Eder Santibáñez, coordinator of the Movement in Defense of the Tucabaca Valley, told Mongabay Latam that on June 23, he and a delegation of 10 others carried out an inspection of the Tucabaca Valley and reserve, which yielded discouraging results.

The delegation's first stop was in the area surrounding the Mennonite colony of El Roble. There they were confronted with a scene they described as alarming: piles of felled trees and dry leaves ready for burning. Santibáñez said that part of the plant material had already been burned and that there was a whole field

"We are very concerned," Santibáñez told Mongabay Latam. "New threats have emerged, not only in the Tucabaca Valley, but also in the Tucabaca UCPN reserve, which is a very sensitive area that should be protected. We received images [in June 2024] that show that the Mennonites have made inroads into the protected area. We are talking about a stretch 800 metres long and eight metres wide. All this suggests that they want to take water from the Tucabaca River to irrigate their crops inside the protected area."

The delegation also found a bridge over the Tucabaca River made of wood, metal and concrete. Santibáñez could not find a sign or plaque indicating that it was a municipal, departmental or national project, but said he believed it was built by Mennonites.

"We realized it wasn't a project of the municipality or the [Santa Cruz] government," said Julio Zeber, also a member of the Movement in Defense of the Tucabaca Valley. "The structure has been there a year and a half and was built by the Mennonites. Does it have an environmental permit? Was an environmental impact assessment carried out, considering the size of the structure and its location inside a protected

Santa Cruz government officials visited the area following the delegation's inspection and verified it was not constructed with government approval. They elaborated that the project did not acquire an environmental permit nor carry out an environmental impact assessment (EIA), both mandatory requirements in Bolivia for large structures.

Zeber said the flow of the Tucabaca River had been greatly reduced, which he blamed on diversion for irrigation of Mennonite sorghum and soy plantations. A team from the Santa Cruz Environmental Quality Service (SDCAM) confirmed that the bridge had also contributed to contamination and reduced flow of the Tucabaca River. They said local residents told them that Mennonite colonists were responsible for its construction.

Latam contacted Mennonite colonies in the area for comment, but received no response.

Mining and 'ghost communities'

In addition to infrastructure development, deforestation and water exploitation, Tucabaca is facing another threat: gold mining.

During a visit on June 23, the delegation of the Movement in Defense of the Tucabaca Valley found evidence of mining activity inside the protected area.

"We could see mining was being carried out seven kilometres from the community of Aguas Calientes,

inside the [Tucabaca] protected area," Santibáñez told Mongabay Latam. "There have been reports of miners coming into the area since 2023.

The team from the Santa Cruz government also acknowledged the mining activity and said that the case would be referred to the relevant authority.

Mauro Mendoza, a resident of Santiago de Chiquitos, a municipality near Tucabaca Valley, was among the delegation. He said he was beside himself when he saw the deforestation that had taken place inside the protected area.

"We did the inspection and saw extensive felling of trees in the valley, but also inside the protected area," Mendoza said. "[In June, we were] experiencing a water crisis as a result of the deforestation being carried out by the Mennonites and ranch owners."

María René Barrancos, an SDCAM technician, said that during their visit the team observed the clearing of primary forest with high-conservation-value tree species on five properties. Barrancos said that the Forest and Land Authority would be informed so it could take the necessary action.

Rubén Darío Arias Ortiz, a member of the National Coordinating Committee for the Defense of Indigenous Peasant Territories and Protected Areas also expressed concern about the reserve.

Arias Ortiz, who lives in the municipality of Roboré, said that land grabs have been taking place in Tucabaca Valley for a decade and are now encroaching on the protected area.

"These men came, divided up the forest and left. They fenced the area with barbed wire, posts and railings," Arias Ortiz told Mongabay Latam. "They're people with money. They did this in the buffer zone of the protected area. What I'm afraid of is that they'll go into the reserve to extract timber; there have already been complaints [from community members] about land grabs inside the protected area."

Arias Ortiz added that "ghost communities" created in the Tucabaca Valley have now moved into the buffer zone of the protected area. He said two communities in particular are about to expand into the reserve: Túpac Amaru and 26 de Julio.

Ghost communities are communities that enter protected areas or state land to carry out illegal logging and agricultural activities.

Ambiguous legality

The issue is complicated by the fact that encroachment of agricultural communities into the Tucabaca protected area may not be outright illegal, according to Iván Quezada, assembly member of the Department of Santa Cruz.

"The biggest problem is that there are authorizations for settlements inside the protected area [awarded by the National Institute for Agrarian Reform] amounting

to 7,000 hectares," Quezada said. "They haven't yet entered because there aren't any roads, but the door is open for them to enter legally.'

Before becoming a departmental assembly member, Quezada was the mayor of the municipality of Roboré and fought against such encroachment while in office. One of these battles was in October 2018, when a group consisting of 33 families deforested 55 hectares of land, under the pretext that they had the support of INRA and the Forest and Land Authority to consolidate their community, which they called Túpac Amaru.

Quezada, together with other members of the Roboré Management Committee, managed to stop this community from going in and causing more deforestation. Despite these efforts, he said that Túpac Amaru is now encroaching into the re-

Pablo Sauto, Secretary of Sustainable Development and Environment of the Government of Santa Cruz, said that during an inspection carried out in the area in January 2024, community members told them they had INRA authorization to settle in the buffer zone. He showed Mongabay Latam four certificates awarded by INRA to four people, including three siblings, who were granted 8,000 hectares. In total, according to the government of Santa Cruz, INRA awarded a total of

INRA, however, denied authorizing settlement permits both in the Tucabaca Valley and the municipal reserve itself. In an official statement, INRA urged Sauto to "avoid deflecting attention onto internal conflicts of the government of Santa Cruz, such as the temporary substitution of the governor, and focus instead on the issue of land."

Quezada said land trafficking is also taking place. He said there is a community called Tamarindos that was granted 17,000 hectares, but not a single person lives there. Quezada said that while visiting the area he found a man clearing plots and digging wells, who told him he had acquired the plots from other community members.

Quezada also said he is concerned about another ghost community called Morales, which appropriated 3,000 hectares, 500 of which are located inside the Tucabaca protected area.

"These land grabs can't be allowed," he said. "As long as INRA's resolutions still stand, we're going to fight them. We'll take action, legal measures in the departmental as-

Becker Barba Frías is a Tucabaca park ranger and said ghost communities can enter the protected area at any time and illegally extract timber. He also expressed concern about the illegal burning of nearby vegetation to prepare land for agriculture, which causes forest fires that impact the reserve. Satellite data from the U.S. National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) analyzed by monitoring platform Global Forest Watch show fire activity in Tucababa has been "unusually high" in 2024. Many of the fire alerts in the reserve appear to coincide with burning in nearby cropland, indicating they may have spread from fires set to clear land for agriculture.

Zoila Zevallos, former head of the community-based organization Tucabaca Defense Committee, said the reserve was created at the request of local residents a quarter-century ago and is now defended by those same residents.

"We've joined with other institutions seeking to defend the Tucabaca Valley, but we have no other support," Zevallos said. "We don't want mining to destroy our protected area, we don't want the Mennonites to destroy our protected area, we don't want land grabbers to destroy our protected area. We asked for the reserve and we're defending it ourselves."

Beyond land tenure, youth land rights nurtures socio-economic development

FRICA is the youngest continent in the world, with a median age of ■around 20. This rising generation of youth presents an enormous opportunity for socioeconomic development. But for Africa's young people to unlock their full potential, they need full enjoyment of land rights - a cornerstone for economic opportunity and social empowerment.

Unfortunately, laws and customary practices related to land still pose barriers for most youth. Customary laws and traditional leadership often exclude young people from accessing land or participating in land governance, and statutory laws and policies often lack youth-specific provisions that would guarantee land rights.

In Tanzania, for example, the National Land Policy and subsequent land laws lack specific provisions on youth land rights and quotas for youth representation on land governance and decision-making processes. Inheritance laws uphold customary norms that discriminate against the inheritance rights of daughters - placing them in the 3rd tier of heirs. Young widows lack inheritance rights altogether.

In Liberia, on the other hand, the Land Rights Act, of 2018, seeks to ensure equal access and protection with respect to land ownership, use, and management, including ensuring customary land protection and equal youth representation in land management committees. Land ownership is accorded to all Liberian citizens regardless

of their identity, custom, ethnicity, tribe, gender, or age, among others. Yet, youth face massive challenges with implementation, especially within customary laws, which favor young men over young women and girls in the succession process.

