EAC commends IGAD bid for Sudan ceasefire

THE East African Community (EAC) has expressed fears over the ongoing conflict in Sudan, calling for an immediate cessation of hostilities between the warring parties to avoid further loss of life.

The EAC Secretariat said in a statement issued yesterday that the regional trading bloc strenuously seeks an amicable settlement through conflict resolution mechanisms at the regional, continental and international levels.

"The EAC stands in solidarity with the people of Sudan in the quest for peace," it said, noting that the conflict will intensify insecurity and instability, plus a ripple effect in the region and the continent at

"We appreciate efforts that have been made so far by the Inter-Governmental Authority on Development (IGAD), the African Union and the United Nations to resolve the conflict," it stated.

The main concern was that it is the most vulnerable segments of the Sudanese population - women and children - who will bear the brunt of the worsening conflict, it said, encouraging the two parties to exhaust diplomatic options in an effort to find a lasting solution to the bitterly divisive conflict.

Fighting between the army and a key paramilitary division in Khartoum in particular has killed around 200 people and wounded 1,800 as of late Monday, damaging hospitals and hampering aid

MPs demand axed input dealers stay out for fraud

REVOKED licences of 736 fertiliser importers, distributors and sales agents in the southern highlands regions will not be restored, the legislature resolved yesterday.

Speaker Dr Tulia Ackson issued the directive when responding to Iringa Urban MP Jesca Msambatavangu, who requested for guidance on whether the government was planning to restore their

The MP expressed concern that chances exist that embezzlers of public funds including deceitful subsidized fertiliser sales agents avoid being punished in accordance with the law.

The Agriculture ministry needs to hire other agents to be allocated in regions needing such services, she said, affirming that allocating alternative agents will enable farmers to receive agricultural

"We cannot let agents temper with subsidized fertiliser because the government has already paid for it. The government injected money in fertilisers with good intentions of relaxing final user prices," she added.

"Legal measures should be taken against them if they were proved to be involved in fraud. Their licenses should be revoked indefinitely for the benefits of farmers. Being deceitful means they are stealing from the government," the legislative chamber leader intoned, commending the ministry for revoking their licenses.

Although the measures may cause some impacts to farmers, it is important that fraudulent importers, distributors and sales are controlled, she emphasised, urging the ministry to seek alternatives to ensure farmers in areas facing TURN TO PAGE 2

Samia's specialist drive enrolls over 400 medics

OVER 400 medics have been enrolled in the wake of a super specialist programme initiated by President Samia Suluhu Hassan, MPs were told yesterday.

Health minister Ummy Mwalimu made this observation when responding to Emmanuel Mwakasaka (Tabora Urban) who wanted to know government plans to solve the shortage of medical specialists at the Kitete Referral Hospital in Tabora

Over 400 medics were sent to various training institutions inside and outside the country in a move to reduce the shortage of medical specialists in the country.

She said the government allocated 8bn/in the outgoing financial year to facilitate the programme and it intends to put up similar amounts for the training drive in

fiscal 2023/24. Following the recently announced vacancies for teachers and medical personnel, the government expects midyear to dispatch medical specialists at regional referral hospitals, she stated.

Some referral hospitals had extra specialists so the ministry was redistributing them as well as training others, even in foreign countries, to cover the deficit, she said.

Earlier when responding to the Tabora Urban MP, deputy minister Dr Godwin Mollel said that the referral hospital had five specialists, thus the government has taken six doctors outside the country for studies to reconcile the disparity.

Tanzania guns for ICT expertise from Estonia

A DELEGATION of the Tanzania Information and Communication Technologies Commission (ICTC) visiting Estonia for five days says that the country has a highly developed ICT infrastructure system from which Tanzania can gain heavily.

Dr Nkundwe Mwasaga (pictured), the director general and leader of the 11-man delegation said here yesterday that Estonia has colossal ICT knowledge and an advanced

e-infrastructure, of a highly competitive level.

Estonia is a small but rich country, with 45.100 sq. km of land, having made huge strides in ICT with appropriate infrastructure.

Tanzania can equally benefit from this knowledge and infrastructure, he said, explaining how the team will make the most of the study tour.

A memorandum of understanding (MoU) between Tanzania and Estonia signed between Estonian authorities and the delegation enables ICTC to collaborate with Estonia's e-Governance Academy and the Estonian Association of Information Technology and Telecommunications a voluntary organisation, whose primary objective is to unite the Estonian (ITL).

Rise in investments in health sector has seen govt offer quality services - official

THE government yesterday said that huge investment and improvement in the health sector including human resources enables it to offer quality healthcare services to achieve the intended goals.

Issa Mmbaga, coordinator of the human resources programme in the health sector from the Ministry of Health, said this when presenting a paper on the availability of human resources that was held in Dodoma.

The meeting involved experts the president's office, Regional Administration and Local

Government (PO-RALG), Ministry of Health, Ministry of finance and planning, President's Office (Public Service Management & Good Governance), Prime Minister's office-Policy, Parliament and coordination.

He said some of the improvements made in the past ten years were construction of new hospitals, medical supplies and renovation of infrastructure in the health

"Improvement of infrastructure has led to an increase in demand for health personnel, noting that the government plans to come up with

a strategy to ensure there is enough human resources to have a strong health sector and ability to offer quality Healthcare," he said.

Assistant director -Policy and Programme in the Prime Minister's Office Crispin Musiba, said that the recruitment of health practitioners and other experts in the health sector has increased to a large extent that majority of them are out of employment.

"We have today organised a meeting on how we can reduce the number of those who are not deployed, and accommodate them in employment. We have agreed on eight resolutions to be completed and submitted to the high level meeting within one month," he said.

Dr Ntuli Kapologwe, Director of Health Services, in the President 's Offices, Regional Administration and Local Government (PO-RALG) highlighted the need to have programme to increase community awareness about specializations and super specialization health services and

Dr Kapologwe said also to know different strategic researches that can help to know the number of human resources in the health sector.

"The development in the health sector cannot realized if we cannot conducted community awareness and come with strategic targeting to improve the cadre," he said

Vegetable, fruit transporters in Njombe advise government to improve infrastructure, storage

VEGETABLE and transporters in Njombe region have urged the government to improve infrastructure including roads and storage facilities so as to facilitate smooth transportation of the products.

The traders made the call here during the meeting organised by the Tanzania Shipping Corporation intergovernmental standing committee on shipping (ISCOS) and Tanzania Shippers' Council (TSC) to encourage transportation of the produce via air and water transport.

Zekomo Masanje, one of the traders, told this paper on the sidelines of the meeting that they are struggling to meet their goals on the businesses due to poor infrastructure and other various road barriers.

"A great challenge which we are facing here is transport barriers as well as special refrigerated containers to keep the vegetables and avocados, we are forced to take them from Nairobi and the expenses are high, we are calling on the government to work on this and put a good system which will facilitate the country," he said.

Sallu Johnsons, TSC executive secretary, said most of the harvests have been delayed to reach the port due to transport challenges from the farms.

Earlier. Njombe district commissioner Kissa Kasongwa said that the dry port which is expected to be constructed in Makambako town should also be capacitated with refrigerated containers so as to facilitate easy transportation of the veggies and fruits.

TASAC Ports, Shipping and Maritime Transport control director, Deogratius Mukasa said availability of the containers within the major objective of the meeting was to receive challenges and

recommendations from fruit and vegetable transporters so as to take needed measures to support the growth of the business. "We want to enable the transporters in the southern highlands zone who use port services to transport goods abroad to understand well on the best way to carry out their transport duties in a way that they can protect their interests in using transport services," Mukasa said.

Robert Soko, a representative from the Tanzania Ports Authority (TPA) said the authority has conducted major improvements in its ports so as to attract more traders and stimulate economic growth.

EAC commends IGAD bid for Sudan ceasefire

after three days of street to street

A weeks-long power struggle exploded into deadly violence Saturday between the allied forces obeying the head of the army on the one hand and head of the more intransigent paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) rejecting all meaningful measures leading to a restoration of democracy.

The army seized power anew nearly two years ago as army chief Abdel Fattah al-Burhan could not obtain sufficient support from the paramilitary division, whose feared field commander Mohamed Hamdan Daglo, known as Hemeti, wants to keep the status quo.

With the fighting in the capital of the chronically unstable country having airs of being prolonged, analysts doubt the staying power of the paramilitary division despite their sharper inclination to the conflict.

Terrified residents of the capital are spending their last savings and the approaching end of Ramadan risks being submerged by explosions and tank movements in the streets.

The army appeared to get an early upper hand and the paramilitary chief was quoted seeking international community intervention. Analysts believe the standoff will end as in the recent Tigray show of force lasting two years, until surrender.

Residents watch from their windows as tanks roll through the streets, buildings shake and smoke from fires triggered by the fighting hangs in the air, as air strikes, artillery and heavy gunfire punctuate the fighting and inn breaking the fast.

Those compelled to venture out face queues for bread and petrol at outlets that are not shuttered. Residents are also dealing with

power outages.

Govt: No plans to redraft Ugalla River National Park boundaries

THE government yesterday stated the commitment to conserve Ugalla River National Park, stating that there are no plans to redraft its boundaries.

Deputy minister for Natural Resources and Tourism, Mary Masanja told the National Assembly here that there are no plans to redraft the national park for it is important for national conservation.

She made the statement in response to a question raised by the Urambo MP, Magreth Sitta (CCM), who wanted to know if the government had plans to do so in order to give some pieces of land to area residents.

