OVER 100 traders at the burnt Kariakoo market are appealing to authorities to arrange low interest rate loans as capital so that they can start afresh after their stalls and goods went up in flames a week ago.

The city traders who are now idle and counting the costs also want the government to make good its promise to secure them new stalls at the recently constructed Kisutu market as well as at the Machinga Complex, both within one kilometer from the centrally placed market

Anna Mzema, the Kariakoo Stall Owners Association secretary told this paper yesterday that the problem they now face is capital, even with the government moving to assist them to relocate to other central business district markets.

Being the leader of the 124 traders whose goods went up in flames, she said that just 19 traders came out unscathed, affected by

"We have been given temporary sanctuary at the Kisutu Market even though the space is small," she stated, expressing gratitude to Regional Commissioner Amos Makalla, Ilala DC and city trade officers for assistance rendered.

"As we wait for the Prime Minister's assessment, we do not yet know what our fate shall be," she remarked.

Noting that many among the traders were of advanced age with family responsibilities, starting other lines of business was difficult for them, in which case low-interest loans



Tanzania moved off Ireland's list for mandatory quarantine

TANZANIA is among 34 countries that have been removed from the mandatory hotel quarantine list for travellers arriving in Ireland, the Irish Minister for Health, Stephen Donnelly, announced at the

An Irish government statement made available here after it was communicated to major travel agencies said that the Irish



move went into effect at the weekend, where those travelling from Tanzania to Dublin or Belfast in Northern Ireland will be free to move in and out of the country.

They will no longer be subjected to undergo the mandatory hotel quarantine which is still a requirement for travelers coming from countries still listed as dangerous sources of the Delta variant of Covid 19 in particular.

"This is a positive development and comes at the right time," stated Sirili Akko (pictured), chief executive of the Arushabased Tanzania Association of Tour Operators (TATO) in reaction to the Irish government's decision.

He said this decision is another boost to Tanzania's tourism industry as visitors from Ireland no longer have to undergo cumbersome health processes upon return to their country after touring Serengeti National Park, Mount

Mbeya prepares nutrition plan to cut stunting levels

AUTHORITIES in Mbeya Region are drawing up a nutrition plan to guide families on what meals to eat on a daily basis to curb runaway stunting among children under five.

Regional Commissioner Juma Homera yesterday gave district commissioners in the region 30 days to liaise with nutrition officers and come up with meal guidelines to be distributed up to the village level.

The RC said the 33.8 per cent rate of stunting in Mbeya is unacceptable considering the fact that it is one of

Tanzania's leading grain producers.

The Tanzania Demographic and Health Survey for 2015-16 showed that the average rate of stunting in the country among children less than five years stood at 36 per cent.

The situation is even worse in other food-rich regions such as Rukwa (56.3), Njombe (49.4), Arusha (36.0), Geita (40.5) and Iringa (41.6).

This move is partly prolonged implementation of the National Multisectoral Nutrition Action Plan (2016/17 -2020/21) which required

Govt launches manhunt as 981 students fall pregnant

THE government has launched a manhunt to locate suspects after it emerged that nearly 1,000 pupils have been impregnated in Kibondo District, Kigoma Region, in the past six months.

Children was made aware of this situation by district officials, during her five-day visit in the district to inspect community development services.

Cuba was being added to the list of designated states for mandatory hotel quarantine, implying that people arriving in Ireland who have transited through Cuba in the previous 14 days will be subjected to restrictions, an instruction that comes into force tomorrow, July 20.

could send them back to market business, she emphasised.

"We ask for long term low interest loans as people have been psychologically affected, with some starting to be infected with illnesses. In order to come back to business, what new business can they do?" she demanded.

Stephen Lusinde, the chairman of the petty traders association told this paper that despite the fire victims getting other areas for business, there was a huge challenge of capital.

Out of 1,636 Kariakoo traders affected by the fire, about 570 were relocated along Swahili Street and others at Kisutu Market and at the Machinga Complex.

"Swahili Street in Kariakoo has been relocated to 340 traders out of the 570, and those who were selling food and vegetables have been relocated to the Machinga Complex," added Lusinde.

John Shao, the chairman of the Kariakoo Main Market Traders Association, said the traders have been relocated to other areas since late last week even though the spaces were not enough for all of them.

"Space for conducting business is small, for example a trader who had three or four stalls will get one area," he said.

Meat and fish sellers along with insecticides and pesticides vendors were relocated at the Kisutu Market, while sellers of equipment have been relocated at the Machinga Complex, he elaborated.

After the fire incident, President Samia Suluhu Hassan instructed defence and security organs to investigate the disaster to find out its cause, while Prime Minister Kassim Majaliwa formed a probe team that was given seven days to come up with probe findings.

District Hospital that would enable victims of domestic violence to obtain inclusive treatment in a short time.

Insisting that the school pregnancies reports cannot be ignored, she said that government officials in respective areas should make sure the suspects are apprehended and brought to

"The community cannot expect miracles of success for the coming generations if we close our eyes to these acts of gender based violence and child abuse by impregnating under-age girls and thereby ending their life dreams," she declared.

District Community Development Officer Sophia Gwamagobe praised joint efforts by the government and development stakeholders in finding solution to acts of GBV and child abuse.

She said the One Stop Centre' sponsored by Save the Children - an international charity organisation - will facilitate the provisions of the required services to GBV victims within a short period from the moment an incident is

The centre incorporates the police, community development officers and doctors, with Save the Children representative Jackson Nsabo saying the global NGO decided to build the centre to fight the rising frequency of GBV and incidents of child abuse.

In June 2016, the legislature approved a bill where men who impregnate or marry schoolgirls face 30 years in prison as part of the government's commitment to prevent child marriages, with .Tanzania reputed to have one of the highest child marriage prevalence rates in the world.

The provisions make it illegal for anyone to impregnate or marry primary or secondary school girls under any circumstances.

A 2015/16 survey by the National Bureau of Statistics showed that 21 per cent of girls aged 15 to 19 got pregnant and gave birth during the year.

While sex with underage girls is a criminal offence, poor parents often marry off their young daughters for cash using a special dispensation under the Law of Marriage Act 1971 which allows girls aged 15 to marry with parental or court consent or at14 with court permit, while boys can marry at 18

Uganda's school reopening hangs in balance - minister

UGANDAN Education and Sports minister Janet Museveni yesterday said the reopening of schools for learners across the country still hangs in the balance with Cabinet yet to decide on the issue.

While releasing the 2020 PLE results at State House Entebbe yesterday, Janetsaid: "I do not want to talk about something we are not confident about. The decision of closing or reopening schools is not made by my ministry alone. The decisions can only be made by the government after they have been discussed by Cabinet," Janet said.

"It is premature to say we will open at this time. To me, I cannot say there is a time we shall open, but in the near future, we shall. We should all be patient," she added.

Janet also faulted parents for the poor 2020 PLE performance in Universal Primary Education (UPE) schools, saying they absconded from playing roles in the education of their children.

She said unlike parents in urban areas who are playing a vital role in the education of their children, the parents in rural areas, whose children attend Universal Primary Education (UPE) schools, have neglected their roles and left everything to the government.

Janet urged the parents to up their game and play their part by participating in the education of their children.

"You cannot blame the Ministry of Education when it exams are not done well. We have to share the blame. UPE and Universal Secondary Education are doing badly because we have no support from the families of these children,"

"Education is a shared responsibility. Parents in rural areas

leave their children to go to school on empty stomach yet parents in urban areas are putting a lot of effort in their children to ensure their children feed well and excel at school," Janet added.

She said children in urban areas go to school early enough and spend a lot of time learning whereas those in rural areas walk very long distances to schools, reach school late, start studying late and go back

areas put in a lot to ensure their learners excel unlike the ones in rural areas who put in less. But she was optimistic that in the

near future, the Ministry will be there for the rural child. Just like in previous years, non-

One, Two and Three have never stepped foot in class since March last year when President Museveni announced the first lockdown. Primary one to three learners

were supposed to report back to School in May, but two days to the reporting date, President Museveni closed schools.

"I ask parents to homeschool their children. This should be considered as we work together with schools to reopen. We should not let our children waste a lot of time at home doing nothing," Janet said.

"Some people have come up with means of teaching their learners even during the lockdown even in rural areas where teachers are teaching their students in small groups. We should come up with means of teaching these learners instead of pointing figures," Janet

Earlier, submitting a report on nutrition in the region, the Regional Nutrition Officer Benson Sanga said stunting has various adverse effects in the community, including slow

child growth be it physically or mentally.

Stunted women were more prone to having difficulties during delivery and likely to face life threatening situations, while children with stunting are also easily infected by diseases, including heart diseases, diabetes and cancer when they attain advanced ages, he explained.

Regional Administrative Officer Dr Angelina Lutambi said the level of stunting in the region was high, thus officials should work together to fight the menace.

TANZANIA and Rwanda have joined a programme that will significantly reduce cost of communication between the two countries.

statement released at Α the weekend by the Tanzania Communications Regulatory Authority (TCRA) said the two countries have embraced a special programme called Smart Africa-One Network Area in African continent and other developing countries

Speaking in Dar es Salaam at the weekend, Rwandan government chief innovation officer Antione Sebera said the costly roaming charges will be scraped off under the alliance system.

He said the two countries will also collaborate on Human Resource capacity building and Technical Experts Exchange Programmethat concerned.

releases results for May exams

THE National Board of Accountants and Auditors Tanzania (NBAA) has released results for the examinations held from May 4 to 7, this year, with 39 per cent of candidates failing.

According to a statement issued during the weekend by the NBAA executive director, CPA Pius Maneno, only 894 out 5,768 candidates passed the exams.

"In total 894 (15.5 per cent) candidates have passed the examinations while 2,624 (45.5 per cent) candidates passed some of the subjects in the respective examination level and 2,250 (39.0 per cent) failed their examinations," he said.

He said that in these examinations, 278 candidates qualify to be professional awarded the certificate of completion of the Certified Public Accountants (CPA) programme. The number makes a total of 10,766 passed CPAs since the commencement of the Board's examinations in May, 1975.

On the CPA (T) equivalent qualification award, 13 candidates qualify to be awarded. The passed candidates make a total of 223 graduates since the commencement of the examinations in November 2014.

examinations involved examination candidates at levels of accounting technicians' levels I and II, foundation level, intermediate and final level under the revised competence based syllabi.

According to him, in accounting technician level I, a total of 17 candidates passed the examinations while 27 passed some of the subjects and 30 failed the exams.

In the Accounting Technician Level II, Maneno said that candidates passed their examinations and will be issued with certificates of completion of the Accounting Technician Certificates (ATEC) examinations.

In Foundation level (Skills and

Knowledge), 209 (32.2 per cent) passed the exams, 312 (48.1 per cent) passed some of the subjects. A total of 128 (19.7 per cent) candidates in this group failed the examinations.

In Intermediate Level, some 349 candidates qualified while 1,372 passed some subjects as 1,175 candidates failed.

