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Minister consulting with media on polls coverage

THE Ministry of Information, Communication and Information Technology has pledged strong collaboration with various stakeholders, including media organizations and journalists, in conducting coverage of upcoming civic polls.

Jerry Slaa, the minister, issued this assurance at a meeting with media sector stakeholders, indicating that he expects to meet with the Right to Information Coalition on Friday, grouping upwards of 16 institutions.

The minister sought to assure stakeholders of the government's intention to protect a favourable environment for coverage of the civic polls preparations and voting exercise, as a torchbearer to the parliamentary and presidential elections next year.

The minister intends to hold meetings with activist organisations, saying there are 1,023 media institutions across the country, underlining that the media sector is cross-cutting and characterised by different orientations, all of which relate to policies, laws, regulations and statutory guidelines.

The statutory variations provide ample room for journalists to use the right to obtain and disseminate information without fear of criminal repercussions, he said, reiterating instructions from

BoT tightens oversight, delists 55 online lenders

THE Bank of Tanzania (BoT) has taken stronger action to regulate online lending services, receiving 16 applications for licenses but granting approval to only four providers that met required standards.

Mary Ngasa, an assistant manager in the BoT Microfinance Department, said in an interview that 55 unlicensed applications have been indexed and re-

ferred to the Tanzania Communications Regulatory Authority (TCRA) for removal from online platforms.

Licensed providers are now required to prominently display notifications confirming BoT approval, offer transparent loan terms and provide accessible customer support contact details, she stated.

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EU delivers €2.5m for clean energy access, in 17 districts

THE government has formed a 19-member task force

to assess the structural integrity of all buildings in the Kariakoo area following the tragic collapse of a building on Saturday, which claimed 16 lives, with nearly 90 survivors rescued from the rubble.

The move follows instructions from President Samia Suluhu Hassan in a televised message in the wake of the disaster, tasking Prime Minister Kassim Majaliwa with constituting a probe team.

The premier announced the formation of the task force during a ceremony at Mnazi Mmoja grounds. where the victims of the disaster were being honoured at the national and city level before being transported for burial proceedings.

Brigadier General Hosea Ndagala, the head of the Disaster Management Department in the Prime Minister's Office will head the team, while Melecky Mwano from the Contractors Registration Board (CRB), will serve as its secretary.

The premier said that the team's primary role will be to assess the condition of buildings in Kariakoo and advise the government on appropriate steps, as Kariakoo is a vital marketplace, not only for Tanzania but for neighboring countries as well.

"We must ensure the safety of its buildings to protect the lives of entrepreneurs and the public," he said, underlining that findings of the task force will help guide the government in implementing new safety standards and measures for the area.

He also provided updates on the rescue effort, noting that as of mid yesterday, 86 individuals had been rescued from the rubble while 16 have been confirmed

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dead.

Rescue operations are being pursued until every person is accounted for, he emphasised, affirming that the rescue teams had reached underground levels of the collapsed building, where voices are still being heard.

He praised the collaborative efforts of various institutions during the rescue operation, echoing remarks by the president in a televised message from the G20 summit in Rio de Janeiro, directing a comprehensive inspection of multistorey buildings in the central busi-

The inspection will focus on safety standards and ways to improve emergency preparedness in the instance of such incidents in future, she said, conveying her condolences to the families of the victims.

She declared the government's commitment to covering treatment costs for the injured and assisting with burial arrangements, asserting that public safety was the top prior-

It also has a component for the provision of vital equipment such as patrol vehicles, communication radios, high speed boats for monitoring charcoal trafficking along the seashore, and pilotless planes (drones) to strengthen observance of forest resource regulations for various stakeholders, she stated.

If successful in the pilot regions the project will be expanded to other regions, she explained at the three-day training session designed to equip forest officers, court administrators, magistrates and local government officials.

The project was designed in the wake of a 2020 study which showed that 63.5 percent of households rely on firewood for cooking, 26 percent use mostly charcoal, and only five percent have adopted natural gas.

The findings underscore the challenge of accessing clean cooking energy, the presenter noted, affirming that the study also indicated that the widespread use of firewood and charcoal has caused significant deforestation.

The 26 percent of the population who routinely use charcoal contribute to forest destruction and environmental degradation in their incessant demand for the product, she stated.


The project is also directed at educating communities concerning misconceptions about forest resources, she said, whereas Judge (rtd) Robert Makaramba highlighted the fragmentation of institutions managing forestry and environmental issues, with a view to foster effective communication and pro-

He proposed merging institutions under a single body dedicated to environmental conservation, citing Ghana's example of an energy commission managing all energy sources, including firewood and charcoal.

He said that penalties requiring offenders to restore damaged environments need to be instituted rather than imprisonment, envisioning a situation where an individual who cuts down a tree could be required to plant 100 trees.

Rajabu Hassan, the Legal and Environmental Action Team (LEAT) training coordinator, noted that LEAT is implementing a project on integrated strategies for improving forestry energy management.

"We've received 16 applications, and only four have been licensed. We expect others to comply soon," she said, elaborating that despite repeated public calls for registration, 55 unlicensed providers have been identified and placed under scrutiny.

Deogratius Mnyamani, another BoT officer, said that BoT assessed 71 applications, engaging providers and conducting thorough vetting before granting licenses. "Many microfinance institutions bypassed regulations when launching apps," he asserted, noting that BoT requires licensed providers to submit regular updates on their loan poli-

types, interest rates, repayment tos. terms and compliance processes, he said, whereas Dickson Gama, the central bank's acting microfinance manager, explained that oversight was initiated in 2018, addressing numerous fraud complaints from unregulated providers.

This informed the development of stricter guidelines, he said, pointing at violations of regulations such as launching unapproved apps, which resulted in disciplinary actions against several licensed enti-

On September 24 BoT introduced new guidelines to further tighten oversight of online lending, making it mandatory for a company to operate just one such platform.

Under the rules, providers are prohibited from sharing customer data with foreign entities, and restricts lenders to access users'

The rules also require that guarantors must be informed and provide consent before loans are

approved as well as restricting bor-

rowers from disclosing and sharing

borrower's information. The rules also require that interest or repayment demands before the agreed-upon due date are prohibited as well as ensuring that customer service representatives use professional language and handle

complaints effectively.

To ensure compliance, all licensed apps must display the provider's identity, BoT license number and contact details. BoT also plans to introduce unique identification numbers for registered apps to track compliance, he stated.

Noting that some countries require app stores to approve lending applications before they are listed, This includes details on loan phone contacts, messages or phowhich BoT is considering adopting across eight regions.

similar procedures, he said that the 2018 Microfinance Act and the 2022 Personal Data Protection Act provide an adequate framework.

They offer legal protection against harassment, defamation and unauthorized data sharing, where victims of online lending abuse can report violations to BoT for redress, he said.

A recent survey in Dar es Salaam revealed troubling practices in the online lending industry, including hidden loan terms, excessive interest rates - in some cases exceeding 80 percent of total loan amount and extensive harassment.

The survey also highlighted instances where unlicensed lenders publicly shamed defaulters or contacted their personal networks about outstanding debts, to which the central bank linked such harassment with 68 deaths of women

Media outlets should be empowered to carry out their duties professionally without interference, and journalists be enabled to carry out their responsibilities in line with professional codes and guidelines,

Media outlets should not be discriminated against based on religious or political views, and journalists need to be respected, he said. Media managers should oversee operations fairly, regardless of whether the outlet is public or private, he added.



MUTATIONS in malarial parasites linked to artemisinin-resistance in Southeast Asia have now been found in African children hospitalised for complicated malaria, according to a new study presented at the Annual Meeting of the American Society of Tropical Medicine & Hygiene (ASTMH).

It provides the first evidence that resistance to the lifesaving antimalarial drug may be emerging in the group of patients that account for most of the world's deaths from malaria: young children in Africa with serious

The study is published in the Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA) and led by researchers from the Indiana University School of Medicine, Makerere University in Kampala, Uganda the University of Pennsylvania and the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine (LSHTM).

The team found partial resistance to the malaria drug artemisinin in 11 of 100 children, aged 6 months to 12 years, treated in Uganda for a complicated case of infection by the malaria parasite Plasmodium falciparum. The term "complicated" malaria is used to define cases where the disease is at risk of causing potentially life-threatening complications,

known as cerebral malaria.

The children in the study received what is considered to be the gold standard for treating complicated malaria infections: an intravenous infusion of artesunate, an artemisinin derivative, followed by an oral combination of artemether, another derivative of artemisinin, with a malaria drug called lumefantrine.

The introduction of artemisinin therapies 20 years ago was a major advance in malaria therapy due to their ability to treat cases quickly and came at a time when resistance was already being observed to other available treatments. The first evidence of partial resistance to artemisinin was reported in 2008 in Cambodia and by 2013, studies suggested the antimalarial was failing to treat some cases. Over the last few years, there has been increasing evidence that artemisininresistance may have spread into East Africa.

While all of the children in the study eventually recovered, 10 patients who were thought to have been cured also suffered a

same strain of malaria that caused the original infection, suggesting that the initial treatment did not fully kill the infecting parasites. Two children required longer than the standard maximum of three days of therapy because they failed to clear their parasites.

Chandy John, Professor and Director of the Indiana University School of Medicine Ryan White Center for Infectious Diseases and Global Health, and one of the study's lead authors, said: "This is the first study from Africa showing that children with malaria and clear signs of severe disease are experiencing at least partial resistance to artemisinin.

"It's also the first study showing a high rate of African children with severe malaria experiencing a subsequent malaria episode with the same strain within 28 days of standard treatment with artesunate, a derivative of artemisinin, and an artemisinin combination therapy (ACT).

"The fact that we started seeing evidence of drug resistance before we even started specifically looking for it is a troubling sign."

Commander Kuzaga expressed concern that some drivers, frustrated by bureaucratic hurdles in the licensing process, resort to brokers who promise quicker or easier results. He emphasized that this approach is illegal and carries severe consequences, including the issuance of incomplete or

Police warn drivers on using brokers for licensing services

"Drivers are required to submit their documents directly to the Regional Traffic Officer (RTO) for thorough review. This includes undergoing a mandatory driving test. Only after verification and approval by the RTO will the Regional Police Commander authorize the issuance of a license," Kuzaga stated.

He stressed that intermediaries or brokers are not authorized to handle licensing matters and warned that those caught facilitating illegal practices will face legal action.

Addressing concerns about the lengthy and often complex procedures, David Jackson, a driver, system as a significant challenge, leading to delays and inefficiencies. He argued that these issues push many drivers to seek help from brokers who claim to fast-track the process.

Jackson urged authorities to streamline the licensing procedures to make them more accessible and efficient for all drivers.

Over 2,000 water meters stolen in Mbeya - official

Mbeya

UNIDENTIFIED individuals have stolen over 2,000 water meters and 50 sewer covers across various parts of Mbeya City, causing losses exceeding 170m/- for the Mbeya Water and Sanitation Authority (Mbeya-WSSA).

Additionally, some dishonest residents have been reported to sabotage water infrastructure through illegal connections, further deteriorating the quality of public services.

Gilbert Kayange, Mbeya-WSSA to this sabotage have been arrestmanaging director disclosed these details during a press briefing on the state of water infrastructure sabotage and service delivery.

Kayange noted that the theft of water meters and sewer covers has surged in recent times, although the motives behind these acts remain unclear.

In response, the authority, in collaboration with security agencies, has launched operations to apprehend and prosecute those respon-

"So far, 12 individuals connected

ed, and some have already been charged in court with economic sabotage. We will continue to take legal action against all those found guilty," Kayange said.

He explained that each water meter costs the authority 80,000 shillings, while a sewer cover is valued at 200,000/-. Water meters are provided free of charge to residents during their initial service connection.

Kayange urged residents to protect water infrastructure and report saboteurs so they can face legal consequences.

He also announced a reward of 1,000,000/- for anyone providing information leading to the arrest of those involved in the sabotage.

The director further warned illegal users to cease their actions immediately, as such practices often lead to water contamination and pose significant health risks.

"To address these issues, our management team is conducting street-by-street monitoring across the city to resolve citizen complaints and curb infrastructure theft," he added.

SA sets up team to help bring out illegal miners

AUTHORITIES in South Africa have put together a team, including mine rescue experts, to come up with a plan to bring to surface illegal miners

On Friday, a government delegation led by the police minister visited the site and engaged with the community and relatives of miners who remain trapped in a disused gold mine in a town southwest of Johannesburg.

"We need a much quicker process because it is risky and dangerous for them to remain where they are for a longer period," said Senzo Mchunu. "Now, in order to achieve that, not only do we need the multiplicity of agencies here, as is currently the case, including the South African National Defence Force. But we need the community—we need their understanding, their cooperation, and their willingness to confront challenges.

Mchunu added that they had been informed the mineshaft was 2,500 metres deep and that any intervention would be extremely dangerous. He also noted that his team was mindful of the possibility that the miners might be heavily armed.

According to the police, 369 firearms, 10,000 rounds of ammunition, five million rand (£220,000) in cash, and 32 million rand (£1.4 million) worth of uncut diamonds have been recovered from illegal miners since the government's operation

Officials have closed entrances to the mineshaft, which had been used to supply food, water, and other basic necessities, as part of a government strategy to force the miners to come to the surface and be arrested.

On Thursday, a body believed to be that of one of the miners was brought to the surface. Police stated they were working to determine the person's identity and cause of

Relatives of the miners remain torn between anguish and hope.

"Four of my family members were trapped in Shaft 10 and Shaft 3. So far, only my partner has made it out. The three others are still underground. I have no idea if they are alive because we've heard of dead bodies being pulled out of there. We haven't had a chance to see or identify any of the bodies. But so far, I remain hopeful and may get some sleep at night," shared Priscilla.

