Niger's military sets three-year transition

NIGER'S coup leader has promised to return the West African nation to civilian rule within three years.

Gen Abdourahamane Tchiani (pictured) made the announcement after meeting mediators from the West African regional bloc Ecowas in the capital, Niamey.

ECOWAS has threatened military action to reverse last month's overthrow of President Mohamed Bazoum if talks fail.

The junta head said that Niger did not want a war but would defend itself against any foreign intervention.

"If an attack were to be undertaken against us, it will not be the walk in the park some people seem to think," he warned in his televised address on Saturday evening.

Gen Tchiani also reiterated criticism of what he called the "illegal and inhumane" sanctions imposed by Ecowas on the landlocked country.

This has included cutting electricity, resulting in blackouts in Niamey and other major cities, as well as blocking crucial imports.

Lorry drivers have been stuck for weeks waiting to bring in supplies, forcing up food

"Sanctions are not conceived with the aim of finding a solution but to bring us to our

knees and humiliate us," Gen Tchiani said. Thousands of men came to a stadium in Niamey on Saturday to register for a volunteer force in case of invasion - although overcrowding prevented the registration process starting, report said.

Regional efforts to reverse the coup have been backed by the US and France, which both have military bases in Niger. These bases are part of efforts to tackle jihadist groups in the wider Sahel region.

The junta leader, who headed the presidential guard before seizing power on 26 July, said military intervention could worsen the Islamist insurgencies linked to al-Qaeda and the Islamic State group.

"They seem ignorant to the fact that it is in large part thanks to the professionalism and valour of the defence and security forces of Niger that Niger has remained a barrier preventing terrorist hordes from destabilising the whole region," he said.

The coup mirrors similar recent takeovers in neighbouring Burkina Faso and Mali.

Kenya's public debt rises by a record \$10.8 billion

KENYA'S debt level has reached record highs despite President William Ruto's vow to tame the country's appetite for loans, treasury figures show.

Total public debt rose by a record 1.56 trillion shillings (\$10.8 billion) in the financial year ended June 30 to 10.1 trillion shillings (\$70.75 billion), breaching a debt ceiling of 10 trillion shillings, according to the data released recently.

"The increase in the public debt is attributed to external loan disbursements, exchange rate fluctuations and the uptake of domestic and external debt," the Treasury said.

Loan repayment costs, mainly to China, have shot up as the local currency trades at record lows of around 144 shillings to the dollar.

The cost of debt servicing in the vear ended June was 391 billion

shillings (\$2.7 billion), of which to expand by more than five the highest payment -- 107 billion shillings (\$743 million) -- went to China.

The debt load has prompted warnings from global credit ratings agencies including Fitch Ratings which last month downgraded Kenya's ability to repay international lenders from "stable to negative", citing tax hikes and social unrest.

Kenyan lawmakers voted in June to change the debt ceiling from a fixed shilling amount to a proportion of the country's gross domestic product (GDP). The Senate is yet to pass the amendment.

Ruto came to power last year on a promise to revive the economy in the country of about 53 million people.

Economic growth slowed to 4.8 percent in 2022 from 7.6 percent the previous year and is forecast rounds of deadly anti-government reliance on borrowing.

Outlining his plan for a "bottomup" economic transformation, Ruto promised to slash government debt and introduce policies putting money in the pockets of impoverished Kenyans.

DRC faces worst cholera epidemic in last six years

THE Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) is facing its worst cholera epidemic for 6 years, warns the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), due to a spike in conflict and displacement in the eastern part of the country.

The UN agency reports that 31,342 cases of suspected or confirmed cholera and 230 deaths were notified throughout the country during the first 7 months of this year, including many children.

North Kivu is the most affected province. On its own, more than 21,400 confirmed or suspected cases, including more than 8,000 children under the age of 5, have been recorded since the start of the year, while over the whole of 2022, only 5,120 cases there had been identified, including 1,200 in cases and more than 1,100 deaths.

India upgrades supercomputer at NM-AIST

IN order to ensure that Tanzania's largest and highest performing remains power supplied against all odds, the High Commission of India in Dar es Salaam has reinforced the Param Kilimanjaro with 64 solarpowered standby batteries.

The added hardware accessories for uninterrupted power supply to the nation's largest technological brain, is part of the upgradation of India-Tanzania Information Communication Technology Centre at the Arusha campus of the Nelson Mandela African Institute of Science and Technology

The India High Commissioner to Tanzania, Binaya Srikanta handed the batteries to the Deputy Vice Chancellor of the Nelson Mandela Institute of Science and Technology,

Prof Anthony Mshandete.

"The Param Kilimanjaro, which is the largest supercomputer in East Africa, was operating under capacity because of challenges arising from power shading, but now with auxiliary power supply it will attain its full potential," said the Deputy Vice Chancellor.

Dr Judith Leo, Acting Dean of School of Computation and Communication Science and Engineering said the super computer is used for research, data dissemination, and highlevel technical training and data management.

"India will continue to support Tanzania's technological advancement in training, medicine and communication sectors," stated the High Commissioner of India, Binaya Srikanta during the event.

He pointed out that the India-Tanzania Centre of Excellence in Information and Communication Technology initiative is already bearing fruits in the country.

Through the initiative, India helped to establish the country's most powerful supercomputer, the Param-Kilimanjaro installed at Nelson Mandela African Institute of Science and Technology in Arusha.

Previously India installed another Param Serengeti High Speed Super Computer, IT laboratories, and tele-medicine center at the Dar es Salaam Institute of Technology (DIT) which is linked to 10 remote regional hubs.

The Param-Kilimanjaro of Arusha is essentially five-times more powerful than the Param-Serengeti in Dar es Salaam.

The NM-AIST Param Kilimanjaro

at NM-AIST is a 100 terabyte (100,000 gigabyte) machine compared to the Param Serengeti operating at the Dar-es-Salaam Institute of Technology (DIT), which features only 20 terabytes (20,000 gigabyte).

A supercomputer is a highly intelligent computer with a highlevel computational capacity compared to a general-purpose computer.

Performance of a supercomputer is measured in floating-point operations per second (FLOPS) instead of million instructions per second (MIPS).

The India-Tanzania education relationship is as old as the 62 years of Independence, with more than 500 scholarships extended to students from Tanzania going to study in New Delhi or Mumbai.

Bus owners called on to submit applications for 24-hour operation

THE Land Transport Regulatory Authority (LATRA) has urged owners of commuter buses interested to operate 24 hours to start submitting their applications for the authority to work on them.

Currently, some buses are allowed to commence their journey at 3am and park before midnight.

Addressing reporters in Dar es Salaam on Friday, LATRA's director of road transport, Johansen Kahatano, said the authority will have to go through the applications and provide a go ahead for buses which will meet requirements.

"We are now preparing to start allowing buses to operate 24 hours but there are some measures that need to be completed which include settling the issue of routes and security so as to make the service safe for all. We hope the service will start soon because there are discussions going on between Home Affairs and the Works and Transport ministries so as to reach consensus on how the routes will be planned considering the areas with high demand," he said.

According to him, the authority is implementing directives issued by Prime Minister Kassim Majaliwa in June this year while adjourning the 11th session of the 12th Parliament in Dodoma where he wanted responsible authorities to start working on processes to allow 24 operation of passenger buses.

government permission for upcountry passenger buses to operate for 24 hours in a bid to further stimulate the economy in the transport sub-

Majaliwa said: "In light of the improvement in roads and communication countrywide, as well as the opinions of various stakeholders in the transport sector, including lawmakers, it appears that bus owners and drivers are willing to comply with road safety regulations."

To implement the decision, the Premier said the Ministry of Home Affairs would cooperate with the Ministry of Works and Transport, particularly in the transportation sector, to establish a procedure for bus owners and drivers who plan to transport passengers at night.

At the end of the 1990s, passenger buses were banned from travelling at night because of frequent incidents of bus hijacking, which resulted in passengers being looted and humiliated, high rate of bus accidents, which resulted in deaths and permanent disabilities, as well as property and road infrastructure damage.

Meanwhile, Kahatano warned some passenger buses that have been violating placed regulations and commencing their journey contrary to the time which they have been given.

"There are some buses which have been allowed to start their journey at 5am but violating it and starting at 4am or 3am, this is a violation of the law and guidelines, we are monitoring them very closely and we will take stern measures against them," he explained.

New AI model aids in African sustainability efforts by accurately predicting fish stocks

SMALL-scale fisheries in Africa and Asia, where accurate stock predictions are often too expensive to conduct, are underperforming relative to their maximum sustained yields due to undue strain from overfishing, a new study has said.

African countries, in particular, are becoming net importers rather than exporters as fishery yields are declining at an estimated 1 million metric tons (MT) per year. Human, environmental, geographical, and ecological factors impact fish biomass and yields, the complexity of which makes it challenging to estimate.

However, a new artificial intelligence (AI) pilot tool managed by the Wildlife Conservation Society (WCS) that, with limited data, can quickly and accurately estimate coastal fish stocks in data-poor areas aims to mitigate the issue and more clearly estimate fish biomass in these types of fisheries.

"People are fishing without knowing the state of their fishery and what the

often do not know if they are overfishing or underfishing in the coarsest terms," WCS Conservation Biologist and Lead Study Author Tim McClanahan said. "This is particularly true in tropical fisheries where the species of fish are many, the ecosystems are complex, and science is insufficient to answer these questions."

Applied to Western Indian Ocean coral reefs using biomass data from past research, the AI model produced an 85 percent accurate prediction for fish census biomass data, which in turn, allows fishers to connect overfishing with their inability to meet maximum sustainable yield, as well as lost catch and income.

"The 85 percent we achieved is as high as you can expect, but the question is over how large an area can you use this model - just nearby sites or perhaps the whole ocean? The farther away from your data the model is predicting, the weaker the predictions. But, in many cases poor predictions are better than no

predictions," McClanahan said. According to the WCS, stock potential is for sustainable fishing. They assessments typically employed by

developed countries are expensive and laborintensive, making them nearly impossible for fisheries in countries like Africa and Asia, which have the highest percentage of small-scale fisheries relying on nearshore ecosystems for income and food, to conduct.

"The plant is expected to cost

5bn/- and is being constructed in the 6,000 square metres of land and will alter the land scape of the Kisongo area," he said and added that it will also increase government revenues as well as assist in making sure of the country's food security.

"We are still communicating with the government for more areas for seeds production to make sure all types of seeds are produced here in the country and stop the dependence to import seeds," he added.

Most young Zimbabwean voters dream of 'change'

JUST days before a national election to pick a president and lawmakers, one word is on the lips of most young Zimbabweans: "change".

Yet, questions about who can deliver change and whether it might happen draw elusive or conflicting answers on the bustling and trafficked streets of Harare, the capital.

"There needs to be a change in almost everything, we need change," said Tsitsi Chifura, a 22-year-old human resources student, echoing the concerns of many others at the lack of work opportunities.

"We have nothing to do, we are just sitting (around)," she said as she walked on the streets of the central business district.

About two-thirds of Zimbabweans are under 25, according to the United Nations.

Many will be voting for the first time on August 23, in an election where unemployment, estimated by economists at about 70 percent in the formal sector, is one of the top concerns.

Talk of change often implies support for the opposition, led by Nelson Chamisa, a 45-year-old lawyer and pastor. But almost no one says that out loud.

"I am scared," said Valentine Kamupini a 25-year-old chef, adding he was still hoping for "a good result", speaking a few blocks from a giant portrait of President Emmerson Mnangagwa which towers over the city.

The ruling ZANU-PF party, in power since independence in 1980 has a low tolerance for dissent and has been accused by rights groups

of resorting to violence, repression and intimidation to secure a favourable vote.

Yet, analysts say the party's long dominance might play against it at the ballot box.

'Young blood' vs 'geriatrics'

"Most young people are sick and tired...of being ruled by a geriatric lot," said Zimbabwean political analyst Brian Kagoro.

Mnangagwa, who is seeking a second term, is 80 and came to power after a 2017 military-led coup that deposed the late Robert Mugabe, then 93.

"We need young blood that is energetic, fresh minds. The current one is old-fashioned," said Tawanda Gwanzura, 28, also a chef, adding there would be "no change" if the government were to win.

Others believe Mnangagwa, who also promised change for Zimbabwe when he was first elected in 2018, is still the best candidate to deliver on that promise after the polls.

"We are looking for jobs. So I think with president Mnangagwa we will have jobs," said Faustina Nyamhandu, 22, unemployed.