The executive director further said in the final stage, a total 290 (14.7 per cent) candidates have passed the examinations while 882 (42.0 present) passed some of the subjects as 856 (43.3 per cent) failed their examinations.

Maneno congratulated those who have passed their examinations and encouraged those who have failed to work hard in the future examinations attempts.

Further, candidates are advised to make good of available learning materials when preparing for the examinations. They are advised to develop a reading culture of other books apart from study kits in order to widen their understanding.

Prime Minister's office to identify untrained but gifted youths for special jobs provisions

TANZANIA is endowed with many untrained, but gifted young people whose self-acquired apprentice skills can be put into proper use of high productivity to boost the country's economy.

"But unfortunately the job openings available in the country have been snubbing those without formal academic credentials despite the fact that most of these young Tanzanians prove to be more industrious than their schooled counterparts," revealed the Arusha regional youth development officer, Japhet Kurwa.

Kurwa was speaking in Tengeru area of Arumeru District, during the occasion to mark the 'World Youth Skills Day,' organized by the 'Deutsche Stiftung Weltbevolkerung (DSW),' which is a global development organization focusing on the needs and potential of the young generation.

"To correct the oversight, Tanzania is now conducting a nationwide talent recruiting exercise to identify informally skilled and talented young people that will be assimilated into local job markets or have their raw talents polished for the better," revealed the Regional Youth Development Officer.

He added that at the moment the Prime Minister's Office through its department of Labour, Youth, Employment and Persons with Disability, has therefore entered into agreement with the Vocational **Education and Training Authority** (VETA) to formulate strategies that aim at taping creative skills from young people who have not undergone formal college training.

Speaking during the World Youths Skills Day, Mr. Comoro Mwenda who is the National Program Coordinator for Youth Skills Development, at the International Labor Organization to tap into for future development," (ILO), said his organization was rolling a similar program targeting to harness apprentice skills from gifted youths.

"Tanzania, Africa and the world in general have been missing out on potential capabilities of selftrained, skilled young people who have not undergone any formal education, because the global jobs markets are blinded with the requirements of 'official certification' from 'recognized institutions."

Mwenda pointed out that, most of the theoretically trained youth graduating from mainstream learning institutions have been faring badly when exposed to practical environments at workplaces such that the world is now diverting attention to raw talents found from self-trained young people to fill the gaps.

Peter Owaga, is the DSW country director who stated that his organization had already started recruiting, empowering and encouraging talented young people to showcase their skills for a series of development projects.

"Many young people work as apprentices in a number of industrial entities and the majority after learning the trade at work places become even better skilled than their supervisors, these are the talents that the country needs

Despite these opportunities, young people are not fully engaged because they lack tangible skills and the situation is particularly difficult for young women and girls who face even greater challenges in securing productive and fulfilling employment than their counterparts in the informal sector.

Like many other countries, Tanzania is failing to tap from skills being showcased by young people because the mostly mainstream job market only recognizes those with official academic documents.

Govt in move to reduce fertiliser transport costs

THE government has promised to reduce fertiliser transport costs in the country to enable farmers get the input at affordable price as opposed to the current situation where the prices have risen during the last few months.

This was revealed by Agriculture deputy minister Hussein Bashe at the weekend as he was addressing fertiliser transporters.

He said the ministry plans to talk to Tanzania Railways Corporation (TRC) to reduce transport cost of the commodity from dealers to various areas in the country.

"We have had discussions with fertiliser importers and discussed various things, firstly to know how much fertiliser the country has during the month of July, who is importing how much so that we and TARI to educate farmers should not experience any kind of on alternative fertiliser via TV

shortage," Bashe said.

"In January I instructed TFRA to sit together with TRC and today I will meet with its Director General to discuss fertiliser transport cost as well as the availability of wagons," he added.

He said due to fertiliser price rise at world market contributed by Covid-19 pandemic, also saw the input's price increase in the country, thereby becoming a burden to farmers.

Citing examples, Bashe said DAP fertiliser was formerly being sold at USD 416 per tonne, but now the price is USD 650; while UREA that was being sold at USD 359 per tonne was now being sold USD 560 per tonne; whereas CAN was formerly sold at USD 274, was now

being sold at USD 420 per tonne.

programmes to enable farmers understand the usage of these fertilisers.

Meanwhile, Deputy Minister Bashe said the government will continue investing in research to increase the quality of locally produced fertiliser in order for the country to be self-sufficient in the in the farm input than solely depending on imports.

"In the coming two to three years local fertiliser production will be increased, we have the Minjingu company that had initially faced challenges which have now been solved," he added.

He said through this fertilise producer, local production of the input could increase from the current 100,000 tonnes to 200,000 tonnes, adding that this could reduce the burden in regard to high cost of imported fertiliser.

Wanted: Global action to end gender-based violence

can take different forms and mostly affects women and girls. GBV is violence directed against a person because of that person's gender or violence that affects persons of a particular gender disproportionately. Violence against women is understood as a violation of human rights and a form of discrimination against women and shall mean all acts of gender-based violence that result in, or are likely to result in physical harm, sexual harm, psychological, or economic harm or suffering to women. It can include violence against women, domestic violence against women, men or children living in the same domestic unit. Although women and girls are the main victims of GBV, it also causes severe harm to families and communities.

GBV can take various forms: Physical: it results in injuries, distress and health problems. Typical forms of physical violence are beating, strangling, pushing, and the use of weapons. In the EU, 31 per cent of women have experienced one or more acts of physical violence since the age of 15. Sexual: it includes sexual acts, attempts to obtain a sexual act, acts to traffic, or acts otherwise directed against a person's sexuality without the person's consent. It's estimated that one in 20 women (5 pc) has been raped in EU countries since the age of 15. Psychological: includes psychologically abusive behaviours, such as controlling, coercion, economic violence and blackmail. 43 per cent of women in the 28 EU countries have experienced some form of psychological violence by an intimate partner.

Examples of gender-based violence include domestic violence

ENDER-based violence includes all acts of physical, sexual, psychological and economic violence that occur within the family, domestic unit, or between intimate partners. These can be former or current spouses also when they don't share the same residence. 22 % of all women who have (had) a partner have experienced physical and/or sexual violence by a partner since the age of 15. Sex-based harassment includes unwelcome verbal, physical or other non-verbal conduct of a sexual nature with the purpose or effect of violating the dignity of a person. Between 45 per cent to 55 per cent of women in the EU have experienced sexual harassment since the age of 15.

Speaking during the handing over ceremony, Director of Children's Dignity Forum (CDF) Koshima Mtengati said the vision behind this goodwill gesture is to combat sexual violation against children in the western region.

He recounted that the region is known for its high involvement in sexual ills in favour of these little ones and in most cases are reported to be violated by those close to them including relatives, teachers, guardians and neighbours.

Apart from Kigoma, other regions such as Shinyanga, Mara, Dodoma, Singida, Manyara, Dar es Saalam, Kilimanjaro, and Tabora for the past five years have also been championing incidence of sexual violence including rape and sodomy.



directionally schizophrenic.

In the first, President Cyril Ramaphosa takes command, displaying leadership, getting tougher and putting policies in place that will ensure growth while reeling in state expenditure.

A second opportunity provides more. In this scenario, the constitutionalists recognise the severity of the crisis and put aside their differences to return the country to the rule of law.

The DA, which should see a surge in support at the local government elections – unless the RET faction can get them postponed would be an attractive partner for the pro-market, pro-growth constitutionalists in the ANC.

The DA would likely accept this scenario, simply because there is no way that it will gain an electoral majority in the next generation of SA politics. But it could conceivably be the broker of a different future, underpinned by values of respect for the rule of law, non-racialism, and the economy shared with the ANC's constitutionalists.

The alternative is truly too ghastly

corrupt RET faction and the equally corrupt EFF to form a coalition of the lawless that makes our current predicament seem like a picnic.

The unravelling of the ANC between these two poles of the RET faction and the constitutionalists will quicken if former president Jacob Zuma stays in jail. And if he doesn't, the RET faction will take this as a victory.

For the country, like the ANC, there is going to be, either way, a rough ride ahead, but there is no question which rough patch leads to a more inclusive, more functional society.

What South Africa needs is for the law-abiding middle from across political parties to stand together for constitutionalism and the rule of law. The construction of an effective criminal justice system that can act to protect life and limb and that can put the criminal syndicates who run these anarchic disruptions behind bars will have to be a priority.

We need a mature democratic system where the parties that support the rule of law and economic reform are in charge. There is simply no alternative.

It seems capitalist economies are where every aspect of the human condition can be labelled and exaggerated in order to create marketing opportunities.

There are women (and some men) in western countries who've received large amounts of public funding for cosmetic surgery, because they convinced their doctors that they were depressed due to the way they looked. This seems like cultivated depression, a modern day condition aided by commercial

But should it be promoted or fostered in Africa where people have genuine hardships and concerns, yet often have a strength and stoicism also, which can enable them to cope, when beset by multiple disasters.

...though who knows.... in the future, and stealthily promoted , this 'ailment' could compete with the big causes, just imagine third world depression...the possibilities could be endless!

HE past week's violence and looting - and the potential for an orchestrated race war in the province have evoked haunting scenes from a bitter and bloody history.

On the night of 13 January 1949, my father slept in the sugar-cane fields in Doringkop, on the Kwa-Zulu-Natal North Coast, along with the women and children in his family. He was eight years old.

News had reached the tiny farming hamlet that there had been rioting earlier that day in Durban's Grey Street area. Shops owned by people of South Asian descent had been looted. The violence had started after an altercation between a man of South Asian descent and a youngster of Zulu heritage at the Victoria Street Market.

It was the spark that would lead to another two days and nights of wanton destruction of homes and buildings during an "anti-Indian" pogrom defined by murders, rapes and wounds of race and ethnicity

Kwazulu-Natal races back to 1949

that, 27 years after the end of a racist and oppressive system, South Africa has yet to fully heal.

Most of the violence 71 years ago was centred in the multi-ethnic working-class neighbourhood of Cato Manor, or Umkhumbane in isiZulu. The attacks were orchestrated by provocateurs who mobilised the all-male, all-Zulu hostels in the city as well as other local networks. The anaemic police and army presence did not react to the violence happening in front of it. Donald L Horowitz, in The Deadly Ethnic Riot, describes white women celebrating the violence "dancing up the streets" afterwards.

The official count of the devastation was given as 142 deaths and 1 087 injured. One school and one factory were completely destroyed, along with 58 shops and 247 homes, while two factories,



652 shops and 1 285 homes were damaged.

The next night and the night after that, my father's stepmother and his sisters slept in the homes of their African neighbours. The adult men stood guard over the small farm that my grandfather, whose parents were indentured labourers, had bought in partnership with a cousin after they had saved enough money working at a local sugar mill. My dad and his brothers slept outside among the stalks of sugar cane; for a little boy, the experience was a bewildering mix of fear and adventure.

