

Govt reaps 143bn/- in new Airtel dividends

VICE President Dr Philip Mpango (pictured) yesterday received a dummy cheque for 143bn/- as dividends, sale of communication towers and empowerment contribution from Airtel (T) Ltd, on the basis of the support services agreement with the Treasury, for fiscal 2021/2022. In his remarks at the delivery ceremony, Dr Mpango asserted that private firms in which the government has shares need to operate efficiently, and thus pay appropriate dividends timely Firms not operating profitably and thus fail to issue dividends need to assess themselves on the need to

The government has invested much to facilitate their work so as to bring development to the people, he said, underlining that the government will continue to create a conducive environment



to attract sustainable business initiatives. He hailed the Treasury Registrar's office for overseeing the government accord with Airtel Plc on the dividends as well as the 1bn/- payment delivered each month. noting that these proceeds contribute a lot to strategic projects and social services

Gabriel Malata, the firm's board chairman, had earlier noted that in the payment, 88bn/is dividend, 12bn/- for support services and 43bn/- arose from selling communication towers, elaborating that in 2019 Airtel (T) issued 38bn/- as dividend, rising to 60bn/-

Total dividends for 2021 attained 181bn/where the government obtains 88bn/-, making it that for the past three years, the firm has paid out over 200bn/- to Treasury in dividends, contributions, tax and other

Last year the firm sold communication towers to Minara (T) Ltd at S\$175m (400bn/-), he said, attributing the transaction to the conducive business environment facilitating smooth operations. The firm also put on the

Govt to finalise hiring of 44,096 by June 30 civil servants had been employed.

THE government yesterday reiterated its commitment to employ 44,096 more civil servants, promote 92,619 of those in service and carry out re-categorisation for 6026 others by end of June. using 26bn/- per month that adds up to 315bn/-annually.

Jenista Mhagama (pictured), the Minister of State in the President's Office (Public Service Management and Good Governance), said at a press conference here yesterday that



through the human capital management information system (HCMIS), around 12,336

New jobs were 11,492 and 844 were recategorised, placed on duty in different ministerial departments and agencies, while in the current fiscal year the government approved new employment of 44,096 staff, 92,619 positions for promotion and the recategorisation of 6,026 civil servants.

She said the government considered new job offers in the key sectors of education, health, agriculture, water, livestock and fisheries. Education was allocated 12,035 positions, 9,800 for primary and secondary schools, plus 2, 235 for lecturers and tutors in higher learning institutions.

Health has 10,285 job openings, with 7,612 allocated to hospitals, health centres and

CONTROLLER and Auditor General (CAG) Charles Kichere yesterday highlighted several weaknesses in contract management and poor supervision of projects, leading to huge losses of public funds.

Widespread violations of public procurement law in local government authorities were especially visible in the annual report, where 40 LGAs procured items worth 5.37bn/- without competitive bidding and 24 others procured items costing 3.84bn/- in contravention of

Briefing journalists on the general audit reports for fiscal 2020/2021 shortly after the documents were presented to the National Assembly, he said 59 LGAs procured items worth 9.86bn/- without tender board approval, and three others failed to supervise implementation of development projects causing a loss of 326.64m/-

Poor management of contracts by the power utility (TANECSO) led to the utility paying Symbion Power (T) Ltd US \$153.43m as compensation for breach of contract, he stated.

On May 2016, TANESCO barred Symbion from supplying power to the national grid, pushing the US-based firm to file a case at the International Centre for Settlement of Investment Disputes (ICSID) demanding \$1.57bn for contract termination.

The government needs to ensure proper supervision of contracts to avoid losses of public funds, he said, tasking the Ministry of Energy to make sure the monies are paid on time to avoid further penalties.

Rising fertiliser prices would affect agricultural production in coming years

The CAG faulted the government over delayed implementation of the Julius Nyerere Hydropower Project (INHPP) which was to be more or less completed end of October last year but was just around halfway due to a number of factors, where the outbreak of COVID-19 was just one reason.

Frequent power cuts at the JNHPP area from January to October 2020 led to TANESCO paying the contractor a fine of \$8.53m equivalent to 19.51bn/-, he stated.


"The state power supplier should conduct an evaluation of power requirements to run the contractor's machines at the project area to avoid power cuts and losses," he emphasised, asking TANESCO to consult the contractor on how to compensate the wasted project implementation period.

Two public entities-Air Tanzania Co. Ltd (ATCL) and Mkulazi Holdings Ltd incurred huge losses in the 2020/2021 financial year. Although ATCL increased its revenues by 11 per cent, it incurred losses amounting to 36.18bn/compared to 60.25bn/- in the 2019/2020 fiscal year, while reducing expenditures by three per cent, he stated.

The Mkulazi sugarcane farm and Mbigiri sugar factory in Morogoro Region operated at a loss for five years consecutively, from 2016/17 to June 30th 2021, with delayed installation of machines and sugar production lesding to a loss of 17.70bn/-, he said.

Audits conducted at the National Health Insurance Fund (NHIF) showed that 731 male members went through cesarean section-C-

RC mobilises farmers in proper use of fertilisers

LINDI regional commissioner, Zainab Telack has said encouraging the proper use of fertiliser for farmers would reduce rampant shifting cultivation in the southern part of the country.

She made the remarks on Monday this week when addressing residents of Lindi District during the commemoration of farmers Day organised by Tanzania fertilisers regulatory Authority (TFRA).

"The issue mobilising for the issue of fertiliser that you have brought up I believe our people will have

have to assure that if on the same land they farm and use fertiliser they will harvest adequate produce,' added the RC.

Farmers Day celebration apex involves mobilisation in the correct use of fertiliser for farmers in Lindi Region that began in May 2021 following the region having poor use of fertiliser compare to other regions in the country including Iringa, Mbeya, Mwanza and other regions.

She said the reasons behind poor use of fertiliser for farmers in Lindi Region, Tellack said it is due to lack

TFRA executive director Dr Stephan Eliuth Ngailo said the authority decided to mobilise in the correct use of fertiliser in both Lindi and Mtwara regions due to the regions' poor use of fertiliser.

He said the presence of the improved port of Mtwara will simplify fertiliser imports that would be offloaded directly at the port to ensure the availability of the farm input at all

"We have seen that the establishment of demonstration farms is the correct way to mobilise farmers to use fertiliser in farming," Dr Ngailo said.

section (in delivering babies) while a total of 2,495 people from 87 private companies were registered as public servants and 73 dependents registered as members.

There were 14,409,200/- invalid claims submitted to NHIF by health centers, with 444 members receiving similar medical services (full blood picture) more than once at the same health centre in a day, the report indicated, showing also that 325 patients who are not fund members were provided with medical services at different hospitals.

CAG Kichere linked the rising fertilizer prices with poor supervision of indicatives prices, with the Tanzania Fertilizer Regulatory Authority (TAFRA) last issuing indicative price in November 2020.

At that time, a 50 kilos bag of fertilizer (DAP) was sold at 66,995/- and 53,318/for a similar package of UREA. Until July 2021, fertilizer prices increased to 90,000 for 50 kilograms of DAP and 86,000/- for UREA, he stated.

Rising fertilizer prices would affect agricultural production in coming years, he stated, urging TAFRA and the government to come up with short and long term plans to control fertilizer

In fiscal 2020/2021 the National Audit Office (headed by the CAG) issued 999 audit certificates, of which 185 went to local government authorities, 195 to public agencies, 308 to the central government departments, 19 to political parties and 292 related to development projects.

There were 56 special audits, 37 conducted on local government authorities, 12 in the central government, six regarding public utilities and one audit on information and communications technology (ICT) systems, he further noted.

Overall, 970p audit reports obtained unqualified opinions (about 97 per cent), 19 had qualified opinions, six adverse opinions and the remaining four entities receiving a disclaimer opinion from the CAG, he stated.

General and performance audits report for the financial year ending June 30, 2021 showed an increase of unqualified opinion compared to 89 per cent recorded during the fiscal 2019/2020 audit exercise.

LGAs receiving qualified opinion include the former Dar es Salaam City Council, Kisarawe District Council, Longido District Council, Mlele District Council, Musoma District Council and Sengerema District Council, while Bunda District Council received an adverse opinion, he added.

dispensaries, while 1650 health staff will be posted to zonal and regional referral hospitals. About 103 positions are designated for district designated hospitals (DDHs) and voluntary agency hospitals (VAHs), she said.

A total of 2,392 positions are offered to agriculture (814), livestock (700), fisheries (204) water (261) and legal sector (513) while 7,792 other positions have been allocated to ministerial departments, local government authorities and public agencies.

