

Headline inflation, overall price index see mild decline

THE October 2024 annual headline inflation decreased to 3.0 percent from 3.1 percent recorded in September, the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) has stated.

A statement issued at the weekend said that the decrease occurred within a trend where the overall commodity value index went up from 112.18 for October 2023 to 115.54 during the past month.

Food and non-alcoholic beverages prices for October 2024 stagnated at 2.5 percent price rise, the same as in September, it asserted, noting that the speed of price change for commodities for the year ended October 2024 was less than what was registered for the year ended September.

Alternatively, annual inflation for all items without food and non-alcoholic beverages for October 2024 slid to 3.2 percent from 3.4 percent recorded in September.

MSC ship to load 600 containers of cashew

A SHIP operated by the Mediterranean Shipping Co. is expected to load 600 containers and depart the next day, making way for other ships to load cashews, the port management here has said.

Ferdinand Nyathi, the port manager, made this observation before regional commissioner Col.Patrick Sawala, who visited the port at the end of the week to inspect the port's capacity to handle cashew exports.

The port is equipped with robust systems to ensure reliable operations, he said, asserting that 11 ships had already been serviced with 6,222 containers received, 1,000 of which are already loaded with cashews.

DC wants chemical users to mind safety EABC, partners drill youth traders on AfCFTA market

THE East African Business Council (EABC), Tanzania Private Sector Foundation (TPSF) and Tanzania Bureau of Standards (TBS) have conducted a training workshop for 40 Tanzanian youth traders.

Supported by GIZ, the session focused on equipping participants with knowledge on the African Continental Free Trade Area (Af-CFTA) Trade in Goods Protocol, particularly in regard to the Technical Barriers to Trade (TBT) and Sanitary and Phytosanitary Standards (SPS) annexes.

Lazaro Msasalaga, TBS Director of Quality Management commended the EABC for organizing the workshop, noting the vital role it plays in addressing compliance issues that impact SMEs and hinder intra-EAC trade. He affirmed the Tanzanian government's commitment to providing essential infrastructure to support Annexes 6 and 7 of AfCFTA Protocol on Trade in Goods.

Mercy Sila, President of Tanzania Women Chamber of Commerce and Goodwill Ambassador for EABC, highlighted the importance of compliance with regional and international trade standards.

Sila reinforced the significance of sustained collaboration among EABC, TPSF, SMEs and youth traders.

She urged young traders to capitalize on the market opportunities AfCFTA presents and emphasized the importance of meeting regulatory standards to boost cross-border trade.

Moses Kanyesigye, EABC Regional Coordinator, encouraged participants to broaden their trade scope beyond EAC to the wider African market. He advised SMEs to utilize EABC's e-commerce and SME platform to showcase their products continent-wide, stressing the benefits of partnerships for business expansion.

CHUNYA District Commissioner Mbaraka Batenga has urged chemical users to strictly adhere to safety regulations in order to mitigate the risks and harmful effects associated with improper handling.

Batenga made the call here at the weekend during opening of a training session on safe chemical management organised by the Government Chemist Laboratory Authority (GCLA) Southern Highlands office.

"Chemicals are widely used in mining and mineral processing and they must be handled and stored with the utmost care to prevent harm to users, animals and the environment," he said.

He commended GCLA for organising the training, recognising the vital role mining plays in the country's economic devel-

He also encouraged the authority to continue providing educational programmes, noting that many stakeholders across various sectors are still involved in chemical-

related activities. Elias Mulima, GCLA Southern Highlands Zone Manager, urged participants to become ambassadors of chemical safety within their communities. He also invited those unable to attend the session to participate in future ones as trainings are regular. "We will continue offering training sessions to ensure that chemicals are used safely, protecting both users and surrounding communities from potential harm," he said.

Omary Hamisi, representative from Small-Scale Miners Association in Chunya, expressed gratitude to GCLA for equipping them with crucial knowledge on safe chemical practices.

He highlighted the valuable insights gained on chemical regulations, safety symbols and proper storage and handling of hazardous substances.

GCLA was established by the Government Chemist Laboratory Authority Act No. 8 of 2016 and became operational in June 2022. It is tasked with managing and controlling production, importation, transportation, exportation, storage, sale and disposal of chemicals as well as provision of forensic laboratory services.

Its core functions include ensuring safety and quality of agricultural and industrial products, conducting laboratory analyses for cases involving toxicology and DNA and offering expert advice to the government on forensic science matters such as illicit drugs, toxicology and environmental management.

THE United States has reaffirmed its commitment to supporting Tanzania in the fight against sickle cell disease with focus on improving early diagnosis and access to affordable treatment.

The renewed pledge responds to alarming statistics showing that 7 percent of Tanzanian children under five die from the disease annually, underscoring the urgent need for intensified efforts to combat its impact on young lives.

US Ambassador to Tanzania Michael Battle made the pledge last weekend during a visit to Muhimbili University of Health and Allied Sciences (MUHAS) to strengthen collaboration in addressing sickle cell disease, a critical public health challenge in Tanzania.

"Saving the life of a child with sickle cell is not just saving an individual, it's saving entire communities," he said. "Together, we can ensure that children with sickle cell

timately we can work to eliminate the disease.'

Battle highlighted the role of influential leaders like former President Jakaya Kikwete in raising awareness and leading efforts against sickle cell, citing Kikwete's personal experience with the disease as a valuable asset. He also emphasized the need to work with global pharmaceutical companies to make essential medications such as Hydroxyurea more affordable and accessible in Tanzania.

Dr Irene Minja, Co-Principal Investigator at the Sickle Cell Programme, outlined key initiatives, including the "Break the Cycle" campaign which educates young people on sickle cell genetics before marriage. Early education, she noted, helps reduce the risk of hit countries, with 7 percent of chil-

to 20 percent of Tanzanians carry the gene.

Dr Minja stressed the importance of early testing and treatment with Hydroxyurea, a crucial medication that prevents infections and complications. She advocated for making the medicine available for free similar to antiretroviral drugs for HIV.

Dr. Minja also highlighted that over 1,000 Tanzanian doctors have been trained on sickle cell care through MUHAS.

Dr. Agnes Jonathan, Sickle Cell Programme Manager at MUHAS, thanked the US government for its support and praised Battle's commitment to reducing sickle cell-related deaths in Tanzania.

"Tanzania is one of the hardest-

disease live healthier lives and ulpassing on the sickle cell trait as 13 dren under five dying from sickle cell disease annually. Between 11,000 and 14,000 children are born with it each year," she said.

Dr. Jonathan underscored the importance of raising public awareness to reduce mortality rates and ensure timely care, noting Tanzania is the fifth country globally affected by the disease.

Ongoing efforts include a newborn screening programme in Dar es Salaam and Mwanza, with plans for expansion to ensure early diagnosis and immediate treatment. Dr. Jonathan proposed integrating sickle cell screening into routine maternal and child health services at clinics.

"With continued support, we can reduce the burden of this disease and ultimately work toward its elimination," she said.

Contractors' association appeals to govt to clear tardy members' debt

THE Tanzania United Contractors and Allied Services Association (TU-CASA) has urged the government to address significant overdue payments owed to many of its members.

Samuel Marwa, TUCASA Chairman, said in a statement yesterday that the delayed payments, linked to government contracts that have been completed, have severely impacted the operations and financial stability of numerous companies, threatening the future of Tanzania's construction and supply sectors.

"TUCASA's members include contractors, construction material suppliers and equipment providers, all of whom have met their obligations in good faith by delivering essential infrastructure projects and supplying critical materialism," he said.

He said despite fulfilling their responsibilities, the businesses have faced prolonged delays in receiving payment from the government, with some waiting for years.

"The situation is becoming increasingly unsustainable as contractors are burdened with rising costs from unpaid bank loans, mounting interests and growing pressure from other creditors. The consequences of the overdue payments are severe," he said.

Marwa detailed that many contractors currently struggle to meet their financial obligations with some companies facing insolvency or being forced to consider liquidation.

In addition, in an effort to reduce operational costs, many companies have been forced to lay off workers, leading to significant job losses and economic hardship for many Tanzanian families.

"With insufficient cash flow to sustain their operations, several companies are at risk of shutting down, which threatens the future

of Tanzania's construction industry and the availability of reliable infrastructure services. The current crisis forces companies to make difficult decisions just to survive," he said.

Marwa said that without immediate intervention from the government, the consequences will extend far beyond individual businesses and affect the broader Tanzanian economy, including jobs, livelihoods and key national development projects.

"TUCASA urges the government to act swiftly to release the funds owed to contractors and suppliers. This is not only critical for the survival of individual companies but also for the stability of Tanzania's infrastructure and protection of jobs for thousands of Tanzanians," he said

He further called for the government to establish a clear and transparent timeline for disbursing the overdue funds and implement measures to prevent similar delays in future contracts.

He said TUCASA remains committed to working with government agencies to find a viable solution that secures the future of Tanzania's construction industry and provide relief to struggling businesses and their employees.

Last week, a section of Members of Parliament said that longstanding debts owed to contractors and suppliers providing services in public schools need to be paid by the government as some face foreclosure by banks due to unpaid loans.

SUA advocates for biotech to address agro challenges

University SOKOINE of Agriculture (SUA) has reaffirmed its commitment to leading research efforts on biotechnology to better understand benefits and risks of technology in Tanzania.

Biotechnology is a versatile field that involves using biological systems to create products and solve problems.

Prof Raphael Chibunda, SUA Deputy Vice Chancellor, affirmed this at the weekend during a panel discussion at the annual meeting of the Crop Science Association of Tanzania (CROSAT) in Dodoma.

The discussion which brought together biotechnology researchers from Tanzania, Belgium and Kenya focused on the role of biotechnology in crop improvement and global perspectives on its use in agriculture.

"As key institution in our country's agricultural research, we have submitted a proposal to the government for our university to be one of the three centres of excellence for biotechnology research. This will allow us to thoroughly investigate the potential of the technology and provide the country with reliable insights," he said.

He explained that the slow adoption of biotechnology in Tanzania and other African countries has been largely due to misunderstandings of the technology and resistance from critics.

The opposition has led to the creation of 'stringent' laws and regulations that restrict local researchers from fully participating in biotechnology research and development, hindering the nation's ability to address pressing challenges in agriculture.

"It is the plea of scientists that the time has come for African countries, including Tanzania, to reconsider how we can engage with biotechnology. We have seen how countries like the United Tanzania and beyond.

States, China and India have embraced it. Even in Europe, where genetically engineered crops are not widely cultivated, they are major consumers, importing from countries that grow them," he said.

He also stressed the importance of SUA leading research in the area, noting that it is essential for Tanzanian scientists to generate local evidence regarding the potential risks or benefits of biotechnology rather than relying on external studies or opinions.

Earlier in the session, Prof. Marc Heidje from VIB International Plant Biotechnology Outreach (VIB-IPBO) presented findings highlighting the growing global demand for food due to population growth, land degradation, climate change and the need to increase food production.

He noted that many countries worldwide have adopted biotechnology to enhance crop yields and improve agricultural productivity.

"Biotechnology is not a panacea for all agricultural challenges, but it is an effective tool for improving seed production and accelerating development of desired traits compared to traditional methods. To date, no evidence has shown that using genetically modified crops has led to harm," he said.

