Bus-truck collision: 15 dead, seven hurt

FIFTEEN people died and seven were injured after a Toyota Coaster bus collided head on with a truck seeking to overtake another vehicle.

CP Awadhi Juma Haji, the Operations and Training commissioner at police headquarters who visited the accident site, said that the cause of the accident was the driver of the truck, T715DZX, traveling from Dar es Salaam to Morogoro.

He attempted to overtake vehicles ahead of him without exercising caution, he said, urging drivers to be vigilant on the road and adhere to traffic regulations to prevent accidents, as they result in the loss of human lives and public resources.

Dr Daniel Nkungu, the Morogoro Regional Hospital medical officer in charge, confirmed that the death toll rose owing due to the severity of injuries sustained in the accident, which occurred two hours after midnight or thereabouts.

Seven of the injured are still being treated at the hospital, he said, noting that an eight-year-old child was among the victims.

Set retirement age at 50 to 55, youth activists demand

YOUTH groups are proposing lowering the voluntary retirement age to 50 and setting mandatory retirement at 55 rather than 60 to create more opportunities for younger people.

Omary Punzi, coordinator of the national youth development policy conference back in 2007 and at present, said at the event in Dar es Salaam yesterday, that the government needs to seriously consider the proposal, "to ensure that young people can also benefit from the nation's resources."

He similarly suggested that the private sector be encouraged to set up a job placement system as in the government, so ease competition for young people.

While the public sector advertises job openings when they arise, the private sector does not usually operate in that way, he said, citing other limitations as including recruitment age.

"We also see that the current age limit for joining the army is 25, yet there is a government-established system for adult education," he stated, disappointed that the army recruitment system does not prioritise those who graduate later in life.

"It would be beneficial to raise the age limit for joining the army to at least 30, so that those who have completed higher education by that age have the opportunity to serve their nation,"

Chadema groups want party leader to contest

To remove him at this stage would be nothing short of madness, he declares

WITH increasing demands for Chadema national chairman Freeman Mbowe to contest for the position again, the veteran party leader has set Saturday this week to announce his decision.

Addressing a gathering of supporters led by William Mungai, the party regional chairman for Iringa at his home north of the city of Dar es Salaam, he asked for 48 hours to reflect on the matter.

"I will then address the public during a meeting with editors," he stated, project-

ing the meeting for Saturday, where it will then be made clear whether he will seek re-election for the chairmanship in the upcoming party leadership polls set for next month.

His meeting with editors would be held after 48 hours of closely monitoring current trends within the party, he said, stressing that his decision would be guided by his commitment to strengthening the party rather than engaging in any internal conflicts that could undermine its future.

"I do not want to engage in any battles

Minister vows to engage with media to uplift press freedom

THE government is prepared for increased collaboration with stakeholders in promoting press freedom to enable the media sector to contribute effectively to national development.

Prof. Palamagamba Kabudi, the Information, Arts and Sports minister, made this declaration at a stakeholders' meeting in Dar es Salaam yesterday, taking stock of the current state in regard to freedom of information, and how to strengthen cooperation between the government and the media.

He emphasized the government's commitment to supporting the media, citing remarks by President Samia Suluhu Hassan that the media is not a competitor to the government but an essential stakeholder in national development.

"It is vital for the government and the media to work together for the benefit of the country," he said, underlining that the president's remarks will guide the direction he will follow in supervising work at the ministry.

The growth of the media industry is among key achievements in the past few years, he said, reminding journalists of constitutional limits set out in Articles 18 and 30, which indicate that every right has boundaries.

He acknowledged the country's image in

the 2024 Global Media Report, pointing at the country's progress in freedom of information, declaring that it is an achievement for which the profession and the public should be proud.

The government will be working closely with the media, ensuring that Tanzania remains high in global rankings for media freedom, while upholding the ethics of the profession, he stated.

Stressing the crucial role of journalists in gathering and disseminating information regarding developments in various sectors, he said that modern equipment is now available in district hospitals, clinics and dispensaries.

This was once confined to regional and referral hospitals, he said, urging that these improvements be reported in the media, while Gerson Msigwa, the permanent secretary, urged the media to collaborate with the government in educating the public about various development initiatives.

The information sector plays a vital role in building a nation based on transparency, accountability and active citizen participation, he emphasised, while Deodatus Balile, the Tanzania Editors' Forum (TEF) chairman, expressed satisfaction with progress made in media freedom, while underlining that challenges remain.

"The government has established an Accreditation Board and plans to create an Independent Media Council, but the director of the Information Services Department still holds the power to shut down media outlets without consulting these bodies. This is a challenge that needs to be

old child was among those who died. The injured person who died in the hospital was being taken to the operating theatre, he said.

"He had suffered crushing injuries to his leg and abdomen. While we were taking him to the theatre, his heart stopped, and despite our best efforts, we could not save him," the medic intoned.

Eight people were earlier reported as injured, and 14 bodies brought to the hospital with two of the injured in a critical condition, before another accident victim dies, he said.

One among the injured is Ally Hengo, the Coast Region Journalists' Club chairman and a former reporter for ITV and Radio One, while Masanja Kipariki, who lost a relative in the accident, said the crash occurred while they were traveling from Morogoro to the city.

"In front of us, there was a queue

of trucks coming from Dar es Salaam. One of the trucks swerved to the left and collided head-on with us. I was sitting in the front seat next to the driver," he said.

When the accident happened, he was thrown to the back, and is incapable of knowing if the driver survived, he narrated.

Adam Malima, the regional commissioner, visited the referral hospital at daybreak to console the injured, appealing to members of the public to go to the hospital to identify bodies of the deceased in case they were travelling and had not shown up.

Saying that some bodies are difficult to identify due to severe mutilation, he regretted habitual negligence by drivers. "It is crucial that drivers take caution when on the road to avoid preventable accidents," he insisted.

Officials said it is believed that the drivers of both vehicles lost their lives at the scene of the crash.

the lobby veteran declared.

Punzi, who serves as the Coast Region scout activities coordinator, stressed the importance of considering these changes, while fellow activist Simon Chambi proposed that Vision 2050 add changes in youth employment prospects.

"There should be a special platform and strategy to connect youth with employment opportunities and international exchange programs to address the challenges young people face in securing jobs," he appealed.

Only five percent of young people benefit from various training and employment opportunities abroad, he said, calling for a strategy to help youth access accurate information and connect with opportunities more easily.

"Vision 2050 should specify how young people can access training in areas not covered by formal education, such as reproductive health and financial literacy. This would help young people become more self-aware and make better use of their limited financial resources," he told the gathering.

Gipson Kawago, a conference participant, highlighted the need for stronger focus on practical education over conceptual learning, as

serting that this would help young people become self-employed upon leaving school or college.

"There is a lack of infrastructure to help young people develop practical skills. A system should also be introduced to teach students digital literacy from primary school, so that they are familiar with technology when they reach higher education," he stated.

Joseph Malekela, contributing, observed that the vision does not clearly outline how the country plans to prepare young people for leadership roles, hinting at the need for the vision to specify a formal process by 2050, showing how young people will be included in decision-making positions.

Ridhiwani Kikwete, the Labour, Youth, Employment and Persons with Disabilities state minister in the Prime Minister's Office (PMO), assured that the government would ensure young people have greater access to national resources. Their ideas would be incorporated into national development plans.

"Your proposals will be taken into account and reflected in the larger plan to be implemented," he said, recalling that addressing the challenges faced by the youth is pivotal to the work assigned to him by President Samia Suluhu Hassan.

Govt launches campaign to sensitise livestock vaccination

TANZANIA has yet to benefit enough from the rich of the abundant livestock breeds available in the country due to diverse setbacks, including prevalence of diseases, among others.

Despite standing second in Africa for harbouring larger livestock, it is a grim revelation that Tanzania failed to sell 882,182.8 tonnes of meat, with a total value of \$3,705,167.76, equal to 9.3bn/- in China, South Africa, Libya, the United Arab Emirates, Mauritius and Singapore.

To address the same, the Ministry of Livestock and Fisheries yesterday launched a national campaign for the sensitization of livestock vaccination, aimed at boosting trades in livestock and its relevant products, within and outside the country.

The development is part to prepare for the envisaged official launch of the National Livestock Vaccination Strategy, the five-year program (2024-2029), to be implemented into different phases at a total cost of around 216bn/-.

Launching the sensitization campaign yesterday here, the livestock minister, Dr Ashatu Kijaji spoke over the need for improving availability of vaccinations to the pastoralists, together with reducing prices.

"We have a major task ahead to

ensure at least 70 percent of the livestock in Tanzania are vaccinated, being from the currently 21 percent," she said.

She said during the 2024-25 fiscal year the government has set aside at least 28.1bn/- as a preliminary budget to support implementation of the first phase of the national vaccination strategy.

Through the strategy, Dr Kijaji informed that the government is targeting to expand meat exportation level to 30,000 tons by 2029, from the currently 14,000 tons, the development which will enable the sector to fetch a total of \$152,287,305.2, being from the currently \$51,894,622.

"As part of preliminary preparations ahead to embark on implementation of the strategy, the ministry is currently finalizing some key issues, including procurement of a total of 700 motorcycle and 4,500 tailor-made gadgets,"

"We're also working to purchase other necessary gears to facilitate the vaccination exercise, such as gumboots, overalls, coolboxes, automatic syringes," Kijaji said.

The facilities will be distributed to the livestock officers across all local government authorities within the country, according to her.

Detailing over the scope of the vaccination, the Minister said the first

phase of the strategy will see a total of 19,097,223 cows across the country vaccinated against the contagious bovine pleuropneumonia (CBPP).

Together with that, she noted that the countrywide exercise will entail vaccination of at least 20, 900,000 goats and sheep against the peste des petits ruminants (PPR), an acute or subacute viral disease of goats and sheep characterized by fever.

"The vaccination will also take into account the poultry sector, whereby a total of 40,000,000 local chickens will receive a special vaccination against the virulent Newcastle Disease (ND)," she explained.

The minister appealed to the pastoralists across the country to ensure they cooperating by sending their cattle to the vaccination centers as the vaccination schedules will direct.

In the rolling out of the vaccinations, he said apart from the livestock officers within the local government authorities, the parent ministry plans to make use of the youths who have graduated from diverse livestock institutes in the country.

"We will open a special window, seeking to offer an interim employment opportunities of absorbing at least 3,540 youths with the livestock health skills," she disclosed.

In order to remove obstacles to livestock trade, especially in the

trade of animals and their products in international markets Dr Kijaji said the campaign will go in tandem with identification and registration of livestock by wearing electronic ear-rings, through which cows, goats and sheep will be identified in the coastal regions, Morogoro and Tanga and on the other hand, identification of goats and sheep will be held in the regions of Lindi and Mtwara.

