African clinics set to get Gates' new portable ultrasound tech

By Guardian Reporter

THE current alarmingly high mortality rates in pregnancy-related complications in remote areas of Africa are likely to be reduced in the wake of unveiling ground-breaking, portable ultrasound technology by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

Dr Anita Zaidi, the gender equality president at the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, disclosed this in Dar es Salaam over the weekend at the WomenLift health global conference, 2024.

With thousands of online television participants, she explained the dire need for accessible diagnostic tools in regions where healthcare facilities are scarce.

"Every year, nearly 300,000 women and over four million newborns perish due to pregnancy-related complications," she stated, underlining the disproportionate impact on low-income and to a considerable extent, middle-income countries.



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'Half of the world's **buffaloes** roaming Tanzanian plains'

TANZANIA leads in the number of buffaloes in Africa, holding more than 50 percent of all buffaloes currently roaming the earth, a new wildlife census shows.

Dr Eblate Mjingo, the Tanzania Wildlife Research Institute (TAWIRI), director general, said in a presentation on the census conducted for the Ministry of Natural Resources and Tourism that Tanzania boasts around

225,000 buffaloes at present. The Serengeti National Park, the home of wildebeest migration, also leads buffalo numbers whose population in the precinct reaches 69,075 such African buf-

pervise transformation measures in operations of public corporations, to work on those failing to attain intended goals, he said.

"We will also review several laws governing sectors like mining, land, agriculture, tourism and trade to address revenue loopholes and improve the business environment in the country," he stated.

Similarly, the government expects to launch the Bagamoyo Special Economic Zone (SEZ) and market it inside and outside the country to attract investors, including elevating the public private partnership (PPP) format, he said.

Requesting the House to approve the 121.329bn/- estimates where 100.246bn/- is recurrent expenditure and 21.08bn/- is intended for development projects, he recalled that the government had scrapped 374 levies, fees and fines that were impeding investments.

The levies involved issuing of permits or licences by the Tanzania Bureau of Standards (TBS), the Sugar Board of Tanzania (SBT), Occupational Health and Safety Authority (OSHA), the Government Chemist Laboratory Authority (GCLA), the Tanzania Medicines and Medical Devices (TMDA) plus the Fire and Rescue Force, he stated.

Apart from removing the levies,

the government merged some agencies and authorities with kindred responsibilities, with the former Tanzania Food and Drugs Authority (TFDA) having part of its duties shifted to the Tanzania Bureau of Standards (TBS).

Permit issuing responsibilities for chemical transportation were shifted to GCLA, ending contentions with TMDA and the Tanzania National Roads Agency (Tanroads).

The government has also amended the Tanzania Shipping Agencies Act (Cap 415) to remove cargo clearing and forwarding, with TASAC now focused on bulk concentrates, live animals, chemicals used in mining plus government trophies.

He pointed at an increase of registered companies from 7,817 in 2018/19 to 10,656 companies by fiscal 2021/22 as arising from efforts taken by the government to create a conducive investment environ-

He said that in the 2024/25 financial year, the ministry is prepared to complete the preparation of the National Development Vision 2050.

During the next financial year, the ministry will finalise preparations for a new investment policy and its implementation strategy, while merging the Tanzania Investment Centre and the Special Processing Zone Authority (EPZA), he added.

tal of 66,546 buffaloes, while the Katavi-Rukwa range hosted 35,273 buffaloes at the moment, followed by the Ruaha-Rungwa wilderness holding 20,911 buffaloes, the report indicates, noting in passing that Tanzania has essentially four-times the number of buffaloes compared to South Africa.

South Africa comes second on the continent with a total of 46,000 buffaloes, followed by Mozambique with upwards of 45,000 of hosts 42,000 buffaloes and Zambia 41,000 of them.

Tanzania also leads in Africa in leopard numbers, having a total of 24,000 of the ferocious cats in the census, more numerous than lions, whose number is put at 17,000 and again the highest on the continent.

It is six times the population of lions found in South Africa despite ranking second with an estimated 3,284 lions at the time the report was compiled, it said.

The number of wildebeests roaming the country's plains has also increased, reaching 1,597,850 at the time of the count, an increase of 1,326 wildebeests over the previous census in 2015.

"By democratizing access to such technologies," she asserted, "we can save more lives and ensure healthier outcomes for mothers and babies worldwide."

Field testing has showcased the effectiveness of the devices in identifying high-risk pregnancies, surpassing human capabilities in estimating gestational age, she stated.

"Furthermore, these advancements align with the foundation's broader mission to bridge healthcare disparities and foster equitable access to life-saving interventions," she elaborated.

With partnerships driving the development of portable, affordable and AI-enabled ultrasound devices, she remained optimistic about their potential to catalyse transformative change in maternal and child health outcomes globally.

"As the world grapples with persisting healthcare inequities, initiatives like these offer a glimmer of hope, signalling a step forward in the journey toward universal healthcare access and improved maternal and child health outcomes," the foundation executive noted

Vaccine microneedle array patches (VMAPs) is another product she announced, affirming that the device heralds a new era in vaccine delivery.

"These patches offer a solution to the challenges of traditional vaccine administration, particularly in regions with limited access to cold chain requirements and trained healthcare workers.

"Early trials demonstrate their effectiveness in delivering vaccines safely, with the potential to eliminate barriers to immunization and protect vulnerable populations from preventable diseases," she explained.

There were other next-generation diagnostic systems with transformative potential in identifying life-threatening diseases faster, in a more affordable way and with greater accessibility that the Gates Foundation was introducing.

These innovations, including low-cost tests and extreme volume manufacturing (EVM) test strips, are designed to revolutionise disease testing, particularly in resource-limited settings, she stated.

"By improving the speed and efficiency of diagnostic processes, these advancements have the po-

tential to save countless lives and mitigate the spread of infectious diseases," she emphasised.

Dr Zaidi similarly highlighted the importance of innovation in contraceptive technology to address unmet needs of women worldwide.

With a significant percentage of pregnancies being unwanted and on account of dissatisfaction with existing contraceptive methods, there is a pressing need for new solutions, she told the global audi-

"Promising innovations such as DMPA-SC and potential monthly pills, patches, and injectables, offer hope for improving contraceptive access and empowering women to make informed choices about their reproductive health," she said.

DMPA-SC is a self-injectable contraception, commonly used reversible contraceptive method among women in the United States, a write up explains, the medic and activist stressed the critical importance of Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccines.

They help to prevent cervical cancer, a leading cause of cancer-related deaths among women globally, even as Dr Zaidi affirms that despite the effectiveness of HPV vaccines millions of girls and women lack access to them, leaving them vulnerable to a preventable disease.

"New research supporting the efficacy of one-dose regimens offers a cost-effective and feasible solution to expand vaccine coverage and protect more individuals from HPV-related cancers," the executive declared.

Data on maternal mortality rates in Africa, published by Saifaddin Galal, showed that in South Sudan, Chad and Nigeria, the maternal mortality rate was above 1,000 per 100,000 live births in 2020.

South Sudan recorded the highest number of mothers' death rates, as during 2020 for every 100,000 children, 1,223 mothers died from incidents related to or aggravated by pregnancy or its management.

The maternal death rate in Chad reached 1,063 with Nigeria following with 1,047 deaths per 100,000 live births, the publication noted, underlining that despite these gains, persistent challenges like health inequities and barriers to accessing quality essential services hamper these efforts.

Vulnerable groups, especially rural and low-income populations, face significant disparities in healthcare coverage. Ongoing crises such as conflicts, climate change and epidemics further exacerbate these challenges, the report added.

THE Drug Control and Enforcement Authority (DCEA) has arrested 21 people in connection to a 767.2 kilogramme consignment of mixed drugs including heroin, Methamphetamine and Marijuana which the authority seized in a special operation from 4th April to 18 this year.

Aretas Lyimo, DCEA commissioner general said during a press conference yesterday that the operation was conducted in the regions of Dar es Salaam, Coast and

He said the seizure involved 525.67 kilogrammes of methamphetamine and 233.2 kilogrammes of heroin and 8.33 kilogrammes of dried marijuana which were seized at Mikanjuni in Tanga, Wailes, Temeke district in Dar es Salaam and Zinga in the Coast region.

Lyimo said on April, 10 officers from DCEA thronged Zinga area in the Coast region and seized 424.84 of Methampheta-

Commissioner Lyimo said on April, 16 at Kunduchi in Dar es Salaam the authority seized 232.69 kilogrammes of heroin and 100.83 of Methamphetamine which were imported into the country through the port of Dar es Salaam and nine people were arrested.

Be careful, forensic investigators urged

COMMISSIONER of Police Forensic Bureau, Shaban Hiki has urged police officers and doctors involved in criminal investigation to be careful of accuracy during collection, packaging, care and transportation of samples and evidence to the laboratory in order to get correct

According to him, for the samples of investigations to test correctly and provide true answers, it is important to take good care of them from the starting point to the laboratory where they are tested.

Commissioner Hiki made the call here when speaking to criminal justice stakeholders who involved police officers, doctors, prosecutors, judges and officers from the Prevention and Combating of Corruption Bureau (PCCB).

He warned that improper collection, transportation and storage of the case proceedings evidence in accordance with the guidelines and laws cause the samples to reach to the laboratory of the chief government chemist being damaged that cause them to be thrown away and thus leading to the delay of case hearing due to lack of evidence.

"You find that the sample taker takes a small piece of liver or cuts the wrong area or puts it in the wrong packaging, causing it to be damaged when it arrives to the laboratory or not suitable as it is small and insufficient and there are other reasons that cause the samples to be rejected, this goes in line with incorrect filling of the form using original copy as per law in order the court to receive and agree to the evidence," he explained.

He thanked the Chief Government Chemist office for organising the training which will bring positive outcomes in criminal justice.

He further reminded doctors to fill the form number 3 (PF3) in order


Gerald Mollel, manager of the Government Chemist Laboratory Authority (GCLA)-Central Zone admitted that despite the government procuring modern machinery and equipment to carry out sample testing to enable Tanzania's tests meet international standards, yet the challenges of taking, transporting and storing samples have made the laboratory unable to test some samples.


"The training is aimed to build a joint awareness to ensure that criminal justice and forensic services reach high levels including court to promote provision and ac-

Allot enough funds for operating patrol boat, public entities urged

PRIME Minister Kassim Majaliwa has tasked public institutions to allocate budgets to finance operations to combat illegal marine activities in the ocean and great lake

Majaliwa made the call in Dar es Salaam over the weekend at the handover and inauguration of the new patrol speedboat to curb illegal activities in the sea and great lake areas emphasizing that the department responsible must come up with strategies to boost maritime security efforts.

"The government is already working on the budget for the financial year 2024/25. The ministries and institutions involved with the use of the patrol boat must ensure they allocate funds to operate the boat. We do not want to see the boat inactive with reasons that the ministry has no money to operate it. Go and get the funds to do so," he said.

He added: "The government initiated the project to curb marine criminal activities in the sea and lakes to ensure our country remains safe. The project costs \$900,000 and has been a vital part of boosting maritime security efforts. I call on heads of department to plan effective strategies against piracy, illegal fishing, transportation of narcotics, and smuggling of natural resources."

Majaliwa said communication strategy for both sides of the union to enhance efforts to fight off illegal activities in the ocean without forgetting the lakes adding that, irresponsibility and lack of accountability should be avoided.

Yasushi Misawa, the Ambassador of Japan in Tanzania, said Japan is committed to contributing to Maritime Security and safety under the vision of Free and Open Indo-Pacific (FOIP) - a concept that

enhances peace and prosperity in the Indo-Pacific region through ensuring rules-based international order.

Minister "Japanese Prime Fumio Kishida reaffirmed the importance of promoting regional and international efforts related to maritime security including the fight against piracy, illegal, unreported and unregulated fishing and other maritime crimes. On that occasion, Prime Minister Kishida had a bilateral meeting with Prime Minister Kassim Majaliwa and agreed on the importance of our cooperation in the Blue Economy," he said.

Misawa said the UNDP project was developed to tackle illegal maritime activities by strengthening the capacity of the responsible agencies and assisting fishing communities, adding that, in May last year, a National Framework Coordination Mechanism for Tackling Illegal Maritime Activities was launched.

"This year the coastal communities were capacitated through training and provision of fish drying racks. Today, we are here to witness an important part of this project, the handover of a patrol boat to the government of Tanzania to strengthen the country's ability to interdict illicit activities within the waters of Tanzania," he said.

Weapons from foreign actors fuel war in Sudan - UN

THE United Nations Under-Secretary-General for Political and Peace building Affairs, Rosemary Anne DiCarlo, briefed the Security Council on the situation in Sudan at the weekend.

The war in Sudan has sparked "a crisis of epic proportions" fuelled by weapons from foreign supporters who continue to flout U.N. sanctions, DiCarlo added.

"If the parties have been able to sustain their confrontation, it is in no small part thanks to the material assets freezes. support they receive from outside the Sudan," she said.