The president, who has been on a ribbon-cutting spree in recent weeks, "is making in-roads" she

Both ZANU-PF and Chamisa's Citizens Coalition for Change (CCC) have refreshed their ranks, filing youthful candidates for legislative and municipal elections, to woo young voters.

But some feel that doesn't really matter, as amid widespread fears of rigging, their vote won't count

"We all know the outcome," said Mafadzwa Taruvinga, 24, explaining why she will not vote. "I think there will be no change at all".

RESIDENTS of three droughtprone Shehias in North A District, Unguja North Region in Zanzibar are set to benefit from deep wells for agriculture alongside entrepreneurship empowerment to shield them from the impact of climate change.

A statement released yesterday by the Vice President's Office said the safety net is implemented under the Ecosystem-Based Adaptation for Rural Resilience (EBARR) and named the benefitting Shehias as Jugakuu, Mbuyutende and Kijini.

along wells come construction of the centers breeding entrepreneurs, tailoring, soap production as well as greenhouses for sustainable agriculture.

Deputy Permanent Secretary in the Vice President's Office (Environment) Dr Switbert Mkama paid a visit at the weekend to inspect implementation of the project and was impressed by the pace and quality so far, the advisory said.

He encouraged leaders in the area especially Shehas of the three Shehias that have benefited from the projects to supervise implementation and encourage resident to plant trees and water

"Personally, I am satisfied with the way you manage these projects and I congratulate the shehas for managing them and the community for accepting them and actively participating in implementing

them, I ask you to ensure that it be built around the project area to continues to have the same quality," he stressed.

Since the construction of buildings for sewing entrepreneurs and soap production will involve machines and equipment, Dr. Mkama said it is important to have a strategic plan so that the project is sustainable even when it expires.

He said that the sewing machines that will be provided along with other equipment including lights and water pipes will need minor repairs and electricity will be paid for so the members of the community should look at how to service it without waiting for the government.

Along with that, the DPS urged that entrepreneurship education be given to those who will benefit from the project, it is also important to educate them about infrastructure maintenance.

Alawi Haji Hija, Coordinator of EBARR in North A District, said that through the nurseries, people will be taught to practise droughttolerant agriculture including use of

well water to irrigate crops. He also said that the wells will help them in accessing water service for home use which they were unable to get due to the

challenge of drought. With that, Hija added that the areas where the project is being implemented have been measured and have already been included in the plan for the best use of land to

be protected. Thus, he said that a fence will protect and maintain it while the water service continues to exist for the people of those areas.

The Sheha of Jugakuu Ali Abdallah Pili thanked and congratulated the government through the VPO for implenting the EBARR Project as water wells use solar energy, which is cheap and they can afford it.

"We are very grateful to the government for this project and we have found a group that makes good soap and you have provided us with modern fishing boats that our citizens use in fishing activities and thus earn an income," he said.

However, the sheikh advised the group members to respect and take care of the projects and cooperate fully in various activities related to the projects.

Projects visited and inspected by Dr. Mkama in Matemwe North District 'A' has cost 760m/-.

The EBARR project funded by the Fund for Developing Countries through the Global Environment Facility (GEF) is also implemented in the districts of Mpwapwa (Dodoma), Simanjiro (Manyara), Mvomero (Morogoro) and Kishapu (Shinyanga).

Through the project, citizens of drought-prone areas are empowered to earn an income in an alternative way without getting involved in acts of environmental damage, including cutting down trees for energy and watering livestock at the sources as infrastructure is being built for that

Government scraps 374 levies

MEMBERS of the business community in the country have reason to smile as the government announced abolishes 374 levies out of 380.

Minister for Industry and Trade Dr Ashatu Kijaji said here at the weekend that the scrapping of 374 out of 380 levies, taxes and fees was continued efforts to create friendly business environment.

Adressing the business community in Dodoma during the meeting that focused on addressing challenges facing traders the minister said, through the business blue print, the remaining taxes that hinder smooth business will be resolved soon.

On inconveniences encountered by the business community when it comes to business licences in

local authorities Dr Kijaji said the ministry is working to address it as it finalises the process to assign Business Registration and Licencing Agency (BRELA) to carry out the task.

"The government started the implementation of the blueprint in 2019, a document that, among other things, enables us to review and assess the business environment. When we started there were 380 levies, taxes and fees on the list that were to be looked at, but we are now remaining with only six which will be cleared soon," she said.

The blueprint provides the government's main framework and it presents key challenges affecting the business environment in the country along with a set of recommendations for reform to put in place a more business friendly environment.

During the meeting, which was attended by Dodoma Regional Commissioner, Rosemary

Senyamule, members of the business community complained about the existence of multiple fees related to licences which have been posing a burden to traders.

Others are cumbersome preapproval procedures, which create rent seeking opportunities, presence of a multiplicity and duplicity of processes, loopholes in some laws and regulations which are applied by regulators during inspection.

"It is important to put in place a framework for addressing regulatory hurdles and create a smart, functional and fair business regulatory regime in the country," said Dr Kijaji.

Dr Kijaji called for preparation of booklets that contain the checklist

of all taxes and fees which should be handed over to the Regional Commissioner so that authorities can revisit them in case any challenges that relate with the charges emerge.

As for licence issuance, the minister said all permits will now be issued by a single entity. In the past Brela was responsible for issuing Class A licence while the councils were responsible for issuing Class B permit, an arrangement that raised complaints from the business community, as it involved a lot of bureaucracy, especially in payment of crop cess during their transportation.

On her part, RC Senyamule assured the minister of the regional administration's commitment to have in place an arrangement where business operators from all walks of life carry out their business according to the laid down procedures for their improved social welfare.

Small-scale sunflower processors urged to adopt quality and standard measures

SMALL-SCALE sunflower processors have been urged to adopt quality and standard measures as well as procedures in efforts to tap the available oil market both locally and internationally.

The call was made here by the Permanent Secretary in the, Ministry of Industry and Trade (MIT), Dr. Hashil T. Abdallah, saying they have to change with the emerging technologies and market demands.

He was speaking at the closure of a training that informed 20 smallscale sunflower processors on quality and standards requirements and procedures contained in a manual developed by the ministry with support of the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO).

The manual, also, aim at enlightening small scale-sunflower processors on decision making criteria for investing in small-scale sunflower processing feasibly and profitably.

The manual was developed to contribute to elevating the knowledge of small-scale sunflower processors on quality, standards and decision making on investments, which are among the challenges they face.

The event was coupled with the inaugurating an energy efficient 1,000 litres sunflower oil refinery which has been fabricated by the Dodoma Region Vocational Training and Service Centre (DRVTSC) of the Vocational Education and Training Authority (VETA).

The manufacturing of the refinery had three objectives of reducing numerous challenges related to imported technology such as incompatibility to local environment, high importation costs and limited access to post installation maintenance and repair services.

" With such benefits and the capacity of the refinery which matches with the needs of the majority of small-scale sunflower processors, domestic manufacture of the sunflower oil refinery will enable an increased number of the small-scale sunflower processors to access the facility to enhance their businesses.", said the PS.

He, furthermore, mentioned that, as the global demand for refined sunflower oil is on the increase, with world market prices poised to rise, investing in domestic sunflower oil refining is highly desirable for reducing significantly the country's expenditure on edible oil imports which, currently, account for nearly 60% of the country's demand for edible oils.

Threat of NHIF 'bankruptcy': Let remedial action come soon

ARLIAMENTARY committees have returned to business ahead of the August-September session of the National Assembly, with a committee report setting out in detail the state of National Health Insurance Fund (NHIF).It laid bare a situation of insufficient revenue collections for three consecutive years, which tended to sharply worsen from one year to another. As a matter of fact the report may have a background that didn't hit the headlines, that there was a Community Health Fund (CHF) which collapsed and its services withdrawn.

This background is vital to perhaps grapple with the insurance sector reform quest, whether it is an attempt to rectify what are still usable financing structures of NHIF, as the crucial organs seem to explain. There is another hunch, in that the real purpose is to recreate the CHF by merging with NHIF and in a way making membership compulsory. It will not be enforced like 'head tax,' but a service levy, that to obtain the final stamp for any public warranty it will be vital to have the card. This way not many income earners will escape.

Committee members seemed quite frank in what NHIF accounts show, but appeared somewhat idealistic on the remedies. They may even have been exaggerating in saying that 'looking at its revenue collection trend, you can see that NHIF is likely to die," as if is a private company besieged with a vast commercial debt, thus standing no chance of paying it. After the budget sitting the government announced taking over TANESCO debts, why not uplift NHIF?

After making a factual assessment of the financial situation, the levies are skimpy.

That is where the CHF comes in, as NHIF is for upper classes, employees who have insurance attached to their conditions of service. An underlying faith in its practicability is not set out in the report but merely taken for granted, and responsible officials explain the procedure, not premises.

Once the bill is passed by the National Assembly, NHIF will be responsible for implementation of the plan, which skips the fact that plenty was on record to the effect that NHIF procurement methods are often wanting, and no one knows if double payments of bills will end. What the parliamentary committee seems to be pursuing is how to get a lot more money for NHIF without really sorting out an efficiency issue in operations, or sufficiency of contributed funds for broad, universal health care. That is how chaos may creep in rather than actual reform.

NHIF membership is said to have increased from 1.05m to 1.35m during the past two years or so, but its efficiency was higher when it had fewer members. Whatever transpired between the committee members and the fund management on the issue, it is clear that insurance works with limited membership, as both CHF and a wider range for NHIF failed to work. It follows that the government can set out free medical care for dispensaries and health centres, and routine payments for referral hospitals, or actual payments for a whole range of medical services from specialists. broadest sense, the use of intentional violence and fear to achieve political or ideological The terms 'terrorist' and 'terrorism' originated during the French Revolution of the late 18th century but became widely used internationally and gained worldwide attention in the 1970s during the Troubles in Northern Ireland, the Basque conflict, and the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. The increased use of suicide attacks from the 1980s onwards was typified by the 2001 September 11 attacks in the United States.

Varied political organisations have been accused of using terrorism to achieve their objectives. These include left-wing and rightwing political organisations, nationalist groups, religious groups, revolutionaries, and ruling governments. Legislation declaring terrorism a crime has been adopted in many states. State terrorism is that perpetrated by nation states, but is not considered such by the state conducting it, making legality a grey area.

The fifth International Day of Remembrance of and Tribute to the Victims of Terrorism was commemorated on 21 August 2022. It took place as the world struggles to transition out of the public health emergency triggered by the COVID-19 pandemic and confronted the social transformations it has created or accelerated. At the same time, victims of terrorism continued to experience uncertainty and anxiety as armed conflicts, violent attacks, and terrorist acts around the world continued to make headlines and perhaps exacerbate or trigger their traumas.

Remembrance of and paying tribute to victims of terrorism plays their status as victims is respected and recognised. The International Day serves to commemorate and uphold the dignity of victims and highlights the importance of global solidarity in ensuring that victims are not forgotten.

The theme was "Memories" and was selected following consultation with victims and victims' associations. Memories bind us together as if connected by a red thread, a fil rouge: a thread that signifies our common humanity and solidarity with those who have suffered irreparable losses in the most heinous of circumstances.

To mark the fifth commemoration of the International Day, the United Nations Office of Counter-Terrorism (UNOCT) organized a high-level prerecorded event entitled 'Surviving Terrorism: The Power of Memories' to be broadcast on Sunday, 21 August 2022, on UN Web TV. The prerecorded event was opened by the United Nations Secretary-General, António Guterres, and featured the participation of the co-Chairs of the Group of Friends of Victims of Terrorism, the Republic of Iraq, and the Kingdom of Spain, testimonies from four victims of terrorism, and closing remarks by Under-Secretary-General for Counter-Terrorism, Vladimir Voronkov.

The cornerstone of 2022's virtual observance was the "Memories" Opens a new window campaign, launched by UNOCT's United Nations Counter-Terrorism Centre (UNCCT) earlier this year. Through film, photography, and carefully crafted captions, the "Memories" campaign tells the stories of victims of terrorism from across the globe who share their memories, emotions and the meaning that they attach to a personal object.

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
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Selling babies at orphanages in Nigeria

HILD-SELLING is the practice of selling children, usually by parents, legal guardians, or subsequent custodians, including adoption agencies, orphanages and Mother and Baby Homes. Where the subsequent relationship with the child is essentially nonexploitative, it is usually the case that purpose of child-selling was to permit adoption.