On the night of 13 July 2021, I helped my mother and father pack small bags with their identity documents, last wills and testaments, chronic medication and a change of clothes. My father also packed a small bag with a winter jersey of food and treats for their overindulged and overweight dachshund, Toby.

There was no sense of adventure in the air. There was bewilderment. Distress and pain, too. And an unfathomable sense of foreboding that they may have to leave their entire lives behind.

A story of townspeople

My father is 80 years old now. My mother is 77, but she protests that the apartheid government recorded her date of birth incorrectly. They are both retired school principals who are easily recognised by many in Stanger (KwaDukuza), the working-class town where they have built their lives together, and their home in which my sister and I grew up.

Most adults in Stanger have gone through their schools at some point and both are fondly remembered and respected.

For this, if I am recognised as my parents' child, I am usually guaranteed a wider smile and a warm message for them from these locals. Sometimes I even benefit from a discount at one of the many shops in the town that have passed through generations of the same family.

My parents are solid citizens. People who have worked their whole lives to build and uplift their community.

When she was principal of Parkgate Primary School in Ottawa, nearer to Durban, my mother received children from Zwelisha, near Phoenix, and from newly built RDP homes near her school. Those communities had been relocated from shack settlements from Clare Estate and other parts of Durban. On the occasions that I have met her former students, they have spoken - without hyperbole - of my mother as a role model, of her school being an enabling and life-changing experience for them.

Zwelisha is a decades old shack settlement that dates back to the 1990s. Whatever socioeconomic gains have been made in post-apartheid South Africa, precious few have come close to its impoverished edges. It is where, over the past week, 20 people are reported to have been killed in what appears to be increasing racial violence in KwaZulu-

The tension has been orchestrated by provocateurs apparently intent on stoking race-based civil

war in the province by targeting specific communities that have deep-running fractures based on inequality and racial mistrust.

Monday 19 July 2021

My parents believe that ordinary people build communities and a country. They have a strong affinity for equality. In 2010, when the local municipality sought to build a statue of Mahatma Gandhi to commemorate the 150 years since the arrival of the indentured labourers in South Africa, my father petitioned them, on principle, to rather commission a statue celebrating the thousands of indentured labourers themselves. He also pointed out that Gandhi only arrived in South Africa in 1893 as a lawyer, not a bonded labourer. The KwaDukuza local municipality, as is the wont of the ANC generally, preferred the elite individual over ordinary people.

My parents care about their community and their country.

Yet on Tuesday night they were preparing, if necessary, to leave their entire lives behind. Photo albums, books, family heirlooms and furniture passed down through generations, birthday cards made by my niece during lockdown... Everything that represents who they are, and what they have survived in a country that has often been oppressive to them, but that they still celebrate as their only one. A country that they have helped build without any thought of recognition or self-enrichment. One that they were watching being destroyed in front of their eyes.

I saw a pain in them that no person should have to bear. I discussed connecting the water hose to an indoor tap with my father, in the instance of our cars in the front yard being petrol-bombed. I swung some sports equipment around, wondering if a childhood cricket bat would be enough to fend off an attack on their home. I tried not to alarm them, but I cried inside.

A looming race war

KwaZulu-Natal appears to be careering towards a full-blown civil war. A war instigated by provocateurs on the ground and on social networking platforms like Twitter, along lines of race and class. But mainly race. Indeed, a mode of making claims in the name of race is being actively used to erase the question of class.

It is a race war to which the government, with its failing intelligence-gathering structures, is only now turning its attention. Part of a wider conflict, whose flames have been gleefully cheered on by people, including former president Jacob Zuma's daughter Duduzile Zuma-Sambudla and her twin brother Duduzane, on social media.

A race war that has been fomented for several years already by the "anti-Indian" demagoguery of people like EFF leader Julius Malema. One that in recent weeks has been stoked by trolls like @nkunz_ emnyama (Son_of_the_Azanian_Soil) and @FallIndians (Indians Must Fall) on Twitter.

There has also been incitement on the ground that began during the early stages of the various mobilisations of the past week.

US investor hands over 1bn/- church building to Serengeti District village

GRUMETI Game Reserves has handed over a new church building to the Catholic Diocese of Musoma, whose construction worth US\$450,000 (Ibn/-) has been fully sponsored by the investor, at a village in Serengeti District, Mara Region.

The church building has been built at Natta-Mbiso village in Tanzania's wildlife-rich district of Serengeti, earlier this year.

Bishop Michael Msongazila led a special church service to bless and inaugurate the church last Friday after a day,

after the investor handed over the church to him.

"The church building was handed over to me yesterday (Thursday evening) and we are today blessing it to officially make it our house of worship," the RC Bishop said.

He thanked the American investor for funding construction of the church for the village Catholics as well as continuing to support local development projects in villages bordering wildlife conservation areas in Western Serengeti.

"Even having a house of worship is social development. I thank God for the investor of Grumeti Reserves," Bishop Msonganzila who was accompanied by several priests and local church elders remarked.

The new church has the capacity to accommodate between 400 to 500 worshippers at a go, according to local church elders.

Bishop Msonganzila said the church will put the investor on the list of those who deserve prayers and blessings of the faithful.

Grumeti Reserves representative, Noel Mbise said besides investing heavily in wildlife conservation, the presence of the investor in Tanzania has continued to

transform lives in many ways, including supporting scholarships to needy but bright students through Grumeti Fund.

"Sustainable wildlife conservation cannot be possible without involvement of the community. The investor supports not only wildlife conservation but also the community," Mbise who is also the General Manager of Research and Community Unit at Grumeti said.

He said the church building will continue to enhance the existing good relationship between the investor who is also a catholic and local communities.

Grumeti Reserves operates several world-class lodges in Tanzania including Sasakwa, and the company has also massively invested in conservation and community development in Western Serengeti, through Grumeti Fund.

The area Parish Priest, Fr Jeremia Musira asked thousands of the church believers to clap hands for the investor as a gesture of appreciation, during the grand inauguration ceremony of the modern church, coloured by a special Mass led by Bishop Msonganzila.

Construction works of the church were carried out by Grumeti Construction, a sister company to Grumeti Reserves, after the investor donated US\$ 450,000 to support the project in recent months.

"The money came directly from the investor to build the church," Martha Baare, a senior official with Grumeti Reserves, said early this year when construction of the church was ongoing

church was ongoing.

She said the US investor has been attending church services hosted by the Natta-Mbiso village Roman Catholic Church very often whenever he visited Tanzania.

"There has been a long term relationship between our investor and the church. And many of our workers go to worship in the same church," she said.

Biden administration announces donation of 25 million Covid-19 vaccines to Africa

WASHINGTON

THE White House has announced that the Biden administration will donate approximately 25 million COVID-19 vaccines to be distributed in Africa. Planned to be made in the next few days are shipments of the Johnson & Johnson one-shot vaccine to Burkina Faso, Djibouti and Ethiopia.

In the coming weeks, U.S. officials say, Johnson & Johnson, Moderna or Pfizer vaccines will be made available to 49 African countries.

The administration says the government has collaborated fully with the African Union, the Africa Centres for Disease Control (Africa CDC), the African Vaccine Acquisition Trust, the Afreximbank, a Cairo-based multi-lateral trade finance institution, and the Covax collaborative for equitable vaccine distribution, co-led by the World Health Organization (WHO) and the Gavi vaccine alliance.

The U.S. doses will be delivered by Covax, which expects to get 620 million doses to Africa by the end of 2021, rising to 1 billion doses by the end of the first quarter of 2022.

The United States has also pledged to assist African nations in their readiness to receive vaccines. The donated shipments announced today follow the pledge made by President Joe Biden in May to share 80 million doses globally.

"The Biden Administration is committed to leading the global response to the pandemic by providing safe and effective vaccines to the world." said Gayle Smith, Coordinator for Covid-19 Recovery and Global Health at the U.S. Department of State. "Working together, we can save lives and bring the COVID-19 pandemic to an end," she said.

"African deaths have climbed steeply for the past five weeks", Dr. Matshidiso Moeti, WHO regional director for Africa, said yesterday. Africa has recorded a 43 percent weekly rise in Covid cases, with over six million cases confirmed on the continent of 55 nations. Limited availability of testing means the actual totals are likely considerably higher.

The British medical journal The Lancet, in an editorial for its 17 July edition, says, "Collaboration and solidarity are prerequisites for success in a pandemic.

Unfortunately, beyond scientific discovery, they have rarely been displayed globally...The need to vaccinate large proportions of the population while health systems strain under a third wave could have been avoided had international dissonance and vaccine nationalism not left African countries at the back of the vaccine queue."

"As the continent battles a surge in cases, we need collective action," said Gavi CEO Dr. Seth Berkley, welcoming the U.S. vaccine contribution.

The collective action that global health experts say is necessary to help Africa avoid health systems collapse and further economic devastation was on view yesterday, at WHO's Geneva headquarters, where German Health Minister Jens Spahn met WHO Director-General Tedros Adhamon Ghebreysus.

At a media briefing, they announced Germany's agreement to donate "at least" 30 million Covid vaccine doses, which Spahn called an initial "baseline". "This pandemic will not be over until it is over for everyone," Spahn said.

He pledged Euro260 million for tests, treatments and vaccines, alongside the US\$500 million Germany has contributed to WHO to support the Covid19 response.

China sets in motion national carbon emission trading market

HINA'S high-profile carbon national emission trading market commenced trading on July 16. Power generation industry will be the first among all industries to try the new trading system, and the market will only allow spot trading in carbon emissions quotas among key emitters of the power generation industry during its startup stage, according to a press briefing held on July 14.

This year marks the first implementation cycle of China's national carbon market, which has included more than 2,000 key carbon dioxide emitters in the power generation industry in the first batch of trading, said Zhao Yingmin, vice minister of China's Ministry of Ecology and Environment (MEE), at the press briefing held by the State Council.

aggregate annual The amount of carbon dioxide emissions of the power companies included in the first batch of trading exceeds four billion tons, which means China's national carbon emission trading market will become the world's largest carbon market in terms of the volume of greenhouse gases it handles.

Carbon emission trading refers to the buying and selling of the rights to emit carbon dioxide like commodities. Before trading, the government allocates carbon emissions quotas, or the rights to emit carbon dioxide, to enterprises and other key emitters of car-

bon dioxide.

A company that manages to keep its actual carbon emissions below its quota by increasing investment in R&D and enhancing technological innovation can sell the rest of its granted quota on the trading market. Likewise, if a company's actual amount of carbon emissions surpasses its quota, it needs to buy carbon emissions right from other companies at market price to offset its excess carbon emissions.

The carbon emission trading market represents a major institutional innovation of China to control and reduce greenhouse gas emissions and promote green and low-carbon development by leveraging market mechanisms.

The carbon emission trading market is expected to be an

important scheme for China to realize the goal of peaking carbon dioxide emissions by 2030 and achieving carbon neutrality by 2060, according to Zhao, who added that the practice of foreign countries has proven that carbon market is a policy instrument for realizing certain carbon emission reduction goals at a relatively low cost.