"These external actors continue to flout the sanctions regime imposed by the Council to support a political settlement, thereby fuelling the conflict. This is illegal, it is immoral and it must stop."

The sanctions regime imposed on Sudan by the resolution 1591 mentions parties in the conflict in Darfur which broke in the early 2000s. It includes an embargo on arms and ammunition as well as

Mohamed Ibn Chambas, chair of the African Union panel on Sudan and high representative for its Silence the Guns in Africa initiative, called external interference "a major factor compounding both the efforts to negotiate a cease-fire and to stop the war."

Neither DiCarlo nor Chambas named any of the foreign supporters. Reports have alleged Saudi Arabia, the UAE and Egypt are involved in the continuation of the war.

Allow all companies to import liquor in Z'bar'

AN advocate of the Zanzibar High Court, Hassan Kijogoo has cited the Liquor Control Act that has narrowed the number of liquor importation companies as illegitimate as it goes against the Zanzibar Constitution of 1984.

The law, enacted in 2020 has limited the number of companies allowed to import liquor to just

Advocate made the remarks after the judgement issued recently by the High Court Judge Gorge Joseph Kazi who ruled Section 33(1) of the LCA "inoperative" and "a nullity in law," effectively rendering it unenforceable.

The case was brought by Quality Meat and Beverage Supplies (QMB) after they were denied a liquor import license due to the limitations in the LCA of 2020.

"Now the High Court has ruled the provisions as defective thus allowing all companies to import liquor in the Isles," he added.

Kijogoo said that what is needed now is to allow companies to import the product as long as they have met all the required conditions which include paying ZMMI.

for the licence which stands at 30m/-.

"This will not only boost business and improve access to the services but also increase revenues to the Zanzibar Revenues Authority (ZRA) and the Tanzania Revenue Authority (TRA)," he said.

According to him, the Act was going against section 12 (1) (2) of the Zanzibar Constitution which explains that there should not be any law which will contain direct discrimination.

On that basis, he said the government authorities should now release more than 25 containers of liquor that have been detained at the Malindi port in Unguja for allegedly importing them without having a permit.

He said OMB was banned from importing liquor in the Isles along with other experienced companies.

Prohibition of liquor importation in Zanzibar has caused a huge crisis of the product after the liquor board granted permit to three other companies which lack experience in the business denying the former and experienced companies such as One Stop Centre, Scotch Store and the popular liquor company-

Cooperation by China, Africa in agriculture continues deepening

WHEN visiting an egg production factory in Pinggu District, Beijing's northeastern suburb, African diplomats were amazed by the automated breeding process and quality products produced.

During an organized trip on Wednesday, 28 diplomats from over 20 African countries visited the egg factory, a food technology company, and scenic spot known as "peach blossom sea".

Modernization of agriculture and mechanization of agriculture at various levels of the value chain is quite relevant to Africa, said Willy Bett, Kenyan ambassador to China.

Beijing boasts about half of Chinese academicians in agriculture, over 1,000 professional breeders, and almost 20,000 agricultural scientific and technical personnel. As a traditional agricultural district of Beijing, Pinggu has made full use of its regional advantages to attract technicians by establishing laboratories for academicians and researchers, offering funds for scientific and technological innovation.

Chickens nurtured in Pinggu are a great example of local products going abroad. At a chicken farm

Pace of SIM card registration in Zanzibar increases by 12 pct

THE trend of SIM card registration in Zanzibar indicates a 12 percent increase in the penetration of mobile phone services among the population.

The newly released communication sector statistics issued by the Tanzania Communications Regulatory Authority (TCRA) Director General, Dr Jabiri Bakari, show that SIM card registration in Unguja and Pemba increased by an average of 37.21 percent between September 2022 and March 2024.

The Government is implementing a key project in Zanzibar to facilitate the migration to superior mobile phone services that offer more quality voice communications and faster data transmissions.

Tanzanian government launched the construction of 42 new mobile base transceiver stations in 39 wards in Zanzibar in November

2022. The statistics show that SIM cards now reach 45 percent of the Unguja and Pemba population. The penetration was 26.5 in September project.

The March 2024 penetration is higher in Pemba's two regions -82.5 percent compared with 38.6 percent in Unguja.

The project is part of a programme managed by the Universal Communications Services Access Fund (UCSAF). The Government is currently building 758 new base stations and upgrading more than 300 others in Mainland Tanzania.

Mobile services rollout and geographical coverage increased by between two and four points per technology during the January-March 2024, quarter. Thirdgeneration (3G) mobile services rollout increased from 86 percent to 88 percent. Fourth generation (4G) from 79 to 80 percent. The fifth generation 5G) rollout is 13.

The TCRA statistics show that 72,496,095 SIM cards were registered throughout Tanzania by March 2024, of which 1.3 percent 2022, two months before the are for machine-to-machine communications. Some 70.035.043 SIM cards were registered in January 2024.

Not World Bank loan terms; capital formation is real gap

T may not really be much of an issue that international financial organisations need to provide Long-term loans without interest so that African countries can fully implement development projects, as a top government official was quoted late last week as having said.

The problem is that, looking at what transpired in the Washington, DC, meeting where this affirmation was being made, it would appear that this demand has already been met.

World Bank lending has various conditions and a range of loans, from the International Development Association, are long-term.

A World Bank write-up says IDA lends money on concessional terms on the basis of zero or very low interest charge, as noted at the weekend meeting.

What the official appeared to be saying was that all World Bank lending needs to be tailored to IDA, whereas IDA is an exception to the role and can't become the rule as such.

IDA loan repayments are stretched over between 30 and 40 years, with more than half of countries receiving all, or half, of their IDA resources on grant terms, which carry no repayments at all.

What the Treasury executive said was that short-term loans are hurting African countries, and there is thus greater need for long-term loans of between 50 and 70 years and without interest

The direct request was for the World Bank to consider reviewing its nearterm programmes to prioritise Africa for additional financial resources.

The tone that one gets from this appeal is that African nations basically rely on loans of key multilateral agencies as they can't obtain commercial loans. At any rate, if they obtained them as they often do, it soon signals a balance of payments crisis.

There were 22 sub-Saharan Africa countries grouped as a specific zone continent - excluding South Africa.

It was unlikely that any participant would have spelled out why African countries would need to create conditions for vast capital formation, as this idea is relatively unknown in the Bretton Woods institution.

The countries' preference is private sector involvement or, rather covertly, growth led by the private sector.

There is no discussion on competition, efficiency, conditions for large savings or transfer of capital from the West to Africa. At the very best, we hear of Diaspora remittances, etc.

There is renewed interest in multilateral lending as the BRICS option, which was unreliable from the start, has now thinned out - with Russia having never been a big lender to Africa.

China used to be a big lender but its investments are in perilous circumstances similar to investments back home.

There slowing global growth and strategic disputes among major powers are slowing investment levels to a pale shadow of its earlier image.

In that case, China could be seen preferring direct investments by private companies or on a private sector basis even for state-owned corporate entities.

Part of the role that China played in the past two decades has been taken up by emerging upper middle income economies like Turkey and a number of others.

Tanzania's own two key projects, one for the standard gauge railway and the other a major hydropower project, attest to this.

Our cooperation with Turkey and Egypt was pivotal, the reason being that there was a massive cut in unnecessary recurrent expenditure for the government to put up large sums on the table for the projects.

What is needed is a further opening up of the various sectors as well as housing and land ownership so that or 'constituency', chiefly Anglophone capital can flow in, in the process ones in the eastern part of the removing the need for massive loans.

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New Senegal president likely to take pragmatic approach to 'shaking up' of external relations

ASSIROU Diomaye Faye's election as Senegal's youngest president on 24 March was celebrated domestically and internationally as confirmation of the country's strong democratic tradition.

Observers believe that Senegalese citizens, and the youth in particular, the Constitutional Council and religious and political actors were impressively resilient in navigating an often violent three-vear political crisis. They successfully resisted attempts to extend former president Macky Sall's term in office.

But alongside the praise is uncertainty about how Faye and his political mentor Ousmane Sonko, who has been appointed prime minister, might conduct Senegal's external relations. Sonko. a firebrand critic of Sall who was disqualified from elections following his imprisonment for "corrupting the youth", endorsed Faye's candidacy for president.

The brief campaign period prevented candidates presenting detailed manifestos. Nevertheless, questions about a possible repositioning of Senegal are borne out by Faye and Sonko's pre-election rhetoric. Their party

Patriotes africains du Sénégal pour le travail, l'éthique et la fraternité - and its political allies issued a campaign programme that called for reclaiming Senegal's sovereignty. It suggested reforming the CFA franc, introducing a new national currency, ensuring mutually beneficial international partnerships, and renegotiating unbalanced natural resources contracts.

Senegalese foreign policy has traditionally featured relations with four main strategic partners: France, Saudi Arabia, the United States (US), and Morocco. It has been underpinned by principles that successive governments have adhered to since independence. These include commitments to African integration and unity, respect for the United Nations Charter and international law, and promoting regional stability.

pragmatism and non-exclusivity in bilateral and multilateral relations. This means Senegal is open to relations with all countries and partners to the extent that they further its national interests. While these principles may guide the Faye government, current issues and contexts could result in particular policy changes.

Economic considerations

An important area is the economic dimensions of Senegal's external relations. The ruling coalition's programme calls for left-wing Pan-Africanist policies ensuring greater national ownership and management of national resources. In keeping with this, Faye announced an audit of the oil, gas and mining sectors in his first speech. New Energy and Mines Minister Birame Souleye Diop reinforced this by indicating that existing contracts could be renegotiated on completion of the audit.

This comes against the backdrop of popular misgivings that some of these contracts weren't negotiated in the interest of Senegal and wouldn't benefit ordinary citizens. External partners and investors could therefore expect some form of economic nationalism.

However, a more cautious approach to the CFA franc's future and Senegal's membership of the West African Economic and Monetary Union (Waemu) could be expected. Both Faye and Sonko had criticised the lack of monetary sovereignty.

The country's currency, used by seven other Waemu members, is pegged to the euro, and the Dakar-based central bank (BCEAO) conducts monetary policy. Faye and Sonko previously advocated for an exit from what they considered the tutelage of France over the BCEAO, and replacing the CFA franc with a currency that would better benefit local economies.

Sonko clarified his stance in a preelection press conference, saying a new currency would be introduced only if CFA franc reforms at the

sub-regional level failed. His appointment of Abdourahmane Sarr – an economist known for his reformist stance on the currency as Economy, Planning and Cooperation Minister, signals his intent to pursue reform. However, there is awareness of a replacement currency's complexities and potential consequences, including managing exchange rates and inflationary impacts.

Similarly, significant shifts in regional engagements appear unlikely. Senegal is an active Economic Community of West African States (Ecowas) member and considers the bloc an important partner in ensuring regional stability, especially in neighbouring Guinea-Bissau and Gambia. These two countries, which border Senegal's southern Casamance region, are crucial to finding a definitive solution to the region's long-standing conflict.

Security contribution

This partly explains Senegal's support to the Ecowas Mission in The Gambia, despite growing weariness among some Gambians, and its troop contribution to the bloc's Stabilisation Support Mission in Guinea-Bissau. Senegal's new authorities will have to strengthen relations not only between states but also among populations.

Security and economic benefits, including access to a West African market of about 394 million people, means a weak Ecowas isn't beneficial to Senegal. In fact, the ruling coalition has committed to reforming the bloc's institutions to make them inclusive of its people.

Supporting a stronger Ecowas means Senegal can help bring Burkina Faso, Mali and Niger back into the regional institution. The three countries formed the Alliance of Sahelian States in September 2023 and in January withdrew from Ecowas over its handling of their coups.

Sonko has in the past expressed support for Mali's interim leader Assimi Goïta, and Senegal's new leaders share the Pan-Africanist and sovereignist ideals of their Sahelian counterparts. Despite this, the country's triumphant election confirmed its status as a strong democracy, making a union with the military-led countries unlikely.

The three Sahelian states were invited to Fave's inauguration showing the president's interest in keeping relations cordial while working on Ecowas reforms, and possibly helping create conditions for their return. These engagements don't mean Senegal will replicate the Alliance of Sahelian States' strong ties with actors such as Russia, or terminate security cooperation with existing partners. France, the US and European Union have supported Senegalese defence and security forces over the past decades.

Senegal will probably remain pragmatic by sustaining relations with its traditional partners, expanding existing ones and building new ties. This can be done while being sensitive to antiimperialist and Pan-Africanist sentiments among a mostly youthful population.

regional commissioner was emphatic that the event would see clerics pray for the country's future as it marks 60 years of Union.

On a secular note, meanwhile, the prayers would be preceded by testing standard gauge railway electric trains, ahead of formal operations by early July. The two events understandably show both success and hope.

In the way nations and individuals live, one reaps what one sows and in many cases prayers constitute appeals for divine help so that we don't face the consequences of our own mischief.

Prayer is one face of society while real economic and social activity shows a different face. The first image wishes good for all, while the second face is one of tearing at what there is pursuit of privileges.