"When shall the government draw new boundaries at the Ugalla River National Park and give some land to residents who had been using it for beekeeping and livestock keeping?" asked the lawmaker.

In response, the deputy minister noted that the park was established through Conservation Act 282 that upgraded it to Conservation Park as published in the government notice (GN) number 936 of 2019.

The deputy minister explained that the park is of great importance but before upgrading, it serves as a bee keeping and fishing area.

She noted that the situation brought several challenges including deforestation that interfered with biodiversity and sources of water. "The government has no plans to interfere with the existing boundary of the Ugalla River National Park" said Masanja.

In 2021, Tanzania was floating as one of 'top' countries in terms of the number of national parks after two more were approved by the Parliament.

Kigosi and River Ugalla National Parks were formed after part of their game reserve areas were split to allow them to become what the government described as more productive.

The minister for Natural Resources and Tourism tabled resolutions to upgrade part of two game reserves into national parks, making Tanzania record a total of 24 national parks including two marine parks.

Government to execute road projects valued at 830bn/-, says minister

THE government will implement road projects worth 830bn/- in the coming financial year, the National Assembly heard yesterday.

The projects will be executed by Tanzania Rural and Urban Roads Agency (TARURA) across the country, said Deputy minister in the Prime Minister's Office, Regional Administration and Local Government (PMO-RALG) Deo Ndejembi in response to queries raised by Members of Parliament when contributing to the ministry's budget estimates for the 2023/2024 financial year.

He said "We are all witness that TARURA has done a great job in just one year; the government through the agency will construct more rural roads. Two years before, TARURA was getting a 257b/budget; thanks to President Samia Suluhu Hassan for increasing the budget for more that 800bn/-,"

Ndejembi said that funds for the road projects will be sourced within and outside the country. He ensured the legislators that the government will make sure the roads are constructed at recommended standards as well as ensuring value for money.

In her response, minister of State in the President's Office (Regional Administration and Local Government), Angela Kairuki said the government is working to empower TARURA with necessary equipment including vehicles.

She said the agency has a total of 282 vehicles, adding the shortage of 177 vehicles will be history in near future as more vehicles will be purchased in the coming year.

She said the ministry will consult the Treasury to ensure road funds are released on time.

Meanwhile, she said the government will give priority to graduates of 2015 in both education and health sectors. She said teachers and health workers volunteering at secondary schools will also be recruited in accordance with the set criteria.

"Recruitment of public servants in the health and education sectors will now consider their year of graduation. Priority will also be given to those applying to teach science subjects including chemistry, biology, physics, English and literature," said the minister.

She said the government is also preparing a special electronic system that will enable volunteering workers to register. She said the aim is to have a database that will include teachers and health workers volunteering in all districts countrywide.

According to her, lack of a proper registration system for volunteers has sometimes resulted in them being left behind when the government recruits new employees.

"We do not have a proper system to recognize and register them; with the new system we will not only recognise them; it will help other graduates to apply for the posts in their specific districts," said Kairuki.

Rural roads will take time to come to standard on this funding format

virtually unanimous in seeking higher budget allocations for the Tanzania Rural and Urban Roads Agency (TARURA), arguing that a greater capacity for the agency would enable it build a more modern a wider network of rural roads. All areas of the country want good transport networks urgently, and the idea is to increase budget allocations, to permit crop diversification, thus boosting economic growth. The idea is not at fault, but the method is not exactly exciting.

It is not clear whether the frequent appeals about private sector involvement in development projects is limited to setting out procurement notices and obtaining tender bids from private firms. The sums that the government allocates annually for the construction sector and especially for roads are fairly massive, at least for the total size of the budget. And indeed the latest overview of growth projection by the Bank of Tanzania was putting construction at the forefront, at 13 per cent level.

One of the wonders of post-World War II growth experiences was in Europe, and another in South East Asia or the Far East generally a generation later (for Japan a couple of decades after the war). Africa has been independent for 60 years in the least and no such growth experience has been seen, and South Africa or Nigeria, to to speak of Zimbabwe, appeared to be on high growth patch earlier and slid off later. Some rectification is being tried like we are doing, to rely on market systems.

Another aspect is that in history there is no single pole of growth that must always provide the 'pole

were vault' capacity, but an avoidable element is a competitive market environment. At the fiscal level, a big lesson of fast growth is the use of revolving credit that is repaid, quickly enough for others to be lent, not empowerment funds that are unlikely to be repaid. Infrastructure is another area, where government can set costing formats for all sorts of roads and private firms build and maintain them.

> When a country has accepted an individualist rather than collective organisation of economy, an investor will be sure that he will be paid his rent permanently, for building and maintaining the road, and he makes sure it is not damaged. Elected councils, when they are put in charge, ensure that the roads are decrepit, so that they elbow their way via Parliament or other organ to get large amounts of money allocated. They invite tender bids, allocate to friends, overstate costs, and soon the roads are ruined. They will remain that way for new bundles of cash to be paid out.

A Special Seats MP said in the debate that the 800bn/- allocation for TARURA is not enough as most rural roads are in a poor state. Definitely that is true, but if that amount was placed in the central bank and commercial banks issue loans for road construction by private firms, using that sum to back up own assets, it would surely suffice. The roads would all be built rapidly and maintained instead of annual allocations and permanent bad roads to get more money disbursed. Child marriage is always a human rights violation

to freely choose their partners, some of whom are more than a decade older than them. Girls are often taken out of school to do household work and raise children. Child brides are more likely to report experiencing abuse at the hands of their partners or in-laws. In the worst cases, child brides are sold into sex trafficking by their husbands or abused to the point of

child marriage means addressing the issue at governmental, community, and individual levels. Child, early, and forced marriage is a form of genderbased violence which can also harm agricultural productivity. Yet this connection between child marriage and agricultural productivity is not often discussed.

Child marriage is a global challenge that impedes our progress across all sectors of society, including agriculture. Seven hundred and twenty million women alive today were married before their 18th birthday, and each year, 12 million additional girls are married before they turn 18 years old. That's the equivalent of 23 girls every minute or nearly one every two seconds. Furthermore, girls in rural communities tend to marry or enter into union at twice the rate of girls in urban communities.

Child marriage is fueled by many complex and localised factors: poverty, lack of education, tradition, insecurity, and lack of positive coping mechanisms to shocks and stressors. Gender inequality and a devaluation of girls and women underlie all factors that contribute to the practice of child marriage. In some cases, families genuinely

ANY girls are unable believe they are protecting their daughter by making her marry young. In other cases, girls are treated as a commodity or as a burden. In times of crisis, girls are seen as a drain on a family's scarce resources and best married in return for a dowry in countries where dowry is practiced. In countries facing drought, there have been spikes in the rate of child marriage.

> Child brides can face a lifetime of challenges from marrying at such a young age. They are more likely to become pregnant before their bodies are fully developed. Ninety per cent of adolescent births in the developing world are to girls who are married or in a union. This contributes to high fertility rates and places a higher care burden on girls who, because of their age, lack the financial, physical, and informational resources, and the agency to adequately care for their growing family. Pregnancy and childbirth complications are the leading cause of death among 15 to 19-year-old girls globally. Girls who marry before the age of 15 are almost 50 per cent more likely to have experienced physical or sexual violence from a partner than girls who marry after 18. In addition, child marriage typically ends a girl's formal education. Girls' new role as a wife and potentially as a mother often brings expectations that she will stay at home to take care of the home and family, and in rural communities, child brides are expected to leave school to cultivate land and collect natural resources.

While agriculture and specific crops can be highly gendered, in general, women are heavily involved in cultivating, harvesting, and processing food and bringing it


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KDF versus police: Supremacy wars derailing banditry security operation

RESIDENT Ruto's determination to end banditry is being frustrated by lack of unity and supremacy wars within the multi-agency security team deployed for the joint operation.

The lack of a unified action plan is being blamed for the circus that has become the fight against banditry in an operation that the government launched in February in Baringo, Samburu, Laikipia, Turkana, West Pokot and Elgeyo Marakwet counties.

The forces deployed include formations in the military and the National Police Service. Bandits, however, continue to strike, steal livestock and kill civilians.

"How do you pick a police officer to be an operation commander where the KDF [Kenya Defence Forces] is actively engaged? It will be an outright flop since the soldiers won't recognise [the police officer]," a military officer told Nation.

"We have been deployed from several units that trained individually and for different tasks. How are we supposed to fight together?"

The soldier said that, besides the military, there are officers from the General Service Unit (GSU), Rapid Deployment Unit (RDU), Special Operations Group (SOG), the Special Recce Team (SRT), Anti Stock Theft Unit (ASTU), Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI) and the Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT). There are feelings that the operation is overloaded with assets with fragmented command centres and none trusts intelligence gathered outside its formation.


While the military is known for its incompatibility with other security assets, the Administration Police has a structural rivalry with the regular police, igniting a war of egos.

Further, a culture of greed that seeks to monetise all opportunities for personal gain has been claimed to permeate security organs, with some officers cutting deals with bandits.

Nation was told that all these units gather their own intelligence and do not share, while information from the National Intelligence Service (NIS) is treated as unverified as per consumption needs.

"The problem is that we as junior officers cannot openly tell him what they are getting wrong," he said.

He added that "words of immense wisdom were uttered by former Rift Valley Regional Commissioner George Natembeya (now the Trans Nzoia governor) on February 12 this year in front of the President to the effect that all was not well and more needed to be done as groundwork before the real operation commenced".

Kandara police boss Michael Mwaura, who has served in Turkana, said "there are certain [elements of] intelligence that banditry reports lack and that is where the war is being lost".

the raids are coated with a lot of propaganda and falsehoods," Mwaura told Nation, a ding that there are people who would wish the country to believe that there are security officers involved in the banditry menace.