Compared to traditional administrative means, establishing a carbon market can not only make enterprises take responsibility for the control of greenhouse gas emissions, but provide corresponding economic incentive mechanisms for carbon emission reduction, thus lowering the cost of reducing carbon emissions for the whole society, driving innovation and investment in green technologies, and offering effective tools for properly handling the relationship between economic development and carbon emission reduction, Zhao explained.

It should be noted that the quality of carbon emissions data of enterprises is particularly important for fair allocation of carbon emission quotas across the country. According to Zhao, China adopts a unified, open, and transparent method of allocating carbon emission quotas and makes the authenticity and accuracy of carbon emissions data the utmost priority in the construction of the national carbon market.

Since the national carbon market is expected to guide optimal allocation of resources for carbon emission reduction according to prices, how the transaction price for trading is set and what level it will be kept at have drawn wide attention.

From a microcosmic and near-term perspective, the transaction price is determined by the supply and demand of the quotas, while macroscopically and in the long run, it is determined by the overall situation of and trend in economic operation and industry development, Zhao noted.

The transaction price of carbon emissions trading should be neither too high nor too low, according to Zhao, who explained that if the price is too low, it will dampen enterprises' enthusiasm for reducing carbon emissions; but if the price is too high, it will overburden some companies with heavy carbon emissions. According to the seven pilot

carbon trading programs, the

have been around 40 yuan (about \$6.2) a ton in the recent two years, Zhao said at the press briefing.

On the basis of sound initial operation of the national carbon emission trading market, China will include more industries with heavy carbon emissions, such as iron and steel, non-ferrous metal, petrochemical, as well as aviation, into the market, according to the press conference.

The MEE will make continuous efforts to improve supporting institutional systems, promote the introduction of interim regulations on the management of carbon emission trading, and complete relevant technical regulations, standards, and management systems, Zhao

Ministry seeks to use new initiatives for harmonising local fertiliser costs hiked by COVID-19 prevalence

THE government has assured farmers of enough fertilizers availability as prices of the product surge at the global market due to COVID-19 prevalence.

Agriculture deputy minister Hussein Bashe said last Friday that to contain the situation, the ministry will hold on indicative prices that goes in line with the temporary suspension of the bulk procurement system to allow individual traders order the product and put it on market at competitive prices that are affordable to

He was speaking at a special meeting with fertilizers manufacturers and importers held in Dar es Salaam last Friday on the availability and costs incurred in logistics that has impacted in hiking purchasing prices for the final consumers.

"Fertilizer demand between July and March takes about 75 percent of the whole country's demand. Annual domestic utilization stands at approximately 570,000 tons just for the top five cash crops and horticulture. However, with considera-

tion of subsistence farmers' demand, the product's demand goes beyond 700,000 tons a year:

Fertilizer top its high demand between July and March, a period of high seasonal cultivation activities of both subsistence and large scale farmers," said Bashe.

The deputy minister called the meeting so that he could be assured of what amount of fertilizer is currently available in their warehouses as the product's price skyrocketed at the global market due to COVID-19 eruption that has led to hiking purchasing and logistics costs.

The global cost, insurance and freight rates have gone high due to the pandemic. At the local market fertilizers purchasing costs have gone high since 2018 when for example DAP was sold at average of \$416 per ton which has topped around \$650 last month. Urea price increased from

\$359 to \$560, CAN rose from \$274 to \$420. "The ministry is holding talks with the Tanzania Railway Corporation to see how logistics costs can be harmonized on the central and TAZARA lines. The purpose is making sure that farmers are reached

with the fertilizers at reasonable costs by eliminating double handling charges to importers and distributors from the port of Dar es Salaam to the final consumers," he added.

Tanzania Fertilizer Regulatory Authority (TFRA) Managing Director Dr Stephan Ngailo, said that currently there are only 13 local and foreign firms that are officially producing the product which its capacity is yet to meet the required demand.

Dr Ngailo said that from the year 2017 to 2020 the regulatory body has spent 1.6trillion/- in importation of fertilizer. If investments are drawn from both local and abroad the money spent on the latter will be reduced to a reasonable magnitude. "We are targeting at attracting more firms and businesses to invest in the fertilizer production so that competitiveness is strengthened and as result there will be reasonable prices on the market that are likely to benefit the final consumers," he said.

TFRA has brought forward this year's fertilizer importation and supply tenders to July 8 from the previous that was set for June 18. The intention of the time extension was to attract more participants from local and foreign countries thus boosting competitiveness that will lead to affordable prices for the final consumers.

"Demand for fertilizer has been growing year in year

out as of 2017/18 demand for fertilizer stood at 485,000 tons while in 2020/21 stood at 719,051. However, from this demand about 90 percent of it is being imported and the rest being produced locally," he affirmed.

According to him, in making the mission of increasing fertilizer production a reality, TFRA has invested in a number of initiatives that involves increasing the efficiency of the fertilizer bulk procurement system that caters three approaches. The approaches are a pre-qualification stage that involves identification of qualified importers who can be featured in the bulk procurement system.

He said the second approach involves consultation of the business community and cooperative unions so that they submit their fertilizer demands and the third process is advertising the tender where the qualified firms are listed at TFRA's database.

Buyers reject Sh1bn KTDA tea on Munya pricing cap

NAIROBI

MOMBASA auction rejected smallholder teas worth Sh1 billion this week after Agriculture Cabinet secretary Peter Munya set a minimum price for all Kenya Tea Development Agency (KTDA) produce.

Tea brokers' data show 53 percent of the teas from KTDA was withdrawn from the auction floor as buyers went for those that traded at less than Sh181, the minimum price Mr Munya set for smallholders'

commodity. Mr Munya set the minimum price last week following a sharp decline of the tea prices at a weekly Mombasa auction, forcing the government to intervene. However, the directive did not offer a reprieve on falling costs as the prices further plunged to Sh166 on Tuesday from Sh179 in the

"The majority of KTDA teas offered remained unsold due to the reserve prices placed on all their teas," said the brokers. According to the report, out of 13.4 million kilogrammes offered, seven million kilos were struck out of the auction floor.

The teas, which were not sold, will be offered to the market next week. This could lead to a high supply in the market due to low demand for the beverage in the global market, depressing the prices further. The current low price of the beverage at the auction

implies that farmers' losses have increased sharply to Sh16 a kilo-

According to the ministry, the cost of producing a kilo of the beverage is Sh183. However, tea is now fetching an average of Sh167 a kilogramme at the tea auction.

Tea price at the auction –

which determines farmers' payouts - has dropped from a high of Sh216 in January following a low demand in the global market amid a glut from top producing countries.

The price has been below Sh183 a kilo for the past

Lenders snub SME loan seekers on Covid jitters

NAIROBI

A OUARTER of small businesses seeking loans were turned away by lenders last year on the fallout of the Covid-19 pandemic that sparked fear of defaults leading to risk

A Central Bank of Kenya study showed that banks turned away 28 per cent of small businesses while microfinance declined 96 percent of the loan applications made

Banks have shunned the private sector, especially small businesses that have defaulted on loans or asked for restructuring their facilities on the impact of the pandemic. Covid-19 disrupted businesses on State imposed lockdown measures, curfew and cessation of movement leading to losses, cash flow problems and even collapse of some enterprises.

"Within 2019 and 2020, commercial and microfinance banks received loan applications from MSMEs worth approximately Sh740 billion, of which Sh546 billion (74 percent) was approved," said the CBK.

The COVID-19 global pandemic had a significant impact on MSMEs' access to finance.

Businesses like restaurants, bars and retail stores are already struggling with a decline in customer demand, repayment of bank loans, rent and utility bills fueling worries of a spike in non-performing loans.

A total of 72,559 MSME loan facilities in the banking industry valued at Sh234.7 billion were restructured in 2020 when the regulator allowed lender to suspend principal and interest payments and lengthen maturities.

Britam pays insurance claims for four traders affected by market fire

FOUR traders at Kariakoo Main Market, whose businesses were ravaged by fire, will soon be back in business, thanks to the payment of their insurance claims.

Juma Khamis Masanja, Anna Mzena, Given Sanga and Kidogo Investments have received a total of 18million/- from Britam, just one week after the incident occurred.

The four had covered their businesses against fire and burglary through a bancassurance product offered in partnership be-

tween Britam and Stanbic Bank. "As we are talking, the money is already

in their bank accounts. Though the law requires us to pay the claims within 45 days, we have found no reason of delaying it further. We have paid them within six days since the incident occurred," said Vincent Tivai, the Britam Chief Operations Officer.

Fire razed the Kariakoo Main Market on Saturday, 10th July, adversely affecting businesses of a total of 220 traders, official fig-

According to the Head of Consumer and Net worth clients at Stanbic Bank, Mr Omari Mtiga, since the incident occurred, the lender which is also a tenant at the Kariakoo Market Market - had been working with relevant government institutions to bring the situation back to normalcy.

"We have also issued a three-month repayment relief to our clients who had been affected by the incident," he said.

The acting director of planning, research and marketing from Tanzania Insurance Regulatory Authority (Tira), Mr Zakaria Muyengi, said the fire incident at the Kariakoo Main Market should serve as a wakeup for traders to see the importance of insuring their businesses against risks.

He commended Britam for its prompt payment of claims so that those affected by the fire can go back to business.

He said Tira will work with all insurance companies to foster public awareness campaigns that will raise the population of Tanzanians who go for insurance products.

"Currently, 36 percent of Tanzanians are aware of what insurance entails yet it is about 15 percent of the total population that actually have insurance covers," he said.

The goal, he said, was to raise the number of Tanzanians who are aware of the insurance subject to 80 percent by the year 2030. The population, covered by insurance products, must also rise to 50 percent by 2030, said Muyengi.

Representing the beneficiaries, Juma

Khamis Masanja and Anna Mzena were all smiles that their businesses have managed to come out of the fire incident unscathed.

"I now have a better understanding of what insurance is all about. With the payments I consider myself a hero," said Masanja who sells horticultural products at Kariakoo. For Mzena, the incident was enticing her to venture into the insurance business as an agent.

"We need insurance. Having received these claims on time, I now wish I could have insured up to 50million/-. I am determined to start selling insurance products in the capacity of an agent," she said.

Ericsson's 5G march hits a wall in China, shares sink

STOCKHOLM

SWEDEN'S Ericsson (ERICb.ST), caught in the middle of a geopolitical battle between Beijing and the West, said on Friday it was no longer banking on previously anticipated contract wins for 5G tenders in China, sending its shares down more than 8%.

The telecoms company has previously warned that its business in China could fall afoul of Sweden's move to ban Chinese equipment giant Huawei (HWT.UL) and in the second quarter its sales there fell by 2.5 billion Swedish crowns (\$290 million), the first drop in three

Asked on an analyst call if Ericsson expected to recoup that money, Chief Executive Borje Ekholm replied: "No, it's not coming back."