Speaking for his part, the Permanent Secretary (PS) in the livestock ministry, Prof Riziki Shemdoe said the vaccination was a technical exercise, thus the involving officers must handle it with great care.

He insisted that the government will continue to execute a number of initiatives to ensure the sector inject reasonable contribution towards the state coffers.

"Currently, the sector's share towards the DGP stands at 6.7 percent, the slim figure which we must work to improve," he noted.

Held under the theme "Eliminate livestock diseases to increase production and facilitate trade in livestock sector within and outside the country" the event attracted a series of participants in the sector, including heads of departments, livestock officers from all regions, and representatives from livestock associations, among others.

that would damage the party; instead, I aim to build it," he said, acknowledging that some critics might view his actions as part of just personal interest.

He cited intense criticism he has faced on social media, saying attacks have been relentless and at times discouraging, affirming that what troubles him is the impact these challenges impinge on himself and close associates.

He ventured to admit that his family has noticed an emotional toll these public battles have taken on him, urging him to step aside, telling him with sympathy and resolve, that 'enough is enough.'

Some in his family want him to step aside from politics, he said, seeking to stand above the personal challenges and reassuring his supporters that both his family and the party support base remain resilient.

"Regardless of what happens, my family and the party are strong and will keep moving forward," he declared, as the regional leaders urged him to seek re-election.

The Iringa chieftain set out four reasons for the party chairman to run for another term, discounting the "noise on social media," and insisting that regional leaders are united in support for the chairman.

He said that removing Mbowe from leadership now would be dis-

astrous, as his leadership has been instrumental in uniting the party. To remove him at this stage would be nothing short of madness, he declared.

He insisted that Mbowe has become the role model both for Chadema members and political leaders outside the party. "His true role model status has been forged through self-sacrifice, much like a sacrificial lamb," he ventured to declare.

"His financial commitment to the party speaks volumes. He has built an institution that serves as a refuge for supporters across different political platforms," he further asserted.

"Chadema is not only a sanctuary for its members but also an inspiration to young people passionate about politics. "We must continue to build this institution, which has become a source of hope and inspiration for the youth," he emphasised.

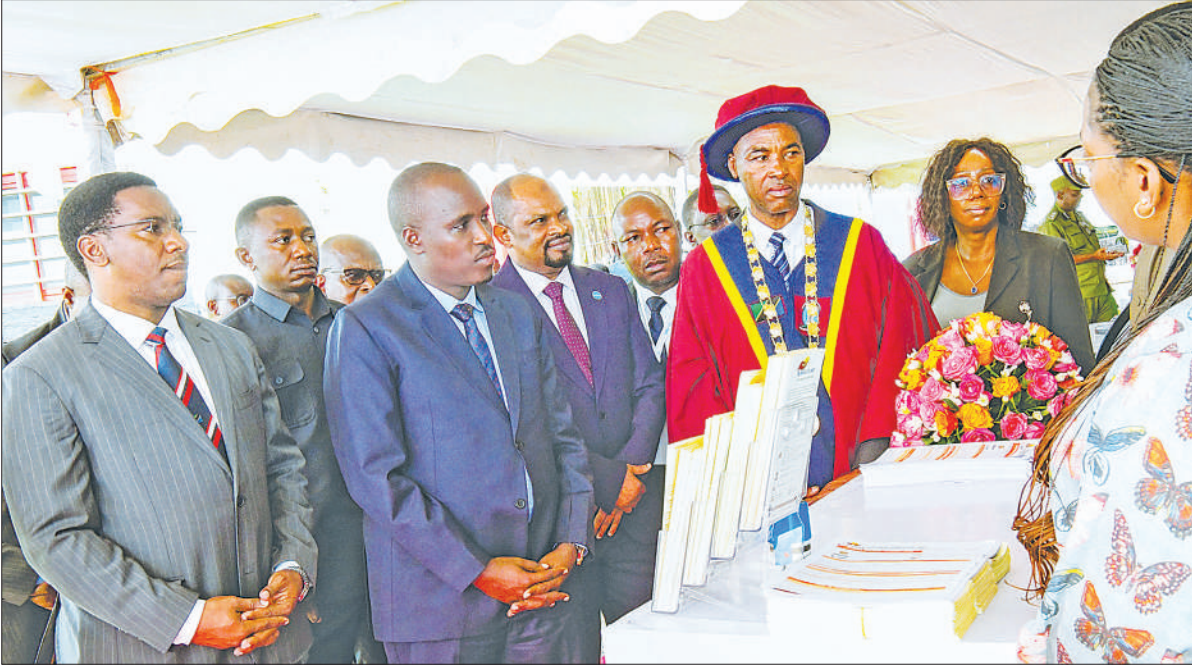
Mbowe's leadership has been crucial in strengthening democracy in the country, thus the regional leaders seek that he stands for another term, until he feels it is time to step down.

Biteko pushes for quality, improved performance in public procurement

DEPUTY Prime Minister and Minister for Energy Dr Doto Biteko has urged procurement and supply chain professionals in the country to adhere to the highest ethical standards in their work to enable the government to drive development for its citizens.

Dr Biteko made the remarks on Tuesday when opening the 15th Annual Procurement and Supply Chain Professionals' Conference currently taking place in Arusha.

He stressed that procurement and supply chain experts play a pivotal role in driving national development and that the government relies on them to achieve its goals. "Procurement and supply chain experts have a major contribution to make. Over 70 percent of the entire national budget is allocated to procurement, so it is crucial that you uphold integrity, fight corruption, and advise on the best ways to successfully implement development programmes," Dr Biteko said.

Given the significant responsibilities entrusted to them, he acknowledged that there is a risk that large-scale corruption could occur within their ranks.

He urged the attendees to use the discussions at the conference to equip themselves with the tools necessary

to prevent and combat such practices.

Furthermore, Dr Biteko emphasised that it is the duty of procurement professionals to safeguard the integrity of their profession and ensure that it is not compromised by individuals lacking the required qualifications.

He also called on the relevant authorities to recognise and motivate qualified professionals in accordance with the law.

He also encouraged the participants to conduct self-assessments regarding their work performance to address any challenges that may tarnish the reputation of the procurement and supply chain profession.

"There are voices among you that you are aware of. Some claim that to secure a tender, one must have close ties with procurement officers. Others say that following proper procurement procedures results in higher costs than usual. Some talk about tender secrets being shared among staff, while others either criticise or praise the process. The important thing is to listen to these voices and reflect on your own practices," he said.

Deputy Minister for Finance, Hamad Chande urged the participants to

collaborate and continue working together, as his ministry seeks solutions to the challenges facing procurement and supply chain professionals.

He identified factors such as jealousy, greed, and gossip among civil servants as major contributors to bureaucratic delays within the government.

He encouraged the professionals to eliminate these issues in order to foster growth and achieve progress.

"The Public Procurement Act, Chapter 410, protects procurement and supply chain professionals, so you should stand tall and ensure that you work in accordance with the existing laws," he said.

Benezeth Ruta, Vice Chairman of the Procurement and Supply Professionals' Board (PSPTB), thanked the government for allocating funds that enable the advancement of the profession.

He mentioned that the board is actively implementing the provisions of the Public Procurement Act No. 23 of 2007, ensuring that procurement and supply professionals meet the necessary qualifications to perform their roles.

THE Food and Agriculture Organisation of the United Nations (FAO) has launched a new initiative aimed at improving food safety and increasing production in Tanzania's meat and dairy sectors.

The project seeks to address the low consumption rates of key animal products such as meat, eggs and milk, which currently fall below global nutritional recommendations.

Recent statistics show that the average Tanzanian consumes just 15 kilograms of meat, 106 eggs, and 62 litres of milk per year, well below recommended levels for optimal health. Experts have noted that milk consumption alone should be closer to 200 litres annually to meet nutritional needs.

To address these deficiencies, the FAO project will support small and medium enterprises (SMEs) within the dairy and meat value chains. Tanzania produces approximately 3.97 billion litres of milk annually, but only about 5 percent is processed—highlighting a significant opportunity for improving milk processing and the production of dairy products.

At the launch event in Dar es Salaam recently, FAO convened an inception meeting to establish guidance mechanisms for SMEs aimed at strengthening food safety in the meat and dairy sectors.

Charles Tulahi, Assistant FAO Representative Tanzania and Head of Programmes, emphasized that the project would provide training, resources, and technical support to SMEs to improve food

safety standards, production quality, and distribution networks.

The ultimate goal is to increase the availability of nutritious food for Tanzanians.

"By improving production and accessibility, this project will help diversify diets, reduce malnutrition, and enhance overall public health," Tulahi said.

The initiative will address key challenges in the value chain, including inadequate infrastructure, limited market linkages, and low compliance with food safety standards.

Tulahi also highlighted that foodborne diseases pose a significant socio-economic burden by straining healthcare systems and negatively impacting national economies.

Through capacity-building efforts, the FAO aims to strengthen Tanzania's local meat and dairy industries, improve market access, and promote sustainable production practices that align with the country's goals for food security and environmental sustainability.

The project is a collaborative effort involving government agencies, private sector stakeholders, and local partners, with the goal of enhancing the competitiveness of Tanzania's meat and dairy sectors both domestically and internationally.

Prof. Riziki Shemdoe, Permanent Secretary at the Ministry of Livestock and Fisheries, highlighted the growth in Tanzania's meat exports, which increased from 1,774.3

tonnes in 2022 to 14,701.2 tonnes in 2023.

He attributed the growth to the government's efforts to revitalise the livestock sector, including a significant increase in budget allocation for the sector.

Shemdoe also pointed to the development of critical infrastructure as essential for improving transportation of livestock and related products, both domestically and internationally.

Additionally, he noted that Tanzania had undertaken major legal and regulatory reforms to create a conducive business environment for livestock trade, ensuring a predictable climate for private sector growth.

"With the FAO project now underway, we are optimistic that it will lead to long-term improvements in food safety and nutri-

tion, benefiting both consumers and producers," Shemdoe said.

Dr Aboubakar Hoza, a senior lecturer at Sokoine University of Agriculture (SUA), stressed the importance of removing bureaucratic obstacles to support farmers and SMEs.

"Simplifying the regulatory process will allow farmers to focus on sustainable and safe practices, helping them meet food safety standards more easily," Hoza said.

The project is expected to have a transformative impact, improving the livelihoods of thousands of people working in Tanzania's dairy and meat sectors. By boosting local production and consumption, the initiative aims to enhance public health and contribute to Tanzania's economic resilience.