"But even the number of herds stolen is usually exaggerated," he said, for propaganda purposes. "The highest real figure I came across was that of 300 goats stolen."

About guns used in the raids, Mwaura said "in some communities, guns are like farm implements where even the kids know how to use them".

Security officers now believe the advice that Natembeya gave in good faith was ignored.

"You tell these teams that the bandits are holed up here and give the exact coordinates only for them to bomb the opposite direction because bandits already know of the strategies," Natembeya said.

His words were corroborated by our sources, who intimated that the only way out is for security formations to work together.

"Let them share out these problematic counties-including those affected by terrorism-among the different formations. That will give clarity of command and accountability," said one of the senior officers.

"Give Pokot to GSU, Baringo to RDU, Turkana to BPU and so on. This will breed competition to emerge the best unit," he said.

"Let them compete in addressing cattle rustlers, terrorism, highway bandits, crop thefts, cyber crimes, name it. That is when the country will know real reprieve".

These revelations come in the wake of a March 2, 2023 report "While I was there, I learnt that by the Armed Conflict Location and Event Data that says the country faced instability owing to heightened activities of pastoralist militia in 2022.

"The Kerio Valley region – which includes West Pokot, Baringo, and Elgeyo Marakwet, plus neighbouring Turkana and Laikipia counties - and the northeastern counties of Isiolo, Samburu, and Marsabit, among other arid and semi-arid lands, are the areas worst affected," it reads in part.

The report says the regions have suffered from increasing intercommunal violence involving pastoralist militias in the past year and continue to experience sustained tensions.

"Besides drought that breeds competition over access to limited pasture and water, we have the proliferation of small arms smuggled from neighbouring countries such as Ethiopia, South Sudan, and Somalia as the drivers of violence," it says.

The report says it recorded 170 incidents involving pastoralist militias in 2022 alone, representing a 139 per cent increase compared to the previous year.

"At least 193 reported fatalities were recorded, with civilian deaths constituting the majority of overall reported cases. Baringo had the highest number of civilian fatalities in 2022 at 27, followed by Elgeyo Marakwet and Isiolo, each with 23," the report said.

It added that Pokot ethnic militias alone were involved in almost 60 per cent of the banditry incidents where 70 per cent of the violence was meted out on civilians and the remaining to clashes with security agencies.

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flicts and soaring food prices have led to a steep rise in hunger in countries across the world.

The conflict in Ukraine-Russia conflict has sent global food prices skyrocketing. As we know, these two countries supply wheat, sunflower oil, barley, maize and fertilizers. But on-going conflict means very little will be available.

So, conflict is still the biggest driver of hunger, with 70 per cent of the world's hungry people living in areas afflicted by war and violence, according to the UN World Food Programme. Not only Ukraine and Russia conflict, but also Mali, eastern DRC, Syria, Yemen, Mozam-

bique and other conflict-hit coun-

Conflicts destroy livelihoods and force families to flee their homes, leaving countless others facing hunger. Studies estimate that over 14 million people in the central Sahel countries of Mali, Burkina Faso and Niger are in need of urgent humanitarian assistance.

Also, studies show that climate change has contributed to the food crisis by changing weather patterns such as rainfall, increased climatic shocks such as floods, droughts, cyclones and hurricanes which all have an impact on harvests.

Drought is nothing new but and flooding.

due to global warming nowadays, less rainfall and quite uncertain rainfalls create different kinds of droughts including the prolonged ones. Droughts which affect agriculture and food security have become more frequent and more severe in recent years in different countries.

COVID -19 also caused a sharp rise in poverty and inequality globally as lockdowns devastated family livelihoods. In many countries, pandemic restrictions also meant disruption to food supplies and steep rises in food prices which created immense strain on household budgets with the poorest families hardest hit.

Economic instability has impacted access to food for many people. Even if the food is available, for many people it is too expensive to buy hence reducing people's access to it. During the pandemic, many people lost their income hence inability to purchase food.

Various studies name South Sudan as the country most affected by hunger where at least 7.2 million people–approximately 60 per cent of the population—are in a food crisis. South Sudan also faces multiple humanitarian crises with the country affected by years of tribal conflicts and a vicious cycle of drought

Experts say that in the Horn of Africa, countries like Ethiopia, Somalia and Kenya struggle for food and clean water. The Horn of Africa has failed 4 consecutive rainy seasons which means the region is facing the worst drought in 40 years. Niger and Mali are also facing the worst humanitarian crisis in over a

Yet, over a third of all food produced (2.5 billion tonnes) is lost or wasted each year. One third of this occurs in the food production stage, studies show.

So, think twice before throwing food away. Also, we have to cook and consume food according to our needs, namely the right quantity. If by chance you make extra, don't throw away your leftovers. Instead, plan to use the leftovers.

We can't afford to wait until more countries reach emergency levels of food insecurity. There shouldn't be any delay; it's time to act now. Governments and donors should contribute to supply funding for food and nutrition as well as other livelihood support.

But most importantly, let's resolve wars and conflicts peacefully to ease the global food crisis. If we choose to reverse this dire situation, we can do it. Can't we?

'I Am The State': Transition from fear to open criticism of excesses

AST Friday, a momentous happening took place in Dar es Salaam which will undoubtedly secure a permanent place in the history of post-independence Tanzania. For the first time, a book which vividly recounts excesses of a president was launched, albeit posthumously.

'I AM THE STATE: A President's Whisper from Chato' is a joint effort by seasoned Tanzanian journalists Ansbert Ngurumo, Jesse Kwayu, Neville Meena and Absalom Kibanda. It opens the lid on how President John Magufuli threw the country into darkness by muzzling the media, thereafter embarking on mismanagement of state resources at will.

With the watchdog rendered toothless and voiceless, favouritism, cronyism, nepotism, regionalism and patronage took centre stage. Additionally, propaganda-induced nationalist sentiments ruled, falsely portraying the president as a man of the people on one hand and running the government a one-manshow affair on the other.

Consequently, public procurement procedures became useless, contractors were single sourced, expert opinion was cooked, political candidates were hand-picked, Parliament became prac-

tically one party and the president became the law. Trillions of shillings were mismanaged and no one could raise a finger to question.

Authors of this tell-it-

all book about Magufuli presidency settled for an interesting title, borrowed from the one and only Louis-Dieudonné. Known simply as Louis XIV or Louis le Grand (Louis the Great), it was this King of France from 1643 until his death in 1715 who famously said L'État, c'est moi (I am the state) in

Louis XIV presided over 'Un roi, une loi, une foi' mentality, meaning 'One king, One law, One faith' style of leadership. When these four senior scribes thought of a leader whose style resembles Magufuli's, they settled for this Frenchman.

"He wanted his people to fear him to prevent uprisings or conflicts. In order to deliver the notion that he was truly the 'one' king in the land, he named himself the 'Sun' king. This was because the people can see the sun every day, bestowing its beauty and happy glitter across the world," reads the king's biography on Wikiversity.

Bishop Dr Benson Bagonza of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania Karagwe Diocese was the guest of honour at the book launch. He said that one of the key

lessons picked from the book is having a constitution that gives powers to institutions and citizens to hold their leaders to account.

He asserted that the book will trigger public debate on the misuse of public funds, the true definition of a patriot and patriotism and separation of powers between the executive, the judiciary and the legislature.

"I would like to urge the present government to invest in the line of governance so that leaders' deeds are excesses was never left challenged or praised alone. One example is that when they are in office of Controller and Auditor rather gagging opponents. Neither the leaders nor the government will last forever. Governments are supposed to rule in the interest of their people," he said.

Sheikh Ponda Issa Ponda, a Muslim cleric and a human rights defender, said that the book should be an eye-opener in stimulating the struggle for a new constitution that forbids impunity, favoritism and regionalism in leadership.

"We had reached a stage where the country was paralyzed at the president's wish. His words became the land's laws and were fully enforced no matter the implications. We need to set mechanisms that compel leaders to govern according to the

"The book reveals how public funds were misused during Magufuli's regime. He used to allocate public funds elsewhere even without the parliament's approval; as a result, the misuse of such funds was nobody's business. This may lead to a situation where taxpayers question why they should pay taxes," said Chadema man Mbowe.

Lest we forget that anybody, including constitutional office holders, who challenged Magufuli's General (CAG) Prof Mussa Assad who he unceremoniously removed from office in 2019 for simply doing his job diligently.

In December last year, the High Court ruled that the removal was unconstitutional, granting an application filed in 2019 by opposition politician Zitto Kabwe. The court held that the removal offended Articles 26 (1) and 144 (1) of the constitution.

Fast forward to March 2023 and Assad's predecessor CAG Charles Kichere unveils 2021/22 government audit report which shows massive flaws, with huge sums of money meant for development projects misused by public office holders.

However, Magufuli's successor, President Samia Suluhu Hassan, acted differently. Instead of

condemning the CAG or scheming to remove him, she turns to weak areas in management of public finances. The president directed major reforms in the collection and management of public funds, as well as classification and operations of some state-owned entities to

prevent the loss of taxpay-

only talk, she acted and heads rolled. Yes, she dissolved the board of directors of loss-making Tanzania Railways Corporation (TRC) and sacked the Director General of Tanzania Government Flights Agency (TGFA) John Nzulule.

And come April 2023, President Samia did not journalist, religious leaders, political analysts and activists converge at a hotel in Dar es Salaam for the launch of a book which dwells on excesses of a former president.