He also addressed misconceptions surrounding genetically modified crops in Europe, stating:

"There is misinformation suggesting that European countries do not grow or consume crops derived from genetic engineering. In Belgium, for instance, we grow genetically modified crops and many European countries import large quantities of such crops for both human and animal consumption."

This year's CROSAT meeting opened with a scientific conference themed 'Tackling Climate Change with Crop Production Technologies' and was followed by the association's annual general meeting, bringing together stakeholders from across

Extensively amending labour laws could impact private sector hiring

among a distinctive array of instruments where the state relates to industrialists, and where a bigger number of stakeholders, labour unions and activist groups, have their demands on the government.

Depending on the situation and indeed vital demands at a particular moment, certain changes will be made, but not all law changes are instantly enforceable. At the same time, an overly pro-labour law cadre can limit hiring by companies, a risk aversion attitude.

Thus, there were mixed feelings when the legislature was handed a bill for first reading that is proposing major amendments to labour laws, where it is stated in its objectives that it is meant for enhancing observation of workers' rights and addressing workplace challenges.

The Labour Laws (Amendments) Act, 2024 seeks to amend the Employment and Labour Relations Act, the Labour Institutions Act, and the Non-Citizens (Employment Regulation) Act, ostensibly to enhance clarity.

It is also intended to broaden protections and modernise provisions of specific employees, while the statement says employers will benefit.

Reports that a key provision in the bill envisages expansion of maternity leave for employees who give birth to premature children, as currently maternity leave is fixed to a set duration

As such mothers leave workplaces earlier than expected, extended leave implies the supplementary time due to early birth and the proper leave.

Nothing objectionable there but companies may replace such officer if the hiring space is limited, while in the public service no problems are likely to arise.

There are changes that are said to offer greater flexibility in hiring,

ABOUR laws are one for instance temporary work or seasonal employment, where the real intention appears to provide for a legal opening for new graduates to build their skills or gain work experience.

The reason for this view is that temporary work or seasonal labour in farm areas are spheres that don't need legislation, but asking major companies and especially parastatal organisations to take in large numbers of graduates for partial work for a while, a year or six months, needs a legal cadre - and a clear budget.

What is unclear is what is meant by a provision where a new section is being introduced allowing employers and employees to agree on procedures for operating during emergencies such as health crises or other disruptions.

Is this a matter of agreeing or actually providing for such aspects in labour law, or making it explicit that public sector firms and private entities can state specific terms for emergencies?

This is a provision that the public sector needs, for there is a sense of aloofness to company or corporate needs that melts in a private sector entity.

Depending on what is expected from that provision, it is expected it would help to ensure job security when such requirements are in the law, not just commanded from above, as it were.

As expected in this regard, there is a provision curtailing disciplinary action taken against an employee while a dispute is pending before the Labour Commission or Labour Court.

There has to be a time frame for it to be resolved as even parastatals that need to enhance productivity just can't stand protracted disputes with employees they are convinced they can safely do without. Enforcing this may be costly.

HIS past summer, I presented actionable AI plans to publishers L at several press and revenue events. When I was first invited to make the presentations, I wanted to discuss amazing tools and the possibilities.

To prepare, I reached out to several of my publisher friends who represented the groups I was presenting to. No judgment, but they all said: "We really haven't started yet. We'd like to."

In fairness to everyone, AI is a moving target. It's overwhelming. It's moving faster than any technology we've ever had in the modern era. Many people don't even know what they don't know but, more importantly, they don't know where to start.

Jumping on the AI train: A guide for news publishers

compose a reasonable story.

The more specific you are about what you need, the better the results. If you ask AI to write a story about something generic like coffee, with a good prompt, it will return a

decent story. If you ask it to write about a school board meeting or an event that has never happened, be prepared for anything because the AI will make things up.

Here is an anatomy of a news prompt. Note that the reference material related to a story should be made available in a knowledge I won't get into the ethics of AI; base or what is known as retrieval there are people who are way more augmented generation or RAG. The cost of using AI tools and techniques is negligible. That's the good news. The bad news for publishers is that it is available to anyone who wants to use it. The classic "two guys/gals in a garage", especially if they are technically astute and aggressive in using AI as tools, will dominate the space. If you are slow to adopt and adapt, you will lose. We are in a major period of disruption that will make the invasion of digital platforms look like a minor inconvenience because, with AI, anyone can become your new competition.

What is AI's real superpower?

While most of the use cases for AI are headline writing, summarisations, copy editing and data mining, AI's superpower is in autonomous agent systems or AI agents.

AI agents can take a task with guidelines/guard rails and break them down into several subtasks, then accomplish those subtasks using the set of tools the system has available.

So, how is this different from an automation or an automated task that uses AI in its workflow? allow you to build virtually any AI app, is a free and open source. But what do you do with the pieces?

However, remember not to submit any private or confidential information as it can be used for training data. Two: Find or develop AI talent. Critical to your journey, find a coach, staffer, your child or anyone you can who will push you to where you need to get to. Three: Map your processes and workflow. Map your publishing processes and see how automation can eliminate expenses and time, then graduate to integrating AI into the automation. Four: Create your "would" list. Your "would" list is everything you would do within your operation if you were not constrained by time, money and talent. That should be your goal as you move to using AI agents. Five: Develop your AI policies and plan. Start developing your AI policies and roadmap as an organization. Don't let anything hold you back. When you have it, figure out how to implement it.

Digital format may ease pensioner verification, funds made available

HE government has another digital rabbit in a hat set to be unveiled in the next few months, as it is reported to be developing a digital system to simplify the verification of pensioners needing to be paid by the Treasury

The new design would enable pensioners to verify their status remotely, either through mobile phones or using banking services, shedding plenty of physical verification.

There is obviously something worthwhile in such a shift, if other bottlenecks don't arise, as the physical verification was lengthy since the pension funds lack the needed cash.

That is why pensioners and the public at large wish to hear that once such verification is done there will be cash to be paid as, without this precondition, some digital buttons will not work accordingly, retaining manual verification, pushing files, reminder letters, etc.

A legislator shot up in the National Assembly recently seeking to know why the government was yet to establish a more convenient procedure for pensioners to verify their status at the council or ward level, instead of regional offices.

Surely, that demand went a bit too far as pensioners are consolidated at company level, and the idea of making this information available everywhere it simply hinges on digitisation.

As is often the case, the authorities responsible were looking at the benefits of the new modality, focusing on the travel part - whereas the crucial issue is the lack of a predictable payment time frame from the moment of retiring to obtaining benefits.

It is obvious that there are big

issues that can't be sorted out by digitisation, including the idea that those losing jobs should not just stay for six months and obtain their benefits but must sit this situation out until retirement age.

Law drafters make this a mercy procedure to save the client from any "mischief" with his or her money, which could indeed be true, but also impede those needing to resettle, urgently.

It is a moral debate how far this condescending attitude is warranted in the way social security is designed: that the government, not the client, is best placed to decide on a person's future.

This attitude apart, the proper reason is that pensioners' funds are too often tied up with projects that don't earn as much in a short while.

An example is the way city centre skyscrapers are jostling for office space clients with peripheral cottages and business complexes on the outer reaches of the old city.

Renters avoid the long morning and evening rush hour road traffic queues and thus modest villas rapidly become office units in the low-density neighbourhoods.

Thus, the format is enticing as it permits pensioners to authenticate their status and receive their benefits just so long as they can put up with the digitally processed details.

Evidently, it is a relief that the system will be integrated with mobile phones and banking platforms that are already widely accessible across the country.

Let's start with the number one complaint I've heard through all my publisher discussions: "AI just makes things up. It cites things that don't exist." You've probably all seen this. I have.

Why does AI hallucinate?

AI today is synonymous with LLMs. LLM is short for Large Language Model. Large Language Models are statistical averages of question-and-answer pairs. Billions of question-and-answer pairs.

When an LLM receives a question it has never seen before, it, like a human, comes up with the best answer based on the average of all the past question-and-answer pairs it can. This inherent averaging can cause details to be left out or lead to a made-up answer.

We know AI for its large language models or LLMs. Brand names like ChatGPT, Claude, Gemini and Llama are all LLMs. Different versions have different capabilities. Some are better at logic, some are better at creativity, and others are better at programming.

What sends an LLM down one discipline or another? Training data. To make it better at coding, feed it code. To make it better at poetry, feed it poems. History? Feed it history books.

To bring it down to human terms, think of an LLM as a brain - and everyone's brain is wired differently, based on their experiences.

Your brain knows every class you've ever taken, every book you've ever read, every programme or movie you've ever seen, and every interaction you've ever had. It all went into training your brain. Suppose I ask you to "write a story about coffee". Maybe you've never written a story about coffee before or have never drunk coffee. In that case, you can still make the word association and recall other

Small is the new big

I personally believe that the greatest success stories and case studies will come from smaller media companies. In the world of AI tools and automation, smaller, more nimble companies can dominate.

Committees, approval processes and institutional drag will bog down larger companies. In the new world AI-driven entrepreneurship, of speed is a competitive advantage. The winners will be those who can quickly adopt, integrate and iterate. I predict that you will see the best, most innovative publishers and operators become frustrated with corporate oversight and build next-generation media companies unconstrained by legacy staff, Automations typically fail if the appropriate tools or input are not available.

Agents will find workarounds to accomplish tasks even if without having the proper tools. That sounds scary, but good AI agent systems will surely put a "human in the middle" for checks and balances.

Challenges of AI for media publishers

I've spoken to dozens of publishers about AI, and the three biggest challenges are: "I don't know where to start."

Given the speed at which the technology is moving, I always feel that. However, you just have to start. Baby steps.

"I know what I want to do; I don't know who to ask."

I have heard this constantly. Those who understand the possibilities of AI don't have a resource to help them or ensure they have access to the tools they need.

"We have people in our organisation using and testing it, but we don't have it organised." This is very dangerous. You don't want to slow things down or stomp out experimentation as a publisher.

At the same time, you need institutional control, or your people will do things "willy-nilly". When you're ready, two platforms you may want to look at are AICamp and TeamGPT.

Invest in expertise, not tools

For the first time in the history of technology, the cost of - and access to - the technology are not barriers to entry. Most of you know that a subscription to paid ChatGPT, Claude and Perplexity is about US\$20/month. If you require API access to power your tools, they are very affordable.

A tool like Langflow, which will

Africa's energy future: Experts calls for self-sufficiency amid paradox of plenty

T the recently held African Energy Week (AEW) 2024 in Cape Town, South Africa, Professor Benedict Oramah, President and Chairman of the Board of Directors at Afreximbank, addressed the gathering with a powerful message on Africa's untapped potential and the urgent need for energy self-sufficiency.

His address laid bare the stark contrast between Africa's vast resource wealth and the continent's energy poverty, a dilemma he called "the paradox of plenty." With over 600 million Africans lacking access to reliable electricity, Oramah emphasized the gravity of the energy access deficit as a barrier to economic growth, development, and overall well-being across the continent.

Africa, Oramah pointed out, is rich in energy resources. The continent holds nearly 10% of the world's oil reserves and 7% of its natural gas. Additionally, with approximately 40% of global solar energy potential, Africa is positioned to harness nearly 60 million terawatt hours of solar energy annually.