The Hague Convention on Intercountry Adoption is a treaty which bans the buying and selling of children and attempts to impose controls and regulation on intercountry adoption, which gives rise to the practice.[1]

The highly revealing report by investigative journalist, 'Fisayo Soyombo, on a most egregious form of human trafficking in our country should compel serious attention from relevant authorities. The report details how babies

at a popular Lagos orphanage home. Unfortunately, this is an old problem that has refused to go away, perhaps because perpetrators believe there are no consequences. Indeed, the United Nations ranks child trafficking as the third most common crime in Nigeria after financial fraud and drug trafficking. In June 2018, authorities in Imo said that there were no fewer than 250 illegal orphanages in the state. "Out of 272 homes across the state, only 15 were genuine while others were fake," said the then Special Okorocha on Governmental Organisations and Allied Matters, Simeon Nwulu. "The rate at which children are being marketed and sold like ordinary articles of trade is alarming. At a peanut, the destiny of a child is destroyed and most of these adopters are not well-to-do to take care of these children." Since then, nothing seems to have changed but the malaise is national.

However, we are mindful that there are operators of licensed

are being sold like merchandise orphanages and couples who children that will be taken away follow laid down procedures in adopting children and they should be encouraged. But those who take advantage of the increasing number of childless parents by engaging in shady deals for quick money should be exposed and decisively dealt with. They pose a threat to the health of our society.In the same vein, the National Agency for the Prohibition of Trafficking in Persons (NAPTIP) must step up its supervisory and monitoring efforts on these orphanages by working hand-in-hand with security agencies, social welfare departments and the civil society.

We understand that the crime is thriving among some desperate persons who have come to regard Assistant to (now former) Governor it as a business because they have several official enablers on their payroll. That perhaps explains why they have operated for so long. Members of these syndicates also scout for young and impoverished females with unwanted pregnancies to lure them to many of the so-called homes and orphanages where they are kept until they are delivered of their babies which they then buy. In some cases, the services of young men are procured to impregnate these girls for the purpose of producing

from them. These children are then traded like commodities.

It is important to tackle this menace because the adoption fad has assumed a new level of popularity in Nigeria with the number of potential adopters far exceeding what the legal orphanages could offer. In the process, we now have a situation in which even in popular orphanages, like the Lagos case, some unscrupulous people are now offering babies for sale to the highest bidders.

It is therefore important for critical stakeholders to join hands with the security agencies and civil society groups to beam more searchlight on some of these orphanages. The approving authorities should equally raise the standard of establishing orphanages in Nigeria with a view to ensuring that every prospective operator meets some minimal conditions before they are licensed.

Meanwhile, we urge NAPTIP to work with the security agencies in investigating the case that has been brought to light in Lagos. If all the details provided in the story are found to be accurate, culprits should face the full wrath of the law to serve as deterrence to others.

South Africa is set to make its mark on BRICS history

OUTH Africa, no stranger to international media attention, is in the limelight again. As the host of this year's 2023 BRICS summit, it will see on its soil the first in-person gathering of key Global South leaders in four years and another BRICS summit in Africa in five years amid world fragmentation, intense major-power competition, as well as a conflict on Europe's doorstep that preoccupies the North and ripples through the South.

The Johannesburg summit is conspicuous on several counts. If you only so much as glance at Western media headlines, you will be struck by their angst—"The BRICS are better off disbanding than expanding", "BRICS raging against the dollar is an exercise in futility".

Writing these off as jealousy is easy. But taking a deeper look at their contention can help South Africa in its effort to deliver a successful summit.

Weight matters

The first argument advanced by Western commentators is that BRICS is disunited. This indicates a fear of

its collective weight. Launched in aligned Movement to call for on Africa. This continent best 2009, BRICS brings together some of the biggest emerging markets and developing countries (EMDCs). Together, they are 23 per cent of global GDP and 42 per cent of the world's population. By 2030, they are projected to contribute over 50 per cent to global output.

And many more from the developing world are looking for an entry ticket. According to South Africa, over 40 nations have expressed interest in joining the economic bloc, and 22 of them have already submitted formal applications.

South Africa's proactive role in advancing the process will important. Admitting the right candidates-those geopolitical economic and representativeness-will enhance the BRICS' role as the premier platform for EMDCs to pursue economic cooperation and speak up for their legitimate rights and interests.

Developing nations have a history of uniting into a force the West cannot underestimate. In 1955, they met in Indonesia's Bandung to denounce imperialism and colonialism. In 1961, they coalesced in Belgrade as the Non-

more democracy in international relations. In 1964, they came together in Geneva as the Group of 77 to push for a new global economic order that is fair for developing countries.

Now, a historic moment has come for BRICS, and South Africa will be remembered as the place where a key milestone is reached and the future course of BRICS cooperation shaped.

Development first

The second point Western elites make is that BRICS will not be able to realise its goal of shaping a fairer order for development. On a more concrete level, its talk of de-dollarisation attracts the most derision. Western commentary points to the dollar's dominance and its skewing effect on development processes as a reality developing countries have to live with.

As with all international groupings, members of the BRICS may not see eye to eye on every issue. But South Africa can encourage a focus of attention on their shared goal, which is development.

The country is right to focus the theme of its chairmanship

captures the bottlenecks of global development: the needs are many and urgent, genuine help from rich nations is under-delivered, what little comes by from them tends to have political strings attached, and a global economic governance structure dominated by the West is preventing meaningful progress in developing countries.

South Africa has the chance to re-energise the global dialogue on how to address these impediments, bringing in topics such as dedollarisation. True, even a layman knows moving away from the dollar will not be easy. But the greenback has been abusing its outsized influence on economies around the world. Its weaponisation is becoming the new norm, pushing many to think about possible alternatives.

All in all, the Johannesburg summit is not just another gathering for the Global South. And what better place to have it than in South Africa, the rainbow nation priding itself on a glorious history of fighting injustices?

Strive to seek legal relief whenever your rights are violated

AST week, we briefly looked at the offence of rape, which is covered in section 130 of the Penal Code (R.E 2022). It is established when a man has sexual intercourse with a girl who is aged below 18 years whether the girl consents or doesn't consent to it or with a woman without her consent or when she is of unsound mind or is in a state of intoxication administered to her by the man or by some other person.

Another circumstance is when a man uses force, threats or intimidation to put a woman in the fear of death or of bodily injury in order to have sexual intercourse with her or while she is in unlawful detention. It may also arise from a certain relationship in which a person in authority or power uses it to have sexual intercourse with his subordinates.

The case we used was of a person who was charged with rape and was convicted of the offence and sentenced to 30 years of imprisonment by the District Court (the trial court), but who unsuc-


cessfully appealed to the High Court of Tanzania in Moshi.

However, when he appealed to the Court of Appeal, his conviction and sentence were set aside although it was proved in court by a medical doctor that the girl had been sexually penetrated.

The case was dismissed for lack of evidence on the identity of the perpetrator of rape. We concluded that it is good to be careful with the way we testify lest we lose the case which had we been more careful, we would have won it. There are girls or women who have been raped, but the way they testified in court was so insufficient that the court had to dismiss their evidence.

Today, I invite you to briefly look again at unfair termination of employment. A few months ago we looked at unfair termination of employment, but from a different perspective. It was about an employee who is unfairly laid off on the grounds of economic reasons and company restructuring.

Today, we look at unfair termination of employment from the point of view of the husband or wife, who, using his or her position, goes to his or her



spouse's workstation and asks the employer to terminate the employment of his wife or her husband. There are people, especially married women, who have fallen victim to this.

In Tanzania, every person, who is aged above 18 years, is entitled to work by virtue of Article 22(1) of the Constitution 2005) and when it happens that his or her employment is terminated, it must be done fairly (following legal procedures).

Article 9 states that "the state authority and all its agencies are obliged to ensure that every person who is able to work does work, and work means any legitimate activity by which a person earns a of the United Republic of Tanzania (R.E. living." This Article concerns all persons and does not exclude women - that is, men and women are equally entitled to work or employ-

Therefore, the husband cannot just go to the workstation of his wife to ask for the termination of her employment. If the employer accepts it and does terminate the emplovee's employment just because the husband has demanded, it amounts to unfair termination of employment and the wife may sue for reinstatement or compensation if she so

As we have repeated time and time again, the purpose of this column is to help a layperson to be acquainted with the laws he or she is subject to and live as a law-abiding citizen. This includes being vigilant so that where he or she reasonably feels that his or her rights are violated, he or she should claim them.

Those who don't claim their rights lose them because they are the ones who have the locus standi - a right of appearance in a court of justice, or before a legislative body, on a given question or issue when it comes to claiming

For the cases I have heard of, even after such

unfair termination of employment, the victims condoned it. There is a legal maxim which says "He who sleeps over his rights loses them". That is, only those who are vigilant against the abuse of their rights get court relief.

If there is any justification for dismissal or termination of employment, then it must be done in compliance with the Employment and Labour Relations Act (Chapter 366) and its Regulations, 2017. Section 37(1) of the Act states that: "It shall be unlawful for an employer to terminate the employment of an employee unfairly."

The law puts the burden of proof to the employer to show that the termination was fair or followed legal procedures and there is no section which states that the husband or wife may go to the employer to demand for the termination of employment of his or her spouse.

Today's legal maxim: "An action is not given to him [her] who is not injured."

Ambassador Mwapachu's autobiography: An extraordinary life lived

N Saturday, 12th of August 2023, Ambassador Juma Volter Mwapachu's autobiography A Journey was launched. It encompasses some of his major speeches and writings. I must confess my delight that Mwapachu documented his life story as I did once ask him in passing about the idea to which he sounded dismissive.

Not many will realise the extent to which Mwapachu has in some form or shape been a central pillar in Tanzania's development vision. Despite our earlier socialist dogma with its attendant problems, Mwapachu never shied away from projecting the possibilities for Tanzania with new contours of thinking.

An attempt to sum up his life reminded me of an autobiography written back in the 1980s by a colourful Zambian public figure, Vernon Mwaanga, titled An Extraordinary Life. The message behind the book was extraordinary such that Mwapachu's illustrious life could be summed up similarly.


How circumstances though in the country contributed to what some may view as a peripatetic past is not clear about the man whose original quest was to study history at Oxford University.

It is fair to say that the only pathway Mwapachu steered overtly clear of was the political, namely contesting for an electoral seat. This may have been contributed to by having an elder brother taking the political plunge after many years in public service. In my opinion, of the two, Harith Bakari Mwapachu had more of the cool mien suited for a political career.

That said, a very unique opportunity presented itself somehow that I'm sure Juma Mwapachu would have found irresistible. I dare say that the time Mwapachu came closest to the world of politics was during the second term of Benjamin Mkapa in the year 2000.

Someone can argue to the contrary that 2015 brought out the best political talent in him under Edward Lowassa. There is no question that he made a heavy emotional investment that well surpassed that of the candidacy of his

brother-in-law, Mark Bomani, in 1995. Mwapachu was so unabashed about Lowassa, resulting in his departure from CCM on the eve of Nyerere Day in 2015, only to troop back home less than a year later after feeling out of sorts. At the time of his departure, he did issue a very powerful statement that unfortunately is not mentioned in the book. The only upshot is that it was what



some Brits would call 'a moment of madness'. Back to 2000 and fortuitously Mwapachu was well-disposed towards Mkapa to the point of being posted as ambassador to France. The story goes that it was meant to be the United Kingdom only that a weekly newspaper at the time, RAI, spilled the beans thus contaminating the plot.

I can only imagine that with Mkapa's strong orientation towards international relations, a man like Juma Mwapachu could well have landed himself the role of chief diplomat on a particular understanding. As it were, he became the secretary-general of the EAC in 2006. And it was Mkapa who brought in constitutional amendments that enables the president to nominate up to 10 individuals to the National Assembly. So, Mwapachu doing a five-year term was doable and which would have, in my estimation, elevated considerably the stature of the ministry domestically and globally. We would have been talking of the topmost foreign minister Tanzania has ever had!

Looking more broadly at Mwapachu and his connection to the political affairs of Tanzania, to quote Jenerali Ulimwengu, who describes himself in the book as an independent Tanzanian thinker and writer, "the reader also gets a taste of the special relationship JV had with JK Nyerere, who treated him as a doting father would treat a son, no less."

It's abundantly clear that he was adored by several older people. For the purposes of this article, his umbilical cord to Nyerere was alltoo clear when the Justice Nyalaliled Commission was winding up its work in January 1992 and he was selected to be among five to visit Mwalimu Nyerere in Butiama for a highly important brief.

