JPM orders audit of prisons, releasing innocent inmates

Zonal land offices set to be scrapped in sector reforms

The land sector is set for extensive reforms as the government makes radical changes including scrapping zonal land offices and establishing regional ones in a bid to take services closer to the people.

The Minister for Land, Housing and Human Settlements Development, William Lukuvi said yesterday that he has taken the step to simplify the services of settlements planning and legalization of informal settlements.

He said from next year the government will start to issue title deeds electronically across the country.

This will go alongside issuing of all land documents at the regional level, saving people, especially the rural population from travelling long distances to get documents.

Addressing a working meeting of land sector experts here yesterday, he said, "Those seeking title deeds will be able to process applications and make payment electronically in order to acquire them."

PRESIDENT John Magufuli yesterday ordered a countrywide audit of prisons and release of all inmates who have been wrongly incarcerated, especially remandees.

Speaking in Kongwa district, Dodoma region, the Head of State said the decision has been informed by what he encountered during his impromptu visit to Butimba Prison in Mwanza on Tuesday where he learned of rampant miscarriage of justice.

"I direct the Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs, the Ministry of Home Affairs in collaboration with other security organs to visit all prisons in the country, talk to the inmates and ensure that those who are not supposed to be there are released," he said.

The team will go from one region to another, one jail to another in search of victims of miscarriage of justice whom the president said are crying and are in urgent need of rescue.

Apart from ensuring that justice is done, the

Lake Victoria climate change, fish supply scenario daunting

The survival of millions of people whose livelihoods depend on Lake Victoria is at stake if climate change impacts on the water body are not controlled, experts warned yesterday.

Speaking at an awareness event on the highway project to support Lake Victoria social and economic activities in Dar es Salaam, the Tanzania Meteorological Authority (TMA) Acting Director General Dr Ladislaus Chang'a said the impact of increased severe weather events on the lake affects the economy of people living within the Lake Victoria basin.

"Extreme events such as severe convection and strong winds have impacted the availability of fish catch and

increased marine accidents. These have in turn affected human livelihoods. These impacts are of great concern to the national economy," he said.

The project brings together partners including the national meteorological services of Tanzania, Kenya, Uganda and Rwanda, in collaboration with the World Meteorological Organization (WMO) along with the United States National Center for Atmospheric Research, managed by the World Meteorological Organisation and funded by the UK Department for International Development (DFID).

Dr Chang'a noted that there have been high and rising temperatures within the lake, and high humidity which if left as it is, in the next 20 years marine life will be

Human capital: World Bank urges health and education leapfrogging

Tanzania needs to invest more in the health and education sectors to accelerate progress of the broader population especially the youth, if the country is to improve its human capital for sustainable development, says the latest economic update by the World Bank.

The report, launched in the commercial capital yesterday, says that to tackle the country's barriers to human capital development requires boosting



investments in multiple areas using a holistic approach by all government departments, aiming at providing quality services with special emphasis being placed on reaching vulnerable adolescent girls and targeting areas of the country that are lagging behind.

In addition, to narrow the gender earnings gap, the authors recommend reducing the time women spend in unpaid work and redistributing care responsibilities to enable them to spend more time in the

have to travel all the way to the Tabora Zonal Office to get land services, largely for legalization of informal settlements," he pointed out.

He warned land officers operating land companies while carrying out official duties, noting that such land

officers should opt between businesses and public service.

On her part, the deputy minister, Angelina Mabula, underscored the need for land officers to apply customer care prerogatives while carrying out official duties.

"There is a dire need for change in order to match with projected

transformation in the land sector", she said.

Earlier, Permanent Secretary Dorothy Mwanyika said that the working meeting was aimed at seeking solutions for challenges facing the land sector.

Among the topics to be presented are government security and

confidential register keeping, the war against corruption in the land sector and the new structure of administration.

The meeting will provide land officers with an opportunity to conduct self evaluation in their performance, the top civil servant intoned.

labour market.

That would give women more access to and control of productive assets, and addressing market and institutional failures that limit opportunities for women, the report observes.

Speaking at the launching, World Bank Country Director Bella Bird said Tanzania's wealth has increased by 45 percent since 1995, itself an important achievement, but the country's population has also grown, leading to a decrease of per capita wealth, a situation that is not sustainable.

She said overall, Tanzania's macroeconomic picture remains positive whereby inflation has remained low and stable, with the current account deficit expanding in recent months with higher imports and stagnant exports. It however remains well below the average for oil-importing African countries, the director noted.

"But as Tanzania pursues its national development priorities as articulated in its Development Vision 2025, lifts its population out of poverty and achieves status as an industrializing middle-income country, people are the most important asset it has - people are the real wealth of nations," she stated.

For the country to achieve sustained and inclusive growth, it needs to make concerted investment in its people, as human capital is the most important asset of any country, she emphasized.

The latest Economic Update also provides a snapshot of recent economic developments and the outlook for the next few years.

"There is a lot for Tanzania and other countries to learn from the four countries that top the human capital index (HCI) ranking - Singapore, South

Korea, Japan, and Hong Kong - whose success is explained by the fact that they made investing in youth a top priority, focusing on education and skills development at all stages of their progress," said Quentin Wodon, World Bank lead economist and co-author of the 12th Tanzania Economic Update.

In recent years, Tanzania has made gains in human development, with reduced under-five mortality, an increase in the average number of years of schooling for its youth, and improved adult survival.

However, its human capital index (HCI) of 0.40 means that children born today in Tanzania may reach only 40 percent of the earnings that they could have attained with full health and education.

The World Bank launched the HCI in October 2018, as part of the new Human Capital Project to encourage countries to invest more and better in their people. The index focuses on five factors that have an important bearing for future earnings: the survival rate of children past age five, expected number of years of education completed by youth, the quality of learning in school, how long workers will remain in the workforce as measured by adult survival past 60 years of age, and prevention of stunting in young children.

Given its level of development, Tanzania performs especially poorly in the number of years of schooling that children complete and the risk that children under the age of five will be stunted. In addition, gender inequality in earnings is also affecting the country's ability to increase its human capital wealth and thereby its total wealth per capita, the report underlined.

move is aimed at decongesting correctional facilities in the country, Dr Magufuli said, citing Butimba as an example, whose capacity is 900 inmates but it has 1,925 including those who are not supposed to be there.

"Thousands of people in our prisons are innocent, they are crying. I don't want to lead a country of tears (of innocent people)," the president said.

Since directing that something be done about the injustices in Mwanza on Tuesday, some prisons had already worked on the matter with scores having been released by yesterday.

"I thank the Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP) for taking action immediately after my directive. Butimba has released 75, Bariadi 100, Mugumu 52, Tarime (6) Bunda (24), Kahama (43) and they are continuing," he said.

While at Butimba, inmates raised a number of issues to the president, including corruption in the corridors of justice, delayed cases, twisted charges, wrongful imprisonment and violence within the facility.

Among the beneficiaries of this initiative are eight Mwanza-based police officers who were in January this year arrested for allegedly escorting smugglers who were about to take

323.6 kilogrammes of gold out of the country.

The president directed that the officers resume their positions and continue with their duties.

Miscarriage of justice and consequent wrongful convictions are frequently cited by death penalty opponents as cause to eliminate death penalties to avoid executing innocent persons. In recent years, DNA evidence has been used to clear many people falsely convicted all over the world.

Various studies estimate that in the United States for instance, between 2.3 and 5 per cent of all prisoners are innocent. One study estimated that up to 10,000 people may be wrongfully convicted of serious crimes each year.

A 2014 study estimated that 4.1 per cent of inmates awaiting execution on death row in the United States are innocent, and that at least 340 innocent people may have been executed since 1973.

GSMA gets £38 million funding to spur digital innovation for the underserved

endangered.

Despite the fact that climate information products and services are readily available, climate products generation, transmissions and sharing are still a challenge in the Lake Victoria basin, he stated.

"These effects arose from inadequate early warning systems, limited integration between producers and users to develop innovative, accurate and tailor-made Early Warning Services (EWS)," he said.

This would have been realized through co-production of those services but there were limited avenues for improved communication, creating ineffective use of Early Warning Services (EWS) products by relevant stakeholders, he asserted.

The successful implementation of the highway project will enhance provision of accurate, reliable and timely weather and climate related products, he said.

Information on such products will be available in a cost-effective and sustainable manner to minimize loss of life and damage to property along the Lake Victoria Basin.

Lake Victoria is one of the African Great Lakes, home to 28 species of freshwater snails and many others. The abundance of aquatic life is just a part of the dependency hierarchy on the lake, as more than 30 million people in Tanzania, Kenya and Uganda rely on the water body.

Tanzania, Uganda aim for enhanced business relations

THE government said yesterday that it is committed to further cement its business relations with Uganda for mutual benefits.

Deputy Minister for Foreign Affairs and East Africa Co-operation, Dr Damas Ndumbaro made the statement at the launch of the Tanzania-Uganda business forum which is expected to open-up a number of opportunities for investors from both countries.

"We aim at ensuring good and strong business relationships with our neighboring countries", Dr Ndumbaro asserted.

The forum according to the Deputy Minister will be held from September 3rd to 5th in Dar es Salaam under the theme: 'promoting bilateral trade and investment for sustainable development'.

The event will bring together business leaders, policy makers and stakeholders to explore business and investment opportunities in the two East African countries.

He said time has come for the country to move from having strong political relations with its neighboring countries to strong business relations, disclosing that despite having many business opportunities Tanzania and Uganda had mostly enjoyed good political cooperation.

"Tanzania and Uganda have enjoyed political relations since the country was led by the late and former President, Julius Nyerere. There are many investment opportunities in the two countries that needs to be fully tapped", he noted.

He added that 2015 data indicates

that business between the two countries was valued at 178bn/-. The business volume increased in 2018 to 350bn/-.

"We want to see more Tanzanians doing business in Uganda and the vice versa" he said.

The deputy minister also asked investors from both countries to grab opportunities in the three big projects currently under construction including the Standard Gauge Railway (SGR), Uganda-Tanzania oil pipeline and the gas pipeline project from Tanzania to Kampala.

Godfrey Simbeye, Executive Director of the Tanzania Private Sector Foundation (TPSF) said the main objective of the Uganda-Tanzania business forum is to create an enabling platform for business organisations in both countries.

He said TPSF aims to ensure the development of entrepreneurs in both countries.

"We have had business forums with investors from Rwanda and Kenya and now it's time for Uganda. The good thing about Ugandans is that they are naturally entrepreneurs, Ugandans are everywhere in the world practicing entrepreneurship activities", said Simbeye insisting the private sector wants to partner with them.

Dr Aziz Mlima and Richard Kabonero who are high commissioners of Tanzania and Uganda respectively described the forum as the best opportunity for growth of trade between the two countries.

They said the forum will also help investors and policy makers to discuss a wider number of issues affecting trade between the two countries.

Govt promises to address challenges facing prisoners

MOST prisons in the country are congested, with some accommodating double of its normal capacity, Constitutional and Legal Affairs minister Augustine Mahiga said yesterday.

Addressing journalists in Mwanza after completing his ten-day official visit to various prisons across the country, Mahiga noted that the Butimba main prison in the city is congested with nearly 2000 prisoners while it has a capacity to accommodate 1000 inmates only.

"We were in a ten-day tour to a number of prisons across Tanzania mainland; I was accompanied by the director of public prosecution (DPP) Biswalo Mganga whereas we listened to queries from inmates in Mara, Simiyu, Shinyanga and Mwanza regions", said

the minister admitting that the jails are too congested.

According to him the big numbers of inmates in prisons poses a number of risks. He said most of the jails were constructed by the colonialists with the capacity to accommodate specific number of suspects and inmates.

"Most of these prisons were built between 1942, 1948, 1958.

Congestion is fuelled with the limited number of Resident Magistrates Courts, High Courts and Courts of Appeal because some of cases cannot be heard at primary courts", said Ambassador Mahiga adding there is also a shortage of judicial workers across the country.