Despite this abundance, the continent's limited energy access remains one of its most formidable barriers to economic progress. According to the World Bank, inadequate energy access costs Africa between 2% and 4% of its GDP annually, highlighting a significant opportunity loss that affects millions. This, Oramah argued, highlights the urgency of adopting a selfsustained energy strategy to close the gap and liberate Africa from the constraints of energy dependence. called on Oramah African leaders and institutions to adopt a bolder, more innovative approach to the energy crisis, shifting from a reliance on external financing to fostering an energyindependent continent. Stressing the need for energy sovereignty, he encouraged African nations to collaborate in transforming the continent into a massive refining and production hub that could meet the domestic energy demand. Using examples from countries like India, Brazil, and South Korea, which have built and maintained their refining infrastructures, Oramah illustrated that African countries could replicate this model, becoming selfsufficient and economically resilient by managing their own refining and energy production capacities. Such a transformation, however, requires more than infrastructure alone; it demands a fundamental rethinking of Africa's approach to energy governance and institutional development. Oramah spoke passionately about Afreximbank's commitment to driving this shift. As a pan-African multilateral bank, Afreximbank, under Oramah's leadership, is dedicated to providing African nations with the financial resourc-

es necessary to invest in their energy sectors. He advocated for significant equity investment in Afreximbank from African countries, creating a continental bank that would work exclusively in Africa's interests.

By consolidating financial resources within Africa, Afreximbank could support homegrown energy initiatives that lessen dependence on foreign aid, addressing energy poverty from within and fostering the economic empowerment of African nations.

To further advance this vision, Oramah invited African oil companies and nations that have yet to sign agreements with Afreximbank to do so, emphasizing that energy security and sovereignty are now essential to Africa's path forward.

Without taking these steps, he warned, Africa would continue to perpetuate a cycle of poverty and debt. By investing in Afreximbank, countries can tap into Africa's wealth to secure funding, using resources such as oil, gas, and minerals as collateral rather than relying on external debt. This approach, he noted, offers Africa a means to leverage its natural wealth to secure financing, build infrastructure, and create institutions that promote self-sufficiency rather than dependency. Highlighting Afrexgram. commitment imbank's to innovative financial solutions, Oramah highlighted that African countries have the resources to transform the continent if they develop the right institutions. Such institutions, he argued, must be capable of delivering affordable financing for energy projects, creating a pipeline of funding for Africa's energy needs that would drive the continent's development independently of foreign

sized energy sovereignty and economic empowerto the need for institu-Africa's energy landscape. Through collaboration, African countries could achieve an energy future

that aligns with their ambitions for growth and development, ensuring that the continent's wealth benefits its people directly. With examples of nations like Singapore, Venezuela, and Mexico, which have achieved energy independence by owning their refining capacities, Oramah made it clear that

HE government and civil society organisations have partnered to promote access to land rights for rural communities but they have faced difficulty in reaching many people who do not know their land rights and how to accesses these rights. Both government and civil society functionaries live far from communities that need their services most. For those who on rare occasions live within communities, they face the problem of understanding traditions and culture of the relevant community and this hampers their efforts to reach out to many beneficiaries of their work.

For this reason projects encourage villagers to form local groups which are trained in basic land laws, land rights and secure tenure, good governance, human rights and conflict resolution, among others. Community members are responsible for selecting members of the groups, usually one group per village, basing on terms and conditions set by the village assembly. NGOs and government provide guidance on formation of such groups and thereafter provide training for those selected.

These groups carry various names but basically they execute similar responsibility, which is promoting access to land rights for villagers.

HakiArdhi, for example, call them Land Rights Monitors (LRMs). They are individuals who are democratically elected by villagers to help ensure sustainability in land rights and governance and create continuity at the community level in its land rights and governance training programme.

Action Aid Tanzania uses Community Development Facilitators (CDF), while Mtandao wa Vikundi vya Wakulima Tanzania (MVIWATA) - a network of small-scale farmers' organizations uses Promoters. On the other hand the Lawyers Environmental Action Team (LEAT) have Social Accountability Monitoring (SAM) teams.

The idea behind is that local groups are better placed to promote land rights for villagers and sustain benefits that community members enjoy from implementation of specific projects. These groups also mobilise villagers to conserve the natural environment and adapt to impacts of climate change in order to build economic and environmental resilience for the community so that ownership of land and secure tenure become more meaningful.

The Tanzania Grass Roots Oriented Development (TAGRODE) that is conducting land rights related projects in four villages in Morogoro and Iringa regions has helped villagers to establish

tion of secondary school education, the candidate must be hard working and must be acceptable in the village because of good character. The forums comprise 20 people, ten males and ten females," explains Dickson Mwalumbandu, Field Coordinator for TAGRODE

Community Forums act as an oversight structure to advocate and sensitize the community members on land rights and tenure. Members of Community Forums work on voluntary basis. In a bid to underscore the value of land, Community Forum members insist that no person should sell their land especially if they have only one plot because they will never have a place to live and neither will they have a reliable source of livelihoods. "That will be the end of their lives. Forum members also encourage villagers to train their children to know their land rights and be guardians of the family land and thus village land," explains Mwalubandu.

In implementing the Enhancing land rights and land security of Rural Communities in Iringa and Morogoro them to fulfil that obligation better. The responsibility to protect ownership rights must come from within the villagers and all community members in general. That is why we helped them establish the Community Forum because members of the forum live in the village, they know the problems that exist in relation to land rights and can therefore help their folks to solve these problems and to participate fully in promoting access to land rights. Besides they can easily win the trust of community members than someone who does not live in the community," explains Zubery Mwachulla, Executive Director of the organization.

Norbert Mpangile, Ikule Village Executive Officer says that villagers acknowledge the important work being done by members of the community forum. He explains that they play a big role in educating and raising awareness of the importance of owning land and ensuring that the ownership is protected. "They do this by engaging individual members, in church, in mosques and during village assemblies. Community Forums also advocate for women ownership of land although traditions and customs remain big obstacles," he explains.

not allow women to own land. "It is an age-old belief that makes it difficult for people to change their mindset. Under the circumstances members of community forums should step up efforts to educate people about equitable land rights for both men and women. It will take time for people to change," says Hiyasinti Edwin Libandama, acting District Lands Development Officer for Mlimba District Council.

Enock Kapola is a member of the Ikule Community Forum. He explains that the Forum's activities focus on educating community members in accessing land rights and how to protect the land they own by acquiring evidence of ownership. The Forum also strives to raise awareness among villagers of the need to abandon traditions that prohibit women from owning land. Some women simply don't want to own land for fear of breaching traditions and drawing the wrath of the family or the clan. "Since women and men make up families and the village population in general, there is no reason why some should have more rights than others when it comes to land ownership. The issue of equal rights becomes more conspicuous at family level where the wife and husband can have joint ownership in order to build a strong economy. We insist that when women own land they don't infringe men's rights of ownership; it is just about gender equality,"

he says

But some villagers are reluctant to take part in activities that will have their parcels of land surveyed and mapped so that they can eventually be given CCROs. Besides conservatism, there are also fears that land certification is just a trick by the district council that would ultimately add to new sources of revenue through land tax or levies.

Even with the use of community forum, implementation of the project does not meet expectations of villagers and they are losing patience. "Awareness is high. People want to see their plots of land being surveyed and mapped and eventually being issued certificates of occupancy. But things are moving rather slowly and they blame forum members for the delay. Their trust is waning."

However, TAGRODE ED acknowledges some minor delays but is confident that the project activities are running according to schedule. "We are implementing this project in partnership with other stakeholders including the Mlimba District Council which is the major partner. Sometimes they are held back by other obligations and this slows down the pace of implementation. But I am confident we will accomplish the project as scheduled," says Dickson Mwalubandu.

As awareness of land issues becomes high Ikule Villagers now look forward to having their land surveyed and are willing to pay 30,000/- to have more than one plot of their land surveyed. The project surveys and maps one piece of land and ultimately issues one Certificate of Customary Right of Occupancy (CCRO) free of charge for every individual. Those who want more plots surveyed, mapped and eventually be issued with certificates are required to part with the said amount.

"However project staff must visit the village frequently so as to reassure villagers that the project is ongoing and the objectives will be met. Currently forum members shoulder the burden of explaining the project status and villagers seem not to trust us anymore," says Frank Msemwa, a member of the forum.

Another CF member at Ikule village, Zakayo Mbwilo explains that the forum has to a small extent been

Community Forums. These are groups formed by small holder farmers and pastoralists' representatives in each of the four villages covered under the project. "The village government proposes the names of people who are eligible to join the forums but these must get approval by the village assembly. The criteria for selection include comple-

Regions project, TAGRODE is working with Mlimba District Council to promote land rights and secure tenure for villagers in the project area. "We strive to build a sense of ownership among community members that each of them has the obligation to protect their land rights and that we only help

The problem of failure of women to access land rights is not isolated to Ikule since in almost all villages under Mlimba District Council, villagers are still entrenched in traditions that do involved in resolving conflicts related to land ownership. "But we need more training in conflict resolution and we should be given the responsibility to resolve such issues in the village. Currently our participation is limited and our impact in conflict resolution is minimal," he says.

Improvement of German Road bolsters economy in Tarime DC

NFRASTRUCTURE such as roads is vital for community development, much like veins and arteries are essential to the human body. This importance is evident among residents of rural areas surrounding the Nyamongo-Komaswa Road and neighboring wards in Tarime District, Mara Region.

The 45-kilometer road, known as the German Road, was previously impassable or very difficult to traverse, hampering economic activities and limiting the transportation of goods and produce. It also made daily commuting difficult, especially for schoolchildren, who could not cross two major bridges during the rainy season, leading to frequent school absences.

However, this situation has greatly improved after the North Mara Gold Mine rehabilitated the road, upgrading it to a gravel standard. The improved road and bridges have been a major relief for local residents.

Eliasi Itembele, the Executive Officer of Nyakunguru Village, confirms that the road has greatly benefitted villagers, reducing transportation costs for both passengers and goods. Before the road upgrade, residents had to travel first to Tarime before heading to Musoma or Mwanza, which added to travel costs.

The same issue applied to goods destined for villages along this route; products from Mwanza or Musoma were previously sold at higher prices due to the



additional detour costs. **Gokohe River** "Now, things are different.

Four buses now travel from Nyamongo to Mwanza daily. The challenges we faced before are gone. Farmers

also benefit as trucks now come directly from Mwanza or Musoma to Nyamongo. Make no mistake-developing infrastructure is the development of people," says

Itembele.

Nyanji Mwita, a resident of Nyangukuru Village, adds that in terms of social services, the road has been a great relief, enabling patients who need to be referred to larger hospitals to travel directly without long detours, ensuring timely access to medical services.

"In rainy seasons like now, students from Nyakunguru attending Kibasuka Secondary School couldn't reach the school because the Gokohe Bridge would be flooded. Students from Nyarwana faced similar issues getting to Genge Secondary School. Now, things have improved for everyone. Even for us women, doing business in nearby villages or attending social activities is much easier," says Nyanji.

She also notes that "boda-boda (motorcycle taxi) transport costs have decreased with the improved road-what used to cost 2,500 to 3,000/- now costs only 1,000/-."

Joseph Mwita, a resident of Nyarwana Village, also appreciates the benefits, stating that the German Road rehabilitation has

boosted local incomes and economic growth for villages along the route.

"This area has many agricultural products. Smallscale entrepreneurs from villages along this road can bring their products to the market, knowing there is demand. Besides large buses, many small cars now pass through. Travelers between Mwanza or Musoma pass here directly, avoiding the Tarime detour. The community benefits from this road in countless ways," he explains.