Zanzibar creates 12 one-stop facilities to combat violence

IN efforts to heighten the fight against gender-based violence (GBV) and abuse against women and children, Zanzibar has established 12 One-Stop Centres (OSCs) across district and regional hospitals.

The centres provide survivors with comprehensive services, including legal aid, psychosocial counselling, medical care and police support.

Farshuu Hafidh, Coordinator of the One-Stop Centre at the Ministry of Health Zanzibar, shared the progress during a cross-learning workshop held recently in Dar es Salaam.

The event which brought together community development officers, police, doctors, social welfare officers and prosecutors from both Tanzania Mainland and Zanzibar aimed to share best practices for addressing GBV and violence against children (VAC) and discuss opportunities and challenges in tackling the issues.

"The one-stop centres were established to ensure that GBV survivors can access essential services without delay, including legal aid, police support (including issuance of PF3), psychosocial counselling, health services and social welfare support," Hafidh said. "The services are designed to help survivors rebuild their lives and pursue their dreams."

The event also highlighted Zanzibar's efforts to improve its legal framework for addressing GBV.

The island has successfully set up a special court to handle GBV cases and established Police Gender and Children's Desk.

Hafidh expressed gratitude for the collaborative efforts of stakeholders, including the Ministry of Health, police, social welfare services and other legal aid providers in supporting GBV survivors in Zanzibar.

Dr Mzee Nassoro, Assistant Director in Ministry of Health's Division of Reproductive, Maternal and Child Health, explained that GBV involves intentional acts that harm individuals physically, mentally, sexually or economically due to their gender.

Similarly, VAC refers to acts of harm directed at individuals under 18 years of age, including neglect abuse, and harmful practices like Female Genital Mutilation (FGM).

"These forms of violence are deeply rooted in cultural norms, poverty and systemic gender inequality," Dr Nassoro said. "Their consequences are severe, often leading to physical disabilities, chronic health issues and long-term mental health challenges."

Dr Nassoro also highlighted that child marriage remains a significant issue, increasing the vulnerability of young girls to various forms of violence.

The government has taken steps to combat child marriage, including the introduction of free education from primary to secondary school as well as the establishment of youth-friendly services in health facilities to equip girls with the knowledge to protect themselves from abuse and early pregnancies.

The workshop also focused on the broader societal factors that drive GBV and VAC, including harmful cultural practices, poverty, economic dependency and unequal power dynamics. "Harmful cultural practices such as FGM and child marriage, combined with economic inequality and mental health issues create a perfect storm that perpetuates GBV and VAC," Dr Nassoro explained.

The 2022 Tanzania Demographic and Health Survey reported that 27 percent of women in Tanzania have experienced GBV, a decrease from 40 percent in previous surveys (2010 and 2016).

However, this figure remains alarmingly high as no individual should ever experience violence. The survey also found that areas with higher rates of GBV tend to have lower utilisation of reproductive health services, indicating that violence inhibits access to essential healthcare.

The one-stop centres in Zanzibar and mainland alongside ongoing awareness campaigns and legal reforms are part of the broader effort to reduce GBV and VAC and ensure that survivors receive the support they need to heal and thrive.

The workshop organised collaboratively by the Ministry of Health, Tanzania Men as Equal Partners in Development (TMEPiD) and funded by GIZ Tanzania, the European Union, and the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), provided an opportunity for key stakeholders to share experiences and strengthen their collective efforts to address the critical issues.

Mozambique: About 650,000 children at risk from cyclone

AROUND 650,000 children are at risk from the impacts of Cyclone Chido in northern Mozambique, the non-governmental organisation (NGO) Save The Children warned on Monday, adding that aid actions are underway.

"Cyclone Chido is a catastrophe for children in northern Mozambique. They risk losing their homes, being separated from their families and having extremely limited access to water, sanitation, healthcare and education," said Ilaria Manunza, director of Save The Children in Mozambique, quoted in a statement from the organisation.

She said that Save The Children has prepared teams and resources to support those most affected by the storm, as part of an "urgent and multidimensional response", also mentioning the vulnerability of communities exposed to Chido.

"This storm is yet another example of extreme weather conditions devastating an already vulnerable community, torn apart by conflict and plunged into poverty," added Ilaria Manunza.

According to the NGO, organisational teams are present in most areas hardest hit by the cyclone. They will support the establishment of child protection systems and services and the rehabilitation of destroyed schools.

"Save the Children is preparing to support the affected communities with survival kits and other essential items, in coordination with other agencies," reads the statement, which also warns of difficulties in assisting

Cabo Delgado, due to the presence of armed groups that have been carrying out attacks in the region since 2017.

At least four people died, and another 37 were injured after Cyclone Chido hit the provinces of Cabo Delgado and Nampula, according to organisations on the ground.

According to the National Emergency Operations Centre (noe), the cyclone, which had a scale of 3 (1 to 5), hit the coastal area of northern Mozambique on Saturday night.

The same service indicated that the cyclone had weakened to a severe tropical storm but that it was still lashing those two northern provinces, with "very heavy rainfall of over 250 mm [millimetres]/24 hours, accompanied by thunderstorms and winds with very strong gusts".

"This scenario presents a high risk of urban flooding and erosion in the cities of Pemba, Nacala and Lichinga, as well as in low-lying and riverside areas of the Muaguide, Megaruma and Lúrio river basins," said the CNOE information, consulted by Lusa.

Around 200,000 customers were left without electricity in Nampula and Cabo Delgado due to the effects of Chido's passage, said Eletricidade de Moçambique (EDM) on Sunday, and at least three flights to the northern region were cancelled on the same day by the airline Linhas Aéreas de Moçambique (LAM).

On Thursday, Mozambican authorities already acknowledged that the cyclone could affect around 2.5 million people in the provinces of Nampula, Cabo Delgado, and Niassa in the north and Zambézia and Tete in the centre.

Prioritise crossbreeding tech to lift meat production, NARCO advised

MINISTER for Livestock and Fisheries Dr Ashantu Kijaji has challenged the National Ranching Company Limited (NARCO) to intensify research and programmes focused on producing high-quality crossbred livestock species to enhance Tanzania's meat industry.

Speaking yesterday during a visit to Kongwa Ranch in Kongwa District, Dodoma Region, Dr Kijaji who was recently appointed to lead the ministry explained that the initiative, alongside improvements in the fodder subsector is critical for ensuring a steady supply of quality meat to strengthen the country's economy.

Dr Kijaji called on NARCO to

focus on crossbreeding to allow local livestock farmers to compete effectively in both international and regional meat markets, thus increasing profits for the sector. She stressed that this would play a vital role in improving Tanzania's overall economic performance.

"I direct NARCO to take immediate steps to enhance crossbreeding of cattle to ensure that local farmers are well equipped to enter the international meat market," she said.

The minister also called for better coordination between NARCO and the Ministry of Livestock's Director of Production and Marketing

Development, Stephen Michael, to resolve the outstanding payments to the contractor overseeing the construction of six wells at NARCO's major ranches.

"Completion of the wells is crucial for ensuring professional production of livestock pastures. The wells will support the overall development of ranching sector," Dr Kijaji added, expressing concern that the project had stalled due to unpaid dues.

During the visit, Dr Kijaji observed the progress of the project and noted the government's significant investment in the initiative.

"The government has already

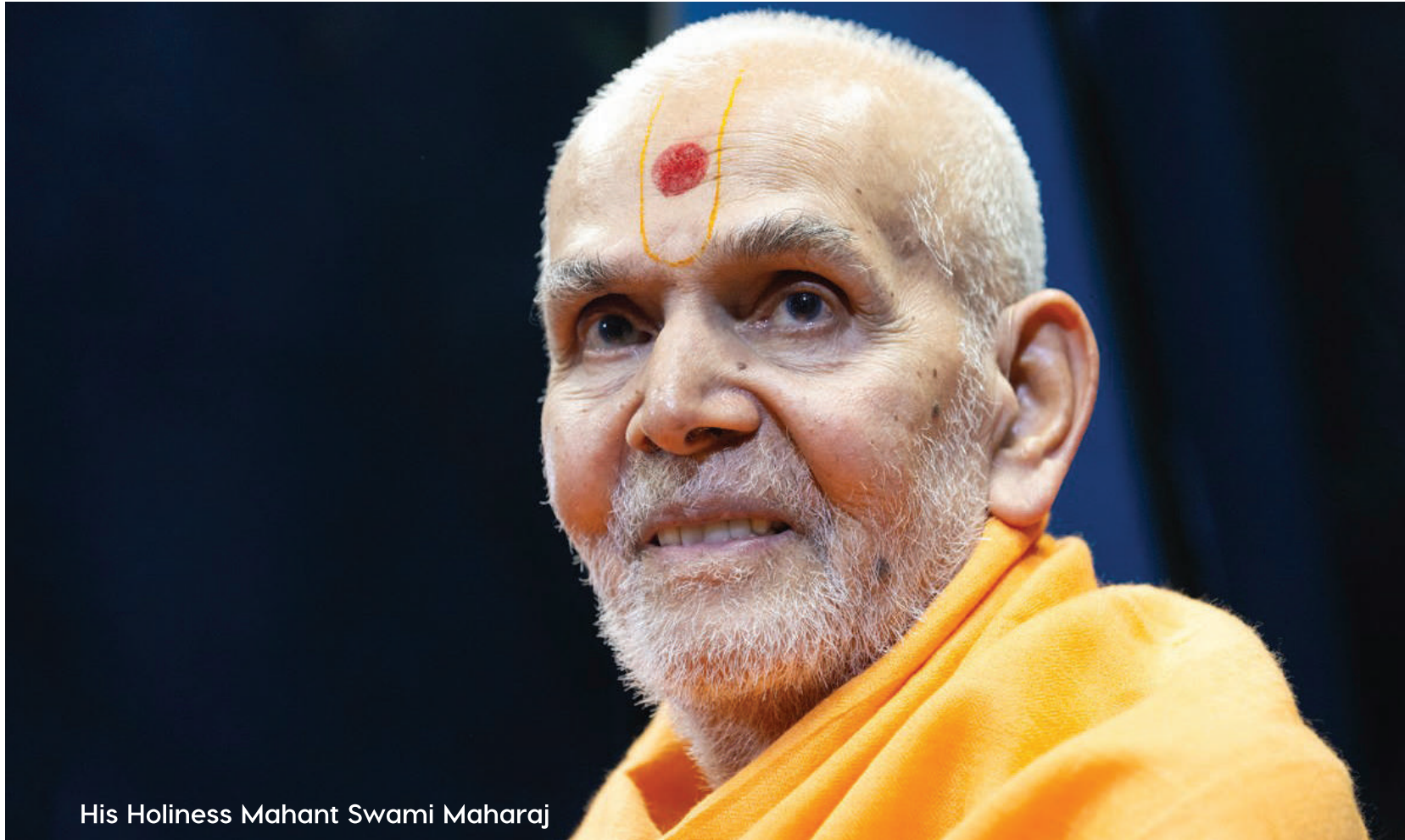
invested 700m/- to support construction of these wells, and it is important that the contractor receives remaining payments so that the project can proceed," she said.