He cited the Tarime prison in Mara region which is accommodating 500 inmates contrary to its capacity. In Mara, the minister also visited and

listened to queries from inmates at the Mugumu -Serengeti, Bunda, Kahama and Bariadi prisons. He also paid visit to the Shinyanga prison where he talked to inmates for more than seven hours.

Dr Mahiga noted that most of the suspects and inmates complained of fabrication of charges claiming to be sentenced to jail for charges they did not commit. He said they also complained over delayed investigation by the police and the slow pace of case proceedings at the courts.

"I met some elders aged between 70 and 90 years who have been jailed for allegedly entering the Serengeti National Park in search of firewood. There are also people who have been jailed for stealing chicken and mobile phones", he noted.

President John Magufuli visited Butimba Prison in Mwanza on Tuesday, July 16, 2019 where he promised to address the challenges facing prisoners and prison wardens.

He also promised to deal with the challenges facing prison wardens which include their actual welfare, lack of enough working equipment such as vehicles and uniforms as well as shortage of houses.

Some of the inmates, who chanced to air their grievances to President Magufuli included, Hashim Kijuu who told President Magufuli that he had an issue with one of the police officers from the Regional Crimes Officer in Mwanza - who was identified by only one name as Sangali - saying he (the officer) fabricated the charges that saw him (Kijuu) entering the prison gates.

Purpose of the Assignment

The operational research at the core of this assignment has two objectives: (1) determine the positive predictive power of 99DOTS to determine medication adherence; and (2) assess the acceptability of 99DOTS to patients and providers and assess the feasibility with which they are able to access & interact with the system. Your work will be diverse. You may conduct surveys, intervention studies, support analysis of surveillance data, carry out operational research, and provide epidemiological support to complex studies as part of the TB REACH project in the Tanzania in order to enhance evidence-based decision-making. Your work will require close coordination with the Technical Officer of this project, and collaboration with the NTP.

BACKGROUND

SOS Children's Villages Tanzania (SOS CV TZ) is an, independent non-governmental social development organization, affiliated to SOS Children's Villages International, working in the spirit of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC). Our mission is to build families for children in need and helping them shape their own futures. TAA students feted for doing well in F-6 Commerce exam

NEMC to inspect all projects and industries countrywide

THE National Environment Management Council (NEMC) has unveiled plan to recruit temporary workers at its all zones countrywide in a move that aims at boosting the capacity in inspecting newly established projects and industries at all levels for formalisation, protection of environment and increased revenue collection.

NEMC Director General, Dr Samuel Gwamaka said here while in his tour of southern zone covering the regions of Lindi, Mtwara and Ruvuma to inspect projects and meeting environment officers to discuss on challenges facing them in implementing environment laws that the council would recruit officers on temporary arrangements to make the plan accomplished on time.

"There is an increase of factories and projects in various places in the country some of which are not known

by NEMC so we have decided that it is high time we embark on thorough inspection to make sure that all the projects are lawful existing," he said.

Dr Gwamaka pointed out that it is important to register projects so as the Council can do Environment Impact Assessment (EIA), adding that it is the only way to ensure that project owners are abiding with the environmental laws.

"This move will greatly help in boosting Council's revenue collection through annual charges and this can only be possible after we have registered all the projects," he said.

Dr Gwamaka pointed out that the increase in the levy would boost NEMC's capacity in carrying out its roles especially through increase of staff and working tools for increased efficiency.

"We are going to register many of the new projects which also mark the beginning of closer follow-up on its

development and ensure compliance with the law," he said.

Dr Gwamaka said that increase in the amount of revenue collected by NEMC would also be translated into the dividend payable to the central government and hence contributing to the smooth implementation of development projects. "Our plan targets at ensuring that law and regulations are observed by all stakeholders in their respective areas and this meant a lot in neatness of environment for current and future generations," he said.

He said various seminars would be conducted to ensure that stakeholders have a thorough understanding of the importance of protecting environment as well as the requirements of environmental laws.

Of recent months, NEMC has been winning kudos from top government officials and environment stakeholders for work efficiency and pro-activeness on matters.

Embedded Mobile Systems".

The ICT4BUSINESS event brought together top executives and technical experts from private sector associations and companies in Rwanda engaged in manufacturing, production, ICT and telecommunications to gain an up-to-date understanding of the trends in the field of ICT specifically Embedded and Mobile Systems.

Digitalization is increasingly gaining momentum, rising productivity levels in industries and creating new business models.

In order to cope, or even better actively shape, the digital transformation, companies require

the relevant skills in Information and Communication Technology (ICT) to be able to profit from new technologies and strengthen their competitiveness in the market.

TB prevalence rate on increase, official says

MORE than 172 people in Kigamboni district were diagnosed with Tuberculosis (TB) in the last quarter of 2018.

Kigamboni District TB and Leprosy Coordinator, Swaleh Kyonda told The Guardian on Tuesday that the number of patients affected by TB has been increasing in every quarter due to low awareness of the disease amongst the people.

He was speaking on the sidelines of TB and HIV/Aids campaign for Temeke residents which was organised by a non-governmental organisation - MUKIKUTE. The organisation conducts TB diagnosis and issues report in every quarter of the year.

He added that out of the 172 diagnosed patients, 28 percent of them were also found to have HIV/Aids, with majority of them being at the age of between 25 and 45 years.

Kyonda added: "We are working closely with authorities in Kigamboni to ensure the residents are well informed about TB and HIV/Aids", he said.

Vice Chairman of the organisation, Seif Mchila said that during the campaign on Tuesday, a total of 97 people were diagnosed whereby five among them were found with TB. He said the patients have been admitted at the Vijibweni TB hospital.

He said that the organisation funded by LHL International, is working on identifying TB patients across the country and admit them to hospitals for treatment.

He said similar campaigns are also conducted in sober houses, ferry areas and in households.

"We also visit drug users, sex workers, fishers, and long trip transporters who are at the risk of getting TB

infections", he said.

He added that they have established eight TB clubs in Temeke and Kigamboni districts that works on making follow-ups for patients with TB to ensure they complete their administered dose.

Hellen Shija, Chairperson of Kigamboni TB club said they have realised that many people are unaware of the disease, the thing that contributes into its spreading.

At least 70 people die every day from Tuberculosis (TB) in Tanzania, according to Health Minister Umyy

Mwalimu. The number is an average of three people per hour.

Speaking during an event to mark this year's World TB Day (WTBD), Mwalimu further pointed out that Tanzania was among the 30 countries in the World reported to have the highest TB prevalence.

"The World Health Organisation (WHO) statistics indicate that at least 154, 000 Tanzanians get infected with the disease every year," said Mwalimu.

Mwalimu revealed that the government in 2018

had managed to reach and treat at least 75,845 TB patients compared to 62,180 reached in the previous year, surpassing the target imposed by the African Union Commission that requires Member States to reach and treat 74,200 TB patients per year.

Mwalimu said: "one TB patient who is not under medication can infect at least 10 to 20 people per year. Therefore, more efforts are required to reach and treat more TB patients in order to prevent further transmission of the disease in the country".

What lessons from the 'stunning' results of Form VI examinations?

A 'ward' secondary school in Arusha Region by the name of Kisimiri has come off the block as top in the recently announced results of this year's National Form VI examinations.

The relatively little-known school effectively sidelined the "habitual" good performers, that is, among them top public schools and privately owned seminaries.

This achievement could understandably make people start questioning the not-so-proud 'ward schools' tag, though many will be more cautious - arguing that Kisimiri does not present the full or realistic picture of the state of ward secondary schools as a whole.

While this is therefore a subject it would not be advisable or wise to broach here for lack of data, it is clearly a hugely relevant issue.

It is evidently noticeable that a ward school has clinched top spot nationally, which logically implies at least the possibility that a ward school may be having excellent facilities for teaching and learning.

That doesn't say how many of those schools are in such a situation but it is however valid as an indication of potential in that if it is possible for Kisimiri to perform so well, other ward schools can also assure themselves of a decent run in the nationwide contest. That makes the Arusha school's result quite encouraging.

It will be recalled that ward secondary schools have been the subject of passionate debate for years among education professionals, hinging around the suitability of favouring quantity over quality in education.

It was once commonly assumed that it is impossible for ward schools to produce students good enough for higher learning institutions and, in that sense, the pass rates may have had to be skewed somewhat to accommodate their performance.

Noticing the high levels of passing announced by the National Examinations Council of Tanzania (NECTA), with the pass mark rising from 97.58 per cent to 98.32 per cent, critics might still decide to believe that exams are 'skewed' so that students or pupils may pass more or less without a hitch.

The passing of exams in statistical or social analysis terms approximates what sociologists call a 'normal curve', the usual run of distribution of most social phenomena. The reason is the diversity of human abilities, capacities or dispositions.

A 98 per cent pass rate defies the normal curve, as failure becomes an extreme instance that is hard to locate in NECTA normal distribution of exam setting, marking and publishing of results.

This already implies that the real pass mark lies elsewhere, as failure ought to start somewhere at the 'E' level as 'D' isn't quite a pass traditionally. Now it appears that only F is failure, 'E' is a marginal pass and 'D' is an outright pass, which eases the public conscience as to school performance but has little to contribute to the quality of education debate per se.

That is why chroniclers of events or news find delight in hearing that some ward secondary schools can compete on their own with more established schools.

But there is really little 'mystery' in finding poor performers even at arguably the best schools, colleges or universities in the world and sparkling stars in what may generally be dismissed as confirmed struggles.

We meanwhile congratulate all 'Kisimiri' schools across Tanzania on their laudable achievement, praying that they keep it up, while hoping that the rest of the pack will seek to emulate the stars. Of course, this is in the belief that the 'wars' will be fought on 'battlefields' as level as humanly possible.



LANDESA: Non-profit agency fighting to sensitise women on land-based rights

IMAGINE a Tanzania where women enjoy secure land rights which break the vicious cycle of poverty, disease and ignorance - and this without let or hindrance, as members of the legal fraternity would put it.

Imagine a Tanzania that abounds in beautiful, healthy and happy women clad in expensive clothes and ready to serve their families and whole communities because they enjoy equal rights to land ownership and inheritance, and their dignity is recognized and acknowledged.

We are very positive that our country will soon be there, with rural development agency LANDESA Tanzania and its partners taking the lead in a spirited effort to take us there.

LANDESA is a non-profit, non-partisan autonomous organisation whose Tanzania chapter was launched in late 2018.

It is meant to collaborate with its partners in supporting the government in activities related to pro-poor, gender-responsive land reforms based on a demand-driven approach.

Agriculture in Tanzania is dominated by women, with estimates showing that 90.4 per cent of active women are engaged in activities closely linked to the sector and are behind the production of roundabout 70 per cent of the country's food requirements.

But much as women are hardworking and loyal participants in the production of food and cash crops, they own neither land nor farm implements. Even more sadly, they cannot even make decisions on precisely what to produce, how to use the produce from "their" farms, or indeed how much the produce - be it maize, cotton, beans, coffee or whatever else - ought to fetch in the local market.

In other words, women are commonly in the dark. They are starved of information with respect to what happens to what they sweat and toil to produce. As a result, they rarely enjoy the "fruits of their labour" in that the money earned often ends up in men's pockets.

This somber scenario is as old as history itself. However, women themselves have realized over time that time was ripe for them to come together and raise their voices against discriminatory customs and laws that militate against women's rights to own, inherit and develop land.

Land is, means and determines life, and hence the need to ensure that owning and develop it qualifies as a basic human right where even the slightest discrimination is not allowed.

There are no comprehensive, current or accurate officially endorsed sex-aggregated data on land rights tenure security in Tanzania. However, there has been a noticeable rise in the involvement of women in crusades for land rights.

In the main, this has been under the auspices of the Gender Land Task Force (GLTF) during campaigns for the promulgation of the land policy and land laws in 1995/1997 and 1999, respectively.