"I came to be told that Pius Msekwa, a senior member of the Commission and then deputy speaker, had advised the chairman that I should be included in the team because Mwalimu loved me and that I should be tasked to present the Commission's majority proposal that Tanzania should be transformed into three governments. Msekwa's argument was that Mwalimu would rudely 'throw us out of his compound' if the chairman or him presented the three-government proposal..."

Msekwa's wish came to pass and Mwapachu was given the unenviable task of informing Nyerere of their recommendation. Mwalimu's reaction was to tell Nyalali, "I do not support your recommendation and if CCM adopts your recommendation, I will move around the country to condemn the proposal. I may even quit CCM if I fail to convince the party. He stood up, took my left hand and said, 'Juma, let us go'...'

When I imagine the task bestowed on Mwapachu as Nyerere's blue-eyed boy, human nature would easily be flattered. Below the surface though, it was an ominous thing. I'm talking here of an abdication of duty by Mwapachu's seniors.

The chairman of the Commission, who was also the Chief Justice, was alarmingly spineless. A whole CI as Kenyans would put it, lacking the mettle! And following Nyerere's livid reaction, Nyalali was left with only a single option: to resign. Today we would be celebrating the man for his principles as happens in other states.

As a consequence then of Nyerere being vehemently against any change to the Union status

quo, attempts at a constitutional settlement of the Union continue to run into strong headwinds. Curiously though, Judge Warioba was quoted some years ago saying that Nyerere was not about a fixed mindset and that he would have come around the three-tier government structure just as he did on a multi-party system. I wish Mwapachu would have said something on this very significant matter concerning his 'second' father.

In closing, I can't fail to end without a special recognition of Mwapachu the public intellectual. Around 1993/94, Mwapachu had established a magazine called Change that was geared at getting to grips with wide-ranging issues affecting the nation.

It was a top-notch magazine that even aroused interest in overseas institutions. How it was allowed to die a natural death was a clear indicator of our slide to becoming an intellectual wasteland. Even the quarterly publication for lawyers eventually disappeared though I blame more laziness on the part of the 'learned friends'.

For the record, upon the death in 2014 of the chancellor of the University of Dar es Salaam, Ambassador Fulgence Kazaura, the name of Mwapachu kept ringing in my head as someone who was head and shoulders above the others to be considered. My dream never saw the light of day with the appointing authority clearly having his own idea by keeping it vacant for nearly two years and himself taking it up.

My recent depressing experience of a UDSM-hosted event on Nelson Mandela only left me embittered that Mwapachu couldn't offer more with his unmatched national and international record of intellectual rigour.

That is Mwapachu, our preeminent public intellectual. The chancellorship would have been the cherry on the cake. Very well done Ambassador Mwapachu on an extraordinary life lived as well as bequeathing the citizens your book that will serve for many generations to come as a treasure trove.

OMEN social activists recognize that gender equality is gaining ground in Chile, but maintain that there is still a long way to go to turn into reality the promises to "level the playing field" between women and men, while they highlight the importance of addressing the issue of

"We push feminism for the people, because we are looking at everything, not just women but the whole family, from a gender perspective," social activist Aída Moreno, a veteran weaver who founded the Huamachuco Women's House in 1989 in the municipality of Renca, northeast of Santiago, told IPS.

She argued that gender inequality is still "an open wound in Chile."

"The issue of care work, for example, is on the table, but nothing has been resolved yet. All we have is hope," said the 77-year-old campaigner for women's rights at her organization's offices.

Carolina Cartagena, 42, is the national secretary of the Asociación Yo Cuido an association of caregivers - based in the municipality of Villa Alemana, in the Valparaíso region, 131 kilometers north of the Chilean capital.

In an interview with IPS at the association's headquarters, she said, "There are many women caregivers whose mental health is already overwhelmed. We have extreme cases...and where does that leave the person being cared for, if his or her caregiver is not well mentally, economically and emotionally?" she asked.

The rights of caregivers emerged as a much more visible issue after left-wing President Gabriel Boric included them among the priorities of his social policy and instructed the respective ministries to mainstream the issue.

The first step was to open a registry of caregivers within the Social Registry of Households. Since 2022, the State has been providing accredited caregivers with a credential that for the time being provides them with facilities to speed up procedures in public services.

The Ministry of Social Development and Family estimates that in a first stage some 25,800 people will be registered in the national registry of caregivers. Their estimate is that there are 470,000 informal live-in caregivers, as they define people who live in the same household and take care of family members on an unpaid basis.

There are also 1.12 million Chileans who require a caregiver and a survey by the ministry found that 85 percent of caregivers are women.

Cartagena sees the registry as a step forward but said that "much remains to be done" for caregivers.

The activist believes that "the most urgent thing is a system of care that is ongoing and permanent. In many cases there are government programs, but they last three months and what do you do for the rest of the year?"

Cartagena was referring to a pilot project implemented so far only in a few municipalities such as Villa Alemana, which lasts three months and provides caregivers with medical assistance, therapies and rehabilitation. Her demand is for it to be made permanent and nationwide.

Yo Cuido brings together 800 families from five regions of this long narrow country wedged between the Andes Mountains and the Pacific Ocean: Metropolitan Santiago, in the center; O'Higgins and Valdivia, in the south; and Valparaíso and Coquimbo, in the north.

The association argues that caregiving is a responsibility that should be shared by the government and not just a responsibility of a family or a couple, as the State saves funds thanks to the work of caregivers.

Changing conditions

The overall living conditions of women in this South American country of 19.5 million people have changed over the last two or three generations, with advances in economic participation and educational levels.

The extension of pre- and post-natal leave and an increase in day care centers were followed by stiffer laws against femicides - gender-based killings - and the decriminalization of therapeutic abortion under three circumstances: fetal malformation, danger to the mother's life or rape.

But this last achievement is threatened today by the far-right Republican Party, which holds a majority in the council that aims to propose the text of a new constitution that voters will approve or reject in a plebiscite in De-

Sociologist Teresa Valdés, of the Gen-

Social activists demand real equality for Chilean women

der and Equity Observatory, told IPS that "gender gaps remain, as do conditions of discrimination, mainly related to machismo (sexism), harassment and the difficulty of getting ahead in the work-

She added that the experience of inequality varies greatly, depending on where the women live.

In Chile, 47.7 percent of households are headed by women, according to the government's 2022 National Socioeconomic Characterization Survey, and 58.7 percent of these live in poverty.

The latest National Time Use Survey, from 2015, showed that the hours dedicated to unpaid work in a typical day average 2.74 for these victims in the health-Chilean men and 5.89 for Chilean women.

Valdes also warned about the high rates of violence against women in the country, despite policies to promote gender parity.

"The latest prevalence survey says that two out of five women have experienced situations of intimate partner violence and these are higher numbers than before. We do not know if this is because there are more cases than before or because there is more sensitivity and recognition of the violence," said the sociologist.

And she complained that there is a lack of capacity in public programs to attend to

care or judicial systems.

"That is a huge debt owed to women, and we continue to see a significant number of femicides per year," Valdes said. In 2022 there were 43 gender-based murders of women in the country, according to the Ministry of Women and Gender Equity.

Huamachuco, a pillar of training and community ser-

The Huamachuco Women's House is a center for training and combating poverty and discrimination against women.

It began in 1989 as a soup kitchen for children and families. Then it became a center for training, especially traditional embroidery on burlap made from jute or hemp, whose handcrafted works are about to be exhibited in the presidential palace of La Moneda. Later it became a place to learn trades such as hairdressing or sewing.

It currently offers a wide range of workshops and courses including baking, jewelry making, therapeutic massage and a digital skills course provided by Mujeres Emplea, a United Nations employment training program led by UN Women.

But above all, it is a place of support for women who suffer various types of violence and who feel protected by their peers.

Moreno said that women

used to work the same amount or more than today and their work was not recognized. She added that now their work is more highly valued, but still "very insufficient-

"There are many gaps we have in terms of men who go out to work and come back home just to rest. He never lays awake at night thinking about what he is going to cook the next day, which is double work when there is no money," she said.

"Today we are placing value on women's work. I don't say price, although I could say it because if a man on his own had to pay for laundry services, food, etc., he wouldn't be able to afford it with what he earns," she said.

Moreno is also concerned about children and stressed that "preventing violence against them is a job that has no price."

The Huamachuco Women's House is now promoting a very important project: getting kids who have dropped out of basic education back into school, with follow-

"We work with children and families and aim to reinsert them in another school. We look for schools and provide them with support. In general, they are critical cases, of parents who are in prison or similar circumstances," she said.

Women caregivers plead for time off

"Recognition of caregiving is urgently needed because we women become poorer by staying at home and not being able to go out and work to improve our quality of life," Moreno said.

It is also a central demand of the Asociación Yo Cuido.

"My daughter, age five, has cerebral palsy," Cartagena said. "There are many moms with children on the autism spectrum. There are caregivers caring for two or three people. The problem is crosscutting and includes Alzheimer's. There are women who take care of their 90-year-old mothers."

And she regretted that there is no legislation to protect caregiv-

"We are fighting for a support and care system that is being promoted with participatory dialogues in different municipalities to learn about the needs of caregivers," she said.

"Never again alone" is the motto of the association, created in 2018, which defines itself as national, non-profit, social action and nonwelfare oriented in character.

"In many cases the person has been born with some type of disability or dependency. Their situation is precarious, they are vulnerable. And the State and society punish you for being in care. You are left without health care, unemployed, often without support or family co-responsibility," said Cartagena.

She added that many caregivers suffer from psychological and emotional deterioration, as well as poverty.

"A main objective of our association is to ensure the mental health rights of caregivers," she under-

She pointed out that caregiving work involves mainly women: 90 percent of the members of the association are women.

"We want centers to be opened where they can drop off the person they take care of, so they can have just a few hours off a day," she

This is the role of the day care center in Huamachuco that serves women who suffer physical, psychological or economic violence.

"Most of the mothers in these projects are single women who have no networks. And they have to go out to work leaving their children with other people," said Moreno.

UN Women rewarded the work of this day care center by donating another similar one, fully equipped, to be installed in another part of Renca.

The elderly activist said with pride that "the fruits are there for us to see because there are young people who are now professionals and who say well...if it hadn't been for this day care center I don't know what would have become of

ecosystem-based Adaptation for Resilience (EBARR) project is being implemented by the Vice President's Office in four districts on the Tanzania mainland, and one in Zanzibar.

Those districts include Kishapu (Shinyanga), Mvomero (Morogoro), Mpwapwa (Dodoma), Simanjiro (Manyara), and one in Zanzibar, Kaskazini "A" (Kaskazini Unguja).

The project aims to increase resilience to climate change in rural communities of Tanzania by strengthening ecosystem resilience and diversifying livelihoods, using an ecosystem-based adaptation approach. It is being executed in semi-arid areas that suffer frequent droughts and water shortages, and areas that are inhabited by herders, farmers, and fishermen who depend on these activities for their livelihoods.

Therefore, EBARR project seeks to support these communities to enhance their adaptive capacity and thus be able to withstand the effects of climate

Dr. James Nyarobi EBBAR National project coordinator says the activities implemented by the project are those that first facilitate availability and access to water for irrigation, livestock, and domestic use.

Dr. Nyarobi says: 'We have drilled about 14 boreholes in all of the project areas. In Mpwapwa district, we have drilled four (4) boreholes, two (2) boreholes in Mvomero district; two (2) in Simanjiro district; and in Kaskazini 'A' district, Unguja, we have drilled six (6) boreholes and all these boreholes are now functioning and supporting about 25,000 members of the community.'

'The goal is to ensure that we solve the challenge of water scarcity in the project areas.' Dr. Nyarobi adds.

In all the project areas with water, boreholes are also used for both domestic purposes and horticultural production. The project has constructed screenhouses as demonstration sites (also known as farmer field schools) to show/teach farmers water efficient

farming techniques. This enables the farmer groups that benefit from the project to learn how to grow and produce vegetables with minimum water use throughout the year.

Having one borehole in the area, according to Dr. Nyarobi, it can be used for a variety of activities. They

can do small-scale irrigation activities, grow crops such as vegetables throughout the year, use the water for domestic purposes and build water troughsfor their livestock.