El Salvador still lacks policies to bolster food security

ITTING under the shade of a tree, Salvadoran farmer Martín Pineda looked desperate, and perhaps angry, as he said that governments of different stripes have come and gone in El Salvador while agriculture remains in the dumps.

"I think this shows contempt for farmers," Pineda told IPS, frowning.

Pineda is in charge of a four-hectare community farm worked by 12 families near San José Villanueva, in the department of La Libertad in the south of El Salvador.

Pineda's hopelessness turned into concern when he commented on the risks that the agricultural sector faces from climatic phenomena that hit crops almost every year.

This risk increases when considering reports that the El Niño Southern Oscillation (Enso) climate phenomenon is expected to appear in 2023, which would mean new droughts and loss of crops.

"Last year we lost a good part of the bean crop," said Pineda, 70. He explained that of the four hectares they plant they lost 2.7 hectares, and the same thing happened with the corn.

In October 2022, Tropical Storm Julia devastated 8,000 hectares of corn and bean crops in the country, leading to losses of around 17 million dol-

The backdrop is the rise in the cost of inputs for production, due to international factors, such as Russia's war with Ukraine. In addition, in El Salvador there have been unjustified price increases because just three companies monopolize the import market for the inputs required by farmers, adding to their difficulties.

The United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) warned in a report published in 2023 that in 2020, factors such as the COVID-19 pandemic, climatic phenomena, and structural aspects like poverty and violence, exposed the Salvadoran population to even great-

The FAO report said that since 36 percent of vulnerable Salvadorans depend on agriculture for

a living, "it is essential to provide affected households with the necessary means to rehabilitate their productive assets and resume production activities."

However, this course is not being followed in the agricultural sector.

According to official figures, in this small Central American country of 6.7 million people, 22.8 percent of households are living in poverty, a proportion that rises to 24.8 percent in rural areas, of which 5.2 percent are in extreme poverty and 19.6 percent in relative pov-

Agriculture is not recovering

El Salvador has failed to iumpstart its agricultural sector for at least three decades. It is one of the most deficient nations in several categories of food, such as vegetables.

It is estimated that the production of vegetables in El Salvador barely covers 10 percent of domestic demand, while the remaining 90 percent are imported from neighboring countries, such as Guatemala.

But what is most worrying is that the country is also deficient in Central American staples such as corn and beans, although the shortfall occurs especially when climatic events hit hard, whether excess or lack of rain.

When that happens, El Salvador must import beans from neighboring countries, such as Nicaragua, although if those nations face drops in production, this country must look for them elsewhere and at higher prices.

For example, in 2015 El Salvador had to import around 1.5 million kg of beans from Ethiopia.

"It is sad that we have to import beans, when we have the capacity to produce them, if we just had government support," Pineda complained.

He said that over the last 30 years, neither leftwing nor right-wing governments have had the political will to provide agriculture with decisive support, and that it appears that the focus is on promoting imports.

"There is no well-defined government policy," said Pineda. "For example, we have the land, but we do not have the inputs,

or ongoing technical advice."

He was talking about the lack of a clear policy in the last 30 years, including the four governments, between 1989 and 2009, of the right-wing Nationalist Republican Alliance (ARENA), the two administrations of the ex-guerrilla Farabundo Martí National Liberation Front (FMLN), from 2009 to 2019, and the almost four years of the administration of Nayib Bukele, in office since June 2019.

"This government has followed the same pattern, of not showing strong support," he argued.

To illustrate, the farmer pointed to the need for an irrigation system on the San José Villanueva farm, which would not be difficult to achieve, since there is a river nearby with sufficient flow.

But when the farm has requested technical support for an irrigation system, it has consistently received the same negative response from governments.

"We have no machinery here, no irrigation system, although we have a river nearby," said Pineda. "We have two wells, but at this time of year they dry up, and we have to buy water."

"How can we produce food efficiently in these conditions?" he asked.

Bukele follows the same blueprint

Academics agree that the collapse of the agricultural sector was influenced by the 1980-1992 civil war, which left some 75,000 dead and 8,000 disappeared.

But that doesn't explain everything.

Neighboring countries, such as Guatemala and Nicaragua, also suffered civil wars, and are more self-sufficient in food production.

When the ARENA neoliberal party took power in El Salvador in 1989, the agriculture sector was abandoned by policy-makers. This was accentuated in

the second ARENA administration (1994-1999), when the growth of the textile maquilas or export assembly plants was bolstered as a source of employment, and the government focused even less on development in the countryside.

Decades later, the country still hasn't found a clear direction for getting

agriculture on track, Luis Treminio, president of the Salvadoran Chamber of Small and Medium Agricultural Producers, told

The chamber is made up of 15 agricultural organizations and in total brings together some 15,000 farmers. An estimated 400,000 people in the country are dedicated to agriculture.

Treminio said that a plan promoted by the Bukele government to reactivate the agricultural sector, announced with great fanfare in June 2021, did not come to fruition because the 1.2 billion dollars in funding needed was not found in the international financial market.

This due to a lack of confidence on the part of the multilateral lenders, he added.

Treminio said the government lacks vision and priorities, since national income is allocated to unfeasible projects, such as the millions of dollars spent to buy bitcoins, which have been legal tender in El Salvador since September 2021.

"The problem is that the government does not prioritize food sovereignty," he said, but instead focuses on food security - that is, providing food regardless of whether the country produces it or not, and much of which is actually imported.

One illustration of the government's chaotic agricultural policy is the fact

that there have already been four ministers of agriculture, in less than four years of government.

Treminio said El Salvador's farmers are not opposed to imports, but argued that they must complement what the country does not produce.

"We are not against imports, but they have to be regulated," he added.

He said that what often happens is that, under the justification of shortages of grains or other products, more is imported than what is actually needed to cover national demand, driving prices way down for local farm-

"For example, in dairy there is a 40 percent deficit in consumption, and 120 percent imports are authorized," he said.

Growing food in the

Given the scarcity and high costs of food, small initiatives have begun to emerge to promote gardens, even in urban areas, taking advantage of all available spaces.

One of these efforts, which are new in the country, is fostered by Micelio Suburbano, a group made up of a dozen young people and adolescents who are trying to show that part of the food consumption can be met by growing vegetables and fruit in open spaces in urban areas.

"It's kind of a utopia to think that in our homes we can grow our own crops of aromatic herbs, tomatoes, etc.," Nuria Mejía, an architect by profession with a passion for spreading the idea of urban agriculture, told IPS.

The group set up its first garden in 2022 in a working-class area of apartment buildings known as Zacamil, on the north side of San Salvador.

In small spaces that were once green areas in the apartment complex, they have planted three gardens, where they grow on a small scale tomatoes, radishes, eggplant and various kinds of aromatic herbs.

The aim is for people to see what can be achieved and to get involved.

"People see the radishes we are growing and ask us for seeds," Mejía said.

The organisation provides humanitarian support across the country including drilling of water boreholes, services to orphanage centres and running primary and secondary schools that are fully supported.

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Ilemela District residents get over 570 title deeds

THE Ministry of Land, Housing and Human Settlements Development has issued over 570 title deeds to citizens in Ilemela district, Mwanza region as part of efforts to prevent conflicts and stimulate economic development.

Minister Angelina Mabula called on those who have received the title deeds to use them well and also pay taxes on time.

Mabula also reminded all land owners who haven't paid taxes to ensure that they clear their debt arrears before April 30, as announced by the government.

"Those who are yet to get title deeds for their plots have to do so to ensure that they own the land legally, this will help you avoid unnecessary conflicts," she said.

She said that many residents were aware of the importance of having such documents urging them not to put the documents in the cupboards but rather use them to boost their businesses.

"The documents are very vital, as through them, the owners (residents) can access loans as well as do the basics, but before going to borrow make sure you sit down, evaluate and plan on how to spend the funds for development," she said.

Ilemela district commissioner Hassan Masala commended the citizens for having their land formalised, something which will stimulate economic development in the area.

Some of the residents urged the government to invest in land formalisation programmes so as to help address various challenges that arise due to having the coun-

try's land unformalised. "This exercise is very good, it helps a lot to prevent conflicts, we are happy to get the title deeds and we urge the government to reach all areas of the country," said Moses Simon, a resident at Kilimahewa.

EW research by the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) has revealed that almost half the world's population of around eight billion people belong to households whose livelihoods depend to some degree on agrifood systems

The findings are important as farming and the food system as a whole is central to the multiple challenges humankind faces to feed a global population forecast to rise to 10 billion by 2050, while meeting the Sustainable Development Goals to end poverty, hunger and malnutrition, combat the climate crisis and preserve natural resources for future generations.

So the research offers precious information for decision makers, and FAO is aiming for it to be the start of an ongoing statistical data

The report said that around 1.23 billion people worked in agrifood systems in 2019, including 857 million in primary agricultural production (agriculture, livestock, forestry, fishing, aquaculture, hunting) and 375 million in the off-farm segments of agrifood systems.

The 1.23 billion people working in agrifood systems belong to households made up of an estimated 3.83 billion people.

FAO says there is evidence of a high degree of exploitation of labour in agrifood systems, includ-

The new report said that the continent with the largest number of people employed in agrifood systems is Asia with 793 million, followed by Africa with almost 290 million

It said the majority of the economically active population in low-income countries, particularly in Africa, had at least one job or activity in agrifood systems.

It said that 62% employment in Africa is in AFS, when relevant trade and transportation activities are included, compared to 40% in Asia and 23% in the Americas.