Xuna, another community member, expressed her outrage: "Some members of the government are parents to young boys. How would they feel if their children were underground, dying of hunger? Would they be happy? Of course not. But their children live privileged lives. The minister came to see the shaft this morning, and I hope he witnessed the tragedy and pain happening underground. May he have the heart to understand that these are also people's children."

There are no official estimates of the number of trapped miners. However, police initially cited local information and suggested that up to 4,000 people might be underground. On Thursday, a police spokesperson said that figure was highly inflated, estimating instead that about 400 individuals could be underground.

More than 1,000 miners have surfaced at various mines in North West province, with many reported to be weak, hungry, and unwell after spending weeks without basic necessities.

Kisumo village resident to serve 20 years in prison for wildlife offences

Biharamulo

A resident of Kisumo Village in Biharamulo District in Kagera Region, Fikiri Rugaila (43), has been sentenced to 20 years in prison after being found guilty of possessing government trophies and an illegal firearm.

Rugaila faced two charges: illegal possession of government trophies and unauthorized possession of a firearm, both in violation of Tanza-

The ruling was delivered recently by Senior Resident Magistrate Subira Mashambo of the Biharamulo District Court, who affirmed that the evidence presented was undeniable. She stated that the sentence would act as a deterrent to others engaged in similar offenses.

Before the judgment was handed down, Rugaila was given an opportunity to make a statement. He requested a reduction in his sentence, expressing remorse for his actions and noting that he had already spent a significant amount of time in custody awaiting trial.

During the proceedings, Prosecutor Edith Tuka, supported by Suddy Lugano, presented the case against Rugaila. The court was informed that Rugaila had been arrested in possession of various wildlife trophies, including the hides of hyenas, impalas, and buffaloes, as well as a firearm. These the Economic Sabotage Act. items were discovered during a special search of his home by officers from the Burigi-Chato National

The first charge, possession of government trophies, was detailed as a violation of Section 86(1) and (2)(C) of the Wildlife Conservation Act, in conjunction with Section 60, paragraph 14 of the First Schedule, and Section 60(2) of the Economic Sabotage Act, as amended in 2022.

The second charge, illegal possession of a firearm without government authorization, was based on a violation of Section 20(1) (a) and (b) of the Firearms Act No. 2 of 2015, along with paragraph 31 of the First Schedule and Section 60(2) of

The prosecutor emphasized the seriousness of Rugaila's offenses, noting his prior involvement in similar criminal activities. Given his history, the prosecution requested a severe sentence to serve as a deterrent to others.

After considering all the evidence, Magistrate Mashambo delivered her verdict, sentencing Rugaila to 20 years in prison. The court underscored that the sentence would serve as a warning to those involved in illegal hunting, poaching, or unlawful firearm pos-

Rugaila has the right to appeal the decision if he is dissatisfied with the court's ruling.

Nagencies warn of hunger crisis in South Sudan

United Nations agencies on Monday warned of a hunger crisis facing South Sudan, with returnees fleeing the Sudan war expected to have the highest levels of food insecurity.

The World Food Program (WFP), the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), and the UN Children's Fund (UNICEF) said alarming new food security data from South Sudan shows that 57 percent of the population will be acutely food insecure through the 2025 lean season, with returnees and young children facing some of the highest levels of hunger and malnutrition as economic pressures, climate extremes, and the effects of Sudan's war worsening hunger.

Meshack Malo, FAO country representative in South Sudan, said the emergence of the economic crisis and associated high food prices as a key driver of food insecurity sends a powerful message that it is time to collectively ramp up investment in supporting South Sudanese to produce their own food.

"This will not only reduce the household food budget but will also create more employment opportunities in the agriculture sector and increase household incomes so that they can seek more healthy diets," Malo said in a joint statement issued in Juba, the capital of South Sudan.

The latest Integrated Food Security Phase Classification (IPC), released on Monday, shows more than 85 percent of returnees fleeing Sudan will

be acutely food insecure through the climate crisis are the main drivers," next lean season, starting April 2025. The returnees will also make up almost half of those facing catastrophic hunger, as they struggle to rebuild their lives amidst an unprecedented economic crisis, severe flooding, and prioritization of resources as needs outpace funding.

According to the report, many communities across South Sudan will continue to struggle as the economic crisis, extreme flooding, prolonged dry spells, and conflict continue to interrupt gains made.

Almost 2.1 million children are at risk of malnutrition, up from 1.65 million, the report said, citing illness as a major contributing factor to the children's malnutrition. Almost half of all children included in the data collected had been ill in the two pre-

HE spectacular decline of the journalism profession is met with alarming indifference. The worst part is that we are getting used to it.

We are no longer surprised to read the grim tally of journalists killed in the line of duty, nor to learn - through an investigation by the Forbidden Stories collective that several of the more than 100 journalists killed in Gaza were clearly deliberately targeted; nor to hear that newsrooms are increasingly instructed to hide press armbands.

It seems entirely normal to everyone that security budgets are rising exponentially in organisations involved in field journalism.

We are no longer surprised to hear that one of the first actions of Argentina's Milei government was to shut down the Télam news agency, leaving 700 employees stranded, or to read that the newspaper La Nación lost all its government advertising revenue overnight.

The unfolding of the populist "playbook" no longer comes as a surprise to anyone: the media, alongside the judiciary, are the first

Incidentally, politician and economist Iavier Gerardo Milei has served as Argentina's President since December 2023.

We are no longer surprised to hear of the murder of a journalist in Mexico whose name was thrown to the wolves on social media or

serious trouble - but no one is noticing the suicide attempt of a German information taken out of context, have access to the material in case journalist cyber-harassed by farright trolls.

Journalists have now accepted the reality that anything they have published in the past could one day be used to discredit them.

We are no longer surprised that "factual journalism" is stigmatised as a front for complicity with the establishment, or that organisations devoted to it are sometimes called upon to pick sides, to abandon a neutrality which, of course, is only seen as a front.

Polarisation is undermining the legitimacy of these organisations, the worst part being that this process of de-legitimisation has already delivered tangible results.

We are no longer surprised by the often-apocalyptic tone of some media conferences, whether discussing the news deserts emerging in the heart of the United States; the declining trust in the media; the increasing job cuts, or the impact of artificial intelligence transforming search engines into answer engines, bypassing traditional media.

And this is not to mention the pollution of the media ecosystem by AI-generated "cheap news" sites.

We are no longer surprised that each 'breaking news' story has its counterpart in the form of fabricated or slightly reworked. No event seems to occur without

some conspiracy theory being grafted onto it. Destabilisation campaigns have become so common that they rarely make the headlines.

The same is true when platforms announce that they are deleting hundreds of thousands of accounts.

Disinformation has become widespread, daily - and factual journalism organisations have had no choice but to focus on the false, which has now become an integral part of the news cycle.

What is surprising, however, is that this does not provoke a stronger

Often, what emerges from the testimonies of journalists who have faced these difficulties is how lonely and powerless they feel.

For instance, where are the major voices that spoke out when the Forbidden Stories investigation was published? Look closely, there are really not that many.

For the record: Forbidden Stories is a non-profit organisation with the mission to continue and publish the work of other journalists facing threats of imprisonment or murder.

To achieve this, it allows journalists to send their work to the organisation so that other journalists

the original investigator is not able to follow it anymore.

Forbidden Stories partners with agencies such as Reporters Without Borders and Freedom of the Press Foundation.

So, if World News Day can help

Finding the right Stuff to keep news alive in New Zealand

TEW Zealand's news industry has had a torrid year, with widespread cutbacks and Newshub's closure. Amid the gloom and fragility, the country's biggest news outlet is pursuing opportunities to share news and content - and get paid for it.

Stuff, New Zealand's biggest news organisation, reaches 82 per cent of the population each month - an audience of 2.2 million. Last year, it "consciously uncoupled" the newsroom into two distinct business units: Stuff Digital and Masthead Publishing.

The Masthead operation produces journalism tailored for its subscribers in key metropolitan and local areas. Stuff Digital meanwhile provides news for the country's biggest news website, Stuff.nz, and produces a daily news bulletin for TV Three, the entertainment channel owned by Warner Bros. Discovery.

Stuff Digital is determinedly growing its direct relationship with readers - mindful of new legislation, similar to a law in Canada and Australia, working its way through the country's Parliament.

If passed, it could lead to

platforms being required to pay news organisations for access to news. Google has already signalled that it will no longer index news organisations in New Zealand if this goes ahead.

On the sidelines of WAN-IFRA's Asian Media Leaders Summit in Singapore last week, Stuff Digital Editor-in-Chief Keith Lynch spoke of his editorial priorities amid the challenges in the New Zealand news market.

Question: Explain the current state of the New Zealand news industry.

Answer: Economic conditions for the media are challenging. This year Newshub, the news service owned by Warner Bros. Discovery, was closed down. Now TVNZ, one of the public broadcasters (along with RNZ), has announced that it is cutting 50 jobs. It has been hard for the commercial players; the big ones being Stuff, TVNZ, and The New Zealand Herald.

Radio New Zealand, the public broadcaster, has had a significant cash injection recently, so they've been fairly insulated. But for the rest of us, it has been a challenging market. We've been honest with both our staff and audience about where we're at. And we know that

the most important thing is still delivering trusted journalism that matters for New Zealand.

New Zealand's biggest news websites, particularly Stuff and The Herald, are incredibly well read. There's been talk recently of a decline in trust in media here, and we take this seriously.

Stuff is the biggest news website and the seventh biggest website in New Zealand. We are not immune to commercial pressures, but we still have a loval audience and a really strong readership that is loyal to us. This presents opportunities.

What's working for Stuff?

We've had a really big year. We started off by re-platforming Stuff; we put it on a new tech stack to make it more sustainable and flexible.

We have also been developing some really interesting commercial partnerships: we just partnered with Team New Zealand and the Americas Cup to livestream the yachting race in Barcelona; we embarked on a commercial mission to find the right sponsors.

The masthead or publishing arm essentially our legacy newspapers and newspaper products - is also growing its subscriber base and converting print-only users to digital, which gives us different revenue

So it has been a hard year, but I'm optimistic that we have managed the newsroom really well, with the right reporters in the right place, a strong editorial strategy that is aligned with our resources, and we have alternative revenue streams.

Given the closure of news organisations, how do you balance the national agenda with local coverage; what's your focus?

Stuff very much covers the biggest stories happening right now in New Zealand. That is our focus. With regards to local coverage, Stuff will, of course, also look to cover the biggest stories in key local markets such as Christchurch, Wellington and Auckland.

One of the wonders of Stuff is that the biggest story of the day can be a global headline, like the US election, or it could be a rather light or quirky local story.

Have you made decisions about what not to cover?

HE 19th G20 Leaders' Summit began on Monday in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, offering prom-ising economic opportunities for Tanzania. The gathering, which features leaders from the world's most powerful economies, presents a significant platform for global cooperation and develop-

It is the first time the summit is hosted in South America under Brazil's presidency. The event focuses on addressing global issues such as energy transition, sustainable development, and reforming multilateral institutions, all under the theme 'Building a Just World and a Sustainable Planet'

Brazil has also introduced initiatives like the global alliance against hunger and poverty, the global mobilization against climate change as well as programmes to boost bio-economy efforts.

Tanzania among top 10 global tax inequality reduction performers

ANZANIA is ranked among the top 10 tax performers in reducing inequality worldwide, according to the Commitment to Reducing Inequality Index (CRI) 2024.

The top 10 countries in the category of "tax impact on inequality" with their pre-tax Gini percentage in brackets are Ireland (-11.3), Kenya (-8.5), Belgium (-8.0), Australia (-7.4), Argentina (-7.2), Tanzania (-7.0), Lesotho (-6.8), Tunisia (-6.2), Canada (-5.9) and the USA (-5.1).

In 2022, Tanzania was among the top five counties with the most inequality-reducing tax systems on income. The top five countries with their change in Gini were Ireland (-0.0595), Kenya (-0.0512), Tanzania (-0.0431), Lesotho (-0.0423) and Argentina (-0.0405). Their percentage points' change to pre-tax Gini was as follows: Ireland (-12.9), Kenya (-8.5), Tanzania (-7.1), Lesotho (-6.8) and Argentina (-7.1).

This year's top 10 inequality reducers collect a large amount of progressive taxation (except Ireland, which diverts revenues away from other countries), according to the (CRI) 2024 report.

"Half of these countries are from the Global South - and three are low-income - showing that states of all levels can reduce inequality through their tax system with the right policies," the report says.

The report measures the commitment of 164 countries and regions to reducing inequality. It assesses their performance across the three pillars of 1) public services (education, health and social protection), 2 progressive taxation, and labour rights and wages.

It says the progressive taxation pillar indicator analyses the impact of tax policies on income inequal-

ity as measured by the change in the Gini coefficient before and after taxes (measuring the degree to which countries' tax policies and collection are reducing or increasing inequality). It measures the overall impact of fiscal policy on income inequality, as tracked by sustainable development goal (SDG) 10.4.2: "Adopt policies, especially fiscal, wage and social protection policies, and progressively achieve greater equality."

The report says previous editions of the CRI have shown that, on average, tax systems and collection are regressive - that is they exacerbate inequality rather than reducing it.

"This is because of the high dependence in many countries on indirect taxes such as VAT/GST and excise duties. In

the CRI 2024, there has been a dramatic increase in this trend - mainly because much more VAT is being collected. The average increase in inequality caused by the tax system has doubled to 0.6 per cent, compared to 0.3 per cent in 2022."

The report suggests that although each country has the potential to reduce inequality to succeed, the international community also needs to take strong measures.

"It is encouraging that inequality is now being better measured and mainstreamed by international organisations, with a new World Bank inequality indicator and potentially a new inequality indicator within SDG10. But both the IMF and World Bank (and the broader international community) need to step up their efforts to support countries in implementing policies that reduce inequality sharply."