Across Africa this is a critical issue, influencing diverse ripple effects on the livelihoods of young people who account for more than 400 million people aged 15-35. In fact, youth rights to land go beyond land tenure - it is the foundation for the African Union's vision for "people-driven development" as laid out in Agenda 2063: The Africa

Aspiration 6 of the AU Agenda 2063 describes an Africa where development meets the needs of women, youth and children. Member states are required to include youth and women in all aspects of decision-making to mainstream youth issues in all development agendas. This recognizes the valuable contribution of women and youth towards the development of the continent. While there are many ways women and youth can drive Africa's development, agriculture remains the largest employment sector, especially in rural areas. Thus, land rights are key, if the continent is to maximize its potential for development.

While Africa's governments are making strides in adopting policies to account for the unique needs of youth, legal and policy frameworks, customary norms, the intergenerational gap between elders and youth, and a lack of youth-centered data all persist in inhibiting youth land rights.

To address these challenges, Landesa, a member of the Youth and Land Multi-Stakeholder Platform of Africa (YLMPA) partnered with the Youth Initiatives for Land in Africa (YILAA) and other partners to convene the International Youth and Land Governance Conference in Africa (CIGOFA4), from 20 - 24 October in Arusha, Tanzania. The event brought together youth, policy makers, CSOs and youth-led organizations, practitioners and traditional leaders from across Africa to discuss, learn

and shape youth governance issues for the acceleration of youth land rights in Africa.

CIGOFA4 offered a dynamic platform for youth-led discussion on access to land and participation in land governance, as well as facilitating intergenerational dialogue between youth and traditional leaders, some of whom express skepticism about the importance of youth land

Such dialogues are vital to close the intergenerational gap, ensuring that youth can benefit from the mentorship and expertise that elders can provide, while addressing misconceptions elders may have about a lack of interest in land rights and agricultural livelihoods among young people.

CIGOFA4's key takeaways and recommendations include developing and implementing youthcentered land laws and policies to mainstream youth land considerations in land tenure frameworks; improving efforts to collect disaggregated data on youth land rights to better inform decision making; addressing customary norms that discriminate against youth land rights, including the rights of girls; and generating up-to-date information on the status of youth land rights at country levels.

With progress on youth land rights, we can help ensure that the next generation of young Africans will be able to secure their futures, putting the continent on the path toward socio-economic development and realizing "the Africa We

Africa leading in next-gen drone technology trials

FRICA has become an attractive testing location for drones. In Kenya, Airbus subsidiary AALTO is testing high-altitude drone 'Zephyr'. Tom Guilfoy, Country Manager for AALTO, spoke with drone pilot Lakoi Takona on establishing a hub in Africa and how the drone technology can help Africa. Here are the key excerpts from their conversation:

Who is Tom Guilfoy?

I am the Country Manager for Kenya and Vice President of AALTO Port, where I oversee AALTO's market entry, company setup and operations in Kenya. Kenya has been selected as the first launch and landing location for our drone Zephyr, a solar-powered, stratospheric High-Altitude Platform Station (HAPS).

Before joining AALTO, I served as an executive at Metrea (formerly Meta Aerospace), where I specialized in contractor-owned and operated aircraft (COCO) solutions for national security stakeholders. I am also a veteran of the United States Navy and have served on several non-executive boards and commissions.

Why was Kenya chosen as the location for the first AALTO Port?

A comprehensive in-house global meteorological study identified Kenya as an optimal location, due to favourable weather and nearly 10 months access to the stratosphere. Kenya is also a high-tech, green economic leader in Africa with a skilled workforce, making it highly attractive for foreign direct invest-

Establishing a permanent launch and landing location has been a priority since the AALTO spin-off from Airbus, to facilitate the industrial and commercial roadmap of the Zephyr drone. We need regular access to the stratosphere to complete the aircraft's

AALTO is committed to making long-term investment in Kenya over the next three to five years, supported by strong partnerships with national and local stakeholders.

Tell us more about the drone 'Zephyr', including its capabilities, and what are High-Altitude **Platform Stations (HAPS)?**

HAPS are unmanned air vehicles that can hold a fixed position in the stratosphere, typically operating between 60,000 - 80,000 feet. They offer continuous coverage and flexibility, functioning similarly to satellites but at a fraction of the cost.

AALTO's Zephyr is fixed-wing HAPS with a wingspan similar to that of a passenger jet (25 meters), yet it weighs only 75 kg. Powered entirely by solar energy, Zephyr can stay aloft for months at a time; its current flight-time record is over 64 days in the stratosphere.

As a versatile platform, Zephyr can support various applications, including low-latency 5G directto-device (D2D) connectivity, as well as high-quality earth observation services. These capabilities enable solutions in mobile Greenfield connectivity, disaster management, border protection, and precision agri-

Our clients include government and commercial sectors across Europe, Asia-Pacific and the Middle


Zephyr adds a unique dimension to complement existing communications infrastructure, adding a new capability layer from the stratosphere.

How has the journey been so far in establishing a hub in Africa?

As with any new technology, our initial focus has been on engaging key partners to educate the regulatory communities about Zephyr and our goal to position Kenya as a leader in stratospheric innovation.

Kenyan authorities, led by the Kenya Space Agency and the Kenya Civil Aviation Authority, have demonstrated a visionary approach by recognising the potential of HAPS technology's potential for resilience planning, connectivity, and observation.

After several months of discussion with the regulatory bodies, the military, and various government



agencies in aviation, communications and space, AALTO has secured the necessary approvals to conduct experimental testing. This makes Kenya a first mover on HAPS technology that is growing increasingly in demand.

Additionally, we are considered part of the Kenyan government's Africa Green Industrialisation Initiative (AGII), programme by President William Ruto to drive African agency in the energy transition. Companies involved in AGII for a key part of Kenya's investment ecosystem.

What are your future plans for Africa after the first successful drone tests?

Our vision for the AALTO Port in Kenya is to establish a hub for stratospheric technology in-country. This will include land, infrastructure, a purpose-built runway, a hangar, a final assembly line, an operations centre, and an administrative hub in the country. This is further down the line as we look at commercial operations scaling-

Our immediate priority is to conduct testing from the initial AALTO Port site.

What is your final message for Africa's tech savvy youth and those interested in drone technology?

Thanks to Kenya's forwardthinking vision, we are establishing a global pathway for Zephyr.

Kenya is at the heart of this new growth industry, which will create opportunities for Africa's tech-savvy youth and contribute to Kenya's leadership position as a high-tech, green economic pioneer on the continent.

We will continue to engage and cooperate with our Kenvan partners and look forward to connecting with the wider community, particularly the next generation.

We are excited to build these connections in the coming years. Originally developed for military use, drones-also known as unmanned aerial vehicles-are now being used for various purposes, including agriculture, package delivery, environmental monitoring and surveillance, among other uses.

With demand for drone technology on the rise, manufacturers are producing a wide range of drones in different sizes to meet the needs diverse markets. Africa has become an attractive testing location for drones thanks to its relatively clear airspaces, vast uninhabited land, and a pressing need for innovative solutions to long-standing challenges.

As technological advancements continue to drive progress, African countries are emerging as inaugural test hubs for the unmanned aircraft of tomorrowshowing that the sky is no longer the limit.

Rwanda and Kenya are some of the African countries where drone testing has taken place.

For example, when the USbased drone manufacturer Zipline needed to test its operations in 2016, it chose Rwanda. The company then went on to partner with the Rwandan government to establish new drone delivery sites across the country, which are now being used to deliver healthcare supplies to hospitals.

Speaking at an interview with ITU (the UN agency for digital technologies), the minister for ICT Innovation for Rwanda, Paula Ingabire, said her government was looking at ways of leveraging emerging technologies to transform the way they do business in Rwanda.

"We are using drones to deliver blood to different hospitals and healthcare centres across Rwanda. We have seen a lot of improvement in healthcare delivery, thanks to drones. We are able to save lives. It used to take us 3 hours to deliver blood, now it has come down to 26 minutes using drones," said Ingabire.

Elsewhere in Kenya, Airbus subsidiary AALTO announced in December 2023 plans to debut a first-ofits-kind drone airport, named AALTO Port, in Laikipia, Kenya, to be used to test the operation of their high-altitude drone known as 'Zephyr'.