Another difficulty on the way ahead in ensuring that harmony remains in place involves errors in locating sources of satisfaction or desperation, where habits may at times form the biggest obstacle to alleviating systemic sources of disaffection.

For instance, the mid-1990s once saw political loyalties rocked by the issue of privatising the National Bank of Commerce, even as it was vital to rationalise the banking and financial sector generally.

Since then there has been little appetite for privatisation as local professionals don't want their commanding positions to be taken

preparations away by appointees, often of foreign investors.

As a result, the economy is not expanding fast enough and job creation is slow, followed by a largely advisory industry on how youths can employ themselves or start skimpy farming units.

Not a single global multilateral agency tells them that landholding is a problem, so the armed herders and meek small land holders are asked to live democratically. It's an absurdity of sorts with vital lessons.

Our reporter, VALENTINE OFORO, interviewed the former premier as he celebrates vears of being one of the country's icon leaders.

Question: Who is Dr John Samweli Malecela?

Answer: Dr John Samweli Malecela is a Tanzanian who was born on April 20th 1934 at Mvumi Mission in Dodoma Region, under the roof of Samweli Malecela's householdthe then church leader who managed to erect his own church some 6 kilometers from Msanga area of Mvumi ward where he served Lord for years and after his death, he was buried at his church grounds.

My grandfather is said to have been born way back between 1885 and 1986, he was a great man who dedicated his lifetime in dealing with faith and church issues. He fathered seven male children, including my father Samweli, and worked hard to ensure all of the children are

And, it was these children who later on established village schools, the then vital facilities which laid a crucial foundation to trigger availability of education services as well as learning culture among villagers.

My father, Samweli decided to extend his living foothold in Mpwapwa before he shifted to Mvumi ward in Dodoma where I was born. This is John Malecela and I thank God for blessing me with all these years.

Q: You are one of the few oldest leaders and politicians in the country who ventured into politics since 1960s, can you tell us the secret behind your long liv-

A: First of all, I would like to thank God for giving me a peculiar blessing of continuing to survive at this old age, sometimes I even ask myself and wonder what exactly is making me continue to breathe and enjoy the sunshine, only to realize that it is by His grace.

For any human being, living long or short is based on the decision of the Lord, but it also depends on individual's willingness and ability to survive in accordance with the recommended healthy living tips, especially eating and drinking habits. Living healthy requires one to do physical exercises.

I used to drink alcohol when I was young, but years have passed since I decided to live healthy whereas I have been observant on what I eat and drink.

On top of that, I grew up in the hands of a 'faith-based' father who was in the forefront to ensure I adopt positive living behaviors since my childhood. My parents played unforgettable roles in enabling me to grow- up and become a sensible man who embraces key humanity values and behaviors. I walk between three and five kilometers every morning, this makes me more physically stable.

O: Putting aside the politics, Dr Malecela is what

kind of a father and husband?

A: Basically, I have always been a responsible father committed to taking good care of my children. Despite the fact that I have been occupied with a lot of work, I tried my best to accomplish my spousal responsibilities and be a good husband.

Q: Is there any relation between your family history and you being a leader?

A: My father was an educated person who during his 'heydays' worked tirelessly to ensure his children get ample opportunity to access quality education. As they said, education is a key to life, after receiving education I came to be aware of the effects of colonial rule which prevailed in the country during those days.

I was inspired to venture into politics during the liberation struggle, especially the strong movements which emerged in Rufiji and Lindi and thus, I decided to join the fray.

Decisions to participate in politics were meant to have a crucial podium to add -up a strong muscle in the fight against colonialism and oppression, as well as voicing for the voiceless. Between 1965 and 1959 I was in India for studies, and during that time India attained independence after a longstruggle. This motivated me to join the fight, wishing to see my country escape

from the hands of colonialists.

Q: Being a public leader has any negative effects on family?

A: It is not wise to mention specific names, but I know a number of families of high-educated individuals and leaders whose families have totally failed to take

To be a public leader has a number of challenges especially in getting enough time to serve then nation, family and fulfill spousal responsibilities. Most leaders find themselves occupied with daily responsibilities to the tune of failing to practice parental care. This gap in children up-brining has been evidencing in the families of most of the public leaders where you will find children are adopting negative behaviors due to lack of parental care. This also happens within families of common people.

For my case, thank God that I was striving harder to set ample hours and days to spend with my family and give them all the needed parental comfort, as well as serving for my marriage. When I was the Minister for East African Community (EAC), I used to reside in Arusha Region, but I could find time at least one a month to go for vacation with my family.

Q: Do you think the current political to select public leaders based on their per-

and leadership system has proper institutions to mold future leaders?

A: Chama Cha Mapinduzi (CCM) used to have tailor-made institutions for shaping young active leaders, for instance in Dodoma there was the college in Hombolo ward, Mlale in Songea Region and Lushoto District in Tanga Region.

We used to send CCM youth to colleges whereas they were imparted with requisite leadership skills. Most of these colleges stopped operating when the country adopted the multiparty system in 1992. The Lushoto college became the institute for training lawyers while the one at Hombolo trains local government leaders.

Q: Last year President Samia Suluhu Hassan reinstated the position of deputy prime minister and appointed Dr Dotto Biteko to handle the key post. What's your comment on this?

A: Yes! And if at all we want to be honest on this, we need to stress over what has been happening since reinstating the position by asking ourselves this question, 'are there any changes?

For me, there have been countless positive developments. Dr Biteko has been demonstrating high maturity in executing his responsibilities to the tune of stimulating development at various socioeconomic sectors. This has enabled him to receive a welcoming-hand from the entire public in the country. Therefore, President Samia has made a sober decision to placeback the position.

Q: We have seen a good number of women appointed at different decision making positions. Do you think they are holding enough muscles to stand as leaders?

A: Where could we (men) be in absence of women? If they can manage to handle the hardest task of bringing us in the world, what other task they cannot accomplish?

Caribbean startups are turning excess seaweed into an agroecology solution

N 2015, smelly mats of a brown macroalgae called sargassum piled as high as 1.2 meter (4 feet) on the beaches of Barbados, recalls Joshua Forte. It was the fourth year in what has become an annual nightmare, with an estimated 18,100 kilograms (20 tons) of seaweed inundating Caribbean shorelines each year and wrecking the region's tourism-centered economies.

The onslaught of seaweed reeked of rotten eggs, but Forte smelled something else: opportunity.

A year earlier, Forte founded an organic fertilizer company called Red Diamond Compost. He was already selling a soil additive from sunflower seeds called Liquid Sunshine. But the sargassum seemed too big to ignore.

So, Forte started to collect the seaweed by hand, hauling 27-kg (60-pound) bags of it into the back of a pickup truck. It became the raw material for a new product called Supreme Sea, a soil additive that includes growthstimulating plant hormones and microorganisms extracted from the sargassum. After extraction, Forte composts what's left over into a humus-rich product that's safe for crops. The idea was to "have as big of an impact as possible on the influx of sargassum while contributing in a positive way to agriculture," Forte said.

Sargassum contains a slew of nutrients, minerals and microorganisms that can foster and even accelerate plant growth, such as iron, magnesium, potassium, calcium and more. But rather than add nutrients such as nitrogen and phosphorus into the soil, it does something savvy: Its properties help plants be more efficient at taking up those nutrients, incentivizing less synthetic fertilizer application in exchange for higher yields and healthier plants and crops. It's a trending solution that could double as both a regional economic opportunity and a new tool for agroecology, a sustainable farming approach that targets food security in tandem with environmental health. Now, a few other entrepreneurs across the Caribbean are developing an industry for sargassum-based agricultural products – and interest is growing, Forte said.

"It could be really huge for the Caribbean economy," said Allen McGonagill, the chief sustainability officer for Carbonwave, a company collecting sargassum in Mexico and Puerto Rico. He said sargassum can be used to make a slew of products, from plastic- and leather-like materials to biofuels and cosmetics. If these industries become large enough, they could collectively keep sargassum off the beaches, which would be a boon for the tourism sec-

Scientists think nitrogen pollution from agricultural runoff in the Amazon River Basin is one of the main reasons why the sargassum blooms have grown so out of control over the past decade or so, in addition to warmer ocean temperatures from climate change and increased volumes of Saharan dust, which carries added nutrients as it wafts over the Atlantic Ocean.

"Taking what nature is producing in overabundance and finding good uses for that is just such a better way of thinking about how we produce materials than the synthetics mindset" of prioritizing cookie-cutter production, McGonagill stated. A branch of Carbonwave, called Sarga Agriscience, is specifically focused on creating a plant-growth extract called SargaExtra.

'Sargassum lends itself to the agriculture side, primarily because of the volume," said Jonas Kunz, Carbonwave's agriculture director. Plus, he added, sargassum "has this kind of natural cocktail of good ingredients."

Sargassum acts like a sponge in the ocean, absorbing nutrients and minerals as it floats around the Atlantic. But that comes with one particularly dangerous drawback: Much of the seaweed contains high levels of arsenic, making it extremely dangerous to apply on soil without treating it first. Some farmers in Vieques, Puerto Rico, did just that, prompting an islandwide law prohibiting the use of sargassum for fertilizers and composts.

To avoid this health hazard, fertilizer companies, as well as folks creating at-home versions of composts from sargassum, need to properly rinse and process the seaweed. At Sarga Agriscience, this was a crucial step in the company's development.

"We had to really look at the extraction method, and we found ways in which we can essentially extract all the good stuff and concentrate that," Kunz said. Carbonwave uses a cold-pressing process, squeezing out the nutrients without destroying any of the beneficial proteins with heat or acids. They also don't use heavy chemicals to filter out the unwanted ingredients, such as heavy metals. Other ways of turning sargassum into organic agricul-

tural products are by fermentation, where microbes break down sugars and other components, or by drying the seaweed and then grinding it up. The latter doesn't make the valuable components accessible to plants because they're still trapped inside the cells, McGonagill explained.

Sargassum's ability to absorb nutrients also makes it a helpful aid to terrestrial plants. "We're helping the [crop] plant be more efficient at taking those nutrients out of the soil," McGonagill added.

It's a tool that can help boost yields as much as 10%, Kunz said – a significant increase. So far, their team has seen the best results in barley, corn and soy. And while organic additives such as SargaExtra and other biostimulants aren't total replacements for fertilizer, they can reduce the amount needed.

A nutrient-pollution solution

Sargassum-based plant growth products, such as SargaExtra and Red Diamond's Supreme Sea, may be efficient means of not only reducing sargassum on coastlines, but also of reducing nitrogen inputs in soil.

Nitrogen loads from synthetic fertilizers pose a global problem: When excess fertilizer runs off into rivers, lakes and oceans, or when it trickles down into groundwater, it creates a nitrogen surplus, which can cause harmful algal blooms and threaten human

As a case in point, Red Diamond conducted trials of its Supreme Sea biostimulant on sports turfs in the United Kingdom with synthetic fertilizers to test which combination resulted in the most optimal turf color. They found that halving the quantity of synthetic fertilizers while using Supreme Sea produced better color than synthetic fertilizers alone.

"We were trying to understand ... how the product affects the efficiency of the nutrient uptake by the plants," Forte said. "[The result] kind of indicates that a lot of nitrogen is still being put into the environment that's not necessary."

Red Diamond has tested its biostimulant in other locations too. Field trials in Spain showed yield increases in tomatoes and cucumbers, and they're beginning to test products in Cameroon and other African countries. Forte said they aim to improve food security and soil health around the world.

There's a huge need for that type of improvement in the Carib-

"I don't think we have paid as much attention to producing good food the way we used to produce good food," said Marcia Brandon, managing director for the Caribbean Centre of Excellence for Sustainable Livelihoods, a Barbados-based NGO dedicated to helping entrepreneurs kickstart their ideas. "We are known in this region for producing agriculture ... but somehow, we let it slip away with the introduction of fertilizers and different chemicals. We have not stood guard over our own food supply."

Brandon considers Red Diamond part of the solution to food security and sovereignty in the Caribbean. If Barbados can reinvigorate its soil and use more sustainable products like Forte's, she said, then the island could undo its dependence on chemicals within the next decade.

Farmers are generally opposed to reducing their fertilizer inputs, McGonagill said, so he hopes products like SargaExtra can incentivize cutting back on fertilizer use by a small percentage. "We do see part of our role as harnessing those nutrients and

then putting them back into agriculture," he said. A challenging waste source

While these products are intended to boost agricultural yields and residential gardens, the other major function is, of course, to help reduce the massive amounts of sargassum hitting shorelines.

"It is a waste source," McGonagill said, noting that prior to the inaugural onslaught in 2011, sargassum was scarce on Caribbean beaches. He added that it's helpful to think of sargassum more as an invasive species – a foreign, nuisance organism that needs to

"While I think we are one of the largest companies that are collecting sargassum and trying to put it to use, we are still only scratching the surface," McGonagill said.

Indeed, of the 20 million estimated tons of sargassum that makes its way across the Caribbean each year, Carbonwave collected just 25,000 tons last year.