The land right campaign fronted by women sought to challenge the contents of the 1996 Land Bill that was widely dismissed as gender-insensitive. Women wanted to see the policy and laws provide for women's access to as well as management, control, ownership and utilisation of land.

If there is any credit due with respect to this, then it goes to this very campaign in that it helped set the appropriate time for the enactment of Village Land acts No. 4 and No. 5.

These were considered progressive pieces of legislation in terms of advancing and protecting women's land rights. Actually, to date, these twin laws serve as the blocks on which several other initiatives by women have been - and are being - built.

Part of evidence that women's land rights are a global phenomenon was highlighted at the November 15, 2018 Annual Trust, with LANDESA Tanzania programme director Dr Monica Mhoja making a memorable presentation

on behalf of the global coalition and announced the mounting of a new global crusade made to bridge the gap between the theory and the practice of the law.

Tanzania was selected as a role model and, accordingly, honoured with the responsibility of piloting the global campaign at the country level. The idea was to see to it that this was rolled out in five to seven countries in total in the next two years. With this, Tanzania has once again been placed on the global development map by being entrusted with the pioneering of a noble mission.

LANDESA stands as the secretariat of the lead organisers, with the Tanzania Women Lawyers Association (Tawla) serving as the campaign's chair in collaboration with 26 civil society organisations.

The campaign, which is still at the formative stage, will endeavour to enhance access by women to land rights. This will be across the individual and communal land tenure, across both rural and urban locations and across the entire spectrum of land tenure rights - from accessing to actually managing and owning land and allied property.

We stress: land is, means and determines life. Without land, there are no buildings, no farms, and no economic gains. Without legally recognized ownership of land for them, women are powerless and helpless and will continue to languish in abject poverty.

While looking forward to celebrating the 25th anniversary of the promulgation of the 1995 Beijing Platform for Action, women and indeed humankind generally cannot afford to lose sight of the giant strides made towards achieving meaningful, tangible and impactful results on the ground.

The phenomenal history expected to unfold through the LANDESA campaigns should open doors wide to women to engage in more productive agriculture leading to much-improved nutrition at family and other levels, healthier income levels, a scaling down in gender-based domestic and other violence, a much-improved standard of education, and enhanced involvement by women in decision-making at all levels.

This may seem a tall order, considering existing challenges, but we see no reason for anyone to see ensuring the universal observance of basic human rights as constituting an impossible mission. With the necessary commitment, will-power and seriousness, it can be done.

Public-private partnership in drugs manufacturing feasible

HEALTH, Community Development, Gender, Elderly and Children ministry authorities are out to elicit interest from private sector players, both Tanzanian and foreign, to invest in the manufacturing of hospital drugs.

The reason is that up to 85 per cent of all drugs used in medication across the country in public hospitals, health centres and dispensaries across the country are imported.

This translates into a heavy toll on public expenditure, which means having local alternatives is a laudable shift, though this expected transition has its traps and drawbacks.

Yet experience shows that not everything local is less expensive than an imported alternative, the first being textiles, in which case the best way this plan could be realised is when local manufacturers are in joint venture with foreign copyright holders of certain medical or drug formulas.

Still this is often easier said than done, as holders of formulas don't give them out on the cheap, in which case there is need for feasible joint venture arrangements where the licence holders or dispensers don't get as much profit as in selling their own drugs, but the difference is acceptable.

The reason is that there is often more than one holder of a particular licence for an applicable essential drug in one or other area, and it is chiefly

the generic essential drugs we need to manufacture locally.

Global health agencies have a list of around 100 basic generic drugs that can be manufactured locally; some of their patents are 100 years old, etc.

The longer the time a drug has been marketed, the less the price another manufacturer will have to pay to obtain the formula for making it, but the trouble here is that basic medical drugs have a tendency to generate resistances.

In that sense we may not make much headway trying to depend on century-old formulas. Manufacturing most generic drugs requires a credible investment outlook, not just philanthropic global health goals.

In that case, as the ministry prepares for a PPP-driven domestic manufacturing of drugs, there are issues that need to be ironed out.

In many instances, such programmes start off with elevated development intentions, in this case import substitution. But many countries have courted economic crises with uncompetitive import substitution industries protected merely by the force of law.

We should not think that this danger is not present with us, far from it, as too many elements are waiting to cut deals, etc. This means that local manufacturing of generic essential drugs must be integrated in the global market if we are to obtain quality but affordable drugs.

South Africa reverses lenient position on fugitive Mozambican minister

JOHANNESBURG

SOUTH Africa's new justice minister Ronald Lamola has shown a creditable commitment to the rule of law rather than political solidarity with former liberation movements. He has halted the extradition of former Mozambican finance minister Manuel Chang to Mozambique.

Chang may now face extradition to the United States (US) on corruption charges in a €2 billion fraudulent loan scheme for the purchase of fishing and military patrol vessels by the Mozambique government. Chang allegedly received millions of dollars in kickbacks for abetting the massive scheme that also defrauded many international investors.

Chang was arrested on 29 December last year while passing through Johannesburg's OR Tambo airport on an Interpol warrant requested by the US and confirmed by a local magistrate. In January the US asked South Africa to extradite him to the US for trial, along with several other banking and shipping company officials implicated in the case.

Only then did Mozambique's government apply for his extradition to that country to face charges arising from the scheme that has devastated the country's tiny economy. In April this year the Kempton Park Magistrate's Court ruled that Chang could legally be extradited to either Mozambique

or the US.

On his last day in office, 21 May this year, Lamola's predecessor Michael Masutha decided to extradite Chang to Mozambique, mainly on the grounds that since the alleged crimes were committed there, that was the logical place to try him. Mozambique's Fórum de Monitoria do Orçamento (FMO), a civil society watchdog, launched a court application to overturn Masutha's decision. It doubted that Chang would face prosecution in Mozambique.

A day before Masutha's decision, André Thomashausen, attorney and University of South Africa professor of international law, pointed out in an Independent Online article that the National Prosecuting Authority (NPA) had 'gullibly' accepted the Mozambique prosecuting authority chief's assurances that Chang's immunity from prosecution had been lifted, so he could and would be prosecuted on returning to Mozambique. This assurance persuaded the Kempton Park magistrate that Chang was extraditable to Mozambique.

In fact, Mozambique's National Assembly had only lifted immunity for Chang's detention and questioning by police, not his arrest and prosecution. No formal indictment had been laid against Chang and investigations were supposedly under way - more than five years after his alleged offences.

On 13 July, Lamola's office announced that he had halted Chang's extradition to Mozambique, and was seeking a high court order reversing Masutha's decision to extradite him to Mozambique. Lamola was also opposing Chang's application to be extradited to Mozambique, and wouldn't oppose the FMO's application to stop Chang's extradition.

Lamola's grounds for this about-turn, his statement said, were that extraditing Chang to Mozambique would be 'unlawful and unconstitutional'. It would contravene South Africa's constitution and Extradition Act and the Southern African Development Community (SADC) extradition protocol, on the basis of which the extradition was sought.

This was because all these instruments - logically - only allow extradition if the suspect doesn't have immunity from prosecution and is in fact charged with the crime for which extradition is sought.

South Africa's justice department Director-General Vusi Madonsela's affidavit on behalf of Lamola to the high court is revealing. Thomashausen's article, which Madonsela cites extensively, suggests incompetence on the NPA's part in not fully grasping the implications of Mozambican law concerning immunity, and therefore probably inadvertently misleading the Kempton Park Magistrate's Court.

Madonsela's affidavit comes close to painting a different picture - one of Masutha deliberately ignoring such evidence. Madonsela notes that on the day before he announced his decision to extradite Chang to Mozambique, Masutha had received a memorandum from the justice department's principal state law adviser on international law.

It informed him of the concerns of Thomashausen, the US embassy and the FMO - that Chang wouldn't face prosecution in Mozambique as his immunity hadn't been lifted. Masutha was urged to order that Chang be extradited to the US instead. Madonsela expresses some puzzlement at why Masutha ignored this expert advice.

Reading between the lines, perhaps Masutha - a holdover from the Jacob Zuma administration with all its problems with the law - made his decision in line with the African National Congress's solidarity with a fellow former liberation movement, rather than the rule of law.

The then international relations minister Lindiwe Sisulu had already divulged months before the Kempton Park court ruling that Chang would be extradited to Mozambique. This reinforces the suggestion that the former justice minister's decision did not lean towards the interest of justice.

Masutha must have known that the ruling Mozambique Liberation Front (Frelimo) party would probably fudge the Chang case, fearing that any further revelations - including from a US court case - could embarrass the party in an election year. And Chang could also reveal in a US court the complicity of more senior politicians and officials.

Lamola's recent decision doesn't necessarily mean Chang will soon be en route to the US. FMO coordinator Jorge Matine told ISS Today that Mozambicans were 'delighted' with Lamola's decision and hoped it would pressure their government to lift his immunity and prosecute him.

However Madonsela's affidavit suggests that he and Lamola believe justice would be best served if Chang were extradited to the US. This is partly because he accepts US assurances that if Chang first stood trial in the US, it would be prepared to send him to Mozambique after that. (Although presumably only after serving time if jailed, and to either face new charges or to serve all or part of his sentence in Mozambique.)

Madonsela says it's unlikely that Mozambique would send him to the US after trying him at home (if indeed it would try him at all, one might add). Either way, it's looking more likely that Mozambicans may well discover the full extent of complicity in the notorious shipping scam. And possibly quite soon, as the US trial is scheduled to start on 7 October - one week before Mozambique's general elections.

Extradition is a complex politico-legal process. 'The ultimate decision is taken by the justice minister, so that's political,' says legal expert Anton du Plessis, Executive Director of the Institute for Security Studies. 'But the minister still needs to comply with the law, including South Africa's treaty obligations. That's why the immunity question in this case is so important.'

The Chang case hinges on the issue of immunity. The previous justice minister swung towards a political solution and Lamola swung the other way - towards the law. That bodes well for the future. Domestically, 'Lamola has lots of work to do if he wants to restore South Africa's commitment to the rule of law, and this is a good start,' says Du Plessis.

Internationally, the FMO's Matine thinks Lamola has created a good precedent for South Africa to tackle other corruption cases, including trying to extradite the notorious Guptas from Dubai to face charges relating to state capture.

Beyond that, could we also see some restorative legal action, perhaps even the revival of the SADC Tribunal that the Zuma administration helped neuter? Lamola has created high expectations. Can he match them?

DAR'S 150BN/- MIXED USE COMPLEX TO OPEN NOVEMBER WITH CARREFOUR SUPERMARKET

AN ultra-modern mixed use commercial complex incorporating shopping mall is set for partial opening in November this year with French supermarket chain, Carrefour opening its first branch in the country.

The 100,000 square metres Palm Village which located at Mikocheni beach in Dar es Salaam will comprise of the shopping mall, the podium, 180 residential apartments and four star hotel with 180-rooms.

Ivory Tower's Head of Real Estate Services, Maina Njuguna said the US \$50m project will be implemented in four phases with the shopping mall being the first phase while the phase two is the podium and will be opened in the first quarter of 2020. The complex will also incorporate a 700 cars parking lot.

"The mall is currently 70 percent let with big international, regional and local brands such as Carrefour. The apartment sales have picked up very much in the last four months," Njuguna said as the project beats Dar's glutted property market which has plenty of space empty.

He said phase three which will feature Palm Village Residency with 180 apartments have its first occupants in December this year while the 180 room four star hotel will open in the third quarter of 2020.

Responding to a question on the mode of payment, the Ivory Tower Head of Real Estate said, "Our finance partners, KCB Bank are offering mortgages for willing buyers. We are also open to buyers coming in with their own mortgage partners."

He said the price of space at the mixed use complex which is located in the commercial capital's prime Mikocheni beach front, is relatively high because of several factors including value added tax imposed by the government.

"We appeal to the government to scrap VAT on residential apartments. This is a big burden on buyers most who have to bear an extra 18 percent over and above the asking property price. This would really be a boost to the property development sector," Njuguna urged.