Ericsson currently generates just under 10% of its revenues in China and despite the country preparing for the next round of a massive 5G build-out Chief Financial Officer Carl Mellander told Reuters that it was "prudent to forecast materially lower market share" in the future. European governments have

been tightening controls on Chinese companies building 5G networks following diplomatic pressure from Washington, which alleges Huawei equipment could be used by Beijing for spying. Huawei has repeatedly denied being a national security risk. China is preparing for the second phase of its 5G build-out and Mellander said that tenders expected during the second quarter did not take place.

Initial contract allotments are expected to be announced before the end of this month, according to two sources familiar with the matter.

The Finnish group, whose shares were up 0.5%, said this week it would likely raise its full-year outlook due to a stronger-than-expected second quarter.

Ericsson, which last year took a hit of about 1 billion crowns due to writedowns of product inventory in China, wrote down a further 300 million crowns in the second quar-

It said network sales were strong in most of its other markets, and it signed an \$8.3 billion five-year 5G contract with Verizon (VZN), its single largest deal.



US officials look to address boring transportation supply chain issues

WASHINGTON

UNITED States Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg is looking at ways to address supply chain disruptions - from clogged ports to addressing the shortage of truck drivers.

President Joe Biden issued an executive order in February on supply chain issues.

In June, the White House unveiled a Supply Chain Disruptions Task Force led by Buttigieg and the secretaries of Commerce and Agriculture "to provide a wholeof-government response to address near-term supply chain challenges ... (and)

to diagnose problems and surface solutions-large and small, public or private-that could help alleviate bottlenecks and supply constraints."

On Thursday, Buttigieg held a virtual roundtable on congestion at the Los Angeles and Long Beach ports that included the Federal Maritime Commission chair, Los Angeles Mayor Eric Garcetti and other senior U.S. officials to look at ways of reducing congestion at

Last week, Buttigieg and Labor Secretary Marty Walsh held a separate meeting with trucking industry and labor groups to discuss driver recruitment and retention.

The department said turn-

over rates are over 90% for large long haul carriers. This driver turnover, coupled with the impact of COVID-19, has helped lead to supply chain disruptions.

American Trucking Associations (ATA) said projections show the industry will need to hire about 1.1 million new drivers over the next decade, or an average of nearly 110,000 per year, to keep pace with retirements and growing transportation needs.

ATA's Bill Sullivan said the group is working with the federal government to "make our supply chain more resilient and grow our workforce.".

Hong Kong says Binance is not licensed to sell its stock tokens

HONG KONG

HONG KONG'S markets watchdog on Friday said Binance, one of the world's largest cryptocurrency exchanges, was not licensed to sell 'stock tokens' in the city, products it said the exchange had offered in other markets.

Hong Kong's Securities and Futures Commission (SFC) also said in its statement that "no entity in the Binance group is licensed or registered to conduct "regulated activity" in Hong Kong."

Stock tokens are virtual assets that are represented to be backed by depository portfolios of underlying overseas listed stock.

The SFC said these were likely to be "securities" under Hong Kong rules, and so it may also be an offence to offer them to the Hong Kong public without its authorisation.

"The SFC does not tolerate any violations of the securities laws and will not hesitate to take enforcement and law enforcement in a collabora-

The move followed other warnings action against unlicensed platform operators where appropriate," said Thomas Atkinson, the SFC's executive director of enforcement.

Hong Kong plans to bring in legislation requiring all cryptocurrency exchanges in the city to be licensed and only to offer services to professional investors. At present, exchanges can apply to be licensed by the SFC, but are not required A Binance spokesperson said it does not currently hold exchange operations in Hong Kong.to.

"We take our legal obligations very seriously and engage with regulators tive fashion," the spokesperson added. In a separate statement on Friday, Binance said it would stop selling stock tokens.

Binance last month was the world's biggest exchange by spot trading volumes, data from UK researcher CryptoCompare showed, with trading The platform offers a wide range of services to users across the globe, from cryptocurrency spot and derivatives trading to digital wallets and stock tokens.volumes reaching \$668 billion - a near 10-fold jump from July 2020.

Bezos and crewmates prepare for inaugural Blue Origin space flight

WASHINGTON

BILLIONAIRE American businessman Ieff Bezos and his three crewmates are engaging in a crash course of training on Sunday in preparation for his company Blue Origin's inaugural flight to the edge of space planned for Tuesday.

The suborbital launch from a site in the high desert plains of West Texas marks a crucial test for Blue Origin's New Shepard spacecraft, a 60-foot-tall (18.3 meters) and fully autonomous rocket-and-capsule combo that is central to plans by Bezos to tap a potentially lucrative space tourism market.

The planned 11-minute trip from the company's Launch Site One facility is set to include the oldest person ever to go to space - 82-yearold trailblazing female aviator Wally Funk - and the youngest - 18-yearold physics student Oliver Daemen. Joining them for Blue Origin's launch will be Bezos, the founder and current executive chairman of Amazon.com Inc and his brother Mark Bezos.

Blue Origin's training program, according to the company, includes safety briefings, a simulation of the spaceflight, a review of the rocket and its operations, and instruction on how to float around the craft's cabin after the capsule sheds Earth's

The training "will help you feel comfortable and prepared for spaceflight and your responsibilities as an astronaut," Blue Origin said in material describing the ses-

New Shepard, which cannot be piloted from inside the spacecraft,



is named for Alan Shepard, who in 1961 became the first American in space during a suborbital flight as part of NASA's pioneering Mercury

New Shepard, like Virgin Galactic's flight, will not enter into orbit around Earth, but will take the crew some 62 miles up (100 km) before the capsule returns by parachute. Virgin Galactic's flight reached 53 miles (86 km) above Earth.

Billionaire businessman Elon Musk's space transportation company, SpaceX, is pledging to go even higher in September, sending an all-civilian crew for a several-day orbital flight aboard its Crew Dragon capsule.

Illustrating tensions in the highstakes "billionaire space race," Blue Origin has described Virgin Galactic as falling short of the 62-mile-highmark (100 km) - called the Kármán line - set by an international aeronautics body as defining the boundary between Earth's atmosphere and space.

The U.S. space agency NASA and the U.S. Air Force both define an astronaut as anyone who has flown higher than 50 miles (80 km), as Branson achieved with his flight.

Tesla registrations in California surge 85pc in second quarter

WASHINGTON

TESLA Inc's (TSLA.O) vehicle registrations in California rose more than 85% in the second quarter versus last year, largely due to the success of the company's Model Y, according to data from Cross-Sell, a research firm that collates title and registra-

The automaker posted record vehicle deliveries for the April-to-June quarter earlier this month, as it dealt with a semiconductor shortage and relied on sales of its cheaper models.

California registrations for the Model Y, Tesla's electric crossover utility vehicle, jumped more than sevenfold to 13,581, Cross-Sell data showed on Thursday.

The focus is now on the company's secondquarter earnings report due on July 26, with investors waiting to gauge if bitcoin's recent fall would hit Tesla's bottom line, due to its exposure to the cryptocurrency's volatility.

Total second-quarter vehicle registrations in the 23 states where data was collected stood at 46,926, with Model Y accounting for more than half of the registrations.

California, a bellwether for the electric-car maker, accounted for about half of the vehicle registrations in these states with a total of 23,556 registrations, Cross-Sell data showed. Tesla has been increasing prices for its ve-

hicles in recent months, with billionaire boss Elon Musk in May blaming the rise on "major supply chain price pressure", especially raw materials. Registration figures might not accurately re-

flect the number of vehicle deliveries during the quarter as registrations in the United States typically take about 30 days from the time of On Saturday it has introduced an option for

some customers to subscribe to its advanced driver assistance software, dubbed "Full Self-Driving capability", for \$199 per month, instead of paying

Facebook says it should not be blamed for US vaccine failures

WASHINGTON

FACEBOOK on Saturday defended itself against U.S. President Joe Biden's assertion that the social media platform is "killing people" by allowing misinformation about coronavirus vaccines to proliferate, saying the facts tell a different

"The data shows that 85% of Facebook users in the US have been or want to be vaccinated against COVID-19." Facebook said in a corporate blog post by Guy Rosen, a company vice president. "President Biden's goal was for 70% of Americans to be vaccinated by July 4. Facebook is not the reason this goal was missed."

COVID-19 misinformation has spread during the pandemic on social media sites including Facebook, Twitter and Alphabet Inc owned (GOOGL.O) YouTube. Researchers and lawmakers have long accused Facebook of failing to police harmful content on its platforms.

"They're killing people. ... Look, the only pandemic we have is among the unvaccinated. And they're killing people," Biden told reporters at the White House on Friday when asked about misinformation and what his message was to social media platforms such as Facebook.

The company has introduced rules against making specific false claims about COVID-19 and vaccines for it, and says it provides people with reliable information on these topics.

Peace gradually returns to S. Africa

JOHANNESBURG

LIFE is gradually returning to normal in South Africa as volunteers and communities started cleaning the looting debris, shops were reopened, and trucks returned to main highways.

Most shops in Johannesburg's center were still repairing damaged infrastructure Saturday. Only a few shops like Cambridge Supermarket were open.

In Alexandra, a township in Johannesburg, which was severely ravaged in last week's violence, people were busy clearing the debris. There were long queues of people who try to buy food from the few shops which were still open.

South African police and soldiers maintained a heavy presence in some malls and the country's key points.

According to local media reports, at least 20 different businesses, non-governmental and non-profit organizations have joined hands in distributing 40,000 loaves of bread and 40,000 liters of milk to communities impacted by violence and looting in the greater Durban area. Some chartered flights carrying necessities such as nappies and formula milk flew from Johannesburg and surround-

ing areas to Durban.

After the reopening of N3 highway, hundreds of trucks left Johannesburg early Saturday, loaded with food and other essential goods to replenish KwaZulu-Natal's looted stores.

The South African Medical Association (SAMA) chairperson Angelique Coetzee welcomed the opening of N3.

"The unrest has undoubtedly had an impact on the provision of healthcare in KwaZulu-Natal (KZN) and a speedy return to law and order is now needed to ensure we can begin to start providing proper and effective healthcare in that province again. There are also fuel stations in KZN which are dedicating lanes and pumps

to healthcare and other essential workers; these steps are critical to ensure the continuation of the provision of health and emergency services and these fuel stations must be applauded for their foresight," she said.

The latest official figures showed 212 people were killed in last week's unrest in the eastern provinces of KwaZulu-Natal and Gauteng, triggered by the imprisonment of former South African president Jacob Zuma, with roads being blocked, properties and vehicles damaged and burned.

UK PM, chancellor to self-isolate after health secretary tests positive for COVID-19

LONDON

BRITISH Prime Minister Boris Johnson and Chancellor of the Exchequer Rishi Sunak will enter quarantine as normal after contact with Health Secretary Sajid Javid who tested positive for COV-ID-19 on Saturday, Downing Street said yesterday.