Aziz Mrima, Chairman of NARCO Board, assured the minister that the company was working diligently to improve livestock production and ensure that the breeds are competitive within the broader African market.

Responding to the minister's directives, Michael promised to address the concerns and ensure that all necessary steps are taken to meet the outlined objectives.

Additionally, Bashungwa expressed gratitude to the government for allocating 42.5bn/- for NIDA's operations in the 2024/2025 financial year.

"Regarding the financial challenges facing NIDA, I will engage with the Treasury to explore the best solutions and ensure successful distribution of identification cards to citizens," he said.

Acting Director General of NIDA, Deusedit Buberwa, thanked the government for the vehicles and assured that the vehicles would be well maintained and used for the intended purposes.

"These vehicles will greatly assist us in two key tasks: registering citizens and distributing national identity cards," he said.

He further highlighted that Tanzania's geographical diversity makes the vehicles crucial in fulfilling the government's goal of ensuring every Tanzanian gets a national ID card.

Initiative launched to address post-harvest losses in Zanzibar

IN a bid to strengthen Zanzibar's horticultural industry, the Tanzania Horticultural Association (TAHA) yesterday introduced an ambitious project focused on reducing post-harvest losses and waste.

Supported by the United States Agency for International Development (USAID), the "Feed the Future Tanzania, Tuhifadhi Chakula" (Let's Save Food) initiative aims to tackle inefficiencies in the agricultural value chain by promoting modern practices and technology adoption.

The project, set to engage over 10,000 stakeholders in Zanzibar over the next four years, aims to address critical challenges that have hindered the sector's growth.

The horticultural industry has long faced significant losses, with post-harvest waste accounting for up to 40 percent of produce.

Between 2012 and 2016, these losses resulted in an estimated economic loss of \$1.7 billion.

One of the key events of the initiative was a farmers' field day held in Pemba, which attracted hundreds of local farmers eager to learn from horticultural experts and industry actors.

The field day offered hands-on demonstrations and information on vital post-harvest management technologies (PHMT), focusing on

areas such as proper food handling, storage methods, and value addition techniques.

Kelvin Remen, Deputy Chief of Party for the project, highlighted the importance of these practical sessions.

He explained that earlier consultations with stakeholders in Zanzibar revealed a lack of access to financing and limited awareness about post-harvest management technologies, including modern harvest techniques, improved storage systems, processing innovations, and efficient packaging methods.

The field day was organized to address these gaps, foster collaboration, and introduce solutions to improve the sector's overall efficiency.

"This project aims to modernize horticultural practices in Zanzibar, helping to build a more resilient and sustainable industry," said Remen.

"By empowering farmers with knowledge and tools, we can significantly enhance their livelihoods and create a brighter future for the industry."

Eng. Indris Abdullah, officer in charge of the Ministry of Agriculture, Irrigation, Natural Resources, and Livestock, also spoke at the event,

emphasizing the importance of sharing knowledge and experiences among farmers.

Hestressed that the field day not only focused on improving post-harvest practices but also facilitated the creation of a strong, interconnected network of farmers in Pemba. "The event has been instrumental in enhancing post-harvest management and building a supportive community of horticultural farmers," Engineer Abdullah noted.

"TAHA's efforts are crucial in linking farmers to markets and financial services, which are vital for improving productivity and ensuring food security in Zanzibar."

Abdullah also commended TAHA for its ongoing advocacy to create a favourable environment for the growth of Zanzibar's horticultural sector, enabling farmers to access the resources and support they need for success.

The "Feed the Future Tanzania, Tuhifadhi Chakula" project is setting a benchmark for innovation and collaboration in the horticultural industry. Its long-term goals include improving food security, increasing economic opportunities for farmers, and ensuring the sustainable growth of the sector in Zanzibar.

Discussing Zanzibar channel trade barriers points to the right direction

ZANZIBAR President Dr Hussein Ali Mwinyi has recently had an audience in Zanzibar with the national Presidential Commission on Tax Reforms, the 'heart and soul' of the agenda relating to Union tax issues.

Evidently, it isn't at that level that actual bits and pieces of tax demands at ports of entry or shops can be tabled, but there are all the same crucial issues of principle.

It is whether it is taxation between two countries or extended taxation in the same country, only at one point, then recognized without further demands on another local entry port.

The Union government commission needs to find tax reform proposals that are palatable to the Zanzibar and Union authorities, where the onus is on the Union authorities to bring down onerous tax demands so that Zanzibar becomes an extension of the local customs and excise regime but not a special third party.

Instituting East African Community customs protocols into use at the start of the past decade diminished cross-channel differences to a large extent. Even then Zanzibar did not restore its past trade hub for the Mainland.

Therefore, at the third or so preliminary round meetings with commission panel members, much of what is being said is still fairly general.

The Zanzibar leader expressed belief that proposed reforms would transform the tax systems on both sides of the Union, ultimately improving business operations and tax-related matters. Highly laudable optimism this was.

What is especially instructive there is the transformation projection though in typical multilateral 'double talk' it was preceded by strengthening, then transforming, tax systems in both parts of the Union.

Diplomatically, it suggests that while respecting the wish to strengthen institutions, transforming the conduct of tax administration by the Union authorities is seen as essential.

One notable observation was obtained from Zanzibar's First Vice President, Othman Masoud Othman, who objected to the prevailing tax system, allowing for the proliferation of taxes managed by specific authorities.

What he did not go as far as actually declaring is that those authorities need to be left with regulatory or procedural roles, while taxation is consolidated and simplified. That is if the government decided on altering its policy anchor from commercial parastatals to markets.

Still, the Zanzibar opposition national unity government partner pointed at multiple tax authorities as significantly inconveniencing for businesses. Just how far the panel of experts in the commission are in a position of finding answers is hard to say, as taxation arises from monopoly.

The opposition leader notably noted that several airlines offer numerous job opportunities but aviation requires tax reforms to improve efficiency and substantially benefit the country.

He was of the view that air transport need not remain accessible only to the wealthy, and so reform is a matter of necessity if we are to foster growth in the sector.

It is rather difficult to see such ideas taken up, as the dominant viewpoint may treat vast government subsidies in that sphere with some preference whereas, if the airlines referred had extended their wings, the fares would be far more competitive.

As often happens, this could also be the case of compromises not being all that visible but still the palaver being beneficial.

Eliminating double taxation, easing property deals good for investments

YET another of those moments promising to progressively improve the face of our country in the way it conducts business was visible only the other day as Tanzania and Oman agreed on removing double taxation on incomes and curbing tax avoidance.

Our Finance minister described the pact, signed in Muscat, as a significant step in opening up our economy by attracting wider international investments.

Given the sort of background we have in policy making, used to seeking loans from multilateral agencies and handing them to loss-making firms in the public sector to continue doing the same thing, at times opening up needs to be justified.

And the usual line is that it arises from efforts by none other than the president, which is true but needs to be anchored in substantial commitment to reform.

But this should not stand as largely more of an exception than the rule, and for that reason we should understand that investors elsewhere - including in Oman - will still be watching.

One difficulty in evaluating what this and various other moves imply for policy and economic dynamic is that there is scarcely any private sector evaluation of what is taking place.

There are no economic think-tanks that evaluate policy on a routine basis outside a public sector perspective, for instance in the form of periodic evaluations by the Bank of Tanzania, the World Bank or the

African Development Bank.

We hear from the minister that the newly signed pact will see investors and traders engaged in bilateral activities taxed only once; it is unclear what potential that will have on increased investments.

Another visible aspect is the conveying of public information only in the context of what was agreed upon, without professional input by independent observers as to what might have been the agenda, at least from the Omani side.

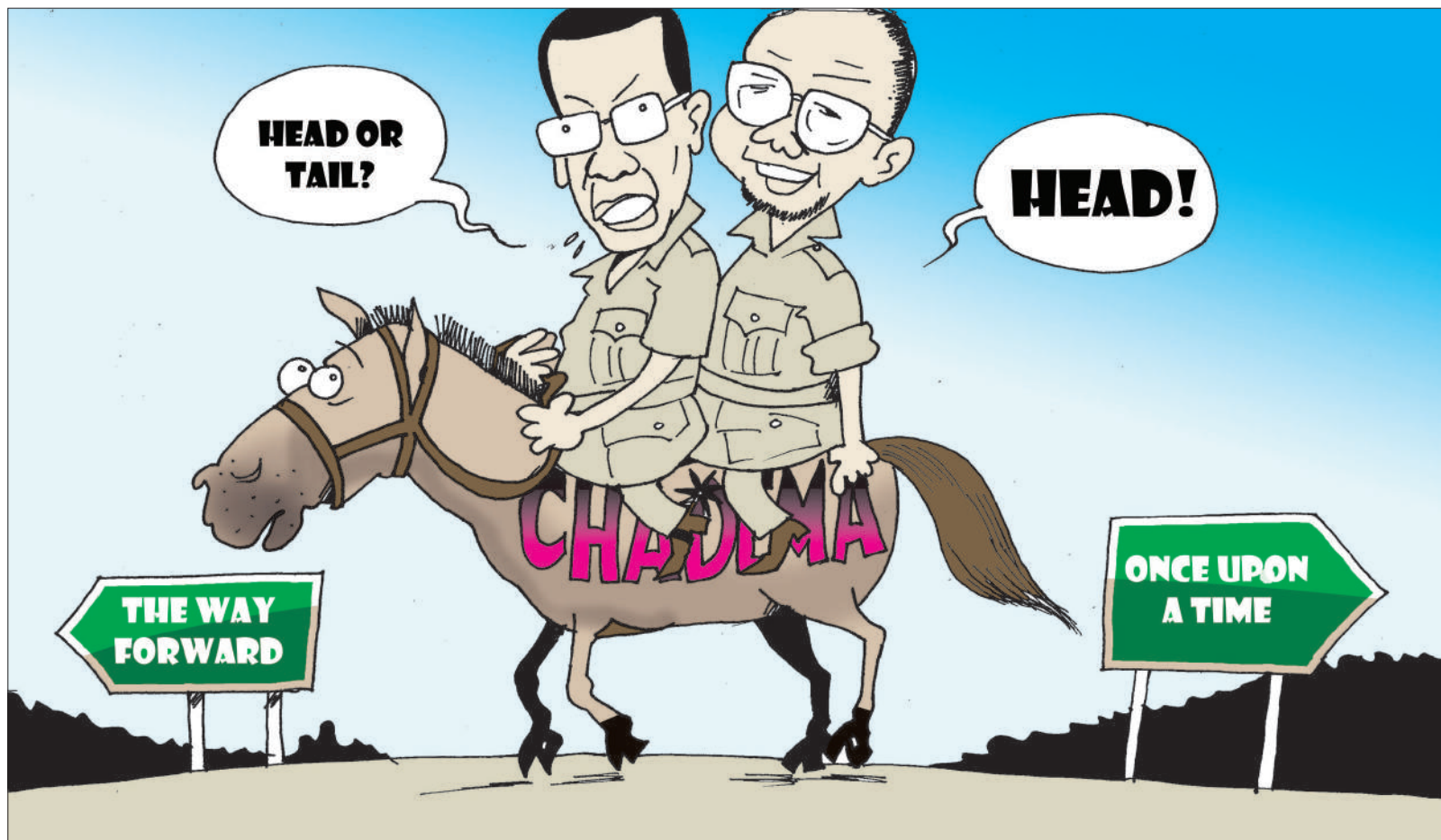
What sort of trade arrangements did they think are best for maximising investments, and what sort of compromises did they have to make to reach a workable agreement?