As government priorities, the report recommends developing realistic and time-bound national inequality reduction plans (NIRPs) to reduce inequality, with regular monitoring to check their progress.

It also recommends prioritising public spending on essential public services such as education, healthcare and social protection.

It says all countries, particularly lowand lower middle-income countries, should ensure their health budget is at least 15 per cent of total public expenditure and education 20 per cent - and that this spending benefits the poorest

people by improving access to and quality of education, health and social protection, so that they maximise progress to universal coverage targeted by the

Another recommendation is increasing progressive taxation by taxing the income of the richest 1 per cent, for example, to a minimum of 60 per cent of their income from both labour and capital, with higher rates for multi-millionaires and billionaires. "The wealth of the super-rich should be taxed at rates high enough to reduce the concentration of extreme wealth, reduce inequality and lower power concentration."

It also recommends developing gender-responsive policies to recognise, reduce and redistribute unpaid care work - and ensure that paid care workers are represented and rewarded justly. The public nature of care services needs to be clearly stated - that is the duty of the state as the primary provider of public

Working with the UN, the World Bank should systematically produce, publish and use data on the impact of fiscal action on inequality. It says the World Bank has a particular role to play, as one of the leading global actors supporting household surveys, and as the 'custodian' of the largest global inequality databank and of SDG indicators 10.1 and 10.4.2. Thus, it needs to produce more frequent and higher-quality data on inequality, including enhancing analysis of top incomes in developing countries using administrative tax data and other methods.

Another recommendation is reaching and implementing global agreements to tax super-rich individuals and corporations. It says the G20 and UN need to work further on developing better international standards to tax super-rich individuals and multinationals more effectively, through minimum effective tax rates on their income and wealth, and with a fair share of the resulting revenues coming to lower-income countries.

Lastly, it also recommends taking urgent measures to tackle the debt crisis and increase concessional financing flows. It says the international community led by the G20, IMF, the World Bank and the UN need to take urgent measures to reduce debt service burdens by bringing down global interest rates, reducing borrowing costs for middle-income countries that have to go to markets to fund their budgets, and providing long-term rescheduling or cancellation for lower-income countries.

INCE the start of the Israel-Hezbollah war, hundreds of thousands of Lebanese have fled their homes because of the fighting. But the residents of one town right in the combat zone have decided to stay.

Rmeish, just 2km (1.2 miles) from the border, is home to 7,000 Maronite Christians - and surrounded by firing on all sides.

"There's lots of damage. Maybe 90 percent of houses have damage of some kind, glass smashed and cracks in the walls. I don't know what's going to happen when winter comes," says Jiries al-Alam, a farmer who also works as an undertaker with the town's church.

"We are determined to stay but hardly anyone sleeps at night because of the air strikes. Thankfully, there's been no deaths among the residents so far, but 200 of my cattle died from the military flares," he adds.

A day after Hamas launched its unprecedented attack on southern Israel from Gaza on 7 October 2023, its Lebanese ally Hezbollah began launching rockets into northern Israel, which in turn, started to strike

The residents of Rmeish began seeing rockets flying in both directions above them.

"Lots of families raised white flags on their homes and cars to say that they are peaceful and have no link to what is happening," says Father George al-Ameel, 44, a priest and teacher in the town.

"We want to stay in our homes and don't want any war in our town.'

After Israel began its ground invasion of Lebanon on 1 October this year, the war drew closer to Rmeish, with heavy fighting taking place in two villages both less than 1.6km away.

"We were staying in our house for months, then the air strikes started getting very close and suddenly our house was hit, we were forced to leave in the middle of the night," says Rasha Makhbour, 38.

"People's work has stopped and no-one goes out, our children's school is shut, everything has changed." Rasha's family of six moved to another house in the centre of town after theirs became uninhabitable.

"We believe the rockets that hit our home came from the south, not from our country," she says.

The Israel Defense Forces told the BBC that there were "no known IDF strikes" on Rmeish during the dates Rasha Makhbour's house was damaged, claiming it was a "failed launch by Hezbollah".

Israel has issued a general evacuation order for the south of Lebanon since its ground invasion began. The UN says over 640,000 people have been displaced from there as they flee the fighting.

The Israeli government says that its military goals in southern Lebanon are to push back Hezbollah and return 60,000 Israelis displaced from its northern

border towns to their homes.

On the border with Israel, Rmeish is the only Lebanese town that has not been directly ordered to leave.

While neither side has directly threatened the residents of Rmeish during the conflict, they have had their loyalty to Lebanon questioned.

"There have been voices under the table spreading rumours that our presence here is evidence of our collaboration with Israel, the enemy. We completely reject this," says Father al-

It is a message reiterated by Rmeish's mayor, Milad al-Alam.

"We've had no guarantees of safety

from any side," he says. "Our town is peaceful, and our only cause is to stay for our identity and our country."

Until the start of Israel's ground invasion, a Lebanese army unit had stayed in Rmeish and helped organise movement in and out of the town. But as Israeli forces moved to cross the border, the Lebanese army - which is not directly involved in the war - decided to pull out of Rmeish, much to the distress of locals.

The Lebanese army said it rejected the description that they have 'withdrawn' from border locations, referring the BBC to a statement that the army is "repositioning" a number of military

units in the south.

Then at the end of October, the main route out of Rmeish itself was hit - leaving residents feeling further isolated and vulnerable. Since then, just one aid convoy has reached the town with the coordination of UN peacekeeping forces, the Unifil mission said.

"We have needs for fuel, foods and medicines, there was a delivery coming from Tyre that had to turn around," says Father al-Ameel. "If someone is hurt, there's no hospital for serious medical care."

Mayor Al-Alam tells us he is optimistic that the route out of town will be regularly usable again soon, so they can fill have to."

"The situation is really bad. There are no goods, no food or fuel coming through. We're starting to see items going missing from the shelves," says Jiries al-Alam, the town undertaker.

Marco Rubio: Trump's foreign policy pick might be a hopeful sign for Nato

LMOST all of Donald for critical positions within his presidential administration have been non-traditional. Fox News presenter Pete Hegseth was just named as Trump's possible defence secretary. Alongside Elon Musk, pharmaceutical company entrepreneur Vivek Ramaswamy has been tapped to lead a newly named Department of Government Efficiency.

With little background in border protection, South Dakota governor Kristi Noem has been nominated as the director of the Department of Homeland Security. Linda Mc-Mahon, World Wrestling Entertainment co-founder has been named Trump's pick for secretary of commerce.

All of these people have been incredibly loyal to Trump. Few have experience

Rubio on Nato

While Rubio has clearly changed his tune on Ukraine to align with Trump, he is not in lockstep with Trump on Nato. In fact, Rubio cosponsored legislation alongside Democratic senator Tim



Kaine, that would make it more difficult for Trump to withdraw from Nato by requiring two-thirds of the Senate to ratify withdrawal.

As Trump has notoriously been critical of Nato, this is likely to be an area of disagreement between the two, but might be seen as a hopeful sign by other Nato member nations.

Trump, however, seems to be willing to look past this because he agrees with Rubio's hawkish approach to China and Iran. Rubio has proposed banning companies controlled by the Chinese Communist Party or the Chinese military from accessing US capital markets.

Rubio also advocated that electric cars that use Chinese technology not receive subsidies, and sponsored a law to prevent the import of Chinese products that were manufactured with forced labour.

Rubio also was instrumental in cracking down on Venezuela. Rubio has made clear his position that Venezuela has become a "narco"state that cannot be negotiated

Rubio has clarified that all options should be on the table when dealing with Venezuela, and thus has not ruled out a military response to remove Venezuelan dictator Nicolas Maduro from power. Though it's unlikely that the US would invade Venezuela, Rubio will likely advocate for much harsher sanctions against the country.

So what best characterises Rubio's foreign policy? He definitely wants to take a tough approach towards America's adversaries, but wouldn't advocate military invasions.

ATC students build an electric vehicle charged using power outlets at home

HE Most challenging thing about electric cars at the moment should be the charging stations which seem to be almost lacking in Tanzania, thus discouraging most people from shifting to engine-less vehicles.

However this is now changing because students at the Arusha Science Secondary School have come up with a new electric car system which allows the vehicles to be charged from any domestic power outlet using ordinary three-pin AC or DC plug receptacles and wall sockets.

To demonstrate that, the clever students of Arusha have converted a one ton pickup truck into an electric vehicle which can be charged at home, pub or anywhere where there are power

charged remotely using large power banks, available in shops, quite a revolution.

"Our students are working to make things easier for people planning to convert into green transportation," explained Godlisten Lema, the Arusha Science teacher who heads the Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) department of Information Communication Technology (ICT) at the institu-

"From a single charge, which takes an average of six hours to juice up the lithium ion battery which powers the electric motor," added Michael Pendaeli Sikawa, one of the students undertaking the electric car project.

Another student, Diana Onesmo, boasted that the Arusha Science

In fact, the truck can even be

devised vehicle can travel over 70 kilometers, or more if not loaded at the modest speed of 80 kilometers per hour in total silence.

This is the second clean energy car that the Arusha Science students have built.

The first, which is also a pickup truck, a solar powered vehicle produced in 2022 and the car is still running to date.

"This electric car system is still in the development stage in that it currently applies to mini truck vehicles with a rear wheel drive set up and manual steering system," revealed Innocent Samuel Mtei, who is also an Arusha Science stu-

The system can be fitted in vehicles such as Suzuki Every, Honda Acty, Daihatsu Hijet, Mazda Porter Cab, Subaru Sambar, Isuzu mini truck, Tata Super Ace Mint Mini Truck and Nissan NT100/NV100 Clipper and their vans equivalents.

For the prototype however the students have used a 1994 model of Suzuki Carry truck which they replaced the engine with an electric motor and ditching the gear

The blue coloured truck moves very smoothly, being much lighter and silent, but still lugs heavy cargo and climbs hills with ease.

The fact that the electric motor is perched directly onto the rear axle next to the differential hub, it

powers the wheels directly reducing the possibility of the car getting stuck in sand or mud.

As for the student, they advise that, if one happens to have an old pickup truck with a dead engine, they should not throw them away or turn the cars into scrap but rather take them to Arusha science where they can be given new lease of life to become clean and greener form of transportation.

ZEC set-up needs gender equality for trustworthy electoral process

HE Zanzibar Electoral Commission (ZEC) plays a crucial role in overseeing elections in Zanzibar, ensuring they are fair and transparent. As a government body, the commission is responsible for organizing and managing elections, maintaining the integrity of the electoral system, and promoting good governance. This work is vital for building public trust in the political process and ensuring that every voice is heard.

One significant issue within the commission is the limited representation of women. From 1993 to 1998, there was only one female member, and this pattern has continued in subsequent terms, including 2003-2007, 2008-2013, 2013-2018, and 2018-2023. In the current 2023-2027 term, two women have been appointed, yet no woman has ever held the role of chairperson or vice-chairperson, raising questions about gender equality in leadership roles.

Women make up 51 percent of Zanzibar's population, with men comprising 49 percent, according to the 2022 Population and Housing Census in Zanzibar. This imbalance underscores the importance of including women's voices in decision-making within the electoral process.

Efforts to address gender representation within the Zanzibar Electoral Commission have been met with silence from many current members, stifling discussions on gender equality and leaving important issues unaddressed. This lack of diverse perspectives results in missed opportunities for a more inclusive electoral system.

Jokha Makame, the only woman in the commission during the 2018-2023 term, shared her experience, noting that true gender equity is still lacking. "I expected to see four or three women in the commission. I was very eager to see women in leadership, and whenever I had the opportunity, I would encourage them to step forward in their constituencies to seek positions and not to hesitate. I have worked hard for this, but any other woman can do the same. I believe women are attentive, honest, trustworthy, and capable."

Her words underscore the need for more female voices in governance and advocate for structural changes to achieve greater equality.

Khamis Mbeto Khamis, Secretary of the Special NEC Committee for Zanzibar's Department of Ideology and Publicity, said, "We cannot question the President's decisions on this matter; he makes these selections, and our responsibility is to follow the instructions given."

Similarly, Masha Ramadhan, a shehia coordinator from Uzini Central District in Unguja, stated, "The President selected the Commission members fairly; if it has more men than women that is how he sees it fit."

This acceptance of unequal representation sidelines women's contributions and limits their influence in critical decisions. Such an environment can cause women's needs and perspectives to be overlooked, reinforcing traditional gender roles and hindering progress toward a fairer society. Without efforts to promote inclusivity, this cycle of exclusion may persist, limiting women's opportunities to lead.

Equal representation has been a long-standing



goal for women, especially for the Tanzania Media Women's Association, Zanzibar (TAMWA-Zanzibar), since 2010. Their advocacy aims to amplify the voices of all women in Zanzibar, working with other NGOs to promote gender equity. However, the effectiveness of these efforts in meeting the needs of the majority of women for equal representation remains a question.

Dr Mzuri Issa, Director of TAMWA Zanzibar, supports women in politics, stating, "The situation is still unsatisfactory regarding women's positions in the Commission; there is a need for more representation of women on that Com-

She added: "The commission must also ensure that all its committees achieve gender balance. Efforts should begin with their laws and policies to ensure that equality is integrated throughout, as the current implementation is still not substantial enough."

Since 1993, Zanzibar's situation has not progressed as much as in other East African countries. For instance, Uganda has made notable strides in including women in their electoral commission, appointing Hajjat Aisha Lubega as deputy chairperson. Kenya has also shown progress. This contrast highlights the importance of learning from successful examples in the region.

Men have also voiced support for equal representation. Dadi Kombo Maalim, a Male Change Agent, said, "I believe that even the chairperson of the Commission should be a

woman at this point because we have already seen the great capabilities of women through President Samia Suluhu Has-

Dadi emphasized that this shift is essential for effective leadership, demonstrating how male allies can help achieve gender equality for everyone's benefit.