This marked a U-turn on the pair's initial decision to avoid self-isolation by taking part in a daily testing pilot scheme, which had caused huge public outrage in the country.

"Whilst the test and trace pilot is fairly restrictive, allowing only essential government business, I recognise that even the sense that the rules aren't the same for everyone is wrong," Sunak said on Twitter.

Javid, the new health secretary who replaced Matt Hancock last month, is now self-isolating at home with his family. He said he has had two jabs of the vaccine and his symptoms are mild.

The British government has confirmed that most COVID-19 restrictions in England will end on Monday as part of the final step, or Step Four, of England's roadmap out of the lockdown. But scientists have warned that lifting all restrictions at this stage could increase likelihood of dangerous variants.

Britain reported on Saturday another 54,674 coronavirus cases in the latest 24-hour period, bringing the total number of coronavirus cases in the country to 5,386,340, official figures showed. The total number of coronavirus-related deaths in Britain has reached 128,683.

More than 87 percent of the Britain's adults have received one dose of COVID-19 vaccine, while over 67 percent have received two jabs, the latest figures showed.

Turkey condemns EU court ruling on headscarf ban

ANKARA

TURKEY on Sunday slammed a ruling by a top European Union court allowing the banning of headscarves under certain conditions as a "clear violation of religious freedoms", adding the move would exacerbate prejudices against Muslim women in Europe.

The Luxembourg-based EU Court of Justice (CJEU) ruled on Thursday that companies in the bloc can ban employees from wearing a headscarf under certain conditions, if they need to do so to project an image of neutrality to customers.

The Turkish Foreign Ministry said in a statement the ruling was a sign of rising Islamophobia at a time when it said Muslim women in Europe are

"The CJEU decision, at a has been criticized by Westtime when the Islamophobia, racism and hatred that have taken Europe hostage are rising, disregards religious freedom and creates a basis and legal cover for discrimination," the ministry said.

On Saturday, the Turkish presidency's communication director Fahrettin Altun condemned the move, saying "this wrong decision is an attempt to grant legitimacy to racism.'

The issue of the hijab, the traditional headscarf worn around the head and shoulders, has been divisive across Europe for years, underlining sharp differences over integrating Muslims.

Turkish President Tayyip Erdogan's Islamist-rooted AK Party, which came to power in 2002 blending a pro-Western, democratic market approach, ern allies in recent years for increasing authoritarianism and religious intolerance. The United States, Greece, Russia and church leaders expressed concern last year over his government's move to convert Istanbul's Hagia Sophia into a mosque last year. Ankara has repeatedly ac-

cused European nations of not doing enough to prevent discrimination against Muslims, saying it will start publishing an annual report on what it calls examples of Islamophobia around the world.

Ties between Ankara and the bloc have been strained over a host of issues, namely over a dispute between EU member Greece and Turkey over maritime jurisdiction and energy rights in the eastern Mediterranean.

ter life. In their remarks at the session, representatives of other countries commended this important draft resolution submitted by China and thanked China for its leading role. They stressed that development is critical to countries, especially developing countries, adding that without development, it would be impossible to achieve enjoyment of human rights and overcome the challenges brought by COVID-19.

It was the third time that the UNHRC adopted a resolution on the contribution of development to the enjoyment of all human rights submitted by China. In June 2017, the UN human rights body adopted a resolution from China on development issues in an overconcept "development promotes human rights" into the international human rights system for the first time. In July 2019, the UNHRC adopted a resolution submitted by China on development issues for the second time.

By holding high the banner of development, China makes the common aspirations and wishes of developing countries heard by the world, winning wide support from the international community.

Development is mankind's eternal quest and creates conditions for the realization of various human rights. The UN Declaration on whelming vote, introducing the the Right to Development specified

that the right to development is an inalienable human right.

Lavrov affirms Russia's Central Asian allies say they do not intend to host US military

TASHKENT

NONE of Russia's Central Asian allies stated their intention at the Tashkent conference of hosting any part whatsoever of the US military infrastructure, which the Americans are moving



out of Afghanistan, Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov said on the sidelines of the international conference, Central and South Asia: Regional Connectivity. Challenges and Opportunities, on Thursday.

"As for the plans by the Americans that they are in fact making public and actively promoting, they seek to persuade Central Asian countries and Pakistan, in particular, to use their territory for accommodating some military infrastructure, which the Americans are moving out of Afghanistan," Russia's top diplomat said.

"First of all, Pakistan and Uzbekistan have already officially stated that this is out of the question and they will not use their territory to host such infrastructure. We conferred both in bilateral contacts, and now at the meeting of foreign ministers of five Central Asian states plus Russia on this issue. None of our allies has stated their intention to subject its territory and population to such a risk," the Russian foreign minister stressed.

The participants in the talks also spoke about another US initiative, namely, the attempt to withdraw Afghans who collaborated with the Americans and accommodate them "either temporarily or permanently on the territory of Central Asian states," Lavrov revealed.

"At first, they talked about 10,000 but quite recently I heard already as part of the American discussions in various political think tanks in the US that the figure of 100,000 until the end of the year was mentioned," Lavrov added.

"Today, I already mentioned this in my contact with my Central Asian counterparts and they understand perfectly well all the risks that these plans harbor and they will, perhaps, make the right decision, proceeding from their own interests," Russia's foreign minister specified.

Expanded "group of three" on the settlement in Afghanistan

Russian Foreign Minister also pointed out that including India and Iran in the expanded "group of three" (Russia, China, the US, and Pakistan) on the settlement in Afghanistan would enrich the possibilities of this format.

"The 'group of three' discussed in particular the candidacies of India and Iran [as new members]. I think that this can enrich the possibilities of this format," the top diplomat said

The foreign minister noted that one of the key tasks of the expanded 'group of three' is the involvement in the dialogue on the settlement of all political and ethnic groups residing in Afghanistan.

France opens doors to vaccinated travellers, restricts others

PARIS

FRANCE will reinforce restrictions on unvaccinated travellers from a series of countries to counter a rebound in COVID-19 infections, while opening its doors to those who have received all their shots, Prime Minister Jean Castex said on Saturday.

The move comes as France faces a rapid surge in new coronavirus infections and President Emmanuel Macron tries to convince French citizens to accept vaccinations he says are the only way to stop the virus and put the country back on track.

From yesterday, July 18, non-vaccinated people coming from the United Kingdom, Spain, Portugal, Cyprus, the Netherlands and Greece will need to present a CO-VID-19 test dating from less than 24 hours before travel to enter France.

Currently tests can date from 48 hours for UK travellers and 72 hours for the other countries listed.

Cubans hold mass rally in support of revolution

HAVANA

THOUSANDS of Cubans on Saturday gathered at the La Piragua esplanade in Havana to express their support of the island's government after the recent unrest.

Raul Castro, leader of the Cuban socialist revolution, President Miguel Diaz-Canel, high-ranking officials, and leaders of social organizations attended the event.

Addressing the audience, Diaz-Canel said that the Cuban revolution continues to stand by its people, and accused the US administration of sponsoring a political and communication campaign against the Caribbean country.

Abiding by social distancing guidelines and mask mandates, participants held national flags and patriotic banners in support of the Cuban socialist revolution, and dozens of people waved from balconies.

Unity has helped Cubans overcome crises, said Gerardo Hernandez, national coordinator of the Committees for the Defense of the Revolution, adding that the US administration wanted to destabilize the tranquility of the island's neighborhoods.

"This revolution was made by Raul (Castro) and Fidel (Castro) for the humble, with the humble, and for the sake of the humble," he said, adding that the Cuban government will continue the work initiated by its predecessors

Julio Cesar Crespo, who works at Havana's Higher Institute of International Relations "Raul Roa Garcia", told Xinhua that young people in Cuba were committed to the development of socialism on the island.

"We have to defend the revolution, which has been a beacon for all Cubans," he said. "We cannot lose (what) all we have shed so much blood for. Today we come to reaffirm our revolutionary convictions."

Death toll rises to 170 in Germany, Belgium floods

ERFTSTADT, Germany/WASSENBERG

THE death toll in devastating flooding in western Germany and Belgium rose to at least 170 on Saturday after burst rivers and flash floods this week collapsed houses and ripped up roads and power lines.

Some 143 people died in the flooding in Germany's worst natural disaster in more than half a century. That included about 98 in the Ahrweiler district south of Cologne, according to police.

Hundreds of people were still missing or unreachable as several areas were inaccessible due to high water levels while communication in some places was still down.

Residents and business owners struggled to pick up the pieces in battered towns.

"Everything is completely destroyed. You don't recognize the scenery," said Michael Lang, owner of a wine shop in the town of Bad Neuenahr-Ahrweiler in Ahrweiler, fighting back tears.

German President Frank-Walter Steinmeier visited Erftstadt in the state of North Rhine-Westphalia, where the disaster killed at least 45 people.

"We mourn with those that have lost friends, acquaintances, family members," he said. "Their fate is ripping our hearts apart."

Around 700 residents were evacuated late on Friday after a dam broke in the town of Wassenberg near Cologne, authorities said.

But Wassenberg mayor Marcel Maurer said water levels had been stabilizing since the night. "It's too early to give the all-clear but we are cautiously optimistic," he said.

The Steinbachtal dam in western Germany, however, remained at risk of breaching, authorities said after some 4,500 people were evacuated from homes downstream.

Steinmeier said it would take weeks before the full damage, expected to require several billions of euros in reconstruction funds, could be assessed.

Armin Laschet, state premier of North Rhine-Westphalia and the ruling CDU party's candidate in September's general election, said he would speak to Finance Minister Olaf Scholz in the coming days about financial support.

Chancellor Angela Merkel was expected to travel on Sunday to Rhineland Palatinate, the state that is home to the devastated village of Schuld.

In Belgium, the death toll rose to 27, according to the national crisis centre, which is coordinating the relief operation there.

It added that 103 people were "missing or unreach-

able". Some were likely unreachable because they could not recharge mobile phones or were in hospital without identity papers, the centre said.

Communities Cut Off

Over the past several days the floods, which have mostly hit the German states of Rhineland Palatinate and North Rhine-Westphalia and eastern Belgium, have cut off entire communities from power and communications.

RWE, Germany's largest power producer, said on Saturday its opencast mine in Inden and the Weisweiler coalfired power plant were massively affected, adding that the plant was running at lower capacity after the situation stabilized.

In the southern Belgian provinces of Luxembourg and Namur, authorities rushed to supply drinking water to households.

Flood water levels slowly fell in the worst hit parts of Belgium, allowing residents to sort through damaged possessions.

Prime Minister Alexander De Croo and European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen visited some areas on Saturday afternoon.

Belgian rail network operator Infrabel published plans of repairs to lines, some of which would be back in service only at the very end of August.

High Alert In The Netherlands

Emergency services in the Netherlands also remained on high alert as overflowing rivers threatened towns and villages throughout the southern province of Limburg.

Tens of thousands of residents in the region have been evacuated in the past

two days, while soldiers, fire brigades and volunteers worked frantically throughout Friday night to enforce dykes and prevent flooding.