The relevance of such inquiry is that the disparity from what was suggested and what was obtained is the key to its potential success.

There is no denying that avoiding being taxed in both countries on identical transactions or income would be a positive gesture as such drawbacks hinder the prosperity of businesses operating from either side.

But that is as far as it goes, as the solution to this specific issue doesn't end all the woes by interested investors, so it will enable those concerned only with double taxation to now think of getting going - as various others remain ambivalent.

Some references were made to investment interests by some big companies having royal family links, as indeed royalty in the modern world and even in the past, was about commerce.



Rethinking white rice: A balanced approach to the management of blood sugar, diabetes

DIETARY management is essential for maintaining healthy blood sugar levels. Many people believe that eating white rice causes blood sugar spikes. However, when eaten in moderation and as part of a balanced diet, rice can help stabilise blood sugar and may even play a role in reversing diabetes.

Additionally, many natural methods can aid in maintaining stable blood sugar levels. A systematic review published in BMJ Open indicated that eating white rice was associated with an increased risk of Type 2 diabetes.

[BMJ Open is a peer-reviewed open access medical journal dedicated to publishing medical research from all disciplines and therapeutic areas.]

However, my years of clinical practice have demonstrated that rice consumption can offer significant benefits for people with diabetes.

According to traditional Chinese medicine (TCM), eating white rice offers three key benefits for stabilising blood sugar.

One: Boosting energy and vitality

Rice contains protein, fat and carbohydrates, vital energy sources for the human body. After eating, carbohydrates - including starches, sugars and fibre - are broken down into glucose, which enters the bloodstream and raises blood sugar levels.

This increase triggers the pancreas to secrete insulin, enabling the body to manage blood sugar effectively.

Eating rice provides energy to cells, strengthens muscles, enhances vitality and supports tissue repair.

In Asian cultures, some patients avoid eating rice entirely in an effort to reduce carbohydrate intake or lose weight. However, this can be an overcorrection, often leading to hunger and fatigue.

As a result, they may turn to snacks or desserts - which can, in turn, cause blood sugar spikes. Therefore, it is important to include rice in your diet in reasonable amounts, as eating too little may not provide lasting fullness.

Two: Promoting wound healing

If rice is a staple food in a region, long-term avoidance of eating it may deprive cells of vital nutrients, potentially resulting in two significant consequences, one being weakened immunity.

A lack of adequate nutrition can compromise the immune system,



increasing the risk of infections and susceptibility to illness.

The other is cell necrosis (cell death). Nutritional deficiencies may lead to gradual cell necrosis, particularly in wounds or injured tissue. As necrotic cells break down, they can damage surrounding healthy tissue, causing the affected area to expand. In severe cases, this could result in the need for amputation.

Therefore, following a balanced diet and stable blood sugar levels is crucial. This helps maintain a strong immune system and promotes proper wound healing.

Three: Supporting digestive health

One ancient medical text describes white rice as a food that strengthens the organs, muscles and bones. It emphasizes that people with diabetes or weak digestive systems should include white rice in their diet. Another similarly highlights grains as the foundational food for maintaining and nurturing health.

Eating rice in moderation, combined with regular exercise, can help stabilise blood sugar levels. White rice also offers the added benefit of replenishing energy in the spleen and lungs while providing energy to the gut. It enhances intestinal peristalsis, which helps promote smoother bowel movements.

The gut, also known as the gastrointestinal system, is the part of the body that digests food and absorbs nutrients. It includes the stomach, intestines and colon.

Numerous studies indicate that physical activity and exercise should be recommended for people with diabetes to help manage blood sugar levels and improve overall well-being.

These recommendations should be tailored to the specific needs of each individual. Additionally, all adults are encouraged to reduce prolonged sitting by incorporating frequent movement into their daily routines.

The Healthy Eating Plate

The Healthy Eating Plate, developed by the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health, divides food into four portions: two of vegetables and fruits, one of protein, and one of whole grains or starchy foods. This balanced distribution helps diabetic patients control meal portions and maintain stable blood sugar levels.

For example, the vegetable and fruit portions can include options like broccoli, carrots, cabbage, or a selection of fruits. The protein portion may feature foods like meat or scrambled eggs. The whole grains and starchy foods portion can include items such as white rice, sweet potatoes or millet.

For vegetarians, vegetables can be stir-fried with mushrooms - for instance, peas stir-fried with king oyster mushrooms make a delicious option. The protein portion may include dishes like braised tofu, while the starchy foods portion may feature options such as rice, sweet potatoes, or yam.

[Tofu is a food prepared by coagulating soy milk and then pressing the resulting curds into solid white blocks of varying softness: silken, soft, firm, extra firm. Tofu is translated as bean curd in English. It originated in China, where it has been consumed for over 2,000 years. Tofu is low in calories but high in protein and fat. It also contains many important vitamins and minerals, including calcium and manganese.]

Generally, it is better to eat half a bowl of white rice rather than just a tiny portion. Many diabetic patients avoid white rice owing to concerns about high blood sugar, opting instead for brown rice or germinated rice.

However, for those with weaker digestion or poor spleen and stomach function, these alternatives may cause indigestion and an upset stomach.

Start your meals with protein

Studies have found that eating protein, fat and fibre before carbohydrates can improve post-meal blood sugar levels. The recommended eating sequence is to start with protein-rich foods,

such as meat, eggs or legumes followed by vegetables, and to finish with rice. This sequence gives the body time to prepare for insulin secretion, helping to stabilise blood sugar levels.

Eating slowly and chewing thoroughly are also advisable - around 20 to 30 times per bite. Chewing slowly allows the brain to register feelings of fullness, which prevents overeating and rushing through meals. In addition to promoting stable blood sugar levels, this practice improves digestion and nutrient absorption and aids in weight management.

Enjoy fruits in moderation

Fruits contain natural fructose, so diabetic patients are advised to limit their intake to one serving per day - about the size of a woman's fist.

Meanwhile, if you notice a sweet smell in your urine, it could indicate excessive glucose - a potential symptom of diabetes. If this is accompanied by frequent urination, excessive thirst, unexplained weight loss or fatigue, it is crucial to seek medical attention promptly for further evaluation. It is a simple method to self-check for diabetes.

Can diabetic patients eat porridge?

Diabetic patients can consume rice porridge in moderation as part of a healthy lifestyle that includes regular exercise. As mentioned, some diabetic patients avoid all starches entirely, only to find that their blood sugar levels remain persistently high. However, after following their doctor's advice to reintroduce rice into their diet and adopt a balanced lifestyle, their blood sugar levels often stabilise.

Once blood sugar levels are under control, shifting your perspective from being a patient to living as a normal, healthy individual is important.

Overcoming challenges in Tanzania's curriculum reforms

CHANGE is inevitable. If we do not adapt, change itself will force us to. In a rapidly evolving world, the ability to take swift, decisive action is crucial for success. This makes dynamic thinking essential, especially in addressing weaknesses that accompany changes in education.

Whenever we reform our education system, positive criticism is to be expected. These critiques help identify weaknesses, and by addressing them, we uphold the validity of the reforms.

The goal for Tanzania as a nation is to ensure quality education for all. Minor weaknesses in curriculum changes should be seen as opportunities for educational stakeholders to demonstrate creativity and problem-solving skills.

Human thought and interaction foster new ideas and improvements, but perfection is unattainable. Challenges that arise from curriculum changes should be met with a culture of problem-solving rather than complaints.

The government announced to start implementing the new Education and Training Policy (2023 edition) in January 2024. The policy, which has been in the making for nearly four years, introduces some major changes in the country's education sector.

A visionary nation invests in its education system. The government's commitment to preserving Tanzania's culture, morals and history led to the introduction of *Historia ya Tanzania na Maadili* in primary schools.

According to Educational Circular No 5 of 2023, the initial phase will start with immediate implementation of the new policy for pre-primary, grade one, and grade three in primary schools after the opening of the school year in January 2024.

This subject equips students with a sense of identity, teaching them where they come from, where they are now,



and where they are headed. It fosters values like unity, cooperation, and humanity, and it embraces Kiswahili, the national language.

It aims to instill a sense of pride, identity and awareness of Tanzania's rich cultural heritage. By teaching students about the country's history, values, and morals, it helps preserve the cultural identity

of Tanzanians.

Changes in the curriculum emphasize the importance of moral values such as unity, cooperation, humanity and love. These values are essential for fostering responsible and ethical citizens who can contribute positively to society.

Understanding history helps pupils know where they come from; this knowl-

edge enables them to make informed decisions and plan for the future. A society that knows its history and values is better positioned to develop a clear vision for the future. The subject helps students become aware of their nation's journey and challenges.

Challenges in teaching the new subject While *Historia ya Tanzania*

na Maadili reflects Tanzanian heritage, history as an academic discipline has roots abroad, primarily in English-speaking contexts. This presents several challenges including technical language barriers whereas students may lack exposure to technical historical terms in English, which could hinder those pursuing higher education in history.

They may need additional time to learn specialized English vocabulary to keep up with international standards.

Teaching history in Kiswahili risks diluting the meaning of translated terms. Learning history in its original language often ensures deeper content mastery than learning through translation. Ter-

minologies like historical linguistics, axiology, and anthropology among others will be missing in our education. Therefore *Historia ya Tanzania na Maadili* has produced some challenges which suggest a solution.

Tanzanians aiming to teach history abroad may be disadvantaged if they lack proficiency in English. Western universities offering African studies programmes might favour candidates who can teach in English, putting Tanzanians at risk of losing opportunities to other African educators.