Kenya makes a great location for such drone airport: a well-educated workforce, an established drone industry, supportive authorities, as well as its location near the equator. Launching at the equator gives the aircraft additional speed.

Laikipia was chosen in particular due to its open space and flat terrain, a requirement for drone Zephyr's unique high-altitude ascent. Also, the favourable weather in the region allows the drone to operate 10 out of 12 months of the year.

Tom Guilfoy, AALTO's Country Manager for Kenya, told Africa Renewal that establishing a permanent launch and landing location is a priority for the company's plans to develop Zephyr.

"We need regular access to the stratosphere to finalise the development of the aircraft. A comprehensive meteorological study identified Kenya as an optimal location, due to benign weather conditions and up to 10 months' access to the stratosphere. Kenya is also a high-tech, green economic pioneer in Africa that is highly attractive for foreign direct investment with a skilled workforce," said Mr. Guilfoy, who is also Vice President of AALTO Port.

High-altitude drones, or High-Altitude Platform Station (HPAS), are some of the latest developments in the drone technology. These drones are designed to operate in the stratosphere-roughly 60,000 -70,000 feet above the earth, which is about twice the altitude of commercial flights and well above most weather patterns.

Although the HPAS classification means any aircraft capable of sustained stratospheric flight, most resemble traditional long wingspan gliders. They operate almost as pseudo-satellites rather than drones and are therefore capable of sustained flight for weeks on end. They powered by solar energy to enable 100% emission-free operation. During the day, they collect solar power to operate, and during the night, they use stored battery power to continue fly-

These high-altitude drones can serve as mobile signal towers, carrying payloads for internet connectivity and earth observation. This is why telecommunications companies love them.

AALTO is pushing the adoption of commercial HPAS drone systems.

Zephyr drone

Zephyr is considered one of the most advanced commercial stratospheric aircraft to date. With a wingspan of 25 metres and weighing just 75kg, it holds the current record for the longest sustained

flight of any unmanned aerial vehicle - lasting 64 days in the air. This feat places it within hours of breaking the record for the longest flight by any aircraft ever.

Zephyr can also function as a telecommunications tower in the sky, covering 7,500 square kilometers and capable of replacing 250 terrestrial towers on the ground, including in difficult terrains.

The drone's most notable use is earth observation. Using a highresolution camera developed by the parent company, Airbus, Zephyr delivers near real-time, high-resolution video for maritime surveillance, border monitoring, mapping, forest fires, and emergency response.

Mr. Guilfoy explained that AALTO is committed to investing long-term investment in Kenya over the next three to five years, adding that "as part of this, we are increasingly present in-country, with warm support from national stakeholders and partners.'

Notably, the establishment of AALTO Port will require a robust supply chain connecting the company's headquarters in the UK to the Kenyan site in Laikipia County. The project will also create job opportunities benefitting local communities.

At the same time, building the necessary infrastructure, including roads, facilities, and ports, will be critical part of the effort.

As AALTO plans to open multiple facilities in the future, the demand for skilled labour will definitely increase. Although initially most of the job opportunities will focus on infrastructure development, more technical roles will emerge as operations ramp up.

Guilfoy explained the company's activities in Kenya and how it will benefit the local community.

"Our goal is to develop a Kenyan workforce that includes both unskilled and highly skilled labour. Skilled labour will include aircraft mechanics (engineers), remote pilots, network operators, and ultimately final assembly production staff and management," said Mr. Guilfoy, adding that these professionals will carry out, maintenance and repairs. They will be inspecting and servicing the delicate solar surface of the airframe.

Although initially the team at the AALTO headquarters will handle the most high-level operations, this will change as "AALTO transitions successfully from test programs to commercialization."

Kenya now has a unique opportunity to build a workforce equipped to support AALTO Port operations.

Support for relevant university or college programs, including funding, will be key to ensuring a steady supply of local talent for higher-level roles at these testing hubs in Africa.

The demand for workers in the drone technology sector is expected to rise as the new industry continues to expand globally.

Preparations for next national household budget survey start

HE National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) and the Office of the Chief Government Statistician (OCGS) Zanzibar are preparing a new comprehensive national wide Household Budget Survey (HBS) to unveil the living standards and rate of poverty in the country.

The survey of which its results will come out in 2026 will be conducted across ten regions with the biggest number of population as per the Census 2022 results.

NBS Statistician General, Dr Albina Chuwa told journalists in Dar es Salaam on Saturday that the importance of this Survey is to assess

the state of economic growth for individuals and the nation which continues to grow at an annual promising rate of 5.6 percent.

"This Survey is going to highlight the state of poverty where the last time in the 2017/18 survey it was measured at 26.4 percent," said Dr. Chuwa.

She said that until the release of the results of the Survey, the poverty indicators in cities and rural areas will have decreased further. This Survey also aims to determine the current state of food production.

Another goal of the Survey is to determine how the country has succeeded in implementing goal number one of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) on

zero hunger and SDG2 on poverty alleviation come 2030.

Dr. Chuwa said that this Survey has a total of 29 modules that will focus on various sectoral areas. The one-year survey will cover 16.480 households from the Islands and the Mainland.

"In this Survey, which involves the World Bank as a donor, all the information provided by the citizens will remain confidential and will be used for statistical purposes only," said Dr. Chuwa.

She said in that Survey, probability proportion to size is determined by Census 2022 which is the basis of the Sample Survey.

Salum Kassim Ali, Chief Statistician from the OCGS Zanzibar, said that in the early stages of implementation the governments of the United Republic and Zanzibar have brought together the secretaries and directors of programs in different ministries to discuss the preparation of the survey.

"We have discussed the preparation stage that we have already reached so far. The expectation is that at the beginning of January 2025 we will start this Survey for selected households," he said

He explained that next month special training for researchers will be held in the districts of Moshi, Pemba and Unguja which will include 1,368 participants.

He asked the citizens to prepare to cooperate with the researchers when they arrive in their areas to collect research information.

Truck owners eye BRT opportunities

New agri-food project to enhance food security

The Netherlands Development Organization (SNV) in Tanzania is collaborating with other organizations to implement an ambitious agri-food project aimed at enhancing food security and resilience among smallholder households in five key regions of the country.

Dubbed NOURISH Tanzania, the five-year initiative (2024-2028) is led by SNV Tanzania in partnership with Farm Africa, the Research, Community, and Organizational Development (RECODA), MIICO, and T-MARC. It aims to impact 168,000 smallholder farmers, 100 micro, small, and medium enterprises (MSMEs), and farmer organizations, with a special focus on vulnerable households.

The project targets regions with high rates of food insecurity and malnutrition, including Singida, Dodoma, and Manyara in the central-northern zone-areas suffering from acute food insecurity-as well as Songwe and Rukwa in the Southern Highlands, which face chronic malnutrition.

Rauscher, the

Team Leader for the NOURISH Project at SNV Tanzania, explained that the initiative is designed to support smallholder farmer households heavily reliant on agriculture and struggling with food insecurity and nutrition challenges.

"Research shows that smallholder farmers in these regions often have low productivity due to limited access to quality inputs and extension services, coupled with unpredictable weather pat-

The initiative seeks to increase and diversify food supplies in local markets by fostering collaborations among market players, promoting digital solutions, and empowering smallholder farmers and MSMEs.

Efforts will focus on promoting nutritious di-

ets, household food budgeting, and empowering women to make household decisions.

"We are focusing on improving the utilization of household resources to provide diverse and nutritious food while targeting four high-potential value chains: sorghum, sun-

flower, common beans, and vegetables," Rauscher added.

According to SNV Tanzania Communication Officer Neema Kimaro, the project has already conducted extensive training sessions for its beneficiaries. Local partners RE-CODA and MIICO trained

478 lead farmers, 115 agricultural extension officers, and 56 coaches in good agronomic practices (GAP), climate-smart agriculture (CSA), soil and water management, post-harvest handling, and demo-plot establishment.

"Each lead farmer will now train approximately

50 smallholder farmers in their communities and establish demonstration plots to showcase recommended techniques and inputs," Kimaro noted.

The project also partnered with the Tanzania Agriculture Research Institute (TARI) to provide 115 ward agricultural extension officers with training on soil health, testing techniques, and fertilizer options.

The initiative has facilitated business-to-consumer meetings across Singida, Manyara, Dodoma, Rukwa, and Songwe, connecting farmers with seed and input suppliers. "These events allow farmers to access information on available products and purchase seeds directly," Kimaro explained.