"If the agricultural industry adopted sargassum-based extracts, it could entirely solve the problem of sargassum on the beaches,' McGonagill added. "But, obviously, that's a big transition for the

Seasonality remains one of the biggest challenges to scaling up production. Although huge amounts of sargassum hit the beaches annually from March to October, it isn't available year-round. Plus, the exact amount varies from year to year. Estimates currently rely on a combination of satellite data and manual measurements on beaches. As of yet, accurate estimates are difficult to pin down.

For that reason, Sarga Ag produces extra product during sargassum season and plans for the remaining inventory. Their liquid product can stay stored on shelves, but for smaller companies, this seasonality is a barrier to establishing a reliable sargassum-based

"There is a problem: It is not predictable," said Daveian Morrison, the founder of a Jamaican company called Awganic Inputs that was using sargassum for goat feed. But when Morrison saw research citing concerns about arsenic levels, he abandoned goatfeed production. He said he'd like to see more research on arsenic levels across the Caribbean to gain a better understanding of how it's distributed throughout the environment – and he would eagerly jump back into the goat feed sector once the science is clearer.

Many studies have quantified arsenic concentrations in sargassum across the Caribbean in an attempt to assess its scope. But concentrations vary from location to location, making localized testing necessary.

Collecting large volumes of seaweed is, no pun intended, another major barrier. Not only is timing essential, but using boats and equipment is a considerable cost compared with the time-intensive manual labor of collecting sargassum by hand.

That's why Forte's next big investment at Red Diamond is a floating barrier with netting that extends 3 feet deep to capture sargassum before it hits the shore. This could also help trap the seaweed for weeks as a way to extend the time it's available for harvest.

As soon as sargassum hits the shore, it starts to decompose. This releases smelly hydrogen sulfide and ammonia into the air, powerful toxins that can cause respiratory issues. And while it can be col-

lected from beaches, it needs to be fresh enough to use for biofertilizers.

Carbonwave mostly collects seaweed onshore and in the shallows; collecting it too far offshore, McGonagill pointed out, can disrupt the seaweed's function as a nursery for small fish and other critters in the open ocean. But beached sargassum can entangle wildlife, including preventing sea turtle hatchlings from reaching the water.

Small-scale industry or regional

While the industry remains a small club, the issue isn't going away. Mexico uses sargassum for a long list of products, such as eco-concrete and biogas. And in Miami, a recent initiative offered cash prizes for innovative uses of sargassum as a mitigation measure, including Carbonwave and a St. Lucian biofertilizer company called Algas Organics. As the industry grows, Morrison anticipated that "ownership" over sargassum, depending on its location in the water, could become a point of

For now, the agroecological benefits of using sargassum to help produce more nutritious food are what keep Forte motivated at Red Diamond.

As a child, his grandmother's garden was paradise. He climbed mango trees, plucked ripe bananas off the stems and stole the occasional "finger fruit," a local term for carambola (star fruit, Averrhoa carambola), as an afternoon snack. Forte watched as she recycled plant matter back into the soil, allowing the crops to proliferate year-round.

Looking back, Forte realized his grandmother was practicing what is now called permaculture, a style of agroecology that prioritizes recycling nutrients in a zero-waste man-

"Nature is something that is everchanging," Forte said. "We have to be as flexible and as adaptable as nature to be able to work with it effectively."

Women cooperative for vegetables transforming Ivory Coast's rural areas

ABIDJAN

IN the village of Fapaha in the north of Ivory Coast, women have formed a cooperative to grow vegetables and sell their produce on the market, allowing them to raise money for their families without relying on hand-outs.

"In the days when I didn't grow onions, when I needed something, I had to ask someone (for help) (saying), sorry, could you help me", explained Mariam Sulue, the Secretary of Fapaha Women's Association.

The project has benefited from the help of the World Food Programme, which has provided them with agricultural tools and ways to sell their produce to the local school canteen.

"We are supporting a number of farming groups, mainly made up of women, by giving them the means to produce through the supply of farming inputs, as well as farming techniques", said Olivia Hantz, WFP chief in Ivory

The farming project also allows women to become the main players in the life of the village. They

have achieved an important place in rural society, which generally tends to be male dominated.

"The woman who works in the market garden already has a reserved place in the village nobility hierarchy," said economic analyst Jean-Marie Biada.

During the cooperative's collaboration with the village school cafeteria in 2022 and 2023, they were able to produce 25 tons of vegetables on 99 acres (40 hectares) and 10 tons of legume on 44 acres (18 hectares).

According to a U.K.-funded study in Ivory Coast in 2020, 42.9 percent of women in the country work in agriculture, more than any other sector.

Yet women are more vulnerable in the agricultural domain because customs around land fa-

Only 8 percent of women own land, as opposed to 22 percent of men. And when women get married, they often lose access to land in case of the death of their husband, in which case they are expected to return to their premarital family.



Drive to unlock school girls' potential to access education unveiled in Geita

IRLS in Geita Region are now breathing a sigh of relief following a new initiative to address menstrual hygiene challenges aimed at unlocking their full potential to education.

For far too long, the stigma and shame associated with menstruation has prevented girls from accessing the education they deserve, trapping them in a cycle of missed classes and diminished opportunities.

But now, thanks to the tireless efforts by Geita Gold Mine Limited (GGML) which has taken on the challenge of addressing the critical issue in local schools, the results have been nothing short of life-changing.

By distributing sanitary pads and providing comprehensive menstrual health education, the company has empowered girls like Kulwa Lameck, a Form Four student at Nyakabale Secondary School, to reclaim their rightful place in the classroom.

The words were echoed by Rosemary Nicolaus, a teacher at Nyankumbu Secondary School who said she has seen a remarkable change in her students' attendance and academic performance since the menstrual hygiene

"After the menstrual hygiene education, the girls' attendance has improved significantly, and their confi-

Since 2018, IPRC Musanze has graduated over 1,700 students and offers a range of courses including irrigation and drainage technology, construction technology, highway engineering, e-commerce and information technology. Student enrollment has grown significantly from just 171 in 2014 to more than 1,800 currently.

ETHABILE Ratsomo said it's the little things that remind her of her perceived place" in South African

There are the verbal slights and side-eye in workspaces, where she's been viewed as a B-BBEE hire (The Broad-Based Black Economic Empowerment programme in South African that seeks to advance and transform the participation of black people in the country's economy) and therefore not capable of doing the work. There are the passive-aggressive comments from colleagues, constantly complimenting her on how well she speaks English. She has lived through the daily microaggressions that form part of her life.

"I am a born-free and despite being born after the advent of democracy in South Africa, my race continues to play a huge role in my being, as a South African," Ratsomo said, 29, who currently works at the Anti-Racism Network and the Ahmed Kathrada Foundation. "Many people continue to normalise racial discrimination and perpetuate harmful behaviours. Racism remains rife.'

Thirty years since the end of Apartheid, South Africa still grapples with its legacy. Unequal access to education, unequal pay, segregated communities and massive economic disparities persists, much of it is reinforced by existing institutions and attitudes. How is it that racism and its accompanying discrimination continues to hold such sway in this, majority Black populated and Black governed nation?

Racism has deep roots in the economic, spatial and social fabric of this country. It reflects the legacy of oppression and subjugation from apartheid and colonialism. While progress has been made to eliminate the scourge of racism it requires everyone to do their part for it be eliminated, said Abigail Noko, Representative for UN Human Rights Regional Office of Southern Africa (OHCHR ROSA)

"Dismantling such entrenched racist and discriminatory systems re-

quires commitment, leadership, dialogue and advocacy to put in place anti-racist policies that implement human rights norms and provide a framework to help address and rectify these injustices and promote equality," she added.

Free your mind and the rest will follow

The project of dismantling racist systems in a place like South Africa, must go hand in hand with the process of decolonization - both at an institutional and an individual level, said Professor Tshepo Madlingozi, a Commissioner at the South African Human Rights Commission

"History has shown that unless you have decolonized your mind, you are going to step into the shoes of the oppressor and oppress other people over and over again," he said.

Madlingozi's comments were part of a panel discussion on dismantling racist systems in South Africa, which took place during the Human Rights Festival in Johannesburg in March, which aligns with national Human Rights Day and the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination. The discussion, sponsored by OHCHR ROSA, had three panellists providing their answers to the overarching question, how can racism present in the "rainbow nation" be dismantled to bring about freedom, equality, and justice for all?

Samkelo Mkhomi, a social justice and equality activist in her 20s, agreed that an internal mindset change was needed, especially among young people. She said she noticed that many of her born-free peers, i.e., someone who was born after the advent of democracy in South Africa, harbour suspicious and distrustful attitudes toward other races. She mentioned a friend who has a distrust of all white people. When Mkhomi asked why, he told her "because of what they did in the past." She called this deliberate lack of understanding among her peers as hereditary and a big stumbling block in moving forward.

"We have set perceptions and stereotypes that we've inherited from family, from social experiences, experiences that are not our own," Mkhomi said. "And we've used that as a blueprint to view other people. Once you can get rid of that as young people, I feel like we can start moving on and dismantling racism."

Madlingozi suggested one way to do this could be to not only focus on individual racist incidences, but also to bring more awareness, and push for policies in institutions that deconstruct current ways of working.

"What matters is, have we dismantled the institutions, the cultures that perpetuate racism," he said. "Because unless you do that, you'll have Black people, you will have a Black government that will continue to perpetuate racism because that is the nature of institutionalised racism. So yes, let's focus on individual human rights. Let's focus on social justice, but where it matters the most is structural institutionalized oppression."

Casting a long shadow

The scars of Apartheid run deep, leaving a legacy of segregation, discrimination and inequality. This is evidenced by the stark economic disparities in the country. A 2022 World Bank report on inequality in southern Africa gave South Africa the unfortunate distinction of being the most unequal country in the world.

The report stated that 80 percent of the country's wealth was in the hands of 10 percent of the population. And it is the Black population who factor the most into the poorest category. The report places the blame for the income disparities directly on race.

"The legacy of colonialism and Apartheid rooted in racial and spatial segregation continues to reinforce inequality," the report states.

The spatial divide mirrors the economic one.

The evil genius of Apartheid was the segregation project, as it allowed the Government to not only separate people based on arbitrary categorisations, but through this create material differences between the communities to reinforce the idea of actual racial differences, said Tessa Dooms. These racial classifications also encouraged the idea that the different groups needed to compete for basic human rights, dignity and economic opportunities, she added. "The Apartheid government didn't just give people categories, they gave real live material meaning to those categories," said Dooms, Director of Programmes for

Rivonia Circle during the panel discussion. "As long as those categories mean something in the world, we still have work to do, to undo Apartheid, to undo colonialism, to decolonize."

To do this, Dooms recommended practical vision as to what a decolonized South Africa would look like, being very specific about the results wanted. She also called on the privileged groups to do the heavy lifting of helping to create more equality. Until those with privileges work to broaden access to them, the cycle will continue, Dooms added.

"We cannot leave creating a more just world to the people who are most affected by injustice," she said. "It's not fair, it's not right and it won't

Taking concrete action

Globally, South Africa's post-Apartheid long walk to freedom has garnered an international reputation as a leader in global efforts to combat racism. In 2001, South Africa hosted the World Conference Against Racism, Racial Discrimination, Xenophobia and Related Intolerance (WCAR), which resulted in the Durban Declaration and Programme of Action (DDPA). The DDPA is a roadmap, providing concrete measures for States to combat racism, discrimination and xenophobia and related intolerance.

One of the big recommendations was to have each country create its own National Action Plan (NAP). The plan is a means through which governments locally codify their commitment to taking action, with concrete steps on how they will combat racism. South Africa launched its plan in 2019, with OHCHR ROSA providing technical assistance. This assistance took many forms including participation in the consultations that led up to the final NAP and helping to set up support structures for its implementation, and support for research and other work to help develop systems for data collection on issues related to the NAP.


"Human rights play crucial role in dismantling racism by providing a framework for addressing and rectifying historical injustices, promoting equality, and ensuring that all individuals are treated fairly and with dignity," Noko said

Various other sectors have pioneered innovative approaches to chip away at Apartheid's remnants. Corporate and governmental diversity programmes, such as B-BBEE, and the Employment Equity Amendment Bill of 2020, aim to promote diversity and equity in the workplace.

Ratsomo of the Ahmed Kathrada Foundation said these and other efforts to address the underlying issue of what to do about that still exists in the country are key to taking it down. Everyone must learn, speak up, and acton racism, racial discrimination and related intolerances, she said.

"The beginning point to tackle and dismantle systemic racism is to understand that being anti-racist does not only mean being against racism," she said. "It also means being active and speaking out against racism whenever you see it happen.

The more we understand racism, the easier it becomes to identify when it happens, which allows us to speak out and act against it when we see it happening."