Promoting 92,619 civil servants will cost 23bn/- per month, equivalent to 276 9bn/- per year while recategorising 6,026 staff will cost a staggering 824.4m/- per month equivalent to 9,9bn/- per year, with this exercise being completed at the close of the financial year, she asserted..

This is the first time in civil service history that such actions are taken

within a year of a new government, she declared, praising President Samia Suluhu Hasssan for determination to improve the public service to uplift development efforts.

The human capital management drive had been carried out in the public service to 52 per cent in some areas and up to 90 percent in a few institutions, thus putting up efforts to obtain resources for new jobs in the current financial year, she explained.

Heads of employing authorities need to issue letters of appointment, promotion and re-categorization as soon as they receive the approval to do so, the minister intoned.

Ministerial departments and other public agencies that have not joined the human capital management information system and are paying salaries from own sources need to complete preparation to switch to the system by the end of June, she added.

Govt warns shoddy contractors on SGR

WORKS and Transport minister Prof Makame Mbarawa has said the government will have no mercy to contractors during the ongoing construction of the Standard Gauge Railway ((SGR) who will fail to meet the deadline.

Prof Mbarawa made the remarks here yesterday when he laid the foundation stone for the construction of Makutopora-Tabora section. He said the commencement of the construction has come after the government signed the contract with Turkish contractor, Yapi Merkez

December, last year in Dar es Salaam.

Phase-three of the project (Makutopora-Tabora) worth 4.4 trn/- will be completed in October 2025. According to the minister, there will be no additional time for the contractor who will cause delaying in the ongoing construction of the SGR

Prof Mbarawa noted that up to date the government had already disbursed over 600/bn to the contractor so far for the Makutopora-Tabora project.

Commenting on the I, II, III and fourth phases, the minister noted that the government had already disbursed 14.74 trn/- "I call on the construction adviser and the management of the Tanzania Railway Corporation(TRC) to work closely to the ensure the construction completes

"It is upon your responsibility to research and provide recommendation to me on the minimum wage in the private

"The board should also abide by the national interest, the obtaining economic situation, ability to pay salaries and workers condition in meeting their day to day expenses," she added.

She added that the board's composition is tripartite involving the government, employers and workers.

She added that recommendations for salary scales are not done on the table, research ought to be conducted to abide by the set conditions.

"The issue of minimum age is very important that has to be dealt with carefully as I had said, because President Samia vows to install better working conditions for the people to enable a worker become proud in performing his duties.

Government set to provide subsidy on fertiliser - minister

THE government will from July, 2022 provide subsidy on fertiliser to help reduce the cost and had budgeted 150bn/- for the purpose, the National Assembly heard yesterday.

It has also has put new strategies to control price hiking of fertiliser in the country through the Tanzania Fertiliser Regulatory Authority (TFRA) in collaboration with regional authorities by conducting assessment of actual cost and provide indicative prices.

The government believes that the process will help control unlawful increase of rice of the product by traders who in most cases do not consider the cost of importing it into the country, the House heard yesterday.

Minister for Agriculture, Hussein Bashe, made the statement here while responding to a question from Namtumbo MP,Vita Kawawa (CCM), who had wanted to know what the government was doing to control the ever escalating prices of fertiliser, especially in Ruvuma.

The minister further explained that price of fertiliser has been increasing globally following increase in the cost of production and demand in countries that import a lot of the farm input like China and India.

Bashe stated that the increase in 2021/2022 is also as a result of effects of COVID-19 and the ongoing war between Rusia and Ukrain, the two countries being big suppliers of raw materials used in manufacturing fertilisers.

He said the government through TFRA issued indicative prices for different types of fertiliser like DAP, UREA, CAN and SA for every region in the country, including Ruvuma in March,2022.

"In order to avoid dependence on importation of fertiliser, the government continues attracting investors to invest in fertiliser industries in the country in effort to reduce prices to farmers" said the minister.

He called on regional and district authorities to ensure that traders adhere to indicative prices at all trading centres of fertiliser.

Govt: Plans on the way to combine NIDA, NEC systems

EXPERTS from the National Electoral Commission (NEC) and the National Identification Authority (NIDA) are working on the possibility of combining their systems, deputy minister of State (Union and Environment), Hamza Khamis Khamis, told the House yesterday.

He made the statement in response to a question from Kawe MP, Josephat Gwajima (CCM) who had wanted to know if the government was ready to combine

systems of the two institutions in efforts to avoid inconveniences faced by members of the public. "Does the government see it fit to join systems of the two institutions and reduce the burden and challenges facing the people?" he asked.

But the deputy minister explained that the government was aware of the importance of having a combined system for the two key organisations and the need to use national ID in voting as well as e-voting.

He said adoption of combined systems shall help the government reduce cost


of preparing voters register and also else supervision of election process.

"Discussions between NIDA and NEC on having a common communication system to improve voters' register started in March,2022 and is expected to yield good results, "said the deputy minister."

Pangawe MP, Haji Amour Haji, on basic question had also wanted to know when the government would repair electronic registration machine that has caused piling of residential permits at the immigration department in Zanzibar for a long time now.

However, deputy minister said between January 2020 and June 2020, the e-permit machine a he immigration department in Zanzibar was not in use due to breakdown, causing delay in printing 139 residence permits. However, he said provision of residence permits is currently doe by stamping on the visitors passport as a proof of legal residence in the Isles.


The deputy minister added that from July,2020, provision of e-permits continued whereby up to March,2022 a total of 799 permits have been issued.

Taking A New Look At The News ESTABLISHED IN 1995

Marking 100 years of Nyerere's birth shows exceptional political stability

SERIES of workshops at local and national levels have been held around the country to mark 100 years of the birth of founder president Mwalimu Nyerere, a situation that is remarkable by African standards. We tend to have fairly short memories, and changes in holders of office are seldom a procedural affair with utmost unanimity and loyalty as has so far been the case here, with the sixth president since the country became independent, and nowhere did people have to right to bring to office - or remove - any national leader. It is a mark of political continuity and credibility of the political system, that many are working to destroy, citing 'boredom' with the constitution, and indeed a long period of political harmony.

Harmony by definition presumes a reasonable measure of trust between the rulers and the ruled, in which case the issue of changing the political party that holds office doesn't arise until it loses the trust that the people have bestowed upon it. That is what was happening in the third and especially fourth phases of government when infighting at higher levels of governance was producing a series of accusations on the reasons for certain decisions often involving huge payments. The reason, or say 'efficient cause' of that situation was excess freedom to eat and drink from state coffers, sowing discord and disoriented ambition.

For that reason the next phase of government resolutely experimented with a solid one party state without room for substantial expression of

dissent, which many in the political landscape feel it was a disaster arising from the ego of a single individual. It was in large measure a clean-up exercise so that energy and political will are directed at what is positive and fruitful to the country, by eliminating the fight over who grabbed what, but fate being what it is, a modification of this orientation was inaugurated in the middle of that phase, to move into the sixth phase. We are now nearer Zanzibar in terms of the number of phases.

That is scarcely another country in Africa, even those with monarchies, where the image of a founder figure who isn't part of a dim historical past but relevant to current political references would be marked with cohesion, unison and dignity as in the case of Mwalimu Nyerere. It is not easy to say how long this situation will still continue, for 'boredom with stability' as Nyerere said in relation to the Tanganyika Resolution of the National Assembly in 1993 is something that is hard to check. It is human nature, that a broad range of people are dissatisfied in their expectations, and wish to try something different, anything.

A 1930s political philosopher, looking at the violent confrontation of communism and fascism in Europe, remarked that 'the road to hell is paved with good intentions,' but people are unlikely to agree on what such intentions are, until it happens. Even then disputes will remain what caused it, in which case only divine benediction keeps countries free from chaos. But we have to merit benediction with good actions.

Success in the toilets drive

triumphant mood on account of success registered in a campaign to build clean toilets countrywide, which formally kicked off in 2018. Erstwhile Vice President Samia Suluhu Hassan launched the campaign, which a ministerial brochure shows it was just a facelift of a continuing effort, since earlier decades. There was a campaign starting from 1973 and conducted for five years, which instigated remarkable improvements including increasing the coverage of basic sanitation from 20 per cent to 80 per cent, taking up sanitation as key to basic needs.

The underlying framework is that the government has always sought to improve the health status of the population by working to control diseases related to water and sanitation. The most typical of them is diarrhea, and its more convulsive expression, first as dysentery and then cholera, are perennial problems in poor countries, but over the decades many have worked to stem the root cases. Availability of clean running water near most households is the crucial element, but building toilets was a separate issue.