The study said that, of the 3.83 billion people belonging to households reliant on agrifood systems for their livelihoods, 2.36 billion live in Asia and 940 million are in Africa.

The study is the first to give a systematic, documented global estimate of the number of people involved in AFS.

It said the number of people engaged in the sector has been undercounted in the past due to three factors.

The first is that many people, especially those living in poverty, work several jobs and lots are involved in AFS, even if this is not their primary

AFS jobs are seasonal or intermittent and so easily missed by surveys.

Finally, many people are engaged in household farming for their own consumption on top of their primary occupation.

The report gives the example of a full-time schoolteacher who grows produce for sale on their

Agrifood systems produce some 11 billion tonnes of food worldwide each year, the FAO says.

But they also have a big environmental footprint.


The IPCC's recent Synthesis Report, which completed its Sixth Assessment cycle, said that 22% of global greenhouse gas emissions currently stem from agriculture, forestry, and land use.

Without radical change, the world is set for a future of persistent food insecurity and the destruction and degradation of natural resources.

Building sustainable, resilient agrifood systems, on the other hand, can help tackle the climate crisis, biodiversity loss and food insecurity.

JKT ventures into cultivation of oil palms, sunflower

THE National Service (JKT) has embarked on oil palm and sunflower farming in Dodoma region to bridge the gap of cooking oil shortages.

It has so far cultivated a total of 700 acres of sunflower oil seeds in Kongwa district as well as in Chenene village in Chamwino district, Dodoma region.

The National Service (JKT) Head of Administration, Brigadier General Hassan Mabena, who doubles as the JKT chairperson of strategic committee on agriculture, livestock and fisheries development, said they have decided to venture into the vital project so as to supplement several efforts being executed by the government to overcome shortage of cooking oil.

Speaking yesterday during a special tour of the JKT's Chenene seed farm, Bri Gen Mabena observed that the country's edible oil demand was standing at 650,000 metric tons (MT) in a year while the country's current production capacity was only at 200,000 MT.

"We, JKT support others efforts implemented by the government, through diverse agricultural institutions to assure the country produces enough sunflower oil seeds as well as oil palm, the vital crops for the production of edible oil," he expressed.

He informed that JKT was very determined and would stand at forefront to work round the clock in co-operation with the Tanzania Agricultural Research Institute (TARI) to produce improved seeds varieties for sunflower and oil palm in order to enable the farmers in the relevant sector to improve production and produc-

Brigadier Gen Mabena expressed that JKT has planted at least 800 acres of oil palm its Bu-

On his side, the Director of strategic committee on agriculture, livestock and fisheries development at IKT, Colonel Peter Rushika, unveiled that after being certified by the Tanzania Official Seeds Certification Institute (TOSCI), the seeds that are being produced will be marketed to the farmers at affordable prices.

"As a pilot project, we have successfully managed to produce the seeds at acreage of 700, but we envision keeping on expanding production for both sunflower and oil palm," he detailed.

Speaking earlier, Acting Commandant 834 Makutupora JKT Camp, Major James Macheta said they have cultivated a total of 590 acres of sunflower oil seeds at the areas, out of the 1000 acres earmarked for the production of the vital oil -producing crop at the

"We started to implement this project in October, last year by clearing a total of 500 acres, the work which was done by our volunteer youths and we're looking forward to cultivating the crop at the whole1000 acres in the next growing season," he informed.

able in the ocean. We as Tanga city council in collaboration with Fondation Botnar jointly organized our ideas and came up with this initiative whereby you will be getting free of charge training and offered capital," she stated.

She further explained that women are also included as the initiative beneficiaries of the programme, because when empowered, they can fully participate in aquaculture activities like growing seaweeds or taking harvested fishes to add value and expanding wider marketplaces

For the side of agriculture production, she noted as Tanga City council allocated about 200 acres for youths who previously got training offered by Fondation Botnar to embark on such agricultural activi-

For his side Tanga city mayor, Abdulrahman Shillow asked the selected youths in the training to take the training as their starting point towards their economic achievements.

"Take your little time to think, you are being offered free training and given money free of charge; it is up to you! whether to delay or hurrying up to growing economically.

On his side, Tanga Yetu Initiative projects coordinator Omari Ally Mohamed explained the objective of the training is to bring together youths, women and giving them awareness on how to generate their daily incomes and being able to get loans from various financial institutions to develop their capitals.

Earlier, Botnar Fondation Tanga region representative, Philostheusy Mbogoro stated that youth population in Tanzania is growing rapidly and make up the largest portion of workforce, so Botnar Fondation through Tanga Yetu Initiative embarked on helping youths economically to enable them sustain their

"We need by 2030, this large portion of youths in Tanga to benefit economically through opportunities available in Tanga, specifically marine resources," he stated.

Buyers urged to procure tobacco at market prices

She said this following the reports that there are tobacco buyers who are exploiting farmers by buying the crop at the prices that do not match with those of the market.

Dendego said this on Monday during the tobacco stakeholders meeting convened to discuss the challenges and future tobacco grading held in Iringa region. Such last meeting was held 12

vears ago

She said that buyers who procure tobacco at good prices will motivate farmers to continue producing the crop, which contributes to foreign exchange earnings.

"If the prices are low and exploitative, this will discourage farmers and many will stop producing; at the end of the day; there will be no tobacco processing factories and there will also be no jobs..." emphasized Dendego.

She said in order to have a sustainable production of tobacco; the value chain of the crop must be given a new impetus and by seeing the importance of every

The Regional Commissioner also

asked farmers in Iringa region to increase the production of the crops like other regions, since the region least producer of crop, compared with regions, specifically Ruvuma.

She also asked the experts, agricultural cooperative officers in the region to ensure that the tobacco crop gets a new impetus to stimulate the regional economy. On his part, the Director General of the Tanzania Tobacco Board (TTB), Stanley Nelson Mnozya asked companies buying tobacco from farmers to procure through cooperatives.

He called for farmers to not sell tobacco to companies which are not licensed.

"Farmers should not sell tobacco to companies that do not have a license

from the board..." said Mnozya.

Mnozya explained that the tobacco is a strategic crop that brings in a lot of foreign currency and contributes to the nation's income.

Mnozya has therefore requested the government to ensure timely availability of inputs to increase the crop pro-

TTB has also asked farmers and various tobacco stakeholders to continue planting trees to conserve the environment, as tobacco currying uses a lot of

The government is targeting to increase the crop production to 200 million kilos by 2025, according to the CCM Election manifesto (2020-2025).

Giving an exclusive interview to The Guardian, Founder and the National Chairman of TAPAIA, Dr. Sebastian Kingu expressed that Association has decided to organise the gathering with a patriotic spirit and mission to help increase the formal employment to the Tanzania youth by finding solution to the numerous problems that appears to crowd them out from initiating their sustainable own income generating projects.

And he added that, the envisaged forum is part to cement a series of concerted efforts to help attain the Association's key initiative, dubbed 'TAPAIA Youth Investors in Agricultural Industries' the vital program which seeks to unlock and create formal employment opportunities towards the youth.

"Among others, the vision behind the program is to organize and facilitate the establishment of large scale industries owned by the youth themselves in order to industrially process all of the available raw agricultural crops, at the same time creating many formal employment opportunities by the youth themselves," Dr. Kingu stated.

He observed that the youth across the country are facing a number of problems when it comes to penetrating the labour market, as well as to employ themselves, and insisted that the Association was working to capacity them to address such challenges.

"Statistics shows that about one million Tanzanian youth joins the labour market each year but only about fifty thousand, equivalent to five percent are being employed in the formal public sector or formal private sector,"

"The rest which is about 950,000, equivalent to 95 percent joins the unemployed youth group, ending up doing small informal activities just to survive, commonly known as the machinga group in the informal private sector, the situation which is not acceptable, and far not good for the youth as well as for the entire development of the nation," he expressed.

He moreover unveiled that it was disconcerting that currently a lot of Tanzania agricultural crops are exported raw into the world markets, including cashew nuts, cotton, coffee as well as tea, added: "Exporting such crops as raw means denying key opportunity for the locals to engage in processing plants, the poor situation which also fuels the spate of unemployment among the youth," he said.

Dr. Kingu expounded that the TAPAIA Youth Investment model was to help to achieve the vision of the national economic empowerment policy of 2004, and the envisaged 2025 economic vision.

Chicken feed producers advised on contract farming

MINISTRY of Livestock and Fisheries has encouraged large producers of chicken feeds to embark on contract farming to ensure adequate supply of maize, the common raw materials.

Asimwe Rwiguza, the Director for Grazing - Land and Animal Feed Resources at the Ministry said that a rise in price of chicken feed has left most farmers in a dilemma following the huge losses they are making.

Rwiguza said contract farming was the only solution to end inadequate supply of maize led skyrocketing of prices of chicken feeds

She said that contract farming will assure the producers the supply of the raw materials especially maize.

"Currently, there is a rise in the prices of maize which is an important raw material for making chicken feeds as well as staple food for people. We encourage them to enter into contracts with farmers in order to be assured of maize supply," she said.

The director said that inadequate supply of maize has contributed to the rise in the demand for chicken feed and human food, hence doubling the production cost.

She said as a result there is a skyrocketing of prices of bags of chicken feeds reaching up to 95,000/- per bag

According to him, if large producers practice contract farming, the price

for maize will drop and there will be million from 83.28 million in 2020/2021

Some poultry farmers in Dar es Salaam said that the price of broiler feeds has increased to 77,000/- from 70,000/- for a 50 kilogramme bag while the same 50 kilogramme bag of layers feeds is traded at 61,000/- from

They sell chickens and eggs at low wholesale and retail prices which subjects them to huge losses especially when the costs of production is high.