Other advocates also stress the importance of women's inclusion. Hawra Shamte, communications officer for Jumuiya ya Wanawake wenye Ulemavu Zanzibar (JUWAUZA), emphasized, "There are two positions allocated to opposition parties within the Commission; they have a chance to recommend women members. They should ensure that capable women are included, and they will see the benefits." She noted, "Diversity in leadership leads to better deci-

sion-making and more effective governance."

Hawra added, "Our goal as activists is to fill all leadership positions, not just the Electoral Commission. We aim for a 50-50 representation by 2030. However, with only a few years left, it is clear that this agenda is falling behind in implementation.'

Asha Aboud, former chairperson of the Association of NGOs Zanzibar (ANGOZA) and a long-time advocate for women's leadership, stated, "This is not just about equality; having two positions for women out of seven means there's

She further said, "When we discuss gender, we must include women, men, people with disabilities, the elderly, and youth. We need representatives from all these groups so that each group's rights are recognized more easily."

For meaningful progress in gender representation within the Zanzibar Electoral Commission, government officials, civil society organizations, and community members need to advocate for reforms in laws and policies that promote gender fairness in appointing commissioners.

The Zanzibar Electoral Commission (ZEC) was formed on March 26, 1993, under Article 119 (1) of the Zanzibar Constitution of 1984 and Section 4 of the Elections Act No. 11 of 1984. It is led by a Chairperson appointed by the President of Zanzibar, a vice-chairperson, and a lawyer among its seven members, with two representatives from opposition parties.

Today's crisis of teen pregnancies, births is controllable and stoppable

URING my radio session that focuses on the untold stories of teen mothers, Sheila shared her heart-touching story. After unintentional unprotected sex, she said she was denied emergency contraceptive pills at the health center, and so became a mother at age 15. She is far from alone.

The World Health Organization (WHO) reported that in 2023, birth rate among teenagers of 10-14 years was estimated at 1.5 per 1000 women. The same report shows that in 2019, around 21 million teen pregnancies were reported in lower- and middle-income countries and 55 percent ended up in unsafe abortions.

The report also shows the estimated teen birth rate was 97 per 1000 adolescent in the WHO African Region compared to 13.1 per 1000 adolescent girls in the European Region. There is also a variation of teen birth rates in countries, like Zambia where teen childbearing incidence varies from 14.9 percent in Lusaka to 42.5 percent in the Southern region.

The actual number of teen childbirths continues to rise in Rwanda, where recent data show that teenage pregnancies have increased by 200% in the last ten years. In 2023, Over 22,055 cases of teen pregnancies were reported in Rwanda, with 39.4 percent of contribution to school dropout rate among high school girls.

Teen birth is troubling for many reasons, including the health risks. Indeed, in my work as a midwife, I see firsthand how fatal risks can arise for both the mother and baby when the mother is a teenager. This can include permanent genital and urinary systemic impairments. An actual impairment happened to Sheila.

Teen mothers experience social and cultural discrimination, stigma, family rejection, and genderbased violence and abuse. These issues disturb their mental health, and lead to increased cases of suicide among teen mothers, several times Sheila said attempted.

Earlier this year, the WHO shared a clear message around the importance of addressing this problem: "Preventing pregnancy among adolescents ... is foundational to achieving positive health outcomes across



the life course and imperative for achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) related to maternal and newborn health".

The evidence and realities echo loudly that the issue of teen pregnancy remains an incontrollable public health concern around the globe and in the region, and it requires innovative changes in mitigation strategies. We must do more to address it.

Indeed, parents, teachers, and church leaders should not wait unup to act. Teaching children early

about sexual and reproductive youth who were stuck at home. "Time for Teenagers" health is one way to prevent teen pregnancies.

By the time they go to school, children need to be equipped with competency to make informed choices. This should be done by providing free, accessible, friendly, safe, and comfortable spaces and opportunities for teen audiences to openly discuss sexual and reproductive health and physical, emotional, and biological changes.

During COVID-19 lockdowns, I til teenagers already have messed began a radio and television pro-

covered a range of reproductive health topics and was very effective.

After COVID-19 restrictions, the program continues with a mix of radio/TV sessions and high school-based outreaches. Uncountable positive feedback and stories are day-to-day shared by the audience.

Through parental relationships and series of nonjudgmental dialogue a teen can establish such correct behaviors towards sexual relationships. The evidence indicates that these early self-awareness skills help a child understand personal values, emotions, and boundaries vis-à-vis any exposure even when she/he is away from guardianship.

Further, to achieve a reduced teen pregnancy rate, gram that reached over 13,000 barriers and other social-culturally constructed sorts

of obstacles which prevent teenagers from accessing and utilizing Adolescent Sexual Reproductive Health Services and Rights (ASRHSR) must be removed. This is a very good example of the Government of Rwanda for its proven effort to provide non-restricted access to contraception for teens of 15 years.

The full package of SRH services must be offered for free and be accessible at the community and primary health care levels. The terms of affordability, availability, accessibility, accommodation, and acceptability should refer to designed comfortable, confidential, and safe spaces.

Unfortunately, in many settings essential ASRH services remain inaccessible due to the high direct and indirect costs involved. For instance, in Rwanda the price of emergency contraception dose is \$10 to \$15 in private dispensaries, and the kind of option seems unobtainable in public health set-

Yes, it will require collective resilience to win this battle against teen pregnancy and births. We can all play a vital role to safeguard our teen community and prevent such regretful stories and cases of Sheila and many untold ones. The shared vision is to create a world where teenagers make their informed choices, the bridge to their dreams.

Easing travel restrictions to boost intra-African trade

"AS an investor, as someone who wants to make Africa great, I have to apply for 35 different visas on my passport," Dangote also lamented during the Africa CEO Forum in Kigali, Rwanda, in May 2024.

For Dangote and many African business leaders, mobility restrictions stymie business; removing them will unlock the potential of intra-African trade, which currently stands at an unimpressive 17 percent–far behind Europe's 60 percent trade within its borders.

The African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA), unveiled by African leaders in March 2018, is expected to boost intra-African trade and consolidate a market of 1.3 billion people with a combined GDP of \$3.4 trillion. The World Bank estimates it could increase Africa's income by \$450 billion by 2035, potentially lifting 30 million people out of extreme

The AfCFTA could expand Africa's tax base and its capacity to sustainably manage its approximately \$1.1 trillion-and growing-debt, asserts the Brookings Institution, a US-based think tank.

Implementation of the trade pact is progressing well, said Wamkele Mene, the Secretary-General of the

Accra-based AfCFTA Secretariat, at the GABI event. With 54 AU member states signed on (only Eritrea has not) and 48 countries submitting instruments of ratification, Mene expects trade to grow significantly, although challenges remain.

smoother intra-African trade.

But when trading under the AfCFTA began in January 2021, the free movement protocol was still not in effect. As of October 2024, only 32 countries have signed the protocol, with just four (Mali, Niger, Rwanda, and São Tomé and Príncipe) ratifying it-well short of the 15 ratifications required for it to take effect.

Barriers to implementation

Why are countries reluctant to ratify the free movement protocol? According to the AU-ECA study, there ment. Greater labor mobility could drive intra-African trade, knowledge transfer, capacity building and improved market access for African products and services.

Additionally, many countries lack adequate border management infrastructure, making it difficult to efficiently handle migration flows and enforce security measures.

Also, some states fear that foreign workers may take local jobs or strain public resources like health, education and sanitation services.

Visa fees remain a vital revenue source for many countries, often impact national budgets, even if free movement might yield greater economic benefits in the long term.

The COVID-19 pandemic has also raised health concerns, with some countries worried that unrestricted cross-border movement could facilitate the spread of diseases, complicating public health management.

The AU-ECA study notes a gap between the protocol on the free movement of persons and the AfCFTA's emphasis on the free movement of goods and services, expressing concern over the disproportionate focus on the latter. It recommends that

both aspects be prioritized. The path forward

Despite these challenges, there is optimism among free trade area advocates. AfCFTA's Guided Trade Initiative (GTI), which began in October 2022 with seven countries, has grown to 39 countries, including economic powerhouses South Africa and Nigeria. The GTI is a pilot for the AfCFTA's legal and operational frame-

The Pan-African Payment and Settlement System (PAPSS), a joint initiative by the AfCFTA Secretariat and African Export-Import Bank (Afreximbank), is facilitating cross-border payments in local currencies and is gradually gaining traction among traders. With over 42 currencies in use among 48 participating countries, PAPSS aims to reduce costs associated with currency exchange, particularly benefiting traveling business leaders and young entrepre-

There is the point of relative integration successes in Africa's regional economic communities- in the East African Community (EAC) and the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS), for instancethat could pave the way for broader continental integration.

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Tanga Region forest management project in the offing

TLINDI District Council in Tanga Region is seeking a donor to support the expansion of Community Based Forest Management (CBFM) to fight deforestation within the villages

Mng'anya Chrispin, Kilindi District Council, head of planning and coordination made the call recently while speaking to journalists and staff from the Tanzania Community Forest Conservation Network (MJUMITA) and the Tanzania Forest Conservation Group (TFCG who paid a visit to assess the impact of the Integrated Forest Biomass Energy Solutions for Tanzania (IFBEST) project.

Currently, deforestation is very high in Kwamazuma, Kilindi, Negero, Lukole, Kwafumbili, Kwadudu, Jungu, Muungano, Kwedijero, Mzunguwasala, Mkindi, Kwekinkwembe, Pangwi, Masilei and Lumotio villages, and the indigenous trees are at risk of disappearing.

"We request TFCG and MJUMITA to scale up the IFBEST project in these villages to prevent deforestation, as people are illegally cutting indigenous trees for charcoal production, agriculture and livestock grazing," he says

The project is implemented by TFCG and MJUMITA with funding from the European Union through the ministry of finance.

The main goal of the project is to enhance environmental sustainability through sustainable forest management and wood-fuel production.

He lauded TFCG and MJUMITA for introducing the IFBEST project in Kilindi District, as it has brought positive changes to Lusane, Mswaki, Mapanga and Mmbogo

Under the IFBEST project, residents are trained on the importance of conserving natural vegetation, sustainable charcoal harvesting, forest conservation and how to establish Village Savings and Loans Associations (VSLAs) in their localities.

He also lauded TFCG for donating one printer, two Global Positioning System (GPS) kits, one laptop and one office cabinet to Kilindi district to improve performance in forest conservation activities, monitor forest management and check for any destruction of forests.

The Laptop are used for record-keeping, while the GPS kits will help measure areas, maintain accurate records, and provide correct information in the system.

The IFBEST project was officially introduced in the district in February 2024.

He also requested the ministry of livestock to assist in constructing cattle dips for pastoralists. Elida Fundi, MJUMITA's good governance and advocacy officer said the project is being implemented in Gendagenda, Mkalamo, Mseko, Lusane, Mmbogo, Mapanga, Nkhobole and Mswaki villages.

The project has enabled villages on proper land use plans, allocate forest reserve for community based forest management, sustainable charcoal production and land for pastures, and resolve village boundary conflicts and they are now living together.

They also collaborate on everything and continue with other activities instead of moving from place to place, something that was not the case in the past.

"As TFCG and MJUMITA, we are very happy with the achievement made so far. Currently, women have contested for lead-

ership in the Village Natural Resources Committees (VNRC) and the village councils. Today, they are leaders who actively conduct patrols within the forest reserves," she says

In Lusane, Mnkonde and Gendagenda villages, Kilindi and Handeni districts of Tanga Region, women hold leadership positions and are working in various roles.

Additionally, women in Lusane village are involved in decision making processes and have the opportunity to engage in various activities.

MJUMITA is training them how to influence and advocate for community-based forest management, as well as the sustainable harvesting of biomass energy from conserved village land forest

The training advocates for sustainable fuel wood production to government officials, politicians, and other stakeholders.

"Under the capacity-building programme, they train participants on gender equality, good governance, law enforcement, and the policies, laws,

and regulations that guide the implementation of community based forest management and the sustainable harvesting of fuel wood," Fundi said.

The training has been offered to members of the Village Natural Resources Committees (VNRC), village leaders, sustainable charcoal and timber producers, private forest owners, and others who wish to advocate for forests with funding from the European Union, through the ministry of finance.

"We have decided to provide this training after discovering that many forests are increasingly disappearing, as people continue to exploit them recklessly for charcoal production and timber harvesting," she says.

The training aimed to help them understand their rights and benefit from the forest resources and products available within their village land.

Also raising their voices and benefiting from forest resources, competing for various positions such as village natural resource committee, village leadership, and various forest matters to dispel the notion that forestry is a men dominated job.

Through the knowledge and skills gained from TFCG and MJUMITA, women are now involved in sustainable charcoal production and timber harvesting, forest conservation and management activities and have taken up high leadership positions such as chairing village natural resource committees.

The IFBEST project is being implemented in Gendagenda, Mkalamo, Mseko, Lusane, Mmbogo, Mapanga, Nkhobole and Mswaki villages.

Mariam Parikole from Lusane village says, "Men now understand that women are beneficial in the community, they listen to our ideas and put them into action. Women have been selected for the village natural resource committees. Thank you for bringing this project to our village," she says

Natus Manumbu, Kilindi district land development officer added that, so far Lusane and Mmbogo villages, located in Luande Ward in Kilindi District, have village land use plans and are now involved in Community Based Forest Management (CBFM).

The land-use plans implemented in both villages have helped prevent land conflicts.

The land use plan has helped the village gain legal authority, enabling them to manage their village legally and obtain a certificate of customary right of occupancy.

Currently, the citizens are aware of the boundaries in their village. They have formulated by-laws and are aware of both administrative and internal boundaries, something that was not the case in the past.