The NOURISH Project aligns with key government frameworks, including the National Five-Year Development Plan (FYDP III, 2021/22-2025/26), the Agriculture Sector Development Programme Phase II (ASDP II, 2018/19-2027/28), the National Climate Response Strategy (2022-2026), and the Nutrition-Sensitive Agriculture Action Plan (2022/23-

UN climate conference agrees to triple funding to developing nations

he UN Climate Change Conference (COP29) has announced a new finance goal to help countries to protect their people and economies against climate disasters, and share in the vast benefits of the clean energy boom.

With a central focus on climate finance, COP29 brought together nearly 200 countries in Baku, Azerbaijan, and reached a breakthrough agreement that will triple finance to developing countries, from the previous goal of USD100 billion annually, to USD300 billion annually by

It was also agreed to secure efforts of all actors to work together to scale up finance to developing countries, from public and private sources, to the amount of USD1.3 trillion per year by 2035.

Known formally as the New Collective Quantified on Climate Finance (NCQG), it was agreed after two weeks of intensive negotiations and several years of preparatory work, in a process that requires all nations to unanimously agree on every word of the agreement.

"This new finance goal is an insurance policy for humanity, amid worsening climate impacts hitting every country," said Simon Stiell, Executive Secretary of UN Climate Change. "But like any insurance policy - it only works - if premiums are paid in full, and on time. Promises must be kept, to protect billions of lives.'

"It will keep the clean energy boom growing, helping all countries to share in its huge benefits: more jobs, stronger growth, cheaper and cleaner energy for all.'

The International Energy Agency expects global clean energy investment is set to exceed USD2 trillion for the first time in 2024.

The new finance goal at COP29 builds on significant strides forward on global climate action at COP27, which agreed an historic Loss and Damage Fund, and COP28, which delivered a global agreement to transition away from all fossil fuels in energy systems swiftly and fairly, triple renewable energy and boost climate

COP29 also reached agreement on carbon markets - which several previous COPs had not been able to achieve.

These agreements will help countries deliver their climate plans more quickly and cheaply, and make faster progress in halving global emissions this decade, as required by science.

Stiell also acknowledged that the



agreement reached in Baku did not meet all Parties' expectations, and substantially more work is still needed next year on several crucial

"No country got everything they wanted, and we leave Baku with a mountain of work to do," said Stiell. "The many other issues we need to progress may not be headlines but they are lifelines for billions of people. So this is no time for victory laps, we need to set our sights and redouble our efforts on the road to Belem."

The finance agreement at COP29 comes as stronger national climate plans (Nationally Determined Contributions, or NDCs) become due from all countries next year. These new climate plans must cover all greenhouse gases and all sectors, to keep the 1.5°C warming limit within reach. COP29 saw two G20 countries - the UK and Brazil - signal clearly that they plan to ramp up climate action in their NDCs 3.0, because they are entirely in the interests of their economies and peo-

"We still have a very long road ahead, but here in Baku we took another important step forward," said Stiell. "The UN Paris Agreement is humanity's life-raft; there is nothing else. So here in Baku and all of the countries represented in this room we're taking that journey forward together."

A notable achievement during the past two weeks was the progress made on carbon markets. After nearly a decade of work, countries have agreed on the final building blocks that set out how carbon markets will operate under the Paris Agreement, making country-to-country trading and a carbon crediting mechanism fully operational.

On country-to-country trading (Article 6.2), the decision out of COP29 provides clarity on how countries will authorize the trade of carbon credits and how registries tracking this will operate. And there is now reassurance that environmental integrity will be ensured up front through technical reviews in a transparent process.

On day one of COP29, countries agreed standards for a centralized carbon market under the UN (Article 6.4 mechanism). This is good news for developing countries, who will benefit from new flows of finance. And it is particularly good news for least developed countries, who will get the capacity-building support they need to get a foothold in the

This mechanism, known as the Paris Agreement Crediting Mechanism, is underpinned by mandatory checks for projects against strong environmental and human rights protections, including safeguards that ensure a project can't go ahead without explicit, informed agreement from Indigenous Peoples. It also allows anyone affected by a project to appeal a decision or file a complaint.

Under the text agreed on Article 6.4, there is a clear mandate for the UN carbon market to align with science. It tasks the Body getting this market up and running to consider the best available science across all work going forward.

The work on carbon markets doesn't stop in Baku. The Supervisory Body setting up the new carbon crediting mechanism has been handed a long 2025 to-do list by Parties and will continue to be accountable to them.

Transparency

Transparent climate reporting made big strides forward in Baku, building a stronger evidence base to strengthen climate policies over time, and helping to identify financing needs and opportunities. To date, 13 Parties have now submitted their

first Biennial Transparency Reports (BTR) - due from all Parties by the end of the year. Andorra, Azerbaijan, the European Union, Germany, Guyana, Japan, Kazakhstan, Maldives, Netherlands, Panama, Singapore, Spain, and Türkiye have led the way on transparent climate reporting, and set an example for others to follow. The list of received BTRs is continuously being updated here.

In addition, all transparency negotiating items concluded successfully at COP29, with Parties expressing their appreciation for the timely completion of the Enhanced Transparency Framework (ETF) reporting tools, the technical trainings, and the support provided to developing countries for reporting under the ETF that took place in 2024. A total of 42 events were organized

under #Together4Transparency, a UNFCCC collaborative initiative that promotes climate transparency with Parties and non-Party stakeholders. These events emphasized the vital role of transparency in preparing NDCs and net-zero pathways, as well as in recognizing climate action from non-Party stakeholders. Events included high-level sessions, mandated events and training sessions to prepare countries for their BTRs, as well as to equip technical experts for

the upcoming review process.

The critical role of REDD+ was recognized through a £3 million pledge by the UK International Forest Unit to support UN Climate Change's work over four years. This funding will bolster REDD+ activities in many countries, enabling the secretariat to create dedicated spaces for REDD+ experts to engage in technical dialogue. These efforts are expected to enhance the transparency and implementation of REDD+, in line with the Global Stocktake objective to halt and reverse deforestation and forest degradation by 2030.

Adaptation

COP29 was an important moment for adaptation, with the delivery of several key outcomes. The COP decision on matters relating to the least developed countries (LDCs) contains a provision for the establishment of a support programme for the implementation of National Adaptation Plans (NAPs) for the LDCs. Parties extensively discussed the second five-year assessment of progress to formulate and implement NAPs, and will continue that in June 2025.

A High-Level Dialogue on National Adaptation Plans convened ministers from least developed countries and small island developing States, financial experts and international donors to address the growing urgency of climate adaptation. Their discussions focused on innovative financing, technical support, and accelerated action to meet the 2025 submission deadline for NAPs. The event concluded with a strong call to action to expedite NAPs and translate plans into tangible outcomes.

Gender and climate change Countries agreed a decision on

gender and climate change, extending the enhanced Lima Work Programme on Gender and Climate Change for another 10 years, reaffirming the importance of gender equality and advancing gender mainstreaming throughout the convention.

They also agreed to develop a new gender action plan for adoption at COP30, which will set the direction for concrete implementation.

Civil society participation, children and youth

World leaders at COP29 were joined by civil society, subnationals, business, Indigenous Peoples, youth, philanthropy, and international organizations. More than 55,000 people attended COP29 to share ideas, solutions, and build partnerships and coalitions.

THE Institute of Rural Development planning (IRDP) is planning to construct new research center at Nala area.

He expressed, the institute started with 14 staff and 13 students in 1979 and has keep on growing impressively to the tune it currently have a total of 400 staff members and over 14,000 students.

"This fast-growing trend alerts us over the need to work harder in order to ensure we stand ready to accommodate expanded number of students as predicted in the future," he said.

He said the college is currently implementing its well -developed

China's traditional sectors get smarter with 5G+ industrial internet

BEIJING

t one of the busiest container terminals along the midstream of the Yangtze River, the atmosphere is surprisingly calm, with only a few people around. Automatic cranes efficiently lift and transfer cargo, while driverless trucks glide in and get loaded.

"Now, 50 percent of our terminal's loading and transportation is automated, which has created a huge leap in efficiency," said Chen Xiaomian, production and operations manager of Wuhan CSP Terminal Co., Ltd. The company operates the namesake terminal in Wuhan, capital of central China's Hubei Province.