In June this year, Ivory Tower's chairman, Janson Huang visited parliament where he rallied lawmakers to buy a stake in the complex or lease space for residence or office accommodation.

"The MPs have shown interest to rent buildings business activities in the Palm Village. We want them to buy or rent," Huang was quoted by the media as saying.

Vice President Samia Suluhu Hassan laid a foundation stone for the complex last year when she commended the Chinese investors for putting up such a valuable investment in the commercial capital.

Asia growth steady amid global trade tensions

DEVELOPING Asia is forecast to maintain strong but moderating growth over 2019 and 2020, as supportive domestic demand counteracts an environment of global trade tensions, according to a new Asian Development Bank (ADB) report released yesterday.

In a supplement to its Asian Development Outlook published in April, ADB maintains growth forecasts for developing Asia at 5.7 percent in 2019 and 5.6 percent in 2020, unchanged from its April forecast.

The Asian Development Outlook is ADB's flagship economic yearly publication.

"Even as the trade conflict continues, the region is set to maintain strong but moderating growth," said ADB Chief Economist Yasuyuki Sawada.

The ongoing trade conflict is now having "discernible effects on regional investment and trade patterns," the report says.

The Manila-based bank said growth for the subregion's largest economy, China, is also unchanged, with forecasts of 6.3 percent in 2019 and 6.1 percent in 2020, as policy support offsets softening growth in domestic and external demand. The growth outlook for East Asia in 2019 has been revised down to 5.6 percent because of slower than expected activity in South Korea. The subregion's growth outlook of 5.5 percent for 2020 is unchanged from April.

In South Asia, the report says the economic outlook is robust, with growth projected at 6.6 percent in 2019 and 6.7 percent in 2020, albeit lower than forecast in April. The growth outlook for India has been cut to 7.0 percent in 2019 and 7.2 percent in 2020 because the fiscal 2018 out-turn fell short.

The outlook for Southeast Asia has been downgraded slightly to 4.8 percent in 2019 and 4.9 percent in 2020 due to the trade impasse and a slowdown in the electronics cycle.

In Central Asia, the growth outlook for 2019 has been revised up to 4.3 percent on account of an improved outlook for Kazakhstan. Central Asia's growth outlook of 4.2 percent for 2020 is unchanged from April.

The growth outlook in the Pacific, 3.5 percent in 2019 and 3.2 percent in 2020, is unchanged, as the subregion continues to rebound from the effects of Cyclone Gita and an earthquake in Papua New Guinea, the subregion's largest economy.

Developing Asia's inflation projections were revised up from 2.5 percent to 2.6 percent for both 2019 and 2020, reflecting higher oil prices and various domestic factors.

Established in 1966, the ADB has 68 members, including 49 from within the Asia-Pacific region.

Shelter Afrique asks Kenya to establish housing microfinancier

NAIROBI

PAN-African residential development financier Shelter Afrique says Kenya should establish a housing microfinance institution (MFI) to promote uptake of mortgages.

Speaking at the Affordable Housing Investment Summit in Nairobi, chief executive Andrew Chimphondah said such an MFI

fund will make mortgages more attractive while opening lending for housing units development.

"Most policies have an exclusive urban focus, hardly consider low-income groups and ignore rural area dwellers.

A government-supported housing institution will facilitate efficient and inclusive housing mar-

ket systems across Kenya and in Africa," he said.

Noting alternative housing finance products such as medium-term non-mortgage finance instruments, mini-mortgages and micro-finance should be introduced, Mr Chimphondah said borrowers can only get loans from conventional banks.

"For instance, only 2.4 percent of the Kenyan population is able to afford typical loan rates. At the end of December 2018, there were only about 26,000 active conventional mortgages in the whole country - the majority of which were granted to urban professionals," he said.

His comments come as Kenya

is implementing a housing development scheme that will see formation of a mortgage refinance company to facilitate cheaper mortgages. Kenya has a two-million housing deficit and requires 150,000 housing units annually.

The government has pledged to provide land and offsite infrastructure.

NBC teams up with IFC to graduate SMEs into industrialists

NATIONAL Bank of Commerce has teamed up with World Bank's commercial lending arm, International Finance Corporation to review lending arrangements of small and medium size enterprises in order to assist them graduate into industrialists.

NBC Managing Director, Theobald Sabi said in Dar es Salaam this week when opening the bank's 51 branch at Tegeta in the outskirts of the city, that in recognition of the SMEs importance in implementing government's industrialization agenda, the bank has already loaned 3,000 SMEs over 155bn/- between 2016 and march 2019.

"Because of the importance of this group, NBC in partnership with International Finance Corporation has undertaken a review of the whole process of giving out loans to this group. In a few days to come, NBC will come up with a better way of serving SMEs," Sabi said in a speech read on his behalf by NBC's Director of Finance, Gaudence Shao.

He said the country's third largest bank by net asset value,

deposits and branch network, is targeting to graduate most SMEs into agro-processors, recyclers and manufacturers of goods using commodities as raw materials.

"NBC strongly supports government's efforts to industrialise the economy and take the nation to middle income status by 2025," the NBC chief added while stressing that the bank has also widely given loans to existing large scale industries.

Highlighting on the new Tegeta branch, Sabi said it is implementation of part of the bank's long term strategic plan to improve services by taking them closer to customers countrywide with modernization of technology.

"With this new branch, it will be easy for our customers to access banking services at their convenience by getting personal contact with our experts to get financial counselling and business management," he stated.

NBC which was privatised in 2000 to South Africa Absa Group Limited which has a controlling stake of 55 percent is also owned by Treasury which retains 30 percent while IFC has 15 percent.

BANK SPENDS OVER 550M/- SUPPORTING EDUCATION, HEALTH INFRASTRUCTURE

EDUCATION and health sector have already received over half a billion shillings in construction material, desks and medical equipment so far this year from NMB Bank Plc.

The bank which allocates a percent of its gross profit to invest in community projects including disaster relief as part of its corporate social responsibility, plans to spend 1bn/- this fiscal year from its over 90bn/- profit last year.

NMB's Head of Government Business, Vicky Bishubo said in Dar es Salaam this week after handing over iron sheet roofing materials, desks and chairs all valued at 40m/- to six public schools and a health center in Kigamboni Municipality.

Bishubo said the 150 desks and iron sheets were donated to three primary schools in Kigamboni Municipality valued at 20m/-, namely Pemba Mnazi, Kibugumo and Gomvu. Other schools supported during the week are Ngando Primary and Lagangabilili Secondary located in Bariadi district of Simiyu region which received 120 desks worth 10m/-.

The country's most profitable bank also donated 170 roofing sheets valued at over 5m/- to Mwenge Primary School in Igunga district of Tabora region while Serengeti Hospital in Mara region got five hospital beds and mattresses, one delivery bed and 54 bed-sheets worth 5m/-.

"For many years now, we at NMB have been in the forefront to finance development projects owned by communities as part

of our corporate social responsibility. As I'm speaking here, the bank has already provided grants worth more than 550m/- in support of community projects this year," she said.

Speaking after receiving the donation, Kigamboni District Executive Director, Engineer Ng'wilabuzu Ludigija commended NMB for the valuable support while calling on other financial institutions and companies to borrow a leaf from the bank in supporting community projects. "With this material support, our education and health sectors will improve very much in delivering to the people," Eng Ludigija said.

In Serengeti, District Commissioner, Nurdin Babu also thanked the bank's management and staff for the support which he said, came at the right time as his district needs more than 9bn/- to complete construction of its 11bn/- district hospital. "We request NMB management and other well-wishers to continue supporting us finish this project that will greatly improve health services in our district," Babu said.

One of Serengeti residents, Charles Magiri backed the DC's observation saying, NMB bank is a valuable corporate citizens that has invested heavily in education and health in the country. "I also request the government to allocate enough money so that our district hospital can be completed on time," Magiri noted.

Expert touts latest Caterpillar brand as good for industrialisation

THE latest model of Caterpillar excavators will help power the construction industry and hasten the country's move towards middle income status by 2025.

Speaking in Dar es Salaam this week when unveiling a New Generation Hydraulic (NGH) of Caterpillar excavators, senior market professional, Gary Martin said the equipment has very much improved by the manufacturer.

"These types of Caterpillar are new, efficient and environmentally friendly to revolutionise the industry in Tanzania due to their economic effectiveness," Martin said.

He noted that Mantrac Tanzania Limited, who are agents of Caterpillar have officially entered the industrialization drive as championed by the government with the latest brand of equipment.

Martin reiterated that the new NGH Caterpillar reduces working hours by half while decreasing fuel consumption by 25 percent with productivity boosted by 25 percent. "It has taken five years to design this machine, and it was designed after suggestions from the customers," he said.

One of the clients who has already purchased and used the new excavator, Eliya Makundi from Sunlight Construction Company said with the acquisition of the new machines, his company has been able to save over 20 m/- monthly because of efficiency in fuel consumption and better performance.

Another contractor, Fenny Elisha of Sumaco Engineering from Singida, said after hearing testimony, he has already ordered for one excavator to try it out. "I have been dealing with Mantrac for so many years, and they have sold us six excavators before, now we want to try NGH Caterpillar," Elisha said.

SA construction industry in survival mode

THERE appears to be little light at the end of the tunnel for South Africa's beleaguered construction industry, with many major listed construction companies still fighting for their survival.

Basil Read, Group Five, Esor Construction and Liviero Group are in business rescue while others, such as Aveng, have been forced to down-scale their operations to strengthen their balance sheets and improve their liquidity.

The problems in the industry have been largely attributed to a combination of a lack of large government infrastructure contracts because of government's strained financial resources and problematic and loss-making contracts. This resulted in construction industry employment dropping by 3.6% year-on-year in the first quarter to an estimated 618 000 as the industry shed a further 23 000 jobs in the quarter.

Group Five's auditors, PwC, resigned earlier this month with immediate effect following the resignation of a number of non-executive directors of the group and several senior executives and key finance staff employees.

The group reported last week that its business rescue practitioners planned to publish a business rescue plan by August 30 after creditors last month agreed to extend the original June 28 deadline for publication of the plan.

Construction market intelligence firm Industry Insight reported this month that "we have most probably seen the last of Group Five" with business rescue practitioners telling shareholders in June their shares were basically worth nothing and the group was not in a position to fully reimburse creditors.

Industry Insight added that the contractors index was at 25.6 points at the end of June, which was slightly down from May, and remained at the worst level ever. "What this essentially means is that listed construction has lost almost 75% of their value or 'size' since 2008," it said. Industry Insight described this as "an absolute destruction of a sector never before seen on the JSE."

Group Five's financial difficulties became a crisis in December when the group's bank guarantee providers paid \$106.5 million to Cenpower Generation for the \$410 million Kpone power plant in Ghana in delay damages.

The group is still involved in contractual disputes with Cenpower and indicated earlier this year it expected a ruling on these disputes by the end of this year. Group Five's business rescue practitioners reported that since inception of business rescue proceedings, payments under certain guarantees have been called for and made, amounting to about R105.1 million.

"There have also been further notices received calling for payment under other guar-

antees. However, these notices are being considered and may, where appropriate, be defended. Updates regarding further payments under the guarantees will be provided in future reports," they said.

Selling off

The business rescue practitioners reported they were continuing to engage in many sale processes related to subsidiary companies, operating divisions, properties and/or shareholdings that may be disposed of to relieve the burden of the secured debt owed by the company as well as to provide working capital for the business rescue proceedings. Aveng has been active in selling identified non-core assets to improve its financial position.

This month it agreed to sell its Rand Roads business as a going concern plus the value of inventory for R30 million to Ultra Asphalt; its Aveng Grinaker-LTA Engineering (GEL) geotechnical contracting business to a newly formed investment special purpose vehicle for R7.5 million; and Aveng Dynamic Fluid Control

(DFC) to wholly black-owned investment company Copaflo for R165 million.