As a result they have abandoned chicken keeping following losses they have been making recently.

Statistics from the ministry of Livestock and Fisheries show that the number of chickens increased to 87.7

out of which 40.36 million are indigenous while 47.34 million broilers.

Minister for Livestock and Fisheries, Abdallah Ulega said the rise in feed prices is depending ministr advocates on the agriculture season.

He said for example, maize is used for human consumption and at the same time for animals.

"So, if the demand is high it means that the price must rise," he noted.

"All I can say is that the rise in prices is due to the season. Buyers of animal feeds often incur high costs of mixing the feed with other ingredients to give the chickens the necessary vitamins...,"

China's consumer-driven growth boosts global economy

BEIJING

hina's economy grew at the fastest pace in a year in the first quarter, putting Beijing on track to meet its growth goal for the year without adding major stimulus, while also helping to cushion the global economy against a downturn

Gross domestic product expanded 4.5 percent last quarter from a year earlier, official data showed Tuesday, beating economists' expectations. In March, retail sales soared 10.6 percent from a year earlier, the biggest monthly gain since June 2021.

The upbeat data provide a foundation for China's government to meet or exceed its GDP growth target of about 5% for the year. That would make China, alongside India, the largest contributers to global growth in 2023, accounting for about half of the expansion, according to the International Monetary Fund.

The strong GDP report prompted Citigroup Inc. and Societe Generale SA to upgrade their full-year growth forecasts for China to 6.1% and 6% respectively. S&P Global Ratings also said there's upside risk to its current projection of

should provide some comfort to policymakers and will probably nudge them a little further in the direction of not wanting to apply a significant amount of macro economic stimulus and starting to think about toning down the generosity of monetary policy," said Louis Kuijs, S&P's chief economist for Asia Pacific. "I think the growth momentum will be main-

Still, the March data showed China's recovery from 2022 when Covid lockdowns and a property slump dragged GDP growth down to the second-weakest pace since the 1970s – will be gradual rather than "V-shaped."

Growth in industrial output remains below pre-pandemic rates, while property investment continued to contract, even though housing sales have started to expand again. Weak real estate construction was to some extent offset by a surge in infrastructure investment led by state-owned companies.

The jobs market and wage growth also haven't returned to normal. Incomes of urban residents grew just 2.7% in inflationadjusted terms during the first quarter from a year earlier, well below growth rates above 5% in pre-pandemic years. close to a record, while the nationwide urban jobless rate remained elevated.

Fu Linghui, a spokesman for the NBS, said Tuesday the economy's rebound is "not yet solid."

Financial markets were relatively muted after the GDP report. The benchmark CSI 300 Index of equities ended 0.3% higher for the day, while the offshore yuan rose 0.1%. China's 10-year government bond yield slipped 1 basis point to 2.83%.

China remains crucial to the global economy this year as the US and Europe struggle due to factors such as high energy costs and consumer inflation running ahead of wage growth, which limits consumer spending. China will be the top contributor to global growth over the next five years, with its share set to be double that of the US, according to Bloomberg calculations based on IMF data.

March industrial output was buoyed by commodities production, with growth in cement output the strongest in two years, underlining higher demand from the construction sector. Vehicle production also climbed as car exports surged. The production of micro computer equipment fell 22% and integrated circuit output also slumped, adding to evidence of a broader slowdown in the electronic supply chain in East

Asia that has hit South Korea's exports. The strong growth in retail sales suggest "there is no immediate need for fiscal stimulus to support consumers," Iris Pang, chief Greater China economist at ING Group NV, said in a note. March's growth of clothing sales, Pang's favored measure of household consumption appetite, was the highest in nearly two years.

Other indicators released this month have provided conflicting signals about the recovery: credit and exports surged in March, but inflation remained weak. While the latter is generally a sign of muted domestic demand in the economy, economists at Goldman Sachs Group Inc. argue the weak inflation figures may indicate growth in demand is being outpaced by a recovery in supply.

"The brisk pickup in China's GDP growth in the first quarter matched our expectations. The pleasant surprise was the strength of retail sales in March

- showing that a long-sought reorientation toward consumption was a big driver of the recovery from the Covid slump."

"Less encouraging was an unexpected slowdown in fixed-asset investment. That's somewhat concerning given that slower global growth is damping the rebound in industrial production."

Gold dropped 2 percent on Friday after the dollar bounced and Fed officials flagged the need for another interest rate hike.

Fed Governor Christopher Waller and Atlanta Fed President Raphael Bostic suggested the Fed could hike another 25 basis points (bp) next month.

markets are pricing in a 86 percent chance of a 25 bp hike in May.

Merkel awarded with highest German honour

BERLIN

GERMANY'S former chancellor Angela Merkel was awarded the country's highest possible honor on Monday amid reflection on her 16-year tenure at the helm of Europe's biggest economy.

The first female leader of Germany, who stepped down in December 2021, was decorated with the Grand Cross of the Order of Merit for special achievement by President Frank-Walter Steinmeier at a ceremony in Schloss Bellevue, Berlin.


At the event, attended by current chancellor Olaf Scholz, European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen

and former national football coach Juergen Klinsmann, Merkel spoke of "many good experiences" in what others had described to her as the "snakepit of poli-

Only two former chancellors of Germany have received the honor previously - Konrad Adenauer, the first leader of post-war Germany, and Helmut Kohl, lauded as a key architect of German reunification.

Merkel is known for steering Germany through the global financial crisis, the eurozone debt crisis and the COV-ID-19 pandemic, but has faced criticism for her stance towards Russia.

In November last year, Merkel said

THE National Prosecuting Authority (NPA) of South Africa said Monday that a provisional restraint order of 165 million rands (about 9 million U.S. dollars) has been granted against 10 people, who were implicated in a corruption case related to the 2010 World Cup tender.

The NPA said the court granted the provisional restraint order against former provincial commissioner Mmamonnye Ngobeni, businessman Thoshan Panday and his ex-wife, as well as seven others.

"The curator has frozen the bank accounts of all the parties cited, and the execution of the order has taken place today," said NPA spokesperson Sindisiwe Seboka.

The alleged criminal syndicate is accused of acting in common purpose to deprive the police of an amount of more than 47.3 million rands through acts of fraud, corruption, forgery, bribery, and money laundering before and during the 2010 World Cup, according to the spokesperson.

Seboka said three police officials did not follow the regulations in securing accommodation for the 2010 World Cup and awarded Panday, who charged inflated rates, the tender to provide accommodation.

The other defendants whose assets have been restrained include a former section head at the office of Ngobeni, a former policeman, four of Panday's family members and his professional assistant. The suspects will appear before the court on Aug. 25. Xinhua

With 185 killed, deadly military conflict in Sudan rages on

KHARTOUM

CLASHES between the Sudanese Army and the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) in Sudan have killed 185 people and wounded another 1,800 as of Monday, while showing no sign of abating.

Volker Perthes, head of the UN Integrated Transition Assistance Mission in Sudan, briefed the Security Council in a closed-door session on the latest situation of the conflict.

"It's a very fluid situation, so it's very difficult to say where the balance is shifting to," Perthes told reporters after the meeting.UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres on Monday called on leaders of the Sudanese Armed Forces and the RSF to immediately cease hostilities and begin a dialogue to resolve the crisis.

But the UN envoy to Sudan said the vene to stop what he termed as "crimes two sides showed no signs of being willing to negotiate.

The Sudanese Army said on Monday that they had limited clashes with the RSF around the perimeter of the army's General Command and the center of Khartoum.

"The armed forces are in complete control of all their headquarters, and what is being circulated about the enemy's seizure of the general command, the guesthouse, or the Republican palace is untrue." the army said in a statement. The army added that the Sudanese Air Force on Monday launched strikes against a number of hostile targets with the aim of ending pockets of the RSF in the capital.

Mohamed Hamdan Dagalo, commander of the RSF, on Monday urged the international community to interof Sudanese army commander.'

"The international community must take action now and intervene against the crimes of Sudanese General Abdel Fattah Al-Burhan, a radical Islamist who is bombing civilians from the air," Dagalo said on his Twitter account on Monday.

"The army is waging a brutal campaign against the innocent, bombing them with missiles," he added. He also denied that his forces initiated the fighting with the Sudanese army. "We did not attack anyone. Our actions are merely a response to the siege and assault against our force," he said.

The fighting is triggering a deteriorating humanitarian crisis across the country. "The clashes are preventing people, especially in cities, from accessing food, water, education, fuel and other critical services for their families," UN Emergency Relief Coordinator Martin Griffiths said on Monday.

"Health services, already precarious, could be further pushed to the brink." "Reports that hospitals and water and electrical infrastructure have come under attack are extremely alarming," Griffiths said. Israel on Monday said it was "following with concern" the fight-

"Israel wants stability and security for Sudan," Israeli Foreign Ministry Spokesman Lior Haiat wrote on Twitter. In response to the raging conflict, Kenya announced plans to evacuate 3,000 of its nationals in Sudan. "We are assembling all the logistics required to evacuate our citizens once Sudan's airspace is open and there is the ability to move people safely," Roseline Njogu, principal secretary for State Department for Diaspora Affairs, told media. *Xinhua*

Putin visited Kherson Region, LPR

RUSSIAN President Vladimir Putin visited the Kherson Region and the Lugansk People's Republic (LPR) on Monday. Allegations that the trip took place at a different time are erroneous, Kremlin Spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters yester-

"It was yesterday. Indeed, the president said, when gifting the icon, that we have Easter. The fact is that our Easter lasts 40 days, we continue celebrating it, now we have Easter week. That's why it is erroneous to pay attention to that phrase and make hypotheses about something that was never real. The trip took place yesterday," the Kremlin spokesman said.