EPZA expands global reach to attract investments

School milk feeding project benefits 100,000 students

total of 100,000 students in 140 primary and secondary schools across the country are currently benefiting from the School Milk Feeding Program (SMFP) which is being implemented by the Tanzania Daily Board (TDB).

This was unveiled over the weekend by the TDB's Acting Marketing Manager, Joseph Semu when the state- owned Board made a special tour of the Mbeya region to inspect progress in the implementation of the crucial program.

The five- year initiative currently covers eight regions, but the plan is to extend it to a total of 500 schools across the country.

"Under this program, the plan was to start with at least 100 schools during a period of 2023/2024 while other 100 schools will be added every year for the five consecutive years of the implementation, and schools covered is expected to increase from 125 to 625 schools by 2027, with the targeted beneficiaries students are those aged

between 4 to 19 years," he observed. Semu expressed that the program is being executed in the region through partnership with key stakeholders, including the small-scale milk processors.

"In Mbeya, Rungwe and Busoleko councils the processors are now producing an average of 240,000 liters of milk daily, making it possible to support the government's goal to provide every student with a daily cup of milk," he said.

He detailed that as per the program's rolling out, the students distributed with the processed milk, either pasteurized, UHT, cultured milk or yoghurt depending on the availability and infrastructure of the area.

Furthermore, he said the quantity of milk supplied is 150mls to 200mls produced, adding the initiative was working to sensitize and encourage parents to contribute money for enabling the program to survive.

'Implementation of this program plays a meaningful role to help spur school enrolment and reduce absenteeism whereby once the children are in schools, the program can also contribute to their learning through avoiding hunger and expanding their cognitive abilities,"

Speaking for his part, Dr. Samora Mshang's, the Mbeya regional Veterinary officer said they're working several efforts to modernize dairy farming practices in the region to ensure the production of high-quality milk for schools.

"We'll continue standing at forefront to collaborate with the TDB to educate the dairy farmers to improve milk production standards," he informed.

Speaking on behalf of others, a standard three student at Mwenge primary school, Reuben Fred, hailed the government and the TDB for implementing the program.

However, Fred underscored the need for the Board to source more funds for supporting the program in order to ensure all students are benefiting accordingly.

Acting Regional Nutrition Officer, Lightness Shibone, said for their part, they are continuing to engage the community on the benefits of school milk programs, including fighting malnutrition and stunting.

The Tanzania Dairy Board (TDB) needs around 15bn/- to have the program implemented into a needed scope, standards and dura-

The five-year program, (2023-2028) incorporates a range of stakeholders from private and public sectors.

Develop industries as carriers of new forces

BEIJING

NEW quality productive forces, which take innovation as the driving force and industry as the carrier, feature high technology, high efficiency and high quality.

Developing new quality productive forces requires production relations and institutional arrangements that meet the characteristics of this new productivity.

China has included the development of new quality productive forces in a top-level document.

During the first and second industrial revolutions, the country missed the opportunity to advance, but we must rise where we once fell.

Under the leadership of the Communist Party of China, through 75 years of relentless efforts, especially the reform and opening-up, China has achieved an average annual GDP growth of 8.9 percent and expanded its economic scale by 46-fold.

Today, China is the world's largest manufacturing country. Not only have we made up for the lessons missed, but we have also caught up to, and even surpassed, developed countries in many industries during the third industrial revolution.

This is evidenced by advancements in computer production, application, the widespread development of information technology, and the deployment of 4G and 5G networks, as well as a leading position in 6G

These achievements make our country closer than ever in history, and more confident, in achieving the great rejuvenation of China.

However, currently, the world is witnessing the rise of a fourth industrial revolution characterized by artificial intelligence, clean energy, robotics, quantum information technology, virtual reality and biotechnology.


If China fails to keep pace with this wave of industrial revolution, the country may once again fall behind developed countries.

Faced with such challenges, how can we promote the development of new quality productive forces?

As we can see, every industrial revolution is marked by the emergence of entirely new industries. The fourth industrial revolution has already given rise to a number of emerging industries, such as new energy vehicles, AI, robotics, drones and genetic engineering. Moreover, future industries like quantum communication and nuclear fusion are expected to become industrialized in the coming years.

The core essence of new quality productive forces lies in the qualitative enhancement of productivity levels brought about by technological transformation.

Traditional industries, through the



integration of digital intelligence and green technologies, can also embody the characteristics of high technology, high quality and high efficiency, thus becoming carriers of new quality productive forces.

Different provinces and regions across China are expected to develop new quality productive forces without neglecting or abandoning traditional industries, and must prevent bubbles.

Generally speaking, development should be based on existing industrial foundations, adhering to the principles of pragmatism and local adaptability and leveraging comparative advantages. New industries should be developed where feasible, and traditional industries should be transformed and upgraded where appropriate.

According to new structural economics, existing industries can be classified into five categories – catch-up industries, leading industries, transition industries, emerging industries and strategic industries.

They are based on three criteria, namely the gap between local industries and global frontiers, alignment with local resource endowments, and whether they represent new industries arising from technological revolutions.

Catch-up industries are prevalent in developed regions or countries, where Chinese industries hold comparative advantages at the mid-to-low end. The technologies and product quality in these industries are still catching up with their counterparts in developed countries. Many local chip manufacturing and photolithography industries exemplify this type.

Leading industries include home

appliances such as televisions and air conditioners. In many regions of China, the home appliance sector not only has a comparative advantage, but also often leads the world in product quality and technology.

Transition industries used to possess comparative advantages and lead globally, but have lost that advantage due to economic development, changes in capital accumulation and resource endowment structures.

Labor-intensive processing industries that developed in the 1980s and 1990s, such as footwear, bags and textiles can explain it. Additionally, industries that have shifted their technological pathways and lost markets, like the transition from color film to digital technologies, represent this category.

Some of these emerging industries result from the fourth industrial revolution, particularly those with short research and development cycles primarily reliant on human capital.

Regions in China rich in human capital have a comparative advantage in these industries. Others arise from new technologiesthatprovidedevelopmental opportunities based on specific natural resource endowments, such as solar and wind energy technologies in sparsely populated desert regions. Additionally, some mature industries can become emerging in less-developed areas where they had previously lacked comparative

Characterized by long R&D cycles - often requiring 10 to 20 years - strategic industries necessitate substantial financial and material capital investments.

Games however remains optimistic that ongoing reforms in Nigeria aimed at enthroning a market-based pricing of foreign exchange will make it easier for foreign companies to do business there in the future.

The naira has indeed been volatile. Between 2004 and 2024, the naira has suffered multiple sudden devaluations against the US dollar.

From approximately N136 to a US dollar in 2004, the currency has weakened more than 12x to N1652/USD as at November 15, 2024, averaging a drop of about 55 percent every year.

The rand, on the other hand, has been more stable, only weakening from 6 ZAR per USD in 2004 to 17 ZAR/USD as of November 2024. That's an average drop of 9 percent per annum.

The trend in the South Africa's rand vs US dollar allows SA's businesses to make adjustments and hedge against currency risk, as the currency devaluations are generally tied to broader economic indicators like trade balance, interest rates, and inflation, which tend to be more stable and predictable in South Africa than in Nigeria.

In Nigeria's case, the devaluations have been sudden and happened only after efforts to artificially prop up the currency failed. That has left little room for businesses to plan and hedge against currency risks.

Additionally, Nigeria's restrictions, policy-induced distortions in the currency market, and heightened inflation rates have created substantial risk for foreign businesses.

These businesses struggle with the challenge of repatriating profits, pricing goods competitively, and managing costs in a highly volatile currency environment.

The CBN's occasional restrictions on accessing foreign currency to curb devaluation also exacerbate these issues, contributing to liquidity challenges for foreign-owned companies.

The appointment of Olayemi Cardoso as CBN governor late last year has sparked a raft of reforms from floating the currency to raising market rates to a record high in order to stabilise the currency and make it more marketdriven.

The reforms have led to a steep decline in the currency, which has shed over 80 percent of its value since the reforms began.

Critics say Nigeria put the cart before the horse by floating the currency before securing significant dollar inflows. The naira depreciation has hurt businesses and slashed the purchasing power of

Foreign firms operating in Nigeria, parent companies in dollars, have been the worst hit.

In the last decade, several prominent South African companies have withdrawn from Nigeria, citing currency volatility and challenging economic conditions as primary reasons.

Africa's largest food retailer announced its exit from Nigeria in 2020, selling its stores to local operators. Shoprite cited currency volatility, supply chain issues, and difficulties in repatriating profits as the main reasons for its departure.

The currency devaluation made it increasingly difficult for Shoprite to operate profitably in Nigeria, given the high costs of importing goods and the challenge of maintaining competitive pricing amidst rising inflation.

Shoprite's exit from Nigeria and some other African markets to focus on its core South African market did not prove too costly for the retailer, which recorded improved profit and margin in its first financial report since exiting Nigeria.

The Cape Town-based retailer grew trading profit by 14 percent to 5.4 billion rand (\$358 million) in the six months through January 2, 2022, with trading margin improving to 6.0 percent from 5.7 percent six months prior.

Trading profit at its South African supermarket business rose 16 percent to 4.9 billion rand (\$319 million) in the period, according to the financial statement released this week, which means it contributed 90.7 percent to the total profit reported by the group.

In full-year 2023, Shoprite posted record revenues of 219.5 billion rand, 17 percent up from the 187.5 billion rand recorded in 2022, a further sign that for Shoprite, it's no Nigeria, no problem.

The year 2024 was even much better for Shoprite. Its sales rose by 9.7 percent to 240.7 billion rand, boosted by both its upmarket and discount grocery brands.

Shoprite's exit was not solely due to its loss-making Nigerian operations but because the new CEO Pieter Engelbrecht was not as bullish about expanding across Africa as his predecessor, according to Dianna Games of the SA-Nigeria business chamber.

"Shoprite's pull back from Nigeria and Kenya was due a change of leadership. The new leadership didn't have as much appetite for Nigeria, and the company is now doing really well in South Africa," Games said.

"They've reinvested a lot of money in South Africa. They (Shoprite) pulled back on the African story, but put down bigger roots at home," Games told BusinessDay during an interview in Johannesburg.

During a September investor call, CEO Pieter Engelbrecht credited Pick n Pay's strong performance in 2024 to increased investments within its home market of South Africa.

Nampak sold its Nigerian canmaking unit, Bevcan, to Alucan Investment for \$68.5 million (N103.8 billion) in May 2024.

The sale of Bevcan, Nigeria's second-largest manufacturer of beverage cans, was part of Nampak's effort to raise 2.7 billion South African rand (\$147.8 million) to pay

Nampak acquired Bevcan Nigeria in 2014 for \$180.6 million, suggesting who must report their sales to their the company recorded a \$109.5 million loss on the asset sale.

> The company said in its financial statement that the devaluation of the naira and removal of petrol subsidy triggered a \$54.7 million loss in 2023 and an impairment loss of \$84.8 million on Bevcan Nigeria.

> The sale of Bevcan Nigeria came after Nampak closed its metal business in Nigeria and sold its property, equipment and machinery to Twinings Ovaltine Nigeria Limited for N7.5 billion.

> Nampak said it made a decision to close its Nigeria Metals business from July 31, 2023 "due primarily to subdued demand for metal can products manufactured by this operation."

Volatile naira sours S. African investors' appetite for Nigeria

SOUTH African business owners recognise the vast potential of Africa's most populous nation, but many are hitting a roadblock-the unpredictable swings of the naira. With dreams of tapping into Nigeria's bustling

market, these investors find themselves at a

crossroads, wary of riding the waves of currency

chaos. "Nigeria is a large and attractive market but the unpredictable swings of the naira make it scary to go in there," Stephane Cohen, a business owner

in South Africa, said. Read also: CBN to penalise DMBs aiding, abetting naira hawking

"Most of the South African businesses have been forced to close shop and that's not a good look. It means it's really tough to do business there and that zaps confidence," Cohen said.

Cohen's view seems to be shared by several other business owners and investors in South Africa who have hit the brakes on investment in Nigeria since a record-breaking 2019.

Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) inflow from South Africa fell to a seven-year low of \$378.49 million in 2023, a sign of waning investor confidence in the country.



A raft of South African businesses have exited Nigeria in recent times, from popular supermarket chain, Shoprite Holdings, to the less-known Nampak, Africa's biggest packaging company.

"A poll done on South African businesses showed that the number one reason why Nigeria is such a tough place to do business is the currency volatility," said Dianna Games, CEO of the Johannesburg-based South Africa-Nigeria business

Co-op bank Q3 profit: Soaring eagle planning delivers double-digit growth

CO-OPERATIVE Bank of Kenya has reported a Profit Before Tax of Ksh26.8 billion for third quarter of 2024, a commendable 8. 5 percent growth compared to Ksh24.7 billion recorded in the same period last year. Profit after tax grew to Ksh19.2 billion from Ksh18.4 billion reported in the third quarter of 2023.

The strong performance is in line with the bank's strategic focus on sustainable growth, resilience, and agility, said Co-operative Bank Group Managing Director and CEO, Dr Dideon Muriuki. According to the O3 financial results, Co-op Bank delivered a competitive Return on Equity of 21.3 percent, riding on the 'Soaring Eagle' Transformation Agenda.

A Tanzanian netizen commented, "Maile" is the phonetic translation of the Swahili word for "forever," symbolizing everlasting Sino-African friendship. As a Tanzanian who speaks Chinese, this drama brought my two worlds together, and I absolutely loved it."

Cultural and tourism exchanges have become a bridge for fostering mutual understanding. Through this bridge, countless heartwarming stories of national friendship and people-to-people bonds have unfolded between Jiangsu and Tanzania.