Despite these challenges, solutions exist. Teachers can integrate English translations of key historical terms into their lessons. Many teachers were educated in English, making this approach feasible.

However, historical books in English remain available, enabling students to broaden their understanding through self-study.

Every challenge invites creativity. The current curriculum reforms are valuable and designed by qualified individuals. While human efforts are never perfect, they are dynamic and adaptable.

Allowing flexibility and creativity during implementation will ensure the reforms are effective. Ultimately, teaching is about solving problems, and embracing change with innovative solutions will keep Tanzania's education system on a path to success. Teaching is problem solving.

This year's theme highlights the stark reality that despite some advances, the global push for UHC has largely stalled, with 4.5 billion people still lacking sufficient coverage.

The situation is even direr in low- and middle-income countries, where the cost of healthcare is pushing up to 1.3 billion people further into poverty.

For nations like Tanzania, this challenge is particularly pressing. The country has made considerable strides toward UHC, but deep-rooted structural and systemic issues continue to impede progress.

The government has enacted the landmark Universal Health Insurance Act, mandating health insurance coverage for all residents to close the coverage gap.

However, with only 15 percent of the population in mainland Tanzania covered by any form of health insurance, and virtually none in Zanzibar, it's clear that there's a long road ahead.

Health financing remains one of the most significant bottlenecks in Tanzania's journey towards UHC. The country faces an increasing demand for healthcare services, especially with a rapidly growing population.

Despite the government's commitment to reforming the health system, inefficient allocation of resources and limited capacity to manage finances continue to hinder its ability to deliver on the promise of universal coverage.

The Controller and Auditor General's report highlights these challenges, pointing to the poor management of funds allocated to health programs and the lack of accountability in health insurance schemes. While the government has allocated more resources to health since the pandemic, these efforts have not been enough to bridge the gap.

The introduction of the Community Health Fund (CHF) in Tanzania,

supported by Switzerland's Health Promotion and System Strengthening (HPSS) project, offers a glimmer of hope.

By the end of the project in 2023, about 5 percent of the population was enrolled in the CHF, a community-based insurance scheme aimed at reaching the rural and informal sectors.

The program has made significant progress in extending coverage to vulnerable groups, but it remains a drop in the ocean.

The rural population, in particular, remains underserved, and the CHF's success is limited by weak administrative structures and insufficient funding.

Despite these hurdles, the Tanzanian government is pushing forward with its commitment to universal health insurance. Both mainland Tanzania and Zanzibar have fast-tracked the enactment of a mandatory health insurance law, yet operationalization is at different stages, with both regions struggling with legislative and institutional challenges.

For example, the health insurance fund's management information system is still not fully integrated into the health system, limiting its potential

to reach the broader population. Moreover, the slow pace of digitization in the health sector hampers efforts to enhance efficiency, responsiveness, and coverage.

Digital health technologies could be a game-changer for Tanzania. The government recognizes the transformative potential of digital solutions to improve service delivery, manage healthcare data, and streamline the insurance process. However, the slow integration of digital innovations into the healthcare system remains a major challenge.

Weak governance and poor coordination between stakeholders have stalled efforts to fully leverage digital tools in healthcare. The lack of infrastructure and capacity to manage these technologies, particularly in rural areas, further exacerbates the problem.

The Tanzanian case is just one example of the broader challenges facing national health insurance schemes in low- and middle-income countries.

Globally, UHC is seen as a critical enabler of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), but the dream of universal health

coverage remains elusive for millions. In countries like Tanzania, the gap between policy intentions and reality is wide.

While the government has demonstrated political will and made significant investments in primary healthcare, the resources available are insufficient to meet the needs of the entire population. Moreover, the political economy of healthcare financing remains deeply entrenched in inefficiencies, which undermine the country's efforts to move towards UHC.

This challenge is not unique to Tanzania. Across Sub-Saharan Africa, millions of people are excluded from essential health services, with catastrophic health expenditures pushing many further into poverty.

The problem is compounded by economic constraints, rising inflation, and public debt, which limit governments' ability to invest in healthcare infrastructure. In many countries, the informal sector, which constitutes the majority of the workforce, remains excluded from health insurance schemes, making it even more difficult to achieve universal

coverage. The push for UHC is not just about expanding coverage; it's also about ensuring that the quality of care meets the needs of the population. In Tanzania, the health system has made improvements in primary healthcare services by increasing the number of health facilities, healthcare workers, and medical equipment.

These investments have led to better health outcomes, but inefficiencies in the system persist. For example, health facilities are often underfunded and lack basic equipment and supplies, which undermines the quality of care provided.

The government's focus on prevention, particularly through vaccinations and health education programs, has yielded positive results, but more needs to be done to strengthen the entire healthcare system.

A key element in Tanzania's strategy for UHC is health equity - ensuring that all people, regardless of their income or social status, can access quality care. This requires addressing the social determinants of health, such as access to clean water, sanitation, education, and nutrition.

Without addressing these factors, UHC will remain out of reach for many people, particularly those in rural and marginalized communities.

Achieving UHC 2.0 - a more inclusive, sustainable, and equitable model of healthcare - will require innovative financing solutions.

One promising approach is the introduction of mandatory contributions to health insurance schemes, which can help build a more sustainable funding base for UHC.

The use of digital health technologies can also play a crucial role in expanding access to healthcare services, particularly in remote areas where

traditional healthcare infrastructure is lacking. Nevertheless, these solutions must be carefully tailored to the context of each country, taking into account cultural, economic, and political factors.

Tanzania's efforts to reform its healthcare system are a step in the right direction, but the journey is far from over. To truly achieve UHC, the government must address the fundamental challenges of health financing, digital integration, and equity.

This will require a coordinated effort across sectors, from government and the private sector to civil society and development partners. The key to success lies in building a health system that is not only financially sustainable but also responsive to the needs of the people it serves.

The world is watching as countries like Tanzania attempt to build a more inclusive and equitable healthcare system.

The progress made so far is commendable, but the task ahead remains monumental. As we mark International UHC Day, it's clear that the road to universal health coverage is long and fraught with challenges.

But with sustained effort, innovative financing, and a commitment to health equity, UHC can become a reality for all.

Tanzania's journey is a reminder that while progress has been made, much work remains to ensure that no one is left behind in the pursuit of health and well-being for all.

AfDB commemorates sixty years of impactful work

ABIDJAN

Ethiopia has joined other countries across the continent to celebrate the African Development Bank's 60th anniversary with a colourful and instructive trip down 'Memory Lane'.

On 29 November 2024, an eventful day of activities, organised by the Bank's country office and the government of Ethiopia, was held in the capital, Addis Ababa under the theme "60 Years of Making a Difference".

Guests, including senior government officials, ministers, members of the diplomatic corps, development partners, Bank staff, academics and others – filled the room to watch a documentary on the Bank's projects and overall impact of decades of activities in Ethiopia.

During interludes, the audience was treated to captivating traditional dances and singing, offering a vibrant display of the richness of Ethiopia's and Africa's cultural heritage.

Amid claps and cheers, Dr Leandro Bassole, the Bank's Deputy Director General for East Africa, who is also Country Manager for Ethiopia, rose to present his welcoming remarks.

"From its inception, the Bank has been a cornerstone for financing critical infrastructure, fostering regional integration, and supporting initiatives that uplift millions from poverty. Our collective journey has been defined by a solid commitment, collaboration, and innovation," he said.

"We have worked hand in hand to drive the nation's develop-

ment agenda. Together, we have embarked on a journey of transformation, focusing on strategic priorities and delivering tangible results for the Ethiopian people," he added.

Bassole mentioned sectors where the Bank has intervened. For example transport, where investments exceeding \$2.1 billion have helped construct over 1,600 km of paved roads, including flagship projects like the Jimma-Mizan, Mombasa-Nairobi-Addis Ababa, Bedele-Metu, and Modjo-Hawassa roads, all of which have contributed to Ethiopia's vision of becoming a regional connectivity hub.

"These initiatives have tripled road density from 44 km/1,000 km² in 2010 to 136 km/1,000 km² in 2021, reducing travel times and enhancing trade and mobility," he declared.

Similar large investments have gone into water and sanitation projects, and energy and agriculture sectors - a fact underlined by several ministers.

Ethiopia's State Minister of Finance for Economic Cooperation, Semereta Sewasew, appreciated the Bank's immense support, saying it "has also fostered an environment of shared knowledge, expertise, and commitment to the common goal of achieving sustainable development in Ethiopia."

She pointed out that from 1975, when the Bank first began operations in Ethiopia, it has financed 213 projects including 39 in transportation, 28 in energy; 66 in agriculture; and some five projects in job creation.

"This partnership has enabled Ethiopia to achieve tangible and



lasting impacts, particularly in the agriculture sector where we have seen improved food security, increased productivity, and greater resilience to climate change. Similarly, in the infrastructure and energy sectors, the collaboration has led to the building of roads, the expansion of access to electricity, and improvements in essential public services," she said.

Artists in West Africa protest against FRANC CFA currency

This currency, a relic of the colonial era, continues to symbolize the enduring economic influence of France over its former colonies, and many believe it stifles the region's development.

A colonial relic that hinders progress

The CFA franc, used by 14 West African countries, is pegged to the euro, restricting the region's monetary sovereignty. Critics argue that this connection benefits France far more than it helps the African nations. By tethering local economies to a strong foreign currency, the CFA franc makes locally-produced goods less competitive internationally. Moreover, the production of the currency remains under French control, raising concerns about potential manipulation for political or economic gain.

Voices of a new generation

The younger generation in West Africa is increasingly vocal about the need for change. Across the region, young leaders and artists are demanding full financial independence as a crucial step toward achieving genuine sovereignty. Economists support these calls, arguing that it is time for West African countries to develop a currency that is untethered from external influences like the euro.

This movement is not confined



to political debates—it is finding expression in vibrant and impactful street art. Murals and graffiti are becoming symbols of resistance, bringing the conversation into public spaces and amplifying the voices of those calling for change.

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The Graffiti Revolution: A Symbol of Protest

In Burkina Faso, a striking mural recently appeared on the walls of the Philippe Zinda Kaboré High School in Ouagadougou. The artwork, featuring a map of Africa and the determined gaze of a woman, boldly proclaims, "Exit the CFA Franc." The artist behind this piece views the currency as a weapon wielded by France against Africa's population, calling for its abolition in favor of financial independence.

Similarly, in Senegal, graffiti in Dakar has sparked widespread attention. Painted on the walls of HLM 86, it depicts France as a piggy bank, thriving at the expense of African nations. This imagery conveys a strong message: the CFA franc perpetuates economic dependency,

benefiting Paris while holding back local development. As Senegal prepares for legislative elections, such artistic expressions have become a rallying cry for change, particularly among the youth.