The brochure for instance asserted that a number of campaigns have been implemented to induce behavioural change at the household level since 1973. The government's goal of improving the health status of the people by controlling water-based ailments pushed it to make several energetic campaigns, where the preliminary (Man is Health) campaign had more or less to be revisited after 30 years or so. It ended in 1978 and from them onward to 2012 a different generation had reached adulthood, without the benefit of memories of the earlier campaign as an active reference point, thus it largely had to be redone.

The chronicler says that fourth phase president Jakava Kikwete set off the first phase of the campaign, on 5th June 2012 in Moshi municipality, taking up 42 local government authorities by January 2013 which had risen to 112 five months later. Then vice president Samia launched phase 2 of the sanitation campaign for the period 2016 to 2021 fairly late in 2018 but as they say, 'better late than never.' The new campaign targeted the building of improved toilets rather than the traditional toilets of the 'Man is Health' drive, in itself evidence that more public resources are disposable to make a systematic difference in

Sanitation is a multifaceted issue that has to do first with running water and then a stable and continuous facility where the running water is a crucial addition. As water connection as well as electricity, whose importance lies less in the economic activities it touches off but in the modernity it imposes, are now being energetically scaled up all over the country, there are grounds for more durable results of the latest sanitation campaign. There is substantial chance of new habits being formed around the continuous supply of clean water and electricity, facilitating stable use of modernized toilets. Let us hope for the best.



ECENTLY, precisely on April 2, as it happens every the international **∟**community marked the World Autism awareness day. On this date, Autism awareness influencers and organisations use the opportunity of the event to create awareness about the health condition as well as the need for the public to accept individuals with Autism and treat them with compassion.

It is instructive to note that Autism or Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), refers to a broad range of conditions characterised by challenges with social skills, repetitive behaviours, speech, and nonverbal communication.

Also, there is not one autism but many subtypes, most influenced by a combination of genetic and environmental factors. Because autism is a spectrum disorder, each person with the ailment has a distinct set of strengths and challenges. How people affected learn, think and problemsolve can range from highly skilled to severely challenged. Some people with ASD may also require significant support in their daily lives, while others may need less support and, in some cases, live entirely independently.

From indications, the awareness of autism in Nigeria is abysmal. Most parents and health workers often fail to detect autism early in children. In some cases, the children achieve all milestones of their age mates, and

impediments that parents begin to

Autism experts claim that although

there are no known causes of autism, some predisposing factors contribute to a child developing the condition. According to the World Health Organisation (WHO), one in 160 children lives with Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD) worldwide.

Furthermore, statistics point to the fact that there are 135 million established cases of autism in the world, with more than one million children and teenagers suffering from the condition in Nigeria. Sadly, in our view, the statistics of children in Nigeria with autism are poor because of the low awareness of the spectrum and it keeps increasing every year in the country, essentially, because it is rarely talked about.

Culturally, the ailment is still perceived as a demonic disease or witchcraft. This may be excusable especially in the rural areas where most people, due to ignorance or an attempt to live in denial, pretend to be oblivious of the disease and its manifestations.

According to experts, symptoms to look out for to help in early detection include; limited eye contact, stemming, which could be flapping of arms, tantrum behaviors or limited speech: another spectrum of autism disorder

but find it difficult to converse with people.

Autism poses special challenges in Africa

The good news, as researchers say, is that with early detection and management, most autistic children can live normal lives. Regrettably, in our view, the number of schools tailored for autistic and other special needs children are few, far between or even nonexistent.

According to a report by educeleb, a nongovernmental organisation (NGO), there are only 1,177 full-fledged nurseries, primary and secondary special needs schools in the country presently. Of that number, Kano has 153, followed by Kaduna with 79 and Lagos with 75. States with the least number of such schools are Borno, Bayelsa, and Zamfara. Where these schools exist, most of them lack the basic infrastructure adapted for

children with special needs. However, it is gratifying to note that some conventional schools are beginning to bridge the gap by adopting inclusive learning to take care of children with special needs. As a newspaper, we are for this approach based on our conviction that inclusive education is the most effective way to give all children equal opportunities for learning and development.

We are persuaded by the reality on ground to point out the snag in this otherwise encouraging development. paying the bills of the children.

only when some of them have speech in those that are extremely intelligent. The fees demanded by most special needs schools and the accompanying therapy are often beyond the reach of an average Nigerian family. This is an obvious challenge to many parents who happen to have a child with this condition. The financial implications of treatment and different therapy recommended for children with autism can and is, indeed, burdensome. For instance, the average cost of therapy alone for a child with autism ranges

> from N350,000 to N600,000 quarterly. Therefore, in the considered opinion of this newspaper, there is every need to create the required awareness with regard to this ailment which will significantly reduce the stigmatisation associated with the condition. Most children with autism are rejected and abused.

> It is from this standpoint that we urge government, at all levels, to invest more in autism and other special needs schools. It will be commendable if the governments feel obligated to subsidise the cost of therapy and management because we are convinced that through this process, more people can be diagnosed early, managed, and placed in therapy.

It is pertinent to stress that this is not a job for the government alone. We also appeal to wealthy Nigerians to support NGOs at the forefront of autism awareness by covering some costs and

Despite its devastation, COVID-19 also brought some positive changes in our lives. All over the world, times of upheavals are always times of radical changes. Some believe the pandemic was a once in a generation chance to remake society and build a better future. Others fear it may only make existing injustices worse.

DAWASA implements crucial water project in Coast Region

THE Dar es Salaam Water and Sanitation Authority (DAWASA) is implementing 11bn/- water project which on completion will guarantee safe and clean water to 206, 253 people.

The project which is sponsored by World Bank (WB) is on good stage where by currently the contractor is laying underground water pipes which will be used to distribute water.

The project which is expected to be completed on 2023 will benefit residents of Yangeyange, Nzasa and Somelo in Coast Region.

Project contractor, Eng. Michael Njau said that they are currently improving water wells, construction of water tanks and laying underground water pipes.

He said the construction of two water tanks with different capacities in Mgeule and Nzasa has started and is going on with a

"We have started this project and we expect to do it within one year and at Mgeule we are constructing water tank with capacity to store about one million litters and at Nzasa we are building underground water tank with capacity of two million litres of water," said Njau.

He said the implementation of the project will involve laying underground water pipes with 10 to 3 inches which will be used to transport water from the tanks to the residents.

"We're at procurement stage of the water pipes but immediately after we procured them we are expecting to laying the pipes underground as soon as possible so that people can enjoy clean and safe water," he added.

Msongola Ward Executive Officer, Venance Mwakilembe said the implementation of Yangeyange water project is a blessing to his people especially Yangeyange residents because they have suffered a lot due to lack of safe and clean water.

"I would like to commend DAWASA for implementation of this water project which will save our people who have been taking a lot of time searching for water. For a very long time Yangeyange residents have been suffering with water shortages but we believe this project will heal our wounds," Mwakilembe said.

Yangeyange Water Project which its source will come from water well with capacity to produce 110,000 litters per hour at Mgeule and another water source from Nzasa - Somelo water project is well which has capacity to produce 60,000 per hour.

The project is expected to be completed on February 2023 and will benefit about 206,253 residents.

'Govt plans to improve livestock husbandry in Handeni District'

DEPUTY Livestock and Fisheries Minister, Abdallah Ulega has said the government has put in place good plans to ensure Msomera Village in Handeni District, Tanga Region has modern infrastructure to serve livestock.

"This including cattle dips, water ponds and grazing areas to enable herders from Ngorongoro who will settle in the village conduct their activities beneficially and in a modern way," said Ulega, when he visited the village which has an area set aside specifically for herders who have decided to voluntarily move out from Ngorongoro Conservation Area Authority (NCAA).

After inspecting the areas set aside for grazing, cattle dips and water ponds, Uklega gave instructions to experts dealing in the development of the area to have in place good strategies to complete the construction of the infrastructures ready for herders moving out of NCCA.

He added that the government has provided funds for the construction of 10 cattle dips in Handeni District, adding that modern livestock keeping to be conducted in the area will also assist the country's processing factories to get reliable raw materials.

He also called on herders who will voluntarily move out of NCAA to settle in Mosomera to be ready change their livestock keeping habits, to abandon traditional herding practices and adopt modern practices.

For his part, Handeni District Commissioner, Siriel Mchembe said the Deputy Minister's visit to the district will help to provide the needed push to experts to enhance their performance especially in the livestock sector.

He added that the average income for a resident of Handeni District was 810,000/- per year, but they have set the target that by 2025 it reaches 1m/- per year.

Will Yemen's newly-formed presidential council succeed in ending years-long war?

EMENI President Abd-Rabbu Mansour Hadi announced Thursday in the Saudi capital of Riyadh that he has handed over all his powers to the newly-formed Presidential Leadership Council (PLC) that will succeed him in running the government and holding peace talks with the Houthis.