"We only need 12 workers to remotely handle a workload that typically requires 39 workers at a traditional terminal," Chen said. Supported by 5G+ industrial internet, terminal workers can operate cranes using just a control handle while monitoring progress on a screen.

According to the Ministry of Industry and Information Technology (MIIT), 5G+ industrial internet is a new infrastructure that integrates application model or industrial ecosystems into industrial sectors. It leverages 5G and other advanced telecommunications technologies.

By connecting people, machines and systems along industrial and value chains, 5G+ industrial internet boosts the digital, networked and intelligent development of industrial sectors, helping companies reduce costs and increase ef-

As part of its tech-driven growth strategy, China has committed to developing 5G+ industrial internet in recent years, aiming to accelerate the smart upgrades of its traditional industries.

According to the MIIT, steelmaking, equipment manufacturing, mining and port logistics are sectors where 5G+ industrial internet is widely used, with technologies such as smart logistics, automated visual inspection, remote control and automated patrol seeing increased use.

A notable example is Hegang, a rust-belt city in northeast China's Heilongjiang Province, where local graphite mining industry is enjoying a resurgence.

Unlike the previous model characterized by extensive exploitation, current mining operations are meticulously planned with remote monitoring and data analysis. These technologies can significantly boost work efficiency and prevent resource waste, helping



Hegang evolve into one of China's major graphite hubs.

The city's tech-fueled revival reflects a broader trend across China, where more than 15,000 5G+ industrial internet projects are underway, covering all 41 major industrial categories in the country, according to the MIIT.

Zhou Ji, an academician with the Chinese Academy of Engineering, said 5G+ industrial internet is the primary driving force behind China's ongoing smart manufacturing drive, which involves not only technological advancements but also the reshaping of industrial models.

He anticipates that by 2035, digital, networked and smart manufacturing technologies will have become widespread among industrial companies nationwide, making China a

leader in global smart manufacturing.

To further accelerate this transformation, the MIIT announced a pilot program for 5G+ industrial internet in 10 cities at the recently concluded 2024 China 5G+ Industrial Internet Conference. The program aims to promote large-scale applications, with Nanjing, Wuhan, Qingdao and seven other cities chosen for participation.

These cities will focus on developing 5G-powered industrial clusters and innovation ecosystems with pace-setting effects at both regional and national levels, according to the

During the conference, Chen Ronghui, deputy head of the National Data Administration, said the administration will continue to transform traditional industries with digital technologies. Moreover, it will create more digital solutions providers that offer streamlined, low-cost products and services, Chen said.

Looking ahead, Guangyong, chief technology officer and deputy general manager of Inspur Yunzhou Industrial Internet Platform, said there should be more solutions tailored to companies' needs. He also suggested reducing prices for all types of 5G-based hardware.

With more smart factories emerging in China, 5G+ industrial internet will enable a broader range of application scenarios, such as smart sensing, real-time analysis and precise control, thereby further enhancing production efficiency, Shang added.

Dubai Airports ready to handle high traffic: COO

Majed Al Joker, Chief Operating Officer of Dubai Airports, affirmed the airport's preparedness for the rainy season and anticipated high traffic in the coming period.

He highlighted close collaboration with strategic partners and the implementation of advanced plans, supported by passenger data analysis, to effectively manage the expected increase in activity.

In statements to the Emirates News Agency (WAM), he emphasised ongoing coordination with government agencies and strategic partners through regular meetings to manage the potential influx. He added that plans are in place to prepare the work team and ensure the airport's readiness.

Al Joker pointed out that the performance of the last quarter of each year is supported by the holiday season, vacations, and improved weather in Dubai, which increases the flow of visitors.

He noted that Dubai airports expect to handle more than 23.2 million passengers during

this quarter, bringing the total number of passengers for the vear to 91.9 million.

He said they regularly review forecasts and aim to exceed expectations, noting that the number might change in the last quarter due to the increase in visitor traffic.

Al Joker anticipated sustained growth in passenger traffic, projecting over 94 million passengers in 2025 and more than 97 million in 2026, with a target of reaching 100 million passengers between 2027 and 2028.

He highlighted the thirdquarter results of this year, during which 23.7 million passengers were recorded, showing significant growth compared to the 21.8 million passengers in the second quar-

He stated that the total number of passengers during the first nine months of the year reached 68.6 million, marking a 6.3 percent increase compared to the same period last year. He also noted a 6.4 percent rise in the number of flights, which reached 327,000, reflecting sustained growth.

Challenges in critical minerals supply threatening global energy transitions

An unprecedented surge in demand for critical minerals on the back of global transitions to clean energy is posing significant challenges in meeting these goals, as the critical minerals sector experiences various challenges, says data and analytics company GlobalData.

"The global transition to clean energy is gaining momentum, heavily relying on renewable technologies such as solar PV cells and wind turbines, alongside energy transition solutions like hydrogen, energy storage and carbon capture," GlobalData explains, adding that this growing demand is putting pressure on minerals supply. The company finds in its latest Strategic Intelligence

report on critical minerals the main challenges to scaling clean energy technologies are mineral depletion, resource monopolisation, geopolitical tensions and water

Strategic Intelligence analyst Martina Raveni says the near-term depletion of critical minerals raises concerns, especially as instability in the green technologies market causes price volatility.

She adds that lower-grade ores complicate extraction, making it less efficient, particularly in the copper indus-

To this end, recycling is expected to play a key role in diversifying supply chains.

Many critical minerals are concentrated in specific regions, creating uneven resource distribution and volatile market dynamics.

For example, much of the world's lithium reserves are concentrated in South America and Australia, while the Democratic Republic of Congo dominates international cobalt supply, as is the case with nickel in Indonesia.

"Geographic monopolies worsen supply risks and are further exacerbated by geopolitical tensions; environmental, social, and governance disclosure rules; and environmental factors such as water scarcity.

"The race to control these critical minerals has intensified rivalries between China, the US and the EU, with China currently dominating the mineral supply chain and energy transition technologies," Raveni states.

These tensions have led to the introduction of sanctions by Western nations to level the playing field, which has disrupted global supply chains, leading to market volatility. In response, China banned rare earth elements exports in 2023, escalating the situation further.

"Given these issues, there are concerns that shortages of critical minerals may make it harder for nations to achieve energy transition goals," Raveni concludes

UN: 2024 sees worst record for deaths of global aid workers

UNITED NATIONS

THIS year has become the worst year on record for deaths of aid workers, with 281 deaths globally, the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) said on Friday.

"Humanitarian workers are being killed at an unprecedented rate, their courage and humanity being met with bullets and bombs," said Tom Fletcher, under-secretary-general for humanitarian affairs and emergency relief coordinator.

"This violence is unconscionable and devastating to aid operations. States and parties to conflict must protect humanitarians, uphold international law, prosecute

of impunity."

OCHA said record fatalities also were recorded in 2023, with 280 aid workers killed across 33 countries.

Stephane Dujarric, chief spokesman for UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres, lamented last year's record was topped, "and it isn't even December".

The humanitarian office said that the more than 320 humanitarian personnel killed since Oct 7, 2023, in Gaza, is driving up the number of global fatalities. Many were killed in the line of duty while providing humanitarian assistance, and most were staff members of the UN relief agency for Palestinian refugees, known as UNRWA.

OCHA said that most of the humanitarthose responsible, and call time on this era ians killed around the world this year were conflicts, a staggering 72 percent in-

local staff members working with non-governmental organizations, UN agencies and the Red Cross/Red Crescent movement.

High levels of violence, kidnappings, injuries, harassment, and arbitrary detention of aid workers have been reported in Afghanistan, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, South Sudan, Sudan, Ukraine and Yemen, among other

The office said that violence against aid workers is part of a broader trend of increasing civilian casualties in conflict zones. Last vear, more than 33.000 civilian deaths were recorded in 14 armed

crease from 2022.

Despite the dangers, OCHA said relief organizations continue to deliver vital assistance, reaching nearly 144 million people in need last year. The organizations supported more than 116 million people worldwide.

The office reminded that the UN Security Council adopted in May Resolution 2730 in response to the growing violence and threats against humanitarian workers. The resolution mandates the UN secretary-general to recommend measures to prevent and respond to such incidents, enhance accountability, and improve protection for humanitarian personnel and assets.