Aziz Biiru, the EBARR project coordinator in the Mpwapwa District Council, claims that the project's

beneficiaries have now solved the problem of carrying water over a long distance, and that training in vegetable farming in the screenhouses built on the edge of the wells, has greatly improved their understanding and awareness of/on vegetable farming and as a result improved household income.

Funded by Global Environmental Facility (GEF), this project started in 2018/2019, and is expected to end in 2024. In implementing this project, the Vice President's Office collaborates with the United Nations Environment Program (UNEP).

Senegal: Democracy in the balance?

IVIC space is deteriorating in Senegal ahead of next February's presidential election. Recent protests have been met with lethal violence and internet and social media restrictions. Senegal's democracy will soon face a key test, and whether it passes will depend largely on whether civic space is respected.

Political conflict

Recent protests have revolved around the populist opposition politician Ousmane Sonko. Sonko came third in the 2019 presidential election and has grown to be the biggest thorn in President Macky Sall's side. He's won support from many young people who see the political elite as corrupt, out of touch and unwilling to tackle major social and economic problems such as the country's high youth unemployment. He's also been the subject of a recent criminal conviction that his supporters insist is politically motivated.

On 1 June, Sonko was sentenced to two years in jail for 'corrupting youth'. This resulted from his arrest on rape charges in March 2021. Although he was cleared of the most serious charges - something women's rights advocates have expressed concern about his conviction likely makes him ineligible to stand in the next presidential election.

Sonko's arrest in March 2021 triggered protests in which 14 people died. His conviction set off a second wave of protests. Sonko was arrested again on 28 July on protest-related charges, including insurrection. A few days later, the government dissolved his party, Pastef. It's the first such ban since Senegal achieved independence in 1960.

All of this gave fresh impetus to Sonko's supporters, who accuse the government of instrumentalising the judiciary and criminal justice system to stop a credible political threat.

Repressive reaction

The latest wave of protests saw instances of violence, including stone-throwing, tyre burning and looting. The state responded

with lethal force. According to civil society estimates, since March 2021 over 30 people have been killed, more than 600 injured and over 700 detained.

In response to the recent protests, the army was deployed in the capital, Dakar. Live ammunition was used and armed people dressed in civilian clothes, evidently embedded with security forces, violently attacked protesters.

Journalists were harassed and arrested while covering protests. Recent years have seen a rise in verbal and physical attacks on journalists, along with legal action to try to silence them. Several journalists were arrested in relation to their reporting on Sonko's prosecution. Investigative journalist Pape Alé Niang has been jailed three times in less than one year.

The constitution appeared to be clear on the two-term limit, but Sall's supporters claimed constitutional amendments in 2016 had reset the count. Thousands mobilised in Dakar on 12 May, organised by a coalition of over 170 civil society groups and opposition parties, to demand that Sall respect the two-term

Third-term tussle

On 3 July, Sall finally announced that he wasn't running again. But it hasn't ended suspicion that the ruling Alliance for the Republic (APR) party will go to any lengths stay in power, including using the state's levers to weaken the opposition.

There's precedent here: ahead of the Sall's re-election in 2019, two prominent opposition politicians who might have presented a serious challenge were excluded. In both cases, barely weeks before the election the Constitutional Council ruled them ineligible due to prior convictions on corruption charges that were widely believed to have been politically motivated.

That Sonko and Pastef might have stood a chance in 2024 was suggested by the results of votes in

2022. In local elections, the APR lost control of Dakar and Sonko was elected mayor of Ziguinchor city. And then in parliamentary elections, the APR lost 43 of its 125 seats and Pastef finished second, claiming 56 seats, leaving no party with a majority.

Reputation on the line

Senegal long enjoyed an international reputation for being a relatively stable and democratic country in a region that's experienced numerous democratic setbacks. With West African countries such as Burkina Faso, Guinea, Mali and now Niger under military control, and others like Togo holding deeply flawed elections, Senegal stood out. It's held several free elections with changes of power.


The country's active and youthful civil society and relatively free media have played a huge part in sustaining democracy. When President Abdoulaye Wade sought an unconstitutional third term in 2012, social movements mobilised. The Y'en a marre ('I'm fed up') movement got out the youth vote to oust Wade in favour of Sall. Wade himself rode a similar youth wave in 2000. So Sall and his party are surely aware of the power of social movements and the youth vote.

A small step forward was taken recently when parliament voted to allow the two opposition candidates who'd been blocked in 2019 to stand in 2024. But the government needs to do much more to show its commitment to democratic rules.

protest Upholding rights would be a good start. The repeated use of violence and detention of protesters points to a systemic problem. No one has been held to account for killings and other rights violations. It's high time for accountability.

Media freedoms need to be respected and people detained for exercising their civic freedoms must be released. For Senegal to live up to its reputation, Sall should strive to enter history as the president who kept democracy alive - not the one who buried it.



he Zanzibar's current account registered a deficit of US\$384 million during the year ending June 2023, compared with a deficit of US\$280.9 million in the corresponding period in 2022.

The Bank of Tanzania (BoT) monthly economic review for July says the widening of the current account deficit was largely explained by an increase in import bills that outweighed the growth in exports.

The import bill increased to US\$593.5 million in the year ending June 2023 from US\$459.9 million in the year ending June 2022, with both goods imports and services payments recording growth.

The increase in the goods import bill was mostly driven by refined white petroleum imports, and machinery and mechanical applied imports that largely reflect on-going construction activities.

The central bank report shows the value of fuel and lubricants imports increased by 81.5 percent to US\$194.5 million during the year ended in June, compared to US\$107.2 million recorded during the

The value of imported machinery and mechanical appliances more than doubled to US\$27.3 million during the year ending June 2023, compared with US\$12.2 million recorded

On a monthly basis, the import bill increased to US\$46.3 million in June 2023 from US\$ 43 million in June 2022.

Services receipts recorded an annual growth of 75.3 percent to US\$137.3 million, largely driven by tourism-related activities following an increase in tourist arrivals.

Global coal demand to reach 8.39m tonnes

NEW DELHI

The global coal demand will reach 8.39 million tons this year, up slightly from last year's all-time high, according to the International Energy Agency (IEA) estimates.

Three out of every 4 tons of coal will be consumed in China, India, and Southeast Asia.

China alone is expected to account for 56 percent of global consumption.

"As Europe cuts down on its coal-fired power generation to be in line with its green energy transition, China and India have continued to add further capacity

at levels that far exceed the current pace of power plant

retirements," said ship brokerage SSY on Monday.

SSY noted that 86 percent of Chinese coal plants are less than 20 years old, and 52 percent are 10-20 years old.

"Considering that the average lifetime of a coal power plant is 40 years, a full capacity phaseout like the one targeted by Europe is unlikely to be replicated," said SSY. On the supply front, the IEA expects global coal production to reach a new high this year, topping last

year's record of 8.63 million tons, with China, India and

Indonesia accounting for over 70 percent of the total. According to BRS, rising domestic production in India reduced that country's coal imports by 7 percent year-

on-year in January to July, to 134 million tons.

BRS said the drop mostly affected demand for Indonesian coal aboard Capesize bulkers (vessels with capacity of around 180,000 deadweight tons or DWT).

In contrast, this year's high Chinese domestic production is being complemented by higher imports, a plus for dry bulk shipping.

China imported 211.8 million tons of coal in the first seven months of 2023, a 77percent surge from the same period last year, said BRS. Indonesia has been China's biggest seaborne supplier, followed by Russia and

US exports higher share of production

The US was once the world's largest coal producer but

has fallen down the ranks. Current production is less than half the 2008 peak.

Even so, America's exports are now on the rise.

Weaker domestic demand (due to environmental regulations and cheap natural gas) leaves more production to sell overseas.

The US Energy Information Administration (EIA) predicts that the US will export 90 million tons of coal this year, up 16 percent versus 2022. Exports are projected to rise further, to 94 million tons, in 2024.

The EIA expects 22 percent of US production to be exported next year. In 2008, when US coal output peaked, only 7 percent of production was exported.

Managing performance in hybrid working environment

he recent global pandemic accelerated the shift towards remote work for many organisations which has prompted business managers across sectors to deliberately think about how to measure performance in an environment where the employees are working either remotely with limited time of physical presence at the office, a self-choice between remote and office working, or on rotational basis between homes and office.

Several employee opinion surveys conducted in the past two years indicates that majority of the employees are reluctant to return to the office on a full-time arrangement. Many prefer a hybrid work model. With this model, employees have the freedom to choose where they get their best work done, whether that's in the office, at home or a combination of the two.

Some organisations have gone ahead with updating their policies and procedures to embed a hybrid workplace model. Other organisations have opted to establish predefined schedules coordinated by business unit managers, whereby there are specific days an employee is expected to work remotely, and days required to be physically present in the office. This change has necessitated a dialogue to rethink on how to fairly measure an employee's performance in a hybrid work model.

As organisations move to a hybrid work model, a higher degree of trust between managers and their teams is required with a change of performance monitoring. Some of the approaches for considerations for a hybrid work model includes:

• Set clear expectations: Employees and the managers need to have a precise and shared understanding of the exact

results expected to be achieved and expected timelines. Hence performance objectives need to be crystal clear. This clarity is mostly important for employees who have limited face to face interaction with their managers and team members, to foster strong alignment to each other and work being done together as a team, contrary it can leave them feeling detached from their managers and teams and the work they are doing together.

- Employee self-evaluations: An employee self-evaluation is essential for the manager to understand employees' strengths areas and opportunities for improvement that might not otherwise be known by management due to limited face to face interactions.
- Regular performance feedback: Employees working in a hybrid environment benefits from frequent updates on their performance, instead of waiting for midyear and annual performance reviews. A consideration for a monthly feedback session will enable both the organisation and the employees to track performance improvements and identify areas that needs more attention and guidance. The notes from the monthly performance check in sessions can be used as reference points during the performance
- Address systemic challenges: Remote working environment may be associated with various challenges that could impact performance in unpredictable ways. These challenges may vary from connectivity to resources availability. It is essential for the organisation to identify the common challenges from the engagement with the employees and provide



the necessary support so that work performance is not affected.

- Provide equal opportunities 'As usually stated, 'out of sight- out of mind', managers may tend to forget the employees working remotely, especially in a scenario where there are multiple resources at the same job level. Managers should educate all team members in the organisation on best ways to collaborate with remote co-workers so that the hybrid teams become visible and practical by ensuring, that opportunities are provided to all employees depending on the nature of the organisation' business model.
- v Appreciate where it is due. In hybrid workforce model, employees work-

for their hard work where it is due. For example, a remote worker may conduct research and prepare a presentation and another employee working in the office delivers it to the intended audience. It is more likely all praises for the good work will go to the presenter. It is the role of the leader to keep note of everyone's contribution so that a note of appreciation is provided to all team members based on their level of contributions.

Deploy a 360-feedback approach. With limited interactions between employees and managers, a hybrid working model will benefit with 360 feedback approach, whereby the manager seeks and receive feedback from colleagues, juniors, other managers, and clients (where feasible) on the performance and conducts of the employee in relation to the work performed. Such feedback will enable the reviewer to have supplementary information during performance evalu-

ation, which minimises bias of rating an

employee, relying on the limited engage-

ments during the performance year.

Evaluate performance fairly. Lastly, it is important to avoid inequalities in the way performance reviews are conducted and delivered. Where possible, a leader should consider conducting a face-to-face appraisal to all employees, and if not feasible, a consideration for video call to each employee to be de-

ployed.

When effectively deployed, a hybrid working model is essential in managing performance due to the convenience it promotes to both employees and organisations. Some

ing remotely may sometimes loose credit of the notable benefits includes flexibility and comfort, the choice for the employees to work where they are most comfortable and productive; and improves work-life balance. Other critical benefits for this model in view of performance is on setting a foundation for a dispersed workforce within an organisation, with a flexibility of hiring the best talents without the need to have them in a specific geographical location.

Furthermore, the model is essential in spearheading talent attraction and retention initiatives, most especially for the millennials and generation z, whom according to various employees opinion surveys conducted, suggest for a flex arrangement between remote working and being physically present in the office.

Considerations:

In a hybrid working model, hours worked by an employee should not carry weight in managing performance, as the focus is not about the time the employees spend at work, rather it's what they are doing with that time that matters most, in alignment with expected levels of productivity and results.

To effectively manage performance in a hybrid working model, organisations have to invest in systems to enable continuous flow of communication and accessibility of organisations information resources in remote working. Such investment should include automation of the performance management system for ease of tracking and documentation of performance progress, seeking feedback and appraisals.