A crossroads in Togo

In Lomé, Togo's capital, young artists have created graffiti portraying the country at a crossroads. One path leads to freedom and independence, while the other remains tethered to the CFA franc. This poignant metaphor underscores the urgency of breaking away from colonial-era systems. These artists emphasize that abandoning the CFA franc is not just about economics—it represents a broader choice for liberty and self-determination.

Malian artists condemn the CFA Franc with bold imagery

Artists in Mali have also joined the West African movement against the CFA franc, using powerful graffiti to denounce France's economic grip on the region. In Bamako, a mural depicts French President Emmanuel Macron as a figure symbolically "feeding" on Africa, representing how France's economy thrives at the expense of African

nations using the CFA franc. The artwork underscores the sentiment that this currency arrangement perpetuates exploitation, fueling calls for financial sovereignty and true independence from colonial legacies.

France as a thief in Niger's graffiti

Likewise in Niger, street art has taken a similarly defiant tone. A recent graffiti in Niamey portrays France as a thief, depicted robbing African nations of their wealth. This provocative imagery reflects the widespread frustration with a system many view as deeply unjust, where the CFA franc serves as a tool of economic plunder. Such visual protests amplify the voices of Nigeriens who demand an end to this exploitative arrangement and emphasize the urgency of reclaiming financial independence.

The Way Forward: A New Currency for West Africa

Despite years of criticism, efforts to abandon the CFA franc have yet to bear fruit. While the proposed ECO currency offers a potential alternative, many fear it will simply replicate the shortcomings of the CFA franc due to continued French influence. Experts argue that the region needs a truly independent currency—one that empowers West African economies rather than serving external interests.

The protests and artistic expressions emerging across West Africa are more than just calls for change—they are acts of defiance against a system that many see as a vestige of neo-colonialism. These movements highlight the importance of financial sovereignty as a foundation for the region's economic growth and independence.

Govt employees in South West Ethiopia Region face terrible hardship after three months without pay

ADDIS ABABA

Government employees in Maji district, West Omo zone, South West Ethiopia region, report significant financial hardships after going without salaries for three consecutive months, according to accounts gathered by Addis Standard.

An agriculture officer in Maji, speaking anonymously, confirmed that salaries have not been paid since September. "I am a married man with one child, and I haven't been paid for three months. My family and I are facing severe hardship because of this," he said.

The officer added that the situation has deeply impacted the local economy, which heavily depends on the salaries of government employees. "Now, there's no one to help," he explained, highlighting his inability to afford rent or basic necessities, which has also left landlords in financial distress.

Eliab Zerihun, another employee speaking under a pseudonym for safety reasons, shared that many workers are now resorting to odd jobs to survive. "We haven't been paid for three months. Most of us can't pay rent, and some have been evicted from their homes," he said. Eliab noted that several employees have taken up daily labor or are selling firewood to sus-

tain their families.

He also pointed out that a malaria outbreak has severely disrupted economic activities, and private pharmacies that once provided credit have stopped due to mounting financial constraints. Eliab accused local authorities of threatening employees with disciplinary action whenever they raise concerns about unpaid salaries.

Ongaye Workineh, a teacher in the district, described the situation as dire. "We cannot pay our rent, and landlords are asking us to vacate their houses," he said. Ongaye explained that the high cost of living has forced some professionals, including teachers, to abandon their jobs and take up temporary labor. "We are being harassed and facing many problems," he added.

Efforts by Addis Standard to reach local government officials for comment were unsuccessful. The issue of unpaid salaries extends beyond Maji. Addis Standard previously reported that in the newly established regions of South and Central Ethiopia, including areas such as Gamo, Wolaita, and Konso, there have been widespread delays in salary payments for teachers and civil servants, with some receiving partial payments or none at all since August 2023.

Guede's struggles now lead to early exit from Singida Black Stars

AFTER just five months, former Young Africans striker Joseph Guede has parted ways with Singida Black Stars, failing to make a lasting impression on the technical staff.

The Ivorian striker joined Singida Black Stars during the pre-season under head coach Patrick Aussems and participated in the Dar Port Kagame Cup tournament as part of the team's preparation for the new season.

Initially, Guede (pictured) was expected to remain at Young Africans under former coach Miguel Gamondi, who valued his contributions during a productive six-month stint in which he scored 10 goals across all competitions.

However, the arrival of Jean Baleke on loan from TP Mazembe reshaped the team's plans, prompting Guede's move to Singida Black Stars.

Despite high expectations, Guede struggled to adapt at Singida Black Stars, failing to secure consistent playing time or score a single goal in any competition.

His lack of form contrasted sharply with his previous success at Young Africans.

The Singida-based club is now seeking to replace Guede with another striker to bolster their attack and provide support for their top scorer, Elvis Rupia, who has netted seven goals so far this season.

Guede's departure marks the third

player exit for Singida Black Stars this season. Earlier, goalkeeper Mohammed Kamara joined Pamba SC on a six-month loan, and midfielder Najim Mussa was loaned to Namungo FC.

The decision to release Guede comes as a surprise, given his strong performances with Young Africans.

However, his inability to replicate that form at Singida Black Stars was a critical factor in his departure.

The club remains ambitious, with their sights set on securing a top position in the Premier League and qualifying for CAF interclub competitions.

Currently, they have 30 points from 14 matches, boasting nine wins, three draws, and only two losses. This places them temporarily in second position.

However, rivals Simba SC and Young Africans, with 28 and 27 points respectively, have played three fewer matches.

Singida Black Stars have also undergone coaching changes this season. Former head coach Aussems was dismissed after just one loss and three draws in the league.

Interim head coach Ramadhan Nswanzirimo, assisted by David Ouma, has since steered the team back to form, as evidenced by their recent 2-0 victory over Tanzania Prisons.

With Rupia leading the attack and the club actively seeking reinforcements, Singida Black Stars remain well-positioned to achieve their ambitious goals in both domestic and continental competitions.

Pickleball's global appeal grows with Tanzania at the forefront

THE second edition of the Pickleball Open marked a significant milestone, showcasing the sport's rapid growth and competitive spirit across Tanzania, Africa, and beyond.

Pickleball, a paddle sport blending elements of tennis, badminton, and table tennis, has gained global popularity for its accessibility and ease of play.

Players, competing in singles or doubles, use smooth-faced paddles to hit a perforated plastic ball over a 34-inch-high (0.86 m) net.

Points are scored when one side fails to return the ball or commits a rule infraction.

Speaking during the tournament's final in Dar es Salaam over

the weekend, the event organizer highlighted the competition's remarkable success.

This year's event attracted 232 players from eight African nations - Kenya, Uganda, Rwanda, South Africa, and host Tanzania - as well as international participants from Egypt, Dubai, Spain, and the United Kingdom.

The diversity of competitors underscored the tournament's growing global appeal.

The tournament featured three main categories: men's singles, women's doubles, and mixed doubles.

Tanzania led in participation, with 205 players, reflecting deliberate efforts to promote Pickleball locally.

Tanzanian players showcased

their dominance in the women's singles category, with Edna John, Fatema Hassanali, and Esther Nankulange excelling.

In the men's singles, a player from Pickleball Arusha claimed victory, further solidifying Tanzania's emerging status in the sport.

Meanwhile, Kenya's Brain Omwando secured the men's doubles title, and the mixed doubles crown went to the impressive pairing of Gloria Kenda from Congo and Shane Du Bois from South Africa.

Describing the event as the largest to date, the tournament's organizer outlined ambitious future plans.

"Next year, we plan to move the tournament to late May or June to take advantage of cooler weather,

which will be more comfortable for players traveling long distances. We aim to welcome 340 players from across Africa," he said.

The tournament aligns with broader efforts to grow Pickleball in Tanzania. Organizers have introduced school programs to engage youth, with plans to expand to regions such as Arusha, Mwanza, Dodoma, and Zanzibar.

"Our goal is to spark grassroots interest and nurture homegrown talent capable of competing internationally," the organizer added.

Lee Isaac, global market strategist at JOOLA, emphasized the sport's infancy in Africa.

"Pickleball is very new here, just within the last two years. While there are fewer professional players compared to soccer, basket-

ball, or tennis, this presents an opportunity for Tanzania and Africa to develop players from the grassroots level. My hope is to see Tanzania excel in Pickleball," he said.

Isaac also announced plans to bring coaching expertise to Tanzania.

"Next year, we intend to bring in a coach and conduct training clinics to help players improve their skills and compete internationally. In the USA, kids grow up playing Pickleball in schools. We need to replicate that here to create a thriving culture for the sport," he added.

Kenya's Omwando, the men's doubles champion, praised the tournament's organization and reach.

"The tournament attracted over

200 players from East Africa and beyond, including the USA. It's a great initiative to grow the sport, and I hope to see even more participation next year," he said.

Omwando emphasized the importance of improved infrastructure, pointing to venues like the East Africa Sports Club as critical for providing accessible courts.

"With growing participation, focused coaching, and better infrastructure, the future of Pickleball in Africa looks promising," he added.

The second edition of the Pickleball Open not only highlighted the sport's growing popularity but also demonstrated its potential to unite players across Africa and beyond.

Global football union finds fragmented growth in women's game

MANCHESTER, England

THE growth of women's football has created a worrisome gulf in the sport, with some players stretched by their increasingly packed calendars but many others with too few games, a report by global players' union FIFPRO said.

The study compiled with Football Benchmark showed some players had 60-plus games last season, while others played less than 10, largely due to new or expanded competitions in Europe and North America with little or no development elsewhere.

While FIFPRO's study of 300 players found that Mariona Caldentey played the highest number with 64 games for FC Barcelona and Spain, the average was 33 games, which even with season breaks is significantly less than a game a week.

"There is a two-speed development of women's football," said Dr. Alex Culvin, FIFPRO's Director of Policy and Strategic Relations for Women's Football.

"You've got this percentage of players who'll be termed 'higher usage' that are squeezed consistently, both by the construct of the calendar, but also the kind of cadence of the games as well.

"The problems that they encounter are not only the number of games, but the lack of consideration of mandated breaks, so these players are constantly burdened, physically and mentally by the calendar.

"And then underloaded players, because we do know players who are playing less than one game a week, is quite problematic (because they) have an increased susceptibility to injury from detraining and retraining," Culvin told reporters on a video call.

The study "From High-Usage to Underload: A Tale of Two Industries" also found a huge disparity in preparation for the 2024 Paris Olympics.

AS Roma defender Moeka Minami played more than 4,500 minutes of competitive football in the 12 months leading up to the Games, while some of her Japan teammates barely played 1,000.