In addition to the German Road, Komarera Village residents have also benefited from a new five-kilometer road built to connect the village with a new community dispensary established by North Mara Mine.

"This road has invigorated trade and strengthened connections with neighboring villages. North Mara has been responsive in providing essential services for the community. The road's importance lies in its link to the village, neighboring communities, and the new dispensary, which is wellequipped and has all necessary supplies. We truly thank the mine for bringing services closer to us," says Mussa Raphael, the Executive Officer of Komarera Village.

The Komarera Dispensary was built alongside a residence for the officer in charge to facilitate community services. The dispensary's in-charge, Dr. Dotto Makumikenda, notes that previously, residents had to travel to Genkuru Village for healthcare, but now they have access within their own village unless a case requires referral.

"Our dispensary has good infrastructure, a clean environment, essential equipment, medicines, and supplies, which makes my work easier and greatly benefits the community," says Dr. Makumikenda.

He adds that before this dispensary was established, patients had to travel far, increasing costs for families; those unable to afford it often resorted to traditional remedies without proper diagnosis, which could endanger their health.

The North Mara Gold Mine has been actively ensuring that the surrounding community benefits from its presence, going beyond the legal requirements of mining and local content regulations.

It is new dawn for the Maasai in Msomera: **Balancing tradition with modern lifestyle**

N the heart of Handeni District, Msomera is quietly becoming a testament to the Tanzanian government's bold efforts to balance conservation with the livelihoods of one of the country's most iconic communities-the Maasai.

More than 3,000 Maasai households have relocated here from the Ngorongoro Conservation Area (NCA), voluntarily leaving behind their ancestral land as part of a broader strategy aimed at reducing human pressure on one of Tanzania's most ecologically fragile zones.

While this move represents a significant change for the Maasai, it also offers an opportunity for growth and development, both for the community and for the village of Msomera itself. The relocation of the Maasai is driven by a pressing need to protect the delicate ecosystem of the NCA, a UNESCO World Heritage site that has seen a sharp rise in human population over recent decades.

From just 9,000 people in 1954, the population of the NCA has ballooned to over 100,000. For a long time, the Maasai were able to coexist with the wildlife in the area, but increasing pressure from livestock and human activities has taken a toll on the environment. Restrictions on grazing and farming have become necessary, but they have also made life difficult for the Maasai, who rely heavily on livestock for their livelihood.

In response, the government has launched a voluntary relocation program, encouraging Maasai families to move to new areas like Msomera, where they are provided with land, housing, and access to social services.

While some critics have expressed concern over the relocation, citing the cultural and social impact of moving the Maasai from their ancestral lands, others see it as a necessary step toward balancing conservation efforts with sustainable development.

One of the veteran journalists Salim Salim said he came to Msomera in 1967 after Tanzania's Arusha Declaration.



Each family relocated to Msomera Village in Handeni District, Tanga Region, is provided with a two-acre plot comprising a three-bed-room house for resettlement, a five-acre farm, and a 22-hectare communal grazing land.

Now, more than five decades later he is witnessing a transformation in the village. "Seeing is believing," he says. "There have been unbelievable changes here. There were no roads, health services, and electricity."

For Salim, these improvements are a testament to the potential of Msomera to become a thriving community, but he also stresses the importance of setting clear guidelines for the use of the new resources, particularly water sources like charcodams, to ensure their sustainability.

As part of the relocation program, each Maasai family is given five acres of land for farming and two acres for settlement, while 22,000 hectares of land are reserved for communal grazing.

This new arrangement has opened up opportunities that were previously unavailable to the Maasai in the NCA, where restrictions on farming and other economic activities limited their ability to diversify their livelihoods.

Many of the Maasai in Msomera have taken up farming, and the fertile land has already proven to be a valuable asset. One resident, a herder who relocated from Ngorongoro, explains that while the NCAA used to provide two bags of maize per year, he was able to harvest 15 bags in a single season after moving to Msomera.

However, the transition from the NCA to Msomera has not been without its challenges. One of the main issues facing the Maasai is the tension between the relocated

families and the host community in Msomera.

Farmers from neighboring villages have encroached on land that was designated for grazing, leading to conflicts between the Maasai herders and local farmers. The government is aware of these challenges and has taken steps to address them, including organizing patrols to protect the grazing areas and engaging civil society organizations to promote harmony between the different communities.

Despite these challenges, many Maasai are optimistic about their future in Msomera. The ditional livestock-keeping government has invested practices and promote more efficient methods. heavily in infrastructure to support the relocated families, including the construction of new health centers, schools, and water supply systems. In addition, a milk collection center and a modern livestock auction facility are being built, which will provide new economic opportunities for the Maasai. Elizabeth Makamero, a Maasai woman who relocated to Msomera with her family, is one of those who is embracing the changes. "We are building a four-bedroom house because the one we were given is too small for our

Msomera will begin to see the benefits of modern livestock-keeping practices.

According to one government official, the goal is to help the Maasai "get more value for their livestock," so that they can sell their cattle at better prices and reinvest the profits into other incomegenerating activities.


As Msomera continues to grow, the government is considering upgrading the village to a ward to accommodate the increasing population.

Plans are also underway to divide the village into smaller administrative units to manage the tensions between the relocated Maasai families and the host community. Meanwhile, efforts are being made to ensure that the Maasai in Msomera have access to the education, healthcare, and social services they need to thrive in their new environment.

The district council is planning to introduce training programs on basic life skills, savings, and credit culture, to help the Maasai manage their finances more effectively and avoid some of the pitfalls that have affected other relocation pro grams in the past.

For the Maasai who have relocated to Msomera, this move represents a new chapter in their lives. It is an opportunity to maintain their cultural heritage while also embracing the opportunities that come with modern development. As one Maasai resident put it, "Msomera is full of opportunities. If the government continues to stand by us, there will be

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family," she explains. Elizabeth is optimistic about the future, noting that Msomera offers opportunities that were unavailable in Ngorongoro. "In Ngorongoro, we couldn't grow crops, and wildlife would often de-



Tanzania to become a global graphite mining powerhouse

Tanzania is projected to become a global powerhouse in graphite mining, ranking sixth worldwide and third in Africa by 2050, according to a recent report by the World Bank and data from the US Geological Survey.

Mozambique leads among African nations, followed by Madagascar.

This achievement was highlighted by Dr. Venance Mwasse, CEO of the State Mining Corporation (STAMICO), who represented the Minister of Minerals, Anthony Mavunde, at the "Ministerial Session" of the Africa Critical Minerals Summit held in Cape Town, South Africa

Dr. Mwasse underscored Tanzania's rich endowment in critical minerals, including graphite, nickel, cobalt, lithium, rare earth elements, and niobium, all essential for modern energy production and technology advancement.

Dr. Mwasse outlined Tanzania's ambitious Mining Vision 2030, which aims to reduce risks for investors by conducting extensive geological research in areas where data is limited, thereby "de-risking" the mining sector.

"This initiative includes expanding high-resolution airborne surveys from the current 16% coverage to 50% by 2030, a move expected to improve exconfidence," he explained.

Emphasizing the need for a united African approach, Dr. Mwasse advocated for collaboration among African nations to establish processing and refining facilities on the continent.

He noted the strategic importance of conducting cost-benefit analyses to determine ideal locations for these facilities.

"For example, the upcoming Kabanga Nickel multi-metal smelter in Kahama, Tanzania, will enable neighboring countries like Burundi and the Democratic Republic of Congo to process their minerals locally, fostering regional prosperity and maximizing resource benefits, Strong partnerships among African nations are key to making this vision a reality," he said.

Tanzania is also enhancing STAMI-CO's role to attract investment by issuing exploration licenses and conducting its own preliminary research.

This approach aims to reduce investor start-up times and minimize risks associated with unproven resources. Dr. Mwasse concluded by urging other African nations to strengthen their state-owned mining corporations to drive critical mineral development.

Iran's empty threat to close the most important oil shipping lane

Speculation over Iran blocking the Strait of Hormuz, a critical oil chokepoint, has resurfaced amid Middle East tensions.

The US and European naval presence in the Persian Gulf could quickly counter any blockade attempt, which would disrupt over 21 million barrels per day of oil flow. President Donald Trump is widely expected to re-impose the "maximum pressure policy" on Iran.

Every time tensions in the Middle East escalate, oil market analysts are back to speculating whether Iran will dare attempt to close the Strait of Hormuz, the world's most vital oil chokepoint, which sees 20% of global daily oil consumption pass through.

The October attack from Iran on Israel and the limited Israeli response have revived speculation on the possible impact of an Iranian blockade of the Strait of Hormuz.

Despite on-and-off threats for years, Iran has never attempted such a blockade. And analysts and geopolitical experts believe it will not do it this time, either.

The closure of the shipping route, where more than 20% of daily oil consumption passes, is a very low-probability event. It would harm both oil exporters from the region, including Iran itself, and all consumers, especially China, the world's largest crude oil importer, which relies on cheap Iranian oil supply.

However, a large US and European naval fleet presence in the Persian Gulf and the U.S. Fifth Fleet based in Bahrain could move quickly to prevent an attempted Iranian blockade.

China, Iran's main oil customer, will not be happy with a blockade and traffic disruption, either, as shipping rates and oil prices will jump. The world's top crude importer depends on the Strait of Hormuz for its vast supply of oil from other Middle Eastern producers, too.

Moreover, Iran's crude oil going to China these days is reportedly priced at its narrowest discount to Brent in five years as Iranian cargo loadings slumped last month amid fears that Israel would target Tehran's energy facilities in response to the Iranian missile attack on Israel on October 1.

out that issues such as the electricity problem and foreign currency shortages, which were major concerns last year, have been resolved.

Emissions from private jets seen soaring

global analysis of private-jet use shows that the number of aircraft, trips and the distance planes covered have all soared over the past four years, exacerbating the sector's carbon dioxide emissions. Between 2019 and 2023, the number of private flights rose to more than four million a year, increasing emissions by 46 percent.

The study, which was published on 7 November in Communications Earth and Environment1, found that private flights produced 15.6 million tonnes of CO2 last year, and identified events that they were concentrated around, including the COP28 climate summit in Dubai last year.

This work "is so important in the light of global warming and the absolute inequalities that we have across the

world," says Milan Klöwer, who researches the impact of aviation on global warming at the University of Oxford, UK. "While private aviation is obviously a small share of commercial aviation, it really shows how disproportionately they're just burning the planet."

Researchers have explored the impacts of air travel on climate change. But few studies have focussed on the global scale and climate cost of private jets, which are one of the most energyconsuming ways to fly. "Per hour, a large private aircraft can emit more than an average person emits per year," says study co-author Stefan Gössling, who studies transport behaviour and climate change at Linnaeus University in Sweden.

Gössling and his colleagues collected private aircraft logs from 2019-23, which provide



real-time location information for all flights. Flight time data were then "associated with aircraft model-specific fuel use to determine emissions", he says.

the number of private jets increased by 28.4% over the four years, to almost 26,000 jets in 2023. The total distance the jets flew also increased.

Their analysis showed that And although total CO2 emissions increased from 10.7 to 15.6 million tonnes, average emissions per kilometre decreased, which could be due to more efficient jet systems

(see 'The jet set').

Nearly 50percent of the flights were shorter than 500 kilometres; such distances, Klöwer says, could have been done by train or by car. And many journeys - well as emissions - were clustered around major world events. For example, 172 of the 595 private planes that flew to the 2023 World Economic Forum were also seen at the Cannes Film Festival that year. COP28 was linked to 644 private flights, releasing an estimated 4,800 tonnes of CO2.