While favorably viewing the political reshuffle, along with the ongoing two-month ceasefire, as a new hope of ending the country's sevenyear civil war, political analysts believe that there is still a long way to go before achieving lasting peace in the war-torn country.

Hours after Hadi announced the transfer of power, Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman Al Saud met with members of the council in Riyadh, during which the crown prince pledged billions of dollars in aid to Yemen.

The United Arab Emirates (UAE), Jordan, Egypt, and the Arab League also welcomed the establishment of PLC on Tuesday.

The council of eight members is headed by Rashad Mohammed Al-Alimi, an advisor to Hadi and former interior minister under the late President Ali Abdullah Saleh. Al-Alimi is known for close ties with various factions in Yemen as well as with Saudi Arabia and the UAE.

Other members include Aidarous Zubaidi, the head of the Southern Transitional Council, Sheikh Sultan Al-Aradah, the governor of the oil-rich Marib Province, and Tariq Saleh, former president Saleh's

Analysts said that the "anti-Houthi" camp's major political shake-up was conducted following the will of Saudi Arabia and the Arab coalition it leads in the civil war of Yemen. "It's perfectly understandable that Saudi Arabia's strong desire and

political conviction stand behind reshuffling Yemen's presidential of-

fice," Mohamed Jawas, a political observer based in Aden, told Xinhua. Hadi, aged 76 and living in extended exile and rare public appearances, has been struggling to lead a camp riddled with internal rivalries and divisions. He served as the vice president in the Saleh era for 18 years. In 2012, he was elected to lead the country after Saleh was

overthrown by a popular uprising. In 2014, the Houthi militia captured the capital Sanaa and large swathes of Yemen, forcing him out of Yemen to seek asylum in Saudi Arabia."The countries involved in Yemen's crisis think that Hadi is hindering the achievement of peace, so they decided to put him aside," lawas noted.

Forming a more representative PLC is a key consensus reached during the Yemeni peace consultations held in late March in Riyadh.The talks, backed by the United Nations and the Gulf Cooperation Council, gathered scores of Yemeni political, tribal, and religious leaders, activists, economists, and leaders of non-governmental organizations.

"The participants came up with recommendations regarding the ceding of powers of President Hadi and appointing two deputies with full powers or forming a presidential council," Ahmed Al-Saleh, a political official from southern Yemen who attended the consultations, told Xinhua.

He noted that during the talks, the leaders of Yemen's political factions decided to push Hadi aside as "he failed to lead the state institutions properly and the country's political system cracked with corrup-

The Saudi-owned Al-Arabiya TV hailed the transfer of power as an important step for Yemenis to move forward, adding that the PLC has representatives across factions of Yemen, which implies broader con-But analysts have cautioned that the road to achieving lasting peace

in Yemen is still a long and strenuous one. Speaking of the ceasefire and government reshuffle, Mahmoud Amer, a Yemeni political writer said "what really matters is whether these positive factors can really translate into lasting peace across Yemen. " Amer noted that the PLC is very "anti-Houthi" as it comprises some of the most steadfast Houthi opponents. "Given the members of the

council were handpicked by the coalition, it reveals the fact that there

has not been a fundamental shift in the coalition's hostility toward the

Houthis," Amer said. Moreover, the truce lacked effective monitoring mechanisms despite Saudi Arabia and Iran having expressed support, so the sporadic

clashes may quickly spiral into a full-blown conflict, Amer noted. Since April 2, the Yemeni government and the Houthis have repeatedly accused each other of breaking the ceasefire. Clashes between the two sides erupted in the government-held Marib province almost on a daily basis.

Meanwhile, the planned reopening of Sanaa international airport, as mentioned in the ceasefire agreement, has vet to be implemented. Mohamed Al-Ahmadi, a political expert, said though the transition of power may bring the political changes that Yemenis need, it has set up a dangerous precedent of replacing a legitimate head of state without a transparent and due procedure.

"It is a new political system established away from the aspirations of Yemen's people and has no relation to the current Yemeni constitution," Al-Ahmadi said, adding it could lead the country to an "unknown

The Houthi group was also quick to dismiss the decision, calling it a farce and a "desperate attempt to restructure the ranks of mercenaries to push them towards further escalation." "Yemen's present and future are decided inside Yemen, and any activity beyond its borders is a skit and entertainment game played by the countries of aggression,"

Houthi spokesman Mohammed Abdulsalam said in a tweet. Amer said the key to solving Yemen's problems lies in whether the Houthis can gain a legitimate place on Yemen's political stage.He noted the Saudi-Iranian rivalries still have an important influence on Yemen, and although Saudi Arabia and Iran have engaged in a series of contacts and negotiations over the past year, there is little hope of an imminent breakthrough in bilateral relations. In this context, it is hard for Saudi Arabia to be truly comfortable with the Houthis.

"Saudi Arabia is likely to remain hostile to the Houthis. It is equally likely that the Houthis will launch a new round of attacks after the cease-fire period," the analyst said.

Akiba Commercial Bank reduces impairment losses by 50 percent

AKIBA Commercial Bank (ACB) managed to cut its impairment losses on loans, advances and overdraft by half last year, signaling more push on assets

The impairment partly resulted by the impact of covid-19 to most of the bank's clients, especially Micro, Small and Medium Entreprises (MSMEs), its main market segment.

The bank's audited financial statement shows during 2021 the bank's impairment losses on loans, advances and overdraft amounted 2.2bn/- from 4.4bn/- recorded during the previous

Loans, advances and overdraft remained nearly flat during the year amounting 77.7bn/- last year, while investment in government securities nearly doubled to 41.08bn/- from 22.7bn/-, which means the bank put more focus on investing risk free government debt instruments.

to a loss of 197 from a loss of 903 recorded in 2020, which indicates an increased recovery from the impacts of covid-19.

The statements show the bank has also managed to cut its losses after income tax to 5.4bn last year from 8.3bn/- in 2020 due to reduction of other operating expenses, increased of net interest income as well as fees and commissions.

In March last year, the National Bank of Malawi (NBM), the country's largest lender by market capitalization and assets - acquired a 51 percent stake in ACB in a deal worth \$7.31 million.

The two banks merger aimed at strengthening ACB capital as required by the Bank of Tanzania (BOT).

In June last year, bank's board announced the appointment of Mr. Silvest Arumasi as the new managing director.

Arumasi, a certified public accountant, has vast experience in the banking sector for more than 17 years primarily in retail and business banking, digital banking, product development, card business, risk management and compliance.

He previously worked as a regulator of banks at the Bank of Tanzania for 7 years before serving for more than 10 years as a senior executive at First National Bank (FNB) and National Bank of Commerce (NBC)

The Foreign Commonwealth development office, Ireland, and Norway funded the development of these systems with a contribution of \$600,000 for the iSQMT portal and US\$350,000 for the e-learning

The TradeMark East Africa Country Director Monica Hangi while speaking to The Guardian in an exclusive interview held at the TradeMark office in Dar es Salaam said the completion of the second phase of iSQMT system will enhance the standards and quality control, adding that plans are underway for accreditation of four of TBS testing laboratories.

"During the second phase of the system, our target is to at least accredit testing laboratories for TBS in Dar es Salaam and Mwanza. This will take a minimum of three years," she

He noted that once the laboratories are accredited, they

would help in provision of accurate and reliable results that meet global and international standards.

"This means that Tanzania products tested through the labs will be able to access international markets without necessarily being tested again in those particular markets since the laboratories meet international standards,' she said.

TBS and TMEA in 2016 signed a \$3million financing agreement which extended by TMEA's support to TBS with the aim of increasing efficiency and effectiveness of TBS in the development and implementation of standards in Tanzania

The agreement provided an opportunity for Tanzania to catch up with other EAC Partner States for TMEA support on standardization and conformity assessment.

It was an extension of support that TMEA has provided to TBS specifically procuring and delivering two categories of testing equipment which included mini-laboratory equipment and glassware. These are expected to contribute to a reduction in testing turnaround time and cost.

Resolution Insurance collapses with billions clients' money

RESOLUTION Insurance collapsed with over Ksh6.5 billion in client cash, insurance claims, and creditor funds after its shareholders failed to recapitalise the business.

The Insurance Regulatory Authority (IRA) said the insurer had collected Ksh4.1 billion in premiums from policyholders out of which 90 percent were medical customers.

The firm also owed creditors and had claims from the insurance business totalling Ksh2.5 billion, an indi-

suppliers eager to recover their funds from the failed insurer.

The Policyholders Compensation Fund (PCF), which has taken over the firm as the statutory manager, said the company presented the liabilities to the regulator but it will conduct an independent audit to verify the actual size of the claims.