China is expected to make the biggest cuts this year to two of its core lending rates, as pressure mounts on policymakers and banks to reverse a trend of slowing momentum and revive flagging demand in the world's second-biggest economy.

The People's Bank of China is set to announce reductions to both one-year and five-year loan prime rates, which affect borrowing costs for businesses and households, at a monthly meeting on Monday, after making a surprise cut to its closely related medium-term financing rate last

Policymakers in Beijing have struggled to counter a host of challenges since lifting pandemic restrictions at the start of the year, including a property sector slowdown, weaker exports, record youth unemployment and price deflation as consumer confidence

The majority of economists polled by Bloomberg expect the one-year LPR, which underpins mortgage lending, to be cut by 15 basis points, the largest margin

since January 2022. A similar cut to the five-year rate would be the biggest in a year. The LPR rates are currently 3.55 and 4.2 per cent, respectively.

The polled economists were unanimous in anticipating a cut to the LPR, which typically follows a reduction in the mediumterm lending facility. The MLF rate, which manages banking sector liquidity, is now 2.5 per cent, the lowest since it was launched in 2014 after last week's cut.

months of disappointing economic data, with consumer prices slipping into deflationary territory in July and growth of just 0.8 per cent in the second quarter against the previous three months. But missed bond payments

from real estate developer Country Garden and on savings products linked to investment conglomerate Zhongzhi this month have increased alarm among ob-

"We believe the risk of systemic concerns emerging in China remains low, though spread[s] will likely remain volatile until the macro volatility subsides," Goldman Sachs analysts wrote on Saturday. This, they added, "may require a more concerted easing effort by China policymakers".

On Friday evening, China's securities regulator announced a series of reforms designed to boost investment in its capital markets, including encouraging share buybacks to stabilise prices and cutting transaction fees for brokers, while the central bank has stepped up its defence of the

biggest banks, which are set to release financial reports for the second quarter this month. The oneyear LPR, which was cut in June by 10 basis points, is being closely watched because of its relationship to mortgage borrowing costs.

Analysts at Nomura projected further cuts to the one-year LPR to 2.35 per cent by the end of the year, while the MLF would be reduced by 15 basis points to 2.35 per cent.

"However, the real issue for the current growth downturn is low credit demand, rather than insufficient supply of loanable funds," they wrote. "At some point in time Beijing might be compelled to take more measures to stem the downward spiral."

China's real estate sector, which typically drives more than a quarter of economic activity, has been paralysed by a liquidity crisis over the past two years following the 2021 default of Evergrande, the world's most indebted property developer. Last week, Evergrande filed for bankruptcy protection in the US as part of a prolonged restructuring process.

BRICS sets to expand, internationalise RMB

The 15th BRICS summit will take place in Johannesburg, South Africa, from 22 - 24 August 2023. As things stand, four of the five BRICS heads of state will attend the gath-

The exception is Russian President Putin, who agreed not to attend in person because of the ICC arrest warrant issued against him: the South African government is legally obligated to comply with that warrant given its ratification in domestic law of the ICC's Rome Statute.

President Putin's nonattendance (at least physically) has reduced the intensity of the global focus on the summit, and certainly diminished some of its pressing risks for SA authorities.

That said, the summit still offers the potential for some substantive agreements, and the symbolic broadening of collaboration within the Global South that is a critical component of the multipolar environment that is gradually replacing US-led unipolarity in global affairs (we commented on this shift in some detail here).

In this note, we discuss the summit's geopolitical relevance, as well as what we expect to be its two apex themes - BRICS expansion, and the potential deepening of trade and investment in BRICS currencies, particularly the renminbi. Of these themes, we dwell extensively on China's ongoing push to internationalize the RMB, a pursuit that Beijing believes can be aided by the BRICS grouping.

A rise in relevance given broader geopolitical shifts. To be sure, the current geopolitical context, epitomized in the main by the war in Ukraine

By Jeremy Stevens & and rising US-China tensions, imbues the BRICS as a group with greater potential relevance. Indeed, as argued here, the BRICS has the potential to evolve to become "a counterpart to the G7 in world affairs, resulting in a profound impact on international relations". As we emphasise in this note, for Beijing specifically the summit (and the BRICS grouping as a whole) holds clear meaning within the context of China's New Era (which we discussed here).

expansion. **BRICS** There is a spirited push, mostly by China, for the BRICS group to be expanded at the upcoming summit. In all, around 40 countries (including Saudi Arabia, the UAE, Mexico, and Iran) have applied for, or expressed an interest, in joining the BRICS. Such expansion however faces resistance from some BRICS members, particularly India and Brazil, who fear the dilution of their influence and an increase in China's capacity to use an expanded BRICS to elevate its global clout. We expect the framework, or criteria, for BRICS expansion to be discussed, and potentially agreed on, at the upcoming summit but not for new members to be officially welcomed into the group.

local currency settlement. In our view, the conversation around the creation of a BRICS currency is a sidenote to the real topic, which is the expanded use of the Chinese RMB in BRICS commercial exchanges. As we discuss in detail in this report, China is keen to push for change in the international monetary system and eager to expand the geographical reach of the RMB. This objective is uncontested amongst the BRICS.

Summit set to bolster BRICS cooperation

BEIJING/NAIROBI

THE upcoming 15th BRICS Summit, to be hosted by South Africa, will present key opportunities to boost dialogue and cooperation between the five major emerging economies and other developing nations, and enhance solidarity between China and Africa, officials and analysts have said.

Their remarks came as the Foreign Ministry announced on Friday that President Xi Jinping will attend the Johannesburg Summit and pay a state visit to South Africa from Monday to Thursday, at the invitation of South African President Cyril Ramaphosa.

Xi and Ramaphosa will also co-chair the China-Africa Leaders' Dialogue in South Africa, said ministry spokeswoman Hua Chunying.

The summit of the grouping, which also includes Brazil, India and Russia, has given rise to high expectations as it will be the first BRICS Summit to be hosted in person since the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Leaders from the five countries are expected to exchange views on prominent challenges in the international

and cooperation in international affairs, as they seek to inject stability and positive energy into a world fraught with changes and chaos, Foreign Ministry spokesman Wang Wenbin said on Fri-

The leaders will convey clear-cut messages on upholding multilateralism and focusing on common development, he

Xi's visit to South Africa, his second in the past five years, comes as the two nations mark the 25th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relations. The leaders of China and South Africa will jointly draw a blueprint for developing bilateral ties, Wang said.

The China-Africa Leaders' Dialogue will bring together the African co-chair of the Forum on China-Africa Cooperation, the rotating chairperson of the African Union and representatives of African subregional organizations.

According to the ministry, China's new direct investment in Africa reached \$1.82 billion in the first half of this year, a year-on-year increase of 4.4 percent. There are now over 3,000 Chinese companies conducting business in Africa.

Li Wentao, executive director and relandscape, and enhance coordination searcher at the Institute of African Stud-

ies at the China Institutes of Contemporary International Relations, said the in-person gathering of BRICS leaders will help boost the solidarity of the grouping and better drive cooperation among member countries.

"There are now increasingly high expectations for China to play a more important role in the global response to various crises, offering the world greater certainty," he said.

One of the most important issues to be discussed at the summit, Li said, will be the expansion of BRICS. According to South African Foreign Minister Naledi Pandor, 23 countries, including Saudi Arabia, Iran, the United Arab Emirates, Argentina, Indonesia, Egypt and Ethiopia, have had formally applied to become new BRICS members, as of Aug 7.

The expansion of the grouping will demonstrate the open and inclusive nature of BRICS cooperation, Li said.

"It would showcase that BRICS, instead of serving as a geopolitical tool, has become a key platform of shared growth and benefits for developing countries and the Global South," he

Li highlighted the role of BRICS in

leading the way for reforming global governance, championing the interests of the Global South and enabling greater voices for the developing world in the global economic order.

"Closer collaboration between Beijing and Pretoria will help South Africa address some of the most acute issues troubling its growth, such as power shortages and unemployment issues."

China has been the largest trading partner of South Africa for 13 consecutive years, and bilateral trade grew by 5 percent year-on-year to \$56.74 billion in 2022, according to the Foreign Ministry.

Dennis Munene, executive director of the China-Africa Center at the Africa Policy Institute, said Xi's attendance at the Johannesburg summit would demonstrate "Beijing's confidence and commitment in advancing Sino-African comprehensive and strategic cooperation".

"For more than seven decades, China has always valued Africa as a key partner in advancing strategic dialogue and cooperation with a broader vision of promoting South-South cooperation for common development and prosperity," he said. Xinhua

India hands over maritime surveillance aircraft Dornier to Sri Lanka

NEW DELHI

TO strengthen the relationship, India handed over a substitute Dornier maritime surveillance aircraft to Sri Lanka in a ceremonial event on Wednesday.

Dornier-228 maritime surveillance aircraft was handed over to be used by the Sri Lanka Air Force at an event held in Katunayake, reported Daily Mirror.

The aircraft was handed over by High Commissioner to the Chief of Staff and Senior Advisor to the President celebrating 77th Independence Day.

Taking to the social media account, X (formerly known as Twitter), Indian High Commission in Sri Lanka said, "#IN successor Dornier handed over by High Commissioner to Mr Sagala Ratnayaka, the Chief of Staff and Senior Adviser to the President in a solemn ceremonial event today, commemorating #IndiaAt77 and the strong relationship."

Last year, in a bid to strengthen the maritime security of the island nation, India gifted a Dornier Maritime Reconnaissance aircraft to Sri Lanka at a special event held in Sri Lanka Air Force Base, Katunayake.

Gifting of Dornier aircraft underscores the cooperation between the two maritime neighbours in the defence and security spheres. Such cooperation is envisaged to add further capability and capacity to Sri Lanka and is in line with the vision of Security and Growth for All in the Region (SAGAR).

Wishing India on its 77th Independence Day, Sri Lanka's Foreign Minister Ali Sabry on Tuesday said, he is confident that bilateral ties will be "further strengthened" between the two nations.

"Warm Greetings, Foreign Minister @DrSJaishankar and the Government & people of #India on the occasion of your Independence Day. I am confident that in the years ahead our bilateral ties will be further strengthened between our two nations India and Sri Lanka," Sabry said on the social media account, X (formerly known as Twitter).

Lavrov: West not willing to negotiate with Russia

RUSSIAN Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov said on Saturday that the West is not interested in negotiating with Moscow on the issue of Ukraine.

The West held multilateral meetings on Ukraine in Jeddah and Copenhagen without inviting Russia, hoping to persuade developing countries to back the Ukrainian president's peace plan, said Lavrov in an interview with the International Affairs magazine, adding that Moscow's vital interests were ignored.

Russia had always been ready for substantive dialogue and had tried for years to make Kiev implement the Minsk agreements, which were aimed at resolving the conflict in eastern Ukraine, he said.

Russia had responded to Ukraine's proposal to start negotiations from the first days of the Special Military Operation, but the talks were halted by Ukraine under Western pressure in 2022, he said.

Later that year, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky banned any negotiations with the Russian leadership by de-

The top Russian diplomat said the West sponsors constantly pushed Ukraine to escalate the situation, and that there was no prospect for negotiations between Russia and the West on Ukraine at the moment.

Russia considered the Western calls for negotiations as a tactical trick to buy time and give a respite to the exhausted Ukrainian troops, said Lavrov. **Agencies**

W. African bloc: 'D-Day' set for possible Niger intervention

WEST Africa's main regional bloc on Friday said it had agreed an undisclosed "D-Day" for a possible military intervention to restore democracy in Niger if diplomatic efforts fail, stressing that it would not hold endless dialogue with the defiant junta.

The comments came at the end of a two-day meeting of West African army chiefs in Ghana's capital Accra, where they have been hashing out the logistics and strategy for a possible use of force in Niger. The Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) has said such action would be a last resort.

Study reveals new pathway for HIV invasion of cell nucleus

DRESDEN

AS a result of the researchers' discovery of three proteins required for the virus to carry out its invasion, they have created compounds (possible medications) that can target one of the proteins, possibly opening the door to brand-new AIDS treatments.

"We have revealed a protein pathway that appears to have a direct impact on

diseases, which opens up a new area for potential drug development," says the study's senior author Aurelio Lorico, MD PhD, Professor of Pathology and interim Chief Research Officer at Touro University Nevada College of Osteopathic Medicine.