Aveng last month also reported the conclusion of the sale of its water business to wholly black-owned Infinity Partners for R85 million. David Metelerkamp, the senior economist at Industry Insight, said the amount received for Aveng Water was a reduction to the original selling price of R95 million and seemed a small sum of money given Aveng's financial difficulties.

Metelerkamp said Aveng's share price continued to flat line and hovered between 2c and 3c, which was a far cry from over R40 a share in 2007/8 and also down by almost 80% over the last year when the share price was at 10c a share.

Contracts

The majority of the more than 20 construction contracts Basil Read had at the commencement of business rescue had either been completed or terminated. The company's business rescue practitioners reported last month that three of the remaining contracts were continuing to completion, five contracts were in the process of being descope or ceded to other contracts and three had been handed over to the clients and the company was engaged in a defects remediation process.

They added that performance guarantees had been reduced from R1.1 billion at the outset of business rescue proceedings to about R744 million and the company continued to pursue a number of contractual claims valued at more than R200 million.

With the exception of the employees required to assist with the completion of the contracts, including the various Medupi power station contracts and the remaining staff at head office, all other employees had been retrenched.

Basil Read has relocated its head office to reduce costs, has continued to sell surplus plant and equipment, and is pursuing expressions of interest from a number of parties for its remaining non-core assets.

The group said the business rescue practitioners remained of the view that a full implementation of the plan would achieve a better result than a liquidation.

Nine companies weighing bids for Vedanta's Zambian assets - minister

LUSAKA

ZAMBIA expects nine companies to submit bids for Konkola Copper Mines (KCM) within weeks, mines minister Richard Musukwa said on Wednesday, even as a court case with Mumbai-listed Vedanta over its ownership was underway.

The dispute between the government and Vedanta started in May when Zambia appointed a liquidator to run KCM, which is around 20% owned by Zambia's state mining company and majority owned by Vedanta, and accused it of breaching its licence.

Vedanta denies that claim and says it will defend its assets in Africa's second biggest copper producer. It sought an urgent order in South Africa to prevent KCM from being wound up, and Vedanta was arguing its case in a Johannesburg court on Wednesday.

Musukwa told a media briefing he was confident the government could win the case with Vedanta in any country in the world, and that companies from Russia, Turkey, Australia, Canada and China were currently conducting due diligence for potential bids for the KCM business.

"Currently we have about nine companies," Musukwa said, adding that they had visited KCM. "The bidding process will start once all the companies have conducted due diligence and we are hoping this can happen within a couple of weeks," he said.

WHO declares Ebola in Congo a global health emergency

GENEVA

THE deadly Ebola outbreak in Congo is now an international health emergency, the World Health Organization announced on Wednesday after a case was confirmed in a city of 2 million people.

A WHO expert committee declined on three previous occasions to advise the United Nations health agency to make the declaration for this outbreak, even though other experts say it has long met the required conditions. More than 1,600 people have died since August in the second-deadliest Ebola outbreak in history, which is unfolding in a region described as a war zone.

A declaration of a global health emergency often brings greater international attention and aid, along with concerns that nervous governments might overreact with border closures.

The declaration comes days after a single case was confirmed in Goma,

a major regional crossroads in north-eastern Congo on the Rwandan border, with an international airport. Also, a sick Congolese fish trader traveled to Uganda and back while symptomatic – and later died of Ebola.

While the risk of regional spread remains high, the risk outside the region remains low, WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said after the announcement in Geneva.

The international emergency “should not be used to stigmatize or penalize the very people who are most in need of our help,” he said. Tedros insisted that the declaration was not made to raise more money – even though WHO estimated “hundreds of millions” of dollars would be needed to stop the epidemic.

Dr Joanne Liu, president of Doctors Without Borders, said she hoped the emergency designation would prompt a radical reset of Ebola response efforts.

“The reality check is that a year into the epidemic, it’s still not under control, and we are not where we should be,” she said. “We cannot keep doing the same thing and expect different results.”

Liu said vaccination strategies should be broadened and that more efforts should be made to build trust within communities.

The US Agency for International Development applauded the WHO decision and said USAID officials would “continue to scale up life-saving support” to end the outbreak.

This is the fifth such declaration in history. Previous emergencies were declared for the devastating 2014-16 Ebola outbreak in West Africa that killed more than 11,000 people, the emergence of Zika in the Americas, the swine flu pandemic and polio.

WHO defines a global emergency as an “extraordinary event” that constitutes a risk to other countries and requires a coordinated international response. Last month, the outbreak spilled across the border for the first time when a family brought the virus into Uganda after attending the burial in Congo of an infected relative. Even then, the expert committee advised against a declaration.

Alexandra Phelan, a global health expert at

Georgetown University Law Center, said Wednesday’s declaration was long overdue.

“This essentially serves as a call to the international community that they have to step up appropriate financial and technical support,” she said but warned that countries should be wary of imposing travel or trade restrictions.

Such restrictions “would actually restrict the flow of goods and health care workers into affected countries so they are counterproductive,” she said. Future emergency declarations might be perceived as punishment and “might result in other countries not reporting outbreaks in the future, which puts us all at greater risk.”

WHO had been heavily criticized for its sluggish response to the West Africa outbreak, which it repeatedly declined to declare a global emergency until the virus was spreading explosively in three countries and nearly 1,000 people were dead. Internal documents later showed WHO held off partly out of fear a declaration would anger the countries involved and hurt their economies.

The organization’s emergency committee will meet again within three months to assess the situation. Committee members will review whether the outbreak is still a global emergency and whether other measures are needed. **Agencies**

Japan ‘may take ROK wartime labor dispute to world court’

TOKYO

JAPAN is considering taking a dispute with the Republic of Korea (ROK) over its compensation for wartime forced labourers to the International Court of Justice as the deadline for seeking third-country arbitration passes yesterday, public broadcaster NHK reported.



The question of compensation for ROK for labour during Japan’s 1910-45 occupation of the Korean peninsula has soured the US allies’ relations, which took a turn for the worse this month when Japan restricted exports of high-tech material to ROK.

ROK’s Supreme Court last year ordered two Japanese companies to compensate the wartime workers in a ruling that Tokyo said violated international law. Japan believes the issue of compensation was settled under a 1965 treaty.

With no mutually palatable agreement, Tokyo has pushed for third-party arbitration, which Seoul has rejected. Midnight (1500 GMT yesterday) is the deadline for making those arrangements, Japanese deputy chief cabinet secretary Yasutoshi Nishimura said.

Nishimura (pictured) told a regular briefing that Tokyo had not received any word on Seoul’s decision. He added the government would continue to “strongly urge” its neighbour to accept the arbitration procedure.

NHK said that once the deadline passes, Japan would continue to push Seoul for proposals to end the dispute while preparing for countermeasures – including considering going to the International Court of Justice.

The case cannot go to trial, however, without agreement from ROK, Kyodo news agency reported.

Officials at Japan’s foreign ministry were not immediately available to comment.

Japan initially cited the dispute over compensation for the wartime labourers as being behind what it sees as broken trust with ROK when it announced tighter export controls this month. Tokyo has stressed that the controls were not retaliation over the forced-labour dispute.

In a separate report, Kyodo news cited Japanese government sources as saying Tokyo would reject Seoul’s request to hold another working-level meeting to discuss the export controls.

The most recent one, held last week in Tokyo, stoked tensions further as the two sides publicly contested the accounts of their frosty meeting.

ROK has appealed to ally United States to defuse the tension with Japan, warning of threats to global supplies memory chips and smartphones.

A senior ROK government official said on Wednesday the export curbs could hurt global technology companies including the operations of Samsung in the Texas state capital of Austin.

During a visit to Seoul on Wednesday, David Stilwell, the top US diplomat for East Asia policy, said the United States would “do what it can do” to help, but did not elaborate on what those steps might be and said it was fundamentally up to ROK and Japan to resolve their differences. **Agencies**

Legal clash at state capture inquiry prompts Zuma’s testimony postponed in S. Africa

JOHANNESBURG

PROCEEDINGS at the state capture inquiry have been adjourned until today following disagreements between South African former President Jacob Zuma’s legal team and the commission’s legal representatives.

Wednesday’s hearings were postponed after Zuma’s advocate Muzi Sikhakhane raised objections over how his client was being questioned.

“I have a view that my client was brought here under false pretenses. It’s clear, it’s been confirmed he is being cross examined,” Sikhakhane told the inquiry before it was adjourned.

The commission’s evidence leader and head of legal team Paul Pretorius accused Zuma’s legal team of wanting to “control how the commission is conducting its job.”

The commission’s chairperson, deputy chief justice Raymond Zondo, said both legal teams would



meet on Thursday to find a way forward before resuming on Friday.

“We are therefore going to adjourn the proceedings until Friday. I am confident that there are rea-

sonable prospects that a way forward would be found,” Zondo said.

A total of eight witnesses who have testified at the commission have implicated Zuma into allegations of corruption and nepotism.

Former Public Enterprises Minister Barbara Horgan accused Zuma of interfering into her work when she was the minister. She also said that Zuma preferred Siyabonga Gama to be appointed as the state owned entity Transnet CEO even though there was a better candi-

date.

Zuma said he couldn’t remember some of the questions he was being asked today.

The hearings of the judicial commission of inquiry into allegations of state capture, corruption and fraud in the public sector including organs of state was set up in 2018. At the center of the inquiry is the infamous Gupta family which has been accused of influencing cabinet appointments under Zuma’s administration. **Xinhua**

Death toll soars as flood situation remains grim in India

NEW DELHI

THE flood situation continued to be grim in several parts of India, particularly eastern state of Bihar, north-eastern state of Assam and parts of northern state of Uttar Pradesh.

Though official estimates were yet to be made, media reports claimed that the number of people died in the flood-affected areas was almost 100, while more than 8 million people were displaced and were given refuge in shelter homes or relief camps.

Food, clothes, medicines and other necessities were provided to the flood-affected by the respective state govern-



ments. Flash floods in Bihar were mainly caused by torrential rains in the catchment areas of Nepal over the weekend.

An official source in Bihar State Disaster Management Department told Xinhua over phone that so far 33 people have died due to floods in the state, while nearly 2.7 million people were affected. A maximum of

More than 125,000 people were evacuated from the flood-affected areas and rehabilitated in around 221 relief camps set up by the state government.

UN chief calls for actions to honour Mandela’s legacy

UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres on Wednesday said that the best tribute to Nelson Mandela is “found in actions”.

To observe Nelson Mandela International Day, which marked yesterday, the UN chief said that Mandela’s message to the world is clear and “every one of us can step up and act for enduring change”.

Describing Mandela as “an extraordinary global advocate for dignity and equality, and one of the most iconic and inspirational leaders of our time”, Guterres said that Mandela exemplified courage, compassion and commitment to freedom, peace and social justice.

Mandela’s calls for social cohesion and an end to racism are particularly relevant today, with hate speech casting a growing shadow

around the world, he added. “As we work collectively for peace, stability, sustainable development and human rights for all, we would be well served to recall the example set by Nelson Mandela.”

“On this day of reflection on Nelson Mandela’s life and work, let us embrace his legacy and aspire to emulate his example,” Guterres said in concluding his message. Each year, the UN observes Nelson Mandela International Day by promoting and engaging in community service.

Mandela was born in July 1918 and died five years ago due to a respiratory infection. He had been imprisoned for 27 years for his role in the fight against apartheid and became the first black president of South Africa. **Xinhua**

Putin’s decision on citizenship for Ukrainians is well-reasoned, Kremlin says

ST. PETERSBURG

UKRAINE’S plan to grant second citizenship to all ethnic Ukrainians is the country’s internal affair, Kremlin Spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters.

Similarly, in his words, the Russian president’s decision to extend a fast-track citizenship offer to all residents of Ukraine’s Donetsk and Lugansk regions is Russia’s internal affair.

According to Peskov, the Ukrainian president’s instruction to develop a mechanism to grant second citizenship to all ethnic Ukrainians from

friendly countries is “Ukraine’s internal affair.” “And the decisions that the President (Vladimir Putin) formalized in his decree are Russia’s domestic affair,” Peskov noted.