He was also asked to comment on why Putin's visit to Russia's new regions took place at this particular time. "Now the president visits the new regions more frequently, naturally, he inspects headquarters, receives operational information on the spot about the progress of the special military operation. This is vital for the commander-in-chief, this is how he works," Peskov said.

Reporters asked the Kremlin spokesman about the Russian president's assessment of the troops status and the servicemen's morale, including in view of Ukraine's potential counterattack.

"As for the assessments of the troops status and so on - this is the prerogative of the Defense Ministry. We have no right to give any information there," Peskov said. Commenting on the trip in general, he added that it was "the routine work of the commander-in-chief."

On Monday, Putin visited the headquarters of the Dnepr battlegroup on the Kherson front and the headquarters of the National Guard East battlegroup in the LPR. During his visits, the head of state heard reports from military commanders on the situation in the Kherson, Zaporozhye and Lugansk directions.

Report: Japan PM attack suspect had sued govt on election

THE suspect who threw a smoke bomb toward Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida had a record of seeking damages from the government, claiming he was unfairly barred from running for the Upper House election, the Yomiuri newspaper reported yesterday.

Ryuji Kimura filed the lawsuit in the Kobe district court last June, claiming he could not run for election held on July 10 due to his age and inability to prepare a 3 million yen (\$22,339) deposit, the report said, citing the case record.

According to the record, Kimura claimed the election law violates the Constitution, which stipulates equality under the law among other provisions.

The court dismissed the claim, in which the 24-year-old suspect sought 100,000 yen in damages for the mental anguish he had suffered, said the Yomiuri report.

Kimura appealed to the Osaka High Court against this ruling, and a decision was

scheduled for May this year, it said.

Japanese authorities searched Kimura's home on Sunday in Kawanishi city in Hyogo after he was arrested on the scene after allegedly attempting to attack Kishida with an explosive object during his election speech in Wakayama City. He has not yet been charged.

Medvedev calls G7 mendacious liars for calls that Russia affirm opposition to nuclear war

MOSCOW

RUSSIAN Security Council Deputy Chairman Dmitry Medvedev has accused the foreign ministers of the G7 countries of lying and mendacity over their calls for Russia to affirm that it stands against nuclear war.

"What lying bastards! They themselves dropped nuclear bombs but show no remorse. They're forever

speaking with a forked tongue, telling bald-faced lies to their own people as well as to outsiders, and then they claim that it's our country that is spreading 'false information' about Ukraine.

They're now demanding that Russia provide them with some sort of guarantees with regards to nuclear weapons, but in reality they're hinting at a future nuclear conflict between our country and NATO," Medvedev wrote on Telegram

He pointed out that the G7 foreign ministers' meeting was taking place in Japan. "It's where hundreds of thousands of people died from atomic bombs. It's a country whose leaders are, in effect, spitting on the graves of their fellow citizens who died at the hands of the Americans," he noted, adding: "What a disgrace!"

The G7 foreign ministers earlier adopted a joint statement calling on Moscow to prove - "in word and in deed" - that there could be no winners in a nuclear war and thus such a war must never be fought.

Meanwhile, US Secretary of State Antony Blinken said on the sidelines of the event that "Hiroshima together with Nagasaki offers the most powerful reminder of the unprecedented devastation and immense human suffering that the people of Japan experienced as a result of the atomic bombings in 1945." However, he failed to specify that it was the US that had carried out the atomic bombings of

The US conducted the atomic bombings of the Japanese cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki towards the end of World War II, with the initial goal of accelerating

The US bombings are to date the only examples of the wartime use of nuclear weapons in human history. The first US atomic bomb instantly killed 70,000 to 100,000 people in Hiroshima on August 6, 1945, with many survivors dying later of radiation sickness and other consequences.

According to the latest estimates, the Hiroshima bombing ultimately claimed over 308,000 lives. Nagasaki came under a US atomic bomb attack two days later, on August 8, 1945. About 70,000 people were killed on the spot and the city was wiped off the face of the Earth. The number of victims of the second attack ex-

Sudan crisis: Burhan and Hemedti - the two generals at the heart of the conflict

KHARTOUM

A SOUNDTRACK of explosions, a skyline dominated by bitter, black smoke, a daily existence of fear and uncertainty as bullets, rockets and rumours fly.

Life in Sudan's capital, Khartoum, and in many other parts of the country, has taken a sudden, very dramatic turn for the worse.

At the heart of it are two generals: Abdel Fattah al-Burhan, the leader of the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF), and Mohamed Hamdan Dagalo, better known as Hemedti, the head of the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF).

The two worked together, and carried out a coup together - now their battle for supremacy is tearing Sudan

apart. The relationship between the two goes back a long way.

Both played key roles in the counter-insurgency against Darfuri rebels, in the civil war in Sudan's western region that began in 2003.

Gen Burhan rose to control the Sudanese army in Darfur.

Hemedti was the commander of one of the many Arab militias, collectively known as the Janjaweed, which the government employed to brutally put down the largely non-Arab Darfuri rebel groups.

Darfur conflict: A bloody stalemate Majak D'Agoot was the deputy director of the National Intelligence and Security Services at the time - before becoming deputy defence minister in South Sudan when it seceded in 2011. He met Gen Burhan and Hemedti in Darfur, and said they worked well together. But he told the BBC he saw little sign that either would rise to the top of the state.

Hemedti was simply a militia leader "playing a counter-insurgency role, helping the military", while Gen Burhan was a career soldier, though "with all the ambitions of the Sudanese officer corps, anything was possible". The military has been running Sudan for most of its post-independ-





The government's tactics in Darfur, once described by Sudan expert Alex de Waal as "counter-insurgency on the cheap", used regular troops, ethnic militias and air power to fight off the rebels - with little to no regard for civilian casualties. Darfur has been described as the first genocide of the 21st Century, with the Janjaweed accused of ethnic cleansing and using mass rape as a weapon of war.

Hemedti eventually became the commander of what could be described as an offshoot of the Janjaweed, his RSF.

Hemedti's power grew massively once he began supplying troops to fight for the Saudi-led coalition in Yemen.

Sudan's then-military ruler, Omar al-Bashir, came to rely on Hemedti and the RSF as a counterweight to the regular armed forces, in the hope that it would be too difficult for any single armed group to depose him.

In the end - after months of popular protests - the generals clubbed together to overthrow Bashir, in April 2019.

Later that year, they signed an agreement with the protesters to form a civilian-led government overseen by the Sovereign Council, a joint civilian-military body, with Gen Burhan at its head, and Hemedti as his deputy.

It lasted two years - until October 2021 - when the military struck, taking power for themselves, with Gen Burhan again at the head of the state and Hemedti again his deputy.

Siddig Tower Kafi was a civilian member of the Sovereign Council, and so regularly met the two generals.

He said he saw no sign of any disagreements until after the 2021 coup.

Then "Gen Burhan started to restore the Islamists and the former regime members to their old positions", he told the BBC. "It was becoming clear that the plan of Gen Burhan was to restore the old regime of Omar al-Bashir to power."

Mr Siddig says that this is when Hemedti began to have doubts, as he felt Bashir's cronies had never fully trusted him. Sudanese politics has always been dominated by an elite largely drawn from the ethnic groups based around Khartoum and the River Nile.

Hemedti comes from Darfur, and the Sudanese elite often

talk about him and his soldiers in pejorative terms, as "country bumpkins" unfit to rule the state.

Over the last two or three years, he has tried to position himself as a national figure, and even as a representative of the marginalised peripheries - trying to forge alliances with rebel groups in Darfur and South Kordofan that he had previously been tasked with destroying.

He has also spoken regularly of a need for democracy despite his forces having brutally put down civilian protests in the past. Tensions between the army and the RSF grew as a deadline for forming a civilian government approached, focused on the thorny issue of how the RSF should be re-integrated into the regular armed forces.

And then the fighting began, pitting the RSF against the SAF, Hemedti against Gen Burhan, for control of the Sudanese

In one way, at least, Hemedti has followed in the footsteps of the SAF top brass, who he is now fighting - over the last few years, he has built a vast business empire, including interests in gold mines and many other sectors.

Gen Burhan and Hemedti have both faced calls from civilian leaders and victims of the conflict in Darfur and elsewhere to face trial for alleged abuses.

The stakes are extremely high, and there are plenty of reasons for these former-allies-turned-bitter-enemies to not back down.

China's Chongqing municipality gears up for green transition

IT'S hard to imagine that a factory has a "farm" on its rooftop, but this is happening in the plant of Mexin Messon Doors Industry Co., Ltd, a manufacturer of windows and doors based in southwest China's Chongqing municipality.

The rooftop "farm" covers over 20,000 square meters, where employees of the factory can grow vegetables, fruits, cereals and flowers in their off time. When the rain stops, there is a mixed fragrance of plants. The window and door manufacturer was recognized as a national-level green factory in

A green factory, according to an evaluation guideline implemented by China in 2018, features intensive land use, adopts hazard-free raw materials, practices clean production, recycles waste and employs low-carbon

As a major manufacturing hub, Chongqing has vigorously promoted green transition among its enterprises. According to a plan of the municipality, Chongqing will be home to over 30 green industrial parks and 300 green factories at municipal level and above by 2025, and it will strive to lower the energy consumption per unit of value added of enterprises above designated size by 14.5 percent from 2020.