Tanzania is a natural and historical extension of the Maritime Silk Road, while Jiangsu sits at the intersection of the Silk Road Economic Belt and the Maritime Silk Road. The two sides have a deep Silk Road friendship. In Jiangsu, landmarks like the Longjiang Shipyard in Nanjing, Tianfei Palace in Suzhou, and Wenfeng Tower in Yangzhou serve as "living relics" of Maritime Silk Road history.

Healthcare cooperation is a cornerstone of the bond between Tanzania and Jiangsu. Zanzibar's President, Hussein Ali Mwinyi, has praised Chinese medical teams for providing advanced treatments, training local doctors, and building a foundation for Zanzibar's medical development. In September, Dr. Kamis Ali Kombo from Zanzibar's Kivunge District Hospital attended the Belt and Road Training Program for Healthcare Excellence, organized by Jiangsu Province Hospital. "Doctors from Jiangsu taught us how to treat accident victims, such as those with fractures and trauma, enhancing our emergency response capabilities," he shared.

In recent years, trade and investment between Africa and China have grown rapidly and China has become Tanzania's largest source of foreign investment. In 2023, China remained Tanzania's largest trading partner, with bilateral trade reaching \$8.78 billion, a 5.66% year-on-year increase. Jiangsu accounted for \$730 million of this, marking a 12.6% growth from the previous year.

The Chinese saying "Give a man a fish, and you feed him for a day; teach a man to fish, and you feed him for a lifetime" embodies this partnership. In 2013, Jiangsu's Jielong Group invested \$30 mil-

Chinese steel exports boom

CHINA'S steel exports have exploded higher. History suggests it can't last

Steelmakers in the world's biggest producer are leaning heavily on overseas sales to soak up a surplus caused by the country's years-long property crisis.

But they're running into dumping accusations from importers and a protectionist Donald Trump will soon be back in the White House. The flare-up in tensions is starting to resemble the industry's last trade crisis of nearly a decade ago.

Unless Beijing rips up its current playbook and decides to re-inflate the housing market or splurge on infrastructure, then steel consumption in China is in long-term decline.

But mills have barely cut production to match that reality. The result is near-record exports. Over 11 million tons were shipped last month, a nine-year high.

Investors fret that Trump's re-election will prompt another trade war. Even though China doesn't sell much of the alloy to the US directly, protectionism could ripple though the world's steel markets and choke global trade. Analysts at ANZ Group Holdings Ltd. reckon Chinese mills may try and 'front run' any increase in tariffs by boosting exports even further over the next few months, according to a note from the bank last week.

Chinese steel has a history of stoking trade tensions. Importing countries have opened 25 anti-dumping investigations so far this year, the most since 2016, according to China's commerce ministry. If that period's any guide, expect sales to drop sharply.

"China's steel exports may start to decline by end-2026 as more trading partners step-up anti-dumping export controls and total steel production falls," said Bloomberg Intelligence analyst Michelle Leung.

China is mostly exporting its steel to nearby developing economies that still need to build infrastructure at scale. Nations in Southeast Asia, South Asia and the Middle East have seen the biggest increase in imports this year and many are partners in Beijing's Belt and Road initiative.

Brazil welcomes PM Modi with vedic chants and traditional festivities ahead of G20 summit

RIO DE JANEIRO

PRIME Minister Narendra Modi was welcomed by Brazilian Vedic scholars chanting Sanskrit mantras upon his arrival in Brazil for the G20 summit

The group of Vedic scholars, comprising men and women of all ages, sang melodious Sanskrit shlokas in PM Modi's presence. They were dressed in traditional Indian attire, and the Prime Minister keenly listened to their harmonious recitation.

According to a statement by the Ministry of External Affairs, there is significant interest in India's culture, religion, performing arts, and philosophy in Brazil. Organizations like the Ramakrishna Mission, ISKCON, Satya Sai Baba, Maharishi Mahesh Yogi, and the Bhakti Vedanta Foundation have active chapters in Brazil. Indian philosophy and spirituality were among the first aspects of Indian culture to influence Brazil, resonating with the country's colourful folkloric traditions and joyous festivities.

Upon PM Modi's arrival at Hotel Nacional, he received a warm welcome, including a traditional Dandiya ceremony performed by dancers in vibrant Gujarati attire. Members of the Indian diaspora greeted him with gifts, waved Indian flags, and displayed his pictures to express their enthusiasm

Speaking to ANI, the Vedic scholars

underlined the influence of the Vedas on their lives. "I started about 10 years ago, I could not see any meaning in my life at the time. When I started studying Vedas I realised who I am. I am a little bit nervous but I am happy," Jenifer Scholles, a Vedic scholar said.

Vedic scholar Jonas Masetti also known as Acharya Vishwanatha said, "Many people in Brazil connect with Vedic culture and Indian culture. The first time they hear mantras, they feel a lot of joy and peace in their hearts. Many students learn Sanskrit, mantras, stories of Ramayan and Mahabharat."

PM Modi is in Brazil to attend the 19th G20 Leaders' Summit, scheduled for November 18 and 19.

As a Troika member, India is playing a significant role in shaping the agenda, building on the momentum from its own G20 presidency last year.

In a statement, PM Modi expressed optimism about Brazil's leadership in continuing the focus on the Global South's priorities.

"Last year, India's successful Presidency elevated the G20 to people's G20 and mainstreamed the priorities of the Global South. This year, Brazil has built upon India's legacy. I look forward to meaningful discussions aligned with our vision of 'One Earth, One Family, One Future," he said.

PM Modi also plans to use the summit to strengthen bilateral ties with other world leaders.

Netanyahu aide accused of leaking classified documents to undermine hostage deal

JERUSALEM

AN aide to Israel's prime minister is suspected of leaking classified documents to a European newspaper to sway public opinion against demonstrations supporting a ceasefire-for-hostage deal with Hamas.

The Magistrate's Court in the Israeli city of Rishon LeZion eased a gag order on Sunday, revealing new details about the case, which has triggered a political scandal and sent shockwaves through the Israeli political sphere.

Eli Feldstein, a media advisor to Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, has been arrested and interrogated by the Shin Bet internal security agency.

Three additional security personnel, whose names remain undisclosed, have Germany's Bild newspaper.

also been detained in connection with the case. Feldstein's detention was extended by five days on Sunday, and he is expected to face charges next week, according to the

The documents allegedly came into Feldstein's possession via an Israel Defense Forces (IDF) reserve officer, who is also a suspect in the investigation. According to the court, Feldstein allegedly leaked the classified materials to portray Yahya Sinwar, the late Hamas leader, as unwilling to agree to a ceasefire deal that would also secure hostage release.

After an Israeli military censor blocked the publication of the documents on an Israeli TV channel, Feldstein bypassed local censorship by providing the material to

G20 Summit: Xi calls for multipolar world, inclusive globalisation

RIO DE JANEIRO

UPON arriving in Rio de Janeiro for the 19th G20 Summit on Sunday, Chinese President Xi Jinping expressed readiness to work with all parties for an equal and orderly multipolar world and a universally beneficial and inclusive economic globalization.

In a written statement, Xi hoped for the G20's greater role as an important platform for international economic cooperation.

This year's G20 Leaders' Summit, scheduled for Nov 18-19, marks the first gathering of the kind since the accession of the African Union as a full member, a historic milestone that strengthens the voice of the Global South.

Javier Miranda, former president of Uruguay's Broad Front party, expressed his hope that this summit will mark a significant step toward building a multipolar world one that fosters dialogue.

In a world fraught with wars and conflicts, the commitment to dialogue stands as one goal of this G20 meeting, he told Xinhua.

Following its assumption of the presidency, Brazil has established the summit theme as "Building a Just World and a Sustainable Planet". Key priorities outlined by the Brazilian government include combating hunger, poverty, and inequality,

advancing sustainable development, and driving reforms in global governance.

"Building a just world requires the G20 to honor the principles of mutual respect, equal-footed cooperation and mutual benefit, and support Global South countries in achieving greater development," Xi said in a signed article published in Brazilian media outlet Folha de S. Paulo on Sunday.

"Building a sustainable planet requires the G20 to promote sustainable production and lifestyle as a way to achieve harmony between humanity and nature," he

The Chinese president also pledged China's active support for the initiative of a Global Alliance Against Hunger and Poverty proposed by Brazilian President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva.

"As we gather at the G20 to address critical global issues such as governance, hunger, sustainability, and the environment, we recognize the crucial role of our partnership with China," said Rodrigo Castro, deputy secretary for Major Events and Promotion Actions of the Government of the State of Rio APEC meeting.

Many of the solutions to address challenges faced by developing nations stem from ideas and practices already implemented in China, Castro said.

"For us Brazilians who are hosting the G20 ... we are very proud to welcome the president and the entire Chinese delegation," he told Xinhua.

Apart from the G20 summit, Xi is also to pay a state visit to Brazil, as this year marks the 50th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic ties between the two countries.

During the visit, Xi will hold an in-depth exchange of views with the Brazilian president on bilateral relations and international and regional issues of common interest.

Brazil is the second stop of Xi's two-nation tour, which has taken him to Peru. In Lima, he kept to a tight schedule, attending the 31st APEC Economic Leaders' Meeting, paying a state visit to Peru and holding a series of bilateral meetings, including one with his US counterpart, Joe Biden, on the sidelines of the

Hezbollah media chief Mohammad Afif killed in Israeli airstrike on Beirut

BEIRUT/JERUSALEM

AN Israeli airstrike targeting the office of Syria's Ba'ath Party in central Beirut on Sunday noon has killed Hezbollah Media Chief Mohammad Afif and three other people, local TV channel al-Jadeed

According to al-Jadeed, Israeli warplanes attacked the office located between the area of Ras al-Nabaa and the Sodeco Square commercial center with two airto-surface missiles after the Ba'ath Party received a call from the Israeli army asking it to evacuate the building hosting the party.

Most part of the targeted building was destroyed during the airstrike, and ambulances rushed to the area to remove the rubble and search for victims, al-Jadeed

Israel's military on Sunday claimed responsibility for the airstrike that killed Afif.

Afif joined Hezbollah in the

1980s and served as a media advisor to the group's late leader, Hassan Nasrallah, who was assassinated by Israel in late September. In a statement, the Israel De-

fense Forces described the attack as "an intelligence-based strike", alleging that Afif "directed Hezbollah operatives to gather field footage for use in propaganda and psychological warfare".

Since Sept 23, the Israeli army

has leveled up its air attack on Lebanon in an escalation of conflict with Hezbollah. In early October, Israel initiated a ground operation across its northern border into Lebanon.

According to the Lebanese health ministry, the death toll from Israeli airstrikes on Lebanon since the beginning of the war on Oct 8, 2023, has reached 3,452, with injuries up to 14,664.

India-US ties to strengthen under Trump, says US Envoy Eric Garcetti

NEW DELHI

US Ambassador to India Eric Garcetti underscored the bipartisan foundation of India-US relations, expressing optimism about their continued growth under President-elect Donald Trump.

"The great thing about the US-India relationship is that it is bipartisan. It has never relied on the Democrats or Republicans being in charge of our United States Congress or the Presidency. It has grown with (every changing) president, so I expect the relationship will grow with the Republican president again," Garcetti (pictured) remarked.

Speaking on the Open Doors Report 2024, Garcetti highlighted a surge in Indian students studying in the US, marking a 50 per cent increase over the past two years.

"The Open Doors Report shares great news that builds on last year's great news when it comes to India & US and our education partnership. It shows that there has been an increase of more than 20 per cent, building on an increase of 30 per cent and more. More than a 50 per cent increase in the number of students coming to the US just over the last two years," he said.

Garcetti emphasised the mutual benefits of this trend, calling it "great for Indians, great for India, and great for America and American educational institutions."

The Ambassador also spotlighted the STEMM India Fellowship, designed to encourage Indian women in science, technology, engineering, mathematics, and medicine. "We love all Indian students but we have put a particular focus on having women students, especially in the field of science and technology, education and medicine," he explained.

Garcetti stressed the fellowship's role in fostering leaders in critical sectors, including artificial intelligence, quantum computing, semiconductors, and climate technology. "These investments that we are making together are bringing 40 students to the United States for graduate-level education," he added.

Regarding possible immigration policy changes under the Trump administration, Garcetti refrained from speculation but noted the significant contributions of Indian students. "I can't comment yet on what the immigration policies will be, but certainly, I will share the amazing impact that Indians have had on higher education in America, and how that impact makes the world a better place," he concluded.

With education and innovation at the core, Garcetti's remarks underscore the enduring and evolving partnership between India and the US under diverse political leaderships. ANI



THE ice and snow economy is characterized by a long industrial chain, significant spillover

effects, and high social benefits. In recent years, with the deepening promotion of the concept that abundant snow and ice provided by the climate are also invaluable assets, and China's continuous efforts to get 300 million people involved in winter sports, China's high-quality "cold resources" of ice and snow have accelerated their transformation into the "hot power" of economic development.

Recently, the Chinese government issued policy measures for stimulating the vitality of the ice and snow economy through the high-quality development of winter sports, which clearly state that China's ice and snow economy will reach a scale of 1.2

trillion yuan (about \$166 billion) by 2027, and 1.5 trillion yuan by The successful hosting of the

Beijing 2022 Winter Olympics and Paralympics has driven the rapid development of ice and snow tourism, competition and performances, sports training, and ice and snow equipment manufacturing, fully demonstrating the strong momentum of the ice and snow economy.

Yang Xuedong, director of the Sports Economy Department of China's General Administration of Sport, said that sports events play a significant role in driving economic development, promoting consumption and stimulating investment.

During the 14th National Winter Games held earlier in Hulun Buir, north China's Inner Mongolia autonomous region this year, Hulun Buir received a total of 1.774 million tourist visits, generating 32 billion yuan in sports and other consumption.