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Current account deficit narrows as export earnings spike

HE Current account deficit narrowed by nearly 45 percent to US\$2.7 billion during the year ending February 2024, compared to US\$5.1 billion recorded in February 2023, thanks to increased exports, moderated global commodity prices and decline of imports

According to the Bank of Tanzania (BoT) monthly economic review for March, in the year ending February 2024, exports of goods and services rose by 14.7 percent, reaching US\$14,274 million compared with the level recorded in the corresponding period in 2023.

The main drivers included tourism receipts, traditional goods and minerals, specifically gold.

Traditional goods exports amounted to US\$ 1,022.7 million, from US\$748.7 million in the previous year, with much of the increase observed in exports of tobacco and coffee on account of volume and price effects.

According to the global market reports, prices of agricultural products have also exhibited a mixed trend, with coffee, cotton, palm oil, and sugar prices increasing due to supply constraints globally.

Exports of non-traditional goods rose by 2.4 percent to US\$6,343.1 million, with the increase noticeable in gold, horticultural products, and oil seeds.

The export of gold amounted to US\$3,108.8 million, compared with US\$2,872.6 million in the previous period, and



accounted for 49 percent of non-traditional exports. Exports of horticultural products edged up by 46.5 percent to USD 425.4 million, driven by an increase in exports of edible vegetables.

Service receipts surged to US\$6,482.5 million in the year to February 2024 from US\$5,094 million in the previous year, largely driven by travel (tourism) and transportation receipt.

The surge in travel receipts reflects the rebound of the tourism sector, as tourist arrivals rose by 21.4 percent to 1,881,823 from 1,550,333.

In Zanzibar Exports of goods and services reached US\$ 217.7 million in the year ending February 2024, up from US\$198.0 million recorded in similar pe-

riod in 2023 on account of an increase in exports of both goods (seaweeds, manufactured products, fish, and fish products) and services (tourism).

Earnings from services rose by 12.8 percent to US\$145.9 million, following an increase in tourist arrivals. Cloves exports in value terms declined by 33.1 percent to USD 28.3 million due to the cyclical nature of the crop.

On a month-to-month basis, exports of goods and services rose to US\$20.2 million compared to US\$2.7 million in February 2023, largely associated with an increase in manufactured goods.

The central bank monthly review also shows imports of goods and services fell to US\$16,087.2 million, compared with USD 16,928.3 million a year earlier.

The decrease was driven by refined white petroleum products, fertilizers, and plastic items.

Conversely, imports of machinery, industrial transport equipment and passenger motor cars increased.

On a monthly basis, goods imports slightly rose to US\$1,056.8 million in February 2024, compared with US\$ 1,003.7 million recorded in similar month in 2023. Services payments declined to US\$2,280.6 million compared with US\$2,561.8 million in the year to February 2023 on account of lower freight payments attributable to reduced import bills.

The primary income account recorded a deficit of US\$1,551.7 million, higher than US\$1,255.0 million recorded in February 2023, due to higher interest payments abroad.

In Zanzibar, the imports of goods and services across all goods categories rose to US\$ 613.3 million from US\$568.3 million recorded in the year ending February 2023. Capital goods increased to US\$71.6 million from US\$44.0 million, largely associated with ongoing infrastructure projects while intermediate goods import rose by 1.7 percent to US\$384.0 million, largely due to an increase in imports of ingredients for food and beverages, and motorcars for households.

Consumer goods imports increased by 3.6 percent to US\$ 57.9 million, mostly influenced by other consumer goods, in particular insecticides, textiles, paper, and

Farmers empowered to boost production amid changing climate

FARMERS in Kongwa and Mpwapwa districts are poised to reap the rewards of an innovative initiative led by esteemed agriculture experts from local and international institutions. This groundbreaking effort is designed to empower farmers to enhance crop production by implementing strategies to combat the adverse effects of climate change.

Among the most drought-prone areas, the two districts stand as resilient bastions in the face of erratic and capricious rainfall patterns, coupled with pervasive land degradation. These challenges have led to crop failures and extreme weather events, with seasonal rainfall hovering consistently below 400mm per annum in these regions.

Christened 'Enabling a Resilient and Prosperous Community through Participatory Agroecological Practices in the Semi-Arid Region of Central Zone (ResComm -II) Project, the robust initiative targets to increase adoption of agroecological practices among the beneficiary farmers within a total of eight villages in Kongwa districts.

In Kongwa, the benefiting villages include Sagara A, Sagara B, Laikala A, Laikala B, Mlali, Nghumbi, Lengaji, and Moleti, the areas which receive an average annual rainfall of 550mm per annum mainly characterized by high spatial and temporal variability.

Being its second phase of implementation, the project under the comfortable financial patronage from Biovision and LED Liechtensein Development Service will see over 2bn/be spent to impart the farmers in the two districts with the best agroecological practices to cheat negative effects of drought towards crop production and productivity.

And apart to train the farmers how to lessen drought effects, the second phase of the project which will run for at least three consecutive years, 2024-2026, also incorporate a series of constructive efforts to disseminate vital knowledge on livestock keeping sector, especially poultry and small ruminants.

In the implementation of the robust project, the International Livestock Research Institute (ILRI) stands at the driver's seat, leading others, which are International Crops Research Institute for the Semi-Arid Tropics (ICRI-SAT), Tanzania Agricultural Research Institute (TARI), Tanzania Livestock Research Institute (TALIRI) and the Sustainable Agriculture Tanzania (SA

Briefing on the ResComm II project during a special event for its official inception day, held yesterday in Lengaji village, Chiwe ward of Kongwa district, Prof Anthony Whitbread, the Project Leader from ILRI, informed that throughout the project, the target is to see a total of 900 households with improved incomes and food security.

Together with that, he expressed that at least 1,875 households in the two districts will be impacted by the project, with an eye to ensure a total of 200 hectares under sustainable management.

"The general vision of extending rolling out of this project is to increase the adoption of agroecological practices, improve food and nutritional quality for vulnerable households, and promote sustainable landscape management in Kongwa and Mpwapwa districts using community-based agroecological approaches," he sounded.

He communicated thankful message for the vital manner to which the project has received positive cooperation from the office of Dodoma regional commissioner (RC), Kongwa and Mpwapwa districts commissioners (DCs), also appreciated the high commitment being demonstrating by all institutes that are in the implementation list of the project.

"After fetching encouraging results in empowering the farmers to curtail effects of climate change during the first phase of its implementation from 2021-2023, the project's second leg seek to go more further to the extent of increasing incomes among the households and nutrition among children and women," he added.

In his remarks, the event's chief guest, Kongwa District Commissioner (DC), Mayeka Simon Mayeka hailed the project's funders and implementers for realizing the need to assist the farmers in the district to battle against the effects of climate change, especially drought.

"Farmers in different districts across Tanzania are faced with diverse challenges and thus, implementation of this project in our district must be regarded as a rare potential opportunity necessary to be tapped effectively to help transforming your household livelihoods," he challenged the

Adolf Jeremiah, the Research Field Coordinator from ILRI in his brief remarks said assisting the farmers to venture economically onto poultry was also in the heart of the project's implementation vision for the next three years "The project is contemplating to impart the farmers with necessary

skills on poultry project, and there will be several efforts to ensure they're adopting improved crossbreed chicken as well as managing chicken disease," he observed. Through engaging into poultry programs, he expressed, the involving

households will stand chances to improve their livelihoods, but also im-

prove children's health and cognitive development.

Prof Erick Komba, the Director General of TALIRI said as per the project's design his side will major to steer dissemination of useful skills on livestock keeping, on poultry and small ruminants, towards the farmers.

"In the project, our other role is to train the project's beneficiaries over how professional to produce best fodder through establishment of a number of fodder banks. the potential demo plots tailored to be used by the farmers as yardstick to learn over the side" he unveiled.

He added that under the well-established fodder tree banks, they have planted the Gliricidia sepium and Laucaena Pallida, the meaningful forage tree species in help maintaining soil moisture and fertility.

The Tanzania Agriculture Research Institute (TARI) in the project is to roll out to the farmers validated natural resources technologies, dubbed insitu rainwater harvesting technologies and soil erosion control measure-Fanya Juu/Chini terraces.

In general, the other initiative under the project's vision includes efforts to promote soil conservation practices, improve soil fertility management in degraded areas, and deployment of innovative water harvesting methods.

To ensure for better results, the project has picked two champion farmers in each of the beneficiary village to produce quality declared seeds (QDS) for climate resilient crops, such as sorghum and pigeon

The seeds varieties to be produced in the constructive initiative include Macia, for sorghum, and Mali for pigeon peas.

The selected farmers for the producing the seed varieties will receive intensive training from the Tanzania Official Seeds Certification Institute (TOSCI) in order to stand professional chance to produce the seeds with needed quality, hence increase the relevant availability and accessibility to the farmers.

Hope for farmers as cassava prices increase in Tanga Region

HE soaring prices of cassava in the districts of Handeni, Kilindi, Korogwe, Muheza, and Mkinga in the vibrant Tanga region, have experienced a remarkable surge, heralding a substantial uptick in farmers' earnings.

The recent market survey conducted by The Guardian, reveals a staggering surge in the prices of cassava, with a sack weighing a minimum of 120 kilograms; is commanding prices ranging from 80,000/to 100,000/-, a significant leap from the 60,000/- range observed just

One acre of cultivated cassava now demands astounding prices ranging from 1,000,000/- to 1,200,000/-, with promising market opportunities flourishing in Moshi, Arusha, and Dar es Salaam.

In the realm of retail prices, consumers now find themselves reaching into their pockets to acquire a kilo of cassava, with prices hovering between 1,500/- and 1,850/-. This notable surge unquestionably represents a well-deserved windfall for the diligent farmers in the region.

The jubilant voices of farmers interviewed by The Guardian echoed resounding joy over the newfound profitability of their cassava crop. As the harvesting season unfolds between the months of late April and late June, farmers are reaping the rewards of their labor with renewed vigor and enthusiasm.

Further, farmers have highlighted another reason is the shortages of maize, where consumers have opted for cassava flour as an alterna-

"During cyclones rains seasons (Masika) there are high demands of maize and rice, as main foods for many homes; that is why the prices are going high. Other people are opting cassava as alternative food to reduce the consumption burden from rising maize and rice prices," said Mohamed Mdoe, chairman of cassava growers at Mkata ward,

Jumanne Haji, a wholesaler buying cassava from farmers in Handeni, Muheza, Mkinga and Pangani and transporting to Buguruni, Ilala and Shekilango markets in Dar es Salaam had said that apart from ensuring food security, cassava farming also create economic opportunities for many women in urban areas.

For myself everyday I'm transporting three tonnes of cassava to Dar es Salaam, many of my customers are women who taking it and frying for vending in streets, while others are selling it as raw by selling in with ground nuts, pieces of coconuts, carrots(popular known as Kifurushi) selling on basin along highways of Dar es Salaam city". Cassava is the third most important staple food crop in Tanzania after maize and rice.

Tanzania is among of the largest cassava producer in the world and the 6th largest in Africa after Nigeria (top producer in the word), Ghana, DRC, Angola, and Mozambique.

Through the National Cassava Development Strategy 2020-2030, the ministry of agriculture says although there are great opportunities for cassava commercialization in Tanzania, these are hindered by fluctuating annual fresh cassava production and productivity which have been ranging from four to eight tons per hectare.

Factors contributing to such low production and productivity include low application of improved technologies along the value chain, infestation of pests and diseases; unreliable rainfall due to climatic changes; low levels of investment into cassava sub-sector; inadequate markets and limited market information amongst stakeholders.

National Cassava Development Strategy provides strategic interventions that focus on increasing current production by three folds in line with product quality improvement that responds to the growing

The key expected outcomes from this strategy will includes increased production and productivity; increased adoption of improved technologies along the cassava value chain; improved cassava marketing and related infrastructures; employment creation and overall economic growth.

'Fast followers' beats 'first movers' in green investment engagement

S financial markets and the wider economy take strides to transition, the development of objectives to accelerate sustainability needs to be prioritised. In order to ensure this - and bolster the integrity and competitiveness of the financial system - safeguarding consumers is key. While there have been developments in risk management, taxonomies and disclosures, less attention has been given to how financial services providers can engage with, influence and support consumers.

The topic was broached in an OMFIF roundtable, in partnership with VISA. OMFIF and Stephen King, vice president of Sustainability Solutions at Visa, were joined by Carlos Martín Tornero, senior ESG specialist and lead associate at the Financial Conduct Authority, and Sarah Kemmitt, consultant at the United Nations Environment Programme Finance Initiative.

In a discussion on how to engage consumers in the shift to net zero, Tornero highlighted the FCA's three pivotal operational objectives: consumer protection, system integrity enhancement and competition. In facilitating the international competitiveness of the UK economy, Tornero pointed out an increased interest in sustainable investments and objectives.

Retail clients are seeking green deposits, bonds and other tools but this is hindered by a lack of environmental, social and governance products, varying ESG ratings and a misunderstanding of what labels mean for banks in practice.