The Dutch have so far escaped disaster on the scale of its neighbors, and as of Saturday morning no casualties had been reported.

Scientists have long said that climate change will lead to heavier down-pours. But determining its role in these relentless rainfalls will take at least several weeks to research, scientists said on

China's foreign trade in H1 hits record high

CHINA'S total foreign trade in goods in the first half of the year grew 27.1 percent from a year ago to 18.07 trillion yuan (about \$2.79 trillion), data from the General Administration of Customs (GAC) showed. Exports increased 28.1 percent to 9.85 trillion yuan, and imports expanded by 25.9 percent to 8.22 trillion yuan.

The country's total foreign trade, exports and imports in the first six months this year were up 22.9 percent, 23.8 percent and 21.7 percent, respectively, compared with those in the same period two years ago, before the outburst of COVID-19.

China's foreign trade stood at 3.29 trillion yuan last month, up 22 percent from a year ago, which marked positive growth for 13 months in a row.

China's foreign trade in the first half of the year posted the best performance in history, which has laid a solid foundation for the whole-year growth of the country's foreign trade, said GAC spokesperson Li Kuiwen at a press conference on July 13. China's economy showed a steady recovery with solid and sound growth in the first half, and market players demonstrated stronger vitality, which offered strong support for the continuous and stable growth of foreign trade, Li, who's also the director of the GAC's statistics and analysis department, added. In particular, the continuous release of policy dividends to stabilize foreign trade, and the leading role played by high-level opening platforms have further outlined the advantages of new businesses and models of foreign trade.

According to GAC statistics, the total trade value of China's cross-border e-commerce sector reached 886.7 billion yuan in the first six months, up 28. 6 year on year. Exports of the sector surged 44.1 percent to 603.6 billion yuan, and imports stood at 283.1 billion yuan, an uptick of 4.6 percent. Besides, exports through mart procurement trade grew 49.1 percent.

The continuous global economic recovery and increasing external demand entailed rising global trade and China's exports. In the past months, multiple international organizations have lifted their expectation for global growth in 2021. For instance, the International Monetary Fund in April lifted the Global Growth Forecast for 2021 to 6 percent, and the World Bank also increased its global economic growth forecast to 5.6% for this year the last

In the first six months, China's exports to the US, the EU, and ASEAN countries grew 31.7 percent, 25.5 percent, and 27.8 percent, respectively. The country also exported 47 percent and 27.7 percent more of goods to Latin America and Africa during the same period.

Since the proposal of the Belt and Road Initiative (BRI), China has witnessed increasingly closer trade ties with BRI countries. Especially after the outbreak of COV-ID-19 in 2020, China and relevant countries offered mutual support to tide over difficulties and constantly deepened Belt and Road cooperation, achieving remarkable progress.

able progress.
China's total trade value with BRI countries grew 27.5 percent in the first half to 5.35 trillion yuan, 0.4 percentage point higher than the growth of the country's total trade in the same period, and accounting for 29.6 percent of its total imports and exports. Exports to these countries increased 29.1 percent to 3.03 trillion yuan, and imports increased 25.6 percent to 2.32 trillion yuan.

China-Europe freight service contributed a major part to stabilizing the trade with countries along the rail tracks. According to China Railway, China Europe freight trains made 7,377 trips in the first six months this year, shipping 707,000 TEUs (twenty-foot equivalent units), up 43 percent

and 52 percent, respectively. Ninety-eight percent of the containers shipped were loaded with goods. The GAC said 209.78 billion yuan of China's foreign trade with BRI countries were realized through rail services, up 43.1 percent.

Upholding the vision of building a global community of health for all, China has actively joined the WHO's COVID-19 Vaccines Global Access, or COVAX project and supported all countries to fight the pandemic. Li said the GAC has issued a series of measures this year to ensure smooth and quick customs clearance of COVID-19 vaccines. According to statistics, China has exported over 500 million doses of COVID-19 vaccines and concentrates to 112 countries and regions. The vaccines and concentrates China has offered equal to 1/6 of the world's total production, which marks an important contribution of the country to global anti-pandemic cooperation and economic recovery.

As COVID-19 is still spreading in many parts of the world, Li warned that China's foreign trade faces uncertainties in a complex global epidemic environment. Meanwhile, the foreign trade growth might slow in the second half due to a high base last year. However, it is still possible that the country's foreign trade maintains rapid growth for the year.

China's white paper on Xinjiang important for knowing real Xinjiang - Jordanian expert

THE Chinese white paper on protecting the rights of Xinjiang's ethnic groups provides the international community with a good opportunity to understand the real Xinjiang, a Jordanian expert on the Arab-China relations has said.

"The white paper explains in detail how China has put in place a whole vision for Xinjiang, focusing on its well-rounded development," Samer Khair Ahmed recently told Xinhua, referring to the document titled "Respecting and Protecting the Rights of All Ethnic Groups in Xinjiang," which was issued by China's State Council Information Office on Wednesday.

Noting that the white paper has illustrated the realities and developments in Xinjiang with abundant statistics and facts, the expert pointed out that the document contains rich details on how the ethnic minorities in Xinjiang have been enjoying constantly improving living standard, and practicing religion freely.

All these positive results were made possible by the Chinese government's "people-centered" approach, which is the apparent opposite of some Western media's rumors and distortions, he said.

For Ahmed, who has been studying the Chinese

society for several decades and has published two books on China so far, fabricating so-called "oppression of minorities" is a usual method used by some U.S. politicians to pressure other countries and cause chaos.

China's outstanding achievements and its vision of a community with a shared future for mankind have gained increasing recognition across the globe, but are considered by Washington and some of its allies as threats to their hegemony, Ahamad said.

"Therefore, they continue to slander China, intending to use issues related to Xinjiang to discredit and restrain China," he said.

The Jordanian expert, who visited Xinjiang in 2017, spoke highly of the developments he witnessed there. Regarding the "forced labor" accusations, Ahmed deemed them as part of some West forces' campaign to destabilize Xinjiang and contain China.

"As a Muslim and an Arab, I saw how the Uygurs preserved their culture and traditions, whether in food, music or heritage," he said.

There is no doubt that the Chinese government has shared the fruits of reform and development with people of all ethnic groups in Xinjiang, he said.

Gospel Singeli: A fashion breaking barriers of the social and the sacred

WHILE no rules exist on how social music interacts with prayerful or mourning sessions, a psychological challenge is being opened up on airwaves of late, with scores of musicians moving into prayerful music with ease and comfort, unaware that some rules ought to be existing in such transition.

It is the wish to adapt popular music tunes to a different need, which is tied to the original on the basis of the factor of celebration, thus it appears to serve the purpose.

While one talks of prayerful music it is actually different.

One musician can be cited as having been pivotal in breaking the barriers between the prayerful and the playful is songbird, Rose Mhando, whose itinerary can be the subject of a twisted novel that grips readers, as she has traversed the wide scene in all sorts of

At one time, she was being rumoured to have reached a sort of terminal stage of illness, after a stretch of worrying reports of what was going on in her music career, but at some point received either routine curative action or most likely a faith cure, as in the subsequent period she is a champion of faith music. But her second coming is laced with tremors as well.

For one thing, the itinerary of activities leading to her being resurrected on a new plane at the local music level has plenty in store to excite her fans, and she seemingly isn't sparing in her ammunition.

She has issued songs blasting her adversaries with vituperations sprouting in each song or series of stanza, such that it becomes hard to distinguish between a routine vengeance and victory song with her presumed gospel music.

One such song played at a major prayerful assembly to the north of Dar es Salaam, apart from being sold in chip form has unpalatable stuff directed at adversaries who maliciously mistreated her.

than the songbird, as in the first place she would not herself have been able to produce virulent compositions against thinly hidden individuals unless there was some example to cite or copy from.

It wasn't just a matter of example but a whole trend of developments in that field to which she ably latched herself into the wagon, and did it better than quite a few others, who have issued less remarkable stuff in the way of celebratory or even combative compositions.

And there is plenty in the prayerful sessions themselves that encourages them on that route, like 'sixpack anointment' (if this is the correct translation of 'upako wa kibabe' that is now trending in multiple FM radio stations the house is heard).

What is characteristic about this trend is that it puts aside prayer as such, which has a mournful tone to it that has always characterized gospel songs, whatever breadth and depth this mode of spiritual entertainment has seen in the six decades of independence.

Still for most of the earlier period there were only choir songs, and then a different genre came up where there was a book of passionate compositions tied to new denominations but it also spread to traditional prayer houses.

Only in the digital age where elaborate bands, stage show, equipment, are stifled that compositions shift to individuals to break barriers.

The reason for this shift from marginally mournful or prayerful monologues in gospel songs to animated celebration that is free to take even 'Singeli' modes of happiness, despite that its gyrations are inseparable from the music itself, and scarcely blends with a gospel scenario, is deep seated.

It is the shift from older prayers where it is one's own slides in conduct which are at issue, and the pursuit of grace or affinity with divinity that is only But the problem is actually wider hoped for but not directly handed to an individual.

At present what is pursued is quite different, as first it is to defeat and eradicate strings blocking one's health or welfare - thus, triumphantly.

There is also a cluster of praise songs (which is starkly different from prayer songs) that basically form the main body of what transpires in choirs or music groups associated with vast assemblies of what was traditionally known as 'exorcism' but is now more adeptly recognized as deliverance, freeing from bonds.

There are other situations where the prevalence of this unorthodox form of proto-gospel singing has been generated, namely in the Free Church of Emmanuel Mgaya, popularly recognizable as old 'Masanja Mkandamizaji,' who has the distinction of having teamed up with followers of the late evangelist, Dr Reinhard Bonnke, of numerous gospel 'crusades' in past decades.

These assemblies have a minimum requirement of being in their fellowship, namely to be able to sing a song of praise, and beyond that everything is permitted, from miniskirts to cigarette smoking, all within the same open air prayer service compound.

This could have been treated as an exception or idiosyncratic, but certified preachers are absorbing it too.

Germany cuts short Olympic warmup with allegations of racism

WAKAYAMA, Japan

GERMANY's Olympic soccer team walked off the field during a preparation match for the Tokyo Games on Saturday in response to alleged racist abuse from an opposing Honduras player toward German defender Jordan Torunarigha.

The players left the field together with five minutes remaining in the game after Torunarigha was "racially insulted," the German soccer federation said on Twitter.

"If one of our players is racially abused, it's not an option for us to keep playing," Germany coach Stefan Kuntz said.

"It was hard to get him in, he was terribly upset because he said he was repeatedly racially abused," Kuntz continued. "For us it's clear, this violates our values, we cannot tolerate it. We'll take our player completely under our protection."

Torunarigha's club, Hertha Berlin, responded by saying "that's the only correct decision!

The score was 1-1 when the German players walked off.