China's ice, snow economy shows strong momentum

In recent years, winter tourism in China has been gaining popularity. It plays an important role in promoting winter consumption and driving economic

According to data from the China Tourism Academy, the number of ice and snow tourists increased by 38 percent year on year during the last snow season, and revenues increased by 50 percent. Data from online travel companies showed that

the total consumption of ice and snow tourism increased by 132.5 percent compared to the 2019-

2020 snow season. During the last snow season, an ice and snow fever swept across various regions in China. The booming tourism in Harbin, northeast China's Heilongjiang province gave a significant boost to local catering, accommodation, entertainment, and shopping industries. Harbin received over 87 million tourist visits, a 300 percent increase year on year, and reported tourism rev-

enue of 124.8 billion yuan, a 500 percent increase year on year.

Jilin province, which neighbors Heilongjiang province, received 125 million tourist visits, up 121 percent from a year ago. The province's tourism revenue surged 140 percent year on year to 241.9 billion yuan.

Altay in northwest China's Xinjiang Uygur autonomous region welcomed nearly 4.89 million tourist visits, a 36 percent increase year on year, and its tourism revenue reached 5.1 billion yuan, up 45.8 percent

compared with that in the same period last year.

After the Beijing 2022 Winter Olympics and Paralympics, winter sports have received wider attention and been joined by more people across China.

Ice and snow equipment is the foundation for the development of winter sports and is also a crucial component of the ice and snow economy. Currently, China has developed a product system consisting of 15 major categories of ice and snow equipment, with the industry rapidly expanding and the technical quality of products steadily improving. **People's Daily**

Africa set to leverage advantages from G20

JOHANNESBURG

AFRICAN countries should use the opportunity of G20 membership to promote trade and investment with the world's most powerful countries, experts said ahead of this year's G20 summit.

Sizo Nkala, a senior research fellow at the University of Johannesburg's Centre for Africa-China Studies, told China Daily that the African Union joining the Group of 20 is an important step for Africa to increase its visibility on the global stage, and gives it the opportunity to negotiate with rich nations on equal terms.

This year's G20 Summit in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, is the first to be held with the African Union as a member. Last year, the G20 accepted the AU as a permanent member of the group.

"The acceptance of the AU will have an impact on the global economic trajectory. Africa will sit at the table with rich nations and voice its concerns and interests and speak for itself," said Nkala.

Alan Mukoki, CEO of the South African Chamber of Commerce and Industry, said while he welcomes the permanent status of the AU at the G20, it remains to be seen

how Africa will use and take advantage of it.

He pointed out that Africa must take advantage of this new status to promote trade with the most powerful nations, and seek investment to develop the continent.

Mikatekiso Kubayi, a senior researcher at the South African think tank, the Institute for Global Dialogue, agreed with Mukoki.

He said: "Africans regaining their prominence in multilateral affairs must put their house in order. Africa should negotiate with big players to benefit the continent. The world has realized that Africa, with its gross domestic product of \$3.1 trillion and population of over 1.4 billion, cannot be ignored."

Kubayi said African countries and many nations in the Global South need technical skills and funding to assist them in a just transition to clean energy and the gradual phasing out of fossil fuels, and the G20 can assist them in that regard. He said the G20 could also help Africa to prepare for the effects of climate change.

Joseph Upile Matola, an associate economist from the South African Institute of International Affairs think tank, said the AU's perma-

Pope joins calls for 'genocide' probe in Gaza the systematic and unlawful mas and other groups does not al-


WITH accusations of Israel committing "genocide" in Gaza being amplified in recent weeks, the head of the Catholic Church has become the latest high-profile figure to call for a probe into Tel Aviv's conduct in Gaza.

In a new book based on his interviews titled Hope Never Disappoints. Pilgrims Towards a Better World, Pope Francis addresses current issues, underscoring the importance of respecting human dignity, Vatican News reported. And in the book, which is set for release on Nov 19, he reportedly says that what is happening in Gaza "has the characteristics of a genocide".

"It should be carefully investigated to determine whether it fits into the technical definition formulated by jurists and inter- atrocities against women and national bodies," Vatican News quoted Pope Francis as saying.

This revelation comes after the United Nations Special Committee to Investigate Israeli Practices Affecting the Human Rights of the Palestinian People and Other Arabs of the Occupied Territories said on Nov 14 that Israel's "warfare" in Gaza was "consistent with the characteristics of genocide, with mass civilian casualties and lifethreatening conditions intentionally imposed on Palestinians

Kamaruzaman bin Yusoff, adjunct professor at the Department of Islamic History and Civilization at Universiti Malaya in Malaysia, told China Daily that the pope "is always doing extra work for the betterment of the which could fall foul of the 1948

He said the world courts' advisory had already called on Israel's leaders to prevent committing genocide of the Gaza people. In January, a 17-judge panel of the International Court of Justice declared that Palestinians had a right to be protected from acts of genocide and called on Israel to "take all measures within its power" to prevent acts Genocide Convention.

The UN Special Committee, in its Nov 14 press release, also said that through Israel's "siege over Gaza, obstruction of humanitarian aid, alongside targeted attacks and killing of civilians and aid workers, despite repeated UN appeals, binding orders from the International Court of Justice and resolutions of the Security Council, Israel is intentionally causing death, starvation and serious injury, using starvation as a method of war and inflicting collective punishment on the Palestinian population".

It noted that since the conflict escalated, Israeli officials have publicly supported policies that "strip Palestinians of the very necessities required to sustain life", decimating essential services, and unleashed an environmental catastrophe that would have lasting health impacts.

"These statements along with

interference of humanitarian aid make clear Israel's intent to instrumentalize life-saving supplies for political and military gains," it said. The report announced in the press release covers the period from October 2023 to July 2024.

Further, by early 2024, "over 25,000 tons of explosives", which the committee said was equivalent to two nuclear bombs, had been dropped on Gaza.

Israeli strikes and bombings of medical facilities and makeshift tents in both Gaza and Lebanon have been reported. Lebanon's National News Agency reported that six paramedics were killed at the Islamic Health Authority center in Nabatieh on Nov 17.

The Palestine Red Crescent Society posted on X that it evacuated 15 patients and 16 companions from Kamal Adwan Hospital in northern Gaza to Al-Shifa Hospital in Gaza City, in coordination with the World Health Organiza-

Additionally, it said, 15 patients and two companions were evacuated from Al-Awda Hospital to Al-Shifa Hospital, in coordination with the International Committee of the Red Cross.

Gokhan Batu, an analyst on Israel studies at the Center for Middle Eastern Studies in Türkiye, told China Daily that the forced evacuation of the northern regions and subsequent displacement of the population to the south, as well as attacks on so-called "safe zones". had significantly worsened the humanitarian crisis in Gaza.

"Israel's justification of its actions by citing the presence of Ha-

leviate the severe hardships faced by the civilian population. The case at the ICJ, initiated by South Africa, has exposed serious challenges in the enforcement of the court's provisional orders, indicating a regression in conditions since those orders were issued," Batu said.

Last week, Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan announced that Türkiye was cutting all ties with Israel. It was widely reported on Nov 17 that Türkiye had denied Israeli President Isaac Herzog's plane access to Turkish airspace en route to Azerbaijan where the COP29 climate conference is being held.

Since Oct 7, Batu said, Türkiye has become "one of the most vocal critics of Israel's military actions in Gaza, escalating its condemnation to tangible sanctions".

"Despite the tensions between Türkiye and Israel, Türkiye has had to navigate its strong ties with Azerbaijan carefully, ensuring that these relations remain unaffected by external conflicts," he

"Herzog, crucial to the stalled normalization efforts between Türkiye and Israel and known for his moderate stance, has nonetheless endorsed the narrative that there are no innocent civilians in Gaza," Batu added.

Later on Nov 18, the UN Security Council was set to hold a briefing session on the topic of ending the war in Gaza and securing a lasting peace that will be chaired by UK Foreign Secretary David Lammy, Wafa News reported.

Kremlin says decision to launch ATACMS missiles deep into Russia 'escalation of tensions'

MOSCOW

MOSCOW, November 18. /TASS/. Russia assumes that the decision to launch ATACMS missiles deep into Russia means a qualitatively new round of escalation of tensions, Kremlin Spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters.



"If such a decision has indeed been formulated and communicated to the Kiev regime, then, of course, this is a qualitatively new round of escalation of tensions and a qualitatively new situation in terms of the involvement of the United States in this conflict," Peskov said.

"We are proceeding from this," he emphasized.

Moscow's position should be absolutely clear to everyone, the spokesman pointed out. "These signals have been received by the collective West. And they were voiced by the president in St. Petersburg," Peskov recalled.

On September 12, Russian President Vladimir Putin pointed out that a potential decision to use Western long-range weapons against Russia would mean nothing less than the direct involvement of the United States and other NATO countries in the war in Ukraine.

This would drastically alter the nature of this

Putin emphasized that Ukraine would not be able to strike deep into Russian territory without Western support, as it would require satellite in-

Former leading Australian broadcaster arrested over indecent assault allegations **SYDNEY**

A former leading Australian radio host and national rugby team coach was arrested on Monday over allegations of indecent assault offenses spanning multiple decades.

Police in the state of New South Wales (NSW) arrested Alan Jones, 83, following a long and thorough investigation into multiple alleged indecent assaults and sexual touching offenses.

In a statement, NSW Police said that detectives from the Child Abuse Squad in March established a strike force to investigate alleged incidents between 2001 and 2019.

Officers on Monday morning executed a search warrant at Iones's luxury Sydney apartment and arrested the veteran broadcaster. NSW Police Commissioner Karen Webb told reporters that detectives had worked tirelessly on the investigation.

"This is a result of a very long, thorough and protracted investigation," she said at a press conference. Iones is one of Australia's best-known media personalities, having worked in radio for 35 years before retiring in 2020. Between 2002 and 2020, he hosted one of Sydney's highest-rating breakfast

Prior to his media career, Jones worked as a teacher, a speechwriter for former Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser, and head coach of the national men's rugby union team, the Wallabies. Nine Entertainment newspapers in December reported that Jones had used his position of power as a teacher and a high-rating radio host to allegedly prey on a number of young men. Jones has denied

campus is equipped with complete facilities, creating a safe and modern learning environment that is highly regarded by students and parents," said the principal of the school. The principal expressed

deep gratitude for the involvement of the Chinese company in the school's reconstruction, believing it not only benefited the students but also supported the educational development of the region.

"We hope that Peru and China continue deepening cooperation so as to bring us more benefits," the principal added.

From dominance to doubt: Why Yanga let go of Gamondi

YOUNG Africans SC have made the unexpected decision to part ways with Argentine head coach Angel Miguel Gamondi, despite the team's relatively strong start to the league season.

While some initially attributed his dismissal to consecutive defeats - 1-0 against Azam FC and 3-1 against Tabora United FC - insiders reveal that the reasons run deeper.

Reports suggest dissatisfaction with Gamondi's tactical approach and a series of lackluster performances, even in matches where results were favourable.

Young Africans secured eight wins in their first ten league matches, yet many of these victories were narrow 1-0 outcomes, which raised concerns among fans and club management.


These performances set a high standard that the team has struggled to meet this season.

The club's goals for the season are ambitious: retaining the NBC Premier League title, the Federation Cup, and making significant strides in the CAF Champions League.

For Ramovi, the immediate priority will be to win over fans and reinvigorate a squad that has struggled to replicate its past dominance. Key players like Stephane Aziz Ki, Clatous Chama, and Clement Mzize will be integral to this effort as the team looks to rediscover its flair and confidence on the pitch.

Despite the circumstances of his departure, Gamondi's contributions to Young Africans cannot be overlooked. He led the club to unprecedented success in

recent years, including breaking a 25-year drought by reaching the CAF Champions League group stage and advancing to the quarterfinals.

Under his leadership, Young Africans claimed the Premier League title, the Federation Cup, and the Community Shield, while also delivering unforgettable victories against both domestic and continental rivals. His impact on Tanzanian football will be remembered, even as the club moves in a new direction.

Hungary's Football Association said the country's former international striker was "stable and conscious" on Friday night.

Szalai, who won 86 caps before retiring from playing in 2023, was carried from the bench on a stretcher at the Johan Cruyff Arena before the match resumed.

When play did restart, the Netherlands were awarded a penalty after a video assistant referee (VAR)

Ajax striker Wout Weghorst converted the 21st-minute spot-kick and celebrated by sliding on his knees towards the corner flag as the hosts opened the scoring in a 4-0 victory.

The former Burnley and Manchester United forward was criticised for his celebration, but said later: "I never thought for a moment that this could come across as unpleasant.

"In retrospect, you think, 'would it have been more respectful to cheer less exuberantly?' Let it be clear that his life is more important than my goal. I hope I don't have to explain that to anyone.

"Taking a penalty is normally exciting but I think this was one of my most difficult penalties ever. When you score it, there is pure relief and release. That's why I didn't realise how I was cheering.'

Netherlands captain Virgil van Dijk added: "I didn't think the celebration was exaggerated at all. Hungary made the choice to continue playing. Then you get on with playing the match."

The Dutch qualified for the Nations League quarter-finals with the success.

Mahrez among the scorers as Algeria finish qualifiers in style

RIYAD Mahrez was back among the goals for Algeria on Sunday as they combleted their Africa Cup of Nations qualifying campaign with a 5-1 home thrashing

Mahrez had not scored for his country in his previous seven outings including their calamitous early exit from the last Cup of Nations finals in the Ivory Coast at the start of the year

But he contributed the second goal as Algeria fought back after conceding early to register an easy win and finish their Group E campaign with five wins and a draw for a runaway 16-point haul at the top of the standings.

They ended eight points ahead of Equatorial Guinea, who lost 3-0 to Togo at the same time but still qualify in second place.