Demand for green mortgages is relatively low due to affordability issues. On the assets side, banks need to know their financed emissions and possess the information to set targets and transition. The conversation indicated that banks see the targets set by science-based policy by 2030 within the current policy setting as largely impossible. In addition, policy reversals in areas like grid capacity for electric vehicles - where there is



huge investment potential - are highly unhelpful in scaling transition.

Yet, King of Visa's Sustainability Solutions noted that as a way of taking advantage of 'embedded finance' opportunities, banks can establish an ecosystem where financing comes to them.

Kemmitt supported this by noting banks can enable consumers to align their financial activities with sustainability goals, while banks' knowledge hubs and partnerships foster holistic solutions, such as property retrofitting and ecofriendly auto finance. Incentivisation mechanisms, such as preferential rates for green mortgages, can also further urge sustainable consumer behaviour.

There is a clear imperative for market transparency and the mitigation of greenwashing risks. While financial regulators cannot pre-empt consumers' sustainability preferences, they can empower them through transparency and the establishment of sustainability disclosure requirements and labelling regimes. These measures stand to go a long way in enhancing market trust and facilitating informed decision-making among retail investors.

Pushing for standardised sustainability disclosures and mandatory reporting

signifies a shift towards greater transparency and accountability within the financial sector. Not only does this process reduce uncertainty, it allows for scalability as King highlighted open data sources, enhanced data granularity and transactional insights as a means of empowering consumers to make informed choices and encourage sustainable practices. With the increasing need for product level data to incentivise and drive greater scale of investment and asset allocation, King finds that there are 'fast followers' not 'first movers'.

Transition plans are now a key focus to support target setting and goals to reach net-zero objectives. For banks, these will be an amalgamation of the firms in their value chain and a way to build information. As financial institutions navigate the complexities of sustainability integration, a multifaceted approach that balances regulatory oversight and consistent frameworks, drives stronger information, innovation and consumer empowerment will be integral.

Study indicates WhatsApp as a choice for brands' conversational customer support

WHATSAPP remains the primary channel brands use for conversational support, where businesses send 90 percent of support messages over the chat app, according to the new research from global cloud communications platform Infobip.

Economists caution markets on interest rate cut forecasts

LONDON

THE Bank of England has found itself caught in the middle of a trans-Atlantic divide over who will cut interest rates first, with costly implications for gilt traders and British political leaders counting on election year relief from high borrowing costs.

On one side are City of London economists and BOE Governor Andrew Bailey who say the UK's outlook seems more like the European Central Bank's. On the other are investors, who are betting the BOE's path to rate cuts more closely resembles the Federal Reserve as they rapidly unwind expectations for easing in the US this year. Only one can be right.

The split has vexed economists, who have seen little in recent UK data to change their mind about the fundamental differences between the British and American outlooks. The UK faces sluggish growth after a shallow contraction in the second half of last year. The US by contrast continues to show strength.

"Markets have superimposed the US cycle on the UK, but the US and UK are on very different tracks," said Sanjay Raja, chief UK economist at Deutsche Bank. "The UK is coming out of technical recession. Inflation is falling more convincingly. Pay settlements are following inflation expectations. And crucially, real policy rates in the UK will be higher than in the US."

A Bloomberg survey of economists released last week showed that most expected the BOE to make its first quarter-point cut in June, with a full percentage point of easing by year-end. Markets, meanwhile, have gone from pricing in six cuts for 2024 at the start of the year to just two now. At times last week, traders were only fully pricing a single quarter-point cut this year – and then not until November.

The confusion over when the BOE might begin to climb down from interest rates, which the central bank has kept at a 16-year high since August, is weakening the case for buying gilts in the near term. More broadly, it's fueling anxieties in the ruling Conservative Party that Prime Minister Rishi Sunak will see little political relief from elevated mortgage rates before he faces Keir Starmer's resurgent Labour Party in an election later this year.

The market's recalibration has accelerated due in part to unexpectedly hot consumer price index data in the US, which has fueled concerns that the Fed faces a difficult "last mile" on the road back to its 2 percent inflation target. A delayed pivot by Fed Chair Jerome Powell could also prompt other central bankers to slow down, since cutting in isolation risks weakening the local currencies relative to the dollar.

The UK was swept up into those jitters last week after wage and inflation data came in slightly higher than expected. Inflation fell to its lowest in 2 1/2 years at 3.2 percent in March, but headline price growth and underlying measures came in slightly above economists' predictions. Wage growth was also stronger than expected for the three months to February, stubbornly holding at 6 percent.

The result is that the market's expectations for BOE easing now looks more like those for the Fed than the ECB.

"While market expectations for the ECB seem to have decoupled somewhat from their US counterparts, expectations for the BOE continue to track US expectations quite closely," said Michael Pfister, an analyst at Commerzbank. It's "likely that the BOE is heading for a small correction in the level of interest rates rather than a pronounced cycle of rate cuts."

Still, while some economists have since scaled back their predictions for BOE cuts, most haven't changed expectations for a summer move. Analysts at Morgan Stanley, Goldman Sachs Group, Capital Economics and Bloomberg Economics are all among those still anticipating a shift toward easing in June.

Against that backdrop, Bailey signaled during appearances with his global peers at International Monetary Fund meetings last week in Washington that he thought the UK shared more in common with Europe than America.

"The dynamics of inflation are rather different between Europe – I mean Europe geographically now – and in the US," Bailey said on Tuesday. He said the US was experiencing more "demand-led inflation pressure" than in the UK's stagnant economy, pointing to "strong evidence" of easing price pressures in the latter.

Bailey played down the data on Wednesday, saying the BOE was "pretty much on track to where we thought we would be" as of its February forecasts. The central bank expects inflation to meet its 2 percent target when April data is released in May, due to another drop in energy bills.

Deputy Governor Dave Ramsden amplified those points on Friday, saying inflation risks are now tilted toward the "downside" and that the UK is looking less like an "outlier" on pricing pressures and more like the euro area.

"We agree with Bailey that the UK's dynamics look different which provides reason to think the BOE can diverge from the Fed," said Dan Hanson, chief UK economist at Bloomberg Economics. "We think the market has pushed pricing for the first BOE cut back too far."

FSD Africa, ACP join forces on climate financing gap in Africa

FSD Africa Investments and Allied Climate Partners (ACP) yesterday entered into an Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) and will partner to address a critical financing gap for climate infrastructure, mitigation and adaptation in Africa.

This aligns with the core missions of both organizations including to increase the number of bankable opportunities for climate-related investment, increase private sector participation, improve livelihoods, and mitigate the effects of climate change across Africa.

FSD Africa Investments (FSDAi) invests to make finance work for Africa by allocating catalytic capital to market shaping instruments, intermediaries and infrastructure and has cumulatively invested US\$ 105 million with a portfolio of 19 projects.

Allied Climate Partners (ACP) seeks to aggregate approximately US\$ 825 million backed by US\$ 235 million in philanthropic capital to support the establishment of third-party funds, platforms, and other investments in early and development stages of climate-related projects in Africa, Southeast Asia, India, and the Caribbean & Central America.

Allied Climate Partners invests junior, first-loss equity in regionally focused third-party funds. ACP announced its inaugural investment into the Southeast Asia Clean Energy Fund II, managed by Clime Capital, in January, and is seeking to replicate similar investments in other regions.

Speaking during the MoU signing ceremony on the sidelines of the ongoing AVCA annual summit in here, FSDAi Chief Investment Officer Anne-Marie Chidzero hailed the collaboration as one that will support Africa to meet her ambitious climate finance goals.

"For the African continent to meet her NDCs, we must raise tenfold current annual climate finance levels to US\$ 277 billion, and the share of private capital to at least US\$ 100 billion. Working with ACP, we will be able to catalyse and crowd in more innovative and green finance for greater action", said Chidzero.

ACP Chief Executive Officer Ahmed Saeed noted that this collaboration will drive innovation across the African continent, specifically mobilising more climate finance for Africa.

"There is a critical gap in climate finance, and specifically riskoriented equity, available for emerging and developing economies to meet climate and energy transition goals. We are thrilled to partner with FSDAi, a pioneering organisation at the forefront of strengthening private sector participation and financial markets in Africa.

Together, we hope to attract more risk-oriented capital for early-stage investments in Africa, by establishing new, catalytic, blended finance solutions that will leverage public and private capital to tackle the climate crisis", explained Saeed.

Working in concert, FSD Africa Investments and Allied Climate Partners will identify, evaluate, and seek to invest in highly catalytic financing solutions in Africa that increase investment for early-stage project development and companies deploying climate-related infrastructure in Africa.

The sectors to be targeted owing to their potential to accelerate a low-carbon transition and improve livelihoods include clean energy generation and transmission; electric transportation; green industry; and water and waste management.

Selected investment managers will seek to invest in high-leverage and catalytic projects, platforms and companies with demonstrable and positive impact on climate in Africa, and which have the potential to mobilise third-party capital at scale.



Oil prices fall 1 percent as Iran-Israel tensions ease

SINGAPORE

OIL prices fell by more than 1 percent on Monday, as the market focus switched to fundamentals after Israel and Iran played down the risk of an escalation of hostilities following Israel's apparently small strike on Iran.

Brent futures fell \$1.21, or 1.4 percent, to \$86.08 a barrel by 0655 GMT. The front-month US West Texas Intermediate (WTI) crude contract for May, which expires on Monday, fell 97 cents, or 1.2 percent, to \$82.17 a barrel, while the more active June contract dropped \$1.23 to \$80.99 a barrel.

"Brent crude prices failed to retain their initial surge, with broad expectations that geopolitical tensions between Israel and Iran may fizzle off given Iran's tamed response," said Yeap Jun Rong, market strategist at IG.

"With that, markets continue to unwind the geopolitical risk premium tied to potential supply disruptions, which seems more unlikely at current point in time," he added.

Both benchmarks spiked more than \$3 a barrel early on Friday, after explosions were heard in the Iranian city of Isfahan in what sources described as an Israeli attack. Gains were capped after Tehran played down the incident and said it did not plan to retaliate.

Yeap said rising US crude stocks had added to the pressure to sell.

US crude inventories rose by 2.7 million barrels, Energy Information Administration data showed last week, nearly double analysts' expectations of a 1.4 million barrel rise.

"Economic concerns again become a bearish factor of the crude market," with prices "under pressure due to a large build in the US stockpile and a hawkish Fed that led to a strong dollar," said independent market analyst Tina Teng. A strong dollar makes oil more expensive for holders of other currencies.

Chicago Federal Reserve President Austan Goolsbee on Friday became the latest central banker to signal a longer timeline for interest rate cuts because progress on curb-

ing inflation had stalled.

On Saturday, the US House of Representatives passed an aid package for Ukraine and Israel containing measures that would let the federal government expand sanctions against Iran and its oil production.

But markets shrugged off the news as the impact of the measures, if passed, would depend on how they are interpreted and implemented. Senate consideration of the bill is set to begin on Tuesday.

For now, ANZ analysts said in a note that volatility in the Middle East will keep oil markets "jittery".

On Saturday, a blast at an Iraqi military base killed a member of a security force that includes Iran-backed groups. The force commander said it was an attack while the army said it was investigating.

Separately, Iran-backed Lebanese group Hezbollah on Sunday said it downed an Israeli drone that was on a combat mission in southern Lebanon.

"The market has been expecting a potential escalation, we haven't seen it," Amrita Sen, co-founder and director of research at Energy Aspects said.

"It's been quite calibrated, measured on both sides. That's why prices have been coming off a little bit. We're not expecting massive downside but we are expecting small downside in prices, physically this is the weakest period for oil anyway."

Still, money managers are the most bullish on Brent since March 2021 as they snap up contracts to profit from any spike higher amid heightened tensions.

Other markets are also signaling bullishness, with oil call options – which profit when prices rise – posting a second consecutive week of record volumes last week.

Earnings from the world's largest oil majors including TotalEnergies SE, Chevron Corp. and Exxon Mobil Corp. are also due this week, as well as Asian companies Reliance Industries Ltd. and Cnooc Ltd. Big Oil's production growth will be in the spotlight this quarter as earnings stabilize.

Two companies merge to form enhanced critical mineral firm

ASX- and Aim-listed Base Resources and US-based uranium and critical minerals producer Energy Fuels have reached a binding agreement for Energy Fuels to acquire 100% of the issued shares in Base Resources

by way of a scheme of arrangement.

Base shareholders are to receive
0.0260 Energy Fuels common
shares plus an unfranked special
dividend of A\$0.065 for each Base
share held, equating to total consideration of about A\$0.302 a share.

Following implementation of the transaction, Base shareholders will hold about 16.4% of the combined group, which will have a pro forma market capitalisation of about \$1.14-million.

Base's board has unanimously recommended that shareholders vote in favour of the scheme.

Base says the transaction will establish a global leader in the critical minerals sector with a focus on rare earth elements, uranium and heavy mineral sands production and a clear strategic development pathway.

It adds that the transaction will also create a platform for the funding and development of Base's Toliara project in Madagascar, with future monazite production from the project to be processed at Energy Fuels' operating White Mesa mill, in Utah, in the US.