In order for the viral components to be integrated into the DNA of the healthy cell during HIV infection, the virus must enter the cell and obtain ac-

cess to the well guarded nucleus. But it's unclear how the viruses get past the barrier, and this is a hotly contested topic.

The newly identified pathway begins with HIV entering a cell wrapped inside a membrane package, called an endosome. The virus-containing endosome then pushes the protective nuclear membrane inward, forming an indentation known as a nuclear invagination. The endosome then moves inside the invagination to its inner tip, where the virus then slips into the nucleus.

The study found that three proteins were critical to the invasion: One protein (Rab7) is located on the membrane of the endosome, the second (VAP-A) is on the nuclear membrane where the invagination occurs, and the third (ORP3) connects the first two proteins together.

Russia appreciates India, Global South for promoting 'realistic' solutions to resolve Ukraine conflict

MOSCOW

RUSSIAN Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov lauded India and other global south countries for promoting "fair and realistic" settlement solutions for the ongoing Ukraine conflict.

He said that the proposals by the developing world are based on the understanding of the true causes and nature of ongoing developments.

"We appreciate China, Brazil, South Africa, Egypt, India and other Global South countries' sincere interest in promoting the quest for fair and realistic settlement avenues," Lavrov said while addressing the 11th Moscow Conference on International Security on Tuesday (local time).

"President Vladimir Putin and our country's leadership have repeatedly spoken about this," he said according to a statement released by the Russian Foreign Ministry.

"It is critically important that the proposals coming from our friends in the developing world are based on a clear understanding of the true causes and nature of ongoing developments as fallout from the West's efforts to undermine the principle of indivisibility and security," Lavrov said.

At the conference, Lavrov ac-

cused the US of undermining the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation (NPT-Treaty) of Nuclear Weapons through its support of Ukrainian forces in its conflict with Russia.

"The United States has ditched a number of key arms control and non-proliferation agreements. It is also feared that now it is ready to impinge upon the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons, one of the core elements of the global security architecture," he said.

The minister claimed that attempts to exclude the AUKUS military bloc from the Treaty on the NPT could jeopardize the agreement's existence, according to the statement.

Lavrov stated that Western geopolitical engineers are directly provoking crises in various parts of the world.

"Building up their military presence near the Russian borders, the NATO members ignored for many years their promises to the Soviet leaders on the non-expansion of the alliance. They were crudely violating their commitments, assumed at the top level in the Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe (OSCE), to observe the principle of equal and indivisible security, not to enhance their own security at the expense of others and to prevent imously approved UN Security

the domination of any party or organisation in Europe. The OSCE signed these commitments in Istanbul in 1999 and in Astana in 2010," he said at the conference.

Lavrov also stated that the "collective West," allegedly to "save" the neo-Nazi Ukraine regime, has launched a hybrid aggression against Russia, one pursued in the military, political, legal, economic, and humanitarian spheres.

Citing numerous facts, he claimed that the Anglo-Saxons and their underlings spent years preparing the Ukraine regime for war by pouring weapons into the country and sabotaging the unanCouncil resolution on a peaceful settlement that took into consideration the legitimate interests of the residents of Donbas.

"On the contrary, the West tacitly and even approvingly looked on as the putschist-founded Kyiv regime passed laws banning Russian in the fields of education and culture, media and everyday life," the minister added.

At the conference, Lavrov expressed his gratitude to participants attending the event and said that despite Western countries' efforts, many nations came to participate, as per the statement.

Study discovers improved survival for incurable brain tumours

FOR the first time, researchers discovered a potential drug candidate that improved outcomes for patients suffering from a type of childhood brain tumour that has no effective treatment. When compared to previous patients, the compound, called ONC201, nearly doubled survival for patients with diffuse midline glioma (DMG) or diffuse intrinsic pontine glioma (DIPG).

The findings are reported by an international team of researcher led by the University of Michigan Health Rogel Cancer Center and the Chad Carr Pediatric Brain

In addition to reporting on the results of two early stage clinical trials, the paper reveals the underlying mechanisms behind the compound's success in these tumors. The paper is published in Cancer Discovery, a journal of the American Association for Cancer Research.

Diffuse midline gliomas including DIPG with a mutation called H3K27M are particularly aggressive, with an overall survival rate of 11-15 months. These tumors are most frequently found in children and young adults. The only available treatment is radiation, and even that is difficult as the tumors are located amid brain regions with critical functions.

"It's an incredibly difficult tumor to treat," said senior author Carl Koschmann, M.D., associate professor of pediatric neuro-oncology and clinical scientific director of the Chad Carr Pediatric Brain Tumor Center at Michigan Medicine. "Prior to this study, there have been more than 250 clinical trials that have not been able to improve outcomes. This is a major crack in the armor."

In two clinical trials testing ONC201 in a total of 71 patients with H3K27M-mutated diffuse midline gliomas, the median overall survival was nearly 22 months for tumors that had not recurred at the time of enrollment. Almost a third of the patients lived longer than two years.

ONC201 took an unusual path to a clinical trial. Initially designed to target dopamine receptors, which are upregulated in many different tumors, researchers saw that the drug passes the blood-brain barrier, one of the biggest challenges to designing drugs for brain tumors. Initial trials in glioblastoma were not successful, but a small number of patients with DMG that carried the H3K27M mutation had more promising results. Without understanding why it worked better in these patients, a phase 1 trial was started in children and young adults with H3K27M-

Meanwhile, Koschmann and co-author Sriram Venneti, M.D., Ph.D., were trying to figure out what was happening in these tumor cells. Through the trial, they collected cerebrospinal fluid from patients. They used this fluid to analyze metabolic changes and found ONC201 got into the tumor cells and affected mitochondria. Patients who responded to the drug had an increase in a metabolite called L-2HG produced by tumor cells.

Koschmann called the finding "very much unexpected." The team found that increased L-2HG reversed tumor defining epigenetic signals causing tumor cells to differentiate more and divide less. The longer patients were on ONC201, the more tumors exhibited these epigenetic reversals. ANI

PM: Sweden thwarts several terrorist attempts

STO CKHOLM

- SWEDISH Prime Minister Ulf Kristersson said on Thursday that the government had thwarted several terrorist attacks.

"We know that planned acts of terrorism have been hindered," Kristersson said at a press conference, hours after the Swedish Secret Service's decision to raise the terrorist threat level from "elevated" to "high".

Addressing the same press conference, Minister for Justice Gunnar Strommer said: "During spring, several people were arrested in Sweden and abroad suspected of having prepared attacks in Sweden."

Strommer did not comment further on these arrests, but Swedish Television (SVT) reported that there were at least two known cases.

In April, five men were arrested in coordinated dawn raids in three Swedish cities. Four of them were later detained on suspicion of planning attacks triggered by the burning of the Quran, SVT reported.

Also in April, two men suspected of planning an attack on a church in Sweden were arrested by police in Germany, SVT reported.

In one of the locations raided by German police, chemicals and fertilizers that can be used for manufacturing explosives were found, SVT said, citing German newspaper Die Welt.

Sweden and Denmark have been in the spotlight in recent weeks after several extremists repeatedly burned or desecrated the Quran in the two countries' capi-

Palestine rejects Israel's further settlement in West Bank

PALESTINIAN authorities on Friday rejected the Israeli government's plan to allocate \$190 million fund to deepen settlement construction in the West Bank by financing random outposts.

The Palestinian Foreign Ministry said that the right-wing Israeli government "is racing against time to steal more land to accelerate the undeclared gradual annexation of the West Bank, including East Jerusalem," in response to the plan raised by Israeli Finance Minister Bezalel Smotrich.

"We live the echo of the expansionist colonial Israeli policy every day amid an escalation of violations and crimes of the occupation authorities and settlers, which is a practical translation of the Israeli government's decisions," the ministry said in a state-It held the Israeli government "fully and directly responsible for its settlement build-

ing and expansion decisions and their results on the conflict arena and on the entire

More than 600,000 Israeli settlers live in the West Bank and East Jerusalem, according to official Palestinian figures.

Israel occupied the West Bank in 1967 and has since established settlements there,

which are considered violations of international law.

British nurse found guilty of murdering seven newborn babies

LONDON

A British nurse who described herself as a "horrible evil person" was found guilty on Friday of murdering seven newborn babies and trying to kill another six in the neonatal unit of a hospital in northwest England where she worked.

Lucy Letby, 33, was convicted of killing five baby boys and two baby girls at the Countess of Chester hospital and attacking other newborns, often while working night shifts, in 2015 and

The verdict, following a harrowing 10-month trial at Manchester Crown Court, makes Letby Britain's most prolific serial child killer in modern history, local media said.

She was found not guilty of two attempted murders while the jury, who spent 110 hours deliberating, were unable to agree on six other suspected attacks.

"We are heartbroken, devastated, angry and feel numb, we may never truly know why this happened," the families of Letby's victims said in a statement.

Prosecutors told the jury Letby poisoned some of her infant victims by injecting them with insulin, while others were injected with air or force fed milk, sometimes involving multiple attacks before they died.

"I killed them on purpose because I'm not good enough to care for them," said a handwritten note found by police officers who searched her home after she was arrested. "I am a horrible evil person," she wrote. "I AM EVIL I DID THIS".

Some of those she attacked were twins - in one case she murdered both siblings, in two instances she killed one but failed in her attempts to murder tried on four occasions to murder

The youngest victim was just oneday old.

'Malevolent presence'

Letby will be sentenced on Monday and faces a lengthy prison term, possibly a rare full life sentence.

Her actions came to light when senior doctors became concerned at the number of unexplained deaths and collapses at the neonatal unit, where premature or sick babies are treated, over 18 months from January

With doctors unable to find a medical reason, police were called in. After a lengthy investigation, Letby, who had been involved in the care of the babies, was pinpointed as the "constant malevolent presence when things took a turn for the worse", said prosecutor Nick Johnson.

Pictures of Letby on social media portrayed a happy and smiling woman with a busy social life, and in one photo she was seen cradling a baby. But, during months of often distressing evidence, her trial heard she was a determined killer.

The jury was told how Letby had

one baby girl before she finally succeeded. When another of the victim's mothers walked in on her attacking twin babies, she said: "Trust me, I'm a nurse"

At her home after her arrest, detectives found paperwork and medical notes with references to the children involved in the case. She had also carried out social media searches for the parents and families of the murdered babies. Letby wept when she gave evidence over 14 days, saying she had never tried to hurt the babies and had only ever wanted to care for them, blaming unsafe staffing levels on the ward and its dirty conditions.

She also claimed four doctors had conspired to pin the blame on her for the unit's failings and had written the "I am evil" message because she had felt overwhelmed.

But the prosecution said she was a cold, cruel, calculating liar who had repeatedly changed her account of events and her notes should be treated as a confession.

Detectives said they had found nothing unusual about Letby's life and could not determine any motive. "Unfortunately, I don't think we'll

ever know unless she just chooses to tell us," said Detective Superintendent Paul Hughes who led the investigation.

One senior doctor at the neonatal unit, Stephen Brearey, told the BBC that hospital bosses had failed to investigate allegations against Letby and failed to act on his and his colleagues' concerns.

"Our staff are devastated by what has happened, and we are committed to ensuring that lessons continue to be learned," said Nigel Scawn, medical director at Countess of Chester Hospital NHS Foundation Trust.

The government said it had ordered an independent inquiry which would include how concerns raised by clinicians were dealt with, while the father of twins who survived her attempts to kill them demanded answers from the hospital.

"They could have stopped it," said the father, who cannot be named for legal reasons.

Police are carrying out further investigations into all the time Letby had worked as a nurse at the hospital and at another one in Liverpool where she had trained, to identify if there were any more victims.

"There is a number of cases that are active investigations that parents have been informed of," Hughes said. Agencies

How climate change drives heatwaves and wildfires in Europe

BRUSSELS

EUROPE is once again battling scorching temperatures this summer, with wildfires blazing across the continent from the Mediterranean to Spain. Here's how climate change drives these events.

Hotter, more frequent heatwaves

Climate change makes heatwaves hotter and more frequent. This is the case for most land regions, and has been confirmed by the United Nations' global panel of climate scientists, the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC).

Greenhouse gas emissions from human activities have

Friederike Otto, a climate scientist at Imperial College London who co-leads the World Weather Attribution global research collaboration.

But other conditions affect heatwaves too. In Europe, atmospheric circulation is an important factor.

Fingerprints of climate change

To find out exactly how much climate change affected a specific heatwave, scientists conduct "attribution studies". Since 2004, more than 400 such studies have been done for extreme weather events, including heat, floods and drought - calculating how much of a role climate change played in each.