Although the scale of emissions from private flights is small compared to other sources, the study argues that the rate at which they are increasing is concerning. "I have already heard many colleagues say that 15.6 million tonnes is nothing in global comparison, and that we can ignore the sector," says Gössling. "I think we should

see it the other way around. If individuals get to emit thousands of tons without consequences, why should anybody else reduce their emissions?'

Klöwer agrees that the global rise in private jet usage is "not sustainable," adding that stricter regulations would help reduce the incentives around private flight. "Carbon is a cost, and this cost should be internalised," says Gössling. "I think every country could put taxes on every private jet that lands or takes off," Klöwer says, although he acknowledges that rules like this would be "politically very, very difficult".

Klöwer is keen for future studies to explore non-CO2 emissions from flying, such as methane or sulphur dioxide. He says that although calculating these emissions would be challenging, research on this could help to provide a clearer picture of how individual jets contribute to climate change. "You could really pin down people and say ... 'this is the amount of warming you are responsible personally for'."

Bitcoin nears \$80,000

NEW YORK

Bitcoin is closing in on \$80,000 for the first time, boosted by President-elect Donald Trump's embrace of digital assets and the prospect of a Congress featuring pro-crypto lawmakers.

The cryptocurrency climbed as much as 4.3% to an unprecedented \$79,771 on Sunday and remained near \$79,000 as of 2:05 p.m. in Singapore. Smaller tokens like Cardano and meme-crowd favorite Dogecoin also rallied.

Trum vowed on the campaign trail to put the US at the center of the digitalasset industry, including creating a strategic Bitcoin stockpile and appointing regulators enamored with digital assets. He emerged from Tuesday's election in a stronger position than expected – his Republican Party has control of the Senate and is on the verge of holding a narrow majority in the House.

"With the dust from Trump's victory still settling down, it was only a matter of time before a run-up of some sort occurred given the perception of Trump being pro-crypto, and that's what we're seeing now," said Le Shi, Hong Kong managing director at market-making

Employers report narrowed skills gap

The Association of Tanzania Employers (ATE) has reported significant progress in narrowing the skills gap among youth in the competitive job market over the past three years.

Speaking at a conference in Dar es Salaam last week, ATE Chief Executive Officer Suzanne Ndomba-Doran (pictured) highlighted the success of the Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) project, launched in 2021 to equip youth with skills for both employment and self-employment.

Addressing the conference theme, "Social Dialogue and Decent Jobs for Young Tanzanians," Ndomba-Doran noted that while TVET equips youth with the skills needed for decent employment and contributes to economic growth, Tanzania's technical and vocational training system faces challenges in adapting to the evolving labor market needs.

"The project covered Dar es Salaam and Morogoro, training 1,098 youth in fields such as fitter mechanics, electrical installations, food production, and refrigeration," she said.

Among the key achievements were the creation of guidelines for TVET graduates and interns, along with training for 34 teachers to enhance curriculum delivery. Additionally, 50 TVET trainers were capacitated in occupational health and safety,

ensuring they can teach students about market needs related to workplace safety.

"We've trained over 350 students in Dar es Salaam and Morogoro, preparing them for employment," Ndo mba-Doran added.

Barrick Gold falls behind rivals

ost of the world's top gold miners have seen their shares surge this year as bullion prices hit repeated record highs.

Not Barrick Gold Corp. Missed production targets, higher operational costs and political turbulence at mines in Africa and Asia have investors turning increasingly sour on the world's second-biggest gold producer. On Thursday, Barrick post-

ed gold output that missed analysts' estimates for the 11th straight quarter. Barrick is one of several miners that have struggled to capitalize on the bullion boom amid higher mining costs and weaker output. But among the largest precious metal producers - Newmont Corp., Agnico Eagle Mines Ltd. and AngloGold Ashanti Ltd. - Barrick has routinely underperformed, with its shares virtually unchanged since the beginning of January. Gold, meanwhile, has soared 30 percent in the period.

According to Barric Gold Corp. CEO Dennis Mark Bristow: We're rebuilding the business

Barrick has spent years working to improve its balance sheet after amassing debt from acquisitions. Bristow, who joined as CEO in 2019 as part of the Canadian company's takeover of Randgold Resources Ltd., has paid down that debt while exercising restraint in dealmaking. He has also pursued diversification into copper.

Bristow's explanation doesn't seem



to be winning over investors. Some of Barrick's top investors have sold off shares while boosting stakes in competitors. Blackrock Inc., one of Barrick's biggest shareholders, reduced its stake while buying into Agnico Eagle and Newmont, according to regulatory disclosures in November. Other major investors like Van Eck Associates Corp., First Eagle Investment Management LLC and Capital Group Inc. also trimmed their holdings in recent months.

Barrick isn't alone in drawing scrutiny from shareholders whose expectations have been lifted by gold's rally. Larger rival Newmont suffered its biggest one-day stock drop since 1997 last month after posting disappointing quarterly earnings.

Bristow said investors are undervaluing Barrick's stock. "It's our job as managers to make sure that the market properly understands us," he said in an interview.

Barrick's strengths lie in its complex of productive mines in the US, along with huge operations in Papua New Guinea and Mali. It has diversified through expanding in copper just as the global energy transition boosts demand for the wiring metal. The company has relatively little debt.

Still, Barrick has faced setbacks in its attempts to match production to cost targets. Its Nevada operations, co-owned with Newmont, need significant infrastructure repairs, and labor costs have increased.

"We're still not as efficient in Nevada as we are in some of our African mines," Bristow said. "But we're getting there."

Africa is also a chief concern among investors, notably in Mali, where the military government is threatening to withdraw the company's right to operate a mine. In the Dominican Republic, an extension to Barrick's Pueblo Viejo mine has taken longer than expected to complete.

Operating issues at the Nevada mines and Pueblo Viejo will "persist into 2025 and are expected to have an impact on production," Bank of Nova Scotia analyst Tanya Jakusconek wrote in a Friday note.

The setbacks have ceded territory to rivals. Newmont solidified its position as the world's top producer with its acquisition of Newcrest Mining Ltd. last year, significantly boosting its production of gold and copper. Agnico Eagle, once a small gold producer, surpassed Barrick's market capitalization for the first time early this year. Barrick's annual gold output, meanwhile, is at its lowest level since 2000.

Barrick has regularly missed Wall Street's expectations for important measures such as revenue and gold production in its quarterly results - including last week's financial disclosures.

"Barrick has a lot of challenges to overcome," said Rick Rule, a US investment adviser and shareholder. "At the very least, it would be useful if the quarterly performance matched guidance.'

Iran and China discuss expansion of trade ties

Iran is attending China International Import Expo (CIIE) in a bid to increase the export of Iran-made goods and services, also expand economic and trade relations with China.

Running from November 5 to 10, the 7th CIIE has attracted 3,496 exhibitors from 129 countries and regions. It also sets a new record with 297 Fortune Global 500 companies and industry leaders attending the event.

Some Iranian high-ranking officials, from government and private sector, have traveled to Shanghai to visit the CIIE and evaluate the country's needs in various sectors



as well as the export potential of Iranian companies in order to develop exports, in addition to examine the existing obstacles in the path of Iranian companies' exports to China, in interaction with Chinese officials and companies, and hold consultations to resolve them.

Mahmoud Najafi-Arab, the head of Tehran Chamber of Commerce, Industries, Mines and Agriculture (TC-CIMA), who traveled to Shanghai on the head of an Iranian trade delegation, met with some entrepreneurs of the private and state-run sectors of China as well as Iranian businessmen living in eastern China in two different meetings upon arriving in Shanghai to attend the CIIE, and discussed with the Chinese sides the conditions and fields of economic relations development, with the focus of attracting investment in projects in the field of renewable energy, processing and food industries, agricultural products, medicine and medical equipment, housing construction, etc.

As reported by the TCCIMA Public Relations Department, Mohsen Bakhtiar, Iran's ambassador to China, Ali Mohammadi, Iran's consul general in Shanghai, and Mohammad-Ali Dehghan Dehnavi, the head of Iran's Trade Promotion Organization (TPO), were also present in these meetings, and discussed the challenges facing the development of Iran-China relations by private sector entrepreneurs.

In these meetings, the TCCIMA head announced the readiness of the Tehran Chamber to host trade delegations from China in various fields of production and trade, and emphasized the need for the two sides to get to know each other as much as possible about the capabilities and capacities of the two countries in meeting the needs and also joint investments.

Addressing the inauguration ceremony of Iran's pavilion in the CIIE, which was also participated by the TPO head and Iran's ambassador to China, Najafi-Arab said: "This huge commercial event provides a valuable opportunity to introduce the export capacities and capabilities of Iran in various industrial and agricultural fields and to strengthen the economic and commercial relations between Iran and China."

Pointing out that Iran and China are big trade partners in the region, he said: "Last year, the bilateral trade, excluding oil export, between the two countries reached about 33 billion dollars. This cooperation continues to grow through trade development in various fields including mining, petrochemicals, food, agriculture and new technologies. The figures show the high capacity of the two countries to expand cooperation, but the relations between the two countries can be developed far beyond this. We should use these capacities optimally by increasing delegation exchanges and developing joint projects and carry out commercial and industrial exchanges on a wider level.'

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OHCHR: Nearly 70% of verified Gaza war dead women and children

THE UN Human Rights Office said on Friday nearly 70 percent of the fatalities it has verified in the Gaza war were women and children, and condemned what it called a systematic violation of the fundamental principles of international humanitarian law.

The UN tally since the start of the war, in which Israel's military is fighting Hamas militants, includes only fatalities it has managed to verify with three sources, and counting continues.

The 8,119 victims verified is a much lower number than the toll of over 43,000 provided by Palestinian health authorities for the 13-month-old war. But the UN breakdown of the victims' age and gender backs the Palestinian assertion that women and children represent a large portion of those

killed in the war.

This finding indicates "a systematic violation of the fundamental principles of international humanitarian law, including distinction and proportionality," the UN rights office said in a statement accompanying the 32-page report.

"It is essential that there is due reckoning with respect to the allegations of serious violations of international law through credible and impartial judicial bodies and that, in the meantime, all relevant information and evidence are collected and preserved," United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights Volker Turk said.

The office of Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu did not immediately respond to a request by Reuters for comment on the report's findings.

It has said approximately one civilian has been killed for every fighter, a ratio it blames on Hamas, saying the Palestinian militant group uses civilian facilities. Hamas has denied using civilians and civilian infrastructure, including hospitals, as human shields.

Youngest victim aged one day

Ajith Sunghay, Head of the UN Human Rights Office for the Occupied Palestinian Territory, told reporters at a briefing in Geneva that the fatalities included in the report were verified by three sources such as neighbors, family members, local NGOs, hospital records or UN staff on the ground.

"The numbers are, of course, massive compared to previous years, so we do need time to catch Israel's military, which began its of- up and verify", he said, adding

that he thought the final UN tally was likely to be similar to the Palestinian toll.

The youngest victim whose death was verified by UN monitors was a one-day-old boy, and the oldest was a 97-year-old woman, the report said.

Overall, those aged 18 or under represented 44 percent of the victims, with children aged five-nine representing the single biggest age category, followed by those aged 10-14, and then those aged up to and including four.