Energy Fuels points out that, once in production, the monazite from Toliara will provide a large portion of the raw materials needed for Energy Fuels' rapidly expanding rare earth element (REE) oxide production facility at the White Mesa mill.

It says that the addition of a lowcost source of REE raw materials to Energy Fuels' US REE production infrastructure, along with a sustainable low-cost source of uranium production, is expected to be highly accretive to its shareholders on a net asset value per share basis, with potential to unlock significant further upside.

Base informs that its proven leadership team will be retained and continue to oversee the development and operation of the Toliara project and the completion of operations and closure of its Kwale operations, in Kenya, as well as the progression of other mineral sands and rare earths interests of the combined group.

"This transaction, which is the culmination of 12 months of discussions between Base and Energy Fuels, reflects the exceptional quality of the Toliara project and the efforts of the Base team over the past several years to advance the project towards construction readiness.

"The combined group will have the financial and technical capability to not only build Toliara into one of the best critical mineral projects in the world, but also to develop an integrated value chain for the rare earth elements that are essential to the global energy transition," says Base MD Tim Carstens. Philippines, US kick off joint military drills amid criticism

MANILA

NEARLY 17,000 Filipino and American troops started a threeweek joint combat training exercise in the Philippines yesterday amid criticisms that the drills threaten regional peace and stabil-

According to the Philippine military, the 19-day exercises, dubbed "Balikatan 2024," will involve around 5,000 Philippine and 11,000 US troops.

Contingents from the Australian Defense Force and, for the first time in Balikatan's history, the French Navy will also join the exercise as participants. A total of 14 nations, including Japan and India, will take part in the annual military drills as observers.

Balikatan 2024 will be held from April 22 to May 10.

Participants will execute a range of complex missions across domains, including maritime security, air and missile defense, dynamic missile strikes, cyber defense, and information operations.

This year's maritime drill will for the first time go beyond the Philippines' 12-nautical-mile territorial

waters Also on Monday, protesters gathered to Camp Aguinaldo, the site of the headquarters of the Armed Forces of the Philippines, where

the opening ceremony of the Balikatan 2024 is held, to voice their opposition.

They carried placards and banners decrying the military exercises, urging the Philippine government to trash the military agreements with the United States.

Many Philippine experts and scholars also expressed their concerns that the joint drills might threaten regional secu-

Anna Malindog-Uy, vice-president of the Manila-based think tank Asian Century Philippines Strategic Studies Institute, told Xinhua that the involvement of more countries in such military drills "may lead to new or strengthened political and military alliances in the region, which could increase our competition and create division and more tension among regional countries.'

"Our people do not want war with any country for any reason whatsoever, least of all one with our biggest neighbor and trading partner with whom we do not have any serious problems we cannot solve," wrote former Philippine senator and current Manila Times columnist Francisco Tatad in a recent opinion piece.

Balikatan, a Tagalog word for "shoulderto-shoulder," is the most comprehensive among several regular Philippines-US joint military exercises.

The Visiting Forces Agreement (VFA) gives US troops a legal basis to be in the Southeast Asian country for bilateral exercises, and governs the conduct of US armed force personnel.

Iran's Supreme leader commends army's anti-Israel operation, says 'missiles hitting targets' of 'secondary importance'

The country's Supreme leader noted that the Iranian armed forces were a commendable figure of the country and highlighted that innovation in weapons and methods, and knowing the enemy's methods, must always be on the agenda.

Khamenei, however, did not refer to the alleged strike by Israel on Friday on the Iranian city of Isfahan.

West balancing on edge of direct military confrontation between nuclear powers – Lavrov

MOSCOW

WESTERN countries are balancing on the edge of a direct military confrontation between nuclear powers, Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov said in a video address to participants in the Moscow Non-Proliferation Conference.

"Today, the United States and their NATO client states are still dreaming of inflicting 'a strategic defeat' on Russia and are ready to carry on with their policy of deterring our country 'to the last Ukrainian.'

At the same time, the West is balancing on the dangerous edge of a direct military confrontation between nuclear powers, which could have cata-



strophic consequences," Lavrov pointed out.

According to the top Russian diplomat, it is especially concerning that the three Western nuclear powers are among the

key sponsors of the Kiev regime and the main initiators of various inflammatory moves. "This could create serious strategic risks and increase the level of nuclear threat," Lavrov noted.

"We are convinced that to prevent further degradation of the world situation, maintain durable stability and create a realistic disarmament, all countries should pool their efforts to upgrade the international security system relying on the principles of multilateralism, equality and indivisibility.

This is the only way of reducing interstate conflicts and ensuring real progress in arms control," the Russian foreign minister emphasized.

Israel urges US to reconsider sanctions on Israeli military unit

JERUSALEM

ISRAELI war Cabinet minister Benny Gantz urged US Secretary of State Antony Blinken in a phone call to reconsider potential sanctions against an Israeli military unit, his office said on Sunday.

The call with Blinken came after Israeli media reported that the US State Department might sanction the Israel Defense Forces (IDF)'s Netzah Yehuda battalion, accused of human rights violations in the West Bank.

Gantz told Blinken that the move would "harm Israel's legitimacy in time of war," asserting that "it has no justification because Israel has a strong and independent judicial system."

Meanwhile, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu vowed to fight any sanctions imposed on parts of the IDF with "all strength," according to his statement on Saturday.

said. E-C Digital is an internet company that focuses on cloud computing for quantifying carbon emissions of industrial manufacturers. Though it has a history of only seven years and its products were sold for only less than three years, the company has already helped many enterprises accurately calculate their carbon emissions.

As green and low-carbon development has become a global consensus, different countries and regions, as well as different industry associations, have put forward their own paths to reduce carbon

Since China set its "dual carbon" goals - reaching the 2030 and attaining carbon neutrality by 2060 in September 2020, the demand for carbon reduction among Chinese enterprises has grown rapidly in recent years.

The precise quantification of carbon data is a foundational work for enterprises in advancing their green transformation, but its operation is not easy.

To make carbon accounting as simple as "building

New Brexit border checks could stifle fine food imports from EU, warn sellers

LONDON

PANZER'S delicatessen in northwest London has lost 37 suppliers from the European Union since Britain left the bloc's single market in 2021, and owner David Josephs fears more will quit after the UK introduces new border checks this month.

Britain voted to leave the EU in 2016 but, such was the scale of the task to untangle supply chains and erect customs borders, that it is only this year setting new rules.

EU exporters of chilled and frozen meat, fish, cheese, dairy products and some cut flowers have had to present health certificates, signed off by a vet or plant inspector, since Jan 31 - a demand that smaller British retailers and wholesalers say can delay the arrival of goods by weeks.

They are now warning that the start of physical checks, along with higher charges, from April 30 will restrict the variety and freshness of fine artisan foods such as charcuterie, cheese, pasta and olive oil, and that prices will

"We find small independent producers making fabulous things that you wouldn't necessarily see outside their region and we're bringing them into London but it's getting harder, because some of them don't want to do the paperwork," said Patricia Michelson, owner of retailer and wholesaler La Fromagerie.

The new hurdles risk unravelling Britain's diversity of food and drink, said John Farrand, managing director of the Guild of Fine Food, which represents 12,000 independent food businesses.

"Only the very biggest processors and retailers are going to be able to deal with this bureaucracy and the extent of these checks," he said.

Fears of supply disruption

Delicatessen owner Josephs, who sells products from more than 80 countries and supplies nearly 200 restaurants, says Brexit has been a disaster for his business.

"The government says there won't be any disruption. I guarantee there will be," he said. "We already have some meat suppliers who are saying it's becoming debatable as to whether or not it's economically viable to supply the UK."

Nick Carlucci, sales director of Italian foods seller Tenuta Marmorelle based in Berkshire, southern England, said the January changes raised costs and lengthened lead times for some goods by a week. He imports olive oil from his family-owned farm in Puglia, burrata and buffalo mozzarella cheese, balsamic vinegar, sliced meats, pasta, antipasti and panettone.

He said importing just one pallet of five or more different sliced meats would, from April 30, cost him 432 pounds (\$537) more than before Brexit, with 120 pounds going on a vet certificate and 195 pounds on fees and charges the government has introduced to cover the costs of its new

Carlucci imports 15 to 20 pallets a week and said the additional costs will hammer his profit margin by 10 percent.

"We're bringing over artisanal products from small producers with a short shelflife," he said. "We need to have those products turning over constantly."

Worried about bottlenecks at the Port of Dover, Britain's biggest port, he is stocking up as much as he can.

The higher costs will have to be passed

"We do our best to absorb as much as we can, but we have to pass it on to our customers, which are farm shops, food halls and delis," he said, noting the price of a 150 gram (5 ounce) tray of Parma ham would rise by 17 pence, or 4 percent, at the end of the month.

Al Hussaini emphasised the significance of the topics being discussed during the 2024 Spring Meetings, and their role in promoting dialogue among stakeholders. He highlighted the UAE's commitment to further global collaboration to accelerate effective and sustainable solutions for agile worldwide development.

Al Hussaini held several bilateral meetings with finance ministers from Pakistan, Ethiopia, Poland, the United Kingdom, and the United States of America, where discussions focused on expanding the horizons of joint cooperation and international collaboration to solve global challenges.

For his part, Ebrahim Al Zaabi affirmed that the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank Spring 2024 meetings, along with accompanying discussions and participations, provided a valuable platform for fostering dialogue and exchanging perspectives among member nations on global economic developments and growth prospects.

The meetings aimed to bolster international cooperation, fortify the stability of the global financial system, advance efforts towards sustainable development, and devise effective solutions. Additionally, the meetings emphasised the significance of knowledge-sharing and capacity-building among member states, empowering them to foster sustainable growth.

titled 'From Vision to Impact: Implementing the World Bank Group Evolution', Mohamed Al Hussaini highlighted the need for swift and constructive interventions to economic development challenges.

He noted his optimism of major economies showing signs of recovery, despite the shocks of the past four years. He pointed out that the outlook for developing countries remains troubled and that the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are further off their 2030 trajectory, while fiscal space in many countries is increasingly constrained because of weak growth and rising debt burdens. He explained that these challenges exacerbate the issues of poverty. climate change, conflict and fragility.

Al Hussaini called for concerted international efforts to define a new action plan to address emergencies resulting from poverty and to improve the operational efficiency of the World Bank to implement financing requirements for projects more quickly, especially transformative projects for energy, water, health, and digital transformation infrastructure.

In addition, he advocated for finding new tools to prepare for and respond to crises, by activating financing tools in partnership between development financial institutions and the private sector.

In his keynote address, Mohamed Al Hussaini noted that the global recovery remains uneven.

He shed light on his concern for fragile and conflict-affected states because they disproportionately bear the burden of ongoing geopolitical developments and tighter global financial conditions.

He also voiced his concern about the increase in interest payments, the general depletion of buffers, and the lacklustre medium-term growth prospect, particularly in emerging markets and developing economies, as IMF Managing Director mentioned.

He noted that in the current uncertain global environment, multilateral cooperation needs to ensure food and energy security, strengthen trade, support economies needing debt reduction, and provide financing for climate adaptation while supporting climate transition ef-

He shared the UAE's achievements in significantly advancing the global climate agenda at COP28, where countries came together to deliver the landmark UAE Consensus, which includes an unprecedented reference to transitioning away from all fossil fuels in energy systems in a just, orderly and equitable manner as well as a historic commitment to triple renewables, double energy efficiency glob-

Scientists: Healthharming heat stress rising in Europe

BRUSSELS

Europe is increasingly facing bouts of heat so intense that the human body cannot cope, as climate change continues to raise temperatures, the EU's Copernicus climate monitoring service and the World Meteorological Organization said yesterdav.

In a report on Europe's climate, Copernicus and the WMO noted last year's extreme conditions, including a July heatwave which pushed 41 percent of southern Europe into strong, very strong or extreme heat stress - the biggest area of Europe under such conditions in any day on record.

Extreme heat poses particular health risks to outdoor workers, the elderly, and people with existing conditions like cardiovascular diseases and diabetes.

Parts of Italy recorded 7 percent more deaths than normal last July, with victims including a 44-year-old man painting road markings in the

northern town of Lodi who collapsed and died. Heat stress measures the impact that the environment has on the human body, combining factors like temperature, humidity and the body's response, to establish a "feels like" temperature.

Parts of Spain, France, Italy and Greece experienced up to ten days of extreme heat stress in 2023, defined as a "feels like" temperature of more than 46 degrees Celsius, at which point immediate action must be taken to avoid heat stroke and other health issues.

Deaths related to heat have increased by around 30 percent in Europe in the last 20 years, the report said.

The EU's environment agency urged governments last month to prepare healthcare systems for climate change and called for EU rules to protect outdoor workers from extreme heat.

Last year was the world's hottest since records began. Europe is the world's fastest-warming con-

Greenhouse gas emissions were the biggest cause of last year's exceptional heat, the report said. Factors including the El Nino weather pattern also played a role.