Spain's Olympic squad had 17 women who had played in at least 30 games before the Olympics, while Colombia had only five.

Rashford says he's ready for a new challenge amid Man United exit rumours

LONDON

MANCHESTER United forward Marcus Rashford is ready for a new challenge, he told football writer Henry Winter on Tuesday, as he continues to be linked with a move away from the Premier League club.

On Sunday, United beat Manchester City 2-1, but Rashford, along with Alejandro Garnacho, was left out of the trip to the Etihad, with new manager Ruben Amorim saying his decision was about holding his players to high standards.

This led to media reports that United were looking to sell the England forward, who has been at United since the age of seven, and the 27-year-old spoke on the subject while visiting his old school to hand out Christmas presents.

"For me, personally, I think I'm ready for a new challenge and the next steps," Rashford told Winter when asked if he was staying or leaving United.

"When I leave it's going to be 'no hard feelings'. You're not going to have any negative comments from me about Manchester United. That's me as a person.

"If I know that a situation is already bad I'm not going to make it worse. I've seen how other players have left in the past and I don't want to be that person.

"When I leave I'll make a statement and it will be from me."

Rashford has scored three goals since Amorim took over last month, but was taken off in the 56th minute of last week's 2-1 Europa League victory over Viktoria Plzen, with supporters booing the striker as he left the pitch.

The player has yet to rediscover the form that saw him score 30 goals across all competitions in the 2022-23 season, but he still believes the best is yet to come.

"I'm halfway through my career. I don't expect my peak to be now," Rashford said.

"I've had nine years so far in the Premier League and that's taught me a lot, that's helped me grow as a player and as a person.

"So I don't have any regrets from the last nine years. I won't have any regrets going forward because I take things day by day and sometimes bad things happen, sometimes good things happen."

Vinicius Jr named Fifa Best men's player of the year

DOHA

REAL Madrid and Brazil winger Vinicius Jr has been named the men's player of the year at the Fifa Best Awards.

The 24-year-old and his club boycotted the recent Ballon d'Or ceremony after missing out to Manchester City's Rodri - but he picked up this prize in Doha.

Vinicius played a key role in Real's Champions League and La Liga-winning campaign in 2023-24, scoring 24 goals and providing 11 assists.

Earlier in the ceremony, Barcelona midfielder Aitana Bonmati was named the women's player of the year for the second year in a row.

This was the first time Vinicius has won the award and capped a happier finish to the season than October's Ballon d'Or boycott.

"It seemed impossible when I played barefoot in the streets of Sao Paulo and now I'm here," Vinicius said.

The Ballon d'Or and Fifa Best Awards are the two most prestigious in football.

This was Vinicius' first Fifa prize, with Lionel Messi winning the previous two awards and Robert Lewandowski the two before that.

The award - for football from August 2023 to August 2024 - was decided by a mix of public vote, one journalist from each country and the

captain and manager of each national team. Each group's vote counted for 25%.

Real Madrid were already in Qatar for Wednesday's Fifa Intercontinental Cup final against Mexican side Pachuca at Lusail Stadium.

Spain's Euro 2024-winning midfielder Rodri finished second to Vinicius for the award, while

Real's England player Jude Bellingham was third.

Fifa has released details on who each coach and captain voted for.

England skipper Harry Kane opted for Rodri, with international teammate Bellingham second and Vinicius third.

Lee Carsley, who was the Three Lions' interim boss when the votes

were cast, went for Bellingham, Rodri and Barcelona's Lamine Yamal in that order.

Scotland boss Steve Clarke and Wales manager Craig Bellamy both opted for Rodri as their top pick.

Wales skipper Aaron Ramsey went for Vinicius, while Northern Ireland captain Paddy McNair voted for Rodri.

Brazil's captain and manager voted for Vinicius, but their Spanish counterparts both selected Real Madrid right-back Dani Carvajal.

There were five Premier League players in the men's team of the year, to go with five from Real Madrid (including the retired Toni Kroos) and one from Barcelona.

The players selected were Emiliano Martinez (Aston Villa), Ruben Dias (Manchester City), William Saliba (Arsenal), Dani Carvajal, Antonio Rudiger, Jude Bellingham, Kroos (all Real Madrid), Rodri, Erling Haaland (both Man City), Lamine Yamal (Barcelona) and Vinicius Jr (Real Madrid).

Martinez was named goalkeeper of the year after helping Argentina win the Copa America.

The 32-year-old has now won the best goalkeeper award twice at each of the Ballon d'Or and Fifa Best awards.

***Garnacho stunner wins Puskas Award**

The Puskas Award for the best men's goal of the year was won by Manchester United winger Alejandro Garnacho for his sensational bicycle kick in their 3-0 win at Everton in November 2023.

Mohammed Kudus' fine solo goal for West

Ham in the Europa League against Freiburg was also nominated.

Until this season the award covered all football but a new Marta Award now covers the women's game.

"I'm very proud to win this award," said Argentine Garnacho in a pre-recorded interview.

"It's a proud moment for me and my family. It was a special goal and I will always remember it."

***Ancelotti named coach of the year**

The coach of the year was Real Madrid's Carlo Ancelotti, who led the Spanish giants to the Champions League and La Liga titles last season.

The 65-year-old Italian won the award, which has been running since 2016, for the first time.

"I want to share this with the club, with my president and with my players, those of the best club in the world," Ancelotti said.

Ancelotti also won the equivalent award at the Ballon d'Or - meaning Xabi Alonso was not recognised in either for leading Bayer Leverkusen to their first German double.

Most of the previous winners at the Fifa Best Awards have been Premier League bosses - Claudio Ranieri, Jurgen Klopp (twice), Thomas Tuchel and last year Pep Guardiola.

European Super League promoters launch Unify League, call on UEFA to recognise it

LONDON

THE promoters of a proposed European Super League have called on UEFA and FIFA to recognise their new competition, which they relaunched on Tuesday as the Unify League.

It is the latest attempt by A22 to get the competition off the ground after the original European Super League (ESL), backed by 12 of the continent's biggest clubs, was controversially launched in 2021 only for support to collapse.

Unlike the original plans which guaranteed the 12 clubs a place in the ESL, A22 says the new 96-club format across four leagues would be merit-based and more competitive than UEFA's current club competitions.

It also promised free streaming for fans on its own advertising-backed platform and a return to the home and away format ditched in the revamped Champions League group phase.

"A key feature is a revised qualification system in which club participation is based on annual, domestic league performance," A22 said in a statement on Tuesday outlining plans for the midweek competition.

A22 CEO Bernd Reichart (pictured) said the proposed new competition would help address challenges in soccer such as rising subscription costs for fans, in-



sufficient investment in women's football and dissatisfaction with the format and governance of the current pan-European competitions.

"We are convinced that with our format being meritocratic and being compatible with the calendar we have the right to establish such a competition, talk to clubs and start implementing it," Reichart told Reuters in Madrid on Tuesday.

The European Court of Justice ruled last December that European governing body UEFA had abused its dominant position in blocking the initial plans for the competition in 2021.

UEFA threatened sanctions against any clubs joining a breakaway league and a fierce backlash by fans meant nine of the original 12, including all six Premier League clubs, pulled out.

"Back then it was framed as a closed shop breakaway league, which it never was, but that was the narrative that probably caused and created the biggest arguments against the initiative over the course of the last years," Reichart said.

"We listened, we heard, we adapted our proposal. It's an open, meritocratic system that is accessible to everybody."

The new format, which has no definite start date, would comprise 32 clubs split into a Star and Gold League, 32

in a Blue League and 32 in a Union League.

Group matches would run from September to April followed by an eight-club knockout phase.

While last year's ECJ ruling, and a similar one by a Spanish court in May, did not lead to a rush of clubs wanting to be involved in the new competition, Reichart said that it had given them confidence to re-engage with the plan.

UEFA insisted that rules it brought in since the initial ESL launch ensured it now complied with EU law.

While Real Madrid, who did not pull out of the original ESL proposal, are closely aligned with A22, Reichart did not reveal the names of any other clubs that are on board.

However, he said the new format could now be pitched to clubs who

are "eager to move on and to make their business and their relationship with their fans across the world future-proof and sustainable."

Spain's LaLiga quickly rejected A22's attempt to resurrect the new competition, saying it would serve an 'elitist few' and 'destroy the economy of national leagues'.

"The project continues to lack support from clubs, federations, players, fans, national governments and European institutions," LaLiga said in a statement.

While not commenting on A22's latest proposal, the English Premier League's stance is thought to be the same as last year when it said the ECJ ruling did not endorse a European Super League and that it continued to reject the concept.

Taoussi praises Diao's comeback as Azam triumph over Fountain Gate

AZAM FC head coach, Rachid Taoussi, expressed his pride in his team's performance after a hard-fought 2-0 victory over Fountain Gate FC in the Mainland Premier League at the Azam Complex in Dar es Salaam on Tuesday.

The win marked a significant milestone for striker Alassane Diao (pictured), who returned from a lengthy injury layoff to score his first goal in six months.

"It was a tough match. Fountain Gate FC is a good side, but we had a very good strategy to win," Taoussi said.

Azam opened the scoring in the 31st minute when Sillah found the back of the net with a clinical finish, assisted by Feisal Salum 'Fei Toto.'

Salum's impressive form continues, as he now leads the league with seven assists this season.

Despite Fountain Gate's efforts to mount a comeback, Azam maintained control of the match, and Diao's late goal sealed the victory, much to the delight of the home fans.

The victory saw Azam conclude the first round of the Mainland Premier League on a high note. The team has amassed 33 points from 15 matches, including 10 wins, three draws, and two losses. They have scored 22 goals and conceded only seven, showcasing their solid defensive and offensive capabilities.

Their performance places them ahead of Singida Black Stars, who are in second place with 30 points from 14 matches. Simba SC are in third place with 28 points from 11 matches, while rivals Young Africans sit in fourth with 27 points from 11 matches.

Ateba's double powers Simba to 2-0 win over KenGold

TWO first-half goals from Leonel Ateba secured Simba a crucial 2-0 victory against KenGold FC in their Premier League encounter at the KMC Complex yesterday.

The Msimbazi Street-based side entered the fixture riding high after a dramatic 2-1 victory over CS Sfaxien in the CAF Confederation Cup at the Benjamin Mkapa Stadium.

While that win bolstered their continental aspirations, their focus shifted to the domestic campaign, where they have been in stellar form.

Simba created several chances in the first 30 minutes, with Kibu Denis leading the charge, but they were unable to breach the defense of KenGold goalkeeper Moussa Camara, who was ably supported by defenders led by Fondor Che Malone.