Wang: Xi's LatAm trip promotes friendship, cooperation, development

BEIJING

CHINESE President Xi Jinping's just-concluded visit to Latin America is a journey of friendship across mountains and seas, a journey of solidarity to jointly promote development, and a journey

of cooperation to expand partnership, Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi said.

From Nov 13 to 23, Xi (pictured) was invited to attend the 31st APEC Economic Leaders' Meeting and pay a state visit to Peru, and to attend the 19th G20 Summit and pay a state visit to Brazil.

During the 11 days, Xi attended nearly 40 bilateral and multilateral events and reached more than 60 cooperation documents, said Wang, also a member of the Political Bureau of the Communist Party of China Central Committee.

From Lima to Rio de Janeiro, Xi once again sent a clear message of firmly upholding multilateralism at the crossroads of human history, illuminated the "Latin American moment" of global governance with Chinese wisdom, and demonstrated China's image as a responsible major country with fairness, justice, courage, openness and inclusiveness, Wang said.

Xi attended the APEC Economic Leaders' Meeting in Lima and delivered a written speech to the CEO summit, calling on Asia-Pacific economies to continuously adhere to true multilateralism, build an open and interconnected paradigm for Asia-Pacific cooperation, make green innovation a catalyst for the Asia-Pacific, and uphold a universally beneficial and inclusive vision for Asia-Pacific development, Wang said.

Wang said that Xi has always attached great importance to the issue of development. At the G20 summit in Rio de Janeiro, Xi elaborated on China's concept of global governance in a comprehensive and systematic way, stressing the need to make global development more inclusive, beneficial to all, and more resilient, and build a just world of common development, Wang said.

Xi called for building a world economy characterized by cooperation, stability, openness, innovation and eco-friendliness, and announced China's eight actions for global development, including joining the Global Alliance Against Hunger and Poverty, Wang said.

The important initiatives have responded to the strong will of the Global South to seek equality and promote change, and have defined the right direction for improving global governance, Wang said.

Wang noted that the key highlight of Xi's visit to Peru was the Chinese president and his Peruvian counterpart, Dina Boluarte, jointly attending the opening ceremony of the Chancay Port via video link. Chancay Port is the first smart port and the first green port in South America, Wang said, adding that once completed, it will bring huge revenues to Peru and contribute to establishing a new Asia-Latin America land-sea corridor with the Chancay Port as a starting point.

In Brazil, Xi and Brazilian President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva engaged in in-depth and amicable strategic communication, agreeing that the China-Brazil relationship is at its best in history, said Wang.

The two countries announced an elevation of their ties to the community with a shared future for a more just world and a more sustainable planet and decided to establish synergies between the Belt and Road Initiative and Brazil's development strategies, said Wang, adding that Xi's visit is an important milestone in the history of China-Brazil relations.

Wang said that Xi held more than 10 bilateral meetings on the sidelines of the multilateral gatherings. In Xi's meeting with US President Joe Biden, the two heads of state stressed the extreme importance of China-US relations, noting that a stable China-US relationship is critical not only to the interests of the two peoples, but also to the future and destiny of the entire humanity, Wang said.

Xi reiterated China's principles and positions on such major issues as Taiwan, urging the two sides to shoulder the responsibilities of major countries and keep exploring the right way for two major countries to get along well with each other and inject more certainty and positive energy into the world, Wang said.

Xi also met with leaders of France, Germany, Britain and other major European countries respectively, stressing that China and Europe should view each other from a long-term and strategic perspective, adhere to partnership, commit to properly resolving differences through dialogue and consultation, and continue to write cooperative stories of mutual achievement, said

Chinese feature film awarded at Cairo International Film Festival

CAIRO, Nov. 23 (Xinhua) --Chinese film Brief History of a Family won the Network for the Promotion of the Asia Pacific Cinema Award as the best Asian feature film at the 45th Cairo International Film Festival (CIFF) concluded here on Friday eve-

"This is my first feature film ... It's a great experience. In all the competitions here, it was the only feature-length Chinese language film. So, that's very special and I'm very happy to win the

award.

"What I want to do is to bring the Chinese film on the international stage. I think this is a very great achievement for the film," he added.

The film tells the story of a Chinese middle-class family and their son's mysterious friend, with a focus on the bonds between family members.

The jury statement said the film demonstrated a subtle exploration of emotions and the use of imagery and sound design. "They told me it doesn't look like a filmmaker's first feaaward," Lin Jianjie, the director, ture. It's very mature, and it has

This year's CIFF saw a strong presence of Chinese films. A highlight of the event was the Chinese Cinema Week, during which seven Chinese features were screened. Among these was Decoded, directed by Chen Sicheng, who received the CIFF's Golden Pyramid honorary award.

"China has a great cinema industry for a long time, and we used to watch Chinese films while learning filmmaking," said Egyptian film director Khaled El-Hagar, a jury member of the International Critics' Week

Competition. "It is important for the Egyptian and Arab audience to watch films from different cultures such as China, India, and other Asian countries, not just European and American films," he told Xinhua, describing Brief History of a Family as "very interesting and intriguing."

During the ten-day festival, a memorandum of understanding was signed between the CIFF and the Beijing International Film Festival to boost cooperation between the two sides in relevant areas.

"Egypt and China have very strong relations for long deca des, especially in the field of arts. In fact, the cinematic and artistic experiences of both countries reflect their civilizations and show a similarity in their dramatic style," Egyptian Minister of Culture Ahmed Fouad Hanno told reporters during the closing ceremony.

He added that this artistic cooperation and closeness between Egypt and China would certainly provide a boost to bilateral cultural exchange.

US expects Russia-North Korea cooperation to be formidable challenge in coming years

THE US administration believes that the cooperation between Russia and North Korea will be a formidable challenge for Washington for years to come, Mira Rapp-Hooper, Special Assistant to US President, National Security Council Senior Director for East Asia and Ocea-

The current administration is concerned about "how far it [the relationship between North Korea and Russia - TASS] has come so quickly," she said. Speaking at a seminar at Washington's Center for Strategic and International Studies (this organization's activities are recognized as undesirable on the territory of the Russian Federation), Rapp-Hooper said that this cooperation has reached a scale that "could not have been imagined a few years ago."

She also mentioned the US administration's version, according to which North Korea has allegedly sent troops to engage in active combat in Ukraine, saying that in response "the Russians <...>



end technical assistance on an order, as well as protect them in international institutions and seek to legitimize their

nuclear weapons capability." "And that is going to be a formidable challenge for administrations, I suspect, for years to come," Rapp-Hooper noted.

In turn, First Deputy US Secretary of State Kurt Campbell said that the cooperation between Russia and North Korea "is not only going to be urgent, but it's going to be a growing issue that cannot be ignored."

Commenting on earlier "satellite images" released by Seoul that allegedly show the presence of North Korean servicemen in Russia, President Vladimir Putin called such photos a "serious matter." However, he emphasized that NATO servicemen have long been directly involved in the Ukrainian conflict. Putin pointed out that the strategic partnership treaty between Moscow and Pyongyang includes a clause on joint defense.

For her part, Russian Foreign Ministry Spokeswoman Maria Zakharova has said that the strategic cooperation between Moscow and Pyongyang is not unusual or extraordinary, despite the West's attempts to demonize it. She emphasized that those who are committed to peaceful cooperation with Moscow have nothing to fear.

Namibian cultural group tackles social issues, creating opportunities with traditional dance

ADORNED in animal-hide garments, a score of performers of the Black Melody Cultural Group (BMCG) delivered captivating performances showcasing the rich culture of Namibia's Batswana tribe as the art troupe celebrated its 32nd anniversary with dance and music in Windhoek, the Namibian capital, Friday night.

BMCG, established in 1992 by seven young members in Gobabis, about 200 km east of Windhoek aimed to engage local youth in constructive and educational activities centered around cultural heritage.

"We strive to achieve this through traditional songs, dramas, poetry, and music, particularly our style known as Borankane," said Juliette Mogotsi, president of BMCG, Satur-

Borankane, in the indigenous Setswana language, reflects the essence of wildlife, socialization, and the community's livelihood. The dance techniques include sliding and stomping of feet, accompanied by various body movements and a cappella singing.

Over the years, the group has addressed social issues such as poverty, HIV/AIDS, and gender-based violence through their performances.

Founded soon after Namibia's independence in 1990, the art troupe also sought to promote national

unity and cultural diversity. "Namibia faces many social problems, and our group hopes to shift ing culture with contemporary life," Mogotsi said.