PCF is expected to announce next week the total value of compensation to policyholders -which will be capped at Ksh250,000 for each client.

TANZANIA Share Index (TSI) registered a 8.5 per cent growth during the first quarter of this year, as the equity market remained resilient against covid-19 impacts, after posting an equity turnover of 34.9bn/-, according to statistics from the Dar Es Salaam Stock Exchange (DSE).

Data from the bourse further shows that during Quarter 1, 2022, seven local listed companies include Tanga Cement, NICO, CRDB, NMB, TWIGA, DSE and DCB registered enormous share prices gains.

The statistics indicate Tanga Cement was on top of the list, with its price growing by 65.5 percent followed by NICO whose share price grew by 56.7 percent and CRDB by

37.5 per cent.

According to the reports, NMB share price grew by 37 per cent, while the TWIGA cement by 20.6 with the self-listed DSE by 13.8 per cent, while the DCB Bank Plc share price grew by 2.6 per cent.

TBL enjoyed the lion's share after registering a turnover of 15bn/- mostly through pre-arranged deals hence not affecting its market price.

Stock analysts however predict a strong outlook for equity market, with corporate profitability remains the key reason for market performance, driving a massive buying spree in a number of counters.

According to the Zan Securities Chief Executive Officer Raphael Masumbuko, the market remains bullish with expectations of Tanzania shares

index (TSI) to gain more points during Q2, 2022, reflecting a "glass half full" outlook based on still-strong corporate sales and profit growth resulting from economic growth, measured inflation and low interest rates.

"These factors suggest a favorable backdrop for stocks, with the potential for more subdued gains when we enter the second quarter of 2022. More listed companies will release their 2021 audited financials and consequently dividend, which together will increase shares prices," Masumbuko noted.

Meanwhile, the bonds market during Q1, 2022 registered mixed performance with diversified portfolio holders that included long term bonds having a good start which strengthened first-quarter returns for diversified portfolios.

Yields fell across the yield curve, albeit faster on the long end of the curve ultimately pushing bond prices significantly high.

For investors seeking to buy bonds, the first quarter proved to be a painful one as low yields meant cost for

acquiring bonds was significantly high. Bank of Tanzania (BoT) statistics show that investors continued to favor long-term bonds as all four auctions oversubscribed by huge bid to cover ratios and investors seemed to repel from intermediate term bonds due to their relative illiquidity, whereby all two auctions that were re-opened (5 year and 10 year) undersubscribed.

Bitcoin losses steepen, dangling at \$40,000

BITCOIN'S losses accelerated during the start of the week, capping off a week of declines during the cryptocurrency's annual conference and ahead of the latest inflation reading on Tuesday that is spooking investors.

As of Monday afternoon New York time, BTC is losing ground and currently changing hands below \$40,000, having dropped 8.5 percent in the last five days, worse than the S&P 500 (-3.7 percent) but closer to the Nasdaq Composite (-7.1 percent). Ether (ETH) is down 5.9 per-

cent and trades just below \$3,000 per unit.

"Bitcoin is struggling here as rising rates are leading to a de-risking moment for many traders," wrote Edward Moya a senior analyst with Oanda in a research note, "With no momentum from the Bitcoin 2022 conference, the focus shifts to inflation and expectations are for a

very hot report that will probably be the peak."

Jubilee to construct \$4m headquarters complex in Tanzania

JUBILEE Holdings is spending US\$4 million to build a head office for its Tanzanian operations in a move that will save the insurer a hefty amount of money in rent.

The development comes as the insurer also plans to move its group corporate headquarters from Nairobi's Wabera Street to Upper Hill in a building previously owned by Coca-Cola and which it spent Ksh1.1 billion to acquire.

This will bring the company's spend on properties to more than Ksh1.6 billion, including the cost of renovating the Upper Hill building.

"We are building headquarters for our Tanzania business in Dar es Salaam. That is going to cost us \$4 million (Ksh461 million)," Jubilee's chairman Nizar Juma told the Business Daily.

"We have owned land there for many years and we feel this is the right time to build the headquar-

He added that the decision will see the company save the \$400,000 that its subsidiaries operating in that market have been paying in rent annually.

The company's subsidiaries and associates in Tanzania include Jubilee Life Insurance Corporation of Tanzania Limited and Jubilee Investments Tanzania Limited.

Groundbreaking for the office, which will have views of the sea from the first floor, will begin in the next few weeks.

The building is designed with an inclination toward environmental sustainability, Mr Juma said.

Tanzania has been the only market where Jubilee is leasing offices, with the insurer preferring to own the properties housing its operations.

The company will rent out part of its current head office - Jubilee Insurance House on Wabera Street– after moving to the Upper Hill property in September.

Mr Juma said the insurer got a bargain in buying the property sitting on 3.2 acres and which had been on the market for more than two years

Oil rises as Shanghai eases some Covid curbs and OPEC talks of tighter supply

BEIJING

OIL prices climbed on Tuesday on easing concerns about demand in China after Shanghai relaxed some COVID-19-related restrictions and OPEC warned it would be impossible to increase output enough to offset lost Russian supply.

Brent crude futures were up \$2.98 or 3.03 percent to \$101.46 a barrel, and U.S. West Texas Intermediate was up \$3 or 3.18 percent to \$97.29 a barrel at 0640 GMT. Both contracts had settled down around 4 percent on Monday.

"Market sentiment is in see-saw mode, both on the supply and the demand front," said Vandana Hari, founder of oil market analysis provider Vanda Insights.

The partial easing of Shanghai lockdowns lifted some of the downward pressure stemming from concerns about Chinese oil demand, she said.

The European Union is drafting proposals for an EU oil embargo on Russia in the wake of its invasion of Ukraine, some foreign ministers said on Monday. However, there is currently no agreement among members on crude from Russia, which calls its actions in Ukraine a "special operation".

Oil staged a partial recovery, after dropping 4 percent on Monday, as traders weighed China's demand outlook following the easing of some virus restrictions in the financial hub of

West Texas Intermediate futures rose more than 3 percent to trade above \$97 a barrel. Shanghai has eased lockdowns for some housing complexes, but most people remained confined to their homes, and authorities have indicated they will reimpose restrictions if virus cases climb.

Oil has now given up almost all its gains since Russia's invasion of Ukraine in late February.

The oil market's structure has softened markedly in recent weeks, as the spike in the price of physical barrels that emerged after war broke out gives way to calmer conditions. Differentials for supplies from the Middle East to West Africa have declined.

Oil prices have moved lower recently due the planned release of emergency reserves, the resurgence of Covid-19 in China -- prompting concerns about demand -- and uncertainty that Russian exports will hold up, according to Helge Andre Martinsen, a senior oil analyst at DNB Bank ASA.

"The price risk is skewed to the upside as Western sanctions will continue to escalate given Russia's continued aggression," he said in a research note.

The oil market has seen a tumultuous period of trading since late February, whipsawed by Russia's invasion of its neighbor, rising tensions in the Middle East, the virus flare-up in China and tighter U.S. monetary policy.

The spike in volatility spurred a liquidity crunch as exchanges hiked their margin requirements, though some of that move is now reversing with CME Group Inc. cutting margins for WTI by almost 8 percent.

Macron, Le Pen battle out on cost of living in runoff campaign

EMMANUEL Macron and Marine Le Pen traded blows at a distance on Monday over who would best protect French voters' purchasing power, kicking off a tense fight to win the presidential election runoff on April 24.

Macron, a pro-European centrist who became president in 2017 after easily beating Le Pen when voters rallied behind him to keep the far-right out of power, is facing a much tougher challenge

He is slightly ahead in polls, but Le Pen, who ahead of Sunday's first round successfully tapped into anger over the cost of living and a perception that Macron is disconnected from everyday hardships, pressed on those points on Monday.

"Emmanuel Macron, if by some mischance he was re-elected, would feel totally free to continue his policy of social wreckage," Le Pen said on a visit to a rural area southeast of Paris, mocking his comments on her policy plans and urging him to read her manifesto.

Warning of the "dark clouds" that inflation cast on France, she said Macron had failed to protect the French, adding that she would, if elected, slash the VAT

Macron had equally harsh words about his rival, telling La Voix du Nord newspaper in an interview on Monday, "Mrs. Le Pen is a demagogue. She is someone who tells people what they want to hear when they want to hear it."

Macron, who has repeatedly accused Le Pen of lying, said her economic promises were a fantasy.

On a walkabout in Denain, one of the country's poorest towns in its former industrial heartland, he warned voters that Le Pen, who has successfully focused her campaign on the cost-of-living issues troubling millions, would not be able to finance her populist economic agenda and that she was lying to voters.