“You know, there was a large number of requests from these regions [the Donetsk and Lugansk regions] of Ukraine, as well as from residents of the self-proclaimed republics, this matter was raised during (Vladimir Putin’s) recent question and answer session, it was long overdue. This is why President Putin’s decision is quite well-reasoned and understandable,” Peskov emphasized.



He declined to specify how many people could seize the opportunity to obtain Ukrainian passports. “I can’t say, I don’t think there are any estimates. One can make predictions until he is blue in the face but those

assumptions will be of relative importance,” the Russian presidential spokesman said.

Peskov pointed out that “Russia doesn’t recognize dual citizenship.” “Even if Russian nationals obtain a second citizenship, they will still be treated as Russians, maintaining all of their rights and responsibilities,” he stressed.

Citizenship matter

On April 24, Russian President Vladimir Putin signed a decree, which eases Russian citizenship rules for residents of certain regions of southeast-

ern Ukraine. “Individuals permanently residing in certain areas of Ukraine’s Donetsk and Lugansk regions have the right to apply for Russian citizenship under a fast-track procedure,” the decree reads.

According to the document, the decision was made “in order to protect human rights and freedoms” based on generally accepted international laws.

On July 17, Putin signed another decree, extending the fast-track citizenship offer to all residents of the Donetsk and Lugansk regions.

Meanwhile, Ukrainian President Vladimir Zelensky has handed down

instructions to develop a mechanism to grant second citizenship to all ethnic Ukrainians from friendly countries and ease citizenship rules for people whose rights and freedoms are violated in their home countries.

Ukraine doesn’t recognize dual citizenship so those obtaining foreign passports give grounds for revoking their Ukrainian nationality. However, members of ethnic minorities in Ukraine have been willingly obtaining foreign passports in recent years. In particular, a large number of Ukrainians have already received Russian citizenship. **Agencies**



Russia ready to deliver Su-35 fighter jets to Turkey

MOSCOW

RUSSIA'S Rostec state corporation is ready to supply Su-35 fighter jets to Turkey if Ankara expresses an interest in their purchase, Rostec chief Sergei Chemezov stated yesterday.

"If our Turkish colleagues express an interest, we are ready to discuss the deliveries of Su-35," the Rostec press service quotes Chemezov as saying.

On July 17, the US State Department spokesperson said in a written statement that Turkey's decision to purchase Russian missile defense systems S-400 makes it impossible for Ankara to remain in the US F-35 fighter jet program.

The Turkish Foreign Ministry called on the US to reconsider the decision to exclude Turkey from the F-35 program.

The Su-35S generation 4++ supersonic fighter jet performed its debut flight on February 19, 2008. The fighter jet is a derivative of the Su-27 plane.

The Su-35S weighs 19 tonnes, has a service ceiling of 20,000 meters, can develop a maximum speed of 2,500 km/h and has a crew of one pilot.

The fighter jet's armament includes a 30mm aircraft gun, up to 8 tonnes of the weapon payload (missiles and bombs of various types) on 12 underwing hardpoints. The Su-35S has been in service with the Russian Army since 2015.

China has been the first foreign buyer of Russian Su-35 fighter aircraft. The contract worth about \$2.5 billion on the deliveries of 24 fighter jets to China was signed in 2015. The contract also stipulates the delivery of ground equipment and reserve engines.

Indonesia is the second foreign buyer of Russian Su-35 fighter jets. Reports emerged in early 2018 that Russia had signed a contract with Indonesia on the delivery of 11 fighters. Under the contract, Russia is due to deliver the first fighter jets to Indonesia this year. The fulfillment of the Indonesian contract ran across some difficulties related to US sanctions.

Earlier, Turkish Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu stated that if the US refuses to supply the F-35 fighter jets to Turkey, it will consider signing a contract with any other state, including Russia.

Boeing pledges \$50m to help families of 737 MAX crash victims

SAN FRANCISCO

TOP U.S. aircraft manufacturer Boeing said Wednesday it will give 50 million U.S. dollars in near-term financial relief to the families of passengers and crew members who died in two deadly 737 MAX crashes.

The money "represents the initial expenditure of a 100 million dollar pledge by Boeing to address family and community needs of those affected by the accidents," said the company in a statement.

Boeing announced in early July that it has set aside 100 million dollars to support education, hardship and living expenses of the families of those who were killed in the "tragic accidents" of Indonesian Lion Air Flight 610 and Ethiopian Airlines Flight 302 last October and in March this year, respectively.

A total of 346 people on the 737 MAX jets died in the two fatal air crashes.

Boeing President and CEO Dennis Muilenburg expressed "utmost sympathy" for the victims Wednesday, saying "the tragic loss of life in both accidents continues to weigh heavily on all of us at

Boeing.

"The U.S. airplane maker said it has hired veteran compensation expert Ken Feinberg to help oversee the distribution of the money to the families of the air crash victims.

Feinberg, who works for a Washington-based law firm, has administered many compensation funds for victims of several major events, such as the Sept. 11, 2001 terror attacks in the United States.

He will be joined by lawyer Camille Biros in managing the distribution of the relief money. "Through our partnership with Feinberg and Biros, we hope affected families receive needed assistance as quickly and efficiently as possible," said Muilenburg.

Boeing said the latest relief funds to be distributed by Feinberg and Biros will be independent of the outcome of any lawsuits.

The company is facing multiple lawsuits and federal investigations related to the 737 MAX accidents. The 737 MAX jets have been grounded globally since March this year over widespread concern about their safety.

Chinese researchers design smart energy harvester on human knee

WASHINGTON

CHINESE researchers have developed a device that can harvest energy from its wearer's knee and generate 1.6 microwatts of power while the wearer walks at a normal speed without any increase in effort.

The study published in the latest edition of Applied Physics Letters described the device that can power gadgets like health monitoring equipment and GPS devices.

A group of researchers from the Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK) used a smart macro-fiber

material, generating energy from any sort of bending to create a mechanism similar to the slider-crank used to drive a motor.

They attached the device to the knee since the knee joint has larger range of motion than most other human joints. Every time the knee flexes, the device bends and captures the biomechanical energy through the natural motion of the human knee, according to the study.

The prototype device weighs only 307 grams and was tested on human subjects walking at speeds from two to 6.5 kilometers per hour. It can be used

by climbers and mountaineers.

The wearers' breathing patterns with and without the device indicated that the energy required to walk was unchanged, meaning that the device is generating power at no cost to the human.

"Self-powered equipment can enable users to get rid of the inconvenient daily charge," said Liao Wei-Hsin, professor of engineering at CUHK and the paper's corresponding author. This energy harvester would promote the development of self-powered smart wearable devices, according to Liao.

Unbowed, Trump intensifies attacks on four Democratic congresswomen

GREENVILLE, N.C./WASHINGTON

PRESIDENT Donald Trump stepped up his vilification of four liberal lawmakers as un-American at a raucous rally on Wednesday, underscoring that the attacks will form a key part of his strategy for winning re-election in 2020.

Despite criticism from Democrats that his comments about the four minority congresswomen are racist, Trump went on an extended diatribe about the lawmakers, saying they were welcome to leave the country if they did not like his policies on issues such as immigration and defending Israel.

"So these Congresswomen, their comments are helping to fuel the rise of a dangerous, militant hard left," the Republican president said to roars from the crowd in North Carolina, a state seen as key to his re-election.

Trump tweeted over the weekend that the four progressive representatives, known as "the squad" - Ilhan Omar of Minnesota, Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez of New York, Rashida Tlaib of Michigan and Ayanna Pressley of Massachusetts - should "go back" where they came from, even though all are U.S. citizens and three are U.S.-born.

The aim, one source close to Trump said, was to make Democrats look as far left as possible to moderate voters as he girds for a tough re-election battle in November 2020.

"He is trying to make them the face of the Democratic Party as we move closer into the 2020 cycle and he's trying to highlight them as a fringe crowd as much as possible so it turns off your middle-of-the-road voters," the source said.

As Trump recounted past comments by Omar, who was born in Somalia and emigrated to the United States as a child, the crowd began chanting: "Send her back!"

"Tonight I have a suggestion for the hate-filled extremists who are constantly trying to tear our country down. They never have anything good to say. That's why I say: 'Hey, if they don't like it, let them leave. Let them leave,'" Trump said.

Trump spent about a fifth of his free-wheeling 90-minute-long speech criticizing the four lawmakers, to enthusiastic crowd response.

Former Vice President Joe Biden, the front-runner for the Democratic 2020 presidential nomination, weighed in against Trump's remarks via Twitter.

"These members of Congress - children of immigrants, just like so many of us - are an example of exactly what makes America great," Biden said on the social network.

Trump also derided Biden in his remarks and skewered other Democrats vying to be the party's 2020 candidate.

He repeated his frequent reference to U.S. Senator Elizabeth Warren as "Pocahontas," a dig about a controversy over her heritage that Warren and Native American groups have complained is racist.

WINNING TACTIC?

Trump's Twitter attacks initially caused some heartburn for advisers who felt he had gone too far.

But two said Trump had since offered a contrasting view, that the political views of the four lawmakers were socialist, out of the mainstream and hateful to their home country, versus those of the president and his flag-waving rhetoric.

"If the American people have to choose between the squad and the president, then that's an easy decision," one adviser said.

Trump, who during his 2016 campaign voiced harsh assessments of the state of the country, tweeted a video ahead of the rally that featured patriotic scenes of the president meeting Americans, with frequent images of the American flag. It ended with the slogan:

"America - One Squad Under God."

"Democrats are now the party of high taxes, high crime, open borders, late-term abortion, intolerance and division. The Republican Party is the party for all Americans and American values," he said in North Carolina.

The tactic follows a well-worn path for Trump, who called for a ban on Muslims entering the United States during his 2016 campaign. His proposal drew widespread criticism, but Republicans overwhelmingly supported it, and it was a factor in his victory.

Over the weekend, Trump inserted himself into what had been an internecine Democratic Party fight pitting Omar, Ocasio-Cortez, Tlaib and Pressley against House of Representatives Speaker Nancy Pelosi.

He first defended Pelosi, then attacked the four. That prompted Pelosi to defend her flock, prompting Trump and other Republicans to argue the Democratic Party had shifted to the left.

The Democratic-controlled House voted on Tuesday largely along party lines to formally condemn Trump's remarks as "racist."

Trump's attacks had a spur-of-the-moment quality around which the Republican Party later built a strategy.

The tactic had worked, said Barry Bennett, who advised Trump's 2016 campaign. "The Democratic Party last week was trying to distance itself from the squad, and this week they're hugging them, and that is a massive win for Trump."

British PM frontrunner Johnson vows to deliver Brexit by Oct. 31

LONDON

BRITISH Prime Minister hopeful Boris Johnson has insisted that he would take Britain out of the European Union (EU) on the scheduled date of Oct. 31, with or without a deal.

Johnson voiced this stance in his final Conservative Party

leadership debate with Jeremy Hunt on Wednesday.

Questioned about messages from Brussels that the Brexit deal brokered by outgoing Prime Minister Theresa May is not up for negotiation, Johnson said: "Where's the will, there's a way."

"We need to get our mojo



back as a party," he added. "If there is a refusal (by Brussels)

to compromise, if they won't change a dot or a comma of the withdrawal agreement, then obviously we have no choice to come out on different terms and that's what we'll do," he told the cheering crowds.

Johnson also said that Brexit will enable his country to champion trade deals around the

world for the first time in 45 years.

But the favorite to be named as May's successor would not be drawn on whether he would suspend the British parliament as a means of achieving Brexit, or whether he would call an early general election.

Such performance explains the economic dynamism and resilience of China, and also brings good news to the whole world.

Chinese economy is re-balancing, said Laurence Boone, Chief Economist at Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD). Her high appraisal of China's economic stability coincides with the general

opinion of global experts.