This broadly reflects the enclave's demographics, which the report said reflected an apparent failure to take precautions to avoid civilian losses.

It showed that in 88 percent of cases, five or more people were killed in the same attack, pointing to the Israeli military's use of weapons with an effect across a wide area, although it said some fatalities may have been the result of errant projectiles from Palestinian armed groups.

'G20 should bring tangible results to people'

NEW DELHI

BRAZIL'S Ambassador to India, Kenneth Felix Haczynski da Nobrega on Friday said that the country's presidency of the G20 will focus on driving tangible results and addressing global challenges.

He further emphasised that on the relationship between India and Brazil and said that there is a "sheer interest" between the business communities and science communities.

While speaking with ANI, Nobrega said, "As I have mentioned, the last sentence of my speech tonight was 'these are indeed exciting times to be Ambassador of Brazil to India'. Why is that? In 12 months, 40 missions from Brazil business and official missions from Brazil and numerous missions also from India to Brazil have taken place. There is a sheer interest between our business communities and science communities to do things together."

He added, "Food security, agriculture, and defence are the key areas... These things are booming and that is why, I am so excited."

On being asked about the focus area for G20 under Brazil's Presidency, Nobrega said, "Our presidency to a considerable extent is a presidency that is a continuity of India's presidency in the sense that we have also developed activities and proposals that boost the legitimacy of G20..."

He added, "We launched, with the approval of the other G20 countries, task forces to fight poverty, hunger and to fight climate change. The idea is that the G2O should bring tangible results to people. I think political decisions and consensus are very important. G20 needs also to deliver things on the ground for the people. Another stunning result was this 'call for action' we approved in New York. This was the first-ever meeting of G20 foreign ministers within the United Nations headquarters.. G20 is becoming more and more important as a group that proposes solutions to the great challenges of humanity."

Notably, Brazil is holding the G20 presidency in 2024. The G20 Leaders' Summit is scheduled for November 18 and 19, 2024, in Rio de Janeiro, with the presence of the leaders of the 19 member countries, along with the African Union and the European Union.

The Brazilian Ambassador further spoke on the outcome of the US presidential elections and said that Brazil has "intense bilateral relations" with the US and that their government will work with Donald Trump. "US has a solid democracy for more than 200 years so we see democracy at work in the United States. Brazil has traditional, very intense bilateral relations with the US and we will work with President Trump. There is no doubt about this," Nobrega told ANI.

Earlier in the day, Nobrega, while giving a speech in New Delhi on the occasion of Brazil National Day, had said that the relations between Brazil and India have become even stronger and emphasised that both countries have developed strong bonds that are based on "common values, perceptions, and interests."

He said, "In 2024, Brazil-India relations have become even stronger. Traditional spheres of cooperation have converged with new ones. Such conversion shows that our long-standing friendship has been gaining in breadth and depth and in a challenging international environment, finding secure paths to social economic development requires new approaches to economic complementarities and, above all, mutual trust." ANI

Noting that mutual respect and trust, and win-win cooperation should always be the defining feature of China-Italy relations, Xi said the two sides should fully leverage the role of the China-Italy Government Committee and dialogue mechanisms in various fields, strengthen exchanges, consolidate mutual trust, continue to understand and support each other on issues of core interests and major concerns, and be strategic partners of mutual

support.

China-Italy cultural cooperation has yielded fruitful results and is full of vitality, Xi said. He urged the two sides to continue to strengthen people-topeople exchanges, implement the new round of cultural cooperation action plans, deepen cooperation on culture and art, cultural relics' protection, translation of classical works, tourism and education, and make cooperation on cultural heritage sites a new highlight



ing between Eastern and Western civilizations, as well as the progress of human civilization.

Mattarella said Italy firmly adheres to the one-China policy and always considers China as an important partner. Italy looks forward to working with China to take the opportunity of celebrating the 20th anniversary of the establishment of the comprehensive strategic partnership to strengthen cooperation in the fields of economy, trade, and science and technology, and push bilateral relations to a new height. Italy shares similar positions with China on many major issues. Both sides oppose protectionism, advocate mutual openness, and stand for strengthening constructive communication, solidarity and cooperation to jointly meet various challenges. Italy is willing to work closely with China in multilateral collaboration and contribute the wisdom of the two civilizations to promoting world peace and stability, Mattarella said.

Xi called on the two sides to support language teaching and youth exchanges, and remain cooperative partners helping each other to succeed. China is willing to import more quality Italian products, support mutual investment by enterprises of the two countries and continue to advance cooperation on science, technology, environmental protection, clean energy and aerospace, Xi said. Pentagon confirms lifting of ban on entry into Ukraine for US military contractors WASHINGTON

THE US Department of Defense (DoD) has confirmed the lifting of the ban on entry into Ukraine for American military contractors to repair and maintain the US-supplied equipment, with all possible risks related to the decision taken into account, a Pentagon representative said, responding to a TASS request.

"In order to help Ukraine repair and maintain military equipment provided by the US and its allies, DoD is soliciting bids for a small number of contractors who will help Ukraine maintain the assistance we've already provided. These contractors will be located far from the front lines and they will not be fighting Russian forces," he said, adding that "some of the equipment the US has provided Ukraine - or will provide Ukraine in the coming months - such as F-16s and Patriot air defense systems require specific technical expertise to maintain."

Australian businessmen see big opportunities at import expo

SEVEN years ago, Wei Li, an Australian businessman and the owner of Auswan, a wine brand, had some hesitation when he was invited to participate in the first China International Import Expo (CIIE).

"When global enterprises from various industries come together, there might be only a few purchasers interested in or knowledgeable about wine," he thought.

But the result surprised him. In 2019, the year after Li participated in the first CIIE, he sold about 7 million bottles of wine in the Chinese market, a great leap from the 4 million bottles in 2018. This made him a seven-time attendee of the expo.

In Li's first CIIE journey, he only met a dozen Australian enterprises. During the seventh CIIE, held from Nov. 5 to 10, his booth is set in the hustle and bustle of the Team Australia Pavilion, "It's packed with exhibitors and visitors, and sometimes I have trouble squeezing through," said Li.

Over 250 Australian enterprises attended this year's CIIE, hitting a historical high, according to the Australian Trade and Investment Commission (Austrade).

The Team Australia Pavilion gathered over 170 enterprises, showcasing various foods and beverages such as meat, seafood, wine and dairy products. From Nov. 4 to 6, Australian enterprises and their Chinese partners have jointly signed 25 memoranda of understandings, with a total value of nearly 300 million Australian dollars (about 199.53 million U.S. dollars), said the Austrade.

China has been Australia's largest trading partner, export market and import source for 15 consecutive years. In 2023, bilateral trade in goods increased by 4.1 percent year on year.

covering over 1,000 square meters. China is also the main importer of agricultural and mineral products from Australia. China's market is huge, and Chinese consumers now attach greater importance to clean, safe and healthy food, and this happens to be the competitive advantage of Australian enterprises, said Dominic Trindade, minister (commercial) at the Australian Embassy in Beijing.

> "For the Australian businesses, the CIIE is not only a chance to meet major Chinese buyers, but also a platform to know better about the changes in the Chinese market, learn from other companies in their industry, and build new cooperations," he said.

> A kind of dry red wine with its wrappers featuring "celebrating the upcoming Chinese zodiac Year of the Snake" under the Auswan brand debuted at the seventh CIIE, and Li's company also cooperated with a seafood enterprise to hold cuisine culture experience activities to better attract Chinese

consumers. Just steps away, Auswan's white wine can find its perfect finedining mate, a whole rock lobster from the cold and nutrient-rich rugged waters off Southern Australia.

The premium seafood was brought to Shanghai from the other side of the earth by Andrew Ferguson, a seasoned Australian fisherman and now a seafood processor and exporter.

This second-time CIIE participant is eager to try his luck again. "The amount of deals I reached during my first CIIE was a really impressive number," Ferguson said, with a smile.

Speaking with Xinhua, Ferguson noted that the Chinese market's appeal lies not only in its sheer size but also in its strong demand for seafood products. "No other place in the world has that sort of liking for seafood like the Chinese market. It's a great place for us to showcase our product," he said. Discussing his business prospects, Ferguson said his products are

already featured in five-star hotels and upscale restaurants, and he now plans to establish a retail pathway to bring them to supermarkets and, ultimately, more Chinese dining tables.

But what made the Australian businessman's CIIE story truly inspiring is that his rock lobster now serves as a testament to China's rock-solid commitment to further opening up its market. China's opening stance has also strengthened the confidence of CIIE veterans like mining giant Rio Tinto in the Chinese market.

Rio Tinto has brought more than ten high-quality mineral raw materials and other products to the expo, including iron ore, copper, aluminum, lithium, and borates from Australia, Canada, the United States, Mongolia, South Africa and Madagascar.

Meanwhile, this year, Rio Tinto achieved a new milestone in the Chinese market, with its cumulative iron ore supply to China reaching 4 billion tonnes

Over the years, the CIIE has had a profound and positive impact on global business and trade, fostering win-win collaboration and reshaping industry dynamics with innovative momentum for high-quality development across sectors, said Bold Baatar, Chief Commercial Officer of the company.

According to the senior executive, the event's success not only reflects China's commitment to driving reform and high-quality growth through greater openness but also highlights the importance of global partnerships in addressing shared challenges and exploring new opportunities.

"I feel immense pride whenever I think about how our raw materials have supported China in building advanced infrastructure and developing new quality productive forces, improving the lives of 1.4 billion people," he said. Xinhua

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Close to 70% of those killed in Gaza were children and women, says UN report

GENEVA

THE United Nations Human Rights Office on Friday published a report detailing the horrific reality that unfolded in Israel and Gaza since October 7, 2023 and asserted that justice must be served with respect to the "grave violations of international law."

In a statement, the UN Human Rights Office said that it has been verifying the personal details of those killed in Gaza by strikes, shelling and other conduct of hostilities.

"Of those fatalities, it has so far found close to 70 per cent to be children and women, indicating a systematic violation of the fundamental principles of international humanitarian law, including distinction and proportionality," it said.

It further said, "The continuation of these attacks, killing evenly across the population, demonstrates an apparent indifference to the death of civilians and the impact of the means and methods of warfare selected."

The most represented of verified fatalities are children. The three categories of age most represented were children aged from 5 to 9 years old, children from 10 to 14 years old, and babies and children from 0 to 4 years old.

Of the verified fatalities, about 80 per cent were killed in residential buildings or similar housing, out of which 44 per cent were children and 26 per cent were women.

Meanwhile, sharing a video message from Volker Turk, the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights, the UN Human Rights shared a video message on X and said, "My office is publishing a report today detailing the horrific reality that has unfolded for the people of Israel and Gaza. since October 7, 2023.

I have repeatedly warned about the risk of atrocity crimes being committed. Justice must be served for these grave

violations of international law."

He further spoke about the Israel Defence Forces (IDF) and said that their actions raise concerns owing to attacks

on hospitals as well as journalists. "The report raises concerns about the actions of the Israeli Defence Forces with respect to attacks on hospitals, and journalists.

It also points to the reported use of white phosphorus munitions. States have an obligation to act to prevent atrocity crimes, and I urge them to support the work of accountability mechanisms including the International Criminal Court; to exercise universal jurisdiction to investigate and try crimes under international law in national courts, and to comply with extradition requests."