In hours of sometimes heated exchanges, locals called Macron out on everything from his plans to push back the retirement age to his saying at the height of the Omicron phase of the COVID-19 pandemic that he wanted to "piss off" anti-vaxxers.

"I said that lovingly," he told a bewildered local about the much-commented "piss-off" comment.


MORE than 100 lawmakers loyal to Pakistan's ousted prime minister Imran Khan resigned on Monday, creating a headache for the new. Western-friendly incumbent Shehbaz Sharif as he tries to drag his country out of political and economic crisis.

Parliament's election of Sharif (pictured), 70, as prime minister on Monday followed a week-long constitutional crisis that reached a climax on Sunday when Khan, 69, lost a no-confidence vote in parliament.

His departure from power sparked street protests and a mass resignation of MPs from Khan's Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf party in protest at the impending change of government.

If the resignations are accepted by the speaker, Pakistan faces a prospect of more than 100 by-elections within two months, a major distraction for Sharif and his coalition partners and a potential platform for Khan to mobilize his support.

That in turn could ensure the nucleararmed nation of 220 million people remains prone to political and economic tur-



bulence.

Sharif has a reputation domestically as an effective administrator more than as a politician. He is the younger brother of three-time prime minister Nawaz Sharif.

Analysts say Shehbaz, unlike Nawaz, enjoys amicable relations with Pakistan's military, which traditionally controls foreign and defense policy.

After Monday's vote, Sharif vowed to tackle an economic malaise that has seen the rupee hit an all-time low and the central bank implement the biggest hike in interest rates in decades last week.

"If we have to save the sinking boat, what we all need is hard work, and unity, unity and unity," he told parliament.

"We are beginning a new era of development today." He took the oath of office at Pakistan's

presidential residence late on Monday at a ceremony packed with lawmakers and leaders from the combined opposition.

Reset ties

The younger Sharif emerged as the leader of a united opposition to topple Khan, a former cricket star who has claimed that the United States was behind his downfall, an assertion that Washington denies. Sharif said in an interview last week good

relations with the United States were critical for Pakistan for better or for worse, in stark contrast to Khan's prickly ties to Washington.

In his maiden speech, he also spoke of improving relations with neighbours India and China.

"We want good relations with India but a durable peace can't be possible without Kashmir's solution," he said, referring to the contested Himalayan territory the countries have fought several wars over.

He said his government will speed up construction of the \$60 billion China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC).

On Monday, Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi congratulated Sharif on the latter being elected as Pakistan's prime min-

In his congratulatory message to Sharif on social media, Modi said India desires peace and stability in the region.

"So that we can focus on our development challenges and ensure the well-being and prosperity of our people," Modi tweet-**Agencies**

S.Korea's incoming leader visits ex-president he investigated

SOUTH Korea's president-elect Yoon Suk-yeol met with former President Park Geun-hye yesterday for the first time since he led a corruption probe that resulted in her impeachment and a nearly five-year prison term.



Yoon (pictured), a former prosecutor-general who barely won a bitterly fought election last month as the new standard-bearer of Park's conservative party, faces low approval ratings and is keen to heal the wounds in his party over Park's ouster five years ago.

His People Power Party will face its next test at the polls in local elections on June 1, just weeks after his May 10 inauguration.

Yoon visited Park, 70, at her home in the southeastern city of Daegu, where she has lived since a pardon last December after serving nearly five years of a 20-year sentence on corruption charges.

"He planned to visit Park to see her health and exchange a friendly chat," Yoon spokesperson Bae Hyun-jin said in

The imprisonment of Park, the daughter of former dictator Park Chung-hee, had divided a country in which old Cold War rivalries between right and left still hold sway in politics, while creating a rift within the conservative camp.

Yoon won the March 9 election by a record narrow margin of 0.7 percent, and a poll released on Monday by Realmeter showed that only 50.4 percent of respondents said Yoon would carry out his presidential duties well, while 45.3 percent expected a poor performance. Newly elected presidents in South Korea have typically enjoyed a honeymoon period with much higher approval ratings during their early period in office.

Yoon said during the election campaign that he was sorry about what happened to Park, and was expected to invite her to his inauguration.

Some 3m virus doses to expire in Germany by end of June

WASHINGTON / THE HAGUE / BERLIN

AROUND three million COVID-19 vaccine doses are expected to expire in Germany by the end of June, a spokesperson for the health ministry said on Monday, as supply outstrips demand because a declining number of people are being vaccinated.

A law mandating the general population get vaccinated, which had failed to pass the parliament last week could have increased demand and made use of the surplus

After a shortage in vaccine doses at the beginning of the vaccine campaign in early 2021, Germany stepped up its deliveries to meet growing demand, but a lower inoculation rate means Germany has more vaccine than it needs

Around 76 percent of the population has received at least one dose, less than the level of more than 80 percent in western European countries including France, Italy and Spain

The ministry declined to provide information on the possible cost of the doses' expiry, citing contract confidentiality. BioNTech said last week its vaccine had a longer shelf life than previously estimated, meaning around seven million doses originally expected to expire by the end of June would be valid for longer.

Although countries in Africa, for instance, are in need of vaccines, Germany cannot donate its spare doses because of the difficulties of storing and transporting mRNA vac-

Britain

Britain will expand access to Pfizer's oral antiviral COV-ID-19 treatment to thousands more people by adding it to a trial to assess how best to use the drug in its highly vaccinated population, the health ministry said on Tuesday.

Paxlovid, a combination of Pfizer's new pill with an older antiviral ritonavir, was made available to thousands of people with compromised immune systems in Britain in

Now Paxlovid is being added to the Panoramic national study in England, which is making antivirals available to a wide number of patients while collecting data on how the drugs should best be used in a vaccinated adult popula-

Paxlovid was shown to reduce the relative risk of death or hospitalization by nearly 90 percent in clinical trials of high risk individuals given the treatment for five days. Currently it is advised to be taken during the early stages of COVID, though last month was added to another trial for hospitalized patients.

US Cold War mentality undermines international security cooperation

U.S. President Joe Biden recently delivered a speech full of the Cold War mentality in Warsaw, capital of Poland. In his speech, Biden spent considerable time in his speech discussing the victory of Western countries, including the U.S. in the Cold War and tried to play up ideological confrontation, attempting to show the world the so-called solidarity between the U.S. and its allies and the deterrent effect of the economic sanctions and military deployment of the

"Western world". U.S. President talked about practically everything in his speech, but only failed to mention how to stop the war and realize peace, indicating that certain U.S. politicians have never abandoned their Cold War mentality even though the Cold War ended more than 30 years ago, some media outlets pointed out.

The Russia-Ukraine tensions have evolved into a war exactly as a pernicious consequence of America's sticking to the Cold War mentality and continuously pushing the North Atlantic Treaty

Organization (NATO) eastward. According to British scholar Martin Jacques, the U.S.'s post-1991 hubris resulted in two disastrous decisions: to remake the world in its own image; and to

treat Russia as a defeated nation. The U.S. has promoted NATO's enlargement through five rounds of eastward expansion, leading to seriously imbalanced regional security. As a result, Ukraine, which should have been the bridge of communication between the East and the West, was gradually transformed into an outpost for major powers confrontation.

George Kennan, former U.S. ambassador to the Soviet Union, pointed out that the decision to expand NATO up to Russia's borders "would be the most fateful error of American policy in the entire post-cold-war era" and may be expected to "restore the atmosphere of the Cold War to East-West relations".

Today, as Ukraine remains mired in turmoil and the embers of conflict rekindle on the European continent, facts prove again that the Cold War mentality is the greatest threat to global peace and stability.

Since the outbreak of the Russia-Ukraine conflict, the U.S. has pursued its geopolitical goal with a Cold War mentality, rather than fostering peace negotiations. The country, which believes that it can exploit the Ukraine crisis to provoke ideological confrontation and deepen Europe's dependence on America, has been enthusiastically escalating tensions between Russia and Ukraine, fanning the flames of discord, and forcing other

countries into taking sides. Besides taking aim at Russia, the U.S.

has also continued to propagate disinformation to defame China and misrepresented China's responsible stance on the Ukraine issue: promoting dialogue and peace talks.

As Iliya Kusa, a political analyst with the Ukrainian Institute of the Future, pointed out, China has played a constructive role in the Ukraine crisis, while the U.S. is still focusing its attention on what it can do to weaken China.

Although the U.S. has frequently claimed that it does not seek a "new Cold War", the country has taken advantage of any chance to suppress China and Russia. Regarding the two countries as its top strategic competitors, it has made

arrangements to gain at their expense. Obviously, America's insistence on the

outdated Cold War mentality is the root cause of the escalation of regional and global security tensions.