BMCG also works to preserve undocumented traditional knowledge. It has produced two albums in the Setswana language to help with this effort: the debut album "Tautona Pohamba" -- a track that talks about how HIV/AIDS is killing and finishing Namibian nationals, and therefore it was pleading President Pohamba to help -- released in 2009, and the second album "Letsatsi Le Dule," meaning "The Sun is out Shining," released in 2012, with its DVD launched in 2014.

According to Mogotsi, while BM-CG's ideology has remained consistent over 32 years, the art troupe, which has grown to have 35 memmindsets and habits by intertwin- bers at present, has also evolved

into an income-generating venture. On average, they charge between 3,000 Namibian dollars (about 166 U.S. dollars) and 15,000 Namibian dollars depending on the event. It also sustains its activities through fundraising events, concerts, and performances at corporate func-

"The funds are reinvested into the group, and members occasionally receive a share of the profits," Mogotsi said.

Over the years, the group has transformed the lives of many young people. Ehrenfriede Katuuo, 25, joined BMCG in 2019 to enhance her knowledge of her culture. For her, there's limited opportunity to explore cultural history in many modern households.

"Long lectures on traditions aren't engaging. However, joining the cultural group has been a gamechanger for me. I've gained a much deeper understanding of my culture and language than I ever could at home," Katuuo said. "As an introvert, I struggled to socialize, but Black Melody has helped me connect with others more comfortably and genuinely."

Like many of her peers, Katuuo has since gained valuable insights from the diverse perspectives within the group.

Manfred Gaeb, the director of National Heritage and Culture Programs in the Ministry of Education, Arts, and Culture, said that cultural groups are vital not only for transferring cultural skills across generations but also for nurturing soft skills such as teamwork, management, and discipline.

BMCG has also instilled pride in its members and provided them with opportunities. The group has toured and performed on the global stage in countries like Rwanda, Cuba, Angola, and Slovakia. This year, two members served as cultural ambassadors on a two-week cruise ship to Spain.

Despite their success, sustaining a cultural group comes with challenges, including limited space to practice and financial resources, according to Mogotsi. "Our remedy is networking and forming partnerships within the cultural sector," she

Putin says Oreshnik missile system cutting-edge innovation by Russia, not Soviet byproduct

MOSCOW

RUSSIA'S Oreshnik hypersonic intermediate-range ballistic missile system is not an upgraded version of previous versions dating back from the Soviet times, and it is in the line of the latest and modern developments, Russian President Vladimir Putin said on Friday.

"The Oreshnik system has nothing to do with the modernization of the old Soviet systems," Putin said.

"It is obvious that we were all raised watching various systems of the Soviet Union operating, we were all brought up on what was done by previous generations, and to a certain extent we used their results," Putin said.

"However, this system is indeed the prime result of your work, the work that was done in Russian times, under the conditions of the new Russia, it was waged on the basis of modern, latest developments," Putin said addressing the meeting with the Defense Ministry executive board, representatives of the military-industrial complex and missile weapon designers.

The Russian Defense Ministry announced earlier in the day that the country's latest Oreshnik intermediaterange ballistic missile hit all the targets at a major Ukrainian military-industrial enterprise in Dnepr (Dnepropetrovsk) with its MIRVed warheads.

"On November 21, 2024, in response to the use of American-and British-made long-range missiles against facilities on Russian territory, the Armed Forces delivered a combined strike on one of the Ukrainian military-industrial sites in Dnepropetrovsk. For the first time, the Oreshnik hypersonic intermediaterange ballistic missile with a non-nuclear payload was employed in combat conditions in the strike. The goal of the



strike was achieved. All the warheads hit the facility," the ministry said in a statement.

On November 19, Russian President Vladimir Putin signed a decree approving the Foundations of State Policy in the Field of Nuclear Deterrence, the country's updated nuclear doctrine.

The fundamental principle of the doctrine is that the use of nuclear weapons is a measure of last resort to protect the country's sovereignty.

The emergence of new military threats and risks prompted Russia to clarify the conditions for the use of nuclear weapons. In particular, the amended doctrine expands the range of countries and military alliances subject to nuclear deterrence, as well as the list of military threats that such deterrence is designed to counter.

In addition, the document states that Russia will now view any attack by a non-nuclear country supported by a nuclear power as a joint attack. Moscow also reserves the right to consider a nuclear response to a conventional weapons attack threatening its sovereignty, a large-scale launch of enemy aircraft, missiles, and drones targeting Russian territory, their crossing of the Russian border, and an attack on its ally Belarus.

Green protectionism: A threat to our shared green future

WITH global leaders and environmental experts gathered in Baku for COP29, the need for decisive action against climate change is once again the focus of the world's attention. There is a resounding call for collective, robust action to combat the escalating crisis.

Yet, amidst commitments to a greener future, a troubling trend of green protectionism has emerged, threatening to undermine these efforts. Such protectionist measures, cloaked in the guise of green development, will only impede the global greening process and disrupt the multilateral trading system.

Green protectionism is hampering global progress towards a greener future. The widespread application of technologies used in electric vehicles (EVs) and photovoltaic power stations promises a significant boost to mitigation efforts. However, by imposing heavy tariffs on the import of competitive green products, green protectionism is delaying the adoption of these technologies and slowing the achievement of our mitigation goals.

Moreover, subsidies for domestic green industries in developed countries can exacerbate the gap with developing economies, which, lacking the financial means for similar subsidies, are struggling to support their own green industries. This is especially problematic when developed nations have yet to honor their promise of providing an annual \$100 billion in climate finance.

Green protectionist measures are also counterproductive for the countries and regions themselves that implement them. High tariffs push up the cost of green transition and reduce the supply of products and services in the domestic market. The increased costs will ultimately be passed on to consumers, dampening the demand for green alternatives, and the lack of competition will weaken the drive for technological innovation.

However disguised, green protectionism is ultimately a form of protectionism. It violates the rules of the World Trade Organization and challenges the free and open multilateral trading system. For example, subsidies and tax credits for American green sectors in the U.S. Inflation Reduction Act contravene the principle of national treatment, which means imported and locally-produced goods should be treated equally. Similarly, the EU's proposed border carbon tax violates the principle of most-favored-nation treatment, leading to

trade discrimination against other countries, particularly developing ones.

These actions risk igniting trade wars, tariff wars, and subsidy wars, disrupting the international cooperation so desperately needed for global green development.

Rejecting competitive green products with green protectionist practices is essentially creating obstacles for a green future. China's export of over 1 million new energy vehicles (NEVs) in 2023 reduced carbon emissions by about 1.66 million tons annually. A study published in Nature in 2022 estimated that the global photovoltaic supply chain, led by China, saved the United States and Germany \$24 billion and \$7 billion, respectively, in photovoltaic installation costs from 2008 to 2020.

Over the past decade, the average cost per kilowatt-hour for global wind and solar power projects has dropped by more than 60 percent and 80 percent respectively, with a significant portion of these savings attributed to Chinese innovation, manufacturing and engineering.

In fact, China has done more than that. With its well-planned and arduous efforts, China is well on its way to reaching its dual carbon goal of peaking carbon emissions by 2030 and carbon neutrality by 2060. From

July to September this year, the market penetration rate of NEVs in China surpassed 50 percent.

Also, China now boasts the world's largest and fastest-growing renewable energy generation capacity. As of the end of August, installed capacity using renewables topped 1.7 billion kilowatts and accounted for 54.4 percent of the national power generation

In addition to all this, China has the most extensive and fastest-growing reforestation

Green transition is a priority in China's high-quality development drive. China's central government released a comprehensive plan to accelerate green transition across various sectors, from industry standards, energy, transportation, urban and rural development, to consumption, green technology, and institutional support. It also includes assisting global green transition through international cooperation.

Today, humanity urgently needs the protection of green development, not green protectionism. Countries must set aside their self-interests and work collaboratively for the common good of the international community to realize a sustainable and greener future.

Key maritime merchants forum in Hong Kong helps steer course for shipping industry

HONG KONG

THE world's first intelligent research and training dual-purpose ship is making its debut visit to Hong Kong and open for admission as a highlight of the city's maritime week, which lasted through Saturday.

One may miss the chance to board it in person, since bookings for "Xin Hong Zhuan" were instantly full days ago. The vessel, built by COSCO Shipping Heavy Industry (Dalian) Co., Ltd. for Dalian Maritime University, a key maritime institution under China's Ministry of Transport, has become the latest darling of Hongkongers.