Notably, Hamas launched a massive terror attack on Israel on October 7 last year, killing over 1200 people and holding over 250 as hostages. Around 100 of them are still in captivity, many are feared dead.

In response, Israel launched a strong counteroffensive targeting Hamas units in Gaza. The Israeli operation, however, has reportedly killed over 45,000 Palestinians in Gaza. The mounting civilian toll has raised global concerns and increased the call for a ceasefire. ANI

Chinese-funded bamboo project brings relief to flood-ravaged Kenyan communities

NAIROBI

FOR decades, Francis Mayobo's farm, located along the Nzoia River in western Kenya, was repeatedly inundated by floods that destroyed his crops and pushed him to the brink of poverty.

A retired public works official, Mayobo's farmland is near the river, which originates in Kenya's northwestern highlands and drains into Lake Victoria, Africa's largest freshwater body. Four years ago, Mayobo took a proactive step by planting hundreds of bamboo trees on his farm after learning about the tree's floodmitigating potential.

"I was motivated to venture into bamboo farming after training and research on how it could protect my farm from floods," Mayobo told Xinhua in a recent interview.

Today, the bamboo trees not only shield his farm from seasonal floods but have also rejuvenated the soil, allowing him to grow crops such as maize, legumes, bananas, and millet.

Mayobo is one of many smallholder farmers in western Kenya's flood-prone areas set to benefit from a bamboo agroforestry initiative funded by the Chinese Academy of Sciences through its Sino-Africa Joint Research Center. The project is implemented by the United Nations Environment Program's affiliated International Ecosystem Management Partnership (UNEP-IEMP), in collaboration with local partners. Dubbed "Ecosystem Restoration for Enhancing Livelihoods and Addressing Climate Change: China-Kenya Cooperation on Bamboo Technology Transfer," the project promises flood protection, income generation, and improved resilience for local farmers and fishermen.

Under this initiative, Mayobo and other farmers have received training on bamboo cultivation, helping them establish nurseries and secure seedlings for replanting in floodprone zones.

Samuel Juma Magoba, an elderly farmer involved in the project, has cultivated bamboo on his one-acre farm and found new income opportunities by selling bamboo for furniture. ornaments, utensils, and compost.

He recalled the severe flood damage he witnessed in his youth in his village near the Nzoia River basin -- a devastation that has no-

tably decreased since local farmers started planting bamboo along the riverbanks.

According to Dennis Otieno Ochuodho, a senior researcher at Jaramogi Oginga Odinga University of Science and Technology in Kenya, a project partner, the bamboo agroforestry project offers an effective, naturebased solution to climate-induced flooding.

Ochuodho said the project aims to expand research, training, and technology transfer in bamboo farming, restore the degraded Nzoia River basin, and enhance food security through mixed cropping systems.

A large-scale bamboo plantation, he added, will protect native species, serve as a carbon sink, and supply raw materials for herbal medicine, supplements, and roofing.

Despite her advanced age, Alice Makhulo's passion for cultivating bamboo on her seven-acre farm near a swamp remains undiminished, thanks to the economic and environmental benefits she has reaped from the trees. "Even my children and grandchildren appreciate the cool breeze from the mature bamboo trees. I have also been selling the bamboo stems to local furniture makers," Makhulo said.

As part of the China-funded bamboo

agroforestry initiative, more than 200 farmers will receive training in sustainable bamboo cultivation, which also includes a 25-hectare demonstration site to showcase ecological restoration through the planting of this iconic tree species.

Guoqin Wang, program manager at UNEP-IEMP, emphasized that by stabilizing the Nzoia River banks, the project not only curtails flooding but also enhances local livelihoods by combining food crops with bamboo and creating natural products for sale.

Leveraging Chinese bamboo technology and expertise, the initiative aims to regenerate degraded landscapes, conserve water sources, and improve climate resilience for river communities, Wang added.

Symprose Anyango, coordinator of Eco Green Kenya, a conservation lobby, noted that communities along the Nzoia River have embraced the project, particularly women, saying that "bamboo has in particular been of huge benefit to women who suffer most from climate change. They are using bamboo to revive traditional weaving and earn an additional income."

Austin also commented on progress made in other regions.

"Despite supporting and managing security assistance to Ukraine, and also [supporting] Israel's efforts to defend its sovereign territory, we've been able to maintain a focus on the Indo-Pacific

countries focused on providing security assistance to Ukraine," Austin said, referencing the alliance of more than 50 nations comprising the Ukraine Defence Contact Group.

Regarding the situation in the Middle East, Austin said that providing adequate humanitarian relief to Gaza remains a high priority, and that he had spoken earlier that day about that priority topic with Yoav Gallant, during his last days as Israel's defence minister, the statement added.

"Today, when I talked to [Gallant] for the final time in his position, I emphasized again how important [the humanitarian aid issue] is and thanked him for what he did to help us move things along," Austin said, adding that more progress on the issue needs to be made.

In terms of the overall situation in both Europe and the Middle East, Austin said he's glad those conflicts have stayed relatively contained, as per the statement.

"I think we've done a magnificent job there in terms of managing things and not allowing things to blossom into a full-blown regional war," the statement quoted him as saying.

When pressed on whether he has any concerns about how the new commander in chief will use the military once the new administration takes over in 2025, Austin said that he wouldn't speculate on such a topic, but that he has full faith in the military leadership.

"I will tell you that we have an incredibly professional group of leaders in the military, and they are absolutely focused on doing the right things to maintain the competitive edge in the battlespace," Austin said.

"These senior leaders will stay focused on the task at hand: defending this country, taking care of our troops [and] succeeding through teamwork," he added.

"This is what they're made of. This is what they do. I have 100% confidence in them going forward," Austin said.

GERMAN opposition parties and business groups on Thursday urged Chancellor Olaf Scholz to trigger a new election quickly to minimize political uncertainty after his rocky threeway coalition collapsed.

The coalition fell apart on Wednesday when years of tensions culminated in a row over how to plug a multi-billion-euro hole in the budget and revive Europe's largest economy, headed for its second year of contraction.

The break-up creates a leadership vacuum at the heart of the European Union just as it seeks a united response to Tuesday's election of Donald Trump as US president on issues ranging from possible new US trade tariffs to Russia's war in Ukraine and the future of the US-led NATO alliance.

The chancellor said he would hold a confidence vote in January, which he would probably lose, triggering a new election by the end of March - six months ahead of schedule.

Friedrich Merz, leader of the opposition conservatives, who are leading in nationwide polls, called for a vote of confidence "by the beginning of next week at the latest", in comments echoed by other opposition parties.

An election could take place in late January, he said.

"We simply cannot afford to have a government without a majority in Germany for several months now, followed by an election campaign for several more months and then possibly several weeks of coalition negotiations," Merz told reporters.

German industry, reeling from high costs and fierce Asian competition, also urged Scholz's government on Thursday to arrange an election as soon as possible. The uncertainty caused German borrowing costs to jump,

with the benchmark 10-year yield rising as much as 10 basis points to its highest since July. A key market gauge that signals debt risk as it falls dropped to its lowest on record.

Scholz delayed his departure for Thursday's European Union summit in Budapest due to the crisis at home and canceled his attendance at the next United Nations climate change summit. Scholz, of the center-left Social Democrats (SPD), said he had

fired his finance minister, Christian Lindner of the fiscally conservative Free Democrats (FDP), for obstructing a resolution of budget disputes.

The last straw was his opposition to Scholz's plan to ease debt limits in order to increase support for Ukraine in the 2025 budget by 3 billion euros (\$3.25 billion).

Lindner's dismissal led to the FDP quitting the coalition, leaving Scholz's SPD and the Greens

running a minority government and relying on cobbled-together majorities to pass any substantial measures in parliament.

A meeting between Scholz and Merz on Thursday failed to solve the impasse, a government source said.

Joerg Kukies, a top official in the chancellery and close SPD ally of Scholz, will be named finance minister.

The crisis comes at a critical juncture for Germany, with a flatlining economy, aging infrastructure and an unprepared military. It is likely to deal another blow to consumption and investment in coming months even as Trump's return threatens to dampen exports, economists said.

The FDP's exit is likely to spell the departure of the government's transatlantic coordinator, who has spent months cultivating ties with senior US Republicans in preparation for a possible Trump return to the White House.

But the crisis could also be a long-term blessing given the tensions that have plagued the coalition, the first of its kind at national level, said ING economist Carsten Brzeski.

"Elections and a new government could and should end the current paralysis of an entire country and offer new and clear policy guidance and certainty," he said.

Still the rise of both leftist and rightist populist parties in Germany, as elsewhere in Europe, means that even a new election might not easily enable a coherent coalition with a clear majority.

"You don't have to be a clairvoyant to deduce ... that things will not automatically become easier in the future, even after the next election," said Economy Minister Robert Habeck of the Greens.

TPLB reschedules matches to support players' recovery after FIFA break

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THE Tanzania Premier League Board (TPLB) has announced the postponement of two NBC Premier League matches originally scheduled for November 21.

The delay, according to TPLB, is to allow players ample recovery time following their return from international duty after the FIFA break.

The affected matches include Pamba Jiji vs. Simba SC at CCM Kirumba Stadium and Young Africans vs. Fountain Gate FC at Azam Complex. The league will resume on November 23 as scheduled, with regular fixtures resuming thereafter.

The FIFA international break, set to conclude on November 19, includes Tanzania's final AFCON qualifier against Guinea to be held at Benjamin Mkapa Stadium.

TPLB CEO Almas Kasongo clarified the rationale for rescheduling the matches involving Simba and Young Africans, emphasizing the need for player recovery.

"We've decided to postpone the matches scheduled for November 21 due to the AFCON qualifiers running from November 11-19," Kasongo explained.

"It's impractical to expect players to return and immediately play on November 21. As such, we've opted to push these matches back. Starting November 23, the league will proceed as planned."

Kasongo highlighted that CAF's recent decision to shift the AFCON qualifiers from November 10-18 to November 11-19, shortening the international window by three days, prompted the TPLB to adjust its schedule to ensure manageable player rosters.

"These adjustments provide clubs with additional time to regroup and prioritize player recovery," Kasongo noted.

In addition, Kasongo praised the NBC Premier League's progress, noting it now ranks sixth in Africa. He highlighted increased competition within the league, with mid-table teams challenging top-ranked clubs.

"This season, the league's competitiveness has notably increased. Last vear, several teams remained unbeaten after 10 games, but this season, 15 out of 16 teams have already experienced at least two defeats," he said.

Simba currently lead the league with 25 points, boasting an impressive goal difference of 21 goals scored and just three conceded.

Young Africans follow closely with 24 points, while Singida Black Stars and Azam FC sit third and fourth with 23 and 21 points, respectively.

The league has witnessed heightened competitiveness this season, with traditionally weaker teams displaying improvement.

As the season advances, the TPLB anticipates intensified battles for the championship, top-four spots, and relegation avoidance.

Simba's strong offense and defense have positioned them as front-runners, with Azam FC also displaying robust defensive stats.

In contrast, Namungo, Kagera Sugar, Pamba Jiji, and KenGold find themselves at the bottom, struggling to gain momentum.

Kasongo expressed optimism about the league's progress toward May, expecting even fiercer competition as teams vie for the top positions.

Kibwana Shomari seeks loan move amid limited playtime under Gamondi

IN a surprising turn at Young Africans SC (Yanga), right-back Kibwana Shomari has reportedly requested a loan move during the upcoming transfer window, opening mid-December and closing in January.