The qualifiers for the 2025 finals, which Morocco is hosting from Dec. 21, 2025 to Jan. 18, 2026, will be completed on Monday and Tuesday.

There are five places up for grabs in the 24-team field with 19 countries already qualified for the tournament.

Marquinhos asks Brazil fans to keep the faith

FIVE-TIMES World Cup winners Brazil have struggled to impress in South America's qualifiers for the 2026 tournament but defender Marquinhos had called on fans to stick by the side ahead of Tuesday's home game against Uruguay.

With a run of five wins, four losses and two draws, Brazil are fourth in the standings on 17 points, five behind leaders Argentina, with the top six qualifying automatically for the World Cup in North America. Uruguay are second on 19 points.

Brazil were held 1-1 in Venezuela on Thursday, with Vinicius Jr seeing a late penalty saved, and stand-in skipper Marquinhos said the players still took pride in playing for the shirt even when results did not go

"Even though many things might cause people to lose hope in the national team, we ask that they never lose their passion for it," the 30-year-old told a news conference on Sunday.

Brazil, who were beaten by Uruguay in Montevideo last year, are in a transitional phase under head coach Dorival Junior and it will take some time to iron out the problems, he added.

"We will still make some mistakes because this transition is still very new, with all these changes of players and teams," said Marquinhos, who deputizes for regular captain Danilo.

"But we will make fewer and fewer mistakes and that makes us happy. "We don't worry too much about the standings as long as we're in a comfortable position. We want to win to move up the table, make the work flow better, and gain confidence."

Brazil go into Tuesday's match without a host of top players with defender Eder Militao and forwards Neymar and Rodrygo among those sidelined due to injury.

Harry Kane sparks England rout against Ireland and Nations League promotion

HARRY Kane's 69th international goal sparked a second-half scoring spree that fired England back to the top tier of the UEFA Nations League on Sunday.

In temporary head coach Lee Carsley's final game in charge, a 5-0 win against Ireland secured promotion and ensured England will be back among Europe's leading nations in the next edition of the competition.

"I wanted the England team to be exciting to watch and attacking," Carsley said. "I see them do it day in, day out on the training ground. And now we've seen it (on the field)."

England won its group on goal difference ahead of second-placed Greece, which beat Finland 2-0.

Kane's 53rd-minute penalty at Wembley was a record-extending goal for his country after Liam Scales brought down Jude Bellingham in the box and was sent off for a second yellow card offense.

Within five minutes England was 3-0 up through Anthony Gordon in the 55th and Conor Gallagher in the 58th.

Substitute Jarrod Bowen made an immediate impact, scoring with his first touch in the 75th and Taylor Harwood-Bellis, making his debut, headed in another four minutes

"A really important win for us," Kane said. "It was a tough first half, but we came out second half with a lot more energy and we finished it

England, which is set to welcome new head coach Thomas Tuchel in January, needed to match Greece's result to top Group B2.

Anastasios Bakasetas had put Greece ahead in the 52nd in Finland, with Kane's England opener coming a minute later.

Christos Tzolis scored the second for Greece, which faces a playoff to try to win promotion.

After five wins from six games, Carsley will now return to his perma-

nent role as head coach of England's under 21s. Tuchel begins in January and will lead the campaign to qualify for the 2026 World Cup.

He should have plenty of options when he selects his first squad after Carsley handed debuts to eight players during his short reign.

In his final game, Gordon, Gallagher, Bowen and Harwood-Bellis all scored their first senior goals for England.

"Lee has achieved the main objective from the six fixtures this autumn: securing promotion back to the top tier of the Nations League," English Football Association CEO Mark Bullingham said. "The players have really enjoyed working with Lee and his team - they have made a real impact in their interim roles."

*Rabiot double Adrien Rabiot scored two goals as France beat Italy 3-1 to win Group A2.

Both teams had already secured their places in the quarterfinals before the match in Milan, but France needed to win by at least two goals to take top spot.

"It's been a while since we've played a match like that, fighting all together." Rabiot told French television channel TF1. "The aggressiveness that we showed, our team spirit, that should all be highlighted. That is the real face of the France team."

Rabiot headed the visitors in front just inside two minutes.

France shocked San Siro into silence in the 33rd when Lucas Digne curled in a magnificent free kick from 25 yards that went into the top left corner via the underside of the bar and Guglielmo Vicario. It went down as an own-goal from the Italy goalkeeper, who was a late replacement after Gianluigi Donnarumma fell ill with a stomach bug.

Italy pulled a goal back two minutes later when Andrea Cambiaso volleyed past Mike Maignan.

But Rabiot grabbed his second in the 65th with another header – the sixth goal in a row Italy has conceded from set plays.

While the match had started with the Italy fans booing the French anthem, it finished with France supporters proudly singing the same song in triumph.

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It was the first time Italy had lost a home game by two or more goals since 1983, according to soccer statistician Opta.

Also in the group, No. 6-ranked Belgium fell to a surprise 1-0 loss against Israel - ranked 81st. Yarden Shua's goal settled the game, which was held in Budapest, Hungary, in the 86th. Israel was relegated to League B despite the win.

Belgium must now face a playoff to try to avoid relegation.

*Haaland hat trick

Erling Haaland leads the Nations League scoring charts after hitting a hat trick in Norway's 5-0 win against Kazakhastan in Group B3.

The Manchester City striker took his total to seven goals and is two clear of Viktor Gyokeres, Cristiano Ronaldo and Benjamin Sesko, who are all tied on five.

Norway was promoted to the top tier, ahead of second-place Austria, which drew 1-1 with Slovenia.

Carsley's mission accomplished as foundations laid for Tuchel

LEE Carsley's mission was accomplished and it took only a matter of minutes before the Football Association thanked England's interim manager for a job well done.

It came immediately after a 5-0 thrashing of the Republic of Ireland at Wembley, leaving Carsley to return to his role as England Under-21 coach, with a record of five wins from six games and the incoming Thomas Tuchel able to take control of a team back in the top tier of the Nations League.

FA chief executive officer Mark Bullingham announced Carsley will also deliver "a very detailed handover" to the German before his arrival as England head coach on 1 January.

Carsley's time in charge has had its complications, the biggest selfinflicted with his wild "no striker" team selection that was the catalyst for the embarrassing home defeat by Greece in October, a result that ultimately denied him the opportunity to leave with an unblemished record.

The 50-year-old also got caught up in chaotic mixed messaging about whether he wanted the job or not, especially when he appeared to rule himself out, and then in again, just minutes after last month's 3-1 victory in Finland - matters made worse by the FA later revealing Tuchel had already been signed and sealed even before the Greece loss.

When measured by results and player development during his six games, however, Carsley can reflect on a job very well done, revealing himself to be a coach willing to make bold decisions, giving youth its head while adopting a fearless approach to selection.

It backfired horribly against Greece but there is still plenty of positive, optimistic news he can provide Tuchel when that report lands on his desk.

There was even a statistical quirk from his final game as four England players scored their first senior goals as the Republic of Ireland subsided. They were Anthony Gordon, Conor

Gallagher, Jarrod Bowen and Tay-Roy Keane - the Southampton defender's future father-in-law and a former Ireland captain - when he headed the fifth on his debut.

It was the first time this had been done since England beat Northern Ireland in October 1930, with Harry Burgess, Jimmy Hampson, Sammy Crooks and Eric Houghton the goalscorers.

It was a night when everything Carsley touched turned to gold - or more precisely goals. Bowen scored with his first touch 29 seconds after coming on, while another substitute Harwood-Bellis struck just four minutes later.

The game was changed in the 53rd minute by a flash of genius from Harry Kane, back after being left out in favour of Ollie Watkins for the 3-0 win in Athens and facing some potentially unflattering reviews after another sluggish first-half performance.

England's 31-year-old captain looked heavy-legged and off the pace in a dreadful first half from both sides, but showed the enduring quality that makes him invaluable when he showed stunning vision and range of passing from the left-hand touchline to pick out Jude Bellingham in the area with a perfect right-foot delivery.

Bellingham was floored by defender Liam Scales, who received a second yellow card. Kane scored his 69th goal for his country from the spot and it was game over.

lor Harwood-Bellis, who may have Carsley's reign in charge, not least with brought a grimace from the watching his public and uncharacteristically outspoken slap-down of those England players who withdrew from the squad for these two internationals.

He then doubled down on his message as he insisted it endangered the culture former manager Gareth Southgate had built up during his eights years in charge, when it became a pleasure to play for the country again.

The fact that Carsley was able to engineer two such comprehensive wins with a squad depleted by those nine withdrawals will only add to his personal stock, along with both his and the FA's satisfaction.

Kane spoke out in his capacity as England's skipper, senior figure and statesman, but it did not stop Carsley showing his own decision-making strength, choosing Watkins ahead of the country's record goalscorer in Athens. It was a pick well rewarded with an early goal from Aston Villa's striker that turned a potentially hazardous task into an easy one.

Kane is still England's first choice, but Carsley's willingness to use Watkins, and the success of the move, proved he does not have to be the only choice.

Tuchel will feel the benefit of Carsley's temporary spell because of his determination to introduce youth, further opening the pathway from under-21s to senior level, and all helped by his insider knowledge of the talent com-

Kane has been a central figure to ing through the England system.

Carsley used 32 players overall, giving a debut to eight - Morgan Gibbs-White, Angel Gomes, Lewis Hall, Harwood-Bellis, Curtis Jones, Tino Livramento, Noni Madueke and Morgan Rogers. They can all reflect on their contri-

butions with satisfaction, especially Liverpool midfielder Jones, who has looked a class act in his two starts, while Chelsea forward Madueke has looked a constant threat.

Gomes made an impression as a midfield option, Gibbs-White showed he can be a creator while there is a big opportunity for Newcastle's Hall at left-back, where Tuchel's options look short. The 19-year-old pair Rico Lewis and Kobbie Mainoo, from Manchester City and Manchester United respectively, also added to their England experiences, which will be in the positive ledge of Carsley's handover.

27 candidates qualify for TOC General Election

THE Tanzania Olympic Committee (TOC) has revealed a list of 27 candidates who have met the initial requirements to contest in the committee's upcoming general election, scheduled to take place on December 14 in Dodoma.

Speaking yesterday, TOC election chairperson Ibrahim Mkwawa confirmed that all 27 individuals cleared the first round of vetting for the 12 available

This election marks the first under the new TOC constitutional amendments, which transitioned the roles of Secretary General and Treasurer from elected to appointed positions.

The battle for the TOC presidency is shaping up to be a competitive four-way race, with Michael Washa, Anthony Mtaka, Henry Tandau, and Nasra Mohammed vying for the top position.

The vice presidency has drawn two contenders, Suleiman Jabir and Jamal Iddi, making it a

straightforward but equally important race. A total of 20 candidates are competing for seats on the TOC Executive Committee.

According to Mkwawa, the committee will consist of five members each from Mainland Tanzania and Zanzibar, with a mandate to ensure at least two female candidates from each side.

"We have 27 people who have met the requirements to contest in the TOC general election. The process is ongoing. Complaints can be lodged today and tomorrow, and the final decision on these complaints will be made on Tuesday next week," Mkwawa stated.

The finalized list of candidates is expected to be announced on December 3, with campaigning slated to run from December 5 to December 13.

Mkwawareiterated the committee's commitment to gender equity, ensuring that women candidates are adequately represented in the election.

"Gender balance will remain a priority as we prepare for this election," he emphasized.

The TOC election process is being overseen by a dedicated commission led by Mkwawa, with Malangwe Ali Mchungahela serving as vice chairperson and Halfani Omari as secretary.

As the election date approaches, the TOC's commitment to a transparent, inclusive, and competitive process is clear.

All eyes will now turn to the campaigning period, where candidates will present their vision for the future of Tanzanian sports development.

SIMBA SC head coach, Fadlu Davids, has urged his squad to remain focused as they prepare for their rescheduled league clash against Pamba Jiji FC and their upcoming CAF Confederation Cup opener against Angola's Bravos do Maquis.

The Mainland Premier League fixture, initially postponed, is now set to take place on November 22 at CCM Kirumba Stadium in Mwanza.

Davids (pictured) views this match as a vital opportunity to fine-tune the team's performance and maintain match fitness ahead of their Confederation Cup match on November 28.

highlighted importance of treating each match with the same intensity and avoiding complacency. Despite Simba's strong position at the top of the league table, he stressed the need to approach Pamba FC with determination and focus.

"Each match is critical for maintaining momentum. We cannot underestimate any opponent, regardless of their position in the table. Staying focused on Pamba is crucial before we think about Bravos," Davids emphasized.

gaffer The expressed confidence that the domestic encounter against Pamba Jiji will help the team stay sharp, particularly for players who did not participate in international fixtures during the AFCON qualifiers.

Simba recently played a friendly match against KMC, which ended in a 1-1 draw, as part of their preparation.

"It's essential not to let our thoughts drift to the Bravos match prematurely. We must focus on each game individually. Underestimating Pamba would be a mistake, and I've reminded the players of the importance of staying grounded."

He added: "Uncertainty around the scheduling of the Pamba match caused some players to shift their focus to Bravos. While it's good that they are mentally preparing for the CAF game, the priority right now is Pamba."

Following the Pamba fixture, Simba will return to Dar es Salaam to host their first CAF Confederation Cup Group A match against Bravos do Maquis on November 28 at Benjamin Mkapa Stadium. Simba have been drawn into a challenging group that also features CS Constantine from Algeria and CS Sfaxien from

Simba's performances in the Mainland Premier League, where they lead with 25 points after 10 matches, have set high expectations. Davids emphasized the importance of carrying the same level of discipline and effort into the continental competition.

"We need to ensure that the same level of commitment we show domestically is mirrored in our CAF campaign. The upcoming matches will test our ability to stay consistent under pressure," he said.