This involves simulating the modern climate hundreds of times and comparing it to simulations of a climate without human-caused greenhouse gas emissions.

For example, scientists with World Weather Attribution determined that a record-breaking heatwave in western Europe in June 2019 was 100 times more likely to occur now in France and the Netherlands than if humans had not changed the climate.

Heatwaves will still get worse

The global average temperature is around 1.2 C warmer than in pre-industrial times. That is already driving extreme heat events.

On average on land, heat extremes that would have happened once every 10 years without human influence on the climate are now three times more frequent, according to ETH Zurich climate scientist Sonia Senevi-

Temperatures will only stop rising if humans stop adding greenhouse gases to the atmosphere. Until then, heatwaves are set to worsen. A failure to tackle climate change would see heat extremes escalate even more dangerously.

Countries agreed under the global 2015 Paris Agreement to cut emissions fast enough to limit global warming to 2 C and aim for 1.5 C, to avoid its most dangerous impacts. Current policies would not cut emissions fast enough to meet either goal.

Climate change drives wildfires

Climate change increases hot and dry conditions that help fires spread faster, burn longer and rage more intensely.

In the Mediterranean, that has contributed to the fire season starting earlier and burning more land. Fires burning since mid-July on the island of Rhodes forced the evacuation of some 20,000 people as an inferno reached resorts and coastal villages on the island's southeast.

Hotter weather also saps moisture from vegetation, turning it into dry fuel that helps fires spread.

Hotter, drier conditions make fires far more dangerous, according to Copernicus senior scientist Mark Parrington.

Without human-induced climate change, the extreme weather experienced across the world this summer would have been extremely rare, according to a study by World Weather Attribution. The study found that human-induced climate change played

an absolutely overwhelming role in the extreme heatwaves that swept across North America, Europe and China in

Climate change isn't the only factor in fires

Forest management and ignition sources are also important factors. In Europe, more than nine out of 10 fires are ignited by human activities, like arson, disposable barbeques, electricity lines, or littered glass, according to European Union data.

Countries, including Spain, face the challenge of shrinking populations in rural areas, as people move to cities, leaving smaller workforces to clear vegetation and avoid fuel for forest fires building up.

Some actions can help to limit severe blazes, such as setting controlled fires that mimic the low-intensity fires in natural ecosystem cycles, or introducing gaps within forests to stop blazes rapidly spreading over large areas.

But scientists concur that without steep cuts to the greenhouse gases causing climate change, heatwaves, wildfires, flooding and drought will significantly worsen.

When people look back on the current fire season in one or two decades, it will probably seem mild by comparison, said Victor Resco de Dios, professor of forest engineering at Spain's Lleida University.

Mdahwa said boxing has, all over the world, seen numerous successful athletes, however, Tanzania's boxers face a number of challenges that hinder their efforts to rise to prominence on the global stage in the industry.

The official, however, admitted that local boxers have made notable contributions to the sport but their overall rise to prominence has been hindered by several factors including limited access to training resources and funding for their boxing programs. Mdahwa also noted the pugilists also lack exposure and opportu-

"One of the primary factors hampering the rise of Tanzanian boxers is the limited access to resources, lack of adequate infrastructure, training facilities, and funding for boxing programs," the official noted.

"This scarcity hinders the development of talented individuals who might have the potential to become successful boxers," the official dis-

Kasi Sports Group's CEO added: "Without proper training facilities and equipment, it becomes difficult for boxers to compete at the same level as their counterparts from countries with better resources."

"They also often face a lack of exposure to high-quality opponents and international fights, this is due to limited funding and inadequate promotional platforms,î he said.

cial noted. "This financial burden often leads talented Tanzanian boxers to prioritize other means of income, limiting their ability to dedicate themselves fully to the sport,î the Official highlit-

The leader further said limited professional boxing structure, cultural and social factors are also other problems the local boxers are encountering in the country.

He said Tanzania, like many other African countries, face challenges in establishing a strong professional boxing structure, adding this is mainly due to the absence of wellorganized and reputable boxing promotions, governing bodies, and management systems that makes it difficult for local boxers to navigate their careerseffectively.

Mdahwa also said lack of clear pathways and opportunities for progression hampers Tanzania boxers' ability to compete at higher levels and gain recognition on the international stage.

The official revealed: ìCultural and social factors can also influence the development and success of boxers. Traditional societal expectations, which prioritize education and other career paths over professional sports, can discourage young talents from pursuing boxing as a viable option."

"Additionally, cultural stigmas attached to combat sports might deter potential boxers and limit the pool of talent willing to participate in the

At times it takes a while o realise this, and when the time comes for a replacement of the communications officer or ëmajor domoí as he or she would have been up to that point, everyone just seems to understand why that is relevant or needful.

They were feeling the burden of the bragging and the anguish of being proved wrong so many

Looking at the city archrivals, Simba SC and Young Africans SC (Yanga), one can say they needed the services of someone like Haji Manara for different reasons in respective moments.

When they are relatively uncertain of themselves they may take comfort in the bragging as an added layer of confidence, but when they are decidedly more confident, the bragging starts to be a bother. They want a measured voice.

It follows that the discomfort earlier registered at Msimbazi Street outfit was at some point likely to be repeated at Jangwani Street club, despite that the club never eased out the official, but he was eased out for them.

It is a matter of conjecture how many are disappointed with the absence of the ëmajor domoí and how many are quietly satisfied they no longer have to do with his antics and controversies. They can only take comfort in that exit if the club is at cruising speed, sailing, no booster needed.

Uncertainty surrounds Tanzania's participation in next month's African Paralympic Games

UNCERTAINTY has surrounded Tanzania's athletes' participation in the African Paralympic Games scheduled for early next month in Ghana.

The African Paralympic Games will as well serve as qualifiers for 2024 Paris Paralympics.

This is the first time that Africa is hosting Paralympic Games and Tanzania was to be represented by athletes from six disciplines namely Paralympic athletics, power weightlifting, wheelchair basketball, amputee football, wheelchair tennis and sitting volleyball.

The Games are slated for September 3-13 and, on Thursday, Tanzania Paralympic Committee (TPC), through its Acting Secretary-General Vincent Kaduma announced that Paralympic athletics and Powerlifting events will not take place in Ghana given the International Paralympic Committee (IPC) officials who inspected the venues set to host the two disciplines deemed them not ready to host the Games.

Tanzania's Paralympic athletes and their officials are banking on the government's financial support to compete in the African Paralympic Games.

On Thursday, however, National Sports Council (NSC), through the council's Information Officer

Najaha Bakari, stated the the continental showgovernment has not secured funds for the Paralympic athletes' trip to the Games, and she appealed for support from the corporate world and other stakeholders.

ìTo be honest I cannot say if our Paralympic athletes will travel to Ghana to compete in the African Paralympic Games, I have said so as currently we donit have funds, due to lack of funds, I canít say who will represent the country in the Games but, once the funds are available, we will see who will go to Ghana,î she said.

Kaduma lamented that the African Paralympic Games are the best opportunity for domestic Para athletes to earn qualification for next year's Paris Paralympics and he described the failure to participate in down as a wasted oppor-

He, however, said the suspension of Paralympic athletics and Powerlifting disciplines is a blessing in disguise, adding the government should now focus on looking for funds to necessitate the two disciplines' athletes to battle it out in 2024 Paris Paralympics' qualifying events slated to take place in November this year and January next year. Paralympic athletics' qualifiers will be held in Tunisia in January next year, whilst Egypt will host the Para Powerlifting qualifiers in November this year.

The TPC leader disclosed: ìI'm reliably informed that the National Sports Council has no money to send our Paralympic athletes to the Afthat are to be used as qualifiers for Paris Paralympic Games."

"If there will be an intervention from the top, our athletes can travel to Ghana, we were hoping that even if there is no enough money in NSC's coffers, wheelchair tennis discipline, made up of four players, and Para Powerlifting- consisting of two athletes onlywould have competed in the Games but, as it is, let us wait and see what the future holds,î he said.

Messi leads Miami to first trophy with **Leagues Cup win**

NASHVILLE, Tennessee

LIONEL Messi scored a screamer and won his first trophy in North American soccer as Inter Miami beat Nashville on penalties (10-9) after their final ended 1-1 in 90 minutes.

The Argentine World Cup winner had put Miami ahead in the 24th minute with a wonder strike into the top corner but Fafa Picault levelled for Nashville in the second half.

After Messi hit the post and Leonardo Campana missed a last second chance to win the game in regulation for Miami, the game went to a shoot-out which ended in a duel between the two keepers and Elliot Panicco's shot being saved by Miami's Drake Callender.

Messi and his team-mates rushed to celebrate with the American goalkeeper, who had made some key saves late in the game to keep his team

Miami, in their third season of existence, were rock bottom of Major League Soccer when Messi joined them a month ago but Messi, along with Spanish pair Sergio Busquets and Jordi Alba, has utterly transformed the team leading them on a seven game unbeaten run to the League

Co-owner David Beckham, who created the club, said he was stunned by the way the former Barcelona trio had been able to bring about change so quickly.

"It is like a movie, you watch these players play and it is, emotionally, everything about their play is beautiful," he said.

Seven-times Ballon d'Or winner Messi has now scored 10 goals in seven games in the pink shirt of his new club and on Wednesday has the chance to reach another final when his team take on Cincinnati in the semi-final of the US

This was not the dominant, entertaining Miami that in the past month has lit up the tournament, featuring MLS and Mexican Liga MX clubs, but the win was sweet nonetheless.

"I am very happy to win our first title in just one month, the club's first. The team is growing by leaps and bounds and we are very happy,' said midfielder Busquets.

- Leaps and bounds -

"We have infected the team with our spirit, our work, our character and experience. We are making a solid team ... And then we have Leo, who makes a difference because he's the best in the world."

Nashville set out with the clear intention to limit the impact of Busquets and by extension Messi and they were effective in forcing Miami to play a slower type of possession football, deeper in their own half.

Gary Smith's side sent an early warning that they could trouble Miami at set-pieces with Walker Zimmerman's header from a Lukas MacNaughton corner forcing Callender into a low save.

Miami were probing, with Messi dropping deeper and looking for gaps in the home de-

But with Walker Zimmerman marshalling the back line well chances were hard to come by until Robert Taylor spun and turned and fired a fierce drive which Nashville keeper Elliot Panicco did well to keep out.

Three minutes later, Miami had the lead -- and the source of their breakthrough was no

Taylor's attempted pass inside was blocked and the ball fell to Messi who zipped past Zimmerman, opening enough space to his left to unleash an unstoppable drive from over 25 yards out which flew into the top corner past the help-

Miami looked in total control, playing with confidence bordering on swagger, but it was a different story after the interval.

From a corner Picault won a header at the back post which ricocheted in off the foot of Benjamin Cremaschi and Callender.

Suddenly Nashville had the belief and their German forward Hany Mukhtar came alive, testing Miami with his speedy runs and Callender with a blast from the right.

Messi went close to another Hollywood ending with a 71st minute shot from just outside the box which shaved the outside of the post.

But in the final seconds, his Ecuadorian teammate Campana should have won the game for Miami, when he rounded Panicco but from a tight angle could only hit the post with the goal at his mercy.

Then came penalties and with all 10 outfield players having shot, with one miss for each side, it came down to the keepers and Callender kept his cool with his shot before denying Panicco and launching the celebrations.

While the players sprayed champagne in the locker-room, Argentine coach Gerardo 'Tata' Martino was in reflective mood.

Spain tame England to win Women's World Cup for first time

PAIN won the Women's World Cup for the first time in their history with skipper Olga Carmona sweeping in the only goal for a deserved 1-0 victory over England in yesterday's final.

In front of a crowd of nearly 76,000 at Stadium Australia in Sydney, Spain were the more accomplished side and had more chances, including missing a second-half penalty.

Spain's triumph is vindication for Jorge Vilda and the Spanish football federation, who stuck with the coach even after 15 players last year said they no longer wanted to represent their country under him.

England coach Sarina Wiegman, who has now suffered back-to-back defeats in the final, and her European champions can have few complaints.

Spain are the fifth team to lift the World Cup since the tourna-



ment began in 1991, joining outgoing champions the United States, Germany, Norway and Ja-

In front of Spain's Oueen Letizia, defender Carmona scored what turned out to be the winner, rampaging from leftback to thrash the ball in low and hard on 29 min-