Shomari (pictured), once a prominent fixture in Young Africans' defensive lineup under former head coach Nasreddine Nabi, has struggled for game time since Miguel Gamondi took charge, leading to frustrations and a desire to play elsewhere.

Shomari initially thrived under Nabi, impressing in his role and enjoying significant playing time. However, this season has seen a shift.

With Ivorian defender Yao Kouassi assuming the starting right-back role, Shomari's opportunities have dwindled. Even after Kouassi sustained an injury, Gamondi opted to deploy winger Denis Nkane in defense, leaving Shomari on the bench. This decision underscores his relegated status within the squad and fuels his pursuit of a loan.

According to a source close to the player, Shomari has formally submitted a loan request to Young Africans' management.

"Yes, he's unhappy with his situation here. He's written a letter seeking a loan move in the coming window due to his limited playtime," said the insider. "He isn't just missing first-team action; he's struggling to make the squad at all, which has been difficult for him to accept."

The source further revealed that several clubs are reportedly interested in Shomari's services, with Kinondoni Municipal Council (KMC) and Singida Black Stars among those named.

Both teams could potentially provide the regular minutes that Shomari seeks, allowing him to maintain his fitness and form.

"KMC and Singida Black Stars are interested, but more teams may come forward once the window opens," the source added. "Kibwana wants a team where he can play regularly to enhance his skills.'

Under Gamondi, Shomari has not appeared in a single NBC Premier League match this season. Even in the recent fixture where Tabora United secured a 3-1 victory against Young Africans, Shomari was benched and did not see any minutes. This lack of action has likely influenced his decision to seek a move to reignite his career.

As Shomari explores his options, the club's management faces a decision on whether to grant his loan request or persuade him to remain.

While his dissatisfaction is clear, Young Africans' leadership might hesitate to release him, particularly if changes in the coaching staff occur.

Gamondi's position has been under scrutiny following mixed results this season, and potential changes in the coaching lineup could impact player retention strategies, especially for squad members like Shomari who might find renewed opportunities under new management.

Adding complexity to the situation is Shomari's recent contract extension. At the beginning of the season, he signed a two-year deal, binding him to Young Africans until 2026. Any loan or transfer move must align with the club's long-term plans, with management holding the final decision on whether to release him temporarily or retain him as a backup option.

Shomari, who joined Young Africans from Mtibwa Sugar, has shown his potential and professionalism in the past two seasons, adapting well to the demands of the club and earning praise from fans and teammates alike.

However, in his current role as a fringe player under Gamondi's system, his desire for regular playtime remains unfulfilled.

A loan move could allow him to rediscover his form, stay competitive, and potentially secure a stronger standing at Young Africans upon his return.

If approved, Shomari's loan transfer would provide valuable minutes and a chance to prove his worth in Tanzania's top-tier football scene.

For now, his future hinges on Young Africans' decision, which will determine whether he remains a part of Gamondi's roster or embarks on a new chapter with a loan spell at another club.

'After six titles, maybe another team deserves one' - reveals Guardiola

LONDON

MANCHESTER City manager Pep Guardiola says maybe another team deserves to win the Premier League after their sustained period of success.

The Blues have won six of the past seven Premier League titles, including four in a row, but have fallen five points behind leaders Liverpool following a 2-1 defeat by Brighton.

Guardiola has now lost four successive matches (excluding shootouts) for the first time in his 17vear managerial career, and this is City's first fourgame losing run for 18 years, since Stuart Pearce was manager.

In recent weeks, they have lost to Bournemouth and Brighton in the league, Tottenham in the Carabao Cup, and Sporting in the Champions League.

"We have to try and win games again," Guardiola told BBC Match of the Day. "Four [defeats] in a row. We have to change things quick.

"The schedule becomes tough but it [winning games] is going to happen when the players come back."

He added: "Maybe after seven years winning six Premier Leagues, maybe one year another team deserve it.'

City continue to be ravaged by injuries with Ruben Dias, John Stones, Jeremy Doku and Jack Grealish - despite his England call-up - all missing, alongside long-term absentees Rodri and Oscar Bobb.

Centre-backs Nathan Ake and Manuel Akanji were only fit enough for the bench, meaning Guardiola handed a first Premier League start to 19-year-old Jahmai Simpson-Pusey in defence.

Speaking to BBC Radio 5 Live, he said: "This is sport. Sport is not always sunrises. It is not always good moments.

Y the time of much Ameriса awoke to Donald Trump's victory in the 2024 presidential election on Wednesday, the president-elect had already received an enthusiastic message from his most powerful admirer in sports.

"Congratulations Mr President!" FIFA president Gianni Infantino wrote in an Instagram post replete with emoji. We will have a great FIFA World Cup and a great FIFA Club World Cup in the United States of America!"

Infantino concluded by tagging Trump, a man he has known since at least 2018 – and now, a man whose favor he'll need to curry.

*Trump's influence on FIFA's operations

World Cups require planning. Layers and layers of planning. FIFA, soccer's global governing body, owns and operates the event, but has long relied on local entities to shoulder expenses and logistical loads. In Russia, for example, Putin's government and the Russian Football Union jointly established a central organizing committee.

Oatar formed the Su-Delivery & Legacy, which hands-on, but it still commands the cooperation of "host committees" in each host city. Those committees, in turn, have been working with their governments – local, state and

federal – to secure funding and operational support. And that, of course, is where the U.S. president comes in. FIFA and the host committees have spent years cultivating re-

lationships within Congress and the Joe Biden administration. They've lobbied for federal assistance, particularly with security. FIFA even hired a head of government relations, Alex Sopko, straight from Biden's Office of Intergovernmental Affairs.

Now, they'll all have to build new relationships. Although some lower-level agency staffers will remain, Trump will appoint an entirely new cabinet and deputies. The change of administration, according to three people familiar with the World Cup process, could exacerbate organizational delays. It could interrupt or distract from ongoing conversations around security and visas

He presented Trump** with gifts and formed a chummy relationship. A few meetings later. at the 2020 World Economic Forum in Davos, Switzerland, Infantino heaped praise on Trump, who in turn lauded Infantino as a "great friend."

Four years later, this past May, they again communed at a Formula 1 race in Miami. In the interim, on the other hand, Infantino never managed to score a White House meeting with Biden.

FIFA was forced to navigate the bureaucracy. The lack of a centralized sports ministry or World Cup-focused entity became a pain point, according to people familiar with the planning. Some, sensing FIFA's surprise and frustration, have joked that "FIFA forgot how democracy worked."

Others expressed concerns related to policy. Trump, in addition to promising the "largest deportation operation in American history," has repeatedly called for a crackdown on immigration.

He has said he'll enact a "travel ban" that's "even bigger than before and much stronger than before," a reference to his first administration's heavy restrictions on travel from several predominantly Muslim countries.

Such a ban might compound worries that thousands of World Cup fans won't be allowed to enter the United States.

Consular officers already deny around 24% of applicants for B1/ B2 visitor visas, according to 2023 State Department data. And some applicants must wait more than a year simply to get an interview.

Under Trump, "I don't see this getting easier," Murphy said. "There's just not a good way, and a limited amount of time, to differentiate between the millions of people who are applying for a visa to come into the United States - for business reasons, for visiting family, or for the purposes of staying long term - and people who are just coming for the [World Cup].

"I have to assume," he continued, "that wait times will go up, that immigration restrictions will be tightened. And as such, the fans – that could continue to be an issue."

Others believe, however, that any negative impact will be counterbalanced by Trump's willingness to grant FIFA preferential treatment. In 2018, during the bidding phase, Trump sent three letters to Infantino. The third, as reported by The New York Times, promised an "open and festive" World Cup, "and that all eligible athletes, officials and fans from all countries around the world would be able to enter the United States without discrimination."

A few months later, Infantino told reporters in Washington that he was "not concerned or worried at all there would be any issue with any team or fans from any country. Iran will [probably] qualify. If they qualify, they will play, and their fans

The Blues dominated for much of the first half, having 67% possession and five shots on target to Brighton's zero.

But that flipped after the break to just one on target, to Brighton's four. City looked lethargic for large periods of the second half as Brighton substitutes Joao Pedro and Matt O'Riley scored to earn the win.

It was the first time City had lost a Premier League game having led at half-time since 2021.

Speaking on Match Of The Day, former City defender Micah Richards said: "The most defining thing for me is not pressing any more. They're going as individuals.

"When you lose the best midfielder in Europe [Rodri] you're always going to have a strain on the team. But they are just too easy to play through at this moment in time."

Guardiola added: "We are not able to do 90 minutes right now. We played a really good first half, but we were not able to sustain the rhythm in the second half.

"We lost again so [we will] clear our heads [in the] international break and hopefully our players come back fit."

In his news conference, Guardiola added: "When the players come back, I don't have any doubt that we will be back to our best."

City's run is tough after the break, with games against Tottenham, Liverpool, Nottingham Forest, Crystal Palace, Manchester United and Aston Villa before Christmas.

In 2020-21 it was Chelsea who led the Premier League at the same stage as Liverpool lead this time.

The gap on that occasion was just three points after 11 games, but Manchester City went on a run of 12 consecutive wins that saw them 13 points clear of the Blues

by the end of January. As the club's supporters often sing, "we fight til' the end".

SIMBA Sports Club head into the FIFA international break atop the NBC Premier League standings, boasting 25 points from 10 matches.

Under the guidance of South African head coach Fadlu Davids, Simba have achieved an impressive start to the season.

Now, Davids (pictured) is turning his attention to Simba's CAF Confederation Cup campaign, which kicks off later this month.

ANZANIA's interim head coach, Hemed 'Morocco' Suleiman, is optimistic about his team's preparation and readiness for the upcoming must-win Africa Cup of Nations (AFCON) qualifiers.

With two crucial matches approaching, the Taifa Stars are aiming for strong performances to keep their qualification hopes alive.

In a pre-training session, coach Morocco reviewed tactics and strategies with the squad, analyzing past performances to highlight both strengths and areas needing improvement.

Currently training at KMC Stadium, the Taifa Stars are focused and motivated, with experienced players like captain Mbwana Sa-

Tanzania needs positive results in both matches to advance.

"We currently have 18 local players in camp, and they arrived ahead of

schedule. Foreign-based players will join us over the weekend, after fulfilling club commitments," Morocco noted.

He expressed satisfaction with the team's initial training sessions, praising the players' motivation and commitment. Their positive attitude, he said, is a promising sign for the chal-

lenging matches ahead. The coach has carefully analyzed previous performances, identifying areas for improvement.

Despite good gameplay, Tanzania has struggled in key moments, missing out on potential wins and narrowly losing close matches, like the recent defeats to DR Congo.

"We need to focus on the small details that can make a big difference in the game's outcome," he emphasized.

Tanzania will use the 2025 qualifiers as preparation for co-hosting the 2027 AFCON finals alongside Kenya and Uganda, hoping to develop a stronger, more cohesive team by then.

Recent results have shown both potential and areas for growth: a goalless draw with Ethiopia, a surprising 2-1 away victory against Guinea, and narrow defeats to DR Congo.

With the final two rounds of qualifiers set for November 13-19, the remaining slots for AFCON 2025 will soon be decided.

This 35th edition of the tournament will take place from December 21, 2025, to January 18, 2026.

As seven teams have already secured qualification, Tanzania hopes to join them by securing their own ticket to Morocco.