"I know that eliminating Russian gas will have costs for Europe, but it's not only the right thing to do from a moral standpoint, it's going to put us on a much stronger strategic footing," said Biden during his visit to Europe. The remarks exposed the true colors of the U.S., a hypocrite that stops at nothing to create crises, shift its burden of crises onto others, and utilize crises to maintain its hegemony.

Russia destroys foreign supplies of missile systems in Ukraine

MOSCOW/KYIV/OTTAWA/PARIS/ BRUSSELS/ZAGREB

RUSSIA'S armed forces have destroyed air defense equipment supplied to Ukraine by a European country, the Russian Defense Ministry said Monday.

"On April 10, high-precision sea-based Kalibr missiles destroyed the equipment of an S-300 anti-aircraft missile division, which was supplied to Kiev by a European country," Russian Defense Ministry Spokesperson Igor Konashenkov told a daily briefing.

The equipment previously hidden in a hangar was destroyed on the southern outskirts of the eastern Ukrainian city of Dnipro.

Russia is continuing its special military operation in Ukraine. Total 129 aircraft and 99 helicopters, 243 antiaircraft missile systems, 441 unmanned aerial vehicles, 2,079 tanks and other armored combat vehicles, 239 multiple launch rocket systems, 909 field artillery and mortars, as well as 2,003 units of special military vehicles have been destroyed to date.

Moscow for continuing talks with Ukraine

Despite Ukraine's inconsistency and tendency to el, the crisis could lower global reject its own proposals, Russia prefers to continue GDP growth by 0.7-1.3 percentthe negotiation process, said Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov during an interview with the Rossiya 24 broadcaster.

Moscow will be patient and persistent throughout the negotiations. But it will never play a subordinate role in the current world order, he said.

"Russia, with its history ... its traditions, is one of those countries that will never occupy a subordinate position. We can only be members of the international community on equal terms, under conditions (that guarantee) the indivisibility of security," Lavrov said, adding that these principles were agreed upon and then ignored by the West.

EU resumes diplomatic presence in Ukraine

The delegation of the European Union to Ukraine said on Monday it has resumed its work in Kyiv. "The EU is back in town," the diplomatic mission tweeted.

The EU evacuated its delegation from Kyiv to the Polish city of Rzeszow shortly after the conflict between Russia and Ukraine started on Feb 24.

European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen and the EU foreign policy chief Josep Borrell visited Ukraine last week, promising a speedier process for the country to join the EU.

New Canadian sanctions on Russia

Canada on Monday announced new measures imposing restrictions on 33 entities in the Russian defense sector.

The entities have provided indirect or direct support to the Russian military, according to foreign min-

Since the start of the Russia-Ukraine conflict, Canada has imposed sanctions on more than 700 individuals and entities from Russia, Ukraine and Belarus.

France declares 6 Russian diplomats personae non

France on Monday declared "six Russian agents operating under diplomatic cover" personae non gratae.

After an investigation made by the General Directorate of Internal Security (DGSI) on Sunday, the six Ruszones aim to generate replicable pracsian agents "whose activities were revealed contrary to tices and experiences for the develour national interest have been declared persona non opment or cross-border e-commerce grata", the French Ministry for Europe and Foreign Affairs said in a press release.

Russia's foreign ministry has said Moscow will respond to the expulsion of diplomats from France, according to media reports.

WB: Ukraine's economy to shrink by 45.1%

Ukraine's gross domestic product will shrink by 45.1 percent this year due to the conflict with Russia, the Interfax-Ukraine news agency reported on Monday, citing a recent World Bank report.

Projecting that the poverty rate in Ukraine will increase from 1.8 percent in 2021 to 19.8 percent in 2022, the WB said private consumption this year will fall by 50 percent, exports will decrease by 80 percent, while

At least 18 shot in US New Orleans within 72 hours, 5 killed

HOUSTON

AT least 18 people were shot, with at least five of them killed, in New Orleans, the largest city in the southern U.S. state Louisiana within 72 hours, tying the record for the last 10 years, local media reported on Monday.

The shootings were reported by police in a 72-hour- (about \$311 billion). period from 7 a.m. (1200 GMT) Friday to 7 a.m. (1200 GMT) Monday local time, said a report from local media outlet Nola.

Locations of the shootings varied. Some occured in apartments or residences, some on roads and others were drive-by incidents.

A man was found dead on the ground in a parking lot after a shooting around noon Saturday, police said. The man had been shot multiple times and died at the scene. In a shooting on Saturday afternoon, two men, aged 36 and 38, were standing near an intersection hensive demonstration parks. when four unidentified people drove up and started shooting, police said.

The two men ran, but the vehicle followed, with the people inside opening fire again and hitting them. The two men's conditions were not available on Monday.

In another shooting on Saturday night, a 14-year-old was injured when an unidentified man approached the promoting industrial digitalization, so vehicle she was in with two other people and opened

A 25-year-old woman was riding early on Sunday when she heard gunshots and realized she had been value-added and consumption taxes shot. Early on Monday, a 37-year-old man was shot for cross-border e-commerce retail when two unidentified men approached him and opened fire.

WTO: Ukraine crisis could slash global trade growth by half

GENEVA

The ongoing conflict between Russia and Ukraine has dealt a severe blow to the global economy, reducing forecasted global trade growth for 2022 from the 4.7 percent predicted last October to between 2.4 percent and 3 percent.

The projection, based on a global economic simulation model, was made by the World Trade Organization Secretariat in a note issued on Monday.

According to the same modage points, bringing it to somewhere between 3.1 percent and 3.7 percent for 2022.

The conflict has pushed up food and energy prices and reduced the availability of goods exported by Russia and Ukraine, according to the WTO Secretariat note.

Russia and Ukraine are both important suppliers of essential products, notably food and energy, according to the note.

The two countries supplied around 25 percent of wheat, 15 percent of barley and 45 percent of sunflower product exports globally in 2019. Russia alone accounted for 9.4 percent of world thttps:// www.chinadailyhk.com/ article/266599#EU-targets-

Previously, China had set up 105 cross-border e-commerce pilot zones in 30 provincial-level regions in five batches. These pilot zones have facilitated rapid development of the indus-

According to statistics released by the General Administration of Customs, China's cross-border e-commerce volume soared tenfold over the past five years. In 2021 alone, the country's cross-border e-commerce imports and exports climbed 15 percent year on year to 1.98 trillion yuan

Biden administration moves to curb proliferation of 'ghost guns'

WASHINGTON

THE administration of US President Joe Biden announced Monday new measures aimed at curbing the proliferation of "ghost guns" - unthat law enforcement personnel are increasingly recovering at crime scenes in cities across the United

of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives as having been recovered by law enforcement in criminal investigations - a ten-fold increase from 2016.

Because "ghost guns" lack the serial numbers marked on the firearms, the US law enforcement has an exceedingly difficult time tracing a ghost gun found at a crime scene back to an individual purchaser.

A new rule issued by the US Department of Justice now bans the business of manufacturing the most accessible "ghost guns," such as unserialized "buy build shoot" kits that individuals can buy online or at a store without a background check and can readily assemble into a working firearm in as little as 30 minutes with the equipment they have at home.

It clarifies that these kits qualify as "firearms" under the Gun Control Act and that commercial manufacturers of such kits must therefore become licensed and include serial numbers on the kits' frame or receiver, and commercial sellers of these kits must become federally licensed and run background checks prior to a sale.

The rule applies to all "ghost guns," regardless of how they were made, which can include 3D printing as well as kits, while the DOJ will require federally licensed dealers to

take any unserialized firearm into inventory to serialize them. Biden introduced these new ac-

Polisi Tanzania FC has not won any game against Simba SC since they first met in the Mainland Tanzania Premier League

in 2019/20. Simba SC had locked horns with Polisi Tanzania FC five times before the previous

weekend's match.
In the games that were held from 2020 to 2022, Simba SC emerged victorious, winning 2-1, 2-1, 2-0, 1-0, and 1-0.

On Sunday, though, Polisi Tanzania FC seemed to have been prepared well to confront Simba SC at the former's home

turf, Ushirika Stadium.

The clash culminated in a 0-0 draw which witnessed some of Simba SC's supporters slowly start losing confidence in the squad's ability to confidently go for a title defense.

The supporters, who were optimistic Simba SC will notch victory to minimize its points gap with Yanga to eight, ended up witnessing the former manage to settle for a point.

Hence, Simba SC is placed second in the NBC Premier League table with 41 points after participating in 19 matches, making

it a 10-point difference from Yanga.

The results have seen Polisi Tanzania FC hold the eighth spot in the standing with 24 points after taking part in 19 matches.

The Guardian has evaluated how the game was played.

Polisi Tanzania FC had settled for defensive tactic whilst making counterattacks, attempting several shots.