The value added of tertiary industry and final consumption expenditure contributed 60.3 percent and 60.1 percent to GDP growth, respectively. The value added of high-tech manufacturing grew by 9.0 percent, and the business revenue of strategic emerging services, high-tech services and technology services demonstrated fast growth, which increased by 12.5 percent, 12.3 percent and 12.0 percent respectively.

These data fully demonstrate that China's economic restructuring has continued paying off, with accelerated replacement of the old growth drivers, a full release of

the energy of market entities, and strong performance of domestic consumption and manufacturing. This explains why China is able to keep its composure when confronted with complicated and perilous situations.

China's economy has kept an interconnected relationship with the world. In the first half of this year, the total value of imports and exports of goods increased 3.9 percent year on year. In addition, the country maintained stable growth in the export to the European Union, ASEAN and Belt and Road countries, and the actual utilized value of foreign investment rose 7.2 percent from a year ago.

McIlroy knows this is not just another British Open

PORTRUSH, Northern Ireland

ON the final day of practice for the final major of the year, Rory McIlroy ripped a shot out of the light rough and began walking toward the green when he stopped in the middle of the fairway for a quick interview with Sky Sports.

That's normal for McIlroy at any British Open. Fans stood six deep, creating a corridor as he walked to the third tee on Wednesday. The grandstand was full and the gallery framed the entire par 3, despite heavy clouds that began to darken with the promise of more rain at Royal Portrush.

No, this is not a normal British Open – certainly not for McIlroy no matter how hard he tries to convince himself as golf's oldest championship returns to his native Northern Ireland for the first time in 68 years.

"You've got the best players in the world here, and I don't feel like I'm the center of attention," McIlroy said at a news conference before a media gathering larger than it was for Tiger Woods.

He is not the only Ulsterman who tees off Thursday in pursuit of a claret jug.

Graeme McDowell was raised in Portrush and was a member of Rathmore Golf Club, which is owned by Royal Portrush and shares the same links along the North Atlantic. Darren Clarke forged his game as a junior at Royal Portrush and now calls it home.

McIlroy is different. He is a four-time major champion and No. 3 in the world, and Royal Portrush is where he came of age in golf. It's where his father brought him for his 10th birthday, when he met Clarke for the first time. It's where he first delivered on his potential at 16 when he shot a course-record 61 in the North of Ireland Amateur.

"Portrush has been a very big – at least the

golf club – part of my upbringing," McIlroy said. "It's sort of surreal that it's here."

Just another Open?

It was the first time in 159 years of the British Open that tickets had to be purchased in advance, including two practice rounds. That brings the attendance total for the week to 237,500, second only to the Old Course at St. Andrews.

"I can't just put the blinkers on and pretend that's not all going on," McIlroy said. "One of my mantras this week is look around and smell the roses. This is a wonderful thing for this country and golf in general. And to be quite a big part of it is an honor and a privilege. And I want to keep reminding myself that this is bigger than me. And I think if you can look at the bigger picture, it sort of takes a little bit of the pressure off."

"I still want to play well and concentrate and do all the right things," he said. "But at the same time, just having that perspective might make me relax a little bit more."

A steady rain slowed the final day of practice, along with a stronger wind that gives this course its best defense.

McIlroy and Justin Thomas, Jordan Spieth and Patrick Cantlay, McDowell and others were among those who took in a rare, late afternoon round for being the eve of the Open.

Woods was a late afternoon arrival on the range, hoping to sharpen a swing in only his fourth tournament since he won the Masters. Before long, the rain returned.

"It's not quite as sharp as I'd like to have it right now," Woods said Tuesday. "My touch around the greens is right where I need to have it. I still need to get the shape of the golf ball a little bit better than I am right now, especially with the weather coming in and winds are going to be changing."

R. Kelly doesn't have freedom, money for this legal battle

CHICAGO

THE difference between R. Kelly's life in 2002 when he was last charged with child sex-related crimes and his arrest last week on even more serious charges was on full display when the R&B singer turned and slowly walked out of court.

Each step Tuesday was cut shorter than normal by the shackles around his ankles – a reminder of how small his world has become and how the advantages he once possessed have vanished. He was not posting bond and leaving by the front door to return to his life as an international recording artist as he did 17 years ago. He was heading back to a federal jail cell knowing there's a good chance he will stay there for months or even years before his case comes to trial, after a judge said the charges against him are too serious to release him on bond.

In the space of an hour, a federal prosecutor and Kelly's own lawyer outlined many of the ways the 52-year-old singer's life has changed. When he eventually went to trial in on child pornography charges in 2008, his lawyers convinced a jury that Kelly was not guilty and prosecutors couldn't prove that it was Kelly or a certain 14-year-old girl in a grainy sex video.

"You are almost better off asking what's not different for him, the situation is like night and day," said Renato Mariotti, a former federal prosecutor in Chicago. "R. Kelly is now facing an array of challenges that he wasn't facing years ago and the resources the federal government can bring to bear far

exceed anything he faced in state court."

For starters, the federal prosecutors in New York and Chicago and the FBI agents who have been working on the case are among the most experienced law enforcement officials in the world.

"He's facing a team of agents used to putting together complex, challenging cases against well-funded defendants," he said. "They did the El Chapo case," he said, referring to the federal probe that led to the conviction in New York of Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman, one of the wealthiest and most powerful drug lords in the world.

And unlike often financially strapped state prosecutors, the U.S. Attorney's office and the FBI won't be outspent, he said. The federal indictments in New York and Chicago accuse Kelly of kidnapping and coercing women and girls into having sex, producing and receiving child pornography, inducing minors to engage in sexual activity, and taking part in a conspiracy worth hundreds of thousands of dollars to cover up sex crimes going back decades.

Kelly, who has been in jail since Friday, was arrested on state sexual abuse and sexual assault charges involving three minors and one woman over roughly a 10-year period. As with his not guilty plea to the federal charges on Tuesday, he has pleaded not guilty to those charges as well.

Perhaps the biggest difference between the case in 2008 and now is the girl at the center of the charges. She didn't testify then, perhaps as Assistant U.S. Attorney Angel Krull suggested to U.S. District Judge Harry Levinweber, because Kelly paid her off. But in this case, she has already told her story.

"The victim has testified it was Kelly who did this," Krull said. The young woman told a federal grand jury that she and Kelly appear in the three videos prosecutors say they have, in which he repeatedly made her call him "Daddy." Prosecutors have five witnesses who will back up her account, Krull said.

"There is no doubt it is him."

It's not just that the federal cases are potentially stronger this time. It's that Kelly is weaker.

The two men who prosecutors say helped Kelly fix the first case have been charged with paying hundreds of thousands of dollars to recover child sex tapes to keep them away from prosecutors before Kelly's 2008 trial. They're no longer in a position to help him and could actually hurt his case.

Mariotti said he suspects that when prosecutors charged the two they did so thinking they might cooperate in exchange for reduced or dismissed charges. "I certainly think that was in the back of their minds when they charged them," he said.

And while in 2002, Kelly walked out of court and into his recording studio to make a string of albums before his trial six years later, on Tuesday he did not return to the luxurious Trump Tower where he's been living, but to jail.

Kelly's attorney, Steve Greenberg, said his client is being held in isolation where he doesn't even have access to television, and about the only technology he is afforded is a telephone for no more than a few minutes a week. That means Kelly, who has already been dropped by his record company and seen concert after concert canceled, has no way to make a living as long as he's locked up.

All those millions and millions he made during his long career? Between child support payments, hundreds of thousands of dollars spent in a costly divorce settlement and, according to prosecutors, money he paid to find and keep young girls and prevent what he is doing with them from becoming public, Kelly is pretty much broke.

"He has no money," Greenberg told the judge on Tuesday. In fact, he is so short of funds that after he was arrested in February he sat in jail until a fan put up the \$100,000 to bail him out.

Janet, Chris Brown, 50 Cent to perform at Saudi concert

NEW YORK

JANET Jackson, Chris Brown, 50 Cent, Future and Tyga have been added to the lineup for the Jeddah World Fest, the concert in Saudi Arabia that Nicki Minaj pulled out of because of human rights concerns.

The website for the event, to take place Thursday at the King Abdullah Sports Stadium, posted photos of the newly added acts alongside previously announced performers Liam Payne and Steve Aoki.

The Human Rights Foundation and other organizations have asked artists not to perform in Saudi Arabia, where gender segregation between single men and women is enforced

in many restaurants, coffee shops, public schools and universities. Other rules have loosened in the kingdom with women now allowed to drive and attend events at sports stadiums.

Representatives for Jackson, Brown, 50 Cent, Future and Tyga didn't immediately reply to emails seeking comment.

Thor Halvorssen, president of the Human Rights Foundation, criticized the entertainers in a statement Thursday to The Associated Press, saying it was "profoundly distressing that they have chosen money over morals."

He added: "These individuals constantly make public statements of support for LGBT rights and women's rights, except, apparently, when a seven-figure check is attached. The hypocrisy is breathtaking. Principal apparently matters to them far more than principles."

Minaj said she pulled out of the concert

because she wants to show support for women's rights, gay rights and freedom of expression. Human rights organizations praised the rapper for her decision.

Saudi Arabia saw profound change last year as a result of Saudi Arabia's Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman's top-down reform efforts, including the opening of the first movie theater and the lifting of the world's only ban on women driving.

But there's a hard limit to the reforms – as revealed by the brutal killing of Saudi writer Jamal Khashoggi by Saudi agents close to the crown prince in October and the reported torture of several women's rights activists in detention. While the arena for entertainment is widening, the space for political engagement and dissent has virtually disappeared.

"It's clear that, after losing Nicki Minaj on the basis of the Saudi regime's atrocious human rights record and their treatment of

women and the gay community, the Crown Prince has chosen to spend whatever it takes to give the appearance that things are normal and that this is just another music concert.

Except it isn't," Halvorssen's statement read. "It's a blatant public relations push on the heels of the pre-meditated assassination of a Washington Post columnist and the ongoing imprisonment of dozens of human rights activists. Saudi is engaged in a sophisticated campaign of distraction."

Over the past several months, the kingdom has seen performances by Mariah Carey, Enrique Iglesias, the Black Eyed Peas, Sean Paul, David Guetta and Tiesto. That's a stark change from when Saudi morality police would raid establishments that played loud music.

Infantino says African football will 'significantly improve' with FIFA help

CAIRO

FIFA President Gianni Infantino said on Wednesday that the unprecedented move to step in and jointly administer African football with the regional body CAF will "significantly improve" the sport on the continent.

Infantino also brushed aside suggestions that there was widespread opposition to the move which followed corruption allegations against CAF president Ahmad Ahmad.

FIFA is sending its Senegalese secretary general Fatma Samoura on a ninth-month secondment from August to overhaul CAF which has been plagued by chaos.

Infantino attended a CAF executive committee meeting on Wednesday where members were shown an 11-point plan.

Suggestions in the plan, seen by Reuters, included possible changes to the format of CAF competitions, a review of refereeing and a task force to improve stadium security.

Other points included a review of CAF's judicial bodies, full transparency of money flows and implementation of good governance principles.

"What counts is that we decide to cooperate, that the highest FIFA administrator is coming to work with CAF...to improve African football significantly," Infantino told reporters.

"This is about democracy. We take on board all comments of everyone and together we try to do our best. The only thing I ask is to judge on us on the results and not on speculation."

Ahmad was reported in March to FIFA's ethics committee by CAF general secretary Amr Fahmy, who was then fired.

Further allegations of fraud have

recently been made against Ahmad, who was detained and questioned by French authorities in June as part of a corruption investigation.

Ahmad has denied wrongdoing in several media interviews but has not responded to repeated requests by Reuters for comment on the specific allegations against him.

FIFA has confirmed there is an ethics investigation into Ahmad, although he has not been suspended.

The second leg of the African Champions League final was abandoned in May in a row over the absence of the technology when it had been scheduled to be used.