"After the situation calmed down a bit, the whole Honduras team came over to us on the bench and apologized," Kuntz said. "That was the end of the matter for us."

said on Twitter that the game was abandoned in the 87th minute "due to the fact that a German player alleged a supposed racist insult on the part of a Honduran national team plaver."

The Honduran federation said the "situation occurred due to a misunderstanding on the field of

Germany captain Maximilian Arnold said the team discussed taking the matter further but decided against it.

'We made a correct statement, we made the right decisions and acted correctly. It was also Jordan's wish. He said that we should leave it at that," Arnold said.

The Honduran soccer federation 'Who is it for?' captain Yoshida asks in call to lift fan ban

JAPAN's men's captain Maya Yoshida has questioned the decision to hold the Olympic Games behind closed doors, calling on authorities to reconsider the spectator ban before the football tournaments begin on Wednesday.

Fans will be absent from the Games as coronavirus infections continue to climb in Japan, even though fans are allowed to attend other sporting contests within the country.

Yoshida led Japan to a 1-1 draw with Spain on Saturday in their final warmup ahead of their opening game in the men's football on Thursday, with a socially-distanced crowd in attendance at Kobe City Stadium.

Matches in the women's tournament will begin on Wednesday.

The presence of the fans moved the former Southampton defender to ask why supporters would not be permitted at the Games, which run until Aug.

"I think a lot of people's tax money is

going to hold these Olympics," the Asahi newspaper quoted Yoshida as saying during an online news conference.

"Despite that, people can't go and watch. So you wonder about who the Olympics is for, and what it is for. Of course athletes want to play in front of

With cases rising rapidly, Tokyo has entered into a state of emergency but spectators have continued to attend games in Japan's professional baseball league and in the country's domestic football competition, the J-League.

"Our families have sacrificed and put up with things, they supported us when we were competing in Europe," said Yoshida, who currently plays in Italy for Sampdoria.

"It's not just the players who were competing, but the family members, every one of them.

"So if they can't watch the match, well who and what is that match for, there is that question. I really hope we can reconsider that seriously."

Ahly punish 10-man Chiefs to win CAF Champions League 10th time

EGYPTIAN club Al Ahly won a record-extending 10th CAF Champions League title on Saturday with a 3-0 final victory over 10-man South African rivals Kaizer Chiefs in Casablanca.

A brilliant goal from Mohamed 'Afsha' Magdy on 64 minutes left little doubt about the outcome in a disappointing finale to the marquee African club competition.

Amr el Sulaya rubbed salt into the wounds of Chiefs with a third goal on 74 minutes, slamming a back-heel past Nigerian goalkeeper Daniel Akpeyi.

Chiefs were struggling to contain Ahly late in the first half when they suffered a massive blow with the redcarding of Happy Mashiane.

The forward stamped on the right leg of full-back Ahmed Tawfik and, after initially flashing a yellow card, the Burundi referee checked the foul on a monitor and changed his decision.

It was a historic victory for Ahly, who became the first club to win backto-back Champions League titles three

South Africa-born Ahly coach Pitso Mosimane, who supported Chiefs as a child, became the first African coach to win the competition three times.

He succeeded in 2016 with South African club Mamelodi Sundowns, and again with Ahly last season in an all-Egyptian final against fierce rivals

Ahly pocket \$2.5 million for winning the Champions League and are guaranteed at least another \$3.5 million when they compete in the FIFA Club World Cup in Japan.

Before travelling to the Far East, the Egyptian club that have won 22 African titles will play CAF Confederation Cup winners Raja Casablanca of Morocco in a one-off match for the CAF Super Cup.

It was a bitterly disappointing first appearance in the final by Chiefs, whose lone CAF title came 21 years ago when they won the now defunct African Cup Winners Cup.

The Soweto outfit matched Ahly early on and had the lone shot on target in the opening half with an effort by Serbian forward Samir Nurkovic that Ahly goalkeeper and captain Mohamed el Shenawy comfortably saved.

Why Buffon went back to where it all began at the age of 43

WHEN Gianluigi Buffon made his professional debut for Parma in November 1995 most of his new teammates weren't even born. If I'd wanted to check that fact on the internet back then. I couldn't Google it: I'd need to use a search engine like WebCrawler (it's still around, in case you want to go old school) on a browser like Mosaic and hope that someone had uploaded the birth dates of players somewhere on the nascent worldwide web since, obviously, football clubs didn't have websites. (Their first form of technology was end-of-season DVDs.)

Five-and-a-half years later, after making his debut for Italy and establishing himself as one of the best keepers in the world, he moved to Juventus in 2001 for around €54.5 million. It wasn't just a world record for a goalkeeper, either; it's a record that would stand for 17 vears, until Alisson (€62.5m) and Kepa Arrizabalaga (€80m) moved to Liverpool and Chelsea, respectively.

Two decades - and 11 league titles, five domestic cups and a World Cup -later, Buffon is back where it all started. It's not surprising, then, that Parma chose to go the superhero route, opting for the #SupermanReturns hashtag in his "welcome back" video.

"It's an incredible feeling," he tells ESPN. "The idea that an athlete can return to the same after 20 years, in the same role as before... wow... I don't know how many athletes in any sport have had that privilege. It's something I wanted badly...'

Buffon is now 43 years old. He backed up Wojciech Szczesny at Juventus the past two seasons, but still managed to start 29 matches over that span - enough of a sample size to know that he can still contribute on the pitch. "Age is just a number" is also just a cliche, of course, though you look at the likes of Zlatan Ibrahimovic (39) and Cristiano Ronaldo (36) and wonder if there isn't some truth in it. Sure, goalkeepers have more longevity, but Buffon has gone way past that.

The hunger is there, as well as the fitness. You wonder how long it will continue.

"I hope for [Cristiano's] sake that I quit first," he says, laughing. "And I do have an idea in my mind of when that time may be... but I also reserve the right to bring that day forward or postpone it!"

Buffon has been asked about his longevity for many years, offering the stock answers you might expect. Professionalism, taking care of his body, luck in avoiding major injuries, enthu-



siasm, good genes, desire - all of these things are likely true for elite athletes who perform beyond their years. But Buffon goes beyond that, citing examples of how you can use age to actually improve.

"Honestly, there are many aspects in which you can better as time passes," he says. "I learned this lesson when I was maybe 36 or 37. I began to realize that if you're serious about it, you do things the right way and you're in the right mental frame, you'll never stop learning and bettering yourself.

"I'm being perfectly honest that when I compare myself now to what I was before, I've improved in a number of areas, where maybe before I was weaker. Obviously, I will have declined in others - that's normal - but overall, when I look at myself objectively, I don't feel that I'm worse than I was six or seven years ago."

Everybody knows what age does to us. At a certain point, you lose muscle mass, strength, agility, your recovery time gets longer: all these things come along together. But that is only part of being a goalkeeper. Buffon cites experience, mental strength and the ability to read a game, all of which makes sense. But there are others, too.

"I'll give you a very obvious example," he says. "I've always had a pretty good right foot when it came to passing. [Buffon was a midfielder until he was 14 years old.] The game has obviously evolved in the past 25 years and keepers are asked to do much more with their feet than before. I was fine with that, because I was very confident on my right. My left was OK, but I'd really only use it to clear the ball or to hit a short pass - never to actually pass it long or accurately."

"But then I started really started working on it in my mid-30s, and I really improved," he adds. "I never thought I'd get to the point where my kicking is almost equal with either foot, but that's where I am. I genuinely believe that through repetition, serious training and muscle memory, all with the right mindset, almost nothing is impossible for a human being."

Back to Parma. When he left in 2001, they were coming off a golden era: nine straight top-five finishes, two wins in the Coppa Italia, a UEFA Cup and a Cup Winners' Cup. They were blessed with superstars, from Lilian Thuram to Gianfranco Zola, from Hernan Crespo to Fabio Cannavaro, from Claudio Taffarel to Tino Asprilla. The 15 or so years

after that would see the club go bankrupt, two owners face prison time in separate cases and Parma be reformed in the amateur ranks. A year ago, they were bought by

Iowa businessman Kyle Krause and after being relegated, Buffon will start over in Serie B. "I was cheering for them to stay up all

of last season - I'm a Parma fan, after all. I joined at 13 and stayed for 10 years," Buffon says. "Parma launched my career. They helped me become what I am, and now maybe it's my turn to help them go back to being great. Like they have been before, and like how they deserve to be. But I want to be clear. I didn't choose Serie B: I chose Parma."

To him, the only thing that is different is that the climb back up the ladder begins in Serie B, rather than near the bottom of Serie A. But he knows where he wants to take them.

"Sometimes you get lucky, and this club is very lucky to have been taken over by a guy like Krause," Buffon says. And then, unexpectedly, he pulls out a stat. "He's ambitious and he has every reason to be. When you talk about Parma, you're talking about the fourthmost successful Italian club in Europe, in terms of trophies. Overall, we're 16th. We need to respect and honour that history."

As for when he may call it quits, there's no "use by" date on his sleeve. Few athletes, in any sport, are as introspective and as open as Buffon. A few years ago, he detailed his bouts with depression in his early 20s, how they rocked his belief that "if you have money and success you can't be unhappy" and how he developed the tools to deal with his mental health issues.

In a sporting world that is often macho and testosterone-laden, it's a refreshing voice and a reminder, that even this Superman had his kryptonite, a challenge he acknowledged, faced and conquered.

National Arts Council now disapproves Rose's exclusion from Miss World 2021 pageant

THE National Arts Council, known by Kiswahili acronym, 'BASA-TA', has said it does not approve of the dismissal of Miss Tanzania 2020/21 Rose Manfere, from the Miss World pageant which is expected to take place in December this year in Puerto Rico.

Matiko Mniko, Acting Executive Secretary of the council, issued the statement and wanted to know the outcome of the session between the council and Rose.

The meeting was originally scheduled to bring together Rose, BASATA, and Miss Tanzania Organizing Committee but it could not take place after committee members failed to attend the meeting because they said they had been constrained by other responsibilities.

However, Mniko said that did not stop BASATA from coming to the decision considering that it was the second session held after the first on May 31 failed to end because members failed to reach an

"One of the resolutions we reached after the session was that the council did not approve and did not agree with the decision to exclude Miss Tanzania 2020/21 from participating in the Miss World 2021 pageant until the Miss Tanzania Organizing Committee provided basic reasons and confirmed them.

Mniko disclosed: "With this explanation and because of the sensitivity of this matter, and since the preparation of the participant should proceed, the council has issued several directives."

"The Miss Tanzania's organizers, The Look Company, is required to present the name of Miss Tanzania 2020/21, Rose, to the Miss World 2021 beauty pageant," Mniko revealed.

In other directives issued by the council, The Look Company should send the name of another Director instead of the former CEO, Basila Mwanukuzi, who currently has government responsibilities, a situation which leads to failure to communicate with her regularly when she is needed.

Basila is currently the Korogwe District Commissioner, a position she has held since June 2021.

The organizers have moreover been asked to submit the names of the members of the Miss Tanzania Organizing Committee and classify their positions individually.