It's far more than ordinary people who are galvanized by the latest breakthroughs in maritime technology, but business insiders and experts, who know that with combined efforts from the government and industry, the sector is gaining traction among a growing number of Chinese, particularly a new generation of successors, through increasing input in maritime education.

This is especially crucial for Hong Kong as the city redefines its role in the shipping industry amid changing global dynamics and fierce industrial competition, trying to battle the brain drain and navigate a green shift.

At the World Maritime Merchants Forum (WMMF) 2024, which convened in Hong Kong on Monday, Xinhua reporters met with a forum volunteer surnamed Ho, also a maritime studies major at the Hong Kong Polytechnic University, and were intrigued by her stories as she eagerly recounted what she has learned from the forum.

Echoing the view of many par-

ticipants at the forum, its fourth edition here in Hong Kong starting 2021, Ho said she noticed a much stronger call for bold actions on green transition in the maritime sector than ever before as "the clock is ticking on mandatory sustainability reporting."

Corporate responsibility on sustainability reporting has come closer into focus, transforming from a point of concern to a business imperative, and that rattles those along the shipping industrial and supply chains, insiders said.

"That's why we call it 'Maritime Merchants' and not just 'Maritime' forum," said Lothair Lam, WMMF chairman and general manager, noting that the forum mechanism is conducive to pooling resources and leveraging the role of the shipping sector as an important link along the value chain.

As the platform broadens, it is also expected to engage more businesses, boost cooperation and innovation across the industry and beyond, and jointly build a prosperous Hong Kong, Lam said.

Back in 2021, the nascent fo-

Back in 2021, the nascent forum unfolded during the CO-VID-19 pandemic and at a time

when many people were keenly concerned about the prospect of Hong Kong as an international shipping center, Wang Yongxin, president of China Merchants Energy Shipping Company Limited, also the organizer of the annual forum, told Xinhua.

"As a Chinese central stateowned enterprise based in Hong Kong, we believe that the more trying the times are, the more we need to bring China's voice and China's solution to the world," noted Wang. "This is why we started the forum in the first place.

In September 2022, China Merchants Energy Shipping Company Limited launched its supertanker "New Aden," with sail wings cutting fuel consumption by over 7.4 percent on average annually, and has been striving toward the dual carbon goal.

After the first edition wrapped up successfully online and offline with solid technical support from China's tech giant Tencent, the Transport and Logistics Bureau of the HKSAR offered to cohost the second edition, and starting from the third edition, the WMMF was incorporated into the Hong Kong Maritime Week as a flagship event, sharing the opening cer-

emony with the maritime week.

Themed "Navigating the Cy-

Themed "Navigating the Cycles," this year's forum tackles such critical topics as the role of ship finance in industrial transformation, the implications of new carbon-tax regulations and the transformative potential of artificial intelligence in driving digital change in shipping, sending a clear and compelling statement of humanity's commitment to sustainability.

"Over the years, the forum has increasingly emerged as a signature event promoting the global shipping industry chain," said Chan Kwok-ki, acting chief executive of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region (HKSAR) government, when addressing the opening ceremony of Hong Kong Maritime Week 2024 cum World Maritime Merchants Forum 2024.

As a gateway to Asia as well as one of the world's busiest and most efficient ports, Hong Kong has been adjusting itself to a plethora of new requirements in the maritime industry, and has been actively engaging regional and global partners in fueling a green shift.

The WMMF, coupled with the maritime week, is just one example and a calling card of Hong Kong's maritime endeavors. In June, the HKSAR government launched the Green Incentive Scheme, the first of its kind in the world that is Carbon Intensity Indicator-related. Last week, the HKSAR government promulgated the Action Plan on Green Maritime Fuel Bunkering, mapping out a clear roadmap to build Hong Kong into a high-quality green maritime fuel bunkering center.

Why 'extra special' Nwaneri has to remain patient

WHEN you are mentioned in the same sentence as Cesc Fabregas, the future must be bright.

Arsenal returned to winning ways by overcoming Nottingham Forest 3-0 thanks to some familiar names - and an exciting 17-year-old talent.

Mikel Arteta's side had fallen away in the Premier League title race after failing to win their previous four games.

But Bukayo Saka, who pulled out of England's recent Nations League fixtures with a leg injury, set Arsenal on their way with his first goal in five matches after combining with captain Martin Ode-

Saka then teed up Thomas Partey to double the lead before attacking midfielder Ethan Nwaneri, who does not turn 18 until March, offered a glimpse into Arsenal's future by sealing the points with his first top-flight goal.

London-born Nwaneri (17 years and 247 days old) became the second-youngest player to score a Premier League goal for Arsenal, behind only Fabregas (17 years and 113 days in 2004), who went on to win the World Cup with Spain.

"I have seen Ethan Nwaneri a couple of times and he's extra special," former Scotland winger Pat Nevin told BBC Radio 5 Live.

"Arsenal left Kai Havertz and Declan Rice out and we hardly even noticed it."

It was the perfect way for Arteta to mark his 250th game in charge of the Gunners, who moved six points behind leaders Liverpool having played one game more.

Nwaneri became the youngest player in Premier League history when he came on in the closing moments of Arsenal's 3-0 win at Brentford in September 2022 aged just 15 years and 181 days.

"School in the morning, he's got school in the morning," sang Arsenal's travelling fans at the

On Saturday, tens of thousands of fans inside

Emirates Stadium sang "he's one of our own, Ethan Nwaneri, he's one of our own" after he scored. Fans have been calling for the teenager to get

more minutes after promising performances in the EFL Cup, and his well-taken goal against Forest will only add to the clamour.

He has scored four goals in 238 minutes this season, with 170 of those minutes in the EFL Cup, 60 in the Premier League and eight in the Champions

Across the big five European leagues, Nwaneri is one of only two players aged under 18 to have scored more than once across all competitions this term after 17-year-old Barcelona and Spain talent Lamine Yamal.

Arteta explained why he was managing Nwaneri's minutes "step by step" after the win over For-

"He's giving us all the reasons to play, another reason to put him there," said the Arsenal boss.

"I am responsible to build a career for him. You have to do that brick by brick. Today he put an-

"Now we have to put cement, make sure it doesn't get dry so we can put another one and that will stick. Then we put one more layer, one more

"If you want to put five in a row believe me - it won't work. We have to manage not only his expectation but his workload as well, which is really

"You can sense how much the crowd loves watching this kid play and the energy."

Odegaard now has two assists in his past two league appearances since returning from a serious ankle injury.

"It's not a coincidence, the team flows in a different way when he is playing," added Arteta.

"When he's in the team, you can sense something that is different. It's difficult to put a finger on it, but it's different.'

Meanwhile, Saka finished the game with another assist - his eighth in the Premier League this season - as well as opening the scoring.

Arteta believes a fit and firing Odegaard and Saka can help haul the Gunners - who had dropped 10 points in their previous four league games before Saturday - back into the title race.

"There's chemistry, sometimes you meet somebody, straight away you make eye contact and something flows. That's the case with those two," said Arteta.

"When you put them together in the right spaces, things flourish and things happen naturally. With others, you try to force it and it doesn't work. "With these two, we are very lucky to have them."

'In eight years we never lived like this' - what is wrong at Man City?

MANCHESTER City manager Pep Guardiola looked back on the stunning 4-0 home defeat by Tottenham and

delivered a simple truth. "We have to accept the reality and break it," he said.

Given he began his post-match news conference by saying "when you lose 4-0 there is not much to say" before offering his congratulations to Spurs on their biggest away win at City, Guardiola then spent quite a bit of time talking about it.

How, after so much success over such a long period of time, "a dip"was inevitable.

How "little details" were the cause of major problems, due in part, but not exclusively, to the number of injuries his side are struggling to cope with.

How his belief in the players has not been shaken because of all they have achieved for him.

But also how he will not ignore the reality of five successive defeats, something he has never experienced as a manager and City as a club last went through in 2006, when Stuart Pearce was in charge.

Nether can he ignore that Liverpool would move eight points clear with a win at Southampton on Sunday - with a meeting with City at Anfield next up.

"In eight years we never lived this. I knew sooner or later we would drop. I never expected to lose three Premier League games in a row but we have been incredibly consistent again and again and again. Now we cannot deny the real-

ity that sometimes happens in football and life is here.