When the referee disallowed an effort by Wydad Casablanca, they stormed off in protest that VAR had not been consulted, even though they had been told before the game that the system was not operational.

Their Tunisian opponents Esperance were initially declared champions but CAF then back-tracked and ordered a replay. Both clubs have since appealed to the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS), asking to be declared champions.

The ongoing Africa Cup of Nations was only awarded to Egypt in January after the original hosts Cameroon were stripped of the right to stage the tournament.

CAF vice-president Amaju Pinnick said it was wrong to say that FIFA were taking over.

"We want to change the narrative from takeover to partnership and collaboration," he said. "People just feel that they are taking over but it's not the case."

"Basically, it's to strengthen our judicial, our governance and our fiscal discipline...its pure collaboration."

African club finals to change to one-match contests - Ahmad

CAIRO

CAF club finals will be reduced from two legs to one match at a neutral venue next season, African football boss Ahmad Ahmad announced Wednesday.

"The Champions League and Confederation Cup finals will now be played as single matches," the CAF president said on Twitter.

The first final of the Champions League, then called the African Cup of Champions Clubs, was staged as a single match in Ghana 54 years ago.

But every subsequent final of the continent's premier club competition has been played over two legs with the aggregate score determining the winners.

However, the result of the latest final, between Esperance of Tunisia and Wydad Casablanca of Morocco, has not been decided nearly seven weeks after the second leg was played.

Wydad refused to continue playing in Tunisia when their equaliser, which would have levelled the overall scores, could not be referred to VAR because the system had malfunctioned.

CAF presented the trophy and medals to Esperance only to order a replay at a neutral venue, a decision which has led both clubs to appeal

to the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS).

Ahmad did not give reasons for the change in his tweet, but the decision is a huge gamble as it could result in the club season showpieces being watched by tiny crowds.

When the CAF Super Cup, an annual one-off match between the Champions League and second-tier Confederation Cup winners, was introduced in 1993, neutral venues were used.

But the crowds were so low that the format was ditched after just three editions in favour of the Champions League trophy-holders enjoying home advantage.

The ongoing Africa Cup of Nations in Egypt has confirmed a decades-old trend of football followers on the continent backing only home sides.

Egypt drew capacity 75,000 crowds to the Cairo International Stadium while many attractive matches not involving them were watched by less than 10,000 spectators.

Malagasy Ahmad also tweeted that the number of qualifiers for the biennial Africa Women's Cup of Nations will increase from eight to 12 for the 2020 tournament.

THE final match of the 2019 Total AFCON is also a game between supporters of the Teranga Lions and those of Les Fenecs at the Cairo international stadium.

Faced with the Algerian tidal wave announced in the stands, the National Association of supporters of Senegal national team will be there to support the Lions.

Apart from the pharaohs' fans whose team were eliminated, it is Les Fenecs who beat the record crowd in the stadiums for the 2019 Africa Cup of Nations.

For the final of 19 July, "le 12ème Gaidé" (the National Association of supporters of Senegal national team) will not want to be outdone and feels ready to challenge the Algerian fans. To get there, le 12ème Gaidé president, Seydina Issa Laye Diop, who is in Cairo with a group

of supporters, said that the association is organized locally in Egypt and through the relay in Senegal.

But, he insisted that le 12ème Gaidé joined the Lions of Senegal from the third group match with initially a contingent of 40 supporters before 30 others came later. And to note that about 500 Senegalese live in Cairo magnifies the group in every game.

For the final, President Seydina Issa Laye Diop remains convinced that the President of the Republic Macky Sall, first "le 12ème Gaidé", who has always responded to their solicitation, will invest once again so that many Senegalese could come to push Sadio Mané and his partners in the continental coronation. Also, he hopes that their are airlifts to convoy many supporters in Cairo.

African Cup final much more than Mane vs. Mahrez

CAIRO

DJAMEL Belmadi sank to his knees, eyes closed and arms aloft after Riyad Mahrez's goal with seconds remaining put Algeria in the African Cup of Nations final for the first time in 29 years.

About two hours earlier, Senegal's Aliou Cisse celebrated a place in Africa's biggest game and a chance at a first title for his country in the same way.

It was striking how two coaches who are good friends, who played against each other in their early days, and who were born just a day apart, expressed their joy with almost carbon-copy acts.

Friday's African Cup final in Cairo will be headlined by the teams' Premier League stars: Senegal forward Sadio Mane of Liverpool and Algeria captain Mahrez of Manchester City. They have lived up to their reputations with high-quality performances at the tournament.

For Champions League-winning Mane or Premier League-winning Mahrez, it'll be a season to savor. They both have three goals in Egypt, setting up the chance of a definitive fourth from one of them.

But it's much more than Mane vs. Mahrez.

The coaches have compelling stories. They are young in the coaching game at age 43. They spent formative years growing up and playing in France, where they came across each other. They are former national team players for their countries who have graduated to the top job, which is uncommon in Africa.

It's also rare that they've both reached the pinnacle of a tournament nearly monopolized by foreign coaches. In 31 previous African Cups, there have only been four finals to feature two African coaches. It last happened in 1998 and before that in the 1960s and '70s.

"It's a great message that we have sent to those responsible for football in all countries in Africa. It's amazing," Belmadi said. "I've known Cisse for a very long time. We used to play against each other when we were both in France. To play this final against Senegal, against my friend, is amazing."

Belmadi played for Algeria in the early 2000s. He's been coach for less than a year but has taken the team to the final for the first time since the country won its sole title on home soil in 1990.

Senegal has no titles, with defeat in the 2002 final, when Cisse himself missed the decisive penalty in a shootout, the closest it has come.

Cisse captained that 2002 team, which went on to make the World Cup quarterfinals four months later and stands out as one of Africa's best.

"I have unlimited trust in my players, and I felt they wanted to achieve something," Cisse said. "They have done all that is needed to win. My players told me they will be better than us (in 2002), and they have been."

Both coaches have deep-rooted connections to their teams.

Belmadi was at the center of Algeria's celebrations after the semifinal against Nigeria. The coach knelt as the players surrounded him. Cisse was also the focal point for Senegal in the extra-time win over Tunisia as jubilant players jumped into his arms.

They have their own styles. Cisse wears crisp white shirts and smart trousers on the sidelines and embodies calm. Belmadi favors untucked T-shirts and tracksuit pants and is a whirlwind of activity.

They met in the group stage, when Algeria won 1-0.

"We know them, they know us," said Mahrez.

Underlining both teams' efforts in Egypt is a prolonged yearning for success.

Algeria's passage to the final was greeted by mass celebrations on the streets at home. In Dakar, thousands danced outside the official residence of Senegal President Macky Sall. The winners will return as national heroes.

Senegal was always one of the title favorites and is the top-ranked team in Africa. Algeria came in under the radar, but the expectation appears to be heavier on the Algerians now, with thousands of their fans in Cairo.

That's provided an extra element for the final.

Egypt has experienced revolution and horrific violence on its streets since 2011. The tournament has been played under intensely heavy security.

The only flash of trouble came when Algeria fans and local Egyptians – who have a fierce North African rivalry – threw bottles and goaded each other over fences separating them at Cairo International Stadium during the semifinal. Security swooped in to quell the trouble.

Large soccer crowds have made Egyptian authorities so nervous in the past few years that fans were banned completely from attending games. The 75,000-seat Cairo International Stadium is expected to be full for the final.

Mane, Mahrez emerge from Salah shadow to steal the show

CAIRO

THE Africa Cup of Nations in Egypt was perfectly set up for Mohamed Salah to lead his team to the title on home territory and crown his career but Algeria's Riyad Mahrez and Senegal's Sadio Mane have stolen the show.

The two players have been instrumental in leading their sides to Friday's final at the Cairo International stadium where Senegal will attempt to win their maiden title and Algeria the first since 1990.

It will be the second time they have met in the current tournament with Algeria outmuscling Senegal to win 1-0 in the group stage.

Salah has been voted Africa's Player of the Year for the past two years but his interest in the tournament ended in round of 16 as the hosts imploded and were knocked out by South Africa.

The 27-year-old almost seemed to be trying too hard, taking on opposing defences single-handedly as his team mates ran out of ideas.

Senegal, beaten in the 2002 final, and Algeria, on the other hand, have been careful to lift the responsibility off the shoulders of their star players.

"I do not like highlighting players. We need to put a little less focus on Mahrez if we want to make this a big tournament for us," said Algeria coach Djamel Belmadi at the start of the finals.

Mahrez has responded with three goals, two of them gems.

He produced a delightful touch in controlling a pass before lashing home a left-foot shot in the 3-0 quarter-final win over Guinea and scored the winner in the semi-final against Nigeria with a stunning free kick deep into stoppage time.

Mane has netted three goals although he has also missed two penalties, prompting him to abdicate responsibility for spot-kicks, but there has been no denying his importance for Senegal.

HAPPY RELATIONSHIP

Neither player had an especially happy relationship with the tournament before this year.

Mahrez scored one goal and played in all four games as Algeria reached the quarter-finals in 2015 where they lost to eventual champions Ivory Coast.

Two years later, Algeria were knocked out in the group stage without winning a game although Mahrez scored twice in the 2-2 draw with Zimbabwe.

Mane, also taking part for the third time, played two matches in 2015 when his side went out in the first round.



Two years ago in Gabon, he scored two goals but could not prevent a quarter-final elimination by Cameroon, missing the decisive penalty in the shootout.

Although both won major club titles this season – Mahrez the English Premier League with Manchester City and Mane the Champions League with Liverpool – they agreed that winning the AFCON

for their countries would be something special.

"To be in the final of the Africa Cup of Nations is something unbelievable," Mahrez said. "I think we have been very good in this tournament. We scored 12 goals and conceded two, that is the source of our confidence."

Mane, meanwhile, said beforehand

that he would happily swap his Champions League medal for an AFCON one.

"To win for my country, which has never won an AFCON, would be magnificent," he said. "I am even ready to trade a Champions League against an AFCON. The return to Dakar would be extraordinary. It would be my craziest dream."

Clarke enjoys emotions of Portrush Open

PORTRUSH, Northern Ireland

NORTHERN Ireland's Darren Clarke said he was ready for the wave of support and sense of history at The Open Championship at Royal Portrush, but was more emotional than he expected when he struck Thursday's first tee-shot.

The Open has not been held at Portrush for 68 years and as a previous winner of the tournament who lives in the town, the 50-year-old Clarke was given the honour of getting things under way.

"I didn't think I'd feel the way I did," he said after completing an even-par round of 71.

"But the support, the crowds, there was just something about it... When I was about to hit my tee-shot, I just thought, 'Wow, it's the Open Championship and we are back here in Portrush'."

"It was more emotional than I thought it was going to be, to be honest. I was very proud stood on the first tee, hitting that first tee shot," he added.

It was Clarke's win in the 2011 Open at Royal St George's in Kent that prompted talks between the tournament organisers and Northern Irish players, including Portrush native Graeme McDowell and Rory McIlroy, about bringing the event back to the course.

"It's huge. But it's not me. I think Rory summed it up perfectly: The Open wasn't about him; it was about how far our country has come," Clarke said.

"How far it's moved forward. The economic benefits of what this tournament is going to bring, not just this week, but the legacy going forward, what it's going to bring to the country.

"If you go back and take a look at some of the pictures 20 years ago, we wouldn't be standing having this conversation. And you go down the street, maybe not here, but you see police everywhere, you see Army everywhere, you don't see that anymore. We're very proud of our country," he said.

Clarke was also quite proud of the way he handled the course on Thursday, collecting three birdies from the opening five holes before a bogey on the par-five seventh tempered his impressive start.

"The first six holes I was really enjoying them and playing with a little bit of freedom, then after I made that bogey I got a little bit defensive, almost," he said.

"I don't know, I was trying to not make mistakes, as opposed to playing a little bit better. And then I'd have spells where I'd hit a couple lovely shots and make birdies and do some stupid things and make bogeys. I guess that comes with being 50, really," he quipped.