The heat fuelled extreme weather including flooding, since the warmer atmosphere can hold more moisture, causing heavier downpours when it is released.

Floods in Slovenia last year affected 1.5 million people. Greece suffered the EU's biggest wildfire on record which, at 960 square km, was twice the size of Athens. Alpine glaciers lost 10 percent of their remaining volume during 2022 and 2023.

"Some of the events of 2023 took the scientific community by surprise because of their intensity, their speed of onset, extent and duration," said Carlo Buontempo, director of the Copernicus Climate Change Service.

Arsenal have the best back line in the country - but does defence still win titles?

MIKEL Arteta was Arsene Wenger's captain and Pep Guardiola's assistant. In the managerial family tree, he has no links to Sir Alex Ferguson. And yet part of his ethos appears to have been borrowed from the great Scot. "Attack wins you games, defence wins you titles," was one of Ferguson's maxims; his attacks and wins could loom larger in the imagination.

Arsenal's season could be an extended experiment in the second half of Ferguson's theory. It looks ever likelier Arteta's side will end the campaign with the finest defence: in some measures, far and away the best. Defence could win David Raya a Golden Glove and the Gunners records, but perhaps only a second consecutive finish as runners-up. And yet, if there are times this season when it has seemed Liverpool have appeared intent on rebuffing Ferguson's truism - forever conceding first and looking to their attack to win both games and then titles - Arsenal are taking a more parsi-

When the final whistle blew at Molineux on Saturday, it was with a historic first. No previous Arsenal team, not even with George Graham's famously frugal back four, had kept six consecutive clean sheets away from home in the league. Arteta has spent 20 years in England and marvelled at the feat. "It is very difficult," he said. "I don't know when it was last done. I imagine not recently because it's extremely difficult to do that." Only Chelsea in 2008 and Manchester United in 2009 have mustered longer runs of clean sheets on their travels in the Premier League; Arsenal could equal each if they can make it a magnificent seventh on their shortest journey, to Tottenham, on Sunday.

And if Graham, an elegant midfielder as a player, became a manager who rigorously drilled a defence, the same may be said of Arteta, stylist turned pragmatist. There is an argument that defence cost Arsenal the title last season: they conceded 10 more than City - and Newcastle - then. They let in 11 in four April games then. Now the defeat to Aston Villa has been surrounded by shutouts. Arsenal have conceded in Portugal and Germany more recently than anywhere other the Emirates Stadium in England.

Wolves manager Gary O'Neil described Arsenal's as the best defence in the world. "If you look at the stats, you see how good they defend," he said. Those numbers are still better on the road. This is the second consecutive year when Arsenal's defensive record has been better away from the Emirates, but it has improved to a remarkable level.

Their expected goals against away from home is just 11.77. City possess the next best tally of 17.44, with no one else under 22; in effect, Arsenal have been 50 percent better than the reigning champions, twice as good as anyone else. They have now gone 541 minutes without conceding. In what should be the tougher half of fixtures, they have been at their most resilient.

Home and away, they have allowed just 74 shots on target, compared to 136 in the whole of last season. There is a formidable unit, even with Jakub Kiwior, Takehiro Tomiyasu and Oleksandr Zinchenko sharing left-back duties and a theory that Jurrien Timber will be the preferred choice when fit: Ben White, William Saliba and Gabriel Magalhaes are cornerstones, however, with Declan Rice affording high-grade protection and, after a shaky start, David Raya established in goal.

There is a pride in clean sheets, Arteta feels. "Credit to the boys for the level of organisation, for the understanding and the love that they show defending and the platform that it gives to the team to win football matches," he said. It could have been a platform for progress; instead Arsenal may have a different sort of stability if they end up second again.

In the Champions League, there is the question if Arsenal have veered too far in the other direction; if they have got the balance right in England, they may have been too cautious in the Champions League. Perhaps that could be attributed to the nervous of newcomers, but they only scored three goals in 420 minutes of knockout football. Each of the other quarterfinalists scored at least six over their four games in the last 16 and last eight. But Arsenal exited Europe having only conceded seven goals in 10 games. Rewind a few years and Wenger's side could let in 10 in two matches against Bayern Munich alone.

But in the Premier League, one possible scenario is that they do the bittersweet Tottenham double. In 2016-17, Mauricio Pochettino's team registered both the most goals for and the fewest against, but without becoming champions. Neither attack nor defence won them the title. The risk is that Arsenal emulate that odd achievement.

Bellingham brings Madrid to brink of title with Clasico winner

MADRID

JUDE Bellingham snatched Real Madrid a dramatic 3-2 Clasico win over champions Barcelona on Sunday with a "fundamental" goal to take them 11 points clear at the top of La Liga.

Real Madrid coach Carlo Ancelotti hailed the England midfielder's decisive intervention to take Los Blancos to the brink of the Spanish title.

Madrid twice came from behind with Vinicius Junior and Lucas Vazquez netting to level Andreas Christensen and Fermin Lopez strikes, before Bellingham rammed home the winner in stoppage time.

"He arrived at just the right time, he worked so hard in the game, it's been a while since he scored and today he scored a goal that could be fundamental in winning the league," said Ancelotti.

Barcelona, second, bounced back with a strong performance after their Champions League exit at the hands of Paris Saint-Germain but their last stand was demolished by Bellingham.

Madrid showed the same grit to stay in the match as they did midweek against Manchester City on the way to the final four in Europe, before Bellingham's knock-out blow left the Santiago Bernabeu crowd delighted.

Madrid's top scorer with 21 goals across all competitions, the former Borussia Dortmund man netted twice in Madrid's Clasico win over Barcelona in October and is shining in his first season in Spain at only 20 years old.

"We took a huge step towards La Liga," Vazquez, key in all three Madrid goals, told Real Madrid TV. "We've had a very good season, we're on a very good path, now we just have to polish it off and we'll go for everything."

Madrid's penalty-saving hero against City, goalkeeper Andriy Lunin, made an early mistake to hand Barcelona the lead.

The Ukrainian strayed from his line to try and deal with a corner but got nowhere near the ball and Christensen nodded into the empty net. However, Madrid were quickly level paid dividends for the coach after a

through Vinicius, who fired over a fine chance before levelling from the spot. The sensational Vazquez escaped Joao Cancelo far too easily and was tripped in the area by 17-year-old Barca centre-back Pau Cubarsi.

Barcelona were not deterred and made inroads down their right flank with Lamine Yamal giving Eduardo Camavinga a torrid time.

The 16-year-old starlet thought he had struck with a clever flick from a corner but Lunin pushed the ball to safety, with Barcelona arguing it had already crossed the line.

La Liga does not contract goal-line technology and using VAR the officials could not confirm the ball had completely entered the goal, so the Catalans were left frustrated.

"We deserved much more given the way we played but there's not much we can do," said Xavi. "(Not having goal-line technology) is a disgrace." Barcelona were dealt a blow on the stroke of half-time when midfielder Frenkie de Jong was taken off on a stretcher after hurting his ankle in a challenge by Fede Valverde.

Xavi also brought Lopez on for Christensen at the interval and it slower start to the second half.

The midfielder was in the right place at the right time to finish after 69 minutes when Lunin could only parry Yamal's low effort back into danger.

However Madrid, seeking a fifth league and Champions League double, swiftly struck back when Vinicius crossed to the back post and Vazquez arrived to finish.

Marc-Andre Ter Stegen made a brilliant save to thwart Vinicius with Madrid looking for a winner to virtually wrap up their La Liga title.

Bellingham dealt the killer blow, despite largely being kept quiet by the Catalans until he appeared to emphatically decide the match in stoppage time from Vazquez's cross.

"Xavi, stay," mocked Real Madrid's fans with the Barcelona coach due to leave at the end of the season.

Earlier Atletico Madrid suffered a 2-0 defeat at Alaves to dent their chances of a top four finish and end a woeful week, following their Champions League exit.

Diego Simeone's side, fourth, lead fifth place Athletic by three points after Carlos Benavidez and Luis Rioja's strikes consigned them to defeat.

Atletico goalkeeper Jan Oblak told DAZN. "We have to improve and if we don't, this end to the season will be very tough.'

Meanwhile, Barcelona coach Xavi Hernandez blasted La Liga for not employing goal-line technology after his team's 3-2 Clasico defeat on Sunday left Real Madrid on the brink of the title.

The coach was furious after Lamine Yamal had a shot which Barcelona said crossed the line not given as a goal after officials could not prove that it had using VAR.

With the score level at 1-1 Yamal cleverly flicked a corner towards goal and Real Madrid goalkeeper Andriy Lunin pushed the ball to safety, potentially after it had crossed the line.

"It's a disgrace," said Xavi, complaining that the technology used in other top flights including the Premier League is not available in La Liga. "If we want to be the best league in the world we have to advance in this sense, you have to put in the technology."

Barcelona goalkeeper Marc-Andre ter Stegen agreed with his coach.

"It's shameful for football, I don't have the words," said the Germany international. "There's so much money in this world and there's no money for what's most important."

Jude Bellingham's late winner left champions Barcelona 11 points behind Real Madrid with six matches remaining.

"(Madrid) have had an extraordinary league, they have lost just one game, they've almost wrapped it up," admitted Xavi. "I feel that with the game we played the normal thing would be that we would win.

"We competed very well, I think we deserved the three points."

Xavi's counterpart Carlo Ancelotti said he was delighted with his Madrid side after they beat Manchester City on Wednesday on penalties to reach the Champions League semifinals and then produced a late Clasico winner.

"I'm very proud, because they were two very demanding games,' said the coach. "Now we have to prepare for the final part of the season, but we are very well positioned."

Klopp backs 'massive quality' in Liverpool squad to launch title fight

JURGEN Klopp said his decision to trust the depth of his squad had been rewarded after a 3-1 win at Fulham on Sunday took Liverpool level on points with Premier League leaders Arsenal.

Klopp left a number of key players, including top scorer Mohamed Salah, on the bench with the trip to west London coming less than 72 hours after their Europa League exit to Atalanta in Italy.

Trent Alexander-Arnold and Diogo Jota scored on their first Premier League starts for two months, either side of Ryan Gravenberch's first goal in the English top flight to keep Klopp's men alive in the title

The destiny of the title remains in Manchester City's hands with the defending champions one point behind the top two with a game in hand.

However, Liverpool and Arsenal have put the pressure on Pep Guardiola's men by bouncing back from shock defeats last weekend.

"All of these boys have massive quality. Sometimes the momentum is there, sometimes not, but the quality is insane," said Klopp.

The German made five changes to the side that won 1-0, but failed to overturn a 3-0 first-leg deficit against Atalanta.

Alexis Mac Allister, Dominik Szoboszlai, Curtis Jones and Ibrahima Konate also dropped the bench alongside Salah.

"It's helped everybody," added Klopp on the importance of fresh legs after his side looked jaded in losing at home to Crystal Palace a week ago.

Harvey Elliott intercepted on his return to Craven Cottage and teed up Gravenberch to curl in from the edge of the area.

Jota then made the points safe with his 100th goal in English football when his low effort had too much power for Bernd Leno 18 minutes from time.

Two more away trips at local rivals Everton and West Ham await Liverpool in the next six days.

But with just five more games of the Klopp era to come, they remain at least in the hunt to give his transformative time at Anfield a glorious goodbye.

Yanga is NBC PL title favourite, says Azam FC head coach Dabo

AZAM FC head coach Youssouph Dabo has said Young Africans SC is now the favourite for the 2023/24 NBC Premier League title with seven matches left to play.

Young Africans SC, alias Yanga, beat long-time rivals Simba SC 2-1 in the league's duel at Benjamin Mkapa Stadium in Dar es Salaam on Saturday to go seven points clear at the top.

On Sunday, Azam FC won 1-0 against Ihefu SC to reduce the gap to four points and, despite that, Dabo reiterated that Yanga is in prime position to retain the club's crown.

The Senegalese tactician remarked: "Yanga is the favourite to win the championship. I said this a long time ago but, for us, we need to continue keeping pressure so that they need to fight until the end to win the title this season."

"It is good for Tanzanian football because, if you have a team that wins the championship 10 matches before, it is not interesting.'

"If you have the kind of competition where some teams fight until the end, it will be more interesting and it adds qualities," Dabo noted.

Dabo's squad looked desperate to bounce back from their midweek draw with Mashujaa FC, with a firsthalf goal from midfielder Feisal Salum securing the hard-fought victory at Azam Complex Stadium.

"It was tough because we lacked enough goal-scoring opportunities. Sometimes it was just frustration, and sometimes we lacked finishing quality but it is football. It is not possible to be efficient in all situations," Dabo stated.

He disclosed: "We controlled the game, offensively and defensively. Our block was not breached even for one moment. Defensively we controlled the game because we knew before that Ihefu SC liked to attack through the width."

"We defend with a high line. I told my players we need to have strong pressure and we need to have good control behind our defensive line. I think we succeeded today. I am happy with the three points but I am not 100% satisfied," he revealed.