Conte showing Man United what changing coach midseason can do

TOTTENHAM Hotspur were struggling in ninth position, already five points adrift of a top-four spot in the Premier League, when Antonio Conte was charged with saving the club's season last November. A month later, Ralf Rangnick started his role as interim manager at Manchester United with his team sitting in seventh and a three-point gap to fourth place.

With just over a month of the season left to play, it is clear that one of those appointments has worked and the other patently hasn't. Spurs are now three points clear of the chasing pack in fourth, while United are still in seventh, but closer to eighthplaced Wolves than Tottenham, who are six points ahead of Rangnick's faltering team.

The United hierarchy are probably too busy trying to finalise their move to hire Ajax coach Erik ten Hag to consider the irony of their decision to reject Conte and recruit a manager more in keeping with their socalled DNA following the dismissal of Ole Gunnar Solskjaer last November, but the contrasting fortunes of Conte and Rangnick show that changing a manager midseason is not always a guarantee of a positive impact.

United sources told ESPN in January that they overlooked Conte - who was out of work at the time after his exit from Inter Milan -- as Solskjaer's replacement because he was too abrasive and demanding of his players. The view within the Old Trafford boardroom was that the United squad would not embrace Conte's very particular approach of giving his players specific instructions, that he would "overload them with information," and that the team needed a more cerebral coach -- one who would treat them as the highcalibre players that they are deemed

When you strip it back, that ex-



planation of United's decision not to hire Conte may actually mean that the former Juventus, Chelsea and Inter Milan coach was too abrasive and demanding of his bosses and that, in reality, was why United's owners, the Glazer family, and the board chose to appoint the more personable Rangnick.

But as the season reaches its conclusion, it's safe to say that United messed up and Spurs are now reaping the rewards of their decision to dismiss concerns over Conte's challenging style by trusting him to make a squad of underperforming players achieve their potential.

Rangnick has won fewer than half of his 17 Premier League games in charge of United, with Saturday's 1-0 defeat at Everton extending the club's dismal run to just one win in eight in all competitions -the win coming against Conte's Tottenham last month.

Conte, meanwhile, has inspired Spurs to 13 league wins from 21 games, with only three defeats in that time. The Italian was also successful in persuading his board to make changes in January, allowing him to offload Dele Alli, Tanguy Ndombele, Bryan Gil and Giovani Lo Celso, and bring in Rodrigo Bentancur and Dejan Kulusevski from Juventus. In just three months, Bentancur and Kulusevski have done more for Spurs this season than any of the outgoing players had managed during the first half of the campaign.

Rangnick, by contrast, allowed Donny van de Beek (Everton) and Anthony Martial (Sevilla) to leave on loan, but failed to persuade the board to sanction a move for Jesse Lingard. The former RB Leipzig coach did not push for incomings, despite the need for a striker and midfielder, and United are now reaping what they sowed during the transfer window.

Conte's personality, rather than prove to be the negative that United believed it to be, has actually ignited Tottenham's squad and driven the club to make crucial changes in January. The opposite has happened at United and a club whose so-called DNA is rooted in Champions League football are now in a battle with Wolves for qualification for the UEFA Conference League because they chose Rangnick rather than Conte.

Changing managers midseason is not an exact science, especially when the hiring club rules out the best candidates for reasons that others wouldn't worry about.

Chelsea showed last season, when replacing Frank Lampard United would rather forget.

with Thomas Tuchel, that ignoring a negative reputation can deliver success. Tuchel, fired by Paris Saint-Germain, was viewed by many within the game as being as outspoken and difficult as Conte can be, but the German delivered Champions League glory six months after taking charge and sources have told ESPN that he is now so highly-regarded at Stamford Bridge that the team's recent blip in form will not threaten his position.

Everton are still waiting to see whether replacing Rafael Benitez with Lampard was worth it in January, with Lampard losing seven of 10 league games, but Jesse Marsch is already justifying his appointment in place of Marcelo Bielsa at Leeds in February having steered the team away from the relegation zone with three wins from six games.

Eddie Howe has also been a success at Newcastle, banishing relegation fears with eight wins from 20 since replacing Steve Bruce in November. But no new boss has done a better job than Conte - a fact that Spurs are relishing and

Lemar: 'It might not look pretty, but it works. Atletico win

"IT's not about advice, says Thomas Lemar. "It's more when he talks, the way he talks, his honesty. That's what makes you play out of your

Lemar knows better than anyone the power of Diego Simeone. After joining Atletico Madrid for 60 million euros from Monaco in 2018, Lemar struggled. He scored four goals in his first two seasons and many assumed Atletico would look to cut their losses the following summer.

Yet Simeone saw a player that needed help not a transfer. He moved Lemar from left wing to central midfield and, together, they got to work. Last season, Lemar was an ever-present in the midfield three and fundamental to Atletico winning La Liga.

"I had a discussion with the coach last year and we spoke about how to improve my situation in the team," Lemar says in an exclusive interview with AFP.

"He listened, he found a role that suited my strengths. I was more comfortable and it made it easier for me to fit into Atletico's style. Now my aim is to repay him as much as possible on the pitch."

When Lemar came from Monaco, he was a winger, creator and scorer, one of the world's most exciting young attackers, who had drawn interest from Liverpool and Arsenal.

But when that role failed to translate at Atletico, Lemar had to adjust. "I worked hard on my negative points and turned them into positive points, and I became a better, more versatile footballer," said Lemar.

"Especially defensively, in recovering the ball, in getting into the right defensive position. I worked on it, I added more strings to my bow. I'm a more complete player

The 26-year-old played for France at the European Championship and is determined to be in the squad for



goal for me, I have to show what I'm worth," he says.

That Lemar has become more defensively-minded at Atletico Madrid will come as little surprise given Simeone is now seen as the pre-eminent defensive coach in the game, a master of how to play without the ball.

Those methods have lifted Atletico out of mediocrity and into Europe's elite - bringing two La Liga titles and a pair of Champions League finals along the way - but aesthetically, it is a style that continues to frustrate.

Atletico were beaten 1-0 by Manchester City last week in the first leg of the Champions League

this year's World Cup. "It's a big quarter-finals but statistically, they suffered a hammering.

City had 15 shots to Atletico's nil and afterwards, Pep Guardiola said: "In prehistory, today and in a hundred thousand years, attacking a 5-5-0 (formation) is very difficult."

Atletico captain Koke responded on Instagram with a picture of the club's crest and the caption: "In love with your story since prehistory. Proud to be from Atleti."

Lemar is asked what he would say to Simeone's critics. "I have nothing to say to them, except look at the results over the years. Look at the results since the coach arrived at Atletico Madrid.

"It might not look pretty, but it

works. Atletico win, that's the most important thing."

And while there has been a shift, a greater emphasis on possession this season, if only to accommodate their attacking talents, Lemar says Simeone's principles are unwavering.

"If you knew Simeone as a player, that's still the identity of Atletico now," Lemar says. "We're a feisty team. We get to every ball. We never accept defeat, in matches or in training.

"Everyone has to fight for their place. The coach always tells us never to take our spots for granted. He says competition and rivalry is what makes us grow." Atletico have tended to grow in ad-

versity too, Simeone's sides finding their fire burns brightest when their backs are against the wall. It is why even though Manchester

City were so clearly superior in the first leg, there is belief that a comeback is possible in the return at the Wanda Metropolitano on Wednesday. "It's always been that way with Atleti

but I'm not going to lie, and maybe it helps, but we get scared as well sometimes when we have to come from behind, even if we know we can change the game in a second," Lemar says.

"It was annoying to concede that goal against City but if you want to go through, you have to score. We saw there were some opportunities to get at them and we're going to go hard in this second leg. Let's hope it comes off."

The Boston Marathon is an annual marathon race hosted by several cities and towns in greater Boston in eastern Massachusetts.

It is traditionally held on Patriots' Day, the third Monday of April, it is the world's oldest marathon having begun in 1897.

The event attracts 500,000 spectators each year, making it New England's most widely viewed sporting event. It started with 15 participants in 1897.

The event now attracts an average of about 30,000 registered participants each year.

It is one of six World Marathon Majors. Its course runs from Hopkinton in southern Middlesex County to Copley Square in Boston.

The Boston Athletic Association (B.A.A.) has organized this event annually since 1897, except for 2020 when it was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In 2021, it was held later, in October. The race has been managed

by DMSE Sports, Inc., since 1988.

Amateur and professional runners from all over the world compete in the Boston Marathon each year, braving the hilly Massachusetts terrain and varying weather to take part in the race.

The National Paralympic Championships, which were taking place in the country after many decades of absence, attracted more than 100 athletes from both Mainland Tanzania and Zanzibar. The championships were spon-