Manufacturers in Chongqing have been "gardenizing" their factories over the recent years. In the general assembly base of China State Shipbuilding Corporation Haizhuang Windpower Co., Ltd. in Chongqing's Liangjiang New Area, trees and flowers can be seen everywhere, and there are even ponds. The vegetation cover helps the base maintain a sound ecology, always keeps it

in appropriate temperature, and reduces the noise diffusion.

Industrial enterprises in the municipality have spared no effort to cut energy consumption and promote green development. They have managed to make full use of sunlight to reduce electricity consumption, greened their plant buildings to consume less energy, and adopted shock absorption and noise insulation techniques to make production quieter.

How could green transition measures be implemented while production remains non-stop? Chongqing's answer is to lower energy consumption and improve efficien-

"Clinker calcination is a key part of cement production," said Han Wei, assistant manager of a cement producer in Bishan district of Chongqing. Coal is the major fuel for calcination, if traditional equipment, techniques and materials were employed during the process, it would consume high energy and lead to pollution, Han noted.

Over the recent years, Han's company has managed to replace part of the limestone needed in the production with calcium carbonate and calcium oxide, which reduces the emission of carbon dioxide generated in the secondary combustion of limestone. This procedure alone lowers the company's cost by over 8 million yuan (\$1.16 million) each

Relying on big data and intelligent technologies, green enterprises in Chongqing have gradually realized targeted management of energy.

Chongqing Sokon Powertrain Co., Ltd. has a national-level green factory in Changshou Economic and Technological Development Area. "We adopt engine cold test technologies which allow us to obtain over 1,000 parameters of an engine without starting it. This cuts annual carbon dioxide emissions by more than 600 tons," said Li Ping with the company.

To make innovations of green products through efficient utilization of energy resources remains another important approach to energy conservation and efficiency im-

A workshop of Chinese home ap-

pliance giant Gree in Jiulongpo district has worked to tackle technological bottlenecks and lowered its annual energy consumption by 20 percent. "Fuyao," the first deep-sea floating wind power equipment of China rolled off the production line last year. Power-packed Liver showcase their potent ammunition

Jurgen Klopp may have ruled out signing a Ferrari this summer but here was a reminder of the high-powered engines he already has in his garage. His Liverpool team motored to a first victory in more than a month to even offer a glimmer of hope they could qualify for Europe.

Last week Klopp compared wanting Jude Bellingham to a child asking for a sports car as a Christmas present, given his price. After five games without a victory it may not have been what supporters wanted to hear, given the gap to the top of the Premier League. In his Telegraph Sport column, Jamie Carragher pointed out how important it was to get recruitment right this summer.

But performances like this and the second half against Arsenal, clawing back a point against the Premier League leaders, is what Klopp's team is capable of. The seven goals against Manchester United and six at Elland Road are the markers for his players, the standards they need to maintain.

Without Bellingham, his team can still have speed and are pleasant on the eye. In red, they can be a fleet of Ferrari's. Look at how they seized on Leeds' mistakes - and generous refereeing for their opening goal - to lead through Cody Gakpo and Mohamed Salah, with Trent Alexander-Arnold orchestrating play from central midfield.

When Leeds pulled one back, they sped away through a couple more goals from Diogo Jota, another from Salah and Darwin Nunez also finding the net. The most impressive moment for Klopp? It was when his players swarmed around Leeds players in stoppage-time, hunting the ball. He considered it their best counter-pressing game of the

It could take them into the European places, which would be a remarkable achievement from where they have been this season. In the 2020/21 campaign they made a late run from eighth to third place in the final months. This time around there is more traffic between them and their rivals, yet Klopp believes these are important games for next season.

The foundations are being set to return to where Klopp feels they belong, should they replicate performances like this.

"I have no clue where we can end up this season. I just don't know because it depends massively on the teams around us," Klopp said. "But it is super important what is happening from now because it will go on after that, there will be a next season.

"What is important is what we showed in the second half against Arsenal because in this season this game could have gone either way. Tonight, it is super important we understand what we got here. We played a really bad season but some things are not really easy to explain, some things are not acceptable.

"When we put in good performances we can understand what is possible. That's really, really important for me. That's why I don't think where we can push to or whatever. I just want us to play top football, win games and then we will see where we

"I think the problem between this season and that (2020/21) season was that we are a bit further away. But we will go on and we need all the performances now to create something new, so the games are super important.

"If we cannot get something this season then we have to build on good performance from this part of the season. I am thinking about that more than where we end up. I would like to see us with the same desire and passion that we did tonight."

Klopp talked about creating something new. This team plus their summer additions to go again and challenge the best. It will probably include Alexander-Arnold moving into midfield mid-match from full-back. He created the opening goal for Gakpo and also Nunez's strike with a lofted through ball.

"It's Trent, it's both full-back and midfield," said Klopp. "I think the goal for Darwin is an exceptional pass. He can be both but in general we need to be better protected as well because we concede too many counter-attacks.

"He won the ball back for the first goal as well, stepping really out. Really impressive, the highlight was the last pass but he had a few more, Wherever Trent is he can be decisive in his passes. This was a good game, you can see he enjoyed it."

After shipping five against Crystal Palace in their last match, this defeat was another worrying performance as owner Andrea Radrizzani watched on from the directors' box, his club's topflight status under severe threat.

Javi Gracia was brought in to save their season but they are in a worse position than a year ago after 31 games, when they eventually needed a win on the final day of the campaign to survive.

"I suppose the supporters need to see the team playing like we have done in the previous games and try to improve our level," said Gracia, whose team scored through Luis Sinisterra. "We have to improve for the seven finals.

"I don't have an explanation. The players always tried and always worked hard during the week. In this game and the last game in the second half we didn't compete at our level and we need to improve that as we have seven games left and have to show our best face. I prefer to be critical at myself and try to find solutions for the future."

How do Arsenal stop the choke? Trust the psychological beliefs of Mikel Arteta

at Arsenal, has been coaching footballers for longer than Bukayo Saka has been alive. Over more than three decades in the professional game, the 52-vear-old has learned to read a room and to judge the mood of an individual, and this time last year he decided to put a supportive arm around Saka's shoulder.

Arsenal were training at the Emirates Stadium on a Friday afternoon, the day before a meeting with Manchester United, and Round and Saka decided to work together on penalties. The young winger had scored from the spot a few days earlier, at Stamford Bridge, but the scars of the previous summer's Euros when he missed in the shootout in the final

against Italy - were still

fresh.

And so, at the end of that day's session, Saka and Round strolled down to one end of the ground and picked a spot. Between them, they agreed which way Saka would shoot if Arsenal were to win a penalty the following afternoon. Saka then took that exact shot, firing into the same corner all season, and coaches again and again, as part of his preparation.

A day later, after 30 minutes of action, Saka was fouled in United's penalty box. He grabbed the ball, puffed out his cheeks, and slammed his effort into the same corner of the net that he and Round had discussed 24

this case, made perfect.

Almost exactly a year STEVE Round, one of later, on Sunday, Saka Mikel Arteta's assistants had another penalty for Arsenal, against West Ham. He shot in the same direction but, this time, fired wide. Within 142 seconds of his miss, West Ham had equalised, and two points had been lost. "Apologies Gunners,' Saka said afterwards. "I'll do everything I can to make it right."

Arsenal do not have hours earlier. Practice, in an official club psy-



chologist, with Arteta and his coaching staff instead leading the messaging and the mental management of the first-team stars. They do use various consultants, however, which are turned to by the players on an individual basis, as and when required.

Arteta likes to read in his spare time, but only non-fiction books and only things that help him become a better manager. He is interested in leadership techniques and methods of management, and he regularly speaks to coaches in other sports, including rugby union's Eddie Jones. With a match against

Southampton looming on Friday before the allimportant meeting with Manchester City next week, Arteta will need to deploy the most effec-

tive of these techniques if he is to steady the ship. cannot afford to stumble again, and they certainly cannot afford to keep blowing two-goal leads.

*'Simply play football' Professor Andy Lane, a sports psychologist at the Centre for Health Human Performance and the University of Wolverhampton, says the key for Arsenal's players is to live in the moment. The more liberated they feel, and the less concerned they are about the bigger picture, the better they will

"If they are thinking they are close to the end of the season, it brings anxiety," he says. "They need to do as much as possible to simply play football. Focus on the quality of the movement, the enjoyment of playing. They could watch back successful performances, trying to recapture what it was like when they were win-



The situation echoes the CAF Confederation Cup quarterfinal played one year ago, in which Simba SC locked horns with a South African side, Orlando Pirates, when he was suspended for yellow card accumulation.

On the other hand, Manu-

la picked up a knock in this season's Federation Cup quarterfinal win over Ihefu SC forcing Simba SC head coach Roberto Oliveira 'Robertinho' to use thirdchoice goalkeeper Ally Salim in the two subsequent games including the derby against Yanga.

Though it has not been confirmed officially, it is understood that secondchoice goalkeeper, Beno Kakolanya, has been overlooked for what is alleged to have signed a pre-contract with another NBC Premier League club.

This will be the third time Simba SC takes on a Moroccan opponent in the premier continental showpiece this year, as they faced off with Wydad Athletic Club's arch-rivals Raja CA in the Group Stage, losing home and away.

The last meeting between Simba SC and Wydad Athletic Club was in the 2011 season in a special play-off match that was ordered by CAF following a successful appeal by Simba SC over DR Congo club, TP Mazembe, fielding an ineligible player. Wydad Athletic Club won 3-0 in Cairo.
